### "Peace by Peace"

One of the assets of the totalitarian states is their ability to forget promises and pledges. When he was demanding the Sudetenland, Hitler assured the world that the Nazis had no further territorial claims in Europe.

But following last week's election in Memel former German territory which was ceded to Lithuania after the World War the Nazis began their usual clamor that the people of Memel wanted to join their brethren in the Third Reich.

Well informed observers believe that Hitler's right to Memel will not be questioned. After all it is only Lithuania who is being pruned; and Chamberlain in his policy of appeasement will probably see Hitler's point of view and suggest that Lithuania accede.

This succession of "Peaces" recalls the old pun that Hitler will conquer Europe "Peace by Peace."

### Benefits of Fascism

From Vienna comes word this week that for the first time since the inflationary period of 1922, butter and whipped cream became scarce. Signs reading "no butter today" appeared in shop windows. It was expected that butter rationing would soon be introduced.

### Hitler and Capone

Al Capone, resting in Alcatraz, would be proud today if he realized what his past deeds have achieved. His methods of operation have been imitated assiduously by one whose field and collaborators have far exceeded Capone's wildest dreams.

And now comes the payoff. Adolf Hitler, from whom the master Capone could now take lessons, has gone in for international kidnapping. He is demanding that the world pay for the release of the persecuted with foreign exchange-polite verbiage for ransom. Fortunately the world has seen through the scheme and the seed, dropped by Schacht, has found barren ground.

It is unfortunate that there does not exist an international "G-Man" department that could haul Hitler by the scruff of his neck to an international Alcatraz.

### The Prov. Symphony

It is with regret that we learned this week that the remaining concerts for the season by the Providence Symphony Orchestra have been cancelled.

Reasons for this action according to officers of the organization, include the scheduled enlargement of the Providence Federal Orchestra and the confusion of having musicians members of both orchestras. The last, naturally, led to rehearsal difficulties for those affiliated with the Federal unit were employed on a regular salary and were subject, therefore, to first call.

Thus the work of six years to establish an independent symphonic group has ended in dismal failure. And further there is no guarantee that the Federal Orchestra will continue its work indefinitely.

As part of the WPA it was born to assist unemployed musicians. But the number of men in the scope of the orchestra was solely on a sustained basis from Washington. (Continued on page 2)


### Sen. King Favors Reich Embargo Says Billion Needed To Halt Anti-Semitism

#### Speaks at Dinner For Minority Aid

"If Hitler persists in his ruthless persecution of minorities, I am willing to support a movement not only to sever diplomatic relations with Germany, but also to stop all commercial dealings with the country," declared Sen. William H. King, veteran member of the U. S. Senate foreign relations committee, as he addressed a banquet of the R. I. Committee for Relief of Oppressed Minorities, held last Monday night at the Narragansett Hotel.

"Something must be done, and done quickly," he said. "Anti-Semitism is a disease that is spreading fast, and is now raising its head in Poland, Roumania, Jugoslavia, Italy, Czechoslovakia (Continued on page 8)

### Accuses Coughlin of Aim To Be Hitler of America

NEW YORK. — Democratic government is on the way out in the United States unless something is done quickly to save it, and the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, is bent on becoming an American Hitler, L. M. Birkhead, Kansas City Unitarian minister, declared here last week.

Mr. Birkhead arrived with a trunkful of anti-Semitic literature which, he charges, links Nazi Germany and anti-Semitic organizations here. He is submitting the material to the Institute for Propaganda Analysis, which is sponsoring a conference of educators and statesmen who hope to chart a program of defense against Nazi proselyting in this country.

#### 800 Groups Formed in U. S.

Eight hundred groups, he said, have been formed here since Hitler came to power, to spread hatred of Jews and undermine the democratic form of government.

"Pope baiting has gone out of fashion," Mr. Birkhead said. "Hitler has provided the world with a new scapegoat, and now it's the Jew who is to blame for all the world's ills. It wouldn't be safe to stand up here and shout 'Down with democracy,' so the attack on democracy is being veiled as an attack on the Jews."

