### What The Jews Want In Palestine

Commons and Lords have both voted approval of Prime Minister Chamberlain's Palestine policy, though by narrower votes of confidence than the present British Government has ever before received. Both houses indorse the plot to appease the Arabs by making Palestine an "independent" Arab-dominated State, leaving the pitiful Jewish colony at the mercy of sworn enemies.

A bit of background might be helpful in understanding why this plan has so shocked world opinion.

(1) The British mandate over Palestine was granted by the fifty-two nations which sat in the Council of the League of Nations. For Britain, by its individual, unilateral action, to seek to end this mandate is illegal. Britain even made a treaty with this country, affirming the mandate and the plan for a Jewish national home. Respect for law requires that the fifty-two nations and the United States should have been notified and asked to frame a new policy.

(2) There are 450,000 Jews and 1,000,000 Arabs in Palestine. The Jews do not seek to dominate Palestine. They do not seek to oust the Arabs. They have spent millions in buying land for Arabs, as they are required to do when they purchase land for themselves. The Zionists would welcome any plan which would give them the bare protection of parity and equal rights with the Arabs.

(3) The Jews do not seek political rule of Palestine. They ask for a national home, not for a nation. By that they mean solely the right to enter and leave and to buy land, under the protection of equal rights. They want to be in Palestine "as of right, and not of sufferance."

These are reasonable aspirations, indorsed by the world. That is why Chamberlain's new action ranks with Munich as an appalling surrender of justice to force.

### After All, Hitler Took Much More

Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German-American Bund, is accused by a Grand Jury of having stolen \$14,548.59 from his own organization.

One of the twelve larceny counts alleges that he pocketed \$8,000 of the funds raised in the famous Madison Square Garden meeting.

We don't, of course, know whether Kuhn is guilty or not. A jury will decide. Kuhn is considered innocent until proved guilty, a quaint custom of our country, which is despised in Kuhn's native Germany.

But if he is found guilty, we do not see that there will be any special cause for Kuhn to hang his head.

After all, what will he have done that is not implicit in the program of his Nazi movement? What will he have done that his Fuehrer, Adolf Hitler, hasn't done on a bigger scale?

Appropriate property not belonging to him? The looted households of the Jews in Germany, the ravaged monasteries and nunneries in Austria, the denuded banks of Czecho-Slovakia all bear witness that is just routine Nazi doctrine.

Will Kuhn have disregarded property rights? But it is Nazi philosophy that property belongs to him who has the power of taking it.

## Honored by Masons

Prof. Harold W. Browning of Rhode Island State College, newly elected Grand Master of the 16,000 Masons in Rhode Island, has appointed Dr. Israel M. Goldman, Rabbi of Temple Emanuel as Associate Grand Chaplain for the Masonic bodies of the State. This is the first time in the 149 year old history of the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island Masons that a Minister of the Jewish Faith has been appointed to this office.

## Dorothy Thompson Wins Gottheil Medal

NEW YORK. — Dorothy Thompson, the writer, received the Richard J. H. Gottheil medal of the Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity at a luncheon attended by trustees of the fraternity at the Harmonie Club.

The medal is awarded annually, on the basis of a poll of Anglo-Jewish editors, for aid to the Jews and democracy. Presentation was made by Harold Riegelman, former executive of the fraternity, who praised Miss Thompson's "instinct for freedom," her "indomitable courage and selfless devotion."

## Polcs Oust Jews From Gov't. Posts

WARSAW. — Voting to oust Jewish employees in municipal positions, the Warsaw Municipal Council with the support of the Camp of National Unity and National Democratic members drew a formal protest from Socialist and Jewish councilors.

A demand for the liquidation of the Jewish hospital and cancellation of subsidies to homes for Jewish children and aged, however, was rejected. Meanwhile violent anti-Jewish disorders occurred at the University in Warsaw where several Jewish students were hurt.

## Passaic Synagogue Must Pay Taxes

TRENTON. — Religious corporations which hold equitable but not legal titles to buildings used for religious purposes are not entitled to exemption from taxation, the State Board of Tax Appeals ruled this week.

As the result of the decision, the trustees of Shomrai Shabbas Shel Cheva B'nai Jacob, Zelda Musiker and Kalman Simon, will be required to pay taxes on the synagogues constructed on the property in Passaic. The property was assessed at \$6,400 for 1937.

## Board Allocates 115 Delegates to Conclave Parties Agree To Single Slate

NEW YORK. — Following the agreement of all parties in the American movement to present a single slate of delegates to the 21st World Zionist Congress which is to convene at Geneva on August 16, the U. S. Central Shekel and Election Board allocated these delegates in the following manner:

This represents an increase of twenty-five delegates over the number of delegates to which the U. S. A. was entitled two years ago, due to the increase in the number of shekel payers. Additional delegates that will accrue through the intensive shekel registration campaign, which is to continue until June 11th on which date the balloting was to take place, will be divided among the parties in the exact proportion as the 115 delegates already distributed.

