Wise and Lipsky Sail for England

New York.—Dr. Stephen S. Wise President, and Mr. Louis Lipsky, Vice-President of the American Jewish Congress, sailed for Europe last week aboard the S. S. Queen Mary, to confer with European Jewish leaders on important problems confronting the Jewish world.

Dr. Wise, who is President of the Zionist Organization of America, and Mr. Lipsky, the American member of the Executive Committee of the World Zionist Organization, will confer with Dr. Chaim Weizmann on Palestine problems and will attend a meeting of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization.

A special meeting of the Executive Committee of the World Jewish Congress will be summoned in London early in March during the presence there of the two leaders.

Arrange Reception For New Members

Maurice Hindus, noted authority on present-day Russia, will discuss "Twenty Years of Soviet Russia" at the Jewish Community Center, Sunday evening, March 13. Mr. Hindus, during his talk, will comment on the treason trial now taking place in Moscow. Samuel Workman will introduce the speaker.

In addition to the address by Maurice Hindus, a reception will be tendered new members. Asks Leniency for Nephew Sentenced to Prison in Russia

Chicago — In an effort to win clemency for her young nephew, a violin prodigy, under sentence of 10 years imprisonment for violating currency restrictions, Mrs. I. Gertzen, a Russian-born Chicago woman, has appealed to the Soviet Russian Ambassador. Mrs. Gertzen learned of her nephew's conviction in a dispatch from Riga, Latvia.

The dispatch stated that Bussy Goldstein, 15, was sentenced to prison, after being caught smuggling currency concealed in his violin, into Russia. In her telegram to Ambassador Alexander A. Troyanovsky in Washington, Mrs. Gertzen said: "I noticed a newspaper item regarding the prison sentence of my nephew, Bussy Goldstein, violinist. Because of his youth and possible ignorance of the severity of the crime, and also the possibility of the in-

fluence of an older person, could your office intercede for us in reducing his sentence?"

"News of Bussy's arrest was a great shock to me," Mrs. Gertzen said, "especially since the Russian Government recognized his great ability as a violinist and took charge of his instruction when he was nine years old."

She went on to say that last year Goldstein and four other Russian musicians won prizes in an international musical competition at Brussels. They were then given permission by the Soviet authorities to make a concert tour of Europe. It is assumed he was returning to Russia from this tour when arrested.

Bussy is the son of Mrs. Gertzen's brother. Mrs. Gertzen emigrated from Russia in 1905 to join her husband in Chicago.

Kuhn, Nazi Leader, Sails for Europe

New York—Fritz Kuhn, who is the leader of the German-American Bund with headquarters in Yorkville, sailed last week from Hoboken for Antwerp on the steamship Westernland of the Red Star Line. He would not admit his identity to the press on board although his name was printed in the passenger list and also written on the passenger manifest. Officials of the steamship line said that he was Mr. Kuhn.

When asked if he was going to Germany Mr. Kuhn replied: "I am going to Belgium." Asked if his trip was for business or pleasure, he slammed the door of his cabin.

Jews' Prosperity Nettles Streicher

Berlin—Alarm against the continued prosperity of Jewish firms in Germany, despite four years of Nazi effort to crowd them out, was sounded by the Stuermer, weekly organ of Julius Streicher, Germany's No. 1 Jew-baiter.

The Stuermer demanded to know if aristocrats deliberately were trying to support Jews.

It printed a long list of regular customers of a large Jewish-owned Berlin department store containing many names of aristocratic families and government employees.

Accuse Dentists of Filling of Yanking Ghost Tooth

Hempstead, L. I.—A tooth which formerly resided in the mouth of LeRoy Wolfe, and another which remains in the possession of his wife constitute the chief evidence under which two prominent Nassau dentists are accused of relief chiseling, it became known this week.