### Musical Prejudice Hit By Deems Taylor

NEW YORK. — Strong condemnation of bans on composers for racial and political reasons in totalitarian states was voiced by Deems Taylor, the composer and commentator on music, speaking over the Columbia Broadcasting System during the intermission of the opening concert of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra. He devoted the greater part of his 15-minute talk to ridiculing racial discrimination in music, referring particularly to the German Government's ban on the playing of Jewish composers' works.

### Cummings May Join Grynszpan Counsel

WASHINGTON. — Friends of Attorney General Homer Cummings said this week he was considering an offer to become a member of counsel for Herschel Grynszpan, Polish Jewish youth who assassinated a German diplomat in Paris last month.

Mr. Cummings, his friends said, was "toying" with the idea, but had arrived at no decision. The Attorney General will leave his government post early in January.

### Paris Fears Grynszpan Trial; Nazis Demand Death Penalty

PARIS. — The chances are good that the French government fears Herschel Grynszpan's trial for the murder of Ernst vom Rath, German diplomat more than does the 17-year-old-Polish Jewish defendant.

The fact that vom Rath was attached to the German Embassy in Paris, that the murder took place inside the embassy and that the Nazi regime is demanding Grynszpan's head creates a delicate and dangerous situation.

The Nazi press and Nazi speakers, not content with making 500,000 German Jews the victims of their wrath over the murder, are saying that nothing less than the death penalty for the boy will satisfy them.

#### Possible Verdicts

As things stand, a jury in France

might find one of four verdicts:— (1) murder with sentence to the guillotine. (2) Lesser degree of crime, with sentence to prison. (3) Insanity, with confinement in an asylum. (4) Acquittal. Even if convicted of the crime, the boy's youth may save him from the extreme penalty.

### Nazi Political Purge Reported by Paper

LONDON. — The Daily Express quoting well informed sources, asserted last week that a "fairly extensive" political purge was under way in Germany, involving high army officers, civic leaders and civil servants.

According to the story, secret police have arrested about forty army officers, including some important Foreign Office officials and high civil officials of Leipzig, Duesseldorf and Vienna.

The newspaper said economic conditions were becoming increasingly difficult in Germany and causing political tension involving the stability of the regime.

### "Boycott American" Declares Arab Paper

JERUSALEM. — A campaign against "everything American" has been launched by Falastin, Palestine's leading Arab Daily.

The paper declared editorially that all Arabs in the Near East would boycott all American institutions in protest against support of the Jewish homeland by the United States.

### Invite Rublee to Berlin To Discuss Migration

LONDON. — Germany is demanding cessation of a worldwide Jewish boycott of German goods in return for financial cooperation in transferring German Jews to new homes overseas, it was learned this week.

This became known after George Rublee, American executive director of the International Refugee Office, was invited to go to Berlin to discuss plans for taking nearly 700,000 Jews out of Germany.

This week's invitation came from Field Marshall Hermann Wilhelm Goering, chief of the Nazi four-year economic self-sufficiency program.

Rublee had been waiting for it for two months. Last October he asked for an appointment with German officials to discuss the refugee problem.

The Germans plan to finance emigration of German Jews by making other nations buy more German goods appeared to be dead since it was understood the United States, Britain, France and the Netherlands are not willing to commit themselves to buy more German exports to solve the refugee problem.

### 40 Members of Two Groups Donate \$500

In correction of a statement issued in the daily paper this week, it has been announced that one donation of \$500 to the Relief of Oppressed Minorities campaign, was contributed not by six men, as reported, but by a group of forty men.

The six men mentioned were sponsors of the idea. They were Harry Bloomberg, Sydney J. Hoffman and Louis Rosenbaum, representing members of the Providence Fraternal Association, and Alter Boyman, Elisha Scoliard and Simon Wolk, representing the R. I. Workmen's Beneficial Association. Sixteen dollars of the total raised was contributed by a Bar-Mitzvah boy.

### 225 Jewish Children Leave for England

BERLIN. — Two hundred and twenty-five Jewish children whose fathers have been expelled from Germany and whose mothers are largely dependent on charity left for Great Britain last week to seek new homes.

