## American Jewish Groups Welcome Proposed Visit By Russia Rabbi

NEW YORK — Assurances were cabled last week to Rabbi Yehuda Leib Levin of Moscow that the major American Jewish organizations were ready to introduce him "to all the varied manifestations and institutions of American Jewish life and to the leadership of the American Jewish community" during his forthcoming visit here.

Rabbi Levin is expected to arrive in this country within the next few weeks with a Soviet Jewish religious delegation, on the invitation of the American Council for Judaism, an anti-Zionist organization.

The cable, signed by Rabbi Jacob P. Rudin, chairman of the Synagogue Council of America; Rabbi Herschel Schacter, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, and Jordan C. Band, chairman of the national Community Relations Advisory Council, was sent in the name of 25 national Jewish organizations.

It reminded the Moscow rabbi that in the past several leading American Jewish organizations had invited him to come here. It pointed out that three signatories were the coordinating agencies "for virtually every single Jewish organization."

The three signatories of the cable said today that American

Jews have repeatedly expressed the desire to have contact with Soviet Jewry hoping to establish "a genuine communication between the two largest Jewish populations in the world." They voiced the hope that Rabbi Levin's scheduled visit "may initiate a process that will lead to this kind of genuine and meaningful dialogue and relationships with Soviet Jews."

They pointed out, however, that "there cannot be today any official representative of Soviet Jewry, since no religious or communal institutions exist in the Soviet Union whereby the Jews of that country could authorize such a visit."

They noted that all the recognized denominations in the Soviet Union, except the Jews, "are permitted some form of central structural organization for congregations and clergy."

The last semblance of a central coordinating structure, they said, was in 1926 when a conference of rabbis of the Soviet Union met for the last time. The three spokesmen for the Jewish community said that "we hope that the anticipated arrival of Rabbi Levin may signal a change in the Soviet Government's policy of gradual attrition of Jewish life in the Soviet Union."

## Says Orthodox Have Made Great Strides

LONDON — The United States Orthodox community has made great strides in establishing itself as a vital force and is fully integrated into modern Jewish life, Rabbi Norman Lamm, Yeshiva University philosophy professor and rabbi of the Jewish Center of New York, said here last week.

Visiting Britain at the invitation of the conference of Anglo-Jewish preachers, Rabbi Lamm told a press conference that U.S. Orthodox strength, had manifested itself most dramatically in the day school movement which, he said, was now a major factor on the American Jewish educational scene.

He said the Anglo-Jewish community should increase its efforts in this field to safeguard its future.

## Suggests Experimental Settlements Of Arabs

SUGGESTS EXPERIMENTAL  
TEL AVIV — Labor Minister Yigal Allon suggested last week that two experimental settlements of Arab refugees be established in Sinai territory seized during last June's Six-Day War.

Speaking to settlers in the religious agricultural region of Shafir, Allon said such resettlement of refugees could be disassociated from the general Arab-Israeli peace problem.

He reiterated Israel's position that it could not agree to an interim solution to the diplomatic deadlock because "interim solutions just lead to new war." Peace arrangements must be permanent, he said.

## Protest Japanese Fail To Adopt Policy On Arab Boycott

NEW YORK — The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith charged last week that the Government of Japan had failed to adopt a policy that would protect its industry from Arab boycott pressure against trade with Israel.

In a special report made public at the League's annual meeting at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, Arnold Forster, the general counsel, noted that the United States had adopted protective legislation that encourages and requests American companies not to comply with "restrictive trade practices fostered or imposed by foreign countries against countries friendly to the United States."

The failure of Japan to adopt such a policy, Mr. Forster said, is the cause for major Japanese companies' "flatly refusing to do business with Israel."

A group of 50 importers in the New York and Boston areas that trade with Japan made official protests to the Japanese Consul General's offices here. It could not be learned what answers the group received.

A second committee, of clothing manufacturers, was scheduled to arrive in Japan to

present its views to Japanese authorities. Among committee members were Jack Clark of CBS Imports, a men's and boys' clothing concern, and Irving Alpert of Regal Accessories, both New York companies.

A dispatch from Tokyo in The New York Times, published April 21, indicated that Japanese companies were cooperating with the Arab boycott of Israel. However, Japanese authorities said the companies refusing trade with Israel were acting on their own and that no national policy was involved.

An official of Japan's Ministry of International Trade and Industry was reported in the dispatch to have said that Government trading circles would prefer to promote — rather than discourage — trade with Israel. He said that only a few Japanese concerns were involved in the boycott.

However, the Anti-Defamation League's report listed among Japanese companies refusing to do business with Israel such concerns as Toyota, in the automotive industry; Suzuki and Yamaha, manufacturers of motorcycles; Nippon Electric, manufacturer of radios and television sets; Hayakawa

## Violence In The Gaza Strip Marks Israeli Anniversary Celebrations

JERUSALEM — Violence in the Gaza Strip this week marred Israeli celebrations marking the first anniversary of the conquest of Jordanian Jerusalem. While Premier Levi Eshkol spoke here of the "act of liberation that made Jerusalem one," Israeli soldiers were battling Arab high school girls in Deir el Balah.

The girls, students at the United Nations high school in the Gaza Strip, had barricaded the main highway and were stoning cars when shooting began, according to the Israelis.

The military authorities were vague about the shooting except to say that the shots had been fired by soldiers and civilians. The girls withdrew to the schoolyard but five were later found to have been slightly injured and were treated at a nearby hospital.

Four other girls were detained by the military government authorities.

Later in the day traffic was stoned in separate incidents in Gaza. Demonstrations and arrests have been a daily occurrence in the Gaza strip since a curfew was imposed following the death last week of two Israelis when their jeep struck a mine at nearby Nahal Oz.

Several hundred Gaza residents were dispersed shortly before they reached the civil administration building. The Arabs were shouting anti-Israel and pro-Nasser slogans.

The tensions in the Gaza Strip was in contrast to the scene in Jerusalem, where tens of thousands of Israelis in a festive mood poured into the Old City to celebrate the unification of Jerusalem.

Although the battle of Jerusalem ended on June 7 last year, its anniversary was marked today on the Hebrew, or lunar, calendar. The significance of the day was augmented by an Israeli decision to concentrate all the one-year celebrations on Jerusalem Day.

Soldiers paraded in army camps throughout the nation and many units whose members fought in Jerusalem gathered this morning at rough stone memorials in the Arab sector to

honor their fallen comrades.

A peace forest was planned in the former no man's land that was the scene of the first major encounter in the Jerusalem fighting.

Premier Eshkol, who received the freedom of the city, spoke of its importance to the Jewish people and of the expansion and consolidation of its Jewish population.

A few hours after he spoke, the formal resettlement of the Jewish Quarter of the old city began with the installation of a nahal, or paramilitary unit, in a renovated house in the center of the quarter.

The soldiers will live in the three-story house but will work in downtown Jerusalem as carpenters, technicians in defense industry and as employees in the Government printing office.

They are not the first Israelis to move into the former Jordanian sector. Several dozen Jewish families, representing about 200 people, have rented apartments throughout the Arab sector, mostly in the new area outside the Old City walls.

These settlers, a few of whom even moved into the Jewish Quarter within the Old City before the Israeli Government forbade such activities, concluded private deals with Arab landlords and have been living in harmony with their Arab neighbors.

The Nahal settlement represents the first Government-sponsored move to repopulate the traditional Jewish Quarter, much of which is being repaired and restored after two decades of use by the Jordanians.

Arabs in the Old City are worried that the Israelis may expropriate considerable areas of the Moslem and Armenian sectors to form an expanded Jewish Quarter. Arab leaders have maps, which they say were obtained from Israeli sources, indicating such an expanded area.

Last week the last of the families living in the area, designated by the Israelis to form a huge plaza in front of the Wailing Wall were transferred to new quarters to enable demolition to proceed.

