A groundbreaking ceremony for the new building for the Jewish Home for the Aged, to be followed by a dinner, is being planned for Wednesday, August 6, it has been announced by Max Alperin, president and general chairman of the Home.

Mr. Alperin said that after several years of study and preparation, the building plans have been finalized, and bids from several contractors have been received. It is expected that the contract will be awarded within the next week.

The building committee under the cochairmanship of Harold Leavitt and Alexander Rumpel

together with the architectural firm of Robinson Green Beretta have been working steadily to devise a plan to provide a new and modern facility capable of providing the highest quality of skilled nursing care, rehabilitation and personal care for the elderly. The other members of the building committee are Milton M. Dubinsky, Irving I. Fain, Irving Kronenberg, David Penn and Jerome R. Sapolsky.

The new complex will be a brand new facility consisting of 200 beds as well as modernization of the 1953 wing which consists of approximately 55 beds making a

total of 255 beds. The groundbreaking ceremony and dinner will be held on the grounds of the Jewish Home for the Aged at 99 Hillside Avenue. A large tent will be erected to accommodate the anticipated audience. Invitations are being mailed this week and it is urged that acceptances be returned promptly.

A committee of hosts and hostesses for the groundbreaking dinner is being set up by the following persons as cochairmen: Mr. and Mrs. Norman I. Fain, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Grossman and Mrs. Leonard I. Salmanson.

Islamic Countries Demand Jerusalem

JIDDA, Saudi Arabia: The Islamic countries are working with more determination than ever to recover Moslem religious and political rights in Jerusalem as part of a Palestinian state.

This was the main theme of the sixth Islamic conference of foreign ministers from 40 countries of Africa, Asia and the Middle East. They were told by King Khalid of Saudi Arabia that the foremost goal of all Moslems must be to see Jerusalem "once again Arab, free, pure and dedicated to Allah and the faith."

Israeli troops conquered East Jerusalem from Jordan during the six-day war of 1967.

Earlier Islamic conferences, adopted resolutions opposing Israel's annexation of Jerusalem's Arab quarter, including the Al Aksa Mosque, one of the shrines of Islam.

In a further step, the sixth conference set up a permanent committee of 13 members, including a delegate of the Palestine Liberation Organization, to conduct a global diplomatic campaign to establish Moslem rights in Jerusalem.

This decision could lead to demands by the Arabs to Iran and

Turkey, members of the Islamic conference, for military as well as diplomatic support in the event of a new Arab war with Israel.

In the past, Iran and Turkey remained aloof from the wars with Israel, but both countries are now clearly leaning toward the Arabs, partly because of Moslem bonds and largely because of political and economic interests.

Oil and Security Issues

Iran has security interests in the Persian Gulf that depend on cooperation with the Arab states. As a major oil producer, Iran has a vital economic interest in the strength of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, which has seven Arab members.

Turkey has turned sharply toward the wealthy Arab countries for economic and political support since the rise of oil prices after the 1973 Middle East war and the Turkish invasion of Cyprus a year ago.

Kissinger Upset By Statement Issued By Egypt On UN Force

WASHINGTON: Secretary of State Kissinger said here that Egypt's threat not to renew the mandate of the United Nations peace-keeping force in Sinai was "extremely unfortunate" and complicated American efforts to bring about a new Egyptian-Israeli agreement.

Speaking at a news conference in Milwaukee before flying back to Washington from a Middle West visit, Mr. Kissinger seemed exasperated by the Egyptian move, which he said had come as a surprise to the United States.

Top officials were consulting here on the significance of the ambiguously worded letter from Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy to Secretary General Waldheim.

The letter seemed to leave open a possibility of keeping the 4,200-member United Nations force in place beyond the July 24 expiration only if an accord was

reached before then or if the United Nations Security Council adopted a resolution — certain to be rejected by Israel — demanding an Israeli withdrawal from all Arab territories occupied since the war of 1967.

Kissinger and Aides Worried

At the United Nations, Secretary General Waldheim said that the Middle East situation looked especially dangerous after the Egyptian announcement. But he said he was confident that Egypt would agree to a renewal of the mandate if the Security Council took "certain steps."

Although Premier Yitzhak Rabin of Israel seemed to react calmly to the Egyptian move, Mr. Kissinger and his aides were worried that Cairo's letter could make it more difficult for Mr. Rabin to obtain wide support for the concessions required for an accord on Sinai.

Rabin Warns That Statement May Jeopardize Negotiations

JERUSALEM: Premier Yitzhak Rabin warned Egypt that her threatened refusal to extend the mandate of the United Nations Emergency Force in Sinai could jeopardize the negotiations on a new Sinai accord and undermine the existing disengagement agreement.

Speaking before Parliament, Mr. Rabin stressed that Israel was observing the terms of the existing agreement on the basis of reciprocity and that the continued presence of the 4,000-man United Nations force in the Sinai buffer zone was an integral part of that agreement.

The Egyptian Foreign Minister, Ismail Fahmy, surprised a Cairo news conference here with the warning that Egypt would not renew the mandate when it expires July 24 unless the Security Council moved to assure a speedy Israeli

withdrawal from occupied territory. He indicated, however, that the force could remain in place after that date and that it would be up to the Security Council to deal with its future.

Mr. Rabin, in a formal statement opening a debate on foreign policy, said: "If Egypt is interested in not harming the separation-of-forces agreement, it will also have to honor the existence and authority of the UNEF."

