Peddlers of Fear

Workers of the Dies House Committee, investigating un-American activities, have brought to light evidence that hundreds of organizations exist to disseminate racial propaganda. These racketeers are not wholly anti-Semitic. Many of them are Jews, who realize that American Jews have become conscious of the wave of Jewish hatred sweeping over Europe, and are fearful that this contagious disease might spread to America.

We are not inclined to underestimate the dangers of a rising hostility against the Jewish people in this country. But, the work of these unscrupulous individuals, through the use of blood-curdling Anti-Semitic literature, to secure funds for unknown magazines or relief organizations, has jeopardized the relief activities of well-known institutions.

Taking advantage of their ignorance of responsible organizations who exist to fortify interests in this country, these shrewd entrepreneurs have built up very lucrative business. Their argument is fear. And, while we know of no effective check on these activities, much can be done by responsible organizations whose solicitations should be heeded and supported by the community.

Because of general suspicion of glib arguments (usually over the telephone) responsible organizations seeking funds or members should take these facts into consideration so that their appeals will not be classed with those peddlers of fear.

A Nazi Utopia

Dreams of a Utopia for a wealthy Brazilian German was blasted this week when he was sentenced to eight months in jail, and his \$100,000 fortune was confiscated.

This disillusionment has hit thousands of Fatherland devotees, who succumbed to the stories of a life of ease in the Fatherland which was painted for them by Nazi propagandists. It is known that some 2,000 left Brazil for the Reich. But, after settling in Germany many became discouraged. They wanted to leave, but found they had been duped. There were regulations concerning leaving with their wealth. Those who protested were given the alternative of leaving with ten marks in their pockets or being entertained in concentration camps.

The Nazi policy of enticing wealthy Germans and then milking them of their wealth is further evidence of the greed that has enmeshed Nazi leaders. Despite the censorship imposed in Germany, there is no doubt that bulk of German people are familiar with similar incidents and are not in sympathy with the imperialistic and sadistic aims of their leaders.

"Via" Mussolini

Opponents of totalitarian systems have often charged Mussolini with imitation of Adolf Hitler's policies. One contrary fact has just been noted. While every city and town in Naziland has Hitlerstrasse, it is impossible to discover a street in Italy named after Mussolini. It seems that while "via" in Italian means street, it also is defined as "away."

Expect 2,000 at Labor Convention

NEW YORK. — The Fourteenth annual convention of the National Labor Committee for Palestine will be held November 25 to 27 at the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York City. The Convention is being called for the purpose of acquainting the delegates with important reports as well as to mobilize the support of American Jewry in order to strengthen the positions of Jewish Labor in Palestine.

According to the reports received to date at the general headquarters of the National Labor Committee, the Convention will be attended by nearly two thousand delegates.

Hadassah Approves Conference Offer

NEW YORK. — Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America today called for an armistice between Jews and Arabs in the Holy Land and expressed satisfaction at Great Britain's determination to continue responsibility for the government of the whole of Palestine.

Mrs. Moses P. Epstein, of New York, national president of Hadassah, after a meeting at the headquarters of the organization here, released a statement on behalf of the national board hailing British offers "to exert power and influence to bring about an understanding between Jews and Arabs as a foundation for peace and progress."

B'nai B'rith to Initiate 500 New Members

Ceremonies at Narra. Hotel

More than 500 candidates will be initiated and admitted into the Roger Williams Lodge, B'nai B'rith, at ceremonies to be held in the ballroom of the Narragansett Hotel, next Wednesday evening, November 30, at 8 o'clock. This is probably the largest group of Jewish men ever admitted at one time into any fraternal organization in the state and is the result of an intensive campaign during the past few weeks.

Rabbi William F. Rosenblum of Temple Israel of the City of New York will be principal speaker, and his topic will be "One Way Not To Live."

The Amos Lodge Degree Team of Boston will exemplify the degree.

This large class of candidates will make the local B'nai B'rith Lodge one of the largest in the country, increasing its membership to more than 750.

Joseph M. Finkle is Chairman of the Membership Committee. Other members of the committee were Saul Abrams, Dr. Ilie Berger, Rabbi Albert T. Bilgray, Max L. Grant, Sydney Hanzel, Judge Philip C. Grocers to Close an Hour in Nazi Protest

More than 20,000 independent retail grocers in the five boroughs will close their stores from noon until 1 P. M., on Wednesday as a mass protest against persecution of the Jews and other minorities in Germany, it was announced this week at headquarters of the United Independent Retail Grocers and Food Dealers Association.

