Briefs

DR. MARCOS MOSHINSKY, 40-year-old Jewish nuclear scientist who was brought to Mexico City when he was a child, was awarded there one of the Government's three annual prizes for scientific research. The presentation was made by President Adolfo Lopez Mateos at a ceremony at the University of Mexico, where Dr. Moshinsky has held the post as professor of physics since 1949.

ONLY TWO FIFTHS OF THE German viewers of a series of TV films on Hitler considered the presentation of the Nazi regime as "correct", and one-fifth of the viewers thought the presentation gave an "incorrect" picture, according to polls conducted by the Allensbach Public Opinion Institute. Some 80 per cent of the adult German population saw the films.

PRESIDENT ITZHAK BEN ZVI, addressing the opening session of the tenth annual International Press Institute in Tel Aviv, termed Israel a natural bridge between the continents. The parley was attended by 130 editors from thirty countries.

MINISTER OF POSTS, BINYAMIN Mintz, former Deputy Speaker of Knesset and leader of the Poale Agudat Israel Party, died recently at the age of 58 after a brief illness. A native of Poland, Mr. Mintz was elected to Knesset in 1949. He was a journalist, writer and an active figure in religious circles. He was named Minister of Posts last year.

LONG TERM PLANS TO MEET the nation-wide shortage of Hebrew school teachers and a program to intensify adult education in the country were adopted in New York at a conference of the American Association for Jewish Education. The two-day parley was marked by expression of divergent views on the question of Federal aid to religious schools. Among the main topics discussed at the parley was the teacher shortage.

LEGALIZATION OF BINGO IN Illinois was opposed by the Chicago Board of Rabbis in a statement to the effect that while the end of the game may be desirable, the means "are at best questionable and at worst morally reprehensible."

BERNARD SANDER, 61, AN insurance salesman, was sentenced to five weeks in jail on charges of defamation of the Jews. The Cologne Criminal Court found him guilty of distributing a leaflet by the Swedish anti-Semite, Einar Abreg, titled "Proof that the Jewish Allegation that Hitler Gassed 6,000,000 Jews is a Big Lie."

A MEASURE INTRODUCED IN the Quebec legislature to allocate \$1,500,000 for the Montreal Protestant School Commission provides for the first time the possibility of grants for pupils of Jewish high schools.

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### Ben-Gurion Says Talks With French Officials 'Fruitful, Satisfactory'

PARIS — Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion left for Israel with a parting statement that his talks with French leaders in Paris had been "fruitful and satisfactory" and that his conversations with President DeGaulle had been the most fruitful in his four-country mission.

Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's foreign minister, remained in Paris for further talks. She met for more than an hour with French Minister Maurice Couve De Murville at the French Foreign Office. She told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, at the close of the meeting, that the talks had been "positive and pleasant" and that the talks had been a continuation of the discussions started by Mr. Ben-Gurion with French Premier Debre and with the French Foreign Minister.

The two Foreign Ministers were reported to have discussed French support for Israel's desire to be associated with the six-nation European Common Market and Support during the forthcoming United Nations General Assembly on the Arab refugee problem. The two diplomats also reviewed world developments and the situation in the Middle East, including recently publicized differences between the Soviet Union and the United Arab Republic.

Mr. Ben-Gurion's Paris visit ended a tour which also took him to Canada, the United States and Britain.

#### PLEDGE FRIENDSHIP

PARIS — Prime Minister Ben-Gurion and President de Gaulle were reported by official sources to have reached "complete understanding on all subjects" during 70 minutes of conversations.

### Charge Israeli Machine Guns Resold To Portugese

JERUSALEM — Three of Israel's political parties — Herut, the Liberal-Party and Ahdut Avodah — demanded that the Knesset urgently debate reports that Israeli-made "Uzi" sub-machine guns, originally sold to West Germany, have been re-sold by the Germans to the Portugese authorities fighting independence forces in Angola, Africa.