Unlike the original clearance project, where the entire Moslem Quarter in front of the wall was cleared with only a few hours' notice, Arab residents are now being offered token payments for compensation and are being directed to new quarters outside the Old City.

Arab leaders assert that many homes in the Jewish Quarter are owned by Arabs. They fear that the Israelis will expropriate this land to facilitate settlement by Jewish families.

Meanwhile, the 838 acres outside the Old City walls expropriated by the Israelis several months ago for new housing remain untouched except for a road built for the Independence Day parade.

Diplomatic observers believe that the lag in Israeli construction can be traced to two factors. Deeds to much of the expropriated land are either missing or are subjects of controversy. Jordanian officials took most of the pertinent documents to Amman as they left.

It is also considered likely that the Western powers, unable to revise the Israeli expropriation, have persuaded the Government to refrain from aggravating the situation by proceeding with the actual construction.

**Gen. Herzog To Address GJC Mass Rally June 6**

Brig. General Chaim Herzog, known as the "Voice of Israel" during last year's Six-Day War, will address the mass rally to be held Thursday, June 6, in the ballroom of the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel in connection with the 1968 campaign of the General Jewish Committee.

As military commentator of Kol Israel, the Israel Broadcasting Company, during the war, he kept the people of the country informed of the war's progress. When hostilities ceased, he was named Military Governor of the West Bank area. General Herzog, a lawyer and former director of military intelligence, is one of the key leaders of the State of Israel.

He was born in Ireland, and came to Palestine in 1935 when his father, Dr. Isaac Herzog, became Chief Rabbi.

Presidents and representatives of more than 100 major Jewish men's and women's organizations in Rhode Island pledged full support at a recent

meeting for the mass rally.

In addition to aiding the statewide GJC campaign, the rally will honor those who fell in the battle to secure the freedom of Israel. The meeting is open to the public.

The memorial service will be conducted by Rabbi Eli A. Bohnen of Temple Emanu-El, assisted by Cantor Ivan E. Perlman.

Judge Frank Licht, GJC president, called for the fullest support of all organizations in the state.

Joseph Galkin, GJC executive director, is coordinating the efforts of the various organizations, and Lawrence Y. Goldberg is in charge of arrangements.

A special program of entertainment will be provided by Rivka Raaz, leading Israeli actress and singer. A native of Israel, and a lieutenant in the Israeli army, Miss Raaz was the recipient of the Harp of David, awarded to the leading actress and singer of the Israeli stage in 1965 and 1966.

## McCarthy Asks Renewal Of Commitment To Israel

MIAMI BEACH — Senator Eugene I. McCarthy said this week that the United States "must renew our commitment not just to the existence but to the protection of the state of Israel."

"It was wrong for the Administration to say when the (Israeli-Arab) war broke out that we were neutral in word, deed and thought," he said. "To say we were neutral in thought was to repudiate really our policy and our commitment."

The Minnesotan, a candidate for the Democrat Presidential nomination, made his remarks at Hibiscus Auditorium before 600 mostly elderly, retired persons, nearly all of them Jewish.

He said that "we must undo what harm has been done and as often as necessary reaffirm our continued strong support" for Israel.

In a prepared statement handed out earlier by his staff, he said, "The United States must reaffirm its moral and political commitment to the continued existence and independence of Israel, by military assistance if necessary."

The Senator's remarks on Israel came in a speech generally denouncing American involvement in Vietnam, in the abortive Cuban invasion in 1961 and in the Dominican Republic in 1963.

## Eshkol Postpones Cabinet Meeting

TEL AVIV — Premier Levi Eshkol postponed his weekly cabinet meeting and conferred privately with Government leaders in Jerusalem in an effort to overcome the friction between the Foreign Minister Abba Eban and his critics in the Government.

The official reason given for the postponement was that Mr. Eshkol was indisposed.

The friction is over Mr. Eban's authorization of a declaration by Yosef Tekoah, the Israeli representative at the United Nations, accepting the Security Council resolution of Nov. 22, 1967. The resolution requires Israel to withdraw from territory captured from the Arabs in the war last June but also calls for the establishment of secure and recognized boundaries in the Middle East.

The Government's policy has been to insist upon direct negotiations with the Arabs.

Mr. Eban's critics say that he has departed from the Government policy.

## ADDING TO FLEET

LONDON — The London Evening Standard reported last week that the Soviet Union is beefing up the Egyptian submarine fleet to a point where Egypt may control the Eastern Mediterranean. According to the report, Russia has supplied Egypt in recent years with 16 submarines, six destroyers, eight minesweepers, eight subchasers, 18 missile craft, 44 torpedo-boats, six rocket-assault vessels, 18 landing craft and six tugs.

PREMIER RESPONDS years ago last week, to the Egyptian Premier Mohammed Naguib responded to Israel's jubilation over its 25th anniversary by referring, 15 Jewish state as a "cancer in the body of the Arab world," and asserting that Palestine must belong to the Arabs.

**Were We Socialists Impolitic?**

I was almost 16 when I joined the Young People's Socialist League. Algernon Lee of the Rand School inducted about eight of us one night. Though young, I was already familiar with the pamphlets of Carl Sandburg and Eugene V. Debs which the YPSL used to distribute free. I believed in them.

These were the days, of course, of the Molly Maguires and the Pinkertons and the Homestead strike.

When Morris Hillquit, the No. 1 Socialist of New York addressed an audience, all he had to do to capture their attention was shout the name "Rockefeller." Imagine the days when Rockefeller was the No. 1 villain?

There were Socialists I knew whose vision of the emerging America was compelling. But I never met one who vaguely suspected that the sons of the robber barons would march in the vanguard of liberals within two generations.

There were many other issues we Socialists underestimated. We agitated for an eight-hour day and for unemployment insurance but we never suspected that prohibition was a political issue.

A disciplined party man like Al Smith did. Though Smith lost the election in 1928 by six million votes, that election marked the first time a Democrat had carried the cities. One of the reasons Smith broke the Republican hold on the big towns was that he campaigned as a wet.

It is true we young Socialists used to heckle Communists in the days when the mass of Americans had no idea what the Third Internationale was. Capitalism was an enemy we Socialists thought we could correct through legislation. Communism was the enemy we could never contain. And we knew it. I remember my father writing in 1934, "The Nazis burn our books and the

smoke spirals to the sky for all to see. The Communists bury us in a dungeon. When you write a Russian ambassador about a missing poet, his answer is he never heard of him."

Neither Communists nor Nazis did the Socialists in but a rich man, Franklin D. Roosevelt, did.

The first 100 days of his New Deal was essentially the implementation of the Socialist Party Platform of 1908. It is naive to suppose the Socialists could have accomplished these reforms.

The American people would take from a senior warden of the Hyde Park Episcopal Church, a fellow who wore a Navy cape, what they would never have taken from a polemical Socialist who wore a beard and spoke with an accent.

**Resigns In Protest Against Neo-Nazi Vote**

BONN — The Mayor of Verrenberg, described as the most "neo-nazi minded" village in southwest Germany, where 32% of the population voted for the right-wing National Democratic Party (NPD) in the April 28 Baden-Wurttemberg state election, resigned last week in protest against the vote.

Walter Halber, 28, said, "I did not want to be in charge of a village which gave the neo-nazis the highest percentage of voters in the state."

A television team made films in the village, already notable for a high turnout of voters favoring the NPD in a poll taken before the state election. Villagers attacked Halber for not preventing the filming which they said was one-sided. Many said they voted for the NPD as a "protest."



## There Should Be Direct Negotiations

The insistence of Israel on direct negotiations with her Arab neighbors on peace terms is the only way in which she can have some assurance of terms which will be upheld. Even under these circumstances it would be rather difficult to trust Nasser.

