1,000,000 \$1 Gifts Asked for Education

New York—Gifts of \$1 each from the 1,000,000 orthodox Jews of the United States to support a program of Jewish education in America are being sought by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations.

William Weiss, president of the organization, said the fund would be used to co-ordinate religious educational work throughout the country under the auspices of the National Orthodox Board of Education.

The fund, he said, will provide for the support of Yeshiva College of New York, the Chicago Theological Seminary and other schools of higher Hebrew learning, as well as for religious schools and Talmud Torah schools attended by children.

Mr. Washington's Public Address Against Jews Brave But Not Wise

New York:—Yokum Washington, 39, a Negro, decided this week to talk publicly against the Jews and chose Pitt and Rivington Streets, in the heart of the east side, for the scene of his culmination. It was an unhappy choice.

When a squad of police and firemen rescued him from an infuriated crowd of more than 300 men and women he was cut and bruised and bleeding from his face and head. Then he was charged with malicious mischief for turning in a fire alarm and was placed in \$100 bail when arraigned before the Magis-

trate in Night Court.

Washington said he was a welder when he works. He said he was a little "ginned up" the night of his performance. He walked into the Clinton Street police station and started to criticize the Jews. He was led out by police. He returned and started again. He was escorted out again.

He protested that he was "smart" and assured the police he had "four years of law in my cranium." They told him to go home and sleep it off. Finally he strode to the street corner and started his speech. When he made the statement, "The United States needs two Hitlers instead of one," things began to pop.

The crowd piled on and Washington, suddenly sober, dashed to a fire box and turned in an alarm. Police and fire apparatus arrived and the men that manned it tried with clubs and poles to open a path to Washington. The crowd released him only when fireman threatened to turn on the hose.

Washington was brought back into the station house, where he was treated by a doctor from Gouverneur Hospital and then arrested.

Anti-Jewish Row Denied by College

Madison, Wis.—Denial that anti-Semitic feeling has dominated the dispute over the ouster three weeks ago of Richard Davis, New York Jewish student, as editor of the Daily Cardinal, student controlled campus newspaper, was expressed by President C. A. Dykstra of the University of Wisconsin.

President Dykstra indicated he would act to settle the strike of about 50 Cardinal workers supporting Davis if the students cannot work out the controversy themselves.

"Doubtless in the heat of the Cardinal campaign some opposition of individual Jews has been expressed, but I feel sure that this opposition has not extended further than to specific individuals," the university head declared.

Jews Too Despairing Says Col. Wedgwood

New York — Jews are giving away too much to despair and not exhibiting sufficient boldness in the face of the present crisis, Col. Josiah Wedgwood, British Laborite member of the House of Commons, said on his arrival for a speaking tour.

He also deplored the fact that Jews are manifesting "too much resignation and not enough indignation."

In his first public address at a luncheon given him by the American Jewish Congress, Colonel Wedgwood predicted that sooner or later the great democracies will have to come to the defense of the victims of totalitarianism.

Ben Gurion Urges Military Training

Rehoboth—David Ben Gurion, head of the Jewish Agency's Jerusalem executive, has urged worldwide military and naval training of Jewish youth and fortification of key points in Palestine as necessary to the Zionist cause.

Rabbi Loses Battle With Mayor Hague

Temple Financial Backers Withdraw

Jersey City: The Congregation Emanu-el, headed by Rabbi Benjamin Plotkin, critic of Mayor Hague, was looking for a meeting house today, faced with expulsion by July 1 from its present quarters in the Jewish Community Center here.

Judge Morris Barison, Hague appointee to the Hudson County Juvenile Court bench, and Louis Jacobs, member of the Hague-controlled city Board of Education, are among the more influential officers of the Jewish Community Center.

A year ago, after Rabbi Plotkin had attacked Mayor Hague several times before the congregation and also had spoken at anti-Hague demonstrations, the Center served notice that Emanu-el must vacate. But a committee representing the congregation reached an agreement with the officers of the Center, which permitted the former to remain.

It is now reported that the committee at that time undertook to guarantee that the Hague administration would not be attacked further, though the rabbi denies that he knew of any such agreement.

At any rate, his attacks have continued and he spoke at the anti-Hague meeting a few months ago at Fairmount Hall. He also was a character witness for John R. Lon-

Vienna Jews Pay Nazi Blackmail Fund

Vienna — The Vienna Jewish Community has succeeded by herculean efforts in raising the 800,000 schillings (\$160,000) demanded of it by the Nazi authorities and has turned over the money. The Nazis insisted on getting this sum as a "token" of good will because the Jewish Community was charged with raising a similar sum to finance the proposed plebiscite of former Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed that Jews leaving Austria must make up their minds to leave behind virtually all of their property. Technically, Jewish refugees are supposed to be allowed to take 75% of their entire property.

Czech. Jews Ask Sudeten Safety

Moravska Ostrava, Czechoslovakia. The Jewish party expressed hope in a resolution that the government would guarantee protection of the Jewish minority against "brutality and boycott in Sudeten German districts.