Mothers of the children began gathering at the railroad station hours before the children's train left. They were not permitted to go to the station platform to say goodbye, because the authorities wanted to avoid scenes or delay. Hence farewells were exchanged in the waiting room.

One of the boys said:— "Already I speak English. In one year I shall be an Englishman."

#### JEWISH ENTRANTS

TOKYO. — Jewish entrants into North China will not be restricted by Japanese military authorities, following the arrival at Tienstein of a large number of Jewish refugees from Germany.

## Highlights of the Week's News

### WPA Workers Seek "Stand Around" Pay

NEW YORK. — Sixty WPA workers halted their work at the North Beach Airport when their demands for "stand around" pay were not met. Then men insisted on being paid for the time they were on the field, especially in rainy weather, when they have to stand around and wait until supervisors decide whether it is too wet to use the machines.

The complainants said that on occasion they have been made to stand around a couple of hours doing nothing and then sent home.

### Prov. Symphony Cancels Concert

The remaining concerts of this season's schedule of the Providence Symphony Orchestra will be cancelled, it was announced this week by Hugh F. MacColl, president.

Enlargement of the Providence Federal Orchestra's schedule and conflicts rising from membership of musicians on the rolls of both orchestras were reasons mentioned for the decision.

### Civil Service Unit Polls Legislators

A post-election poll of legislators by the R. I. Committee of the National Civil Service Reform League revealed this week that only 36 of the 103 Representatives and only 14 of the 43 Senators have gone on record as favoring a State Civil Service Act.

A Gallup Poll disclosed that 97 per cent of the electorate were in favor of civil service legislation.

### Lemon Resigns GOP City Post

Shakeup in political party leadership continued this week with the resignation of Alfred B. Lemon as chairman of the City Republican Committee and a demand by J. Howard McGrath, U. S. District Attorney that the Democrats revamp the state party with a new State chairman with "no stains or spots on him."

Alderman Henry Violet, of the 11th ward, and William Needham,

secretary of the city committee, who were mentioned as possible candidates for Lemon's post declared they are not seeking the office.

### Coster Disclosures Six Years Too Late

NEW YORK. — The significant fact was disclosed this week by the World-Telegram that more than six years ago the Senate Committee on Banking and Currency might have spotted Coster's colossal exploitation and perversion of the McKesson & Robbins drug corporation.

The committee was asked to study Federal Trade Commission data on the legality of McKesson & Robbins operations and to probe stock exchange methods of appraising values of McKesson & Robbins securities.

Demands for the investigation, the New York paper asserted, came to naught.

### U. S. Policy Hit

BERLIN. — Abolition of the Monroe Doctrine was urged upon South American republics this week by Hitler's controlled press. Articles in the various papers insisted the United States had imperialistic designs toward Latin America.

### Bridges Scoffs At "Red" Charge

SAN FRANCISCO — Harry Bridges, Pacific Coast labor leader, said this week that if there were any evidence that he was a Communist or was attempting to overthrow the government, "they wouldn't waste five minutes arresting me."

"The President stated in a nationwide broadcast," Bridges said, "that he is not a Communist and does not eat millionaires for breakfast. Neither do I. They're too tough."

### Verbal Tilt Marks Tolerance Meeting

NEW YORK. — A sharp verbal tilt between Rabbi Louis I. Newman and Rev. Dr. Christian F. Reinsler interrupted the first public meeting of the Inter-Faith Movement, organized to promote tolerance. Dr. Reinsler, in his speech, called on Jews to refute charges of Communism and to be "more patriotic." Rabbi Newman challenged the remark and during the wordy altercation that followed, Rabbi Newman stalked from the room.

Rabbi Newman later said that he objected to any statement which makes the battle against Communism a special Jewish responsibility.

### Socialized Medicine Enemies Indicted

WASHINGTON. — Charged with conspiring to restrain trade by preventing physicians hired by a co-operative from practicing in Washington hospitals or consulting with other doctors, the American Medical Association was this week indicted by a Federal Grand

### Schacht Visit Fails

BERLIN. — His visit a failure, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, returned from London this week without effecting anything definite on Jewish emigration. It was denied that Schacht discussed credits for Germany.