The story appeared in the London Observer, and is believed by Israel officials to have been planted as deliberately anti-Israel propaganda by Franz von Leers, the ex-Nazi who serves the United Arab Republic as a psycho-

logical warfare expert against Jews and Israel.

Israel circles reported they have received assurances from the West German Government at Bonn, denying that any of the Israeli arms acquired by Germany have been sold to the Portugese. On the other hand, Defense Ministry circles here pointed out that Israel's arms deal with West Germany contains no clauses about possible re-sale of the Israel-made weapons to a third party.

Various stories accusing Israel of collaboration with reactionary regimes have recently cropped up

in the world press, and Israel has traced the origin of many of these stories to Spain, where von Leers has contacts with former Nazi war criminals who have asylum there. One story alleged that the French rebels, who tried to stage an anti-DeGaulle coup in Algeria, had presumably obtained arms "from Spain, Portugal, and Israel."

The Arab purpose for spreading these canards, it is said here, is to create anti-Israel hostility among Africans, as well as to besmirch Israel's reputation among liberal circles in Western countries.

### Calls Assimilation Greatest Peril To Jewish Survival

NEW YORK — The head of the Zionist Organization of America said last Saturday that assimilation was "the greatest peril to Jewish survival," and called on American Jews to strengthen the Jewish school system according to Irving Spiegel of the New York Times.

Max Bressler of Chicago, president of the organization, contended that American-Jewish communities had "failed to assess the true value of Jewish education." He said the Jewish future in this country depended on an "intensive Hebrew education, which is indispensable for the preservation and development of Jewish life and Jewish tradition."

He was one of several speakers at the opening session of a two-day national conference on Jewish education, sponsored by the Z. O. A., at the Carnegie Endowment Center for International Peace, 345 East Forty-fifth Street.

To insure what he termed the "survival of our people in this blessed American free society," Mr. Bressler urged the establishment of networks of Jewish schools where "our children can imbibe Jewish learning alongside their secular education."

"By blending the two cultures, the student learns to be a completely integrated American and Jew," he said. "Being equally informed, he finds the synthesis of moral and ethical teaching of our sages and of the founders and builders of America."

Mr. Bressler said the American-Jewish community "is beginning somewhat belatedly to realize that without Jewish education there can be no Jewish creative living in America nor a full partnership with the State of Israel."

He called attention to the enrollment of 550,000 Jewish children in Jewish schools in this country. However, he added, more than 50 per cent of young Jews do "not know the Hebrew alphabet and their Jewishness is identified only as that of accident of their birth."

### Central Conference Of Reform Judaism To Meet

NEW YORK—The Central Conference of American Rabbis representing form Judaism in the U. S. and Canada, will hold its five-day annual convention here at the New Yorker Hotel beginning June 20.

It will be the fourth time since its founding in 1889 that the conference has convened in this city. The conference was founded by the late Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise.

The convention will open with a presidential message to be delivered by the Rev. Dr. Bernard J. Bamberger, rabbi Tefla, 250 East Seventy-ninth Street.

It will also hear an address by Elihu Ellath, Israel's first Ambassador to the United States and more recently Ambassador to Britain.

## Says Kennedy, Ben-Gurion Found No Arab Solution

WASHINGTON — The State Department issued a statement this week, emphasizing that "the question of an understanding" between President Kennedy and Israel's Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, as to a "specific solution" of the Palestine Arab refugee problem, "did not arise" during the talk last week in New York between the two statesmen.

Prime Minister Ben-Gurion, prior to his departure from New York for London, told reporters that he had reached "a very large measure of agreement" with President Kennedy with regard to the solution of the Arab refugee problem and that President Kennedy had a plan for the solution of this problem. He added that if the Arabs would accept this plan, "there will be a solution."

The State Department, in its statement last week, referred to a communique issued on May 10 by the United Nations Conciliation Commission, and emphasized that the U. S. Government has consistently supported the UN resolutions which envisage the solution of the Palestine refugee problem through repatriation or compensation. "It will fully support moves made by the Conciliation Commission in accordance with them," the State Department declared.

