Raps Race Prejudice As Damn Fool Belief

New York (WNS)—Race prejudice was characterized as "a damn fool belief" by Sinclair Lewis, noted novelist and Nobel Prize winner, in an address before the Columbia University Institute of Arts and Sciences.

"It's completely idiotic to say certain races are inferior," Lewis said. "The vice of race prejudice is no longer amusing and must be stamped out. Active anti-Semitism marks the decadence of a race into barbarism and there are no exceptions. That's a scientific statement and not a literary mark."

Hates Hitler; Smashes Picture in Window

Vienna (WNS)—Windows in Jewish shops were smashed by Nazis in a series of raids organized in retaliation for the smashing of a window in the new German Travel Bureau, where a life-size picture of Hitler was on display.

Michael Lebenschuss, a Jewish merchant, was arrested on a charge of having smashed the window in the travel bureau.

London (WNS)—The opening of an anti-Jewish book exhibit in London under the patronage of Joachim von Ribbentrop, Nazi ambassador, has drawn sharp protests here. The exhibit includes most of the anti-Semitic volumes

Boycott Violator Expelled By Center

New York (WNS)—The Brooklyn Jewish Center has expelled from membership David Jacoby, owner of the Mills Sales Company, for his persistent violation of the anti-Nazi boycott after he had several times agreed to discontinue dealing in German goods, according to a statement by Albert A. Weinstein, chairman of the Center's grievance committee, to the Joint Boycott Council.

Anti-Nazi pickets have several times demonstrated before Jacoby's place of business and his home in Brooklyn.

Believes Religious Liberty Barrier to Fascism Here

New York (WNS) — America's Constitutional guarantee of religious liberty is the strongest bulwark against Fascism in America because "there is an irreconcilable conflict between religious groups and a totalitarian state," Justice Irving Lehman declared in an address on the sesquicentennial of the United States Constitution.

Speaking before a convocation of the New York society of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, Justice Lehman said he had no fear that dictatorship and anti-Semitism would find a foothold in the United States because "I believe that American idealism and American independence will not tolerate the destruction of our liberties. American idealism includes, I believe, an acceptance of religious ideals and the influence

Held For Stealing Synagogue Relics

Ornaments Were Worth Thousands

New York (WNS)—A Jew with the priestly name of Cohen is being held for the Grand Jury here on a charge of grand larceny growing out of the disclosure that he had in his possession several thousand dollars worth of sacred silver and gold ornaments stolen from the Park Avenue Synagogue. The man under arrest is Harry Cohen, 20 years old.

The police charge that Cohen hammered the ornaments into shapelessness and sold them to a junk dealer for \$70. Cohen claims to have received the articles from an unnamed man and was promised a commission if he sold them.

The articles, all of which are more than 50 years old, include a silver chalice, six ornamental breastplates of silver which hung in front of the Torah Scroll, and one silver and one gold crown.

January 1. Swami Satprakashananda, "What is Hinduism?" The Swami is a Hindu Monk, scholar and leader of the local Vedanta Society.

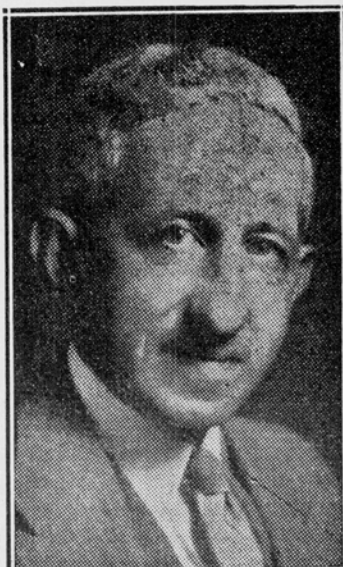
January 8. Dr. Clarence Horner, "What Is Protestantism?" Dr. Horner is the newly installed Rector of Grace Church.

Eden Requests End Of Hostile Activities

Difficult at Present To Better Relations

London (WNS-Palcor Agency)

—The Italian Government has been warned that its continued hostile propaganda in Palestine and in other countries of the Near and Middle East is making it more difficult for Great Britain and Italy to arrive at a mutual understanding, it was stated in the House of Commons by Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

Arthur Henderson, Laborite, questioned Mr. Eden on Italian propaganda in Palestine and was told that reports had been received by the Government regarding these activities.

As a result, Mr. Eden had informed the Italian Ambassador at London that "unless these activities are ended, it is impossible to create the atmosphere necessary for conversations designed to improve mutual relations."

Asked by R. Dyke Acland, Laborite, whether it was possible to sponsor broadcasts in Italian, the Foreign Secretary replied that for the present news was broadcast from Jerusalem in Arabic.

Union Recognized as Bargaining Agency

N. Y. Federation Sets Precedent in Industry

Employees Granted Collective Rights

New York (WNS)—A major advance in establishing the principle of the right of Jewish social workers to the same collective bargaining rights which are granted to workers in industry under the National Labor Relations Act was made when Jacob Fisher, president of the Social Service Employees Union, announced that the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York had acceded to the request of its employees to be represented by the union.

This decision was communicated to the union by Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive vice-president of the Federation and president of the National Conference of Social Work.