President Bourguiba of Tunisia recently described Egyptian president Nasser as "the evil genius of the whole region," adding that "even for the Egyptian people the result has been disaster." He also said that nations seriously concerned with a peaceful settlement in the Mid-East should not take excessive notice of Nasser's play-acting.

This appraisal of Nasser is supported by the behavior of the Egyptian ruler. In a series of talks less than a month ago, Nasser flatly declared that another war with Israel is "inevitable" and that the "complete liquidation" of the results of the Six-Day War last June is a holy obligation. With world attention now focused on the efforts of Dr. Gunnar V. Jarring, special United Nations envoy to the Middle East, Nasser has been displaying his talents in another direction.

He is described in recent news stories as willing to project peace terms making considerable concessions to Israel, if only that country would stop being so unyieldingly hard-headed. Actually, however, Nasser's offers emerge as fraudulent and illusory, and they testify more to his skill as a propagandist than they do to a genuine desire for a rational end to difficulties in the Mid-East.

Part of this is due, no doubt, to the nature of the man; but there is also the fact that many rulers in Nasser's position like to be able to point to someone else and say "That's the reason things are not going well with the country. It is not my fault. It is their fault." A scapegoat comes in handy for rulers in trouble.

The fact that so many of the countries seem to think that it is futile to expect direct negotiations between Israel and the Arabs. It was considered a tremendous advance towards peace when the United States and North Viet Nam agreed to sit down and talk to one another directly. Why cannot this be expected in the case of the Middle East. Acceptance of this sort of double standard, one for the Middle East and another for the Far East, does little credit to those who espouse it.

The fact is that Israel is prepared to make every legitimate contribution to eliminate the explosive potentials inherent in the Middle East impasse. Nasser and those who accept his leadership—under the over-all umbrella protection of the Soviet Union—are dramatically and unmistakably in the wrong on this issue, as they are on so many others.

## Many In Israel Regard Abba Eban As Foreigner

JERUSALEM — When Foreign Minister Abba Eban returned from a tour of Scandinavia 10 days ago, he was confronted at the airport by several dozen demonstrators carrying placards that read: "Eban in the footsteps of Chamberlain."

A week later, appearing at Tel Aviv University, Foreign Minister Eban was resoundingly booed by half the students and professors who had turned out to hear him. As he had at the airport, Mr. Eban smiled gamely but unhappily at the hecklers who interrupted his speech.

The two incidents illustrate the curious paradox of Abba Eban's role as Israel's Foreign Minister and spokesman before the world.

Of all of Israel's leaders, Mr. Eban, who is 53 years old, is probably the second best known outside of the country.

To many outside Israel, he is Israel, simply because they have heard him explaining the country's views so often.

In Israel, Mr. Eban is regarded in an altogether different light. To many Israelis, particularly the native-born, their Foreign Minister is a foreigner himself. His manners and style are those of Europe, and his Hebrew is a classical, studied variety. Most Israelis are aware that

Mr. Eban has been in the service of their country since the birth of the state 20 years ago, but they are also aware that he has spent the great portion of that time abroad, including 11 years in the United States as Ambassador to Washington and the United States.

They are also aware that when he is in Israel, he moves in a tightly restricted world of top Government leaders and visiting dignitaries. In a time when their most popular political military leaders are products of the kibbutz generation, their foreign minister is the very antithesis of a man reared in the hardy, demanding collective settlements.

As the country has moved to the right and become notably more hawkish on this matter he has continued to espouse a moderate line. While other ministers have been making increasingly determined statements about retaining the occupied Arab territories, Mr. Eban has continued to insist that to make any statement on the territories would be a tactical error in the bargaining process.

Of the 21 ministers in the expanded national unity Cabinet, the Foreign Minister is regarded as the most dovish. In the public view, as reflected in the Hebrew papers, his stance indicated a lack of resolve and a conciliatory attitude toward the Arabs.

### The Aged And The Home

The concept of Old Age has changed drastically within our own lifetime.

People who were considered "old" some fifty years ago are now at an age when the future holds out a promise for them.

Medical science has done wonders at both ends of life. The infant has been given a greater chance to grow to maturity, and the mature can expect to live longer than did their parents.

At the age of seventy some men are still doing business or performing in their professions. When told of the retirement age, some people are very unhappy. At sixty or sixty-five, they feel that there is still enough energy in them, and they can do their work creditably. And some do it.

But with all this, the process of getting on in years is not a joyous occasion.

At best, man loses some of his old capacities, and gains none. Man is at the end of his journey and he cannot embark on another exciting adventure.

It is, therefore, childish to talk of a happy Old Age. Happiness and Old Age do not go together. There is nothing good or joyful in getting old. What we can hope to get in Old Age is security, and tranquility, and the knowledge that somebody cares.

This is why of all the institutions in the Community the Jewish Home for the Aged is closest to my heart.

At the Home we can truthfully say that the residents are given security, live a tranquil life, and are treated with the utmost care.

And this is why I come away so depressed every time I attend a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Home. Why shouldn't more aged people benefit from what the Home can offer?

For months, now, we hear that there are about fifty people on the waiting lists. Fifty people who ought to be in the Home, whom the Admissions Committee recommended, but who are left outside because there is no room for them within.

The Home accommodates 150 residents now. The fifty that are told to wait make up 25% of the total aged who need a Home.

And no one can tell them how long they will have to wait.

A month? Two months? A year? Until a New Home is built?

Put yourself in the place of the people on the waiting list and you will know exactly how they feel. When a person makes up his mind to come to the Home, and most people do not make up their minds so easily, he or she finds the place where they are now residing unbearable. They have no understanding for the reasons of the delay, no matter how valid they are.

And neither do we.

I have spoken to several members of the Board of Directors. These members have given a goodly portion of their life and of their substance to the Home. They, too, are distressed at the long waiting list. A Home, they reason, is not a Hospital. If there is no room in one hospital the patient applies to the other hospitals in the city. There is only one Jewish Home in the Community, and that Home, they feel, has certain obligations to the Aged of the Community.

The Waiting List must be reduced.

Until the Building Committee decides where to buy new land and how to build the New Home, these fifty odd people must be cared for.

Rent or build or shift around, but do not let fifty people stay outside.

At every meeting we hear the reports of the Directors of the Home. There is not a stone left unturned to make life in the Home more palatable for the residents.

A Director of Medicine appointed.

A Nursing Director engaged. Occupational Therapy re-introduced on a large scale.

A professional Dietitian to supervise the feeding habits and

requirements of the residents is starting to work soon.

And many other little things, each of which makes for more comfortable living, and above all they spell out for the residents the words: We Care.

Then the painful question arises:

"Why shouldn't the fifty on the waiting list also have this care and this security and this comfort?"

The Home is now conducting a drive for members. No Jew living in Rhode Island can say: I will have no share and take no part in the maintenance of the Home. Everyone can afford One-Dollar-A-Month in dues to the Home.

Let the Building Committee take its time in finding a new place. We cannot rush them into decisions of this kind. But an increased membership can help the Home in making temporary decisions and speed up the time when most of the fifty on the waiting list will be admitted.

The situation as it is now is intolerable.

### Welfare Crisis

System at Turning Point

In mounting crescendo, calls for a "negative income tax," a "guaranteed annual income," "family allowances," are being heard throughout the land.

The reminders of past turning points in our society's social-economic laws are unmistakable: this is how the "atmosphere" was at the start of Social Security, unemployment insurance, the minimum wage, Medicare. The alignment of political-economic forces in favor of fundamental changes in our welfare system is a fascinating forecast of what could be: conservative businessmen, radical economists, militant Negro leaders, reactionary politicians, liberal Democrats, stand-pat Republicans, all are lining up for one of the ideas expressed in the first paragraph.

The message is clear: we are on the threshold of another leap forward into an advanced social-welfare society.

