Buy A Shekel!

When people are threatened by one enemy—the same enemy: When people are exposed to one danger—the same danger: They agree to neglect their differences of opinion for the sake of common action.

They know that if that enemy triumphs, it will make no difference—none, absolutely none—where the individual stood in matters of opinion.

To the Nazi mobs, the difference between an Orthodox Synagogue and a Reform Temple and a B'nai B'rith Lodge is no difference at all.

The present attempt to secure one million Jews in this country to register as Shekel payers will help to test the temper and the common-sense and the common self-preservative instinct of American Jewry. It will show us whether the Jewish people has that minimum instinct for political action which characterizes other peoples. For history has itself rendered utterly vain and empty and meaningless any resistance to the common cause of the Jewish people or any standing aside from that cause.

The British Plan

The new turn which the Palestine Conferences have taken has brought Jews face to face with a crisis unparalleled in the last twenty years of Zionist history. Whatever means the government may use to explain away the suggestions on the future constitution of Palestine communicated to both delegations last week-end, they indicate with grim clarity the substance of what the Government has in mind.

The phraseology of the proposals and the terms in which they have been couched seem to have been carefully chosen to give the Jews as little offence as possible. But they cannot hide the concrete intentions which underly this diplomatic ambiguity.

Let us be quite frank. The essence of the proposals is that an independent Arab State is ultimately envisaged, and that all the preliminary steps to be taken both during the interim period before an autumn Round Table Conference, and during the transition period pending the establishment of a State, are all destined to pave the way for Arab independence in Palestine.

It was only to be expected that the Jewish Delegation, led by Dr. Chaim Weizman, should have adopted the only course possible and declared to the Government that they were unable to find in the proposals any basis for further discussion.

One would have thought it inconceivable that at this moment in the world's history, and particularly at this time when Jews in increasing numbers are being trampled under foot by totalitarian anti-Semitism, the British Government, representing one of the three major democracies in the world, should even consider a policy which involves a complete sacrifice of Jewry's one bright hope.

It is a grim commentary on current world history that Great Britain should be contemplating this very step.

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Independent Palestine State With Jews As Minority Scored by Zionists Leaders

Relief Units Care for 400 Italian Refugees

Order 5,000 Jews to Leave

PARIS. — More than 400 Jews were driven across the Italian border at bayonet point were lodged in Nice cared for with the aid of American-Jewish relief funds, while hundreds more roamed the no-man's land hills begging at frontier stations for admission to France.

Two hundred were at Vintimille. Several dozens overpowered a small French guard and reached a bridge in the no-mans land near Menton, but had not yet been admitted to Menton.

The Jewish Relief Committee at Nice denied Paris reports that 6,000 of the expelled Jews were in the hills.

More than 5,000 foreign Jews, including 506 children of school age had been ordered to leave Italy by March 2.

The 400 refugees at Nice included a large number of women and children, many of them wounded by the bayonets of Italian soldiers.

Blast at Nazis Aids Roosevelt's Popularity

NEW YORK. — The blunt denunciation of Nazi treatment of minorities by President Roosevelt and Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles has served as a factor in an upturn of the President's personal popularity in the presidential index of the American Institute of Public Opinion.

The poll shows that 58 per cent of the voters approve President Roosevelt today, compared with 55 and a half per cent in December—a rise of 2 and one half per cent in a month.

Would Change Laws To Eradicate "Isms"

PITTSBURGH. — Changes in existing laws so that those "who preach alien philosophies would not have the right to attempt to destroy freedom of America" were advocated here at a large American Legion rally in Soldiers' Memorial Hall by National Commander Stephen F. Chadwick.

"America," he declared, "does not believe in a movement where men go around in monkey suits with hands raised in salutes, preaching hatred and asking individuals to surrender their rights and liberties for the security of dictatorship."

Defeat of Anti-Jewish Bill Seen

LONDON. — The South African Parliament is now occupied with the anti-Jewish Bill introduced by the Nationalist member, Mr. Louw, which prohibits the entry of Jews into South Africa. The debate on the Bill has aroused immense interest in the country, although the defeat of the measure is regarded as certain.

Hear London Has Decided On Independent Arab State

LONDON. — The British Government was reliably reported to have decided to place Jews in a permanent minority status in Palestine.

Well informed quarters said the plan provided for:

1. Creation of an independent Palestine state linked by treaty with Britain, and with the Arabs in a majority of three to one;
2. Limitation of Jewish immigration to 15,000 a year for five years;
3. Certain safeguards for the Jewish minority;
4. Maintenance of the British mandate for a "transitional period";
5. Creation of an executive council composed of four Arabs and two Jews to help rule during the interim period, with the British high commissioner having veto power.