Signs and circulars announcing the closing are being distributed to all members, Charles Ackerman, general secretary, said, so that the public might be advised of the reason.

Propaganda Put Out By Exploiting Group

Dies Requests State Curbs

WASHINGTON. — A "rising tide of anti-Semitism" in the United States was blamed in part this week before the House Committee Investigating Un-American Activities on the large number of organizations in this country which agitate such sentiments and in part on the effects of "the situation in Europe."

The statement was made by John C. Metcalfe, an investigator for the committee, and echoed by Chairman Dies. Mr. Metcalfe described about three-fourth of the anti-Jewish propaganda organizations as "pure rackets."

Mr. Metcalfe testified concerning activities of more than a score of alleged anti-Semitic organizations. Mr. Dies said that 135 organizations apparently of this type had come to the committee's attention and that activities of fifty-four had been checked.

About three-fourths of the organizations studied were "letter-head outfits" with few or no members of record, Mr. Metcalfe said, but which nevertheless disseminated a large amount of anti-Jewish and "anti-radical" propaganda.

"It must cost a lot of money," he added. "We have had evidence that some of it comes from Germany and Italy, but a lot of the money for issuing such stuff must be raised in this country. Unfortunately, the committee does not have the funds to find out who is paying for it."

U.P.A. Conference Sunday at Crown

At the Rhode Island State Conference of the United Palestine Emergency Appeal, to be held on Sunday afternoon at the Crown Hotel, Dr. Joachim Prinz, noted rabbi and a refugee from German oppression, will be the guest speaker.

Each organization in the city has been requested to select five delegates to attend this conference.

Since 1933, Dr. Prinz has traveled the route between Germany and Palestine acting as guide and counselor to the thousands of German-Jewish children brought into Palestine through the Youth Aliyah movement sponsored by the American Hadassah.

Highlights of the Week's News

Claim Powder Cures Ulcers

OKLAHOMA CITY. — New hope for stomach ulcer sufferer came this week with the announcement by Doctors M. H. Metz and Robert Lackey of Baylor University that they have discovered a pituitary gland powder which has proven successful in the treatment of stomach ulcers. A whiff of the powder blend inhaled into the nose has been found successful in fifty-five out of sixty cases in which it was tried.

Pay Britons to Wed German Refugees

LONDON. — The Daily Express said this week that Scotland Yard has uncovered a marriage bureau specializing in providing British nationality for wealthy German Women refugees.

Agents of the bureau offer laborers, lorry drivers and unemployed men as much as \$300 and expenses, including a new suit, to marry German Jewish women. The bridegroom must sign a pledge not to approach the bride after the ceremony.

Rules Jews Outside Nazi Abortion Law

BERLIN. — The Boersen-Zeitung reported this week the acquittal of a Jewish woman charged with procuring an abortion, usually subject to heavy penalties under the criminal law. The court ruled that preventing a Jewish birth was not not illegal.

A court in Lueneberg found that "the law punished persons for abortion can be interpreted after the National Socialist revolution as a protective measure for Aryan offspring alone.

Brown Aides Refugees

Brown University this week raised \$400 for the aid of German refugees, the Brown Committee for German Refugee Aid announced today. A student mass meeting of protest at the action of the German government was held last Tuesday afternoon. A goal of \$1,000 was set.

Journalist Defense Fund at \$8,000

The Dorothy Thompson Defense Fund this week cabled \$8,000 to Moro Giamferi, the most famous criminal lawyer in France, who has agreed to defend Herschel Grynspan.

School Savings Drop

A movement to close out neglected accounts, resulted in a loss of \$84,698 in net savings in the Rhode Island School Banking System, it was reported this week by the American Baking Association. Rhode Island Virginia were the only two states in the country to show a drop in deposits.

C. I. O. Votes Huge Unionization Prog'm

Leaders of the Congress of Industrial Organizations this week

made preparations to carry out the mandate of the first C. I. O. convention and initiate an unremitting drive to unionize all mass production workers. The 519 delegates, representing a membership of 3,787,000, voted levies estimated to total about two million dollars annually, to finance the program.

