The (Only) Catholic Hero in Germany

Father Coughlin has one distinction.

He is the only Catholic who is a hero to the Nazis.

"The German hero in America for the moment", Otto D. Tolischus, Berlin correspondent of the New York Times, reported in a dispatch, "is the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin."

For a professing Catholic, much less a priest, to be a hero in the Third Reich is a rare honor.

A few selections from cables during the past year may help our readers to understand how strangely unique is the applause accorded Father Coughlin in the Reich:

MUNICH. — Michael Cardinal von Faulhaber, Archbishop of Munich, reading mass at three Munich churches yesterday, asserted that despite Nazi denials, Catholics are being persecuted in Germany.

WASHINGTON. — Complete destruction of the Catholic Church is the aim of the present regime in Germany, the National Catholic Welfare Conference reported to the general meeting of bishops here today.

BERLIN. — The newspaper Angriff today demanded the suppression of the special privileges of the Catholic Church.

MUNICH. — Aroused Nazis today descended on the palace of Michael Cardinal von Faulhaber with bricks and clubs and shattered many windows in the three-story building.

That is the Germany in which Father Charles E. Coughlin is acclaimed as a hero.

Benevolent Attitude

Early this week, Herr Hitler received the special envoy of King Ibn Saud, Khalid Al Hud. In well informed circles, it was understood that Hitler discussed with the Arabian envoy the Near East situation and particularly the Palestine problem, and tried to impress upon him the "benevolent" attitude of the Axis Powers towards the Arab cause.

Says White Paper Is Inconsistent

GENEVA. — Categorical denial that the policy of the Chamberlain White Paper is in any way consistent with the Mandate for Palestine, as claimed by British Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald in his defense of the new British policy before the Permanent Mandates Commission, was voiced in a statement issued by the Geneva Office of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Coughlin is Called Thorn to Catholics

CAMP TAMMINT, Pa. — In an address before the Tamiment Economic and Social Institute the Rev. Francis Talbot, editor of "America," said, "There is a divided Catholic opinion on Father Coughlin. Catholics are definitely not anti-Semitic. Whatever problem there is about Coughlin can best be handled by his ecclesiastical superiors."

Rev. Talbot said that "If Father Coughlin is a thorn in the side of the Jews, he is also a thorn in the side of Catholics. If he is arousing anti-Semitism, he is also arousing anti-Catholicism."

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Wagner Acts to Kill Refugee Amendment

Needlessly Cruel Declares Senator

WASHINGTON. — Senator Wagner (D., N. Y.), criticized the revised resolution dealing with the admittance to this country of German refugee children last week, and said he would ask the Senate Immigration Committee to reconsider the proposal.

The committee amended the measure so that the number of children admitted under it during the next two years would be charged against the German quota for these years.

"The proposed change would in effect convert the measure from a humane proposal to help children who are in acute distress into a proposal with needlessly cruel consequences for the adults in Germany who are in need of succor and are fortunate enough to obtain visas under the present drastic quota restrictions," Senator Wagner said.

While the committee was being criticized by Wagner, it was praised by Senator Reynolds, (D., N. C.) for approving legislation designed to stop all immigration for five years.

Priest's Evidence Saves Jewish Poet

BUCHAREST. — Aron Knitzer, Yiddish poet, held for two months in the infamous Jilava prison on charges of insulting the Christian faith by his volume of poetry, "Evangelic Motives," was acquitted here following testimony by a noted Catholic priest, literary critic and a legal scholar.

"Far from insulting the Christian faith, he had extolled Christian morals by his beautiful verse," said Father Gala Golactu, who is a professor at the Kishineff Theological Seminary and author of a Roumanian translation of the Bible published under the auspices of King Carol.

Plaque to Vom Rath Unveiled in Berlin

BERLIN. — Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop unveiled a plaque at the Foreign Ministry in memory of Ernst vom Rath, German Embassy secretary, killed by Herschel Grynszpan, 17-year-old Polish Jew, in Paris last November.

"Today we are again surrounded by the hate and hostility of the world," von Ribbentrop said. "We know that our comrade vom Rath was the victim of this agitation." The plaque bears the inscription: "Ernst Eduard vom Rath who fell in Paris faithfully accomplishing his duty toward the Fuehrer and the people."

RESIGNS IN PROTEST

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Condemning the "vindictiveness and savagery" of the Nazi Government, Dr. Franklin Edgerton, Professor at Yale University, has resigned as a corresponding member of the Bavarian Academy of Arts and Sciences in protest against the Reich Government's order to German academies to purge their membership of all "non-Aryans."