Skeleton Found Chained to Tree

Remains Believed To Be of Refugee

Paris (WNS)—The mysterious disappearance last June of Dr. Heinrich Hellmund, 42-year-old German-Jewish refugee, is believed to have been cleared up by the accidental discovery of a skeleton chained to trees in Feullerote Forest near Dijon.

Police think the skeleton is the remains of Dr. Hellmund because at the scene was found a visiting card of Countess Kerstin Hamilton, wife of the general director of the Swedish telegraph system, who had helped Dr. Hellmund with money and lecture engagements.

The mystery was complicated by the discovery of a large sum of French, Swedish and German money near the skeleton.

Samuel Ormitz Will Ignore Death Threats

Hollywood — Samuel Ormitz, speaker for the Hollywood Anti-Nazi League, will continue his radio addresses despite threats against his life received in crudely printed letters marked with a swastika sent to the league office. Headquarters of the league would be wrecked also, the letter warned. Hollywood police, who have been called to investigate previous rumors of violence planned against anti-Nazi groups, and postal authorities are looking into the matter.

Japs Arrest Jews as Soviet Sympathizers

Shanghai (WNS)—The arrest of several Jews in Harbin by the Japanese authorities on charges of Soviet sympathies was reported in dispatches reaching here. At the same time Jewish refugees from Tientsin, now under Japanese rule, reported on their arrival here that they had fled the city to avoid signing individual anti-Soviet oaths demanded by the Japanese.

Such oaths, the Jews said, would have endangered the position of their relatives in Russia.

Queen Marie Tended By Noted Doctor

Bucharest (WNS)—Among eight celebrated specialists rushed to the bedside of Dowager Queen Marie of Roumania, who is reported to be critically ill, this week was Dr. Hans Eppinger of Vienna.

New York—Only a short time ago the nation was shouting, "We want Cantor, We Want Cantor." But now the chant has turned to "We Want Friedman, We Want Friedman," and it's being sung in a rising crescendo from New York to Ann Arbor, where the University of Michigan is located.

As this piece is being constructed, brick by brick, Benny Friedman, as fine a passer as ever drew a bead on a herring, is being boomed as the next coach at his Alma Mammy, and from this angle it's not a bad idea. Benner, a colonel from Palestine, has been doing himself proud at City College of New York, where the students are so athletically minded that they won't give one good substantial cheer because it smacks too much of fascism!

That's what he's had to put up with ever since he took the head coaching job at C. C. N. Y. But he attacked the problem with the same perspicacity that once made him the most feared back in the nation. And while he hasn't been able to turn C. C. N. Y. into a Notre Dame, speaking of football only now, he has developed his material, such as it has been, to the utmost.

It was only a few hours, comparatively speaking, after Michigan announced that Kipke had been given his walking papers, that New York started the ball

rolling for Friedman. A meeting of Michigan alumni in New York did it. And now the hue and cry is terrific, as they say out in Hollywood.

His conduct and abilities have been a credit to his people, his school and himself, and so here's one good substantial cheer for Friedman for coach at the U. of Michigan.

Foil Bomb Plot on Life of Leon Blum

Paris (WNS)—An attempt to assassinate Vice-Premier Leon Blum, leader of the French Socialist Party and former premier, is believed to have been foiled by the discovery in a Paris branch postoffice of a bomb addressed to him. A package addressed to him was intercepted by postoffice officials who found it contained a glass tube filled with black powder.

Decree Shortens Mein Herr's Shirt

Berlin—German men must wear shirts with shorter tails, the ministry of economics announced today.

The ministry approved an application of the textile interests to shorten men's shirt tails five centimeters (about 12 inches) in order to conserve material under Germany's economic four-year plan.

Montclair, N. J. (WNS)—Police and the United States Postal authorities are investigating the receipt of three anonymous messages signed "K. K. K." by Mrs. Leon H. Fradkin, well-known peace worker and wife of a local Jewish dentist. The receipt of the messages preceded by a day the planting of a fiery cross on the lawn of the Fradkin's home.

The fact that no Ku Klux Klan unit is known to exist in the Montclair vicinity has given rise to the belief that the messages may originate with a Nazi organization.

Gov. Murphy Warns Against Threat to Democratic Rule

Frank Murphy, Governor of the State of Michigan (standing) sounded a poignant warning to American public opinion when he said that "Democracy cannot become a reality in every phase of life while movements to discriminate against Jewry or to persecute the Catholic or the Mennonite are being planned."

The outstanding American liberal delivered a memorable address on "Democracy: The Guardian of Religious Liberty" at the National Conference of Jewish congregations and organizations in the United States held last week in New York City under the auspices of the Yeshiva, American Jewry's institute for higher Jewish learning, and Yeshiva College, the only college of liberal arts and sciences under Jewish auspices. A nation-wide drive to raise \$1,000,000 as a Jubilee Fund for these two institutions was proclaimed by the Conference which heard, at its concluding session, Senator Alben W. Barkley, majority leader in the United States Senate.

New York (WNS)—The British Government is considering abandoning entirely the plan to partition Palestine, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the Zionist Organization of America, said in an address at the seventh annual convention of the Federation of Palestine Jews in America.

