On the Rising Tide of Anti-Semitism

When a well-known and well-meaning liberal speaks or writes about "the rising tide of anti-Semitism in America," that isn't news. But when a liberal such as William Allan White after loitering around hamburger stands, pool halls, newspaper city rooms, one-horse cafes and soda fountains during a 2,000 mile tour of the States, says he found few indications of anti-Semitism, that is News.

The boys you find hanging around these public forums, says Mr. White, have never heard of anti-Semitism and, if you ask about it, will look sharply at you and draw away. If you sound them out about Jews they see no reason why any one should be entitled to any unusual amount of credit or sympathy for being one — it's like being a Lithuanian, a Catholic or a stamp collector — pretty much your own business so long as you don't go around bothering other people about it. But they are quickly bored and are anxious to talk about something practical, such as whether Boston can catch up with the Yankees.

West of the Alleghenies, Mr. White noticed a strong sympathetic interest in the plight of the refugees but this curiosity went hand in hand with an uneasiness about the numbers who have arrived in New York. They'll tell you, Mr. White said, that there isn't enough business or jobs to go around. And Hitler's solution of picking on a minority, stealing its money and driving it out won't help him long.

The Mississippi watershed, on the other hand, is deeply distrustful of propaganda. The first thing they want to know about Father Coughlin is who is really putting up all the money for those broadcasts. Yes, they know what he says, but who is really paying for them?

The well meaning liberals when they hie themselves forth to feel the public pulse, Mr. White continues, must loiter in a different type of place. They may be, of course, the Sacred Geese whose cackling some day will save the city. But Mr. White presumes to doubt this fact and suspects that the rising tide they see is a restricted water course which boils furiously between their own ears, beneath their pajamas and above their foulard ties.

And what is the effect of it all? Well, Mr. White feels that after his 2,000 mile trip, he would bracket these band-wagon prophets with the man who, in a crowded theatre, rises to scream that all are in imminent peril, for the exit doors are too narrow and in the event of a panic many would be crushed and smothered.

Mr. White further states that he hasn't said there is no anti-Semitism in this country. He didn't canvas the Racquet Club and he can't honestly report on the Deep South or the West Coast. But he concludes that if there were a rising tide it would be trickling down the upper Mississippi basin and a few drops would have spotted the high plains but he found none.

Or maybe, Mr. White says, when the well-meaning liberals came paddling in, with earnest faces and round goggling eyes, they told them what they thought they wanted to hear.

Tells U. S. Coughlin Is An Agent of Nazis Birkhead Informs State Department

NEW YORK. — The State Department had before it this week the names of seven persons, including the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, radio priest, whom the Rev. Dr. Leon M. Birkhead charges with "disseminating pro-Nazi propaganda originating from official sources in Germany."

Dr. Birkhead is national director of the Friends of Democracy. The seven were named in response to a State Department letter dated July 19 and signed by Joseph C. Green, acknowledging a complaint by Dr. Birkhead and asking names and addresses.

Others listed by Dr. Birkhead are Fritz Kuhn of the German-American Bund; the Rev. Gerald B. Winrod of Wichita, Kan.; James True of James True Associates, Washington; Dr. Paul M. Winter of Shaverstown, Pa.; H. D. Kissinger of Kansas City, Mo., and Harry A. Jung of Chicago, head of the American Vigilant Intelligence Federation.

Father Coughlin is accused of reprinting a speech by Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi Minister of Propaganda, in the Dec. 5, 1938, issue of his weekly, Social Justice.

Swiss Nazis Jailed For Spy Activities

ZURICH. — Switzerland's Nazi "Fuehrer" and seven of his confederates were sentenced here this week to prison terms ranging from three months to two years after being convicted of pro-German espionage. All eight defendants were given 10 days in which to file an appeal.

Dr. Alfred Zander, head of the "League of Faithful Confederates," insisted throughout the trial that he and his followers had maintained no contact with the Reich, and protested that they had not sought to overthrow the Swiss Government. The prosecution produced testimony to prove the defendants had communicated with Nazi party officials at Munich.

