Communal Agencies Conclave, Oct. 9-10

Local Leaders to Speak at Hartford

The session of "Family Welfare and Related Activities" include as discussants Jacob Temkin, Miss Rose Presel, Maurice Stollerman, Walter I. Sundlun, Samuel M. Magid, Isaac E. Feinstein, Max L. Grant, Charles Hoffman, and Dr. Banice Feinberg.

J. I. Cohen and Milton C. Sapinsley have been selected to serve as discussants in the session of "Group Work and Group Activities."

This is the fourth annual Conference at which leaders throughout New England gather to discuss their local programs and to exchange experience for the purpose of creating or improving services to meet constantly changing needs.

Hospital Orderlies Strike in Brooklyn

New York, N. Y. (WNS)—500 patients at the Jewish Sanatorium and Hospital for Chronic Diseases in Brooklyn waited an hour for supper because of a strike of orderlies and kitchen employees.

Bernard Lebovitz, vice-president of the hospital, said the strike started at 5 p. m. when several employees walked out in protest against the dismissal of a woman orderly because of scratching a patient.

The orderlies seized the kitchen and refused to move until ejected by the police. The patients then were fed with the help of volunteers among the nurses and visitors.

Roumania Outlaws Zionist Movement

Bucharest (WNS)—Zionism became in effect an outlaw movement throughout Roumania when the Roumanian government sent instructions to all local officials to forbid the collection of funds for Palestine and ordered the arrest of officials of the Zionist Organization and the confiscation of Zionist funds.

No reason was given for the action. A formal protest is being prepared by Jewish leaders here.

New York (WNS)—Samuel B. Finkel, director of the American Friends of the Hebrew University, will leave for Palestine on the S.S. Roma on October 2nd to confer with administrative officials of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

Claim Nazis Carrying on Trade Piracy in U. S.

New York—Dr. Mitchell Salem Fisher, chairman of the legal committee of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, in an address recently accused the German government of carrying on a large scale trade piracy in the United States, in deliberate violation of the American laws.

He asserted that it was being carried on in two ways: by evasion of the marking laws, and by "unconscionable dumping of goods in the United States."

"In evading the Marking Laws" said Dr. Fisher, "all kinds of tricks have been resorted to; price tickets have been placed over the words 'Made in Germany'; mirrors with that symbol on the back have had the back completely covered with green plush; and, over the words 'Made in Germany' on pottery made in Nazi-land, there have been painted beautiful gold stripes which, while esthetically pleasing, are tools of fraud. Not only has the Treasury Department of our country been apathetic to such plain violations, but

Says Jewish Spirit Alone Permanent in Judaism

Cincinnati—"The only thing which is permanent in Judaism is neither Jewish culture nor Jewish civilization, but the Jewish spirit—a particular mode of viewing life and its institutions," Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president of the Hebrew Union College, declared in the principal address at the exercises which marked the opening of the sixty-third academic year of the Cincinnati rabbinical institution.

Dr. Morgenstern outlined his belief that the true meaning of reform and progress of "discriminative assimilation."

He declared, "The task of Judaism and the task of the Jew today and throughout all time is to assimilate without being assimilated, to invest the cultural treasures of the people with whom Israel comes into close contact with the Jewish spirit and world view, and then to give them back to the world purified."

Viscount Peel Dies; Advocated Partition

Viscount Peel, chairman of the British Royal Commission which recently advocated partition of Palestine, died in London.

Viscount Peel was a grandson of Sir Robert Peel, the British Prime Minister, and a cousin of the late Sir Robert Peel, husband of Beatrice Lillie, the actress.

During a long public career, Viscount Peel, a Conservative, was chairman of the London County Council, Under-Secretary of War, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and twice Secretary of State for India.

Racketeers Find Haven in Palestine

New York, N. Y. (WNS)—According to a report in the New York Daily Mirror, Louis Buchalter and Jacob Shapiro, two of New York's most notorious racketeers in the fur industry, have gone to Palestine to escape prosecution in this city.

If admitted into Palestine, they cannot be extradited by the United States Government as there is no extradition treaty between the two countries.

Officials Consider Marital Law

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A reward of £10,000 (\$50,000), unprecedented in the history of Palestine, was announced by the Government for information leading to the arrest of the slayers of Lewis Yelland Andrews, District Commissioner of Galilee, who was shot to death September 26th, as he left a Nazareth church.

Police raids conducted throughout the country during the past two days netted scores of Arab notables, held on charges of inciting to terrorism or merely for purposes of investigation.