Refugees Learn to "Feel Well" in U S



Attend Americanization Class Sponsored by HIAS

NEW YORK. — In a spacious room in the former Astor Library which is now the headquarters of the Hebrew Sheltering & Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS), a large class of old and young pupils meets every afternoon, with the exception of Saturday and Sunday. It is the Americanization school created by American Jewry's HIAS for the recent arrivals from Hitler's domain.

"How do you feel today, Mr. Oppenheim?" the young teacher who faces his class of former business men, engineers, doctors, lawyers, executives, clerks and fashionable ladies, asks.

"I feel gutt," answers Mr. Oppenheim.

"That's is wrong!" jumps up Mr. Goldschmidt.

"No, no, you should say I feel well", joyously exclaims Frau Mannheimer, whose dress, de-

meanor and refined features testify eloquently to her high station in former days.

"No, you should say I feel well", jumps up Fritz Neumayer, who arrived in Manhattan six weeks ago, and who has apparently made already rapid progress in his Americanization.

Exercising in accordance with the teacher's instructions the class says in unison — "I feel well today! I feel fine today- I feel better today!"

With the memories of their horrible experiences in concentration camps slowly fading, the new arrivals learn to "feel better" as they progress in their grammar and in their Americanization.

Israel Levi, French Grand Rabbi, Dies

PARIS. — Israel Levi, retired grand rabbi of France and son-in-law of the grand rabbi, Zadoc Kahn, whom he succeeded after the World War, died here at the age of eighty-three.

Rabbi Levi joined the faculty of the Paris Rabbinical Assembly in 1882 and four years later was appointed professor of Talmudic literature.

EDITOR PREDICTS REBUKE

PHILADELPHIA. — Addressing a meeting on racial and religious tolerance sponsored by 50 organizations here, William Callahan, managing editor of The Catholic Worker, predicted that "Catholic leaders will shortly organize and deliver anti-Semitic groups a rebuke they never looked for."

96 Jewish Children Vacation For 2-Week Period at Camp

In an atmosphere of enthusiasm 96 children — 48 boys and 48 girls — left the Jewish Community Center last Sunday for a two-week vacation at Beach Pond Camp located at Escoheag, Rhode Island.

Leased from Rhode Island Camps Inc. Beach Pond Camp affords Jewish children of Providence excellent facilities for wholesome physical development, needed rest and relief from the strains of the hot city streets.

In charge of the children for the two-week period is a group of well-trained counsellors, all experienced in the art of handling children, many of them teachers in the Providence schools. The following constitute the educa-

tional staff: Miss Betty Roy, Miss Sophie Naimark, Miss Barbara Blotcher, Mrs. Hannah Weinreich, Miss Florence Kwasha. Mark Huddish is in charge of dramatics and Mrs. Cwebel is kitchen supervisor.

The organizations which cooperated in sending children are: the Jewish Community Center, Jewish Family Welfare Society, Auxiliary B'nai B'rith, B'nai B'rith, Roger Williams Lodge, Council of Jewish Women and the Ladies Union Aid.

The Jewish period at Beach Pond Camp extends from July 2 to July 15. Friday evening services tonight and the following week will be conducted by visiting rabbis.

Congregation Answers Union "Trefa" Edict

Religious Dispute Still Unsettled

In a leaflet distributed in Providence this week by the Waad Hacashruth, the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada declared that any fowl or animal slaughtered by the Schochet of the Congregation Sons of Abraham is absolutely Trefa and is forbidden to all Jewish people.

This decision was the outgrowth of a religious dispute between the Waad Hacashruth and the Congregation Sons of Abraham which to date remains unsettled despite a series of conferences between the disputants.

When advised of the contents of the leaflet, a spokesman of the Congregation Sons of Abraham said that the Congregation branches is willing and is ready for a peaceful negotiation and just arbitration by the outstanding leaders of Providence Communal Life and is totally willing to subordinate itself as in the past to such an impartial committee which should take out the entire matter from the jurisdiction of the local Rabbis.

The leaflet reads as follows: "We are aware of the deplorable conditions in the Communal life of the City of Providence, that the Institution of Kashruth and the prestige of our Holy Torah for which the Rabbis and all faithful Jews suffered untold sacrifices are now in danger of being annihilated through the mis-

Doctor Discrimination Boosts Death Rate

BUCHAREST. — Discrimination against Jewish doctors in Rumania is having an adverse effect on the health of the population. This charge was made recently at a meeting of the Rumanian Royal Medical Society by Professor Alexander Manolescu, a leading figure in medical circles.