The question is already deep in 1968 Presidential politics and

civil rights. The debate over various proposals is developing rapidly in policymaking circles. To reach intelligent decisions on the questions, you must be informed. Thus, this series of columns on the welfare crisis.

First, some sweeping but helpful generalizations.

Being denounced is our entire system of public welfare. Under discussion are ways to overhaul the system to establish welfare as a matter of need and right and to create minimum national standards for assistance to the needy. Sought is a welfare system which will bring order and logic to what is now an enormous, expensive, wasteful, sprawling mess.

Each phrase in the opening paragraph alone refers to a proposed system to channel funds to the poor (details in a later column.) Now here are basic points.

(1) The riots of summer 1967 and spring 1968 have added new political-social-economic urgency to the problem of poverty. Finally, it is being admitted that poverty is a burden on our whole society, not just the poor. Finally, it is acknowledged that poverty is an evil which breeds disease, delinquency, crime, immorality.

(2) Our welfare system has not only failed to solve our poverty problem; it has also actually made the problem worse in many ways. The system must not just be reformed; it must be replaced.

(3) Even after years of the greatest, broadest prosperity this nation has ever known, welfare costs and rolls are at the highest ever and rising steadily. Relief has become a way of life for millions. We are seeing third generation relief families.

(4) The problem of welfare is tied to the whole urban crisis. The President's Riot Commission report favors a national system

# BRIDGE

Today's hand is excellent for illustrating how a good Bridge player's mind should work. The defenders could always have defeated the contract, a slam, if they took the two tricks they were entitled to. To do it some pertinent information had to be handed across the table and at every table but one, they were allowed to pass along this information.

Mrs. Leonard Mandell and Mrs. Herman Selya were South and North, East dealer, North - South vulnerable. The bidding:

E	S	W	N
P	1H	1S	2D
P	4NT	P	5D
P	6H	End	

Reviewing the bidding, South had almost a two Diamond bid, and intended to go to game in Hearts after one peep out of her partner. When West overcalled Spades and North gave evidence of strength by her two Diamond bid, that was all South needed to hear. North's minimum of ten points and West's showing of Spades told South that there should certainly be a reasonable play for slam. So she asked for Aces, found one missing and stopped at six Hearts.

Most of the pairs at the Tournament arrived at the same contract and all were given the same opening lead, the Spade King. When the dummy went down the problem became quite simple. The hand seemed to depend on the location of the Diamond King. The Club Ace was there for the taking and that seemed to be all there was to it. So without further ado the other Declarers did the automatic, they drew Trumps first and then took the Diamond finesse which lost.

Meanwhile, West had showed out on the first Trump play and seized this opportunity to desperately signal to her partner. She discarded the Club 9 and then then 3, violently trying to convey a message which was alertly noticed, a Club was returned after the Diamond finesse had lost and the hand was set.

Our Declarer looked at the hand for a while and also saw that the hand depended on the Diamond finesse. But here is where, as the saying goes, "we separate the men from the boys". She realized that if the finesse were to work it would also work before Trumps were drawn but if it were to lose and West not be able to signal the location of that Club Ace, possibly East would woodenly return a Spade. Remember, she had seen her partner lead the King and was well aware that West had the Queen. As you can

see above, if that should happen, South would ruff, draw Trumps and discard all her Clubs on the now good Diamonds.

So, before touching Trumps at all, the Diamond finesse was taken and lost. And just as she had hoped, back came East with a Spade and the hand was made. You should have heard the recriminations at this point but what they should have done was congratulate the Declarer for she had given them an easy chance to go wrong. Actually, East had not really done anything wrong nor had West, they simply had not been provided the same opportunity the other Defenders had been given. Another factor should have been that if the finesse did work, by taking it immediately, Declarer could then have used the Trumps as an entry to take it again and if West had but three Diamonds to the King, seven could then be made.

Moral: If possible, never allow the opponents to get together and exchange information. Tell your partner everything, the other team nothing that will do them any good.

**British Jewry Holds Silent March To Protest Present Polish Policy**

**LONDON** — An estimated 4,000 representatives of British Jewry marched in silence from Hyde Park to the Polish Embassy here last week to present to the Polish envoy a letter condemning the Polish Government's repression of the surviving remnant of Poland's Jews and its anti-Semitic campaign.

The document was taken into the Embassy by a deputation consisting of Chief Rabbi Immanuel Jakobovits of the British Commonwealth, Michael Fidler, president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, Sir Barnett Janner, MP, chairman of the board's foreign affairs department, Sir Samuel Fisher, board vice-president, and Simon Frisner, chairman of the Polish-Jewish Ex-Servicemen's Association.

The silent march, which stretched for half a mile, was organized by the Board of Deputies in conjunction with some 20 other Jewish bodies representing the entire Anglo-Jewish community. The marchers carried hundreds of banners with statements protesting the campaign of the Communist Polish regime against Polish Jews.

Their letter declared that "we are shocked that the Jews of Poland, numbering about 20,000, many of whom are aged and infirm, should be singled out as scapegoats and blamed for Poland's internal difficulties." It demanded, "in the name of humanity" the "immediate denunciation" by the Warsaw regime of all incitement to hatred against Jews, cessation of all

discriminatory treatment, threats and oppression, the restoration to their posts of those dismissed because of their Jewish origins and freedom for Polish Jews to live in dignity in accordance with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights adopted by the United Nations 20 years ago.

The Sunday Observer reported that 300 Polish Jews left Poland last week on exit visas as a result of Communist Party leader Wladislaw Gomułka's recent statement that those who were "loyal to Israel" would be given permission to leave Poland. "It is known that many thousands have asked for visas," the paper said.

The Daily Telegraph reported that those who emigrate must renounce Polish nationality. The paper added that hundreds of Jews in responsible positions in the Polish Government, party and press and in academic and artistic life have been ousted in the past few weeks. The violent press attacks against "cosmopolitan agents of Zionism are unabated and widespread discrimination is rife against all Poles of Jewish origin causing deep concern among Poland's 20,000 Jews," the Telegraph said.

**HONOR SIEGEL**  
 WASHINGTON — A New York Jewish soldier, Sgt. Kenneth A. Siegel, who won the Silver Star for heroism under fire, was honored in Congress. He received the medal for his leadership of a reconnaissance patrol last Nov. 14 on a mission to investigate Viet Cong guerrillas.


**Monitor Speaks Of 'Formula For Peace'**

**BOSTON** — The Christian Science Monitor gave considerable prominence last week to a Beirut, Lebanon dispatch describing "a beginning formula for peace" in the Middle East involving Israel's return to the Jordan-Israel mixed armistice commission. The dispatch from the mid-East by John K. Cooley, quoted Col. Mohammed Daoud, senior Jordanian delegate on the commission, as declaring that "we are ready to meet the Israelis any time as long as UN personnel are present."

But Baoud complained that, "Every time we suggest a meeting with UN personnel present, the Israelis counter by insisting on direct meetings." He reiterated the Jordanian position that the armistice agreements are still in force and said Jordan rejected the idea of new truce supervision observers being stationed in the Jordan Valley because "This would amount to UN recognition of the present cease-fire line. Besides, it would help the Israelis strengthen their position on the West Bank."

## Pledges Complete Support To Israel; Will Still Remain Non-Zionist Group

KIAMESHA LAKE, N.Y. — The newly-elected president of the Workmen's Circle pledged last week his organization's whole-hearted support of Israel but declared that it would remain a non-Zionist organization and explained the reasons to the 800 delegates attending the biennial convention of the Jewish fraternal labor order.

According to Israel Breslow, "there is a basic difference between being supporters of Israel, even passionate supporters, as we are, and being Zionists."

The Zionists, he said, "believe that Israel is the homeland of all Jews, and that Jews elsewhere are living in the Galut — in the Diaspora. We in the Workmen's Circle say no. For us the United States . . . is our permanent homeland."

