### Follow The Leader

In this game of "Follow the Leader" which Hitler has copyrighted, Russia is proving an apt pupil. Even anti-Semitism, which the Soviets supposedly have outlawed, is sacrificed on the altar of convenience. A cable from Edgar Ansel Mowrer, Paris correspondent of the Chicago Daily News, who has been always been sympathetic to Russia neatly demonstrates this about face.

"In their anxiety to please the Germans," Mowrer wrote, "the Russians even went so far as to exclude Jews from the banquet that had been planned to celebrate the great event."

"The banquet was canceled when the German Foreign Minister, Colonel Joachim von Ribbentrop insisted upon leaving Moscow immediately."

There was a time when the U. S. S. R. sent Jewish ambassadors to the Court of St. Hitler—Kretinski and Suritz have both been "liquidated." But times have changed and Jewish commissars must not offend the fine sensibilities of the former champagne traveling salesman.

### A New Horror

To the already difficult work of rescue, a new horror has been added in the shape of, as the London Times puts it, "ships crammed with so-called 'illegal' refugees drifting about the seas and unable to find any place to land their despairing and often starving cargoes."

"So-called" in the Times leader is really the operative word. We can only hope that the Colonial office has taken note of it. For the burden of Mr. Malcolm MacDonald's defence of his suspension of the immigration decree was that the problem of what he called illegal immigration had necessitated his ban on the entry of legal immigrants into Palestine.

The Times recognizes, as apparently Mr. MacDonald does not, that to term illegal the actions of helpless, hunted refugees seeking to escape from the concentration camp or the grave, hardly demonstrates an accurate understanding of legality.

Sir John Hope-Simon emphasizes in his report that the adherence to the present principle of dealing with refugees case by case means that a victim may be in a concentration camp or in his grave before his turn comes. In this tragic situation it is clear that the Colonial Office restrictions on immigration into Palestine are but euphemistic death-sentences.

The tragedy is heightened by the fact that it is so needless. Tens of thousands of homes are waiting in Palestine ready to be filled by people who may be given a new life and a new future in a land in which they can be free. Only a Government fiat stands in the way.

We can only hope that these two reports will be used by the Colonial office as indispensable handbooks when they come to consider the question of Jewish immigration into Palestine.

BRUSSELS. — Charges that the German Ambassador in Belgium had given orders to Belgian firms to dismiss Jews and that Gestapo agents in the country were hounding refugees are made by Socialist deputies in Parliament. Premier Pierlot says the government will put a stop to these activities if they threaten the country's existence.

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## Kuhn Insists Bund Still Battles Reds

### Speaks Before Yaphank Group

YAPHANK, L. I. — Speaking in German before more than 10,000 members of the German-American Bund meeting here last week at Camp Siegfried, Fritz Kuhn, international leader of the Bund, pledged the organization to continued opposition to international Communism "in all shapes," despite the nonaggression pact between Germany and Russia.

"Hitler made that pact for economic rather than political reasons," Kuhn said. He declared that an "aristocratic caste" in England, "under control of international Jewry," tried to encircle Germany by coming to terms with Russia, but that Hitler upset this plan.

Relative to the present European crisis, Kuhn said that the Bund was an American organization and wanted to go on record in urging this country to keep out of foreign entanglements.

## Refugee Follows Wife to Death

NEW YORK. — Albert Aarons, 53, a German lawyer, brought his wife and two sons, Daniel, 14, and Frank, 11, to this country to escape the Nazis.

Last July his wife died from an overdose of a sleeping potion.

Last week Mr. Aarons put a noose around his neck, tied the other end to a door knob and threw himself to the floor, breaking his neck.

## Indian Jews Protest Anti-Semite Paper

BOMBAY. — The Jewish community has protested to the Government against anti-Jewish incitement by a new paper, in three languages, founded after the recent visit of Dr. Hjarner Schacht, German economic expert.

The complaint declared that such incitement violated the provision of the Indian Penal Code prohibiting the arousing of hatred against any class of British subjects. The paper is modelled after Der Stuermer, German anti-Semitic weekly.