Basing his asserting on a letter he received from London, Dr. Wise declined to say how much stock he put in the report.

Accused Protests Then Leaves Court

Hearing to Continue Despite Absence

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The hearing against Meier Grossman head of the Jewish State Party, for alleged breach of Zionist discipline, will take place in camera, although the accused walked out on the proceedings when the decision of the Zionist Congress Court was announced.

When the trial started by determining what action should be taken against Grossman, who is said to have made public a confidential memorandum purporting to cover a conversation between Colonial Secretary W. G. A. Ormsby-Gore and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the prosecution demanded that the sessions be closed to the public. It pointed out that secret Zionist external political documents were involved.

Following a recess, the court announced when it reconvened that the hearing would be in camera. At once Grossman rose to protest and to urge that the public be admitted.

When his request was denied he strode out of the hearing room. But the court will continue its investigation despite his absence.

Streicher, Mad Again, Names New Boycott Against Jews

Has a New Bug in His Head

Berlin (WNS)—Enraged by appeals in the Roumanian Jewish press to Roumanian Jews not to buy German toys manufactured chiefly in Nuremberg, Julius Streicher, Nazi overlord of Franconia, of which Nuremberg is the capital, launched a new anti-Jewish boycott drive.

Red placards announcing the boycott have been posted in front of all Jewish stores and on all public billboards.

The boycott placards declare: "The Jew agitates for a boycott. He will have it. Whoever still puts his foot in a Jewish shop, whoever still carries one pfennig into a Jewish store, proves that he is no National Socialist, that he is no decent German but only a depraved Jewish knave. No German should pass the threshold of a Jewish store. Whoever makes purchases in a Jewish shop is a stooge and ally of the Jews and a traitor to the German people."

13 Jews Ambushed; 1 Killed, 2 Wounded

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Thirteen young Jews were ambushed and fired upon while they were passing the railway station on their return to Jerusalem from Talpith, a suburb.

Abraham Haim Perlman, 20 years old, was killed, and two of his companions — Malka Jacobowitz, 17 years old, and Yona Klobler, 16 years old — were wounded.

Claim Missing Robinson is Self-Styled "American Hitler"

New York (WNS)—The mysterious case of Donald L. Robinson, the American writer who entered Russia on a fraudulent American passport with his wife and then disappeared behind prison walls took an even more sensational turn when Nazi leaders here identified pictures of Robinson as Raymond Joseph Healey, the Irish-born Nazi and self-styled "American Hitler."

Among those who identified Robinsons as Healey were James Wheeler-Hill, New York leader of the German-American Bund, and Fritz Kuhn, national Bund Fuehrer.

Descriptions of Healey on file in the criminal identification bureau of the New York Police also tally with those of Robinson. Healey, who was several times arrested for

his anti-Semitic activities in New York, was the founder of the pro-Nazi National Socialist Workers Party of America and the Militant Christian Patriots.

Weep No Mo' Lady No Rain Down South

SALEM, Mass.—Tear drops got Henry Reichert into matrimony—rain drops got him out.

Reichert testified in Probate Court that he married Mrs. Reichert, a Southern girl, because she chided when he told her he "didn't intend to be married."

When he brought her North, Mrs. Reichert deserted him "because it was raining all the time."

Paris Opposes Mufti's Stay in Damascus

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The French Foreign Office has given instructions to the French High Commissioner in Syria to bar the proposed visit of the Mufti of Jerusalem to Damascus, it was reported here from Beirut.

Previously Count de Martel, the French High Commissioner, had apparently wished to get rid of his Moslem guest, who fled to Beirut from his self-imposed se-

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Move Made to Annul Kuhn's Citizenship

Immigration Unit Orders Bund Head Activities Checked

Washington, D. C. (WNS)—Action looking to the nullification of the naturalization of Fritz Kuhn, leader of the pro-Nazi German-American Bund, as a step toward his deportation was initiated by the House Immigration Committee when it adopted a resolution calling upon the Departments of Justice and Labor to investigate Kuhn's activities.

The Labor Department was asked to assemble all documents concerning him, including his petition for citizenship so that his statements at that time could be checked against his subsequent declarations.

The Department of Justice was asked to investigate his activities from the date of his arrival in this country until his naturalization in May 1934.

At the same time the Immigration Committee voted favorably on a bill that says "no person shall be naturalized or be made a citizen of the United States who does not believe in the form of government of the United States or who is a member of or affiliated with any organization which advocates any form of government other than that of the United States."

Youth Killed in New Polish Disturbances

Warsaw (WNS)—The death of Samuel Strziner, son of a Jewish tavern-keeper in Mieczyslaw, from injuries suffered when he and his father and sister were assaulted by a gang of anti-Semites was reported here together with news of renewed anti-Jewish disturbances in Warsaw and Vilna.

A synagogue in the Okuniev district of the capital was partially destroyed by a bomb while in Vilna five Jews were injured in the streets.

In Radomsk a large number of Jewish merchants were facing prosecution for closing their stores during the general protest strike against ghetto benches in the Warsaw universities.