At the same time, the statement revealed that President

Kennedy, in his talks with the Israel Prime Minister, "stressed the importance of Israel's cooperating with such efforts as may be initiated by the UN Palestine Conciliation Commission."

### GET PRISON TERMS

AURICH, West Germany — Five former Nazis, including a physician and two police men, were sentenced here last week to varying terms of hard labor for their part in the shooting of 220 Jews in Lithuania in June 1941. The sentences ranged from three to six years.

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# Feuer Protests Visa Abuse By Adolf Eichmann's Son

WASHINGTON — An investigation of the use of an American visitor's visa by Nicolas Eichmann, son of Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann, to spread anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi propaganda in the United States has been asked by national commander I. L. Feuer, of the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S.A., it was revealed here.

In a letter to Secretary of State Dean Rusk, the veterans group sent the State Department evidence of anti-Semitic propaganda disseminated in Washington by Nicolas Eichmann. He is here "under the excuse of writing a book, compensation for which, presumably, is coming from Jack Anderson and/or Drew Pearson, employer of Anderson."

Feuer told Secretary Rusk that "When we permit Nicolas Eichmann to use our press and other public relations media as a forum and opportunity to conduct un-American, anti-Jewish, and pro-Nazi propaganda, thereby facilitating the commercial exploitation of this Nazi aberration by syndicated newsmen seeking profit through 'sensationalism', we distort the image of the United States . . ."

Feuer pointed out that "Nicolas Eichmann, 25 years of age, has not been, and obviously cannot be, accused of the war crimes committed by his father and other Nazis when he, Nicolas Eichmann, was but a child. However, this fact does not give him the right to abuse the privileges of a visitor's visa, issued by the U. S. Consular authorities in Argentina."

Nicholas Eichmann, in a Washington press interview, claimed that his father, now on trial in Israel, had "saved the Jews who are now living very healthy, very rich maybe. Will they testify? No.

## Capehart Attacks U. S. Supporters

WASHINGTON — Sen. Homer E. Capehart (R., Ind.), last week injected an attack on Israel and "pressure groups pushing U.S. foreign policies in special interest directions" into a Senate debate on foreign policy.

While the issue before the Senate was relations with Cuba and the "Tractors for Freedom Committee," Capehart denounced "private individuals" who "take it upon themselves to speak for our Government." Capehart said that Chairman J. W. Fulbright (D., Ark.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee "aptly summed this up last year in discussing the role of some of the Israelis in the Suez Canal dispute."

Capehart quoted from an attack by Fulbright on Americans who backed Israel in the Arab boycott and the blockade controversy, especially the picketing of the Egyptian ship Cleopatra in New York harbor. (The ship was picketed by an American seamen's union because the Arabs discriminated against American vessels that visited Israeli ports.)

Referring to supporters of Israel, Capehart quoted the Fulbright allegation that "despite the official actions of the United States, we find private groups proceeding by coercive devices of their own to interfere with the official activities of our Government in the field of foreign policy." (Under the Logan Act cited, convicted persons may be fined "not more than \$5,000 or imprisoned not more than three years, or both.)

Feuer said: "It is not the view of our organization that the sins of the father should be placed upon the son. We do, however, feel that the Bureau of Immigration should immediately investigate the matter of Eichmann's abuse of the visa."

The veterans' leader made a point that Nicolas Eichmann was jeopardizing American relations with many friendly foreign nations, including NATO members whose citizens suffered under Nazism, and Israel."

It was also termed an apparent "breach of American hospitality for a visitor to impugn . . . the loyalty of any group of American citizens or to inject the poison of Nazi anti-Jewishness, thus taking advantage of his hosts."

The JWV commander added: "Our nation is currently beset with native racist agitators. Why should we import more agitators from abroad?"

## Riot Action Cited By Jewish League

NEW YORK — Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy was last week praised by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith for his "prompt, decisive, and effective steps" in seeking to preserve law and order in areas of Alabama disturbed by racial conflicts.