## Zionists Quit Convention; Pass Resolution Criticizing England

### Forget Partitioning Questions; To Support British Democracy

GENEVA. — British Jews who had come here to aid organizing opposition to Great Britain's Palestine policy went home last week — to fight for her if war came. Poland's Jews went home by way of Yugoslavia and South-eastern Europe to avoid passing through Germany.

The Jewish delegates had met here in the twenty-first biennial Zionist Congress. They were prepared to take firm action to oppose the partition of Palestine.

With European peace threatened, they adjourned after passing a resolution criticizing British action.

## Crisis Forces Dr. Berger To Postpone His Trip Home

In a dispatch from Paris, received this week at the offices of The Herald, it was learned that Dr. Ilie Berger, a delegate to the recent Zionist Congress held in Geneva, has been forced to postpone his return to this country until September 13. The message stated that because of the tremendous exodus of American tourists, caused by the European crisis, an earlier passage booking was impossible. Dr. Ber-

ger was also forced to cancel his scheduled visit, via plane, to Bucharest, since all air travel has been discontinued.

A memorandum was received from the Doctor on the Congress, in which he reported: "Gathered here from all parts of the world are delegates who hope to solve the Jewish problem. One listens to endless speeches—views of our Eastern and Central European (Continued on page 4)

## Nazi-Soviet Pact Vindicates Jews

WASHINGTON. — Chairman Martin Dies of the House Committee on Un-American Activities this week used the impending RussoGerman non-aggression treaty to refute an anti-Semite's assertion that Jews were responsible for Communism.

Henry D. Allen of Pasadena, Cal., former member of the Silver Shirts and organizer of the defunct American White Guards, testified that Jews started Communism in Russia. "That probably explains why Germany and Russia are getting together now," commented Dies caustically.

## Rabbi Calls Principle 'A Precious Heritage'

WILLIAMSTOWN. — In an address on the general topic of "Community Experiments in Week-day Religious Education," Dr. David de Sola Pool, Rabbi of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue in New York, declared:

"The American principle of the rigid separation of church and state has become an even more precious heritage today under the darkening shadow of increased state control over religious organizations and teachings."

"The Church," he said, "must function in complete independence of the State as represented in the public school system if it is to preserve its integrity and freedom."

## Italy Shuts Down Refugee Committees

### Lists New Firms For Aryanization

ROME. — The Italian authorities have ordered shutdown of the Jewish Refugee Committee headquarters in Milan and branches throughout the country. No reason for the action was given, although it was believed connected with the recent entry of more than 1,000 German Jewish refugees on six-month tourist permits.

The Government, it was understood, is anxious to discourage entry of refugees with insufficient funds at their disposal. The authorities also contend that there is no need for a refugee committee since all foreign Jews legally were supposed to have left the country before March 12 last.

A second list of Jewish firms scheduled for "Aryanization" under the Italian anti-Semitic legislation was made public. The list includes four industrial enterprises with a personnel of 2,125 employees.

## Declares Hitler Lacks Knowledge

NEW YORK. — Adolf Hitler does not understand the nature of either peace or war in the world in which he is living today, Dr. James T. Shotwell, professor of International Relations at Columbia University, and director of the division of economics and history of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, said in a radio address last week.

Dr. Shotwell also said that Hitler never had grasped the economic consequences of war, especially those of the World War.

## 2000 Danzig Jews Grow Apprehensive

### Fear Internation Or Forced Labor

DANZIG. — Two thousand Danzig Jews followed the European situation with grave apprehension this week. They believed that if war broke out many would be sent to concentration camps or be forced to labor.

Until foreign exchange restrictions were inaugurated two months ago their emigration had progressed so well they had hoped to evacuate their whole community, except for 300 aged members, before the end of the year.

The Jewish community supports 1000 destitutes, with the aid of United States contributions.

The last of their number to leave Danzig were 26 children, who emigrated to England last week. Two hundred children remain.