It was understood that the plan intended that all Jews and Arabs cooperate in governing the country; elections for an advisory council, to rule the country eventually, would be held in two years.

Author Stresses Importance Of United States as Asylum

Center Speaker



Congressman Isaac Siegel of New York, lawyer, former special deputy attorney general, widely known Jewish institutional worker and philanthropist, will be the principal speaker at the campaign dinner of the Jewish Community Center Building Fund in the Narragansett Hotel on Monday evening.

Admitting refugee children and elderly persons might help rather than injure the employment situation in the United States, Louis Adamic, author of "My America," asserts in "America and the Refugee," published recently by the Public Affairs Committee of New York City.

Mr. Adamic's pamphlet is a concise, objective summary of the refugee question as it affects the United States. The bringing in of consumers with purchasing power should aid somewhat in disposing of our food surplus and thus help the American farmer, Mr. Adamic points out. "Many of the groups will have to be supported in any case by American money," he states, "either in Germany or elsewhere. It might better be spent here where American business can reap the profit."

The author concedes that there are real dangers in bringing in large numbers of adult refugees in view of the serious social and economic problems existing in this country, warning that a letting down of the bars may aggravate anti-foreign and anti-Jewish sentiment and activities. But "we cannot overemphasize," Mr. Adamic adds, "the importance of continuing this country's tradition as an asylum. If it is given up, something important and precious will be lost in America. That loss will subtly—and unfavorably—influence the personal lives of Americans and most phases of American life."

Will Never Receive Cooperation, Consent Hitler "Shadow" Blamed for Plan

NEW YORK. — Great Britain will never be able to create an independent Palestine State without the consent and cooperation of the Jews in Palestine, and she cannot get this cooperation or consent if the Jews are to be reduced to the status of a permanent minority in such a State, according to Dr. Stephen S. Wise, who returned last week from the London Conference on Palestine.

Dr. Wise spoke at a public reception at the Hotel Roosevelt on Thursday, where nearly 2,000 officers and members of the various Zionist parties were assembled to meet him.

Rabbi Wise declared that Britain's attitude on the Palestine situation was due to the presence "in the shadow" of Hitler, Mussolini and the Mufti. "But," he declared, "if the half-million Jews now living in Palestine say 'No, we will not cooperate in the making of an independent Palestine State,' there will be no independent Palestine."

Rabbi Wise reiterated the thought that government comes

Charges Britain Betrayed Jews

NEW YORK. — Rabbi Stephen S. Wise charged this week that the British have found it "expedient and convenient" to let the Arab revolt in Palestine continue and asserted that "if the Balfour mandate had been written in German or Italian, it could not have been more definitely repudiated by the English."

A delegate to the recent Palestine conference in London, said that the British suggestions for a "solution" of the Palestine problem, rejected by the Jewish delegates, "would mean the end of the Jewish national home."

"They betrayed us to secure themselves against the bombing of Paris and London by Hitler and Mussolini," he declared.

WASHINGTON. — Rep. Martin Dies, chairman of the revived House Committee investigating un-American activities, announced that the people "may rest assured that such disgraceful demonstrations as the recent Bund meeting in New York is being fully and completely investigated."

"The German-American Bund, the Silver Shirts and every Nazi and Fascist organization are being investigated by a special group of trained men."

Asserts Only War Can Halt Fascism

NEW YORK. — Addressing 600 members of the New York City Association of English Teachers at their annual conference here, Vincent Sheean, author and journalist declared that there can be no defeat of Fascist forces in the world until the democracies are ready to fight with arms, rather than words.

Sheean, who returned recently from Europe, expressed the belief that Zionism was "a professional organization to maintain Jewish separateness and is no solution to the Jewish problem at all."

He declared that only war can stop Fascism and that when war comes America will throw her support to the democracies.

Non-Citizen Votes For Thirty Years

ROCHESTER. — Jacob Tack, 70, a gardener, who testified he had voted since 1908 in the belief a letter from then Governor Charles Evans Hughes entitled him to do so, is finally a citizen.

Mr. Tack, a native of the Netherlands, told of the letter in Supreme Court as he was admitted to citizenship yesterday. The letter, he said, was burned many years ago, but he did not discover he was not a citizen until recently.

Biography of Albert Einstein Written By Science Editor

A tribute to a modern saint is to be found in "Albert Einstein," a biography published this week (Funk and Wagnalls) by H. Gordon Garbedian, one of the science editors of the New York Times.

One of the most extraordinary public reactions of the century has been the acclaim accorded to Albert Einstein. People who had no knowledge of astronomy or physics, even those who had flunked high school algebra flocked in thousands to pay tribute to this gentle little man. Although his mind deals with matters far beyond common ken, stenographers and shipping clerks have honored the shy Jewish saint.