Nazis Sorry "Rim" Exiles Were Saved

LONDON. — An Arabic broadcast from Germany voiced regret that the Jewish refugees on the steamer Rim, which last week burned off the Island of Rhodes, had escaped death, it was revealed by the Times.

The following version of the Rim tragedy was broadcast from Germany on July 7 and recorded in London and Palestine: "Fire broke out in a ship flying the Panama flag with 814 Jews on board. Unfortunately these errant Jews were rescued from the death that they deserved by nearby boats."

MRS. WEIZMANN DEAD

JERUSALEM. — Rachael Weizmann, 37, mother of Russian-born Dr. Chaim Weizmann, died this week at Haifa. Her son is president of the Jewish agency for Palestine here.

Announce Membership Rates For R. I. Hospital Service

Approval of the Blue Cross membership rates by Horace L. Weller, Director of the State Department of Business Regulation, opens the way for the Hospital Service Corporation to move Rhode Island's group hospitalization program into the final preparatory stages.

Enrollment of members will start in another week, and agreements will become effective on September 1.

Rates will range from 50 cents a month for an individual subscriber under the ward plan, to a maximum of \$1.90 a month for a family group membership with semi-private service. The pro-

Danzig Jews Suffer By Nazi Domination

DANZIG. — Religious courses in Danzig schools will be replaced by lessons in Nazi ideology. Books on religion may be sold only by shops holding special permits.

Fifty per cent of the Danzig Jewish community, which numbers approximately 2,000, depends entirely for their subsistence on relief organizations abroad, chiefly the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. For these impoverished Jews the Community has opened a soup kitchen. The remainder is still able to subsist on meager incomes.

Girl Bears Baby After 6-Story Plunge; Both Die

NEW YORK. — Jenny Kenesky ended her seventeen years of life tragically last week — and in dying she gave both life and death to a baby girl.

The girl had been working as a servant in the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. George Kalow, at 1065 Jerome avenue, The Bronx. She told the Kalows that her husband, whom she met in a Brooklyn dance hall, could not afford a room big enough for both of them, so they had to live apart.

Last night she finished her work, put away the dishes and went to the roof of the six-story building. Her body crashed on a sidewalk a few minutes later. An ambulance surgeon discovered that as she fell, she bore a daughter. The baby was still breathing, but died a few minutes later. The mother lived half an hour after reaching Morrisania Hospital.

Co-Operation Appeal Rejected By Agency Commons Allows Immigration Ban

LONDON. — The Jewish Agency for Palestine, rejecting Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald's appeal in Commons for co-operation with the Government in effecting its new Palestine policy, has refused to take responsibility for the "inevitable consequences" of the ban on immigration.

The action was taken after Commons, by a slim margin, had voted approval of the six-month ban on Jewish immigration to Palestine.

The Agency stated:

"The Jewish Agency for 20 years made loyal cooperation with the mandatory power the basis of its work and looks forward to the time when it will be enabled to resume full cooperation. But they state once more that the policy of the White Paper is devoid of moral and legal basis and is calculated to destroy the last and holiest possession of the Jewish people—the national home. They cannot be expected to help implement the White Paper and refuse to be made in any way responsible for the inevitable consequences of the Government's new immigration policy."

Brains and a Fire Beat Nazi Rules

LONDON. — A German Jew has found a new way of defeating the Nazi currency regulations—to the tune of \$280,000.

A British lawyer called to Berlin to take details of British stock certificates, watched astounded as his client threw them on the fire. After reaching England the refugee had the lawyer file a sworn statement as to the destruction of the certificates. Under British law this enabled him to obtain the necessary duplicates—at a cost of around \$7.20.

450,000 Jews Stage Ten-Hour Strike

JERUSALEM. — A silent stay-in-general strike of ten hours' duration was staged by Palestine's 450,000 Jews as a mark of protest against the British decree suspending Jewish immigration for six months, beginning October 1.