In addition to 108 Arabs previously arrested, 25 more were seized in Haifa, including the Secretary of the Moslem Association and many of its leaders, also a mosque preacher. All of them were dispatched to Acre Jail. Many Arabs suspected of participation in terroristic acts or incitation are known to have bolted the country until such time as the furore aroused by Andrews' slaying subsides. Among the notables arrested were a number of Moslem judges and also Subhi el Khadra, one of the leaders of the 1936 general strike.

The situation was so intense that authorities were reported considering martial law.

National Secretary To Address Pioneers

Sarah Feder, national secretary for the Women Pioneers will be the guest speaker at the first regular meeting of the local group, to be held on Monday at 109 Washington street.

Miss Feder, who comes as a delegate from the Congress, received her education in the field of sociology. She attended a Normal school, the University of Illinois, and then pursued her education at Columbia University Teachers College. She received her Master Degree at the University of Missouri.

She has devoted much time and study to the needs of the Women Pioneers and accepted the leadership only when she found herself adequately prepared.

Mrs. L. Sherman and her committee will be hostesses for the afternoon.

Volunteer O'Goldstein Put Irish in Hypnotic Trance on Madrid Front

New York—The O'Goldstein of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade was conspicuous while in the trenches outside Madrid, for at least two reasons:

First, he was the only Jew in a company of Irishmen, who at roll call could scarcely restrain their mirth when his name rang out, and they therefore dubbed him—Milton Goldstein, twenty-one—"The O'Goldstein."

Hypnotizer

Second, by way of entertainment, he would hypnotize his comrades-in-arms and make them do almost everything except give the Fascist salute. They would walk in their sleep and stick pins into themselves and feel no pain. Such entertainment has been provided

at the front rarely, if ever, in all the history of warfare.

Fascists Spoil Fun

One time, said Goldstein—being interviewed for the first time on his return to this city—he had a couple of Irishmen hypnotized or half hypnotized when the Fascists as he called them, opened fire. From force of habit everybody in the company fell flat, all except the two in a trance. Goldstein was sufficiently mindful of his responsibility to raise his head and cry out: "Wake up! Wake up!" They did, and then laid down with the rest.

Liked the Irish

"If anybody says anything against the Irish, I'll fight at the drop of a hat," was Goldstein's

reply when asked what it was like to be the only Jew in a company of Irishmen.

Wanted Revenge

It was because, as a Jew, he wished to get back at Hitler in the only way possible that Goldstein sailed for Spain, without telling his parents. He joined the James Connelly company; was the first American given a ten-day leave for bravery, and is out of it now as the result of an injury while carrying munitions over a stretch of twelve hours.

Girl Waited

While Goldstein was away, his father, Morris Goldstein, a Jewish choir leader, lighted candles for him in their home in Brooklyn.

Charity Racket Costs Jews Thousands Yearly

During recent months the Herald has received a number of inquiries from individuals, many non-Jewish, concerning the legitimacy of organizations from an out-side area soliciting funds via the mail. These organizations usually employ an effective, heart-touching appeal designed to provoke an immediate response before the intellect becomes suspicious.

Not All Give

While it is known that many give without investigating the worthiness of the charity, they have been those whose suspicions have been aroused. These men and women have, at various times requested the aid of the Herald in determining the forces behind these appeals. Through its affiliated agencies the Herald has been able to save Providence citizens sizeable amounts each year. For reports on these mail solicitations indicate that the charity racket is sometimes as profitable as the often dramatized cleaning, poultry and trucking rackets.

Charities Local

Some of the results of the Herald's inquiries indicate that many of the organizations soliciting funds serve a definite local area. Their charitable intent may be worthwhile; yet, since they exploit the commercial possibilities of charity by giving a percentage of the "take" to professional campaigners, the worthiness of the charity takes on a dubious tint. Secondly, since they serve only locally, the funds they receive from a national campaign, many times are more than sufficient for their needs. Where, then, does the excess money go? This is only one of the questions that a prospective on a "sucker" list should ask before writing a check.

Council Investigated

The Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds has investigated the many-faced angles of charity solicitations and they have formulated a set of rules which the individual may well follow.

Mail Solicitation

The Board disapproves of the solicitation of funds through the sale of merchandise through the mails; and secondly, the solicitation of funds by local organizations in other than the communities in which they serve. While these practices are permitted by law, they are not to be considered desirable methods of obtaining support for charitable agencies.