### Predicts O'Hara's Return to Track

Leonard Lyons this week in his daily column appearing in the New York Post said that Walter O'Hara, who resigned his management of the Narragansett Race track is expected to resume his official position there on May 1.

### Russia and Poland Reach Agreement

MOSCOW. — Substantial increases in trade between Soviet Russia and Poland were interpreted this week as a Russian-Polish reply to any designs which Adolf Hitler may have on the Ukraine. The trade increases are expected to be followed up with the strengthening of political ties.

### Nazi About-Face

WASHINGTON. — Desperate for foreign exchange, the Nazi government this week lifted restrictions on American citizens from collecting in full on inheritances left them in Germany.

This about-face was brought about by Judge MacNeille who refused to allow part of an estate to go to claimants in Germany. The German embassy heard about the matter and reported it to Berlin.

### Storm Troopers Open Drive on 'White' Jews Define Them as Lustful Aryans

BERLIN. — The publication Das Schwarze Korps, organ of the picked SS Nazi storm troops, opened a drive this week against elements which it called "white Jews" and defined them as "Aryans with the same lust for profits, the same cunning, the same unscrupulousness in choice of their means as black Jews."

Explaining its drive, the publication said:

"We have not gone through years of struggle and endured pressure and war agitation to enable these evil vultures to sit down at the table which Jews have just been forced to vacate."

This article coincided with a drive in Fascist Italy against bourgeois elements as part of every effort was made to make middle class persons appear as the opposite of everything for which Fascism stands. Premier Mussolini's newspaper Popolo d'Italia of Milan said, for instance: "To let the bourgeois live is equivalent to letting the proletariat survive."

### Old Colony Bank Has Christmas Party

On Tuesday evening December 20, 70-odd employees of Old Colony Cooperative Bank gathered at the new Woonsocket building in which are housed the officers of that institution, to celebrate Christmas with the usual yearly festivities.

Executives and staff from the home office in Providence and from the Pawtucket, West Warwick and Greystone branches joined first in a quiz game mingling merry quips with practical questions, after which dinner was served by a caterer. This was followed in turn by group singing, remarks by president, Edward H. Weeks and distribution of the usual Christmas remembrances in initiation ceremony for new members of the organization, and dancing.

The event was in charge of a committee composed entirely of the Woonsocket Branch staff-Manager Ralph R. Crosby being chairman, assisted by James H. Hood, Jr., Gertrude Fitzgerald, Madeline Page and Harriet North.

### New Agency Formed Against Intolerance

NEW YORK CITY — Organization of the council against intolerance in America, outgrowth of the Provisional Council Against Anti-Semitism, was announced here by Senator-elect W. In outlining his plans for the future the new Premier has discussed the plight of the Jews with reticence. While he is anxious for Hitler's moral and financial support he finds it difficult, at the moment, to offend the liberal leaders whom he still needs.

It is possible, therefore, that the near future will bring a series of political purges to bring to the front only men who are susceptible to Hitler's advice. If this occurs the future of Czech Jews and thousands of refugees will be none too comfortable.


# She Sings Swing . . . Loves It!

## Local Girl Makes Good as Vocalist In Renard Band

"It's exactly the kind of work I love . . . I wouldn't do anything else!" . . . This was the declaration that fired the opening gun of an interview last Sunday afternoon, with Miss Ethel Sydney, songstress for Jacques Renard's orchestra in Boston at the Coconut Grove . . . Perhaps more familiarly known in this city as Ethel Shukofsky, she is the daughter of Mrs. Jennie Shukofsky of 233 Sixth street . . . And, Sydney, by the way, is Ethel's middle name

**Gone a Long Way**  
Enthusiastically and in unmistakable terms, she told me she adores singing, and she thinks Mr. Renard is "a swell fella to work for." . . . Ethel has come a rather long way since she began her career in Providence . . . It was about three years ago that she was singing with Arthur Paquette's orchestra in the Palais D'Or, a Providence restaurant . . . Following that contract, through the efforts of Jimmy Lipet, Ethel's fiance and manager, she was auditioned and signed by Ted Peck for an engagement in a Providence nite club, and later sang with Frank Ward in the Penthouse of Boston's Hotel Bradford . . .

