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## Vladeck, 51, Dies After Heart Attack Was Head of ORT Federation

NEW YORK. — Leaders in all walks of life this week mourned the passing of B. Charney Vladeck, late president of the American ORT Federation, who distinguished himself as an outstanding spokesman and active worker in all fields of service that had as its aim the betterment of the human race. Mr. Vladeck died on Sunday evening, following a heart attack a few days previous. He was stricken while attending a session of the New York City Council and was taken home and then removed to Mount Sinai Hospital where his death occurred.

Mr. Vladeck has been associated with the American ORT Federation ever since its founding in 1922 and has been president of the ORT since 1932. He has toured the country in its behalf and has made many trips to Europe investigating conditions of the Jews in Poland and other countries. He was a firm believer in the philosophy of the ORT which aimed at making Jews productive workers.

## Needle Trade Colony Homes for Rent

HIGHTSTOWN, N. J. — Seventy-five of the 200 one and two-family dwellings at Jersey Homesteads, the cooperative agricultural-industrial colony established here for Jewish needle trade workers from New York by the Federal Farm Security Administration, were being offered for rent this week to outsiders in the vicinity because there are not enough jobs available at the cooperative clothing factory to justify the settlement of additional colonists.

Operations at the factory have not risen to original expectations, Walter A. Simon, project manager, said.

## Roundup Laid to "Plot" on Hitler

LONDON. — The newspaper Daily Mirror alleged this week that Germany's round-up of Polish Jews was the result of the discovery by the German secret police, the Gestapo, of a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler and his chief lieutenants.

The newspaper reported, without crediting any source, that the alleged plot was conceived by Polish anarchists who formerly lived in the Sudetenland area and entered Germany, each sworn to kill Hitler or die.

It was asserted that when Hitler visited the grave of his niece in Austria a few days ago a bomb was discovered in the cemetery.

## Pope Likens Hitler To Nero in Address

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy. — The voice of Pope Pius trembled with emotion as he denied that the Holy See pursued political aims. It was obvious that the venerable pontiff was deeply touched and speaking from the depths of his heart, but with firmness and determination unusual in a man of his years, when in a speech to 300 professors of Christian archaeology gathered in Rome he compared Chancellor Hitler with Julian the Apostate and recalled Nero and the Apostle Judas in denouncing in strong terms Nazi attacks.

## Cuba Gives Nazi Party Legal Status

HAVANA. — Having amended its program to bring it into harmony with the Cuban constitution by omitting all references to race, the newly organized Nazi party of Cuba was given legal standing by the authorities.

The latter had previously rejected an application for legal status because the party's program contained "legal defects" in the form of clauses advocating racial discrimination. Legal status has also been granted to the new Cuban Fascist party.

## Reaffirm Faith in Democratic Principles

### Condemn Rule of Force, Violence

NEW YORK. — The American Jewish Congress concluded a three-day Session devoted to a discussion of the many problems confronting Jewry throughout the world with the adoption of a series of important resolutions designed to meet to the extent possible the existing situations.

The first resolution adopted by the American Jewish Congress expresses "its deep belief in the final victory of the democratic ideal and calls for the strengthening and the enlarging of the co-operation both of Jewish international and national organizations with all democratic forces of the world in the common fight against the establishment of an international system based on the rule of force and violence. The solution of the Jewish problem," the Convention recognized, "and the re-establishment and safeguarding of Jewish civil and minority rights depend upon the victory of democracy."

### Dr. Louis Newman to Open Institute of Jewish Studies



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## Radio Censorship

Despite the fact that newspapers throughout the country played up the panic that overspread the States on the occasion of the radio dramatization of H. G. Wells fantastic old story, "The War of the Worlds," there is no reason why censorship should be imposed upon radio programs.

The officers of the Federal Commission have reported that only fifteen letters and telegrams had been received in protest to the play But, proponents of radio censorship have seized upon this incident and are demanding the necessity of a Federal Board, which would supervise all programs.

Although it is disturbing that Orson Welles broadcast should have created such a sensation, think what would result of the radio stations were permitted to broadcast stories favorable to the party in power. The dictators in Europe use radio to make their people believe falsehoods. We want nothing like that here. A blunder has been made, but recurrence of this mistake can be avoided by judicious presentation of similar radio programs.

## A Nazi Speaks

Dr. Borchers, Nazi consul, who addressed the American Bund this week, ridiculed freedom of speech in this country and the status of Jews in the so-called influential positions.

This obvious attempt of propoganda, to influence the minds of his listeners and the readers of our newspapers, is a direct slap at the courtesies Dr. Borchers as a representative of the Nazi government, is permitted.

We know what would happen to an American who dared to criticize any policy, however small, of Hitler's government. They would be his last words, for the guillotine would silence his lips.

This incidence is added proof that Hitler is beginning to make good his threat to interfere in our domestic life. It's time he was made to understand that the people of the United States will not tolerate an outsider, especially one whose principles of government vary so with ours, to tell them how to run their country.