A month ago 45 Jews were drafted to clear land near the Polish frontier. They were recalled recently because of the crisis. The only Jews in Danzig who now are permitted to work are two physicians, a dentist, a lawyer and six skilled laborers.

## Border Guards Use Man as Punch Bag

WARSAW. — The tragedy of a 67-year-old German Jew, Isaac Gotzler, who was driven four times across the Reich-Polish frontier and beaten was disclosed in an official report of Polish frontier guards to headquarters.

Gestapo agents forced Gotzler across the frontier near Boruszwici under the threat of shooting him, after stripping him of all his belongings. He was sent back by Polish frontier guards, whereupon he was beaten by Germans and again forced across the border.

This was repeated four times, after which Gotzler, covered with blood, was bandaged by Polish guards. When the Germans, called by the Poles, arrived, Gotzler fainted and was turned over unconscious, to the Nazis.

## Fr. Coughlin Orders Boys to 'Pipe Down'

NEW YORK. — Father Charles E. Coughlin, whose disavowal of a scheduled parade of his followers in New York had led to its cancellation, has also promised to instruct distributors of his magazine Social Justice to cease using inflammatory tactics, it was announced by the Friends of Democracy, Inc.

L. M. Birkhead, director of the Friends, had wired Coughlin, following the priest's repudiation of the proposed parade, asking him also to repudiate the violent remarks of his followers and their distribution of "vicious and obscene anti-Semitic pamphlets."



## Last Payment Made On Vengeance Fine

BERLIN. — German Jews have completed paying 20 per cent of their fortunes toward the fine of \$400,000,000 levied in vengeance for the shooting in Paris of Ernst Vom Rath, embassy secretary, by a Polish Jewish youth.

Most Jews paid the fourth and final installment of the levy a week ago, and there was no final rush when the deadline was reached. Jews who emigrated since last November, when Rath was shot, paid their shares of the fines as they left.

BUDAPEST. — The Justice Ministry has taken under consideration a draft of regulations designed to speed Hungary's drastic anti-Jewish law which provides for restriction of Jews in the country's economic, political and cultural life.

## Hospital Service Effective Sept. 1

Hospitalization under the Blue Cross group plan became available last midnight for those groups which completed their enrollment during August, Stanley H. Saunders, executive director of the Hospital Service Corporation, announced last night.

This marks the final step in making available to the people of Rhode Island a hospitalization plan operated by a non-profit organization as a community service. For a year, preliminary steps have been taken one by one. Local committees conducted a program of education. The State Legislature acted unanimously to permit non-profit plans to be set up. The Corporation was formed, and on August 10 enrollment actually began.

Now, with several groups formed among persons all over the State, and other groups rapidly applying for permission to enroll, hospitalization is finally available to all those who enrolled during August. The same rule will be followed in the future, and groups formed during September will be eligible for hospital care for accident or new illnesses on October 1.

## Famous Yeshiva Destroyed By Nazis

### Terror-Stricken Jews Flee Area

PRAGUE. — The world-famous Pressburg rabbinical seminary in Bratislava was destroyed this week following a cold pogrom started by Nazi hooligans, reliable sources disclosed. All books and valuable manuscripts were burned.

As a result of the pogrom a terror-stricken Jewish populace started an exodus from Slovakian provincial towns fearing that the terrorism which took place was but the beginning of further violence and destruction. Jews were said to be storming foreign consulates in an effort to obtain visas and those whose applications were denied are said to be fleeing to the small towns, where anti-Semitism is not so violent.

In Bruenn, the advices say, two Jews died as a result of injury sustained during a terrorist pogrom during which young anti-Semites stormed the largest Jewish bookshop conducted by Dr. Fleisch, and destroyed more than five hundred volumes of rare editions.

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## Newspapermen Hit Fr. Coughlin's Talks Condemned As Foe of Democracy

SAN FRANCISCO. — The sixth annual convention of the American Newspaper Guild adopted resolutions condemning anti-Semitism and denouncing Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, but refused to recommend disciplinary action against Coughlin by his religious superiors.