The Jewish National Council, which called the strike, forbade meetings and demonstrations throughout the country, ordering Jews to remain in their homes and to maintain silence for the duration of the period.

100,000 Blood Donors Respond in 24 Hours

LONDON. — Acting under the orders of the British Ministry of Health, the Medical Research Council recently issued a call for 1,180,000 blood donors. Within twenty-four hours more than 100,000 volunteers had responded in London alone.

One hundred members of a refugees' club volunteered "as a mark of appreciation of the sanctuary which Great Britain has given them."

Seventeen-Year-Old Bicyclist Touring U.S. and Hostel Plan

NEW YORK. — Anybody who whistles at girls would whistle at Ruth Orkin even if she didn't habitually ride a bicycle, because she is seventeen years old and pretty.

But Miss Orkin doesn't mind being whistled at—she's been whistled at in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington and now in New York—because she is a sort of propagandist and—to propagandists—any attention, even whistling, is welcome.

She left Los Angeles, where she attends the City College, on June 1 to make a tour of the country as a missionary for the American Youth Hostels, an organization which provides safe and cheap accommodations for traveling boys and girls.

5,000 in 20 Countries
The idea started in Germany about twenty years ago, and has now spread to twenty countries with about 5,000 European hostels and 200 here where a night's lodging costs twenty-five cents.

"I spent about one week in each of those cities," she said, "and only a few hours in New York, and already I've been whistled and yelled at more here than in all those places."

"Along Broadway everybody stopped and stared, and the traffic cops looked startled when I went by. Don't people ride bicycles here?"

Miss Orkin seemed surprised when she was told that very few pretty girls ride bicycles at Broadway and Wall Street.

Hasn't a Cent Left

"I had \$25 when I started out," she said, "and now I haven't got a cent left. I saved that money like a miser since I won it in a newspaper contest two years ago. They asked a lot of questions like, 'Who was the first woman who swam the English Channel?' and I called up the library and they answered all the questions for me. I've often wondered why nobody else thought of doing that."

"I saved the money to make this trip, and now I have to make some more because I want to go through New England. Do you know of any contests going on?"

It costs about \$1 a day, Miss Orkin said, to tour on the hostel plan. About half a dollar for food, a quarter for lodging and the rest for incidentals.

Hostel Rules Strict

"Most of the hostels," she said, "are farm houses, and the house parents usually have children themselves. They put the boys in barns usually, and the girls on their porch or in rooms if they have rooms. The house parents are always investigated, and they're pretty careful about behavior."

"You have to be in bed at 10 o'clock and out and away from the hostel by nine the next morning. The rules don't allow drinking or smoking in the hostel."

To Test Decree in France Forbidding Race Agitation

PARIS. — The first trial under the recent decree forbidding anti-Semitic agitation or campaigns in the press was ordered by a magistrate after investigating charges against Louis Darquier de Pellepoix, a Paris Municipal Councilor and director of the anti-Semitic France Enchaînée. The case will be heard under the decree law

which forbids publication of matter intended to incite race hatred against any group of citizens.

French newspapers charged that Germany is keeping up a constant flow of anti-Semitic propaganda material into Alsace-Lorraine aimed at combatting recent decrees issued by the French Government which forbid anti-Semitic agitation. It is said that letters addressed to French citizens in the territory contain anti-Jewish caricatures and leaflets.

Palestine Concern Fosters Aviation

JERUSALEM. — Palestine's forward industrial and scientific progress recorded a new chapter with the opening of the first conference of the Palestine Flying Enterprises, Ltd., which is being held at Dagan. Isaac Ben Zvi, head of the Vaad Leumi (Jewish National Council), officially inaugurated the aviation conference which was attended by visitors, newspaper correspondents and representatives of national institutions as well as flying clubs.

The purpose of the new company is to foster Jewish aviation and especially to assist the flying school at Afkum. Greetings in behalf of the Jewish Agency for Palestine were brought to the conference by Isaac Gruenbaum.