One of the defendants is Dr. Clarence Cohen, former police commissioner of Hempstead Village and a wealthy landowner. He was charged with violating the Public Welfare Law, after a fellow practitioner, Dr. Abraham Gubar, also prominent in Hempstead, had pleaded not guilty to a similar accusation. The two men are accused of submitting bills to the relief agency for dental work on Mr. and Mrs. Wolfe,

Jews, still frightened by the anti-Semitic measures of the short-lived regime of Premier Octavian Goga, were greatly encouraged by the gesture of the Dr. Cristea, who, besides being Premier, is Patriarch of the Roumanian Orthodox Church.

Dr. Cristea's immediate purpose was to ask synagogues to hold services simultaneously with the orthodox church on March 13, at which religious sanctions would be given Roumanians to disregard any oaths previously given to political parties or social movements.

One object was to release members of the outlawed Iron Guard, extreme nationalist organization, from oaths of unquestioning loyalty to Cornelius Zelea Codreanu, Fascist Iron Guard leader and anti-Semitic agitator.

The Jewish community was expected to give Dr. Cristea assurance of co-operation.

Traditional Wedding Held by Ancient Sect at Mt. Grizim

SAMARIA, Palestine—Ancient Mt. Grizim, adjoining the now all-Arab city of Shechem, was the scene last week of a Samaritan wedding, the first in a decade.

The wedding ceremony was carried out in full accordance with the laws and traditions of this ancient sect which claims ancestry to the tribes of Levi and Joseph. The Samaritans believe only in the Bible. They do not recognize Talmudic and rabbinic laws.

The groom, Jacob Nakoen, a giant of six feet three inches in height is 39 years old. He is the elder of the community and holds the position of high priest. The bride is sixteen years old.

The Samaritan sect which is over two thousand years old is gradually dying off. Today there are somewhere in the vicinity of about 200 souls in the entire Sa-

maritan community. Of that number there are about 30 eligible young men. However there is a shortage of girls, and intermarriage, even with Jews is definitely forbidden. Some of the younger element have left the sect and have married Jewish girls from Yemen and Palestine.

The sect carries out all ancient Hebrew rites including the sacrificial of a Pascal lamb on the eve of Passover.



In addition to a week's vacation at Bethlehem, N. H., the winner will receive a number of prizes.



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The Picture Changes

Not so many weeks ago anti-Semitism was riding high in South America.

Brazil had announced its intention to deport hundreds of German Jewish refugees. Ecuador had ordered the deportation of all Jews not engaged in farming. Mexico was engaged in harassing Jewish merchants. The influence of Nazi propaganda had also made itself felt in Uruguay, Argentina, Paraguay and Chile. The creation of an authoritarian regime in Brazil with all the earmarks of Fascism focused world attention on Fascist propaganda in Latin-America as never before.

But just when it appeared that Fascism was on the verge of making its first real conquest in the New World, the picture changed.

Brazil changed its mind about deporting Jews and took special pains to emphasize that its new form of government was not patterned in form or ideology on that of Germany or Italy. Ecuador revoked its order for the expulsion of Jews and Mexico began to soft-pedal its anti-Jewish legislation. At the same time the newly inaugurated president of Argentina stressed democracy and liberty in his inaugural address.

Then the United States began a series of radio programs intended to counteract Fascist propaganda in Latin-America. Fascism once so popular there, appears to be losing ground and will lose more as the dictatorships of Europe become more ruthless and more ambitious.

Regardless of how much Latin-America may fear the United States, they know that this country has no territorial designs and that ultimately the salvation of South and Central America lies in the expansion of the good neighbor policy.

"No Racial Persecution" Says Head of Argentine Republic

Buenos Aires—A pledge not to tolerate racial persecution during his regime was made before a group of Jewish newspapermen by President-elect Roberto M. Ortiz, who assumed the presidency of the Argentine Republic last week.

The nation cannot tolerate a policy of race hatred, "which is repulsive to the national character," Dr. Ortiz said. He declared: "During my presidency, I shall not tolerate any race persecutions.