But Breslow, who is a vice president of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, allied the Workmen's Circle for the first time with Histadrut, Israel's Labor Federation.

"Our failure to do so in the past made little sense to me," he said. "We were supporting Israel but withholding support from the movement in Israel with which we have the most in common."

Breslow said, "For the Zionists, the Jewish community in the United States must be a temporary affair — to be abandoned in exodus to Israel, adding that, "For the Zionists the goal is immigration to Israel. . . Our goal is to improve and strengthen our society here, to make it more truly democratic, to eliminate prejudices and bigotry, to give all of our citizens a fair chance to share in the

general prosperity."

The convention adopted a series of resolutions supporting the programs of President Johnson's "Great Society" and condemning the "small-minded groups in Congress" that failed to enact all of the President's proposals and scaled down those they did enact.

Also adopted were resolutions denouncing the anti-Semitic manifestations in the Soviet Union and Poland. Concerning Jews behind the Iron Curtain, the delegates declared "our fervent hope is that the winds of freedom will quickly gain momentum in the communist lands, that it will loose the bonds that have confined its peoples' better impulses and that when freedom is restored it will prove again that Jewish life has the gift of durability and regeneration with which to outlive its tormentors."

In an earlier announcement last week Breslow said the Workmen's Circle endorsed President Johnson's peace efforts in Vietnam, condemned Soviet repression of Russian Jewry and warned against the rise of neo-nazism in West Germany.

Breslow told the delegates that "we are united in support of President Johnson's efforts to achieve a durable peace, a peace without victories or vanquished. Let us hope that the peace conference opening in Paris will achieve its objective."

Breslow said that the Jewish people, having lost six million of their brethren to "inhuman" hatreds, "cannot now close our eyes to those hatreds, whether they are directed against Jews in Poland and Russia or against minorities in our own country."

Benjamin A. Gebiner, Workmen's Circle executive secretary, said "we are dismayed at the events in West Germany where the neo-nazis have succeeded in gaining electoral strength. We do not view the rise of neo-nazism as an internal West German problem any more than we view Russian or Polish anti-Semitism as an internal problem of those countries."

Gebiner said that representations to Secretary of State Dean Rusk by the Workmen's Circle were responsible for preventing a visit to this country last year of Adolf von Thadden, leader of the neo-nazi NDP in West Germany. He canceled his trip when it became evident to him that he would not be welcomed by any responsible U.S. Government agency or official, Gebiner said.

### ASKS END OF BAN

JERUSALEM — The man who was instrumental in the capture of Adolf Eichmann applied to the Supreme Court here for an order calling on the Government to show cause why it should not rescind its decision to prohibit the publication of his book on Eichmann's capture.

Former Chief of Israeli Security Isser Harel, who resigned several years ago after differences of opinion with the Government, said in his petition that the book had previously been approved by competent security authorities. On the strength of this approval he had contracted for the book with publishers in Israel and abroad. Later, the Israeli Cabinet decided to ban the publication.

**TRIAL ENDS WITH CONVICTION**  
**STUTTGART** — The "Lvov Trial," the second longest war crimes prosecution in West German history, ended here last week with the conviction of 11 former SS men for their role in the slaughter of more than 400,000 Jews in the Lvov region of Poland during World War II.

Only one of the defendants, 60-year-old former SS sergeant Ernst Epple, received the maximum sentence of life imprisonment at hard labor. Nine others received sentences ranging from two-and-a-half to 10 years in prison. One was found guilty but set free.

Four other defendants were acquitted, all of them former SS or Gestapo officials or camp guards in the area where Jews were rounded up for shooting or shipment to concentration camps.

The trial opened Oct. 25, 1966, with 214 witnesses testifying against the 15 defendants. The Lvov district, a region of the Ukraine, was Polish territory before World War II. Today it is in Russia. The longest trial was the 20-month Auschwitz trial in Frankfurt lasting from 1963-1965.

# Growing Narcotics Addiction Among Jews Blamed On Pressures, Permissiveness

NEW YORK — Permissive attitudes toward children among Jewish parents and pressure by such parents of their children to excel scholastically and socially were cited last week by three authorities on narcotics addiction as factors in the growing narcotics addiction among Jews.

The charges were made at a conference on the problem sponsored by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York.

The three critics were Meyer Diskind, commissioner of community-based services of the New York State Narcotics Addicts Control Commission; Adolph Wasser, executive director of the East New York YM-YWHA, a Federation agency; and Rabbi Richard I. Schachet, formerly with the Samaritan Halfway Society, a private narcotics treatment center in New York.

More than 100 physicians, government officials, social workers, rabbis and others connected with the problem attended the one-day conference.

Diskind asserted that "the plague of addiction has unfortunately begun to affect the lives of a significant number of Jewish people." He proposed that a Jewish-sponsored agency be set up to treat the "growing number" of Jewish addicts, adding that "it is time for the Jewish community to abandon the ostrich-in-the-sand attitude and involve itself more directly in a solution to the problem."

He suggested that the Jewish-sponsored treatment agency be established as a unit in one of the Federation's health and welfare

agencies and thus utilize existing resources.

He stressed the need for psychotherapy for the Jewish addict who, he said, tends to fall into the category of the "psychological" as opposed to the "sociological addict." He explained that the psychological addict "has deep-seated personality conflicts and a poor emotional equilibrium" and that drugs serve him "as an adjustive mechanism to resolve inner conflicts and ease tensions."

In many cases, he declared, such conflicts arise in a family which has an absent or weak father and a domineering and extremely protective mother. He added that while this situation characterizes "the lives of most addicts, it assumes more pathological proportions with the families of Jewish addicts."

Wasser said the problem is growing among Jewish young people because Jewish parents tend to be overly permissive and fail to exercise adequate "parent power." He added that Jewish parents tend to reflect the general tendency of Jews to be liberal and permissive and that, as a result, there is less assertion of parental authority among Jews than among Protestant and Catholic parents at the same socio-economic level.

He asserted that the failure by Jewish parents to set strong limitations — "thou shalt and thou shalt not" — results in children whose super-egos are weak or non-existent. In many cases, he said, "these children are unable to accept authority

exercised by anyone. They are alienated from our society, and their escape lies in withdrawal into the unreality of a hallucogenic Nirvana produced by opium or other drugs."

He expressed the belief that "the prevention of drug abuse and of the use of narcotics by young people is best insured if our social agencies, synagogues and communal institutions teach parents how to use parent power."

In the third indictment against Jewish parents, Rabbi Schachet criticized the pressures many apply on their children to achieve scholastic and social success. He told the conference that, "the new status symbol has become our children and our children's grades." This pressure on Jewish youngsters to exceed their educational or emotional abilities is so intense in some cases, he said, that they respond by seeking escape through narcotics use.

Both Rabbi Schachet and Diskind said their experience indicated a low rate of addiction among Jews who had a well-rounded Jewish education. Diskind emphasized that he did not wish to convey the impression that Jewish education alone "is responsible for successful social adjustment. The cohesive Jewish family structure and the resultant emotional security no doubt is a pervasive factor. But perhaps the family cohesion is also an outgrowth of the Jew's ethical and spiritual standards."

The conference was sponsored by the Federation's commission on synagogue relations of which Rabbi Isaac N. Trainin is director.

# Lack Of Leadership Endangers Vitality Of Rumanian Jewish Community

BUCHAREST — The synagogue was crowded that Friday evening, when Rumania's Chief Rabbi celebrated the 20th anniversary of the foundation of modern Israel.

The Chief Rabbi, Dr. Moses Rosen, declared that the Government assured total freedom of religious practice and rigorously observed laws against anti-Semitism. Officials of Western Jewish organizations familiar with this country agree.

But Jewish life is dying and the vast majority of able-bodied Jews want to emigrate.