The resolution on anti-Semitism scored "barbarous persecutions" in Germany and attempts to divide "supporters of democracy on racial and religious lines" in this country, and resolved "that we take measures to have introduced and caused to be passed all legislation" in defense of racial and religious liberty.

The Coughlin resolution condemned him as "enemy of progressive unionism, a harbinger of Fascism, a would-be strike-breaker." The original resolution, introduced by Jack Morris of Chicago, was amended on suggestion of President Heywood Broun to omit the words "Father," "Reverend" and all reference to the Catholic Church on the ground that action to crack down on Coughlin would "open the door to discipline on the part of many Catholic clergymen who might be on the other extreme."

## Labor Federation Flays Jew-Hatred

NEW YORK. — The 76th annual convention of the New York State Federation of Labor adopted a resolution condemning all individuals, publications and organizations which "are seeking to divide the labor movement by spreading anti-Semitism."

As originally introduced the resolution named Father Charles E. Coughlin, the magazine Social Justice and the Christian Front and denounced them as advance agents of Fascism. The resolution committee recommended that the resolution in that form be referred to the executive board. After discussion on the floor, the resolution was amended to eliminate all names.

## Refugee Conference Postponed to October

WASHINGTON. — The White House conference on the refugee problem, originally scheduled to be held the first week in September has been postponed until October 16 or 17 it was learned here.

Lord Winterton, chairman of the Intergovernmental Refugee Committee and five committee vice-chairmen representing the United States, the Netherlands, the Argentine and Brazil, have been invited to attend the conference in Washington by President Roosevelt.

## Britain Moves to Halt Illegal Immigration Builds 12 New Guard Stations

JERUSALEM. — The government is constructing 12 new coast guard stations as part of an intensified effort to check illegal immigration. The stations, six of which already have been completed, will be located at regular intervals along Palestine's 200-mile coastline. Each will be manned by crews of six Englishmen and six Palestinian's attached to the mounted or motorized police. Powerful searchlights will sweep the coastal waters from these posts to detect ships attempting to land refugees illegally.

Unofficial estimates reveal that more than 6,000 immigrants have tried to enter the country without the proper documents. They came on 19 vessels and 1,200 were sent back on the same ships. About 4,700 were arrested but finally permitted to remain in Palestine.

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

NEW YORK. — We're bound to get in it if war breaks out in Europe, Admiral Stirling declared this week. So, the thing to do, says he, is to get into it right at the start to make sure of winning.

To Testify Before Committee

WASHINGTON. — "General Krivitsky" whose real name is Samuel Ginsberg, will testify before the Dies Committee concerning his knowledge of Communist activities, it was announced this week. "Krivitsky" who claims he was a Soviet general will be deported after testifying.

To Help Unemployed

SAN FRANCISCO. — A production-for-use program financed by the State of California to help unemployed to help themselves will be launched soon. Working co-operatives will contain 450 on relief and 50 others.

Pay Envelopes Falter

WASHINGTON. — The national payroll is up 5 per cent for the first half of 1939 compared with last year, the Commerce Department reported this week. Even though investors got less, the U. S. total income gained 3 per cent.

Scorn Assistance

NEW YORK. — College on the cuff doesn't appeal to the great majority of students polled by a Columbia professor. He discovered that the students prefer part-time jobs to university assistance or Federal or State aid to get them through.

Hope For Revolution

NEW YORK. — A bloody Fascist revolution is advocated by leaders of Knights of the White Camellias, once allied to the K.K.K. in a meeting held in the Bronx. Other speakers said that present officials should be hanged from the nearest telegraph poles.

Predicts Tough Winter

WASHINGTON. — A tough winter is in store for unemployed, a WPA commissioner said this week. Unless business picks up and hires more than a million who were removed from relief rolls, there'll have to be a tightening of belts, he says.

To Continue Resistance

CHUNKING, CHINA. — Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek declared this week that China would fight on regardless of the turn of events in Europe. "China, not relaxing her resistance to Japanese aggression despite the turn in the international situation will cope with the rapidly changing world developments in accordance with established policy," said the Generalissimo's message.