A telegram from Henry Edward Schultz, the League's national chairman to the Attorney General, said that "your actions have profound meaning to the future of America and to all the people of the world."

"Decent Americans North and South have been saddened and humiliated by the savagery on the part of hoodlums and rampant mobs in Alabama," Schultz said. "Those who defy the law of the land and seek to deprive others of their most basic rights do completely misinterpret the meaning of the United States and its historic role."

"We are heartened by the prompt, decisive, and effective steps you are taking to assure the preservation of law in Montgomery and other disturbed areas. In so doing, you are helping to guarantee the freedom and security of all Americans," Schultz added.

## Services Varying Widely In Israel

NEW YORK — In Jerusalem, weekly services are held in a meeting house. In Nazareth, worship is conducted in homes, and, on occasion, in rented halls.

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## Israel's Economy Stood Still In '60

JERUSALEM — The bank of Israel issued a report last week stating that 1960 was a period of standstill in Israel's economic growth in contrast to 1959.

David Kohav, the bank's research director, told the press that "negative factors" affecting Israel's economic growth apparently had continued in the first five months of 1961. He said that while 1959 was a year of great expansion in production, resulting in a stabilization of prices and increases in exports, the 1960 increase in output was much slower. At the same time, an increase in consumption in 1960 brought an increase in imports and a consequent increase in Israel's trade imbalance.

The bank's principal recommendations, based on practically full employment in Israel, urged the Government not to rush into quantitative expansion of output at all costs. Instead, the bank proposed, the Government should take measures to increase efficiency in existing plants. The bank also argued for restraints in consumption and a limitation against further increases in imports.

## Rabbi Excoriates Indolence In U.S.

NEW YORK — The average American has lost the pioneering spirit of his forefathers, the Rev. Dr. William F. Rosenblum said last week.

Preaching at Temple Israel, 210 West Ninety-first Street, Rabbi Rosenblum asserted that all too frequently contemporary man "does not go somewhere — he waits to be taken and is sometimes 'taken in.'"

"It is because of this mental and social indolence," the rabbi declared, "that movements like the John Birch Society can lure into their ranks some of the business, political and even religious leaders, good men all who are just too soft or too tired intellectually to think for themselves.

"It is this same general inertness that makes so many of our American youth the easy bait of the beatniks and dissidents who invade a California college campus or strum their strident guitars in some of our Greenwich Village cafes.

"It accounts for the small memberships in our national organizations for the study of world conditions, bodies in which members are expected to help 'think things through.'

"One of the weaknesses from which we Americans suffer as a nation is our tendency towards 'watchful waiting' in the hope that everything will be all right, the unwillingness to face facts because it is unpleasant to become disturbed.

"President Kennedy is appealing to the American people to get out of this lethargy and to realize that the only way to preserve our nation and or way of life is to recapture the willingness to be a nation of leaders and not followers and to pay the price in money, in inconveniences and every needed sacrifice which such leadership demands."

## Bill to Convert Works Passes in Parliament

JERUSALEM — Israel's Parliament approved into law a bill converting the Dead Sea Potash Works from a Government-owned operation to a private one. The vote was virtually unanimous.

The measure reduced the Government's ownership in the company to 35 percent thus enabling the new owners to obtain a \$25,000,000 loan from the World Bank in addition to a \$10,000,000 loan provided by an American financial firm the name of which was not disclosed.

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## What Is Role Of Zionists In Morocco?

New York --The United Jewish Appeal is continuing to stress the urgent need to "redeem" the Jews of Morocco through mass immigration to Israel as one of the main slogans of its fund drive for Israel this year.

Dr. Ruth Gruber, a UJA speaker from the New York headquarters, told 700 Canadian women at a luncheon in Winnipeg that "Morocco of 1961 is Nazi Germany of 1938." Dr. Gruber also informed her listeners that Moroccan Jews were living "in terror in a complete prison." She said that they were being denied communication with their kinsmen in Israel and were forbidden to leave the country.