### Renard Suggested

Manager Lipet, however, was looking to even greater glories for Ethel . . . Acquainted with Vick Knight, radio program director in New York for Eddie Cantor's and Jack Benny's radio shows, Jimmy spoke to Knight about Ethel . . . "She sounds good," thought Knight, and suggested that Ethel be auditioned by Jacques Renard . . . It happened that Renard was planning an opening in Boston, having just completed an engagement on Eddie Cantor's

program . . .

### Premiere at Benefit

So, in the early part of last May, Knight wired Maestro Renard in Boston that a Miss Ethel Sydney and her manager were on their way down to the Hub to see him . . . Ethel and Jimmy got there the night Renard was opening . . . When they met Renard (whose middle circumference by the way goes from here to tomorrow) he and the band were rushing out to do a benefit . . . As per the wire, Renard had expected the two young people, and no sooner had introductions been made, than he asked Ethel if she'd sing at this benefit they were going to . . . All this, mind you, before he'd even heard her! . . . Would she sing ??? . . . But, definitely! . . . Her heart beat like a hammer . . . So, losing no time, they all trucked on over to the benefit . . . Renard slipped a sheet of music to his pianist — and Ethel sang "How 'Ja Like To Love Me?" . . . They all loved her—and Renard knew then and there this was the type of voice his band needed . . .

### Visits Here

Ethel lives at the Hotel Westminster in Boston's historic Copley Square . . . Her week starts Monday night and runs through Saturday night . . . She spends all day Sunday, and Monday until four, here in town with her mother . . . Mrs. S. said her daughter has remained unspoiled, despite her steady climb upwards as an entertainer . . . She gets up early on Sunday morning, fresh as the proverbial daisy, pushes up her sleeves and helps about the house

. . . She waits on herself, and is always chattering about how nice everybody is to her . . . Her mother said Ethel hasn't acquired the "I love to lounge around in a negligee" attitude—and doesn't think she ever will . . . She's too energetic and ambitious . . .

Her work-days, however, are quite different from those of the average girl . . . "I get up usually about 12:30," said Ethel, "and after dressing, take a nice brisk fifteen minute walk to town . . . I never have breakfast, but that walk certainly does things for my luncheon appetite . . . After eating," she continued, "I visit various publishers, most of whom are located in the Little Building." . . . I questioned her about the purpose of the visits . . . "The publishers are really song pluggers, she explained . . . "They bring new songs to the attention of Boston bands, and help singers decide which songs to use." . . . After these visits, living up to the tradition of her sex, she shops for clothes . . . When she isn't shopping, she may be found attending plays or movies, to which she has entree at any time . . . Then there are always friends for pleasant afternoons of chatting . . .

After the evening is over, (about 1:30 A. M.) she and Maestro Renard and several contact men, go down to Chinatown, and in a round table discussion, just for "diversion" they talk about—music . . .

If a vote were taken in these parts, as it is in New York, for the No. 1 Glamour Girl of the season, I think Ethel would emerge as winner . . . She's five feet, three and a half . . . Weighs 105 . . . Has auburn hair in a perfect page-boy roll, grayish green eyes, and red fingernails . . . Her voice is technically known as mezzo contralto . . . It's deep and throaty, but unmistakably feminine . . . At work, she wears strictly dinner clothes, and usually changes about twice a night . . .

Ethel and Jimmy are being married some time at the end of January . . . "—when I find some time between jobs," Ethel added . . . But it's not going to be another Sally Ann Clark affair—that is, giving up a singing career for marriage . . . Because, Ethel is going to keep right on singing, with the consent and urging of her husband-to-be . . . # Huge Fund Sought For Refugees Colonies

## Would Curb Utopian Scheme

NEW YORK. — There is immediate need for \$10,000,000 to establish "hundreds of thousands of persecuted Jews from Europe in Palestine and other places of refuge" officers of the United Palestine Appeal declared this week.