Speaking on the general fitness of the Rumanian people, Professor Manolescu said that the increased mortality of late years was due to the artificial barriers put up against hundreds of non-Christian doctors in the small towns and villages. Owing to the agitation of anti-Semitic propagandists among the peasants, he alleged, qualified non-Christian doctors were being kept out despite the fact that non-Jewish doctors were not available to take their places.

Brazil to Admit 3,000 Refugees

RIO DE JANEIRO. — At the request of Pope Pius XII, the Brazilian government will accept 3,000 refugees from Germany who are Roman Catholics of Jewish origin. The president of the immigration and Colonization Council, Carlos Muniz, said all of the refugees were at present in Germany, many of them in concentration camps.

They are expected to begin arriving here shortly, according to Muniz who said that an appeal from the Pope to President Getulio Vargas had brought permission for their eventual entry.

leadership of the Congregation Sons of Abraham who act contrary to the Organized Jewish Community and follow a spiritual leader who is unfit for his high office and who causes dissention among our people and leads the innocent into sinful actions.

"We have formally warned the above mentioned Congregation and its leaders at three different times to bring the matter before an impartial Rabbinical Tribunal, whose composition is satisfactory to all concerned, only such a tribunal is authorized to settle religious disputes."

"In our last summons we gave the Congregation Sons of Abraham two weeks to settle this dispute by a Din Torah before a Rabbinical Tribunal. This time expired June 29, 1939."

"Therefore, be it known, that according to our Sacred Laws any fowl or animal slaughtered by the Shochet of the Congregation Sons of Abraham is absolutely Trefa and is forbidden to all Jewish people as long as they refuse to obey the law.

"We are certain that no faithful Jewish man, woman or child will aid the transgressors of our sacred Torah, and avoid the Biblical curse of the "Masig Gvill" (Deuteronomy 28:17). Those who will obey us will be blessed with the blessings of the faithful.

Congregation Replies

In reply to the above, the Congregation Sons of Abraham this morning made public the following statement:

at a conference which was held by both parties concerned at the Narragansett Hotel on June 4 and which was continued on June 5 and which was called to order by special letters and telegrams by the Agudas Horabonim, an agreement was proposed by the head of the local Waad Hacashruth, Mr. Kaufman, whose content was worded legally by attorney Jacob Alprin, to which the Congregation Sons of Abraham and its spiritual leader, Rabbi Nathan Taragin consented, granting all concessions which was demanded by the opposition, yet, when it came to sign the agreement, Rabbis Joshua and David Werner and M. Spector, backed out and insisted upon a Din Torah, the Rabbis to be selected and paid by the Waad Hacashruth. The Congregation Sons of Abraham would have no voice in selecting the Rabbis.

"Zablo" Acceptable

"Rabbi Taragin has written and telegraphed the Agudas Horabonim four times that he is willing to go to a Din Torah in the form of a "Zablo". In this latter form each party concerned chooses its own Rabbis. Harry Leach, as president of the Congregation, send a telegram from Sharon Springs, N. Y. where he is vacationing, accepting a Din Torah when he would return on June 30, before the "setting date" by the Agudas Horabonim had expired. Receipt of this wire was officially acknowledged by the vice-president of the Agudas Horabonim on July 1 by Rabbi Zelmanowitz.

"At the last Convention of the Rabbinical Council of America, a resolution was passed that a committee be appointed to go to Providence for the purpose of investigating the situation and arrange if necessary, for a Zablo arbitration and if need be, defend the interest of Rabbi Taragin. The Agudas Habonim has no right to assume such dictatorial powers as they expressed in the leaflet."

The statement concluded with the words mentioned earlier that the Congregation Sons of Abraham is entirely willing to arbitrate the dispute.

Jerusalem Bomb Injures 15 Arabs

Police Arrest 53 Revisionists

JERUSALEM. — Fifteen Arabs were wounded by a bomb explosion in the center of the city this week.

The blast occurred near an Arab cafe in the business district when the cafe was crowded with patrons including Egyptians, who were smoking water pipes.

The cafe was wrecked. Police formed a cordon about the area.

An Arab villager was shot dead near the Jewish quarter in the suburbs of Jerusalem.