Einstein is seen first in the book as a small boy, sick in bed, but utterly fascinated by a gift his father had brought him: a toy compass. As he grew up he developed into a mathematical genius, apparently somewhat at the expense of other factors in his early education. He didn't much care for language, literature or art, but his ability with mathematical things

baffled and disturbed his teachers. Honors piled upon him, unwilling as he was to accept their penalty. All he wanted was privacy for his creative thought, with no other instrument than a pen and an ample supply of paper.

Einstein's own explanation of his theory is simple. Said he: "When a man sits with a pretty girl for an hour, it seems like a minute. But let him sit on a hot stove for a minute—and it's longer than an hour! That's Relativity!"

After all the persecutions in Nazi Germany, including a price being placed upon his head, Einstein finally left that tortured land to live in this country. At Princeton he met his new colleagues under a fireplace inscription from one of his own speeches. It reads: "God is clever, but not dishonest." There, evidently he will stay until he dies—a sweet and gentle soul. Great mathematician though he is, perhaps he is even a greater humanitarian.

Citizenship Prized More Than Fortune

KALAMAZOO, Mich. — A \$26-a-week paper mill worker here would rather keep his job than forfeit his U. S. citizenship and claim a fortune awaiting him in his native Italy.

He has renounced the fortune, saying: "My American citizenship means more to me than any other possession. I would rather be a mill worker here than king of Italy."

The worker is Frank Rusoti, 42, who came to the United States when he was nine. His father died in Italy last month and left his estate to Rusoti. To claim it, however, he must return to his native country.

Rusoti doesn't know the size of the fortune, because Italian officials have refused to divulge the amount.

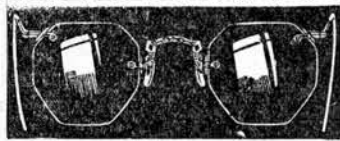

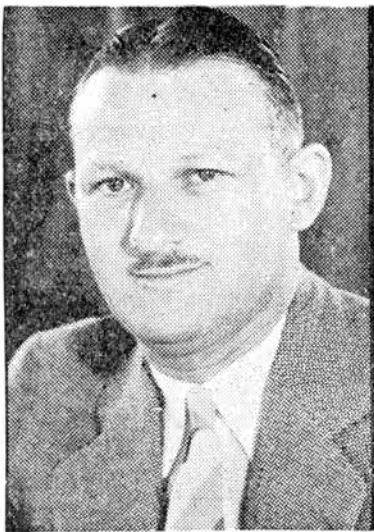

PHILADELPHIA. — Communists paid "agitators" \$3 a day to pose as students of Columbia University, William F. Russell, dean of Teachers College, Columbia University, declared recently in a speech here.

He said they "would sit in the front rows of classes, get into student councils, and, the first thing we knew, they were holding meetings on peace, the Spanish situation and labor problems."

The technique of the Communists in the United States, the Dean said, is to "organize special groups into class-conscious units" and then to "radicalize those groups to make them militant instruments in the class struggle."

Milton C. Sapinsley, chairman of the Jewish Community Center's Building Fund Campaign, has just released the following architect's estimates of the cost of modernizing and enlarging the present structures:

Erection of a new auditorium on land now owned by the Center, the building to be complete with permanent stage, scenery, lighting equipment, dressing rooms, etc., and capable of accommodating 600 persons at lectures, concerts and dramatic presentations.....

\$25,000.

Remodelling and enlarging present gymnasium to permit of the introduction of indoor baseball, handball courts, volley ball, badminton, indoor tennis and other sports, and the installation of separate locker and shower rooms with the necessary sanitizing equipment.....

Reich Creates 'Work-Ghetto' As It Rescinds Ban on Jobs

BERLIN. — A shortage of workers in Germany has brought about a new Nazi order that recommends the employment of Jews in public and private businesses and reverses a long line of earlier decrees curtailing the business, professional and public life of Jews.

Dr. Friedrich Syrup, president of the Unemployment Insurance Board and member of the Labor Department, issued the order "with the special approval of Field Marshal Goering as chief of the four-year plan."

"The state is not interested in letting the working capacity of able-bodied unemployed Jews lie idle and leave them to be supported by charity," the statement read.

"It is therefore recommended to give such Jews employment, thereby freeing German citizens for undertaking urgent work for the state.

"Jews may be employed in public and private businesses, building construction, land improvement, etc.

"The Jews affected may be German subjects or stateless Jews. They are to be set to work separately from regular staffs."