Most of the worshippers Friday were old men. Two boys, wearing the insignia of Rumanian public schools, recited prayers, but their audience was of the generation of the grandparents. A decade of emigration has reduced the 400,000 Rumanian Jews who survived World War II to 100,000, and the elderly predominate.

The Chief Rabbi is the only real rabbi in this country. Emigration, he said, has removed those who should be spiritual and social leaders.

For the first time in this country, where anti-Semitism has deep roots, Jews enjoy safety from persecution. But, it is said here, they learn that it takes two to love. They may no longer be hated in the country of their birth, but the more Jewish they feel, the more they feel like outsiders.

Few Jews, according to knowledgeable sources, have found assimilation possible. Assimilated Jews, prominent among Communists during the Stalinist period, were purged or ostracized in the aftermath of Stalinism.

The pronounced nationalism that followed Stalinist rule has proved no boon to the acceptance of Jews as full-fledged Rumanians, although it has not produced enmity to Jews.

It has even produced a kind of resurgence of Jewish feeling among young Jews, enhanced by the Israeli victory in the Arab-Israeli war last June seemingly unconnected with religious faith.

Rumania is the only country in the Communist world whose Jews

have lost no sleep over what effect the June war might have on their own lives. Bucharest maintains strict neutrality and Rumania is the only Communist country maintaining normal relations with Israel.

The Israeli flag is now flying over an industrial exhibition here, and Israel's envoy was granted time on state television to mark his country's anniversary. Next week, the two countries will begin regular traffic by their national airlines.

The Government allowed Rabbi Rosen to send 3,100 Torah scrolls, the first five books of the Old Testament in Hebrew, to Israel. This is evidence both of the Government's goodwill to Jews and of the dwindling role of the Jewish faith in Rumania.

"I wish the Jews would use the religious opportunities they have," said Dr. Rosen, a squat man in his fifties with sad eyes and a thin white beard.

About 150 synagogues remain open in this country. But they lack worshippers as well as leaders and administrators. Dr. Rosen is the only one of 600 rabbis who lived in Rumania in 1948 not to have left with the bulk of their followers.

The principal danger to Jewish life is this lack of leadership, Dr. Rosen said. In 1966 he closed a rabbinical seminary founded ten years earlier for lack of students. Of the 15 Talmud-Torah schools, founded after the war in which boys are instructed in the fundamental texts of Judaism, all but six have closed because of a lack of teachers.

As a result Dr. Rosen is the overworked heart and soul of a community of 100,000, according to international Jewish officials. In addition to his religious duties, he administers programs of social welfare that in the United States, according to these officials, would be run by hundreds.

In another gesture of goodwill, beneficial also to Rumania's limited reserves of convertible currency, the American Joint Distribution Committee was allowed last year to finance

important parts of the welfare program. The negotiation of this financing was the last important accomplishment of Charles Jordan, the official of the Joint Distribution Committee who was murdered last year in Prague.

With the aid of the American organization, 3,000 aged families receive monetary help in addition to their state pensions. Eight kosher restaurants around the country feed 1,500 people daily. Food and clothing are also distributed.

A newspaper in Rumanian, Hebrew and Yiddish is printed twice a month in 10,000 copies but no books are published for the Jewish community. The state maintains the Yiddish theater, which plays at great cost to small audiences.

Despite shrinking number of worshippers, no synagogue is destroyed in Rumania without the Chief Rabbi's consent. He gives his consent only to prevent the use of a synagogue for profane purposes.

## POLE - AXED

JERUSALEM — Official sources said here that there are no grounds for a report published in London that Polish Jews have been given freedom to emigrate and that a mass aliyah (immigration) has developed to Israel. According to Government circles, the Jewish Agency and the Association of Polish Jews in Israel, there has been no aliyah whatsoever from Poland since last June's Six-Day War when Poland severed diplomatic relations with Israel. These sources said they had no information about facilities for Jews wishing to leave Poland. A survey of various European capitals by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency confirmed that there has been no movement of Jews out of Poland in recent months.

## Urge Britain's Speedy Ratification Of UN Anti-Genocide Convention

LONDON — Britain's speedy ratification of the United Nation's anti-genocide convention was urged in the House of Commons by Sir Barnett Janner and other Laborite MPs this week "in view of the shocking rise of neo-Nazism in Germany and the fact that Human Rights year is in effect." Sir Barnett raised the question during a session on next

week's agenda. He asked the House leader, Fred Peart, if he would "reconsider introducing as speedily as possible, legislation so that we can accede to the convention on genocide."

The Board of Deputies of British Jews said that it viewed "with the gravest concern, the continued progress and success of the National Democratic Party

in the elections in Baden-Wurttemberg." The NPD polled nearly 10 percent of the popular vote in the state election. The Board noted that it had "repeatedly conveyed to the Federal German Government its view that firm action was essential to curtail the dangerous influences of the NPD."

Twenty members of


Parliament introduced a motion expressing anxiety over the rise of neo-Nazism in West Germany. The motion which has Sir Barnett Janner as one of its sponsors, was prompted by the success of the NPD in the Baden-Wurttemberg state elections.

In Antwerp, an international congress of former inmates of the Mauthausen concentration

camp adopted a resolution warning against the revival of Nazism in Germany and other countries. In Bonn Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesner warned during a Bundestag debate that votes for the ultra-rightist National Democratic Party could harm the country.

But he said, the "global conviction" that the NPD's electoral success implied a revival of Nazism in West Germany was "not true".



After the Six-Day June war of 1967 access was restored to the area. There were indications that as many as 2,400 students, in the sciences and law, may register when the November term begins.

## Israeli Government Accepts Presence Of Jewish Settlers In Hebron

HEBRON — The Israeli Government is reported to have decided to accept the presence of a group of Jewish settlers who have been living for a month in this occupied town on the west bank of the Jordan River.

The settlers, a group of about 80 ultraOrthodox Jews, had moved into the Park Hotel on the northern outskirts, of Hebron ostensibly to celebrate the Passover holiday but then announced that they had come to stay.

They said that Hebron, which is holy to both Jews and Moslems, had been a Jewish city a thousand years ago and that its capture in the June war last year was part of the redemption of the land of Israel.

The presence created a split in the Cabinet. Ministers who favor retention of the occupied West-Bank area of Jordan applauded the move. Others regretted it as an obstacle to peace talks.

The Government was forced to decide whether to order the removal of the settlers or accept their presence and, by doing so, extend Israeli protection to them.

Reliable sources said that the decision had been made in the form of an authorization to the Israeli military governor in Hebron to "attend to the defense and housing needs" of the settlers.

It is likely to infuriate Arab leaders, who have been pleading with the Israeli authorities for weeks to remove the settlers before their presence touched off incidents.

The Mayor, Sheik Mohammed Ali Jaabari, said earlier in an interview that took place before the Israeli decision was known. That the Israelis should not be allowed to settle in Hebron before the status of the west bank was decided. He said that the people of Hebron did not want Jews settling there.

Hebron was the site of a

for supplementing incomes, declares that while it would be expensive, "if the deepening cycle of poverty and dependence on welfare can be broken, if the children of the poor can be given the opportunity to scale the wall that now separates them from the rest of society, the return on this investment will be great indeed."

(5) There is growing agreement across a broad spectrum that we must develop a system of uniform, national standards for public assistance which provides a floor for assistance below which no State nor individual can fall. Today, relief benefits for a family of four range from a low of \$40 a month in Mississippi to \$280 a month in New Jersey.

(6) Solid research into the whole question of welfare is imperative but woefully lacking. Less than 1/10th of 1 per cent of the \$8 billion we spend yearly on public welfare goes to find out why we are spending so much, what it is accomplishing, what is right, what is wrong.

(7) We know so little and the more we learn, the more we discover that policies we thought were right are terribly wrong.