Declaring that the \$10,000,000 should be raised by American Jews, the United Palestine Appeal officers said that at the London conference they had proposed the establishment of a sub-commission of experts under the aegis of the Intergovernmental Refugee Committee to act as a clearing house for colonization schemes.

### Would Curb Utopian Schemes

That, they said, "would avoid the unauthorized airing of Utopian schemes which can only be interpreted as cruel exercises in falsely raising the hopes of tens of thousands of homeless and despair-ridden Jews."



## Appeasement Till It Hurts

THE NEW REPUBLIC

France, by sacrificing Czechoslovakia at Munich and signing a pact of non-aggression with Germany, has not escaped attack from the southern end of the Rome-Berlin axis. Now that Hitler has gained enough territory to satisfy his appetite for a few weeks, Mussolini must go on to his next advance. His well trained cohorts are demanding annexation of Tunisia, Jibuti (the port of the French-owned railroad running from Ethiopia,) a share of control in the Suez Canal, dominance by Franco in Spain, Corsica, and even Savoy and Nice in France itself.

### Many Shareholders in Empire

Though Frenchmen may be ready to sacrifice allies, they are quite unwilling to hand over any French property or any territory over which their flag flies. The empire is, in great measure, an affair of long history, and many shareholders both large and small depend on their colonial interests. Here is no matter of mere sentiment or even of strategic calculations having to do with national defense. It is a practical matter touching the French pocketbook, and any French government would prefer war to surrendering any substantial imperial interests.

### Duce's Demands Seem Laughable

If this is the case, why does Italy hope to gain anything by a demand of this character? To attack Ethiopia, even in the face of League opposition, is one thing, but to treat France as if she were Czecho-Slovakia is quite another. Gayda, the unofficial spokesman of Mussolini in foreign affairs, has already explicitly warned France not to repeat the mistake of her sister republic of resisting. Such boldness seems at first merely laughable. France could overwhelm Italy in open hostilities; her army is immensely superior in ability and equipment, and her navy could cut off Italy's chief sources of supply by sea. The spectacle of Italy attempting to take Tunisia in the face of the magnificent French "Army of Africa," to say nothing of trying to invade France itself, is enough to bring nightmares to torment the sleep of any realistic Italian general-staff officer. The Italian air force, it is true, is somewhat superior to the French but against this must be set the far greater vulnerability of Italy, with her massed industrial areas and electric railways, to bombing attack; while her total lack of raw materials and indifferent food supply make it unthinkable for Italy to go to war with superior naval power—save in the columns of the Giornale d'Italia.

### Believes France Vulnerable

No doubt Mussolini has inferred from the economic difficulties and the internal dissension in France that this "democracy" is ready to crack. Under Blum and

the French "New Deal," labor won shorter hours, the right to organize and other reforms, but capital went on strike; much of it left the country and there was diminishing of that which could not leave. Under Daladier with his decrees, compulsion has been applied to labor while capital is wooed. Daladier refuses to apply exchange control to prevent the flight of capital, though he lengthens the working week and suppresses strikes. It is not really a need for production that dictated the abandonment of the forty-hour week, since there are many unemployed. What was really wanted was lower labor costs and larger profits. The tax on incomes of 12,000 francs a year is quadrupled, but the tax on incomes of year 500,000 francs is actually reduced. Yet the reactionary forces do not quite dare to suppress democracy for fear of civil war.

### Deadlock Deceiving

In spite of this deadlock, Mussolini would be rash to tempt fate in an actual war with France, for as soon as the first shot was fired, the ranks would close, and France would do what was necessary to win. French workers would prefer their own exploiters to Hitler and Mussolini. But of course Mussolini has allies—Hitler and Chamberlain.

### Peace Sacrifices

Has anyone forgotten the part Mussolini played at Munich? He assured the world publicly of his solidarity with Hitler, while privately he played on Chamberlain's desire for "appeasement" and friendship. He thus helped Hitler to carry away his prize without fighting a shot. Hitler can play the same game, now that Mussolini is on the march. He can make both France and Britain believe that if war breaks out, he must come to the aid of his good friend. Neither nation will put any trust in his recent promises. But he will assure Chamberlain

One day last week, a bondsman showed up with a court order for Benjamin Herman's release in \$1,000 bail.