Police arrested fifty-three members of the Zion Revisionists, who recently established a Jewish colony south of Tel-Aviv, as the result of investigations into the shooting in the Tel-Aviv area of eighteen Arabs, of whom thirteen were killed and five wounded.

Six-Years Old Boy Is Called Human Calendar by Scientists

Sol Shearn Rovinsky, 6-year-old Texas boy, is a human calendar. His father discovered it quite by accident several months ago. They were driving to Forth Worth one day when Mr. Rovinsky said to his wife: "I think I'll buy a new car in March." "What day in March, daddy?" asked Sol. "Oh, I don't know, just in March." "But, you're bound to buy it one day." "Well, how about March fifth?" "Oh, no, daddy, you can't buy it on March fifth because that's Sunday." "How did you know that?" questioned his father. "I don't know," said the boy.

They asked him about a few other dates in 1939 and he clicked off the correct answers before they could find them on the calendar. They hunted around for a 1940 calendar. He was just as good.

Mr. Rovinsky bought a perpetual calendar. He found that the boy was accurate up to 1949. Sol rattles off the Sundays or Tuesdays or Fridays in any month up to 1945 like a football quarterback calling signals. He never names them in order but mixes them up as: "The Sixth, the twenty-seventh, the thirteenth and the twentieth."

The child has stumped psychol-

ogists. Science has no more explanation for the phenomenon than the layman. "It's just one of those things," said one of Dallas' most prominent psychiatrists, whose name may not be used because of medical ethics. "We know they exist, but we don't know why."

Sol has a remarkable memory, but that could not possibly explain his amazing familiarity with the calendar. He knows the presidents of the United States backward and forward, when each was born and died, when each took office. He can recite the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States, Lincoln's Gettysburg address, and many other things.

As yet not entered in school, he can write and spell better than the average person.

Mr. and Mrs. Rovinsky have not tried Sol on any feats of mathematics, because they have been warned not to cultivate his peculiar bent. Psychologists say the boy should be allowed to forget his accomplishment in the natural course of things, and by all means, strangers and casual acquaintances should not keep him constantly at work naming dates in the future.

British See Better Attitude In Some European States

LONDON. — Leonard Stein, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, in a recent report of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Deputies of British Jews and the Anglo-Jewish Association, noted an improvement in the Jewish position in Poland and Rumania, coupled with a new attitude toward Nazi-inspired anti-Semitic agitation on the part of other European states.

Submitting the report, which described the plight of the Jewish populations in Germany, the protectorate of Bohemia-Moravia, Slovakia and Carpatho-Russia, Stein said:

"There is reason to believe that some states with small Jewish populations, where the influence of the Nazi regime led the governments to condone anti-Semitic agitation and discrimination against the Jews, are beginning to see that freedom from the allegation of Jewish persecution is a moral asset in the eyes of democracies which no country can

Frick Orders Jew Crow Laws

BERLIN. — New regulations against Jews throughout Germany were issued by Dr. Wilhelm Frick, Minister of the Interior, governing their attendance at health resorts and making no differentiation between German Jews and Jewish citizens of foreign nations.

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Deportation of Polish Jews Is Resumed

WARSAW. — Information from Berlin disclosed that Nazi authorities have resumed mass deportation of Polish Jews, including aged and children, forcing hundreds across the Polish-German frontier. It is believed that about 1,000 under arrest in Germany, will be expelled this week.

Many of those deported have been driven back and forth across the border near Zbonszyn, a Polish frontier station.

A group numbering approximately 140, including many children, are camped in a wooden portion of the district and are known to be suffering from exposure and hunger.

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

Return of Defense Weapons is Begun

JERUSALEM. — The expectation that weapons assigned to colonies for defense and removed in the past week by the authorities would be returned was strengthened when forty reserve rifles recently taken from the eastern Emek settlement were restored to them.

The announcement was made that the Jordan Valley settlements, also punished by the removal of arms because of a burst of terrorism which the Government control their firearms returned this week, with the likelihood that the weapons taken from all the other settlements would be brought back shortly.

Jewish Technicians Shipped to Germany

PRAGUE. — The Gestapo is inducing professionally trained Jews in Prague to take up positions in Germany, it was reported here. It has been the practice for some time for the government to order skilled technicians when applying for emigration papers to seek employment in the armament factories of the Ruhr district.

Italy Now Limiting Jews In Industry

Rome Enforces New Legislation

ROME. — Racial legislation, limiting the size of business Jews may own or manage, and requiring registration of Jewish enterprises, classified 224 enterprises of which at least four may not be retained by Jews: One was found to be important to the nation's defense and three others employ more than 100 persons.

