

## Poison In The Melting Pot

James True has been vying with Nazi propagandists in the effort to arouse the American public against incoming refugees from countries dominated by Hitler. No lie is too brazen for use in this campaign.

Even when True defends himself against Christian criticism, he cannot restrain his un-Christian animus.

Recently he replied to the criticism of the Christian Science Monitor in part as follows:

"The writer is a Protestant whose convictions are dedicated to the principles laid down and demonstrated by Jesus Christ. This organization is pro-Christian, pro-American and pro-Truth. We have reported that the magnificent effort of Father Coughlin and certain Catholic groups constitute the only effective organized Christian resistance in this country to the subversive activities of Communism and the domination of international Jewry. We have published facts and corrected propaganda lies concerning the Nazi and Fascist Governments. We have given credit where credit is due, which we consider essential for any organization professing to be pro-Christian, pro-American and pro-Truth."

This man who presents himself as a Christian and an American, as well as a "seeker after truth," continues to disseminate sheets reeking with hatred of his fellowmen and filled with falsehood. Cold-bloodedly he awaits the day when he may rise to power in a fascist America, supported by battalions wielding "kike-killers." While his financial backing does not permit him to issue the well-printed and illustrated literature published by Coughlin and Pelley, he yields to no man in the intensity of his hate-propaganda.

## All's Not Fair At The World's Fair

All roads lead to the World's Fair. If you purchase an admission ticket, you can get in to see the progressive "World of Tomorrow." The ticket agents at the gates will admit you without regard to race, creed or color. But if you are a Jew or a Negro, trying to get a job as a hostess, receptionist, stenographer, or porter at the Fair Grounds, you are out of luck. You are confronted with a barrier that is as high as the Trylon and as all-around-the-mulberry-bush as the Perisphere.

Public denials by Mr. Grover Whalen of discriminatory employment practices are contrary to the facts that have come to our attention. Is it not a fact that World's Fair exhibits and private employment agencies have advertised that only those of "Christian appearance" or of a distinct "Nordic type" need apply?

Regardless of the protestations of the World's Fair Corporation, it must answer to the public for having permitted a vicious, un-American practice to sully the reputation of the "World of Tomorrow," not to speak of the "World of Today."—Equality.

## Budapest Man Sells Conversions

BUDAPEST. — A fantastic confidence game in which a pseudo-bishop furnished Jews with certificates of conversion for prices ranging from 50 to 200 pengoes (about \$10 to \$40) was revealed here. Police arrested Etienne Nemeth, who had allegedly installed a false altar in his room, where he practiced "mass conversions." Jews possessing his certificates were able to change their religion on the civil register, officials said.

## Nazi Deputies Shy At Photo by Jew

BUDAPEST. — Forty Nazi deputies in green shirts and high boots strode in at the opening of Hungary's parliament this week and took seats—on the extreme left.

The government party marshalled 202 Deputies, but was concerned that many of them, chosen in parliamentary elections May 27, have shown Nazi influence.

Nazi Deputies objected to a Jewish photographer taking their pictures, but were admonished by their leader, Kalman Hubay, that propaganda comes before all."

## Moseley's Target Discourses on Flag

ATLANTA. — Rabbi David Marx, whom Major General Van Horn Moseley, retired, recently quoted as saying the flag was "only a worthless piece of bunting," delivered Atlanta's Flag Day address last Wednesday.

General Moseley made the assertion before the Congressional Committee on un-American Activities. Rabbi Marx said at the time he considered the officer's charge as preposterous and unworthy of a direct answer.

## High School Students Brand Jewish Youth Officials Begin Baltimore Probe

BALTIMORE. — The reported beating and branding of a fourteen-year-old Jewish high school student by pro-Nazi classmates, and a resultant gang fight between friends of the Jewish boy and pro-Nazis on the school grounds, started a sweeping investigation this week by city authorities.

The assault on the Jewish boy occurred last Friday. The fight on the school grounds occurred as classes were being dismissed. Adults were said to have taken part in it. One official said that there was a "junior bund" in operation at the school.

The fighters had dispersed when police arrived at the scene, the Gwynn Falls High School, but they arrested one youth. Another was taken to a hospital suffering from a broken nose.

## Nazis Threaten to War on Jews Throughout Europe

WUERZBURG, Germany. — The Reich's war on Jewry will not be confined to Germany's boundaries but will be pushed "until there is not a single Jew left on European territory," Nazi ideologist Dr. Alfred Rosenberg warned in an address to a German student congress here.