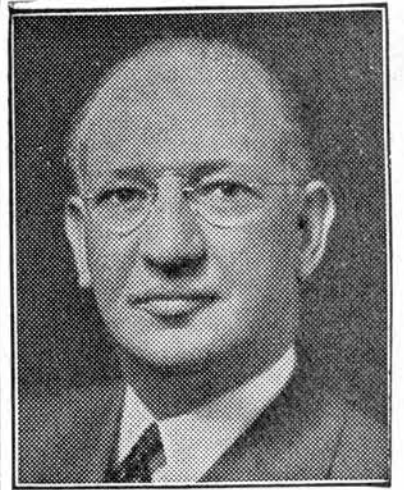

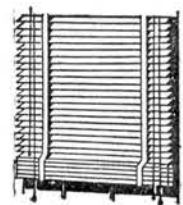

Democracy Here

BY ROBERT A. JACKSON

It is but just that democracy should afford a shelter to the Jew who early furnished the vision of democracy to the world. In Israel we find the first authentic evidence of a social consciousness among the leaders of organized society. It was here that the ethics of democracy were the warp and woof of the meditations of men. One can scarcely discuss modern problems of democracy without borrowing the language as well as the thought embodied in such precepts as "A man cannot serve two masters," or in the question "Am I my brother's keeper?"

Democracy in America is under a heavy debt to individual Jews. There are those who think of the Jew only as a man of trade and who picture him as concerned only with the accumulation of wealth. That is a false picture in America, at least. Our great banking houses are guided by Yankee thrift and no Jew could better the commercial instruction of the Yankee. In the financial and industrial corporations there are relatively few Jewish directors.

The predominant contribution of the Jew to American life is intellectual. In the law it is doubtful if the contributions of any man of our times may be measured against those of Mr. Justice Brandeis or the late Mr. Justice Cardozo. Given to the nation, against an incredibly bitter opposition, by Woodrow Wilson, Mr. Justice Brandeis with his associate, Mr. Justice Holmes, almost alone sustained the spiritual courage and the intellectual integrity of liberal political thought in America during the dark and futile days from 1920 to 1932.

That is Religion

The other day I read a speech delivered some years ago by Justice Cardozo, which ranks among the many legacies he left to thoughtful men. "The submergence of self in the pursuit of an ideal," he said, "the readiness to spend oneself without measure, prodigally, almost ecstatically, for something intuitively apprehended as great and noble, spend oneself one knows not why,—some of us like to believe that this is what religion means."

The pledge that in Palestine the indestructible Jewish people would find a national home after eighteen centuries of exile, dispersion, and suffering is a challenge to the Christian conscience. What American would not rejoice to see the reunited Children of Israel resurrect the life and culture of the people of the Bible in that little land which has shaped our faith? Who can fail in sympathy with exiles who turn, as their fathers turned of old, to Palestine as a Promised Land, where bondage will be broken, where they may find tranquillity of spirit. This masterful stock after its long Odyssey of dispersion and suffering has yet the astonishing tenacity of spirit that the Egyptian taskmasters found in the Children of Israel of whom Exodus tells us "the more they afflicted them, the more they multiplied and grew."

I can easily understand the anxiety and distress of Jews everywhere, as in land after land, their people are subjected to a policy of afflictions which we had supposed had long been renounced by all civilized governments.

Who Should Seek Deliverance?

Yet I believe that there should be a stirring of Christian anxiety even deeper than Jewish anxiety. A terrible debt is being written in the great book of history against the non-Jewish world, and those who have faith in ultimate justice fear that it is the Gentile rather than the Jew who should seek deliverance.

Is it the non-Jewish world that is earning for itself a day of retribution and leaving its children a legacy of shame. To earnestly carry out the promise and help to fulfil the hope of a Jewish National Home in Palestine might be a powerful help on the Day of Atonement.

The Jew, as of old, is again on the rack of persecution. But the farseeing know that persecution, like fire, purifies the spirit. Among a persecuted people, noble forces come to the top and bloom in a finer culture and a nobler life. They forgive old grudges; they forget the feuds of more prosperous days; they draw together and achieve a solidarity in sacrifice. Smarting under a sense of wrong, they hand on a legacy of nobility and courage and spiritual exaltation which comes only of suffering.

What a contrast does the camp

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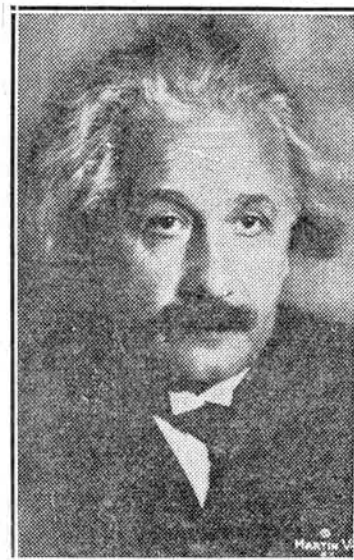

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Jewish Stores Bombed In Prague; Seek Kosher Meat

PRAGUE. — The anti-Semites have thrown a bomb into a big Jewish store in Prague. The bomb exploded and broke all the windows in the shop.