"We are in Morocco through the Joint Distribution Committee which gets funds from the UJA," she said, and added that Moroccan Jewry "was crying out for redemption." (Israelite Press, Winnipeg, April 28)

The Jewish Newsletter (April 3) had reported a similar campaign for the evacuation of Moroccan Jews to Israel conducted by the UJA in Denver. Robert J. Gamzey, editor of the Intermountain Jewish News of Denver and leader of its UJA campaign, had claimed that the campaign was being conducted only locally and not with the direction or knowledge of the

central office of the UJA in New York, the Newsletter said.

Moroccan newspapers report that 20 young Jews, who were arrested in April for trying to leave the country for Israel, were sentenced to three months imprisonment. The conservative, pro-government newspaper, Al Alam, angrily declared that the Jews were "preparing to desert the fatherland" and that their emigration had been organized "by a network working for the Zionists in a foreign state in defiance of the laws, sovereignty and dignity of Morocco."

Another development has been taking place within the Jewish community of Morocco itself, the Jewish Newsletter claims. The letter states that Zionists have begun a campaign to discredit the anti-Zionist forces, who have shown surprising strength and organized under the banner of integrating the Jewish community into Moroccan society on an equal basis with the Moslems.

The Zionists accuse the integrationists of having entered into a political alliance with Moroccan Communists and of having turned into Government informers by handing over to police officials the names of the organizers of the illegal Zionist emigration network.



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## Site Needless Controversy Of Zionists And Ben-Gurion

On the eve of his visit to Canada and the United States, Prime Minister Ben-Gurion delivered himself of another blast at the Zionist movement in general and American Zionists in particular. What he said was merely a variation of his favorite theme that no Jew has a right to call himself a Zionist unless he is prepared to settle in Israel, and since there is no discernible sign that American Zionists are ready to transplant themselves to Israel they are not really Zionists.

As always, his critical remarks were widely publicized in the American press. But the various newspaper reports of what Mr. Ben-Gurion is supposed to have said also attribute to him certain statements which are downright shocking in their implication. Thus the New York Times quotes him as having said "about Jews in the United States who call themselves Zionists" that

"They are reluctant to say they are not Americans and not part of the American homeland like any other Americans."

It is almost incredible that Mr. Ben-Gurion should have given utterance to such an irresponsible statement. It is sheerest nonsense

to say that Zionists in America do not consider themselves full-fledged American citizens. This sentiment is of a piece with the slander disseminated by the dignitaries of the American Council for Judaism. Certainly Mr. Ben-Gurion has nothing in common with them.

The most charitable view we can take of Mr. Ben-Gurion's latest pronouncement is that he has somehow been misquoted or misinterpreted. No doubt, as has happened in the past, there will be further "explanations" and "clarifications." We suggest, however, that it would be best for all concerned if Mr. Ben-Gurion would desist from his extracurricular pastime of feuding with the Zionist Organization. His observations on that score invariably lead to needless controversy and confusion. The responsibilities attached to the office of Prime Minister of Israel are sufficiently onerous to engage all of his considerable talents and energies. As the head of the government of Israel, he has our unreserved admiration and esteem.

## Berlin Rabbi Decorated For Communist Loyalty

BERLIN — Rabbi Martin Riesenburger, spiritual leader of East Berlin's 960 Jews, was awarded the gold medal of the Patriotic Order of Merit, one of East Germany's top decorations, last week, to mark his 65th birthday which he celebrated earlier last month.

According to Jewish circles in West Berlin, Rabbi Riesenburger was honored not so much for his work in Jewish affairs as for the loyalty he has shown to East German Communist leader Walter Ulbricht. Rabbi Riesenburger has made pro-Communist declarations ever since he was appointed Jewish spiritual leader of East Berlin in 1953.