Dr. Rosenberg alleged that "international Jewry has declared war on Germany." He said: "Certain foreign quarters of the same species as those we long ago

mastered within our own country, today think they can order or advise us to be more moderate. But whereas we formerly declared that the Jewish problem would not be resolved in Germany until there was not a Jew left on German territory, we declare openly today that the Jewish question will not be settled in Europe until there is not a single Jew left on European territory."

## Chicago Candidates Win Despite Bias

CHICAGO. — Four Jews were reelected in this week's judicial election on the Democratic-Republican coalition ticket for a six-year term. They are Benjamin P. Epstein, Hugo N. Friend, Hattie N. Fisher and Michael Feinberg. A fifth Jewish candidate, Ulysses S. Schwartz, was elected for two years to fill the unexpired term of a judge who died in office.

Judge Feinberg won despite a campaign against him which involved the racial issue. On election night a sign with the words "Heil Hitler," was put up over the vacant Panorama Theater. It was taken down by the police. A week before a huge swastika flag had been removed from the flag-staff at Bidler Grade School.

JERUSALEM. — The Jewish Flying School located at Kibbutz Afikim, a kibbutz of the Hashomer Hatzair in the Jordan Valley, has received four more training planes in addition to the three which have already been operating for some time.

## Urge Unity Between Jewish-Arab Masses

LONDON. — A call to Jewish and Arab workers and peasants in Palestine to unite to end national hatred between the Jewish and Arab masses was issued by the Independent Labor Party, bearing the signatures of James Maxton and other party leaders, as well as of George Bernard Shaw, Augustus, John, John Leonard Wolf, Sir Peter Chalmers, Mitchell Pritt and other well-known Britain Socialists.

The call urges that, in view of the grave political situation in Palestine, immediate steps be taken for preparation of a united Jewish-Arab Socialist Party by forming a Jewish-Arab alliance of Socialist organizations in Palestine which would be extended throughout the Near and Middle East."

## Ask For Stricter Visa Refugee Control

WASHINGTON. — While three trans-Atlantic ships sought to discharge more than 1,000 refugees at Caribbean ports, it was learned that the Intergovernmental Committee for Refugees in London had requested the Reich to exercise stricter control over their departure. The committee asked Nazi officials not to let refugees leave unless it was certain they would be permitted to land in the country of destination.

# Jewish School Teacher Tells Of Interview With Moseley

**Dies Witness Was Courteous But Had Warped Opinions on Jews**

NEW YORK: — Out of a correspondence, Mrs. Rita Schenkman, an English teacher in a public school in Queens, inadvertently obtained an interview with Major General George Van Horn Moseley, in the hope, Mrs. Schenkman said, "we could blend our minds in a friendly talk and arrive at some understanding."

**Relates Incident**

Well, it was no go. But the history of the attempt, as Mrs. Schenkman disclosed this week, is interesting, revealing further the attitude of the General who recently was a witness before the Dies Committee in Washington.

Some time ago, Mrs. Schenkman said she read in a newspaper a report of a radio address General Moseley made in Philadelphia. She wrote to him as follows:—

I am a Jew. I am a teacher in a New York City School. Please do not cut my throat. Your radio address as reported this morning does practically that. Please read the inclosed address. (By Father Kernan titled, "Is Coughlinism Americanism?") Also, please read Gunther's "Inside Europe," Pierre Van Paassen's "Days of

Our Years," and Lorant's "I Was Hitler's Prisoner." I love America as much as you do and I hate every ism except Americanism."

Mrs. Schenkman had no hope he would answer. "And I had the impudence to suggest the books, in the hope, God willing, he'd read a book," said Mrs. Schenkman.

General Moseley did answer, "Kindly and courteously," said Mrs. Schenkman. He wrote:—"I believe from reading your letter and its inclosure that you and I would agree if we could have an interview." He said he was coming to New York and would stop at the Hotel Pennsylvania. There Mrs. Schenkman phoned him and he fixed a date, for her visit. She kept the appointment.

**Mind Definitely Warped**

"I found him a thorough gentleman, most kind and courteous," said she, "but his mind is definitely warped. I had no success with him. I have been able to take certain people and gently change their minds, adjust them to the fact that Jews cannot be international bankers and Communists at the same time. But his mind is tight.