Angelo Goldstein, a Jewish deputy, said that Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York had cabled a denial of reports of an American Jewish boycott against German industries in Czechoslovakia.

Hold Conference on Arab-Jewish Problem

New York—A permanent conference on Arab-Jewish Relations, interested in a peaceful and friendly solution for present troubles in Palestine, has been formed here with Rabbi Bernard Drachman as chairman.

There is no intrinsic reason for hostility between Jews and Arabs and efforts should be made to attain mutual agreement between the

Nazi Landlords Told To "Choose" Tenants

New Form of Leases Drawn


Berlin.—An additional step toward segregating Jews may be taken soon, it was reported this week.

Information from Nazi quarters was that government action was not intended, but that the formula for tenancy contracts would be revised so that "Aryan" landlords would pledge themselves not to rent rooms to Jewish tenants and to try gradually to replace present Jewish tenants with "Aryan" ones.

Efforts have been made by "Aryan" landlords recently to "Aryanize" the renting business. The Landlords' Assn. has applied pressure to induce Jewish landlords to sell their businesses, it is reported.

Committee Protests Nationality Law

Geneva—The executive committee of the World Jewish Congress appealed to the president of the League Council and to the British and French Foreign Ministers today to prevent the application of the new law on revision of nationalities in Rumania on the ground that the law puts Jews of Rumanian nationality outside the protection of minorities treaties.

(The Rumanian government on March 8 ordered Jews and Christians who were Jews before December 1, 1918, to produce evidence of their Rumanian citizenship.)

Immigration Schedule Announced by Govt.

Jerusalem—The Government today announced a six-month immigration schedule of 3,440 certificates, of which 3,000 are earmarked for Jews and the remainder for Christians. The certificates for Jews are to be allotted in the proportion of 2,000 for capitalists possessing a minimum of \$5,000 and 1,000 for laborers. In the latter category, 830 certificates will be distributed by the Jewish Agency for Palestine, with the remainder reserved for distribution by the Government Immigration Department.



Hollywood, May 11. —Sam Goldwyn, of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studios, announced today that he had ordered production rushed on a picture dramatizing the exiling of Jews from Germany.

The announcement brought protests from Goldwyn's more timid associates, who feared such a film would ruin the American movie business in Germany.

What business? Goldwyn asked. "They haven't let me show a film of mine over there in five years," he said.

His forthcoming picture is entitled "The Exiles." It features Jascha Heifetz in his first screen role and will go into production as soon as Mr. Goldwyn can round up a cast to play the parts of the other exiles.

New York:—More than 48,000 of the 50,000 members enrolled in the National Council of Jewish Women

are in favor of uniform marriage and divorce laws in America, Mrs. Elizabeth Bass Golding, chairman of the organization's legislative committee reported this week.

Merry Farce of Marriage in Red Russia Given by Center Players

The merry farce, "Squaring the Circle" describing the adventures of two married couples residing in a single room during Russia's housing shortage, was presented last Tuesday night by the Center Players at the Plantations Auditorium.

The light surface of fun thinly veils the trenchant satire against those who enter into hasty marriages. The play ridicules those who are so intellectual that they become dull to material necessities and those who are so bourgeois that the domestic interests stultify intellectual development.

In this round of obvious nonsense, the bourgeois domesticity is soundly satirized in the character of a young bride, Ludmilla, capably portrayed by Annette Kaufman, who easily walked off with the honors of the evening.

The closing line of Emilian, the poet, aptly describes the re-action of the audience. "Sabotage" Emilian cried, when his great experimental marriage failed. The audience failed to grab the thin-thread that served as a plot and many funny situations did not produce the expected laughs. For such amateur productions it would appear wise to present plays of more substance.

Her running mate, Tonya, Mrs. Leo Marks, the superintelligent bride, is also represented with tongue in cheek. These girls have married two young Communists, Leo Marks and Philip Lieberman. It soon becomes evident that the marriage knot has been tied backwards. A divorce and another marriage shuffles the four people into a more satisfactorily family arrangement.

Others in the cast include Melvin Chernick, as Saska; Sydney Cohen, as Rabinovitch; and Simeon Kingsley as Boris Novikov. The entire production was under the supervision of Hazel Brown Goodwin.

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A Decade of Jewish Culture

Temple Emanuel, this week-end, is celebrating ten years of Jewish Adult Education.

Seven art exhibits were sponsored. Saul Raskin, Boris Schatz and his children, were numbered among those whose works were on display.

And lastly, no less than 31 intensive courses were conducted in Jewish History, ethics, bible education and other subjects.

This record deserves celebration. And Temple Emanuel, in this chaotic era of suggested assimilation and non-Jewish propaganda, can well be proud of its efforts to spread the seed of Jewish culture.

Toscanini Sails for Italy; Under Constant Military Guard

Haifa—Arturo Toscanini, world famous symphony conductor, and his wife were to sail for Italy from Haifa this week, after having been under constant military guard during the three weeks he has been here.