Most members of East Berlin's Jewish community are in their late sixties and seventies. After their experiences in Nazi concentration camps and periods of hidden illegality, most are too tired to care about politics. Outside of East Berlin, there are only about 600 other Jews remaining in all of East Germany, including a congregation of 100 Jews in Leipzig.

## Label Katz Calls For Group Unity

KIAMESHA LAKE, N. Y. — B'nai B'rith president Label A. Katz called for a "working unity" among American Jewish groups to assist Jewish communities abroad "whose status and future are critically affected by political upheavals and international conflicts."

Addressing 2,000 delegates at the 109th annual convention of B'nai B'rith District 1, Mr. Katz proposed a "three freedoms" goal in support of Jews living in the world's "trouble spots." He described these as:

The right of the Jew to physical security, spiritual freedom and equality of opportunity.

His right to emigrate freely "to any land that welcomes him," and

His right, "wherever he lives, to be himself — to be Jewish on his own terms."

He called the last "the most challenging freedom of all," since it provides that "Jews are free to be Jews not by chance but by choice." In urging "cooperative action" among Jewish groups, Mr. Katz said this "does not mean a dominant or monolithic group in Jewish life, but a working unity on issues that are a common concern of Jewish groups.

This concept, he added, was encouraged by Prime Minister Ben-Gurion in his meeting with the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, a consultative group of 18.

### HOLD MOCK TRIAL

SANTIAGO, CHILE — A mock "Eichmann Trial" sponsored by the law faculty of the Catholic University here was attended by hundreds of students last week. Two experts in criminal law, Prof. Etcheberri and Prof. Miranda, participated in the proceedings which are scheduled to be repeated because of the wide interest in the case.

### WOMAN MEETS FAMILY

NEW YORK — A Polish Catholic peasant girl, Valentina Zak, who had saved a Jewish family of four from Hitler's gas chambers was reunited with this family in New York. Valentina, who had married a Polish Zionist in Vienna after the war, went to Israel with him in 1948 and accepted Judaism.

## A Catalyst For American Judaism Pauses At Age Of 80

NEW YORK — A goateed religious philosopher who for more than fifty years has been a catalyst in American Jewish religious and communal life celebrated his eightieth birthday last Sunday according to Irving Spiegel of the New York Times.

He is Rabbi Mordecai Menahem Kaplan, blue-eyed and silver-haired, ever ready with a decisive opinion on nettling Jewish problems. In turn, he has been a rabbi, teacher, head of the Teachers Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, and Professor of Philosophies of Religion.

The future of the American Jews has been Professor Kaplan's lifetime preoccupation. The list of his acclaimed but controversial books on the subject is long.

In his role as teacher and former head of the Teachers Institute, he has instructed more than 1,000 ordained rabbis, and a like number of teachers who attended the institute at the Jewish Theological Seminary. His disciplines can be found in many parts of the free world, imparting the principles for which Professor Kaplan stands.

In his apartment at 415 Central Park West last week, Professor Kaplan set forth his general philosophy of Judaism, his own concept of Zionism. He has been a lifelong Zionist.

For Professor Kaplan, the American Jewish community is "distinctive and tangible" — one that must be "an evolving religious civilization without dogma."

"The Jewish heritage," he said, "exists for the Jewish people, not the Jewish people for the Jewish heritage."

Jewish civilization, he maintained, "consists of peoplehood, religion and culture — these are the modern equivalents of the traditional terms: House of Israel, God and Torah." Of paramount importance for him is the spiritual unity of American Jews, "even though they may differ theologically."

If Judaism is to survive, Professor Kaplan said, "it must be reconstructed; that is to say it must reckon with new conditions which have resulted from the political, economic, cultural and social changes which have taken place

in the world since the beginning of the nineteenth century."

Professor Kaplan termed it "unfortunate" that the Zionism of Dr. Theodor Herzl, the founder of political Zionism, had become identified in the minds of Jews with refugee aid "and nothing more."