Standards

The following standards are therefore suggested:

(1) A legitimate purpose with suitable program and no avoidable duplication of the work of

another efficiently managed organization.

(2) Reasonable efficiency in conduct of work, management of institutions, etc., and suitable equipment of such work, both material and in personnel, and a budget indicating an attainable program.

Responsible Body

(3) An active and responsible governing body, holding regular meetings, with satisfactory form of administrative control.

(4) Evidence of co-operation with other organizations in promoting efficiency and economy of administration among local agencies and in preventing duplication of work. Organizations engaged in personal service should clear their cases with the Social Service Exchange of the Welfare Council.

Ethical Methods

(5) Ethical methods of publicity, promotion and solicitation of funds. Ethical methods exclude solicitors on commission or other commission methods of raising money; the "remit of return" method of raising money by the sale of merchandise or tickets through the mail; telephone solicitations; agreements to conduct entertainments for money-raising purposes, the expenses of which, including compensation under the terms of agreement, exceed 40 per cent of the gross proceeds.

(6) Complete annual audited accounts prepared by a certified public accountant and available to the public.

Herald Offer

Individuals wishing to determine the legitimacy of a charity need only write the Herald. Within a week, a report on the organization will be available which will enable the individual to draw his own conclusions on the worthiness of the charity.

Andover, N. J. (WNS)—A tongue-in-cheek invitation to Samuel Untermeyer, and Representative Samuel Dickstein, two of the leading anti-Nazi spokesmen, "to come up and see our camp and talk to us," was extended by Fritz Kuhn, national fuhrer of the German-American Bund, at the last weekly rally at Camp Nordland.

Addressing a record crowd of 18,000, Kuhn appealed for funds to build a new \$40,000 building and urged his followers to contribute the "forty cents which you spend in a Jewish movie house."

Poland Pushes Plan For Mass Evacuation

Geneva (WNS)—Pushing its plan for the mass evacuation of its Jewish population the Polish government laid before the Assembly of the League of Nations a scheme calling for the establishment of an international agency to underwrite the cost of moving 100,000 people from Eastern and Central Europe to South America.

The proposed plan would cost from three to five hundred million Swiss Francs, Adam Rose, the Polish delegate, said.

Dr. Israel M. Goldman, Rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, in his capacity as Lecturer at Brown University Extension Division, is offering a lecture course this Fall semester. The first lecture will be held this coming Wednesday night, October 6th. The lectures are being given in Rogers Hall, Room 2.

The course is entitled "Ten Jews of the Ages" and is described in the catalogue as follows:

"This course will present an appreciation and understanding of the lives, achievements and influences of ten Jews, from the earliest times to the present, whom the world has claimed for its own. They present the gift of the Jewish spirit to humanity. The drama of each of their lives is a human interest story of never-fading fascination. The message of each of these giants of the spirit is of great contemporary significance in every phase of present-day life.

"The following are the lecture themes: (1) Moses, Lawgiver and Liberator; (2) Jeremiah, Patriot and Social Reformer; (3) Jesus, the Rabbi of Nazareth; (4) Akiba, Scholar, Saint and Martyr; (5) Paul, the Jewish Light to the Gentile World; (6) Maimonides, the Philosopher in Religion; (7) Mendelssohn, the Great Emancipator; (8) Marx, the Father of Socialism; (9) Freud, the Columbus of the Mind; (10) Herzl, the Jewish Nationalist."

Registrations are now open. Those who wish to register may communicate with Prof. Ekstrom of Brown University.

Edmondson Trial Put Off Until Nov. 15

New York (WNS)—The trial of Robert Edward Edmondson, anti-Semitic pamphleteer, on an indictment of having libeled the Jewish religion, Secretary of Labor Perkins and Dean Gildersleeve of Barnard College, was again postponed, this time to November 15, when Judge Wallace in General Sessions Court granted the request of Edmondson's counsel.

The trial had been set for September 13. Edmondson, who was indicted last year, pleaded illness and the absence of vital witnesses.

Mrs. Ruth L. Mirsky Chosen as Case Worker by Family Welfare

Jewish Family Welfare Society has engaged as case worker, Ruth Lessler Mirsky, according to announcements made by Arthur J. Levy, President. Mrs. Mirsky replaces Mrs. Edwin Waldman, formerly Miss Janet Fain who resigned early in the summer.

The new case worker received her education in social work at Columbia University, Harvard University, and Simmons College School of Social Work.