Finds Black Diamonds

WASHINGTON. — The Smithsonian Institute said this week that it had found black diamonds, rarest of jewels, in a meteor which struck in Arizona thousands of years ago. Recovery of such diamonds is not commercially practical because the cost of cutting them out would be greater than their value.

Yorkville Apprehensive

NEW YORK. — For the first time, German Yorkville felt this week that perhaps the infallible Fuehrer had gone too far to retreat. "Up to now," one man said, "it was mostly the Juden. One expects the Jews today to hate the Germans. But there was enough work to do without worrying about the Jews. Now it's different. Only this the French and Irish have decided that Germans can't do their work. I guess I'll have to go back to Germany." Another, a woman, offered the hope that "a little war between Poland and Germany only" would help.

Book Banned

KANSAS CITY. — The Board of Education here has ordered the public library to stop circulating John Steinbeck's "The Grapes of Wrath" because a board member called the book "obscene and indecent."

Sign of the Times

LONDON. — The Anti-Nazi movie "Professor Mamlock" which film censors had barred, will now be shown in theatres here. Made in Russia before the Communist-Nazi pact, it depicts the sufferings of a cultured Jew under the German Nazis. In New York at the Russian theatre . . .

Cross on L. I.

MATTITUCK, N. Y. — A blazing ten-foot cross which could be seen for miles across the Long Island countryside attracted hundreds of residents to a small hill near the Mattituck High School.

Near the cross were found two signs, bearing the inscriptions, "The Jews are invading Mattituck. Look at our beaches," and "Jews are not wanted in Mattituck — K.K.K."

Police were unable to discover who had erected the cross and the signs, but launched an investigation.

FREUD BETTER

LONDON. — Prof. Sigmund Freud, 83-year-old founder of psychoanalysis, is reported improved from a serious illness which has kept him confined to the house for several weeks. The daughter of the famed Viennese exile said his condition was not causing anxiety and that he was reading all the newspapers and was "very active."


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# Britain Defends White Paper Against Commission's Findings

## Contend Obligations to Arabs Are as Binding as to Jews

LONDON. — Exactly three months after it issued the White Paper on Palestine, the British Government was called upon to defend its policy against the findings of the majority of the Mandates Commission that it violates the terms and spirit of the Mandate.

The same argument which Colonial Secretary MacDonald used in recent debates in the House of Commons on the Palestine question were served up again by the Government in its comment upon the report of the Mandates Commission to the Council of the League of Nations. The principal point in the Government's statement centered around the contention that its obligations to the Arabs are as binding as to the

Jews. The Government denies that under the constitutional proposals of the White Paper the Jewish minority will be subordinated to the Arab majority. Referring to the ultimate form of the independent state proposed for Palestine, the British Government said that it regards a federal constitution as a definite possibility among other possibilities.

It is understood that Colonial Secretary MacDonald will proceed to Geneva as a delegate to the meeting of the Council of the League which will take place on September 8. If the Council does not accept the White Paper it is to be referred back to Parliament in accordance with the Government's promise to do so.

# German Refugee Builds New Industry; Has 150 Employees

NEW YORK. — A stoutish, florid man of 50, who expertly maneuvered a silver-rimmed monocle, sat one day recently in a tiny office strewn with wood shavings. He said, "I regret I came to America twenty years too late."

Then, sensing that his statement required amplification — "Herr Hitler took all my worldly possessions. He drove me away from my homeland. Yet I am glad. Today I am in your America, and have the good fortune to provide work for 150 of your countrymen who were unemployed. Have I not the right to be happy?"

### No Protests Allowed

The speaker was Martin Lipschutz, formerly of Berlin, and presently a resident of Jackson Heights. The fact that his ancestors had served Germany in industry and war during many years, and that he himself had been a captain in the German forces during the World War was of no consequence, Mr. Lip-

schutz was told. He could protest, but there was always the concentration camp, he was reminded.

Realizing the futility of his position, he decided to try for a new start in the United States. Immediately, though, he was faced with a problem—the German government would allow him to take only 10 marks (\$4 above his passage) out of the country . . .