As just one illustration, most States - 28 - penalize a welfare family if there is a "man in the house" on the basis that if a man is around, he should be able to support his family. What this has done is break up countless families as men abandon the family so the children can get assistance.

The time for debate is approaching. The time for action will follow. The time is now for you, the taxpayer, to find out what this is about.

Pressures For Reform  
Proposals to overhaul our public welfare system are already deep in 1968 presidential politics and civil rights. The movement for reform is extraordinarily broad and

diverse, quite probably far beyond what you think. Consider:

## Vice President Hubert Humphrey says that "key issues in this year's national debate" will be "guaranteed income for everybody, or a negative income tax, or family allowances . . . The present welfare program mocks justice." (A negative income tax will be explained in a later column in this series.)

## Senator Robert Kennedy opposes a guaranteed annual income, emphasizes that jobs are the heart of the matter. He calls for a review of welfare benefits to establish "minimal standards nationwide to assure that no individual or family falls below the poverty line."

## Senator Eugene McCarthy proposes that the federal government "determine a minimum income which it will assure for all Americans."

## Former Vice President Nixon says he is studying a wide range of alternatives to the present welfare system, including a guaranteed income.

## Governor Rockefeller hasn't yet publicly stated his position but as long ago as March 1967, he appointed a committee of national leaders to consider "if the problem of public welfare was given to you, what would you recommend as sound public policy for the next decade?" Out of that committee's discussions came a steering committee of 12 top industrialists which has just submitted a report recommending "an income maintenance system, possibly a negative income tax."

## The Rockefeller Committee was headed by Joseph C. Wilson, chairman of Xerox. Among its members were Arjay Miller, vice chairman of Ford; Joseph Block, executive committee chairman of Inland Steel; Albert L. Nickerson, chairman of Mobil Oil; Gustave Levy, chairman of the New York Stock Exchange . . . Hardly a group of fiscally irresponsible radicals.

## The AFL-CIO has come out in favor of a system of minimum incomes.

## Economists ranging from the arch conservative Dr. Milton Friedman of the University of Chicago to the liberal Dr. James Tobin of Yale University have endorsed the negative income tax. Economists associated with the Brookings Institution have made several exhaustive studies of income maintenance proposals.

## The Reverend Ralph David Abernathy opened the Poor People's Campaign in Washington this month with a vow to plague the U.S. with "plague after plague until they agree to give us meaningful jobs and a guaranteed annual income."

## The Committee For Economic Development, a non-profit group of 200 distinguished business leaders and educators, held a policy forum in New York City in mid-May to debate the Rockefeller Committee's recommendations for welfare system reforms. Among the CED's speakers were Ralph Lazarus, chairman of Federated Department Stores and Marion B. Folsom, director of Eastman Kodak — again hardly wild-eyed visionaries. While views on the best welfare reform differed, all speakers at the CED forum called for a new system of income maintenance.

## The President's Commission on Civil Disorders in its riot report reminds us that the conservative Republican's idol, the late Senator Robert A. Taft, called, as far back as 1949 for a "minimum standard floor . . . to give all a minimum standard of decent living and to all children a fair opportunity to get a start in life."

## The President early in 1968 appointed a Commission on Income Maintenance under the chairmanship of railroad tycoon Ben W. Heineman of Chicago to examine all forms of income maintenance proposals. This commission almost surely will be reporting its findings in coming months to spur publicity and debate.

Pulled together this way, it's impossible, isn't it? Something indeed is happening!

## Roman Catholic Teachers To Study Judaism And The Jew In Fall Classes

NEW YORK — Teachers in New York's Roman Catholic parochial schools will study Judaism and the Jew in literature next fall.

Five one-hour programs for closed-circuit television have been taped in the Yonkers studios maintained by the New York Archdiocese. It is jointly sponsoring the project with the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, which concerns itself with protecting Jewish civil and religious rights.

In a joint announcement by

both groups, Msgr. Edward M. Connors, associate superintendent of the archdiocese schools, said: "It had become apparent that a gap existed in our schools. In general we simply weren't teaching as much as we should about Jews and Judaism."

Monsignor Connors said the project grew out of a November, 1966, colloquium on "Judaism and the Catholic School" at Marymount Manhattan College. It was held for Catholic teachers.

"For many who attended that Marymount colloquium," he said,

"a whole new world was opened up by the Jewish scholars who spoke to us."

Dore Schary, national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League, said the forthcoming programs on the Jew in literature were designed for the teachers of English in Catholic schools.

"The attempt is made," he said, "to counter a negative stereotype of the Jew in English literature not by censoring the literature but by helping the teacher to question the premise of such stereotyping, deal with author motivation, and so forth."

Mr. Schary said that the Jewish scholars and theologians who prepared the tapes also were "introducing and suggesting to the teachers works of literary merit not now taught, but which are good reading experiences and contain situations, characters, attitudes and moods that can help the non-Jew better understand the life, culture and background of his Jewish neighbor."

In source of the programs the lecture format will be complemented by a round-table discussion among Catholics and Jews. Papers on which the programs are based will be published, as will an annotated bibliography of recommended readings and additional curricular aids.

About 8,000 teachers in Catholic high schools and elementary schools will view the programs. Ultimately, the archdiocese said, the curriculums of more than 250,000 Catholic children will be affected by the inclusion of the taped material and resource aids.

The cooperative project, other spokesmen said, is in keeping with repeated statements by the Roman Catholic hierarchy in this country on the Jews. The programs deal not only need for closer educational relations between Catholics and with the Jew in literature, but also with Judaic custom, law, ritual, practices, traditions and beliefs. The archdiocese is preparing a resource unit for this aspect of the programs.

In the literature aspect Elle Wiesel, the novelist, has taped sections on Jewish legends, and Professor Baruch Hochman of Bard College, translator and critic of the Israeli S. Y. Agnon, a Nobel Prize winner, has contributed a program on the American Jewish writer.

## B'nai B'rith Report Emphasizes Need For 'Preferential Treatment'

WASHINGTON — Leaders of B'nai B'rith expressed concern last week over what they described as an "atmosphere of lawlessness" arising from racial conflicts.

This fear was projected during a discussion of Negro-Jewish relations at the annual meeting of the organization's Board of Governors, the ruling body of the organization's 500,000 members.

The concern over Negro-white relations was reflected in a report submitted to the board by Federal Judge Sidney Sugarman of the Southern District of New York. A vice president of B'nai B'rith who headed a special committee that dealt with the urban crisis.

The report emphasized that there must be "preferential treatment" in educational, employment and housing opportunities of Negroes and other disadvantaged minorities.

Other recommendations called for a canvass of the B'nai B'rith membership to promote summer jobs for slum youths and for help to potential small businessmen in the black community who seek financial and managerial assistance.

In calling for "just enforcement of the law by an adequate and properly trained police force" the report said that public support of such law enforcement efforts is necessary to halt riots "before they gain momentum" and before private elements turn themselves into vigilantes.

Dr. William A. Wexler, president of B'nai B'rith, said that "racial indignities are not going to evaporate in riots."

But, he added, "extremism is encouraged if the national mood is to stress efforts to suppress riots over building the kind of society that is our only salvation."

"The first step in halting a riot is social conditions that will avert it," he said.

Philip M. Klutznick, a past president of B'nai B'rith, said that "without bending the rules to grant advantages to the disadvantaged, the problems of poverty in the ghetto are not likely to be solved."

The B'nai B'rith leaders deplored Negro anti-Semitism. Many, however, believed that its extent had been exaggerated. Dr. Wexler cited Anti-Defamation League studies that showed "that the Negro American is less anti-Semitic in sentiment and attitudes than the white American, just as he is less anti-white than whites are anti-Negro."