Carol Gives Thanks For Loyalty Pledge

BUCHAREST. — Dr. William Filderman was in receipt of a message of thanks from King Carol following Dr. Filderman's expression of loyalty sent to the King on the occasion of Dr. Filderman's reelection as president of the Union of Jewish communities. Minister of Minorities Silviu Dragomir also sent a congratulatory message to Dr. Filderman.

Ceremonies held in the Royal Palace to introduce the new Patriarch of the Rumanian Orthodox Church were attended by Rabbi Jakob Niemirower as representative of the Jewish religious community. The Patriarch later received Rabbi Niebirower in a special audiences.

Jewish Rights Safe, Yugoslavia Claims

BELGRADE. — The Rev. Maurice L. Perlzweig, British Zionist leader and member of the World Jewish Congress executive committee, was received by Premier Dragisha Cvetkovic, who assured him that Jewish rights in Yugoslavia would not be impaired.

Perlzweig also discussed the aliens problem with officials of the Foreign Ministry. He came here from Bucharest, where he conferred with Premier Armand Calinescu, reportedly on the Jewish

According to Dr. Parry, an advertisement of the German Railroad appearing in the New York Herald Tribune on June 15, claiming that "Americans Prefer Germany," was based on an apparent falsification of statistics.

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
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National Fund Issues Stamps

A reception will be held in the vestry following the ceremony. Guests are expected to attend from various cities in New England.



Investigate Sweatshop Haven

JERSEY CITY. — The long expected cleanup of sweatshops in New Jersey this week started when the labor board began investigation of the artificial flower trade. Until the present time Northern New Jersey has been the sweatshop haven for anti-labor employers who fled New York.

Block Change in Security Law

WASHINGTON. — Changes in security laws are blocked in Congress by fears of some legislators that the Senate's increase in old-age pensions is a step toward the Townsend plan.

Gather Incidents

SHANGHAI. — American Consuls are compiling a list of Japanese-American incidents since the start of the Chinese-Japanese war for the use of the State Department. It was reported that already more than 600 incidents have been listed since the start of hostilities, including the bombing of American properties on twenty occasions.

Must Make Democracy Work

NEW YORK. — Norman Thomas was certain this week that a war would bring a military Fascism and a totalitarian state. He said: "The main way of fighting Fascism must be to make democracy work as democracy has not yet worked. To accomplish this end will do more to stimulate the masses in Europe than would any participation by America in a war that would cost her own democracy."

Nothing Can Stop Japan

NEW YORK. — John Gunther, foreign correspondent, is convinced that Japan is on the march, cruel and vigorous. "Nothing will stop Japan," he said, "except force—force stronger than Japan's—or, conceivably, social upheaval following grave military disaster."

Against Third Term

NEW YORK. — Donald Richberg, former New Deal proponent gave out flatly this week against a third term for Roosevelt. "There is a real menace to the welfare of the country," he said, "in the possibility that public action and thought may be dominated or even feel that it is being dominated by the personality of one man."

Contraption Saves Babies

NEW YORK. — Twin babies were saved this week from an acute attack of whooping cough by a doctor who used a welder's oxygen tank, fruit jar and some rubber hose to rig emergency equipment. It looked like a Rube Goldberg production but it worked.

Japs Blame Russia

SHANGHAI. — Japanese Army authorities alleged this week that Russia was financing a Chinese guerilla campaign against Japanese airdrops and supply depots in Shanghai-Nanking area "with support of British authorities." The British Consulate General retorted that the charge was "full of lies."

To Accept Loyalists

HENDAYE, France. — Nationalist Spain was reported to have agreed to take back 50,000 former Republican militiamen from French concentration camps at the rate of 2,000 daily. Acceptance of the refugees was agreed upon after France offered to return Spanish gold deposited in French banks by the former Republican regime.

Predicts Street Fighting

BOSTON. — A prediction that the increase in racial propaganda in Boston would soon cause street fighting was made this week by Roy P. Monohan, chairman of the Americanism Committee of the Disabled War Veterans during the 19th annual convention being held at the Hotel Statler.