Of the remainder of the listed 224 enterprises, none will be permitted Jewish management.

An investigation was launched by Milan authorities to force property registration by Jews in accordance with the anti-Jewish decrees. This measure was taken following failure of property registrations by Jews in Milan to disclose anticipated large sums.

The Nov. 10 degrees provide that Jews may not own urban properties which yield more than 20,000 lire annually or rural properties which yield more than 5,000 lire. Enterprises vital to the nation's defense or those employing more than 100 persons may not be owned by Jews, the decrees state.

WARNS OF FASCISM

WASHINGTON. — When questioned concerning an article of the Congressional Record in which he named all the Jewish chairmen of House committees and discussed foreign governments and charges that they paid numerous agents in this country, Rep. "Our strength lies in our great market," Mr. Sayres said, "our free exchange and our system of free economic initiative. WASHINGTON. — The Works Projects Administration has initiated a drive to pare Federal relief rolls to an average of 2,000,000 persons so that the recently voted \$1,855,000 appropriation may be stretched through the fiscal year.

WANT CHURCHILL, EDEN

LONDON. — Terrific pressure is being applied to Prime Minister Chamberlain to bring both Mr. Churchill and Anthony Eden into his cabinet. This, in the estimation of many people, would make the Nazis realize that Britain intends to live up to her treaty obligations.

"UNDECLARED" WAR

TOKYO. — Japanese-Manchukuan forces have opened an offensive against Outer-Mongolian -Russian forces on the Manchukua-Outer Mongolia border and the armies are now engaged in a battle, it was reported this week. The Japanese forces claim to have captured 30 Russian tanks and disabled many others.

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Year Book Shows Changes In Local Jewish Social Work

NEW YORK. — Government welfare programs and current economic conditions are bringing about many changes in the work of local Jewish welfare organizations, according to the 1938 Year Book of Jewish Social Work just published by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

Family agencies, it was found, are now placing greater emphasis on services other than relief. The number of children being cared for in institutions is declining, with increasing stress being placed on foster home care and assistance in their own homes. Other major trends are the marked development of medical service for the aged the chronically ill in recent years and the sudden rise of Jewish vocational services. This development, it is asserted

in the Year Book, is in line with the trend since 1933, when the public welfare programs took over most of the relief burden, enabling the Jewish agencies to devote more and more attention to the work of solving difficulties in individual and family adjustment — a task which the government agencies are not equipped to do at present. The Jewish family organizations are concentrating on counseling with individuals and families to prevent the breaking-up of homes, mental and physical breakdown, delinquency and deterioration through chronic dependency. They are also placing more emphasis on special services such as vocational guidance and training, child guidance, and housekeeper service for families when the mother is ill.

EXPELLED

VIENNA. — Georg Mariniak, a Jewish citizen of Poland and a former conductor of the Vienna State Opera, has been arrested and expelled from Germany by Nazi authorities, it was understood this week. His "Aryan" wife was permitted to remain.

Mindanao Favored As Refugee Haven New Yorkers Complete Tour

MANILLA. — Three members of the New York Jewish Refugee Commission returned to Manilla this week after a six-week inspection tour of Mindanao Island, proposed site of Jewish immigration.

"We were greatly impressed by the fertile soil, magnificent scenery, immense virgin forests and the splendid climate of Mindanao," one of the commissioners said.

Some authorities assert Mindanao could take care of 14,000,000 homesteaders.

With the aid of the United States Government, the Commonwealth Government has advanced tentative plans to settle 10,000 Jews on the agriculturally and minerally rich island, part of which is dominated by Japanese settlers.

New Wrapper Reduces Waste

NEW YORK. — A new method of impregnating wrappers for citrus fruit, developed by Dr. Adalbert Farkas of the department of physical chemistry at the Hebrew University, Jerusalem, may have a far-reaching effect of citrus fruit storage and transport, and is expected to save the citrus fruit industry of Palestine over a million dollars annually, it was reported this week.

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

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Hearst Employs Anti-Semitism to Combat Strike

Paganists in U. S. Advised to Get Out

Bennett Talks To B'rith Abraham

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y. — Scoring governments "of pagan philosophies that glorify prejudice and intolerance," State Attorney General John J. Bennett Jr. said this week Americans admiring such practices "should be told to pick up, get out."

The attorney general spoke before the annual convention of the Independent Order of B'nai Abraham, sessions.