From 1929 to 1931 she served as Receptionist with American Red Cross in Bridgeport, Conn. In 1933 and 1934 she was Girl Supervisor at the Jewish Orphanage of Rhode

Island and left that position in order to further her studies.

From 1935 to 1937 she acted as Field Supervisor of Emergency Relief and Works Progress Administration in charge of government family case work in twenty-three towns including Lowell, Massachusetts.

In announcing her appointment, Mr. Levy made the following statement:

"In engaging Mrs. Mirsky as case worker, Jewish Family Welfare Society has endeavored and we believe succeeded in complying with the recommendations of the recent Providence survey and of

Providence Community Fund. She is fully qualified by education and field experience to bring to her work the most modern methods essential to do a good job. The Executive Committee, in making its choice, has paid particular attention to obtaining a worker of such personality as will bring to families in need of care a thorough kindly spirit and a warm interest in their welfare.

"In exactly the same sense as we wish to provide a thoroughly trained physician to care for illness, whether the patient be rich or poor, in the same spirit we have sought to provide a specialist to care for families whose affairs are ailing so that we may not only relieve suffering, but also seek the cause, prescribe the cure, and restore the family to its place in the community."

Sirovich to Edit New Magazine

New York (WNS)—William I. Sirovich, Democratic Congressman of New York, will be the editor of a new monthly magazine, "The New Democracy!"

Its publisher, Paul J. Swift, announces that the magazine "will wage a holy war against the unholy forces which seek to undermine the foundations of American life." Fascism is specifically mentioned as one of the isms to be attacked. The first issue of the magazine will appear on December 1st.

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On Charity

On another page in this week's Herald is
an article about charity organizations and
their methods of soliciting funds

These organizations from an outside city
flood Providence with appeals for their proj-
ects, many of which serve but a local area. In-
stead of seeking funds for their budgets from
the localites, they, through professional, com-
mercialized methods, obtain their funds
through a nation-wide appeal. After the ex-
penses of this professional "schnorrng" are
deducted there seldom is sufficient remaining
for the charity.

It would be more expedient if the individ-
ual receiving these mail appeals would deposit
those suspicious ones in the waste-paper basket
and make their intended donations to a local
charity.

Contrary to the popular belief, our local
charities are not sufficiently financed. Many
are on starvation budgets; and others are
overcrowded and require new structures. If
the thousands that are contributed each year
in answer to mail appeals were diverted to the
Community Fund or the local Jewish Char-
ities, it would help place our organizations in
a better position to serve the public.

Remember—Charity begins at home.

Haym Solomon

The same hard luck that dogged the steps
of Haym Salomon, the patriotic Jewish finan-
cier of the American Revolution, and that suc-
ceeded in preventing his heirs from being com-
pensated by the government, seems to be at
work again.

For many years efforts have been made to
erect a monument to Haym Salomon. Petty
bickering prevented the consumation of such
a plan in New York. A similar project in
Washington also fell by the wayside.

Now troubles seems to be besetting the
Patriotic Foundation of Chicago which is spon-
soring the erection of a George Washington-
Robert Morris-Haym Salomon Memorial in the
midwest metropolis.

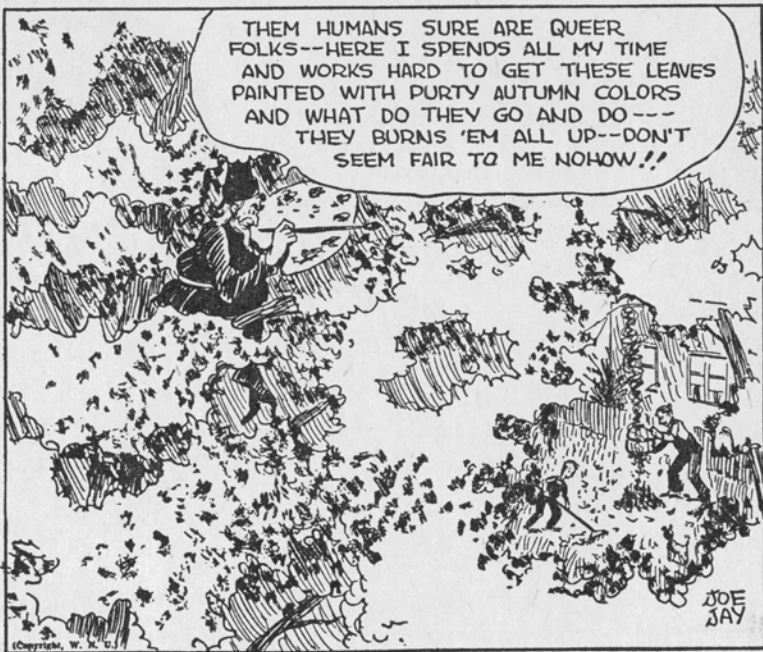
Of the sum required to build the memorial