Professor Kaplan said that Herzl and the early Zionist leaders all saw in Zionism "the drive for the renaissance of the spirit and culture of the Jewish people, so seriously threatened by the emancipation which opened the doors wide to assimilation."

However, he was quick to stress that it was a "mistaken notion that Jews must go to live in Israel, that Judaism cannot survive outside the Land" With Israel as "the core, and focus of world Jewry," the "Diaspora (Jews outside of Israel) can be inspired and replenished," he added.

"The fact that Jews yearned for centuries to return to the Land does not call for the complete ingathering of the exiles in our time," he said.

"With free nations offering Jews equality, 'exile' no longer carries the same connotation."

The Jewish people, he stressed, "owe their political allegiance to the various countries of which they are citizens."

Born in Russia, Dr. Kaplan came to this country as a boy and was ordained in 1903.

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

### SET FOR AN "ON THE CUFF" SPREE

We, as typical American families, are in the best shape in years to go on a new, major instalment buying spree -- and when and as we decide to do this, even to raise our on-the-cuff buying back to a "normal" rate, we'll give our economy a great new stimulus.

We've been trimming our instalment debts steadily for the last several months. The reduction in our instalment debts in these months has been the steepest in modern history.

We've brought no cheer whatsoever to the automakers and auto dealers through this entire period. Pay-backs on automobile instalment paper are the usual thing in the winter months, but we've continued whittling our auto debts right through the spring.

We've been following the unusual policy of reducing our instalment debts in the face of rising incomes. The normal trend is a rise in the debt load along with a rise in personal income, but just the opposite movement has been occurring recently. Personal incomes are way up, net instalment debt is down.

We are showing ourselves in excellent control of our personal debts. Delinquencies are minor and are becoming even more so.

Thus, assuming we haven't suddenly become disenchanted with buying big-ticket items on the instalment plan -- which I definitely am assuming -- we can, at any time, begin adding perceptibly to our debts to buy autos, appliances, furniture, etc., and virtually overnight spur activity in these vital industries.

This is a force for economic advance which is hidden in the statistics, which is hardly ever mentioned and yet which could be of vital significance as the months roll on. Here are some facts:

In the first four months of this year, consumer repayments on debt topped new borrowings by a hefty \$2 billion. Instalment debt also declined during the 1958 recession, but that recession was more severe than this one -- and the just-announced decline of \$139 million in instalment debt, seasonally adjusted, in April coincided with the start of recovery from the 1960-61 recession.

The drop in instalment debt so far this year has more than wiped out the increases that took place during the peak spending months of November, December last year. Total instalment debt is just about where it was in July 1960 -- \$42 billion then, \$42 billion now. Auto instalment debt in April was slightly above \$17 billion, exactly the level of April a year ago.

Every month American families are taking on around \$4 billion of new instalment debts -- but every month, they're repaying this huge total PLUS.

Yet, at the same time, personal incomes before and after taxes, have risen sharply. Disposable personal incomes -- our incomes after taxes -- are at least \$10 billion higher than at this time in 1960. This would normally suggest rising, not falling, instalment debts.

What does it mean? Assuming that we've not turning against instalment buying, that we're not saturated with goods, that we have confidence in our own and our nation's economic future -- reasonable assumptions -- the debt trend means that:

You've put yourself into strong shape to resume on-the-cuff borrowing on a rising scale, and if the trend after the recessions of 1954 and 1958 is repeated now, you'll be hiking your borrowing rate soon, thereby directly spurring the economy.

You're a conservative money manager, far more capable of sensible handling of your instalment debts than the viewers-with-alarm claim. No official control has forced you to curtail your borrowing; there was no clamp-down by retailers or lenders; the recent recession was mild and short. But still, on the cuff borrowing has dwindled and the debt-income ratio has distinctly improved.

You're an amazingly imaginative user of instalment credit -- using it not only to buy, but also to budget yourself, to discipline your spending, to help you save. In sum, you are now and you will be the most powerful influence of all on our economy.