A call for Benjamin Herman was sent out to the jail's recreation hall.

Benjamin Herman, twenty-five, 654 Hendrix Street, Brooklyn, awaiting his second trial on a Sullivan; law charge, responded.

The bond was posted, and he sauntered out of the prison a free man.

### Second Herman Howls

It wasn't until some time afterward that Benjamin Herman, twenty-three, 114 East Fourteenth Street, awaiting trial on a charge of assault, set up a howl.

He'd expected friends to spring him before dark, he yelled, and it was time he was getting action.

He got action, all right—for a hasty checkup immediately revealed that the bail certificate applied to Mr. Herman of the Manhattan Hermans—and not of the family's Brooklyn branch.

# Roumania Plans Mass Emigration

## Expect to Settle 150,000 in Palestine

### Request Wealthy Jews For Money

BUCHAREST. — The Rumanian Foreign Office let it be known this week that the removal of 150,000 Rumanian Jews to Palestine and certain British colonies was envisaged in diplomatic negotiations now in progress with Great Britain.

A plan was disclosed which contemplates the settlement of 50,000 Rumanian Jews annually in the Holy Land and British possessions.

It was said wealthy Jews were being asked to help finance the plan and Jewish communities invited to start subscriptions for that purpose. A Rumanian Government report on the mass colonization project was promised.

Details remained indefinite, but it was expected that one government measure to enable Jews to emigrate would be to permit them to take out small amounts of capital. First removals would be from the eastern provinces of Bucovina, Bessarabia and Transylvania.

## Urges Suppression

WASHINGTON. — Gerhart Seger, former member of the German Reichstag, urged last week that the United States take steps immediately to suppress what he said were growing Nazi activities in this country.

Addressing the Washington Town Hall Forum, Seger said:—"The United States should by all means avoid repeating the mistakes made by the young German republic before Hitler came to power."

## Hungary to Increase Restriction for Jews

### May Set Limit Of Six Per Cent

BUDAPEST. — New restrictions on Hungary's Jews, possibly including limiting their voting rights were in prospect as the Cabinet gave final touches to a bill for control of Jews to be introduced in Parliament Friday.

This coincided with the arrival of Count Galeazzo Ciano, Italian Foreign Minister, who came, the Budapest official press said, to give Hungary the benefit of Fascist experience in dealing with the Jewish and other domestic problems.

### Will Increase Restrictions

In official quarters it was said that social and economic restrictions to be proposed would be far more sweeping than Hungary's present legislation concerning Jews, which limits their participation in business and the professions to 20 per cent of the total engaged in any calling.

It was indicated that a limit of 6 per cent would be set in some instances.

that he does not want war and that peace may be had—for a price. Of course France would be crushed if both Germany and Italy attacked her, and she did not have Britain's aid. Therefore Chamberlain will have an opportunity to press upon the French government the necessity for making sacrifices for peace. "Appeasement" may thus give Mussolini his bloodless conquest, just as it showered victory on his brother dictator. Meanwhile the superior financial power of the British can profoundly influence France, as it has in the past, to keep democracy in check and prevent a militant anti-Fascist movement from coming into power.

No doubt Mussolini is counting upon cowering the "great democracies" again by some such process. If he were not, his present course would be a mad courting of defeat. Will he succeed? Perhaps not in taking over Tunisia and Jibuti. But he might easily win a final sacrifice of Loyalist Spain and might even penetrate even to a share in Suez. That would strengthen both ends of the axis for the next adventure. Appeasement would have taken a

## Hadassah Begins Emergency Drive For Child Refugees

NEW YORK. — A nationwide emergency campaign to raise funds for the transfer to Palestine of thousands of starving and homeless Jewish children, many of whom have been separated from their parents during the reprisals against Jews in Germany, has been launched by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, it was announced here this week. More than \$25,000 enough to care for some seventy refugee children already holding certificates for Palestine was sent to Jerusalem by Hadassah as an initial contribution.