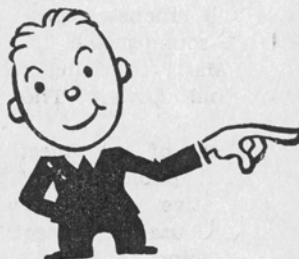

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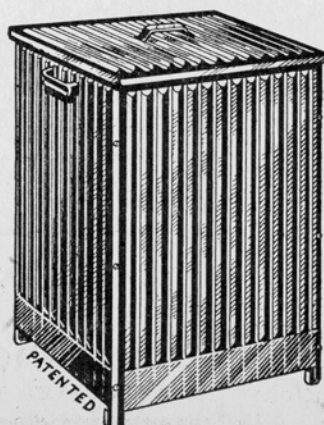

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Spanish Moroccan Jews Terrorized

Fascists Provoke Disturbances

Tangier (WNS)—The plight of the Jews of Spanish Morocco, which is controlled by the Spanish Fascists, is becoming increasingly worse, according to reports reaching here.

Spanish and Moslem groups have established special Falangist (Fascist) organizations which continue to provoke anti-Jewish incidents.

Even Jewish funeral processions are attacked in the streets, compelling Jews to bury their dead under cover of night.

Whenever the local Rebel authorities are in need of funds they extort large sums from the Jews. But because of the rigidly enforced anti-Jewish boycott, such extortions can no longer be met.

Nazi agents in Morocco are openly demanding the adoption of anti-Jewish legislation.

Urge Support of Center Convention

In a letter addressed to Center members and officials throughout New England, Nathan A. Heller, president of the Associated Y. M. & Y. W. H. A.'s of New England, urged the support of annual convention to be held in the Biltmore Hotel, this city, on October 23-24.

Mr. Heller's letter in part read: "The Convention is not only an opportunity for good fellowship but an important means by which we can improve our contribution to the Jewish Center and the Jewish community."

Kaiser's Crony Prays For American Hitler

Malden - on - Hudson, N. Y. (WNS)—Poultney Bigelow, crony of the former Kaiser Wilhelm II of Germany, celebrated his 82nd birthday here with a public statement on the condition of the world in which he expressed the hope that God would send some one like Hitler to rule the United States. A firm believer in dictatorship, Mr. Bigelow said "Germany has now an ideal administration. I knew her 70 years ago, and now under Hitler. Would to God that He would make another such man to settle our Bolshevike strikers and sterilize our irresponsible Congressmen and even more pernicious fabricators of public opinion."

Abraham Mordecai was one of the founders of Montgomery, Alabama.

New Anti-Jewish Bomb Outrages Stir Warsaw

Warsaw (WNS)—Boldly defying Premier Skadkowski himself, who had assured a delegation of Jewish members of parliament he would take immediate measures to halt anti-Jewish terrorism, anti-Semites renewed their violence in Warsaw with a series of bomb outrages which brought injuries to 23 Jews.

Roumania, Though Prosperous, is Making Life Miserable for Jews

"Jews in Poland and Roumania are making a valiant stand against the brutal forces of anti-Semitism that seek to overwhelm them," Rabbi Ferdinand Isserman of St. Louis stated this week on his return from a visit to those countries.

"One has a right to expect the Jews of Roumania to be in a happier plight," Rabbi Isserman went on to say. "Roumania's population grew from seven million to 22 million since the world war. It is a rich agricultural country. It has no unemployment, but the Jews of Roumania are miserable."

"They are miserable because of political circumstances, and because of perverted nationalism which is wrecking their country. The Jews of Roumania gained citizenship through the Treaty of Versailles. That clause, Roumania has violated in spirit if not in letter."

"The aim of the government is to eliminate all members of min-

orities, of whom the Jews are only 20 per cent, not only from government posts, but from all strategic points within the kingdom.

"The prosperity that is Roumania's only brings despair and hunger and hopelessness to its Jews."

Satire on Summer Resorts True Picture, Says Hotel Proprietor

New York—Mr. Max Leshnick, a smallish, dark-skinned man, rendered even darker by prolonged exposure to the sun, said the other day, that Arthur Kober, author of "Having Wonderful Time" certainly knows his resorts.