The Jewish Communal Board in Prague has adopted measures to secure an adequate supply of kosher meat for the 70,000 Jews in the city in view of the action of the Municipality in forbidding the slaughter of animals according to Jewish rites in the city abattoirs. The alarming feature of the situation is, however, the move of the anti-Semites in several provincial municipalities, too, to ban Shechita in their towns. Deputy Kundt, the leader of

the German minority in Czechoslovakia has, on his return from Berlin, presented a stern note to the Czechoslovakian Government, demanding autonomy for the German minority and the enactment of anti-Jewish measures. The Premier, M. Beran, is strongly opposed to the demands of Deputy Kundt, but the Minister of the Interior, M. Krejci, and the Foreign Minister, M. Chvalkowsky, are advising the Cabinet to yield to them.

of the persecutor present! Quarrels always arise over plunder; spoils call out only greed and snarls. Fear and suspicion take the place of trust of friends, for none knows who next will be prescribed. Recrimination, feuds, and spiritual degradation come of persecuting the helpless.

Again on the Anvil

Perhaps only the seers and poets know how the laws of compensation will adjust the balance. Perhaps only the historian can bear witness to the exaltation of a people by suffering and to the spiritual disintegration of oppressors and wrong doers. Perhaps only philosophers appreciate that to be innocent, long-suffering and poor may store up greater treasures than to be rich, hard and unbelieving.

But I urge the leaders of the Jewish people to summon the wisdom of ages and lift up their hearts. The Jewish race is again on the anvil, taking that terrible hammering which has made the toughness of character that has so influenced mankind.

It seems only yesterday that we thought mankind to be achieving a democratic society which would respect the personality of every individual and receive him upon his worth alone. To the Jewish people this world of hope and opportunity and good will must seem forever to have passed away. If they but keep their spiritual integrity, there will yet be help. As Kipling put it: "Our world has passed away In wantonness o'erthrown. There is nothing left today But steel and fire and stone!"

See Enslavement for 5,000 Danzig Jews

WARSAW. — The tragedy of the 5,000 Jews in the Nazi-dominated Free City of Danzig has entered a new phase with the decision of the senate to utilize the Jews as cheap labor for construction of a motor road between Danzig and East Prussia and to intern them with their families in concentration camps.

The former project of shipping all the Jews to unknown destinations seems to have been abandoned after the date for the shipment of the first transport of 1,000 Jews had several times been postponed "for external reasons."

Meanwhile, those who had been marked for evacuation have been completely ruined. Their property has been sold to "Aryans" for a song and the proceeds confiscated to "cover the expenses of emigration."

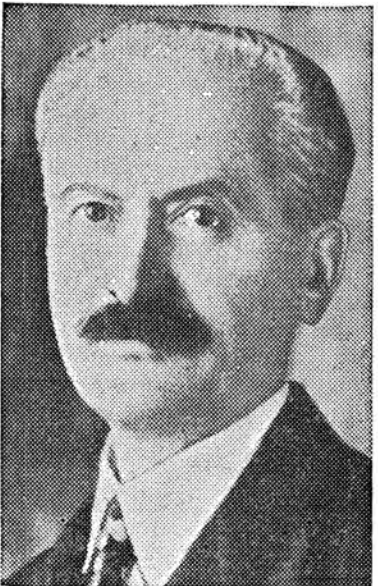
He described the territory, discovered in a four months' tour, as a group of towns in which the Indian inhabitants lived harmoniously, without warfare or internal strife.

Refugee Signed Under Duress

BOSTON. — A bill was brought in the Equity Court at Boston last week on behalf of Sigfried Weil, a refugee from Germany, to enjoin payment of \$3,900.00 by the Old Colony Trust Company, to a German bank.

Mr. Weil alleges in his bill that while a prisoner in a concentration camp in Germany, he was forced under the threat of immediate death to sign an agreement turning over his interest in the estate of his uncle, Louis Weil, formerly of Boston, to the Dresdner Bank, a branch of the German Reichsbank.

Subsequent to the execution of assignment, Mr. Weil escaped from Germany to Palestine and is now seeking to have the assignment declared void. Arthur T. Wasserman, attorney for Mr. Weil, presented the bill to Judge Pinanski who after being satisfied as to the fact, entered a temporary restraining order enjoining the Old Colony Trust Company from paying over to the German bank the money due Mr. Weil from his uncle's estate pending the further order of the court. A hearing will be held later in the month.