"He is quite deaf, so I let him do most of the talking. The highlight of his talk was:—"For 2,000 years the Jews have been thrown out of every country, and within ten years they will be thrown out of this country." Then he told me that Jews had attacked him personally. He said he was at a luncheon and everybody had cocktails, and that he and a lady

only had one inch of sherry and afterward 'the Jews accused me of having been drunk at that luncheon.'

**Adamant Inconsistent**

"I found him adamant and inconsistent," said Mrs. Schenkman. He kept saying, 'The Jews have got to come to me, but I will not see them.' It all seemed so terrible, so illogical. After all, America is the last refuge of the Jews, Why should they try to destroy it?"

Mrs. Schenkman admitted that she has been a Christian Scientist for the past twenty-five years. General Moseley said he didn't like Christian Scientists either. 'Christian Jews, they are all the same,' he said.

## Maintains Nazism Defense Mechanism

DETROIT. — Denying that he is anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi, the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin declared, in his weekly broadcast, that he was "well aware of the vicious campaign" accusing him of being an anti-Semite and "a Nazi stooge."

He accused certain Jewish leaders and particularly the General Jewish Council of spreading such "lies," asserting that "Not a single paragraph can be found in any radio speech ever delivered by me in which I have launched a sweeping denouncement of the Jewish people. It is true that I regard Nazism as a defense mechanism against Communism and I have gone on public record in speech and writing against Nazism with its persecution of religion and race."

**THREATEN REBELLION**  
JERUSALEM. — Threat of a Jewish rebellion if Britain carries out proposals to create an Arab-controlled state in Palestine was voiced by Isaac Greunbaum, member of the Jewish Agency Executive, at a Zionist conference. "The Jews," Mr. Greunbaum declared, "will never consent to participate in an Arab Government."

NEW YORK. — Regardless of whatever provisions may be enacted by the Palestine authorities as a result of the MacDonald White Paper, the task of Geulath Ha'aretz, Palestine Land Redemption, will be carried on by the Keren Kayemeth, Manahem Ussishkin, seventy-six-year-old Zionist leader and president of the Zionist General Council, declared in a cable to Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Jewish National Fund in America.

Acknowledging the receipt of \$250,000 remitted to Jerusalem headquarters by the American branch following the publication of the White Paper, Mr. Ussishkin declared that: "We are greatly encouraged by American Jewry's manifestation of solidarity with the Yishuv (Palestine Jewry). The White Paper of the Chamberlain Government cannot frustrate the cause and thwart the determination of a united people."

## Victory in Miami

(Reprinted from Equality Magazine)

On May 2 an extraordinary event took place in Miami. The reverberations of what occurred are still rumbling through the country like thunder. Wherever Negroes live, work and suffer it remains the chief topic of conversation for its like has never been seen nor heard of before in the backward South. Negroes glow with proper pride and say: The Negro at last has asserted his stature and the spell of his "inferiority" and fear has been broken.

It would be an error, however, to consider the event only as a victory for the Negro people. Democracy is not divisible. May 2 represented not only a profound step forward for the Negro people, but a practical victory for all truly sincere believers in democracy as well; at one and the same time it strengthened the cause of race equality and struck a sharp blow at all bigots.

Frederick Douglas, the Moses of the Negro people, made this profound statement. He said: it was not enough that Abraham Lincoln freed the Negro slaves; far more important was it that they free themselves. The years that have passed have borne out the accuracy of this comment, for despite the symbolic meaning of the Emancipation Proclamation the Negroes in the South have benefited very little from their liberation since the Civil War. Economic, social and legal disabilities have bound them into slavery to their white economic masters as securely as in the days when they were chattels. Their rights as Americans and as citizens always have been flagrantly denied them. There are few places in the South where they freely may exercise their right of franchise. The reactionaries and lynchers will not tolerate voting by Negroes.

In many places they appear at the polls on Election Day ostentatiously brandishing guns. Those who are not intimidated in this way are prevented from voting by the infamous "grandfather clause" still in operation in many states. In Miami, for instance, until its repeal by the State Legislature last year, the \$1 poll tax disqualified practically all Negroes from voting because their poverty was so appalling.

In previous elections in Miami less than 50 Negroes ever voted. But with all disqualifications removed this year the Negroes of the city were much excited over the prospect of casting a large vote during the May 2 elections for mayor and two city commissioners.