Hadassah's 70,000 women members comprise the sole American agency for the Youth Aliyah (immigration) movement which has

been removing Jewish children from Central Europe to Palestine for the past four and a half years. The emergency plea was telegraphed to 381 chapter presidents of the organization, in 45 states, after a specially convened meeting of the executive committee of the national board here at 1860 Broadway.

A trans-Atlantic telephone call from the Netherlands, where two hundred Jewish children now awaiting certificates for immigration to Palestine have been given temporary refuge, revealed the fact that there were five thousand starving children waiting at the border of the country for permission to enter.

## "Like You and Me, Bosses Get Fired," Says Job Agent

NEW YORK. — Walter A. Lowen, who runs an employment agency for jobless \$50,000-a-year, men sat at his desk one day this week in the Graybar Building, and airily debunked the guys you work for — the presidents of the corporations.

Mr. Lowen has nothing against presidents; he even went so far as to say some of his best friends are presidents. "But," he went on, "the public today, the general public, thinks of a president as irreplaceable, while in fact in these times a president is just as fireable as an office boy! Perhaps even more so. Listen—"

He whispered the names of several corporation presidents who got the bounce this year.

## Suggest Reserving Visas for Refugees

PARIS. — A proposal that the United States relax immigration restrictions to provide temporary relief for more than 50,000 Jews of Germany was advanced this week by representatives of Jewish organizations, meeting with Sir Herbert Emerson, assistant to the League's high commissioner for refugees.

The committee suggested that the United States immediately grant the full quota of visas for the next two years for emigrants from Germany, which would be 56,000, including annexed Austria.

### Valid in 1939 or 1940

The visas would not become valid until their regular times in 1939 or 1940.

With the visas assured, however, refugees would be allowed to leave Germany for a "receiving country" to remain until regulations permitted their entry into the United States.

If arrangements were made meanwhile for entrance to other countries the visas would be withdrawn or transferred to other refugees.

## Washington Finance Has New Quarters

Announcement was made this week that the Washington Finance Corporation, established in 1927, will remove to new and convenient offices, at 1010 Union Trust Building.

Located at 77 Washington st., for the past thirteen years, it was the first Jewish finance company in the city. Officers and members of its board include prominent leaders in the Jewish Community.

The organization has expressed thanks to its patrons, and will be pleased to welcome old friends at its new address.

## Paper Bankrupt Because of Policy

ST. LOUIS. — The Westliche Post, one of the oldest German-language newspapers in the country, which was once edited by Morris Pinner, a Jewish political supporter of Abraham Lincoln, and once owned by the late Joseph Pulitzer, later publisher of the New York World, fell a victim to the cleavage created among German-Americans by Nazi propaganda and suspended publication.

J. O. Pfeiffer, the paper's editor, said that it lost circulation and advertising because Nazis accused it of being anti-Nazi, and anti-Nazis believed it to be pro-Nazi. As a result of this cross-fire of charges the paper went bankrupt.



BRONX. — While a mob was burning the Vienna synagogue where his father had been music director for twenty-eight years, Robert Reisenman, nine, was safe in a Bronx apartment, composing a new refuge.

Of course, the synagogue burning was conjectural. Dispatches from Vienna said that all synagogues were razed. That would include the temple where David Reisenman conducted the choir until the Nazis took over.

Robert and his mother and father are snugly tucked away in some plainly furnished rooms at 2137 Clinton avenue, The Bronx, where Robert has no piano for practice, but has plenty of paper and ink whereon to jot, a bit untidily, the musical fantasies that keep singing their way through his small mind.

Musicians have said that Robert has reached "Opus 50." He began to play and to compose at seven and has been busy at it ever since. He has only one drawback. He is a music critic. That

also began when he was seven, but there's hope that he may outgrow it. He has gained auditions at the Julliard School, which hopes to have him later, but for the present he has been sent to the Chatham Square Music School, where children of musical aptitude are in contact with musicians capable of appreciating their gifts.

Robert has a missing tooth, rosy cheeks, a piping voice and terrific ambition. Although he has heard a symphony orchestra only once, he has begun to write a symphony, scored for a dozen different instruments.