Zionists Forcibly Fed

JERUSALEM. — Eighty Zionist revisionists who have been on a six-day hunger strike at a concentration camp at Sarafand, near Tel Aviv were fed forcibly this week. In another sit-down hunger strike, 70 Jewish families are occupying the great Synagogue in Tel Aviv in protest against the

F. C. C. Decree Said To Be "Ambiguous" Hate Campaign Forces Five Bund Families from Canada

WASHINGTON. — Representatives of the radio industry testifying at a hearing on the Federal Communication Commission's recent ruling that broadcasters "shall render only an international broadcast which will reflect the culture of this country and which will promote international goodwill, understanding and co-operation," criticized the decree as "ambiguous" and as a form of "censorship."

NEW YORK. — Five German families from Loon River, Saskatchewan, sailed back to Germany in the Bremen last week, the first group of a community of 84 families who are returning from that region to the Fatherland.

Hugo Schilling, Bund leader of the Loon River region, said that he couldn't stand the "hate" that surrounded "everything German" in that part of Canada.

No Longer Friendly

At first Mr. Schilling said his people were forced to leave Canada because there was no "economic future" there, but presently he revealed his real grievance.

"When I came to Canada ten years ago," he said, "everything was fine. The people were friendly and spoke to us. Canadian officials even complimented us on our cleanliness, friendliness and efficiency."

"When the newspapers began printing about the situation in Europe, the friendliness disappeared. If we had agreed with our neighbors everything would have been all right. Finally we couldn't stand it any longer. The hate of everything German we couldn't stand.

"We even had some of our form-

er neighbors stop us on the street and tell us that for every Jew forced out of Germany they would hang one of us."

Jewish Hospital Trains Two Nuns

NEW YORK. — Two nuns of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Brentwood, L. I., were graduated last week from the laboratory school of the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn. They were Sisters Anna Vinucent and Catharine, who have been preparing to assume charge of the laboratory of Ponce Hospital, Puerto Rico.

This was the first time the Jewish Hospital has given training and its diploma to members of a Catholic order.

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Orders Put Up to Take Out

Palestine Nat'l. Army Ready To Fight For Jewish State

Hopes to Establish Absolute Jewish Majority Population in Holy Land.

NEW YORK: The secret illegal Palestine National Army, dedicated to the creation of a Jewish sovereign state in the Jewish homeland, and strong enough now in its own opinion to speak openly of its work and purposes, reported on itself here last week.

It is modeled on the Irish Republican Army and on other direction national revolutionary organization. Built into small secret cells whose members know only their immediate superior, it has two principal aims at the moment: The first is to be strong enough to defend Palestine. "An oppressed nation never succeeds without the support of an adequate military force ready to stand up to threat and challenge," reads the first article of its doctrine.

The second is political. It is to establish an absolute Jewish majority of population in Palestine. This the "Irgun," as the National Army calls itself, is now seeking to accomplish through mass immigration, which, under the British mandate and with Palestine under martial law, is illegal.

More than 15,000 Jews have been deposited in Palestine since April, 1938, by the action of Irgun. There are 10,000 Jews now roaming the Mediterranean in vessels ready for landing. The campaign is now being intensified.

In all these aims, Irgun considers Britain its direct enemy. It proclaims the recent British White Paper as a piece of treachery, in violation of international law and of pledges given. It accuses the British administration in Palestine of being "outspokenly anti-Zionist and anti-Jewish. It charges that British has "instigated" Arab violence, favored it and allowed it to continue.

"It is already clear today," said Mr. Gilead, "that Britain and the Arabs make no decisions without taking into account the reaction of Irgun. Daily our military activities increase. A Jewish Ghetto in Palestine will be established only over our dead bodies."