The Argentine will be, as heretofore, a great country for all who know how to love her and contribute to realization of Argentine ideals and aspirations. The Argentine cannot tolerate a policy of race hate, which is repulsive to the national character. Argentine Jews, when they put to the service of the nation their energies, capabilities and intelligency in building up their home here, may be sure in my administration of peace and respect.

Label Marks Aryan Made Nazi Textiles

Berlin—Steps have been taken by the Nazi trade organization to make it easy for shoppers to determine with one look whether or not a piece of cloth has gone through Jewish hands.

"Aryan from weaving loom to retailer" reads a little guarantee seal in men's clothes and ladies' dresses sold by a chain of stores throughout the country.

With the gradual elimination of Jewish businessmen from the textile industry in Germany, the trade organizations now aim at guaranteeing the aryan origin of underwear, lingerie, hats, umbrellas, ties, garters, suspenders and spats.

Official Italian Organ Denies Anti-Semitism

Rome—The Italian Government denied last week any intention to inaugurate an anti-Semitic policy and proposed establishment of a Jewish State somewhere outside Palestine as a solution of "the international Jewish problem."

The official Informazione Diplomatica issued a statement, generally attributed to Premier Mussolini, which denied reports that the Government planned anti-Jewish restrictions, but reserved the right to act against Jews hostile to the regime—it held the international anti-Fascist movement directed by "Jewish elements"—and to watch recent Jewish immigrants.

The statement made a deep impression here. It was reported that a suggestion was made to the Italian press to check anti-Semitic attacks.



No Jews in Reich by 1938 Nazi Hope

Hitler Organ Makes Prophecy

Berlin—In 20 years Germany will be free of the bulk of its Jewish population, Das Schwarze Korps, organ of Chancellor Hitler's elite guards, declares in its current issue in a leading article accusing the Jews of not wanting to emigrate.

"Twenty years ago," the periodical states, "it would have been considered utopian to dream of forcibly separating the Jews from the spiritual and political life of the nation. It is no chimera that 20 years from now there will be a separation in space, at least as far as the greater number of Jews are concerned.

Palestinian Man Has Three Wives; Judge Says Its O K

Tel Aviv.—Jacob Melnik is an amorous young Talmudic scholar. He's married to three women—yes, all at once—and he thinks it's all right. As a matter of fact, a Jewish magistrate sitting in the all-Jewish city thinks it's all right, too. The court held polygamy in certain circumstances to be no crime. The decision freeing the thrice-wed defendant has thrown religious leaders into somewhat of an uproar.

Became Ambitious

It seems that after seven years of an uneventful matrimony with his wife, Boda Blizovsky, Jacob suddenly began to seek connubial bliss on a larger scale. On July 2, 1936, he wed Chaya Esther Melamed. On August 6, 1936 he married Rivka Friedman. He told Boda he worked during the day, and he told Chaya he worked at night. And he might have gone merrily on

his way "marrying additional women if the police had not caught him," said the court.

Melnik was tried before Magistrate Khishin in a courtroom packed to the doors every day, as religious and legal leaders of the Jewish National Home argued over the application of Biblical and Talmudic law to Jews who marry one woman while still wed to another.

Marriages Legal

The case, Magistrate Khishin declared in his decision freeing Melnik, hinged on the provision in the Palestinian criminal code, adopted in 1936, that four points must be established to convict in a polygamy case—that the defendant is married, that his wife is living, that he married a second time, and that the second marriage is void because it occurred during the lifetime of the first wife.

The first three points were established in Melnik's case, Magistrate Khishin held. As to the fourth, he decided, the marriage to Miss Melamed and Miss Friedman were void, not for the reason prescribed in the law, but because the defendant had concealed his previous marriage, and in one case, used an assumed name. The magistrate held this variation was sufficient to acquit Melnik. He nevertheless bound Melnik over in \$250 bail for deceiving his second and third wives.

After his liberation, Melnik told reporters who asked for a statement: "I got my punishment to compensate for the pleasure of having three wives—don't forget there are three mothers-in-law." Triple trouble, we call it.