Japan Takes Profit out of War

TOKYO. — After a heated dispute, the Finance and War Ministries decided to invoke the National Mobilization law, which authorizes the government to limit dividends and profits of all Japanese business. Approximately 147 concerns dealing with the government will be affected.

"Peace" Loses Out

NEW YORK. — Dorothy Fox, the dancer appearing in "Sing Out the News," was this week suffering a leg bruise, a sore jaw and a sprained wrist. The battered lady sustained the injuries while being pushed around in the "Peace and Diplomat number" which she portrayed Peace.

Pledges Economy

Notified that he had been formally elected Mayor of Providence by the plurality of 6,037 votes, John F. Collins this week pledged himself to fulfill all promises made during his campaign. He declared that he will enforce economy measures in all branches of the city government.

Radio Priest Scored

NEW YORK. — In an unusual statement, station WMCA criticized Father Charles E. Coughlin for uttering "mistakes in fact in his broadcast over Station WMCA last Sunday."

In his topic "Persecution—Jewish and Christian," Father Coughlin repeatedly referred to the Jewish control of the Communist party in Russia. The priest later divulged that his information came from Nazi sources.

Admit Plunder Plans Pre-Arranged

BERLIN. — The newspaper Boerzen Zeitung acknowledged this week that Nazi leaders had made ready to do spoil the Jews financially, long before the slaying of Ernst Vom Rath was made the excuse.

Accuse Hague of "Packing" Court

WASHINGTON. — Accusations that the public believes presiding Judge J. Warren Davis "packed" the Third Circuit Court of Appeals, in favor of Mayor Hague and other Jersey City officials, were laid before the Supreme Court. The high court was asked to take the case of Mayor Hague out of the hands of the circuit court.

Evelyn Axelrod "Sits" For Interview Re: Her Painting

The walls of the Axelrod studio are a dull grey . . . The lighting is not good . . . But the whole effect is curiously soothing and elegant . . . Located in the Hoppin Homestead Building on Westminster street, the workshop of Miss Evelyn Axelrod, painter, is as pleasant as the artist herself . . .

When I went into the studio late Friday afternoon, for a story, Evelyn was painting . . . The person sitting for her was a friend of mine, so the interview turned into a very cozy session for the three of us . . . Evelyn looked the perfect artist in her casual jumper dress of black wool, with a soft blue jersey blouse . . . Complimenting her outfit, was a gloriously paint-smeared apron . . . She's got light brown hair, blue eyes, and clear skin . . . Has definite and frank ideas about things

fascinating occupation than selling newspapers . . . Se he rolled up his ragged shirt sleeves and became assistant wall painter . . . During the weeks that followed, Evelyn painted his portrait, which is on display in her studio . . . It's vital . . . It captures the essence so typical of all American newsboys — a devilish innocence in the eyes — you know . . .

She very much likes painting scenery also . . . During last summer she studied landscaping at the Ogunquit School of Art in Maine. "I don't like surrealism — and I don't exactly know why I don't," she volunteered . . . I venture to say I don't either . . . After all — why should people go around painting nightmares? . . . Or am I being sacrilegious? . . .

In the outer part of her studio, which is fixed like a music room, there hangs a huge painting of

—if she doesn't like a thing, she comes right out and says she doesn't . . .

Now in her early twenties, Evelyn got her training at the Rhode Island School of Design, taking the fine arts course . . . Coming as she does from a musically talented family, it is a bit unexpected to find her branching into an entirely different phase of art . . . When asked how long she'd been painting, her quick rejoinder was "Practically ever since I was born." . . . She's energetic and genial, and speaks of her work with disinterested dignity, which betrays her love of her work but her modesty as regards her own accomplishments . . .

She doesn't believe in the ballyhoo of Bohemianism . . . "Too many people these days are consciously Bohemian in an affected way," she said . . . "Hundreds of years ago, it was different . . . Artists lived a hand-to-mouth existence . . . They had to makeshift for themselves and were carelessly free—and if they became a bit indiscreet in their design for living, it was the normal result of their struggle for existence . . . At that," she continued, "a great many of the masters did their best work after they had outgrown their poverty—and were living in better circumstances." . . . She believes that today, the poorest artists have many opportunities and a better chance for success—and that even in poverty they can live like human beings . . . So all this business of living in attics and sleeping on floors was debunked . . .