After praising delegates because their organization "enjoys a magnificent international reputation for helping not only Jewry but Christianity," the speaker said:

"Today, we and other peoples of the world are faced by the problems created by governments of philosophies that glorify prejudice and intolerance. Governments are attempting to justify their denial of personal liberties in a pantheistic freedom called the natural state.

"Those who think other nations have a better form of government or a better philosophy of life or a better mode of living than we have, should be told to pick up, get out and go to the other nation that is their ideal."

Prints Scurrilous Poem about Four Jewish Strike Leaders

CHICAGO. — The Hearst management, through the company unions working in its interests, has resorted to anti-Semitism to fight the Chicago Newspaper Guild's six-month-old strike against the Chicago Evening American and Herald & Examiner.

Singling out four Jewish strike leaders and a striking office boy as central characters for a scurrilous doggerel appearing in a tabloid issued by the scab unions, Hearst and his minions have again succeeded in rousing the Chi-

cago populace to the side of the strikers. Gentiles, even more than Jews, have been aroused by the "poetry" which, incidentally, appeared over the signature "F.T.," often used by Rev. Irwin St. Tucker (who likes to be known as Friar Tuck) as a signature for his poems. Tucker is an Episcopalian minister who augments his ecclesiastical income by strikebreaking on the Herald & Examiner copy-desk.

Under the title "The 'Gyp'", the doggerel reads like this:

Weary months to and fro you've been tramping —
Street-walkers, who fell for the Guild;
But where are the eloquent lovers
By whose glittering lure you were thrilled?
You tightened your belts through the Winter,
Growing gaunt on the striker's thin dole;
While fat grew Sapoznik and Weinberg,
Alexkovsky, Yablonky and Wohl!
You've trudged from the sleet of December
To the blossoming langour (sic) of May;
Still trusting, still fooled, still deserted
By the "leaders" who led you astray.
Tramp on, then. Tramp on in your gutters;
"Starvation is good for your soul!"
(But not for Sapoznik and Weinberg,
Alexkovsky, Yablonky and Wohl.)

Harry Wohl is president of the Chicago Newspaper Guild, while Henry Wineberg (not Weinberg), Nathan Alexkovsky (not Alexkovsky) and Ben Yablonky are chairmen of various strike committees, and Jack Sapoznik is a striking office boy.

Chamberlain Visits Refugee Plant

LONDON. — Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, during his week-end tour of South Wales, visited a chrome leather factory started a year ago by two German Jewish refugees which is now employing 200 Welsh ex-miners. Commenting editorially on the visit, the News-Chronicle said that the factory constituted "practical refutation of the argument that refugees are displacing British workers."

In the dangerous Beisan Valley Jewish pioneer shock troops, moving with secrecy, Thursday night established a new settlement northeast of Beisan, making the twelfth such colony founded in the valley since issuance of the British White Paper under which an independent Palestine would be set up with the Jews as a one-third minority.

Young Judaea Hits Fascist Ideologies

PORT JERVAIS, N. Y. — Louis P. Rocker, of New York City, was re-elected for the fourth consecutive term as national president of Young Judaea, the junior affiliate of the Zionist Organization of America; and Governor Herbert H. Lehman of New York, was re-elected honorary president during the movement's annual convention held over the past weekend at Camp Cejwin, here.

Resolutions adopted by the organization included an expression of its abhorrence at the bad faith of the British Government by the issuance of the White Paper Plan; a condemnation of and hatred for all Fascist and Nazi ideologies; advocating with great favor the proposal to admit 20,000 refugee children into the United States; plans be formulated for the establishment of an employment bureau whose purpose shall be to secure jobs for unemployed youth so that they may become "worthwhile, self-supporting citizens who can be enlisted to work and to contribute to Jewish causes."

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Declare Mosely Menace to Prestige High Army Men Lash Anti-Semite

NEW YORK. — General Malin Craig, chief of staff of the United States Army, and other high Army officials regard Major-Gen. George Van Horn Moseley (retired) "only as a menace to the prestige of the service," declared Kenneth G. Crawford, in an article, "Moseley Loses His Horse," in the current issue of The Nation.

The Washington correspondent revealed that prior to Moseley's appearance before the Dies committee on un-American activities an emissary in the service had been sent to him to suggest that "he hold his irresponsible tongue in the interest of preserving the dignity of the army."

When this failed the War Department considered disciplinary measures but was dissuaded from acting by President Roosevelt himself. The attitude of the army toward the whole affair has been reassuring."

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