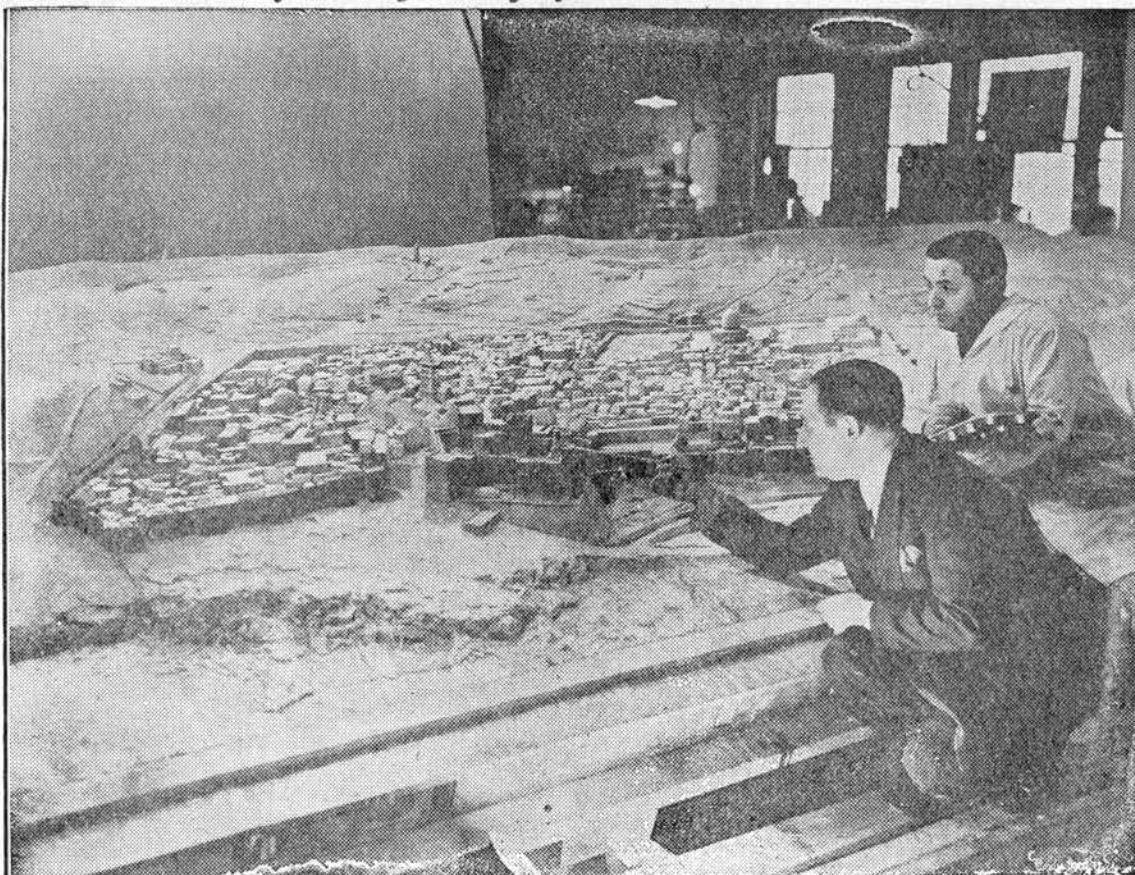

Anti-Semitism Only a Phase Of Fascism, Says Dr. Wise

NEW YORK. — "Europe has come at last to see that anti-Semitism is definitely a phase of Fascism," Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress stated upon his return from Europe.

Dr. Wise, who was accompanied by Mrs. Wise, president of the Women's Division of the American Jewish Congress, spent six weeks abroad conferring on Palestine and other major problems confronting Jewish life.

In a statement issued upon his return, Dr. Wise counseled "resistance to Fascism and defense of democracy." In this connection, he declared:

"One thing I may say at this time. For the first time in a European land, I felt as I had never before, that there is at last an understanding of the truth anti-Semitism is nothing more than a phase or facet of Fascism. There is no fortuitous relation between Nazism and anti-Semitism. There are one and the same thing, Nazism utilizing anti-Semitism as one of its most easily accessible and widely usable weapons.

"If we should, Heaven forbid, suffer defeat in Palestine, it will be because Fascism, using the Arabs as its allies and the British as its victims, has triumphed in the Near East.

"One struggle all along the line: Resist Fascism! Uphold Democracy! Our fate is linked with that of the democratic ideal. We have no choices, but what is more, we would have none. We defend democracy not solely nor chiefly that we may live, but that democracy may live under which alone

Gandhi Suggests Arab Appeasement

Overtures to Arabs Advised

NEW YORK. — Mahandas K. Gandhi all but urged a mass-hunger strike by Jews still intent on resisting Nazi rule in Germany, in the March issue of Jewish Frontier.

"If I were a Jew and were born in Germany," the Indian minority leader wrote, "I would claim Germany as my home, even as the tallest Gentile German may, and challenge him to shoot me or cast me in the dungeon; I would refuse to be expelled or to submit to discriminating treatment."