PREFERS PORTRAITS

She said she'd rather paint portraits than anything else . . . Then followed the story about her favorite model . . . One day about three years ago, she was painting the walls of her studio—to cheer everything up a bit . . . A youngster about nine came to her door selling newspapers . . . On first sight of him, Evelyn knew he was the type of subject she

Beethoven . . . Evelyn copied it from a black and white photograph that had been on a post card she received from Europe . . . It's a breathtaking likeness, and has what all artists strive for—depth . . . One almost expects Mr. Beethoven to step down off his perch on the wall — and go into a long tirade on what he thinks of music today . . . Wonder if he'd approve of swing? . . . Spending an hour or so in the studio proper (where the actual painting is done) is like being in a world apart . . . I found myself suddenly growing feverish about the seven arts . . . yep—all of them . . . In delightful disorder around the room were a few idle easels — pastels from photographs —busts—a radio—paints and brushes . . .

The bells of a nearby church chimed four . . . It seemed exactly the right way to know of the passing of time in an art studio . . . Evelyn confessed that she never wears a watch . . . The day was dull, and it was growing dark—so she had to cease work for the day . . . Painting is never done under artificial lights . . . She hums while she works . . .

And the person who had been sitting for her added that she also makes faces . . . And speaking of faces . . . I asked her if she wants her subjects to talk or be absolutely quiet while they are being painted . . . "I prefer them to speak every so often"—she answered, "and remain quiet also, in order that I may get the various expressions on their faces during silence and speech . . . Then I try to incorporate the various moods into the portrait . . ."

Aside from painting, she has a passion for boats of all kinds . . . "We had a cruiser at the Edgewood Yacht Club," she said, "er—that is before the hurricane" . . . She's not a sissy nor a sophisticate . . . Loves the country . . . Plays the piano . . . Adores symphonies . . . Has a good sense of humor, and laughs easily . . .



War Against Jews

FROM NATION MAGAZINE

The anniversary of the Armistice was celebrated in Germany with a characteristic demonstration of Nazi spirit. In every city and town Nazi youths in party cars, animated by what Propaganda Minister Goebbels described as "healthy instincts," smashed and plundered Jewish shops, burned synagogues, beat and arrested thousands of helpless Jews, while police and fireman looked on with smiling approval. It was a great show. Never were mass cowardice, mass brutality, and mass destructiveness so gruesomely displayed.

The demonstration was finally called off when the ruin was complete and the mob presumably sated. Then the official sequel was announced. Field Marshall Hermann Goering, director of Germany's Four-Year Plan, issued a decree forbidding Jews after January 1 to conduct any retail, mail-order, commission, or handicraft business. At the same time he levied a fine of 1,000,000,000 marks—some \$400,000,000; and Herr Goebbels published an order prohibiting Jews from entering movie houses, theatres or concert halls.

Thus, has the Third Reich, most powerful nation on the Continent of Europe, avenged the death of a German official at the hand of a seventeen-year-old Jewish boy, hysterical with grief because his parents, driven out of Germany with thousands of other Jews, were stranded without money or shelter on the Polish frontier.

MUST ANSWER

What answer can we make to this degenerate brutality? We can and must protest; refusing to be silenced even by the bestial Nazi threat to visit still more vengeance on the Jews for protests coming from abroad. We can protest, but we know that indignation will not influence a government which has abandoned even the outward forms of justice. The perverse mentality that can hold a racial group responsible for the act of one individual is beyond the reach of ordinary remonstrance. The torture of Germany's Jews seemed to have reached its climax when the Nurnberg laws were adopted; many people believed that their position would remain static thereafter, fixed by detailed restrictions; a sorry enough fate, but perhaps bearable. Nothing like that has happened. New decrees have multiplied, narrowing more and more the civil rights and means of self-support permitted to Jews. And now the last possibility of earning a living has been snatched away by the new decrees.

WORLD HORRIFIED

Newspapers and the public men in every country have expressed their horror at the whole performance. They have denounced the Nazi sadists for their atrocities and for the even more perverse cruelty of forcing the victims to pay for the repair of their damaged property. They have pointed out the discrepancy between the Nazis' boast of discipline and order in the Reich and their claim that the riot of destruction was a "spontaneous" outburst. Few of them emphasized the most significant fact about the new pogroms — that they are direct consequences of the Munich triumph which completed the rout of all the sober elements around Hitler and established the power of the extremists.