Mr. Gilead told of a recent arrival of more than 700 Jews in Palestine. They arrived off the port of Haifa a week ago Sunday. A sailing vessel flying the blue and white Palestine flag put off from shore, took the immigrants aboard, and sailed them openly into the port. The British detained them, but no way of re-shiping them and let them enter, Mr. Gilead added.

Mr. Gilead looked as if he would rather welcome a fight in such cases. "If the British should oppose a landing by arms," he said, "we will oppose the British by arms."

"Politically," Mr. Gilead said, "the future of Palestine will be decided by an absolute Jewish

majority. At present there are about 450,000 Jews in Palestine and 900,000 Arabs. The only reason there are so few Jews is that British has ordered it that way. We could absorb a million more Jews in Palestine in less than a year without hardship. The country is capable eventually of supporting from eight to ten million Jews."

This information and these charges were made by a young man with steel-blue eyes and several European college degrees, who calls himself Mr. Gilead. He is here, Mr. Gilead said, merely as the representative of Irgun. He is making no appeal, but merely telling about his organization, of which he is not the leader. While Irgun has military headquarters, equipped for enrollment and soldierly training in several European cities, there is none Mr. Gilead said, in the United States, and there is no intention to establish one here.

Discipline is on a strict military and hierarchic basis. At the headquarters in Jerusalem is the commander and his "command." Beneath is a general staff, consistign of all heads of departments. Lower officers and the rank and file are grouped in small units. Training is secret. No member knows anyone in the organization except his immediate superior. Thus, thousands of people are controlled by the high command without fear of major attack by Palestine authorities.

Irgun's principal military action today is fighting the Arab terror in Palestine by "defense and retaliation measures." Since the publication of the British White Paper last May, Irgun has been in "active resistance against Britain and the Arabs, with the aim to defy the new Ukases."


Urges Propaganda Be Met By Appraisal

CHARLOTTESVILLE. — Declaring that civil liberties are today fighting a losing battle throughout the world, Bruce Bliven, editor of "The New Republic," in an address before the Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Virginia, urged that problems arising out of irrational prejudices masquerading as intelligent judgments be met by critical thought as the best protection against international propoganda of a subversive nature and as the surest bulwark of democracy itself.

"Our problem," said Bliven, "is to train ourselves to recognize propoganda, and when we recognize it, to suspend judgment until we can analyze its purposes dispassionately."

Free Speech For Thorkelson Upheld

WASHINGTON. — Representative Clare E. Hoffman (Rep., Mich.) this week criticized Majority Leader Sam Rayburn on the floor of the House for his attitude last week toward Representative Jacob Thorkelson (Rep., Mont.) in connection with Thorkelson's injection of racial prejudice in his extension remarks in the Congressional Record.

Hoffman charged that Rayburn was attempting to deny to Thorkelson the right of free speech because the latter's views differed from his own. Rayburn heatedly denied the allegation, asserting he was denying Thorkelson nothing but his right to spread racial dissention.

Reveal Shortage Of Jewish Chaplains

JOHANNESBURG. — A sharp increase in the number of Jews in the military reserve forces of the Union of South Africa has resulted in a shortage of Jewish chaplains, it was learned.

The shortage was made known in a letter by general J. J. Collver, Director of Reserves, to Board of Deputies of South African Jews.

The General's request for more chaplains was turned over to the rabbinate, which will shortly submit a list of candidates.

Mother Dies Unaware of Sons Death 7 Years Ago

OMAHA, Neb. — For seven years Mrs. Himon Goldberg lived in Omaha and Los Angeles without knowledge of the fatal shooting of two of her three sons.

In 1932 Harry and Sam Goldberg, the sons, were shot and killed by an enraged cousin during a business dispute.

Mrs. Goldberg then was in ill health in California. Her condition was so serious that Ralph D., a third son, felt news of the tragedy would result in her immediate death.

To meet the situation, he decided to send his mother letters signed "Harry" and "Sam". Every week or two he wrote one of these letters, mailing some in Omaha and sending others to friends in New York and other cities for remailing.