Disagrees on Palestine

While his "sympathies are entirely with the Jews on the German question," Gandhi is not entirely in accord with their position in Palestine, anent which he said his compassion "cannot blind me to the requirements of justice."

"They can settle in Palestine," he predicted, "only with the good will of the Arabs. They should seek to convert the Arab heart. There are hundreds of ways of reasoning, if they will discard the help of the British bayonet."

Plan to Popularize Products in U. S.

JERUSALEM. — A plan to increase sale of Palestinian products in the United States was outlined at a conference of the Jewish Agency, Zionist fund raising bodies and various economic organizations.

Dr. Emil Schmorak, head of the Jewish Agency's Trade Department, said it was intended to (1) establish an information bureau at the Palestine Pavilion of the New York World's Fair. (2) found a "Tozereth Haaretz" (Palestine products) organization in the United States, and (3) establish a permanent traveling exhibition of Palestinian goods in the United States.

MOSCOW. — Japan has decided to get tough in their quarrel with Russia over fishing rights. The Japanese envoy to Moscow has informed Litvinov that Tokio will give armed protection to fishermen in Soviet waters.

Dual Allegiance Of Aliens Hit

NEW YORK. — Dual allegiance of alien groups who enjoy hospitality of American countries and still have political rights in their homelands was assailed here this week by delegates to the Pan-American congress.

Buried Treasure

CHICAGO. — A buried treasure (counterfeit) was found this week on a Chicago golf course by secret service men investigating bogus money ring. The location of the treasure was traced from a map that Captain Kidd would have been proud of.

Mayor Demands Passage of Bill

Mayor John F. Collins this week asked for immediate passage of his administrative code bill, now before the General Assembly, without change. The bill carries no provision for a referendum.

The bill in its present form which concentrates appointive powers, without City Council confirmation, in the hands of the Mayor, is not acceptable to the Governor. The latter also criticized the bill because it contained no provision for referendum.

Petition Denied

License for the public showing of the motion picture, "Professor Mamlock" was denied this week by members of the Providence

Bureau of Police and Fire. The application was presented by the Avon Theatre and the Amkino Corporation. The board had previously banned the picture after a private pre-view.

Plan 30 Buildings For Rocky Point

Thirty new buildings are planned for Rocky Point which was demolished during the September hurricane, a spokesman for the amusement park said this week. It was hoped that the resort would be completely re-built by mid-summer. Among the contemplated structures are a new shore dinner hall, a skating rink, dance hall, bowling alleys and Rock Cafe.

To Probe Alleged Election Frauds

Governor William H. Vanderbilt this week signed a bill setting up the House and Senate elections committee as a virtual grand jury to probe into alleged election frauds throughout the State last November.

New Drug Aids Cure of Pneumonia

A new drug, sulphyridine, has been used for treatment of pneumonia and meningitis with "encouraging results," Dr. Dennet L. Richardson, superintendent, revealed this week. Although he assumed an optimistic viewpoint Dr. Richardson said the drug was still in the experimental stage and there is no evidence yet that it will end pneumonia deaths.

Ask Tax Relief for Idle Mill Owners

Tax relief to owners of idle mill or manufacturing property, as recommended in 1935 by a special commission created by the General Assembly, is provided in a bill which Senator Charles T. Algren, East Greenwich, the Republican leader, introduced in the Senate this week.

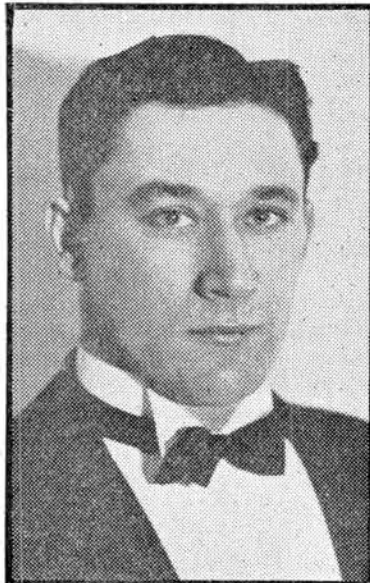
It would allow city and town councils, with approval of the State Tax Administrator, to exempt from taxation, in whole or in part, mill property which has been idle for at least a year prior to the period of exemption. The exemption could be made for the period of one year with the city and town councils having the right to extend it if they so desire.

The bill contains the condition, however, that the exemption shall be granted only when the owner of the property agrees in writing not to tear it down during the period of exemption nor to remove machinery.

Nazis Train Youth for Prospective Colonial Empire

BERLIN. — Germany is training hundreds of young men and women to be colonists planters and doctors in a Nazi colonial empire that does not exist.

The elaborate preparations have been undertaken as a sign of confidence that eventually Germany's pre-war colonies will be restored by Great Britain and France.