Mr. Leshnick came down from his own resort ("it is ninety-eight miles like a bargain counter mileage") to pick up an entertainer or two and to have a look at Mr. Kober's play about Kamp Kare-free.

Has a Partner

He is in partnership with Irving Podolnick in the operation of a Hotel at Swan Lake, 200 rooms, accommodating 500 if lots of them sleep two in a bed. Mr. Podolnick, explained Mr. Leshnick, takes care of matters in the back end, such as the kitchen and dining room, whereas Mr. Leshnick is the "front man" who keeps the customers happy.

"But the unattached young men and young women," he explained, "come at different times every year. Early in the season, maybe, will come all the girls and no boys. Late in the season will come all the boys, and by that time the girls have all gone home. So the following year it will be just the opposite, because the boys will think they should come early so they can be with the girls, and vice voisa." Some fun!

Loud Enterprise

M. L. is proud to say that he inaugurated a loud speaker system that extends throughout his and similar resorts. "Is for giving the first call for breakfast and the last call for breakfast and so on. Galt, Ontario (WNS)—Jews and Christians alike in this city of 14,000 in Central Canada are up in arms against Mayor R. K. Servis who publicly declared that "I feel the same way about" the Jews "as Hitler."

Servis' remark was made at a meeting of the board of aldermen after he had refused to retract a previous statement that S. Lunenfeld, a Jewish member of the board, was "a bloody Jew".

Ignoring Lunenfeld's announcement that he would resign from the board, Mayor Servis said, "I have no retraction to make. I told Alderman Lunenfeld at the August meeting of the welfare board that he was a Jew—a bloody Jew. I repeat what I said then, that I feel the same way about his race as Hitler does. I have no apology to offer him. It is time he was told he is a Hebrew and what a Gentile thinks of a Hebrew."

Geneva (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The case of Palestine's Arabs was again presented forcefully to the Assembly of the League of Nations when Tewfil Bey Swaidi, Foreign Secretary of Iraq, condemned Great Britain's allegedly pro-Jewish policy in Palestine and criticized the proposal for the partition of the country.

Echoing the statement made before the Assembly by the Foreign Secretary of Egypt, the Iraqi spokesman asserted that "over 300,000 foreigners have been introduced into Palestine and the Arabs of Palestine are in danger of becoming a minority in their own country. 'Which of the States here represented' he cried out, 'would consent to similar treatment?'"

The Balfour Declaration, pledging a Jewish National Home, conflicts with Article 22 of the League Covenant, he asserted, adding that "we cannot agree that Palestine should be sacrificed or made an international problem merely to provide a solution for the internal problems of other States."

The Arabs of Iraq are grateful to Britain, but nevertheless Iraq continues to protest against the injustice being done to Palestine Arabs, Swaidi declared.

Pro-Nazi Germans Ousted from League

Peoria, Ill. (WNS)—"Americans of German extraction who raise palms in Nazi salute and display the swastika emblem in a fervor of perverted patriotism" were assailed in a resolution adopted by the German-American Citizens League of Illinois.

After Fred Rixmann of Chicago, the League's president, had declared that "as a united citizens group we can be a mighty force in driving from the land any influence which seeks to undermine the Americanism which we hold dear," the League voted to expel all pro-Nazi members.

Three Arabs Injured in Acre Jail Riot

Haifa (WNS-Palcor Agency)—As a result of disorders arising out of a hunger-strike against their detention, three Arab political prisoners were injured when they clashed with warders.

The rioting was finally subdued. An official communique stated that a number of Arabs being detained at the Acre concentration camp went on a hunger-strike and slept without bedding. The camp, where the revolt took place, is near the ancient Acre Jail.

PARTITION WAITS

After examining the resolution adopted by the Council of the League of Nations on England's plan to partition Palestine into Jewish and Arab states, the only conclusion possible is that partition has been eliminated as an issue of immediate concern.

Touching on the weakest point in the British proposals—the absence of a definite scheme for partition—the Council deferred any definite action on the scheme until England was ready to lay before it a comprehensive plan. Thus the entire question is tossed back into Britain's lap, which means that another Commission will be sent to Palestine to draft a concrete partition proposal.