Mr. Toscanini came here to conduct a series of concerts in Haifa, Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. The concerts were declared by music lovers to be the greatest treats this part of the world ever has been privileged to hear. Every performance has been crowded. Audiences, chiefly made up of Jews, have stood for many minutes at the end of each concert to cheer him.

Throughout his stay, however, the bitter atmosphere existing between the Jews and Arabs has been intensified. Every precaution was taken by Palestine authorities to prevent the Arab insurgents from endangering him.

Met at the boat on their arrival, Mr. and Mrs. Toscanini were driven under armed guard to a private home in Tel Aviv, where they were to be guests. The address of this home was not disclosed to the public and newspaper men were not permitted to interview the conductor.

Day and night armed guards patrolled the streets near the house. At the concerts every ticket holder was scrutinized before he was allowed to take his seat.

Mr. Toscanini is expected to spend several weeks in his home in northern Italy before returning to New York in the late summer to rehearse his NBC orchestra for a series of concerts to be broadcast over a National Broadcasting company network.

He has told friends here that despite the danger, he has enjoyed enormously his visit in Palestine, but is eager to get back to "my American orchestra."

Mexico Denies It Persecutes Aliens Says Will Welcome German Refugees

Mexico City—A detailed exposition of Mexico's immigration policy was laid before leaders of the Jewish community by Francisco Trejo, head of the population bureau of the interior, in an unprecedented visit to the headquarters of the Jewish Chamber of Commerce. After Gershon Shapiro, president of the chamber, had read a memorandum reaffirming the Jewish colony's loyalty to Mexico's commercial and industrial development, Trejo replied in a speech in which he made the following points:

"Mexico is not persecuting aliens, but is seeking to regularize their status in accordance with existing laws; the government will welcome refugees from Germany and Austria, but the Mexican Jewish community must undertake to care for them and see that they do not become public charges or go into business; the government looks with disfavor upon the settlement of new immigrants in Mexico City, preferring to have them go into the provincial towns.

Mobsters Wreck Publishing Plant

Philadelphia.—Three tall, thin men, armed with sledges and crow-bars, wrecked the printing plant of the Mansion Gazette, a weekly newspaper.

The mobsters commanded the owner, William Goldberg, and his editor, Theodore F. Prosky, twenty-six, to "stand still and keep your mouths shut."

Victor Roffman thirty-two, a visitor, also was forced to stand by as the sabotage went on.

Sledges smashed a new \$2,000 press Goldberg installed three weeks ago, and then the men went to work on a job-printing press, pry-it apart.

Publisher Goldberg, who said damage would amount to \$1,500, declared the vandalism was the result of an editorial published in the Gazette—which has 5,000 "throw-away" circulation—last Friday.

Nazis Extend "Peace" For Austria's Jews

Vienna—Austria's "Easter peace" was extended until May 30 as anti-Jewish demonstrations increased.

Joseph Buerckel, Nazi leader, was understood to have become alarmed over the mounting anti-Semitism and extended the "peace" because of diminishing troop units. It was reported that other troops were due to return to Germany, leaving behind only a skeleton force. Many Nazi brown shirts left over the week-end.

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

Noted speakers graced the occasion and the Kadimah Choral Society presented a program of Jewish sacred music under the direction of Arthur Einstein. Rabbi Herman H. Rubenowitz of Boston spoke on the subject "A Call to Jewish Culture". Professor C. Emanuel Ekstrom, Director of the Extension Division at Brown University discussed "The Cultural Contributions of Minorities to American Democracy"; and Mrs. Nathan Temkin, present chairman of the Institute welcomed the guests.

NINETY-THREE LECTURES

Dr. Israel M. Goldman, who has directed the Institute reviewed "A Decade of Jewish Culture". He pointed out that Temple Emanu-El was one of the pioneers in Jewish adult education in this country. His report further indicated that during the past ten years no less than ninety-three public lectures were given. These public lectures were divided into fourteen different lecture courses. The themes of these lectures included such subjects as Jewish History, Jewish Literature, Jewish Religion, Jewish Philosophy, Jewish Travel, Jewish Music, and current Jewish problems.

go, twenty-four-year-old Hague opponent recently convicted of swearing falsely to signatures on a primary nominating petition. This, however, was after the Community Center had served notice under date of May 1 that the congregation must move within two months.

The rabbi announced the eviction order to the congregation this week, likening the situation to that of Jews fleeing from a program in another land. It would be impossible, he said, to find a permanent home for the synagogue in two months.

"But, there are friends, Jews and Christians, who will come to our rescue," he said, assuring the 300 members that some meeting place would be found. Last year, after the eviction order, the congregation raised \$60,000 toward construction of a temple, but observers believed the Hague machine had sent out word that "loyal" citizens should not contribute.

Vienna Jews Visit, Pray at Herzl's Grave

Vienna—The grave of Dr. Theodore Herzl, father of modern Zionism, this week became a veritable shrine to which hundreds of Vienna Jews come daily to pray and ask forgiveness for their failure to give generously for the upbuilding of Palestine, instead of waiting to have their fortunes confiscated by the Nazis.