Physicians also are undergoing special training at the Hamburg Institute for Nautical and Tropical Medicine.

At Rensburg in Holstein there is a colonial school for young women. Its course of study, extend-

ing over a year takes in all phases of an agriculture, self-sufficient household—cooking, interior decoration, baking, slaughtering, fruit growing, sewing, first aid tropical hygiene and care of children.

Race Theory Stressed

The young women are intensively schooled in the National Socialist ideology, with emphasis on race theory and genetics.

Tuition and other expenses are small, and entrance requirements not too stringent. Strict disciplinary conditions obtain at all times.

A similar school for young men from seventeen to twenty-six is located at Witzenhausen an de Werra. Here all phases of colonial problems are taught over a period of three years.

Young men and women for these schools are chosen with an eye to their physical and genetical fitness.

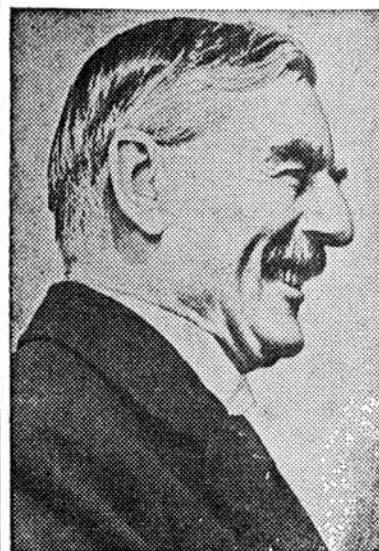
John Spivak Talks Here March 29th

AJC Plans Pan-American Boycott

Nazi Penetration In S. America Surveyed Advocate Curb Of Nazi Method

NEW YORK. — The Joint Boycott Council, national coordinating agency for anti-Nazi Boycott activity in this country, this week released a report on German and American trade in Latin America. At the same time Dr. Tanenbaum, Chairman of the Council, announced plans for the formation of a Pan-American Boycott committee to extend the German Boycott into South and Central American countries.

Referring to twenty Latin American countries, the Council's survey shows that the United States is the largest purchaser of their goods, having disposed of 30.4% of their total exports during 1937, while Germany's share of these exports amounted to only 8.9%.

Dr. Tanenbaum's statement follows:

"The fight of democracy against Nazi tyranny, while worldwide, has for the United States a most vital significance and must be pursued with all the means at our disposal to protect not only our trade but our homes and our people from the nightmare of Nazi domination. What has happened in Mexico is a warning of what may come in other countries. The little 'Sudeten Germanies' in Latin American countries constitute a direct menace to our peace and safety. They are the advance guard of Hitler for any contemplated action against the United States. They must be curbed not only through trade but also through efficient means of counter-propaganda and through enlisting the sympathies and understanding of the populations of these countries. The Joint Boycott Council is now organizing its forces in Latin America for a Pan-American Anti-Nazi Boycott to drive Hitler and his henchmen out of the Americas into the wilds of his own jungle kingdom. There is no place for Hitler on the American Hemisphere."

Crack Nazi Propagandist Here to Spread Discontent

SAN FRANCISCO. — Captain Fritz Weidemann, who recently arrived in San Francisco where he will direct the German Consulate, is in reality a Nazi propaganda agent charged with the task of fomenting Nazism.

Weidemann, who held the rank of Brigadier in the Automobile Corps of the National Socialist Military Organization and is also the personal Adjutant of Herr Hitler was ordered among other things to "use any and all means" to stir up opposition to President Roosevelt. He was told to reorganize the German press services in the United States to fa-

cilitate wider and more effective distribution of Nazi news releases. He is to offer his services to those South American countries which are regarded as having pro-German sympathies.

According to the same source, Weidemann spent a week in Berlin where he was given "training" in Nazi's latest propaganda methods. He conferred with the Ministry of Propaganda officials and the Gestapo leaders. He is regarded as a militarist and is an intimate of Goerring.

Coincidental with Weidemann's work here, the Propaganda Department in Germany will em-

phasize in German newspapers the "instability" of U. S. finances and economy and this country's "inability" to aid the democracies.

only from the consent of the governed when he drew a parallel between the present situation and that existing in the American colonies 160 years ago when Britain enacted stamp laws to tax the colonial pioneers. These laws, he said, could not be enforced, because the colonists did not want them enforced, and the independence of America resulted.

"I think England understands this situation," he declared, but he added that Great Britain's position was a most difficult one with the shadow of war hovering constantly over the land. "I may not like what His Majesty's Governments may decide to do with Palestine, yet at the same time I cannot forget that tomorrow—or the next day—or the next—England, as the World's greatest democracy, may be called upon to stand in the trenches as the defender of all that is democratic in the world."

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