Meanwhile, however, the Council emphasized that the existing Palestine Mandate, which England has called unworkable, remains in full force, and declared that restriction of Jewish immigration is only temporary. In other words the League of Nations has in effect restored the status quo as it existed before the Royal Commission's report was made public. This means that partition will have to wait, perhaps four or five years, until another Commission can go to Palestine, make its report and win for it the approval of the House of Commons and the League of Nations.

DANGER IN BUCHAREST

Although anti-Semitic agitation, discrimination and even violence are no rarities in Roumania, the latest anti-Jewish campaign in that country has all the earmarks of being inspired from some central source.

Starting with the inflammatory utterance of the head of the Greek Orthodox Church that the Jews ought to be dealt with like a pestilence, the Jews have become the target of virtually every organized group in the country. Teachers, war veterans, clergy, lawyers, doctors, businessmen — have joined in taking or urging measures the Jews.

Not to be outdone, the ministry of commerce has ordered employers to give work only to "ethnic Roumanians." The latest group to align itself with the anti-Jewish crusade is the National Peasants Party. Traditionally democratic, this party had been regarded as the last and strongest bulwark against Fascism in King Carol's domain. That it too has turned anti-Semitic indicates that dire days are ahead for Roumanian Jewry.

Housewife Turns Tables On Brush Salesman

Mrs. Cohen Sells Canvasser Promise of Job for Nine Dollars

Some housewives slam the door. Others talk about hard times, and still others succumb and buy a brush. But Mrs. Alice Cohen, 24, used a system all her own when Robert Prendergast, 26, called at her home in Brooklyn, with brushes to sell and a supposedly irresistible sales talk.

Promises Job

Mrs. Cohen, mother of four and a home relief client, listened to Prendergast's impassioned plea. When it was all over she had \$9 of his money, and the disheartened brush salesman had her promise to get him a better job in a hospital. That was about a month ago and only the beginning of a career of crime which ended abruptly when Mrs. Cohen was locked up on a petty larceny charge.

Swindled 5 Men

Representing herself as a sort of personnel director for various hospitals, she had obtained a total of about \$50 from five young men seeking jobs, and had persuaded a chauffeur to drive her around nightly in a shiny limousine as she went about her fictitious duties.

"All For Children"

"I did it for the children," she explained. She has four, the youngest seven weeks old. Her husband, Frederick, is an unemployed furrier. The relief check is \$31 every two weeks and the rent is \$26 a month.

None of her victims appear to have a clear idea of exactly what her connection with the hospitals was supposed to be. It was Prendergast who brought about Mrs. Cohen's undoing. Assured that

everything had been fixed up, he visited Bellevue Hospital to take a job in the laboratory and was told that they had never heard of him or Mrs. Cohen.

Trouble Piles Up

The brush salesman was telling his troubles to a Detective at the Police Headquarters, when the chauffeur decided to submit his bill to Mrs. Cohen as she left Kings County Hospital. Mrs. Cohen opened her purse, clutched her throat and cried, "I've been robbed!" The sympathetic chauffeur urged a trip to Police Headquarters and Mrs. Cohen agreed. While Mr. Prendergast and the detective were waiting outside her home, she marched into headquarters and marched out again. "Well, I reported it," she told her chauffeur, directing him to drive home.

Discover Sucker List

Undertaking to untangle everything, the detective took everybody to headquarters. He obtained from Mrs. Cohen the admission that she had swindled five young men. The detective though he had found something when he discovered a penciled list of about 250 men in Mrs. Cohen's brief case. But Mrs. Cohen explained she had merely occupied her time while in hospitals by diligently copying names at random from telephone books and stuffing them into her brief case. In the general discussion, the chauffeur wanted to know what she did when she went into headquarters to report the robbery of her purse. He was told that she merely asked the desk lieutenant if there was a patrolman named John Brown working there. The desk lieutenant said there wasn't and she said "O. K. Thanks."

JNF Parley to Hear Chaim Weizmann

To Speak from London by Radio

Detroit (WNS) — A special transatlantic radio broadcast arranged by the National Broadcasting Company will bring to the delegates attending the national conference on Palestine redemption of the Jewish National Fund here on October 10th the voice of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Dr. Weizmann will speak from London.

Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the JNF, announced that the conference will take action to safeguard the Jewish character of the northern part of Palestine which has been included in the tentative frontiers of the Jewish state proposed by the British government.

This action, which involves a special fund-raising effort in honor of the J. N. F.'s 35th anniversary the completion of the purchase by sary, is intended to make possible the J. N. F. of important large and continuous land areas in the Huleh zone and in Upper Galilee.