### Thought of Plan

Four dollars offered little comfort to one arriving in a strange country, without friends or relatives, and he was about to give up in despair. Then came an idea. He had applied for permission to come to New York. California, he determined, was 3000 miles farther away, and required a larger amount for passage. Revising his application Mr. Lipschutz was granted permission to take out an additional sum for

his expenses. His problem, thus, was solved. He got off the boat in New York and pocketed the additional sum for "working capital."

### Sought Work

Here he sought work as a tile-maker, wood-worker, millhand and in other occupations allied with his former business. But there were no jobs. Eventually he visited the smoke houses of meat-packing concerns, and promised, in return for a job to smoke their products to a finer flavor, better color and with less shrinkage.

"In Germany," Mr. Lipschutz explained, "meat and fish smoking was a vocation. Here I decided it should be a vocation." Pursuing his new vocation, Mr. Lipschutz obtained jobs at various packers, staying in each place however, only long enough to prove the superiority of his process. After a year, he had completed a tour of all the eastern packing plants and now was ready to go to work for himself. Armed with testimonials to prove that he could prepare wood that would smoke meats and fish as they never had been smoked before, he set out to finance his project.

### Financing Simple

"It wasn't hard to see 'big shots,' about my project," Mr. Lipschutz related. I found little difficulty getting the \$50,000 I needed. Men with money saw quickly that my process filled a need and had unlimited possibilities and were ready to assist me."

Mr. Lipschutz' formula is a secret, but he revealed that he uses 10 varieties of wood with a base of hickory, chopped in a special manner and treated with chemicals.

### Different Here

As he was being interviewed he constantly looked out of the window of his dingy office to what ordinarily would be the front yard of his factory. Three members of Troop F of the Police Department's mounted squadron, stationed in a building adjoining his plant were exercising the horses.

"In Germany," Mr. Lipschutz observed, "mounted policemen guarded my factory, too. But it is so different here, I'm glad."


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## Obituary

## Man Without Home Shuttles Between Miami and Havana

MIAMI. — Haim Flukman, man without a country, who has shuttled back and forth between the United States and Cuba as each nation denied him entry was ordered deported again last week. Immigration officials directed

that he be placed aboard the steamship Florida when it sails for Havana, hoping that he finally may be permitted to land there and join his family.

Flukman, a forty-seven year old Russian-born Jew, spent the last four weeks in the county jail here while the Florida was tied up by a strike.

He lost his status as a Russian in 1923 when he entered Cuba and became a permanent resident there. In 1933 he was one of seventeen aliens apprehended in the Florida Keys after being smuggled from Cuba. He served a brief sentence for illegal entry, forfeiting any chance of American citizenship, and was ordered deported.

Cuba declined to readmit him. Since the United States had no diplomatic relations with Russia at the time, Flukman remained here under a deportation order until May, 1939. Then he voluntarily went to Cuba to rejoin his wife and four children. Two months later Cuban immigration authorities arrested and deported him.

## Hadassah Women Become "Godmother"

NEW YORK. — Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, learned here last week that it had become a "godmother" for the first infant to be born in its new million dollar medical center on Mt. Scopus, Jerusalem.

In a report on the new project received from Mrs. S. W. Halprin, former president and Palestine representative of Hadassah, who is in this country for an indefinite stay, the story of the first baby to be born in the new institution was reported for the first time to its 85,000 "American sponsors."

## Hungary Enforces New Anti-Jew Laws

BUDAPEST. — It was reported that the Cabinet is considering regulations to enforce the drastic second anti-Jewish law and that the regulations, a draft of which was submitted to the Cabinet, will be published in the Official Gazette if no opposition is encountered.

Upwards of 23,000 persons have already been affected by the anti-Jewish legislation and between 17,000 and 18,000 industrial employes, under the terms of recent anti-Jewish laws, will be replaced within the next two and a half to four years. Approximately 45,000 pengoes in severance compensation have been paid discharged employes whose dismissal will affect 54,000 dependents, expected to become destitute.