RECALL PRAISED

The recall of our ambassador for "report and consultation" is an effective and courageous move. It is hinted, as this issue goes to press that it may be followed by more drastic action. It is known that Mr. Roosevelt and his advisers have been considering the possible effects of a complete diplomatic break with the Reich. We hope most earnestly that this action will be taken. It may be without precedent, but the situation demands unprecedented steps. A rupture of relations would at least bring to the Nazi government some realization of the horror with which its new orgy of Schrecklichkeit is regarded.

SECONDARY BENEFITS

Such an act would yield many secondary benefits. The United States would at a stroke be rid of Nazi agents concealed in the habiliments and titles of diplomats. And no American representatives would thereafter be subjected to the humiliation of listening to

\$100,000 Raised At "Night of Stars"

NEW YORK. — A crowd of 20,000, which packed Madison Square Garden paid between \$90,000 and \$100,000 into the fund of the United Palestine Appeal, witnessed a show by 400 celebrities in the fifth "Night of Stars," and heard an apology from Mayor La Guardia.

The Mayor did not mention Hitler, but the audience knew at once to whom he referred when he apologized for not having "adequately described the brutality of this man and his government." The Mayor was introduced by Nathan Strauss, head of the United States Housing Authority and honorary chairman of the United Palestine Appeal.

Paganism, Religion Issue In Reich, Says Finklestein

Calling the present struggle in Germany a "death struggle between resurgent paganism and western religion," Prof. Louis Finklestein, provost of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, last Sunday evening at the Narragansett Hotel, addressed a meeting comprised of more than 500 Jewish members from all parts of southern New England.

"The fate of the German people," Dr. Finklestein declared, "is worse than that of the Jews. The Germans have already been reduced to savagery. The Jew is being hounded into exile, yet it is better to be nothing than to be a savage."

"Three weeks ago we could not have believed that what has happened in Germany could take place, nor could we imagine that the overwhelming and generous response of Christians here in America could have taken place, in both we were mistaken; in the brutality of the enemies of God, and in the love of the people of God."

At the afternoon session of the conference, Dr. James P. Adams vice-president of Brown University, and Dr. Robert Gordis, a faculty member of the seminary,

gave addresses.

Reports of four round-table seminars, held during the day were presented by Dr. Ilie Berger, Judge Robert M. Dannin of Newport, Harry Lider and Isadore S. Levin.

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

JERUSALEM. — Arab rebels intend to declare a general Arab traffic strike coincident with the enforcement of military restrictions on travel, it was reported this week.

Under the new British Army regulations, it will be necessary to obtain military permission to travel by rail, automobile or a foot between towns.

It was reported also that Arab rebels were planning to reoccupy the old quarter of Jerusalem from which British troops ousted them.

At Jaffa, a twenty-four-hour curfew was imposed apparently for a military search for rebels and arms.

As the result of an army search from house to house at Gaza, 150 suspects have been detained and a quantity of revolvers, ammunition and old Turkish artillery shells have been found.

Discovery of the alleged cells was laid to the OVRA, the Fascist secret police. According to the official communique, those under arrest included Professor Eugenio Colorni of Trieste, and Dino Philipponi of Trieste, a member of the Chamber of Deputies before the advent of Fascism.

The latter was described as a "rich Jew connected with the Rothschild family." The official announcement said that Professor Colorni had made full confession, admitting that he had maintained political relations with Jews in Italy and abroad.

Hears Nazis Slew 200 Jews in Camp

LONDON. — The Manchester Guardian said this week that it had reliable reports of 200 German Jews having been executed at the concentration camp at Buchenwald, Germany.

Seventy Jews were executed November 9, the newspaper said. This was before the assassination of Ernst Vom Rath, Nazi attache in Paris. Since that time executions brought the total to 200.

Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, speaking at a national government demonstration, declared that into the better prospects created by the Munich agreement "there has been thrown into the forefront a development which deeply stirred and shocked the world."

"We should do no good service to the cause of better understanding and peaceful agreement if we did not recognize the reaction of world opinion," he said.

Always the lean years leaven the fat years. Sharply outlined now by contrast, and, therefore, the more precious, are the simple varieties of daily living — love, friendship, laughter, contentment, health, work, family, children, hearthstone, life itself.

Strength comes from a higher power, from God of the tough fibre of inner consciousness. Within ourselves in abiding faith, we have the stamina to build anew in hope and fortitude. 