## \$8,000,000 Sent By Jews Abroad

WASHINGTON. — The Department of Commerce at Washington reports that out of \$40,000,000 in contributions sent abroad by religious, charitable and other institutions in the United States, \$8,000,000 were sent by Jewish groups to Palestine, Poland and Germany.



## N. J. Assembly Bans Foreign Uniforms

TRENTON. — A bill banning the use of foreign government uniforms was approved unanimously by the Assembly after its sponsor had said it was designed to "seal fate of foreign propagandists in our state." Besides forbidding the wearing of military, naval or storm uniforms, the bill makes it unlawful for persons to imitate the drill formations, salutes or symbols of a foreign government.

Assemblyman R. Graham Huntington, of Essex, the sponsor said, "every true American is nauseated by propaganda groups who would introduce into our country the methods employed by governments abroad." The measure makes violators liable to a fine or imprisonment, or both.

## Speakers Denounce "White Paper" Plan Jewish Progress Is Dramatized

NEW YORK. — A hundred thousand visitors witnessed the formal opening of the Jewish Palestine Pavilion, at the World's Fair, where progress of the Jews in rebuilding their homeland is dramatized.

Dr. Albert Einstein read an address in which, though with restraint, he reproved Great Britain for its "white paper" plan to depriving the Jews of Palestinian control.

"In Palestine a handful of people is threatened by the political intrigues of the Powers," he said. "Sheer brutal mob violence would rob it of achievements won at the price of hard work and bitter sacrifice."

A message from Governor Lehman, read by Lieutenant Governor Poletti, said that any repudiation of the obligations recognized in the Palestine mandate would be a "tragic anti-climax."

Mayor LaGuardia was another of the speakers. He paid tribute to Jewish contributions to the advancement of mankind.

Senator William H. King of Utah said that the present British Government threatens to retreat

## Jews in Berlin Get Segregation Edict

BERLIN. — Jews have received orders to prepare to leave Aryan-owned houses and live in Jewish-owned buildings, it was announced this week. At the same time Jews were forbidden to live in nine important areas of the West End.

Jewish quarters regarded the orders as a step toward the establishment of a ghetto although authorities asserted they did not intend to form one.

It was expected that enforcement of the decree would begin June 10.

## Ludwig Honored By French Society

PARIS. — Emil Ludwig, the author and biographer, has been made a member of the French Legion of honor. The author, who was born Emil Ludwig Cohn, gave up his German citizenship in 1932 and became a naturalized Swiss. Ludwig is 50 years old.

He is the author of biographies of Bismarck, Goethe, Napoleon, and President Roosevelt, as well as well as of historical works and essays.

## Vienna Jews Lose Half Their Total

VIENNA. — More than half of Vienna's former Jewish population of 165,000 have emigrated since Anschluss, the Central Jewish Emigration Headquarters announced this week. They were distributed as follows:

North America, 20,677; South America, 6,231; Central America, 2,402; Palestine, 6,194; Europe, 45,172; Asia, 14,848; Africa, 2,560; Australia, 1,498.

## Rabbi Scores Attempts To Muzzle Jewish Pulpit

Rabbi Louis I. Newman of New York this week rebuked over-zealous individuals who recently have made attempts to muzzle freedom of expression in the Hebrew pulpit.

The Rabbi said:

"I trust that many of my colleagues in the Rabbinate will read this word of friendly council and warning. Attempts are being made in these days of tension and crisis to strike directly and indirectly at the freedom of the Jewish spirit. Under the pretense of currying favor with some Gentiles, over-zealous individuals and groups are attempting to get themselves up as censors and inquisitors.

They are going either to the Rabbis or behind their backs to their Boards of Trustees in the endeavour to bring pressure upon them. Instead of seeking to prevent the defamation of Israel at the hands of the Anti-Semites, whom they cannot halt, these petty martinets are turning against Jewish leaders within the Jewish household.

This is an abomination and will prove a boomerang against those who resort to such shabby practices. I urge my colleagues in the Rabbinate to be on guard: It is regrettable that at a time when





## Fair Enough

It is my belief that most American Jews not only have no interest in Palestine but resent the insinuation inherent in the case that they desire some other homeland than the United States. The agitation of the problem in this country, including representations to the American State Department on behalf of the Palestine community by certain prominent Jews who call themselves leaders, puts other American Jews in a false position, and gives undeserved aid and comfort to a band of Hitlerized American terrorists who allege that all Jews withhold devotion to the land of their birth. Men and women who were born in this country and who are utterly loyal to their native land thus are made to suffer suspicion and other penalties for sentiments of which they are innocent.

Regardless of the legal, political and diplomatic facts of the problem, the American people will not sympathize with an effort to create a homeland for those who are already citizens of other countries, including this one.

American Methodists, Baptists and Catholics are content with this as their homeland and, in a simple, direct way, will ask themselves why American Jews should not only want another but call on other nations to guarantee and protect it, instead of fighting out their own problems.

The fact is that comparatively few American Jews are active in this agitation, the vast majority of them being either indifferent to the movement or opposed to it on the ground that it suggests some weakness or division in their own love of the United States.

The so-called Jewish homeland is an artificial creation attempted as the result of a bargain which the British agreed to in violation of another bargain at a time when they would have promised anybody anything to save their lives.