It was Ralph's plan to tell his mother of the tragedy when her condition improved. But there was never sufficient improvement and the deception was carried on until Mrs. Goldberg's death last week.

Suspect Reich of Utilizing Refugees to Further Aims

NEW YORK. — "Despite great efforts on the part of the Inter-governmental Refugees Committee, the solution of the problem is hardly more than begun."

In the opinion of Harold Calender, special writer for the New York Times, the Reich is suspected of employing unwanted refugees as instruments to promote its diplomatic aims. The refugees are social outcasts whom the Nazi Reich has swept together in order to dump them upon the neighbors' doorstep.

The Nazis do not mind creating difficulties for any country," Calender maintains and thus, "the Nazis use the refugees as instruments of diplomacy. There are many who suspect that the Nazis have deliberately created a refugee problem abroad and intentionally maintain a stream of refugees at a level with which the

world cannot readily cope.

"Hence, all reports of official German plans for regularizing the outflow of refugees are taken with a grain of salt, for the greatest obstacle to the solution of the problem is the refusal of the Reich to permit Jews to use their own funds to emigrate or help others to emigrate. The refugee problem is deliberately created by Germany for the purpose of internal politics and is used to embarrass other nations."

Petition Asks Curb On Coughlin Group

NEW YORK. — The American Jewish Alliance announced this week that it was seeking 100,000 signatures to a petition asking Mayor LaGuardia to take steps "to stop the incitement to riot and physical attacks on peaceful citizens by the followers of Father Coughlin and members of the so-called Christian Front."

The petition charges that "Jewish citizens have been attacked, insulted and maltreated" on the streets and in subways "while the police in many instances, have looked the other way or deliberately refused to interfere."

Fear Unlimited Immigration Will Increase Anti-Semitism

LONDON. — A government spokesman revealed that despite demands from all parts of the House of Lords for a more liberal policy toward refugees, the government refused either to loosen existing restrictions on immigration or to provide public funds to

aid the proposed settlement of German Jews in British Guiana and elsewhere.

Lord Dufferin, who said the total number of refugees now in Great Britain was 40,000, asserted that Britain could not admit large numbers because it would stimulate anti-Semitism.

"I have the strongest feeling," said Lord Dufferin, "that any very large increase in the Jewish population of this country would provoke an anti-Semitic feeling, which, I cannot disguise, is an underlying factor in England, in common with almost every coun-

Arabs Secure Council Control

JERUSALEM. — Falastin reports that the Government has nominated Adel Jaber, Arab writer, as a member of the Jerusalem Municipal Council.

If this report is confirmed it will mean that the Arabs will again have six seats on the Council and thereby regain majority status in the administration of the city's affairs.

Falastin's report indicates that the Arabs have won an important point, for now the Arab mayor can swing any vote in favor of the Arabs who now have six members to an equal number for the Jews.

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Bishop Denounces Slander Broadcasts States Opinions In Letter to Rabbi

MILWAUKEE. — Slandering of Jews by "certain individuals, who to gain and hold a popular audience, degrade themselves and abuse the trust reposed in them by misquoting, half-quoting and actually insinuating untruths" has been denounced by Archbishop Samuel A. Stritch, member of the Administration Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference and Archbishop of Milwaukee, in a letter to Rabbi Joseph L. Baron.

"Now it is all too true," he wrote, "that your people have been the victim in our day of a wicked movement which distorts truth and gilds falsehood." In this Jews have the sympathy of Catholics, declared Archbishop Stritch, for "Catholics too are the victims of vile propaganda and a very hatred of truth." He exhorted sane men to "keep cool heads" in the face of nefarious propaganda, and guide public opinion in safe channels pointing out that in the end "truth does conquer."

Nathan Laski, president of the Manchester Community, sharply criticized the assertion, terming it "insulting to the noblest traditions of the country."

The Daily Express, however, complimented Lord Dufferin as a "true friend of the Jews" declaring editorially that "Organizations striving to flood Britain

with Jewish refugees should listen to this warning and act upon it."

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