When the Miami Kleagle of the Ku Klux Klan heard of this his "superior" white blood began to boil and he ordered a general mobilization of the hooded ghouls. The night before election they piled into some fifty auto-

mobiles and invaded the Negro section of the town with blood-curdling yells, threats and obscenities. At every street corner they stopped and placed a large wooden cross. They poured gasoline over it and put fire to it.

The brave knights came well disguised in their melodramatic pillow-cases and shrouds. They also took the precaution of carefully covering their license plates. At every automobile window sat a Klansman ominously displaying to full view an artistically arranged noose. With it came the cheering promise that it was going to be put around the neck of every "nigger" who would dare vote. Alongside one polling place they also strung up a bizarre looking effigy of a man on whose chest they had written in black paint the words: "This Nigger Voted."

Such an incident is very common in the South, but usually when it occurs the Negro population is seized with panic. Men, women, and children rush indoors, hide themselves behind locked doors, put out the lights if it is night time, and desperately try to hush the crying of their terrified children in order not to attract to themselves the fury of the lynch mobs.

But during this witches' Sabbath in Miami the most remarkable thing happened: instead of running away before the Klansmen many of the Negroes remained on the streets and watched the macabre parade in defiant silence.

The Klansmen returned to their homes satisfied that they had "scared the daylight out of those niggers." But what was their incredulity when the following morning they saw long queues of Negroes standing at the polls! There was neither hysteria nor belligerence in their attitude. With the thoughtful determination of all citizens about to do their patriotic duty they quietly



(Continued from page 4) awaited their turn to vote. More than a thousand Negroes cast their free vote that day.

The Klansmen raged, snarled and sneered just like the Big Bad Wolf in the Three Little Pigs but there was nothing that they could do about it. Against individual Negroes it was very easy to administer "lynch" justice for daring to think that they were as good as white men, but against a united Negro people they remained impotent with rage. May it be said to the credit of the Miami city authorities that they rose patriotically to the occasion. The Mayor called out the entire police force to protect the Negro citizens from any molestation at the

### See No Appeal On White Paper Legality Jewish Agency Advised on Issue

LONDON. — The Government sees no basis for an appeal to the World Court on the legality of the immigration restrictions, Colonial Secretary MacDonald told the House of Commons in reply to Geoffrey Mander, Liberal, who had asked what answer had been made to the demand made a month ago by the Jewish Agency for submission of the question for a ruling by the International Court of Justice at The Hague.

Mr. McDonald said that this view had been stressed in a reply sent to the Jewish Agency on the grounds that "Government consider the present restrictions on immigration temporary pending promulgation of its policy, as publicly explained on various occasions, and can add nothing to previous statements. The arguments of the Jewish Agency do not lead them to alter their view."

### Nazis Interpret Adam Eve Story

LONDON: — Why Adam and Eve got chased out of the Garden had nothing to do with an apple, according to Professor Dettweiler, German scholar, writing in the Reich anti-Semitic monthly, Hammer.


It seems that Adam was a Jew and Eve an "Aryan." He seduced her, thus committing the first act of "race pollution." As a result the participants in "this disgraceful sexual crime" were expelled from the "Aryan" paradise. The article is quoted by the Berlin correspondent of the London News-Chronicle.

### Honor Memory Of Julius Rosenwald

NEW YORK. — Because American Negroes, especially those who live in the South, are deeply indebted to the late Julius Rosenwald, "who gave millions of dollars to establish Young Men's Christian Association buildings and rural public schools for members of the Negro race." P. B. Young, editor of the Negro periodical "Journal and Guide," sent a contribution to Sylvan Altschul, chairman of the United Jewish Fund of Norfolk, Va.

Mr. Young said that through this contribution he "wanted to indicate our interest in the broad question of Jewish welfare in the present crisis and to make some expression of our concern and sympathy."

### Italy Adopts New Anti-Semitic Laws Become Effective In Six Months

ROME. — On June 1, the Grand Fascist Council adopted a series of new anti-Jewish measures, providing that legatees who leave the Jewish religion retain their inheritance even if the will has a clause disinheriting the legatee upon conversion. No Jew may change his will or disinherit a son because he has changed his religion.

Another measure deals with Jewish surnames. Non-Jewish citizens who happen to have Jewish surnames are authorized to change them while citizens born of Jewish father and a non-Jewish mother may legally assume the mother's name. It is expected that forthcoming decrees will require that Jews adopt unmistakably Jewish family names.

On June 2, the Senate adopted a law passed by the Grand Fascist Council on April 29 which excludes Jews from the professions. This law is to go into effect after the lapse of six months.