It hasn't worked up to now, and the British are in a terrible sweat as they weasel around in the manner of a country court shyster trying to prove that they promised less than they did. But that is their problem, and the problem of the Arabs and some Jews, but not the problem of the American Jews, except those who voluntarily and formally declare themselves in on it.

If those concerned can work it out, that will be fine, but the American people will not commission their government to take any responsibility for the

fulfillment of a British promise of the protection of any other homeland than this one, always excepting the mysterious and unexplored possibilities of the Monroe Doctrine.

This document commits us to the job of protecting much British and French property on this side of the water, and protecting certain South American countries from their own folly, should they decide to throw in with a new Spanish Fascist empire under General Franco.

The hyphenism of the Nazis is popularly detested and openly rebuked here, but it is just as reasonable to ask the American nation to help the Germans recapture Danzig as it is for certain Jews of American nationality to press the government or people for any official aid for this so-called homeland.

Those Jews who do cherish the idea and the hope of its fulfillment, and want to give their ability and money for it, have a legal right to do so. But there should be some means by which the American who regards this as his only homeland, and resents any suggestion that he wants another, could dissociate himself from the propaganda.

# Kuhn Scores Pres. Roosevelt Says Arrest Is "Persecution"

## Declares Dewey is Ambitious for Presidency and Needs Jewish Vote

GRAFTON, Wis. — Fritz Kuhn, head of the German-American Bund, attacked President Roosevelt and District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey of New York City and said he hoped both would be defeated if they seek the Presidency next year.

He said he believed Roosevelt would seek a third term. He spoke at the dedication of a Bund camp.

After his speech Kuhn left for Chicago. He said he would return to New York soon to make plans for a mass meeting to protest "persecution of the Bund." He was released on bond in New York last Thursday after his arrest on a charge of embezzling \$14,548 from the Bund.

George Froboese, Mid-West director, who accompanied him to the dedication, said the Bund was against the Roosevelt Administration because it "is under the influence of Jews." He said the Bund was opposed to Dewey for similar reasons.

Kuhn did not refer to his arrest during his dedicatory speech. However, he had charged in a speech at Milwaukee that he was being persecuted, because Dewey was ambitious for the Presidency and needed the Jewish vote to be elected.

He denied last night that military drills were conducted at Bund camps and said the purpose of the camps was to provide recreation. He said enemies of the Bund "have accused us of getting money even from Germany to finance the Bund activities."

LOS ANGELES. — Producer Al Rosen announced the signing of Bridget Hitler, former sister-in-law of Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany, to act in "The Mad Dog of Europe." The picture, which is scheduled for early production, deals with the tragedy of Germany under the Hitler regime. Mrs. Hitler will also act in an advisory capacity.

REICH GHETTO

BERLIN. — A new government decree provides for establishment of ghettos in German cities and compels all Jews who "will not or cannot emigrate to live in houses belonging to Jews."

## Zionists to Meet In Geneva, Aug. 16

JERUSALEM. — The Twenty-first Congress of the World Zionist Organization will be held in Geneva on Aug. 16, it was decided at a joint meeting of the Zionist Executive and the Praesidium of the General Council.

June 16 has been set as the final date on which may be bought he shekolim on the basis of which delegates to the Congress are elected. # Dr. Freud's New Book Shows Moses as Egyptian

NEW YORK. — Prof. Sigmund Freud's new book, "Moses and Monotheism," will be published by Alfred A. Knopf on June 19. This is Prof. Freud's first new book in six years. He began it while still a resident of Vienna, and completed at least the first two parts before the annexation in March, 1938, which forced his removal to England. The third and longest part was not finished until some time after his arrival in London.

"In 'Moses and Monotheism,'" Professor Freud deals in some measure with problems of psychoanalysis, but even more with the general question of cultural patterns, especially Jewish culture and religion. He presents the thesis that Moses, the founder of Judaism, was not himself a Jew but an Egyptian, and he holds that this throws light on both the par-

ticular development of Judaism and the age-long relation of Jew and Gentile up to and including the outbreak of anti-Semitism in Nazi Germany today.

Dr. Freud is now 83. His birthday was May 6. His last birthday had founded him in Vienna, where he had lived so long and done his basic work in psychoanalysis.

## Japan Studies Influx Of Jews into China

### Technical Experts To Be Welcomed

SHANGHAI. — Japanese diplomatic and other authorities here are "studying" the question whether the continued influx of Jews from Europe and Shanghai should be permitted unchecked.

More than 9,000 Jews have arrived at Shanghai from what were Austria and Czecho-Slovakia, while advance booking indicates that before the year's end the total may reach 25,000.

"Possibly this influx will conflict with and hamper Japan's economic development of Central China, but possibly the well-known Jewish business ability will assist in the development," said a Japanese Embassy spokesman this evening. "Thus far we have not decided."

The spokesman emphasized that technical experts, chemical workers and some handicraft artisans would be welcomed, but that doubt existed as to the desirability of an influx of traders.

A nominal admission fee will be charged. The public is invited to attend.