Saying that a growing element among long-time white supporters of civil rights and Negro equality, Jews among them are expressing impatience with aggressive Negro activism, one Jewish leader remarked:

"The impatience is misplaced. The Negro cries out for black power because he feels so utterly without power. He has been given equal opportunity laws but not the equality to compete for, and find, opportunity."

## Protestant Churches Ask For Israeli Recognition

TEL AVIV — Six Protestant churches asked the Israeli Government last week for authority to set up religious courts to adjudicate matters of personal status involving members of their communities.

The six churches formed the Protestant Community of Churches, and applied to the Minister for Religious Affairs, Zerach Wahrhaftig, for recognition as a religious community.

Such recognition would accord their organization exclusive jurisdiction over members of their communities in matters of marriage, divorce, wills, legacies, adoption and other matters of personal status.

Under Israeli law, carried over from the periods of Turkish and British rule in Palestine, recognized religious communities have sole competence in matters of personal status.

Nine Christian churches have had such recognition since the last century. None of them is Protestant.

The Anglican Protestant community applied for recognition during the British administration but it was rejected. The Church of England was reported to have opposed it.

The Anglican Church is the largest Protestant community in Israel. It was not in the group that set up the organization today. The six are the Baptist Convention, the Lutheran Church, the Church of the Nazarenes, the British Pentecostal Fellowship, the Christian and Missionary

Alliance and the Mennonite Church. They represent less than half the Protestants of Israel.

An official of the Ministry for Religious Affairs said that the application would be granted, provided technical difficulties could be overcome. For one thing, before the new organization can set up religious courts, it will have to adopt a unified law. Some of the churches don't have canon law.

The official said the complexity of the problem was illustrated by the fact that it took six years for the churches to make the application. Representatives of the churches, led by the Rev. Robert Lindsey, of the Baptist Convention, acting chairman of the new organization, met newsmen last week. They said their churches customarily relied on civil law. In fact, they said, they favored a Western type of pluralistic society.

According to the organization's representatives, they decided to apply for recognition because the present system discriminated against Protestants and withheld rights and services from members of their churches. Moreover, they said, it hampered their proselytization, since people hesitated to join a community that was not recognized by the Government.

Hitherto, they said, the Government had authorized them from time to time to deal with cases involving members of their communities.

## Kinsey Institute Report Finds Jews Rarely Involved In Sex Offenses

NEW YORK — A massive study of sex offenders, published by the Kinsey Institute of Sex Research, credits "elements in the Jewish culture and family life" for the fact that Jews are rarely involved in such offenses, just as they are seldom involved in crime generally. The study, which analyzed data collected over a period of some 20 years in various parts of the United States, concluded that "there are simply far too few Jews in our prison and sex offender groups to be explained in any other way."

"Sex Offenders," published by Harper and Row, is based on a sample, which the researchers consider adequate, of 1,346 white males convicted of one or more sex offenses. A sex offender is defined as an individual who has been arrested, tried and convicted for a specific sex act legally forbidden as a criminal activity.

Data on two other groups were developed for purposes of comparison. A prison group sample was comprised of 888 white males who had never been convicted of a sex offense but who had been sent to prison for some other misdemeanor or felony. A control group of 44 male whites was made up of persons who had never been convicted of anything more serious than a traffic violation. Data on the control group members' sexual histories were obtained from those of the thousands of persons who have been viewed by Kinsey Institute staff members.

Approximately two-thirds of the control prison groups were Protestant and one-quarter

Catholic. The authors indicated that Jews were slightly under-represented in the control group and were rare in the prison group. In the sex offenders group, 75% were classified as Protestant, 20% Catholic and 1% was Jewish.

The study found that in only one category of sex offenders, that of homosexuals, did the Jews constitute as much as 2%. The authors commented that this could have been anticipated "for it is only in this realm of behavior that no one can find a legal sexual outlet."

### BIAS IN LA

LOS ANGELES — A survey by the American Jewish Committee here indicated that there is discrimination among major Los Angeles corporations in the hiring of Jews for top executive posts and their election to board membership. The results of the survey were made public by Arthur Greenberg, chairman of the AJCommittee's Los Angeles chapter. It covered the hiring techniques of 27 leading Los Angeles companies. It found that while 10 percent of Los Angeles' population is Jewish, as are 20 percent of its college students, only six percent of the top corporation employees are Jewish. The figure is 51 out of 848 board members and senior management personnel.



**Concerned Over Youths' Understanding Of Relevance Of Jewish Values**

MIAMI — Leaders of the American Jewish Congress this week voiced concern over what they described as the problem of instilling an understanding among the young Jewish generation of the relevance of Jewish values to contemporary issues.

This question occupied the attention of 500 delegates at the closing session of the biennial convention of the congress at the Doral Country Club.

A report on Jewish campus youth, prepared by Theodore Bikel, a vice president of the congress who is co-chairman of the organization's Commission on Jewish Affairs, cited the "rejection of the synagogue, not necessarily for its content but for its form." Mr. Bikel is the actor and folk singer.

The report said that many young Jews were uncomfortable with "the goals and glitter of the pulpit, the plushness of the wall-to-wall carpeting, the petition for more money for the building fund."

In his intensive study, which was based on more than 100 visits to campuses throughout the country, Mr. Bikel observed that for many young Jewish people "Judaism is just like other institutions — stagnant, demanding conformism and status quo adherence."

He said the question most often asked of him in his talks with young people was this: "What connection does Judaism have with the burning problems that concern us — Vietnam, the draft, civil rights, the sexual revolution and the drug experience?"

On the answer to this question, Mr. Bikel said, will

depend in large measure the adherence of the younger generation to Judaism.

Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld of Cleveland, who was re-elected president of the Congress, said it had become "fashionable to excoriate the Jewish community for its failure to hold the loyalty of its college generation."

"This is simplistic and untrue," said Rabbi Lelyveld. "There are hosts of concerned young Jewish people. We have not failed more signally than the rest of our generation. Indeed, the rebellion of what is probably the most precious segment of the younger Jewish generation against hypocrisy, violence and disrespect of individual rights is in itself a tribute to the perennial values."

In the discussion, Rabbi Ira Eisenstein, president of the Jewish Reconstructionist Foundation, denounced the system of Jewish education in America. He contended that Jewish students at the college level "look at their studies with contempt for its irrelevance and dullness."

In a resolution, the delegates went on record in calling for a series of activities aimed at "maintaining constructive relationships with Jewish youth," including the preparation of study guides and other material on involvement in social action issues.

Other officers elected at the final session included Shad Polier, chairman of the national governing council; Harold M. Squadron, co-chairman; Frank Abrams, treasurer; Samuel G. Domash, co-treasurer, and Joseph Garofsky, secretary.

**Ousted British Leader Causes Controversy**

JERUSALEM — A British Conservative Leader who was ousted from his party's "shadow cabinet" recently for publicly demanding a ban on further colored immigration to Britain, has become a figure of controversy in Israel. Foreign Ministry sources refused to confirm or deny reports that Enoch Powell was being "discouraged" from visiting Israel at this time. A Ministry spokesman, however, said the invitation, extended to him 18 months ago but frequently postponed, still stands.

It is known, however, that leading Israelis are opposed to Powell visiting here now as an official guest of the Government. Powell had planned to visit Israel and was scheduled to lecture at the Hebrew University. But university President Avraham Harman is reportedly afraid that Powell's appearance might arouse violent demonstrations among Israeli students and the many African students attending the university and other institutions in Israel.

**ANTI-NAZIS HIT**

BONN — A left-wing organization, Democratic Action Against Neo-nazism and Fascism, which was set up in January with headquarters in Munich has been subjected since its inception to a torrent of letters and telephone calls, most of them anti-Semitic and many threatening violence, it was disclosed. Frank Arnau, a writer, its chairman, received 51 calls and 54 letters in the four days after the organization held its first rally in January in Munich, he reported.