"Nine years ago," Kaufman said, "the Pennsylvania RR canceled all passenger traffic to Philadelphia for one month. It also canceled all freight traffic. The only thing it carried to Philadelphia was trouble. Believe me, we'll run into it somehow."

He made a speech about plagiarism suits which usually beset authors of hit shows and told the audience: "I'm saying this in the faint hope that some of you have lawyers in the family and that you will kill them." He offered a simple solution for New York's crippling traffic: Have all traffic lights on the streets turned red, and keep them that way. His only exercise, he said, was in changing cuff-links from one shirt to another.

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## Enacts Measure Forbidding Public Officials To Campaign

JERUSALEM — Israel's Parliament approved last week changes in the election law which will make it more difficult for splinter parties to develop and which bars electioneering of any kind of public servants who have administrative authority.

The law, which was adopted in clause-by-clause voting, requires a deposit of 5,000 pounds (\$2,800) for a new list of candidates in an election which will be forfeited if the new list fails to obtain one percent of the valid votes cast in that election.

Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's Mapai party favored less stringent restrictions on new parties and the clause was approved by votes of the other parties. The new Liberal party also voted against the clause on grounds that it was undemocratic, because it allegedly favored vested interests against newcomers to the political arena. The clause provides that the amount to be forfeited will be only 1,000 of the 5,000 pound deposit in the event the list is invalidated by the Israel Central Election committee.

The measure barring electioneering by public servants, including employees of a municipality, the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund, applies to any employee of a public body who has the power to make administrative decisions. Such persons will be barred from electioneering, publicity or privately, within his own work area or elsewhere.

The proposal which was adopted again involved Mapai versus other parties, Mapai favoring an arrangement under which the ban on election activity would apply only to the individual's work area. The stronger proposal, offered by the Mizrahi, Mapam and Achdut Avodah, passed by a slim majority.

## Jewish Educators Oppose U. S. Funds

ATLANTIC CITY—Jewish educators from all over the United States voiced support of Government aid to public education but opposed such aid to private or parochial schools. A resolution on Federal aid was adopted at the 35th annual conference of the National Council for Jewish Education attended by more than 300 leading Jewish educators. The resolution said that "all religious and private education are the responsibility of their respective sponsors."

Emphasizing "the crucial importance which Jewish education must assume to assure the creative survival of the Jewish community in America," the delegates stressed the growing financial need to implement the nationwide Jewish education program. The educators urged all Jewish federations and welfare funds throughout the United States and Canada to extend maximum support and aid to educational programs within their communities.

Significant steps in unifying the Jewish education profession were noted by Samuel J. Borowsky, general secretary of the National Council in a report to the conference. Mr. Borowsky stated that as a result of the Council's initiative, a joint committee of national organizations of Jewish educators has been brought into existence.

## White House Silent Regarding Arab Mail

WASHINGTON — White House sources declined last week to comment on reports from Arab capitals that President Kennedy sent an important personal message to King Saud of Saudi Arabia pertaining to Israel-Arab relations. If such a letter was sent it would be up to the King to publish the contents, these sources said.

The press here reported from Cairo that virtually all Cairo newspapers reported King Saud had received a letter from President Kennedy relating to Israel. The reports said the King summoned ambassadors of all Arab League countries and informed them of the text. The content was not divulged.

The Saudi Arabian Ambassador here met with Phillips Talbot, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. The Saudi Arabian Embassy refused to divulge the contents of the reported personal communication on Israel-Arab relations now "under study" by King Saud after receipt from President Kennedy.

**DEMANDS FAST PAYMENT BRUSSELS** — A speeding of Government action on allocation and disbursement of \$20,000,000 which Belgium is to receive from West Germany in reparations, part of which is to go to Jewish victims of Nazi persecution, was requested by a delegation of Jewish leaders.

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

Before the trial opened, Beer's defense counsel told the press here that his client would plead no guilty to all charges. "Even if he met a foreign agent, it is still not espionage," the lawyer declared.

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