Says Jewish State Can Absorb 2 Million

London (WNS)—Asserting that the proposed Jewish state in Palestine could absorb 2,000,000 Jews in from 10 to 20 years, Moshe Smilansky, president of the Palestine Jewish Farmers Association, outlined a three-point plan for the creation of the Jewish state, in an address before the Anglo-Palestine Club.

He urged that England guarantee that the Jewish population will reach 1,000,000 during the transition period, suggested the granting of most-favored-nation treatment to the Jewish state by the British Empire and urged an international loan for the Jewish state.

Fascists May Ban Foreign Propaganda

Rome (WNS) — A tentative agreement not to promote Fascist and Nazi propaganda in other countries on condition that the governments of other countries agree to suppress attacks on Nazism and Fascism is reported to have been reached by Hitler and Mussolini in their confabs in Germany, according to reports sent here by Italian correspondents accompanying Mussolini.

Show for Aid in Palestine is Endorsed by Roosevelt

New York — Indorsement by President Roosevelt of the fourth annual presentation of "Night of Stars" at Madison Square Garden on November 17, for the purpose of raising a supplementary fund for the United Palestine Appeal, was contained in a letter from the White House made public today by Harold Jacobi, chairman of the sponsoring committee.

In the message of Mr. Jacobi, President Roosevelt expressed his sympathy and support for the activities of the United Palestine Appeal in the settlement in Palestine of large numbers of Jews of Poland, Germany and other lands. The President's letter read in part: "Dear Mr. Jacobi:—I am happy to take this opportunity to extend my good wishes to the United Palestine Appeal, together with my congratulations on the part American Jewry has played in the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home in Palestine."

With the return from Europe last week of Louis K. Sidney, chairman of the producing committee, work was started on the elaborate preparations for "Night of Stars." George Jessel flew to Hollywood to round up a number of leading screen celebrities for the Madison Square Garden Show. The motion pictures industry has been mobilized for this production, with prominent executives serving as honorary chairmen of the producing committee.

The radio industry and night clubs also will have an important share in the staging of the show. Such important names as Jack Benny, Irving Berlin, Eddie Cantor, Howard Dietz, Max Gordon, George Jessel, Billy Rose, and Rudy Vallee are on the list of the producing committee. Tickets have been put on sale at the headquarters of the United Palestine Appeal, 111 Fifth avenue, New York.

Tomb of Ancient Rabbi Destroyed in Tiberias

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Vandals destroyed the tomb of Rabbi Meier Baal Hanes, one of the greatest figures in second century Judaism, and wrecked the prayer books and Gomerroth that were stored in the Tiberias burial place.

After a series of shots at the watchman guarding the hot springs buildings at Tiberias, the hoodlums also broke the doors of one of the huts.

Rabbi Meier is one of the saintly figures of traditional Judaism, whose death anniversary is the signal for pilgrimages from all parts of Palestine.

Australia Tightens Immigration Curb

Canberra, Australia (WNS)—Further Jewish immigration to Australia became extremely difficult when the department of the interior informed the Jewish Welfare Society, which handles Jewish immigrants, that henceforth all immigrants must have a certificate from a prospective employer guaranteeing that the job which the immigrant will get will not be depriving a native Australian of work.

This new requirement is in addition to the previous regulation which provided that each immigrant must have \$250 and a guarantee from the Welfare Society that he will not become a public charge.

The difficulty in obtaining certificates from employers is expected to reduce Jewish immigration considerably.

Blanstein Creates \$500,000 Foundation

Baltimore (WNS)—Charitable, educational and research institutions without regard to race or creed will benefit from a trust fund foundation of \$500,000 set up by the will of the late Louis Blaustein president and founder of the American Oil Company.

Jacobus Von Belsen Dies; Twice an Exile

Was Refugee from Russia and Reich

New York — Jacobus Von Belsen, 67, artist and refugee from both Russia and Germany, died early yesterday in his home in the Arcade Theatre Apartments, Broadway and 65th Street. A painter, etcher, and sculptor, he had been in this country less than a year.

One of the first jobs he obtained here was the painting of mica slides to obtain cloud and water effects for the Metropolitan Opera Company.

Born in Central Russia, he became a professor of architecture and engineering at the University of St. Petersburg, and painted murals in civic and church buildings. After the revolution he went to Germany, where he continued painting and became a political cartoonist.

He made several caricatures of Hitler which were widely reprinted. He also illustrated German editions of Norwegian and Finnish tales.