Find Detailed Plans For Attacks On Jews

PARIS: "Minutely detailed plans for attacks" on the Israeli Ambassador to France, Asher Ben-Natan, and unidentified Jewish figures in France and Britain were found in the papers of a Lebanese terrorist killed in the "Carlos affair" in Paris, the French Interior Ministry reported here.

In a communique summing up investigations in the case, the ministry said "Carlos" — a Venezuelan-born terrorist said to be actually named Illich Ramirez Sanchez, — had an important role in the terrorist squads and "everything leads to the belief" that he headed the groups.

Carlos shot to death two French counterespionage agents and Michel Moukarbel, a Lebanese who led them to the Paris apartment where Carlos was staying on June 27. Carlos is still being hunted and was last reported in Britain.

Mr. Moukarbel, the ministry said, was the head of "a logistic support, network for an extreme leftist organization, still being identified," which was preparing attacks and kidnappings in Western Europe and particularly France and Britain.

Predicts War In Mid-East


BEIRUT, Lebanon: Yasir Arafat, the Palestinian guerrilla leader, predicting an imminent new war in the Middle East, said in an interview last week that his forces had stepped up attacks on Israel and would launch even more in the future.

"As you well know, we have escalated our activities in the occupied territories, a fact easily discovered from the declarations of the military and information officers in Israel," Mr. Arafat said in an interview.

"We will continue to escalate more and more because we have homes and our rights there, and we must recover them. We have no choice. These are our homes."


TO BUILD PORT

TEL AVIV: The government plans to build a third deep water port at the new seacoast town of Yamit which is being built in the area between the Gaza Strip and the northern Sinai. Your Money's Worth

'Sifting for Savings' in Food

How much could you slash your food bill merely by consistently choosing the least costly version of each item on your grocery list and downgrading quality, convenience and fancy labels?

While surely you realize you could achieve some savings, would you believe a slashing of your food bills by an average 40 to 45 per cent? Would you believe that, even in this era of the highest food prices ever, that, "trading down" still ranks among the most significant way to reduce your food budget? Or that in some items, the trading-down need not involve more than a cheaper packaging form — and no sacrifice in quality or certainly in nutritional value?

Curious about whether the advantages of trading-down were still as spectacular as I found them a few years back, I assigned my young assistant, Cris, to the chore of pricing two typical market-baskets in three similar suburban markets — and then of calculating the precise differences in terms of dollars and percentages.

"I saved so much, it was unreal!" she reported to me when she had completed her assignment. "I had not realized what it cost to make 'quality' the paramount issue."

"The drawback is the amount of time spent in the job of 'sifting for savings.' But as I became accustomed to where and what the bargains were, I cut my shopping time too."

What Cris did was price foods from two carefully planned grocery lists — a large list of 70 items for the comprehensive needs of a family of four, a smaller list to supply one or two persons for an average week.

She obtained permission from the store managers in an independent store and members of two national chains to price all the items herself — the most expensive in a category, the least costly. Here is her short list of everyday items:

One-half gallon milk;
1 dozen eggs;
1 pound butter;
1 pound ground beef;
16 slices American cheese;
24 ounces peanut butter;
1 pound perk coffee;
2 10-ounce packages frozen vegetables;
1 pound can baked beans;
1 pound frankfurters;
7 ounces can tuna fish;
1 pound loaf white bread;
1 bar soap (to illustrate non-food items).

At the independent store, the expensive items came to \$15 vs \$10.64 for the cheapest; at the food chain stores, the comparisons were \$12.81 vs \$8.85 and \$13.17 vs \$9.44. More specific details would be self-defeating because prices vary so widely from area to area.

* By trading-down, you can indeed achieve enormous savings. On some items, your savings will

be much more than 40 to 45 per cent; on others, they may average around 20 per cent.

* In some instances, you must sacrifice quality to a degree — but quality may not especially matter in the meal involved or there may be no difference at all in quality. Why not purchase a cheaper package of carrots if the vegetable is going into a stew? Or why not look for lower priced beans if you're planning to make chile?

* Look for the cheaper box or bag in items where packaging is secondary — sugar, for instance.

* Expect to spend a lot of time at the chore when you are beginning (her lists took Cris more than two hours in each of the first two stores she checked) but, as she says, expect also to reduce this waste of time as you know what you want.

* As a side benefit, you'll really locate the stores which post the lowest prices. Reported Cris: I calculated savings of 65 per cent between the most expensive items in the most expensive store and the cheapest counterparts in the least expensive store. "This is certainly worth the cost of driving to the cheapest store."

* Forget "convenience" if lowest cost is your goal. No pre-peeled vegetables, no pre-patted hamburgers, no single servings.

* But don't worry about sacrificing nutritional value. You'll probably come out even here, for you're buying essentially the identical foods in less costly form.

Unless you truly need or want to, you can stop short of cutting to the bottom of the price scale. But there are so many places where the cuts would be no sacrifice at all that I urge you to see for yourself how much you can save this summer and fall.

Hans Morgenthau Calls US Israeli Embassy Inept

TEL AVIV: Prof. Hans Morgenthau, addressing an intimate and closed meeting of 20 persons representing various circles in Israel, strongly castigated the Israeli Embassy in America as inept. Morgenthau rated the performance of the embassy in Washington as unsatisfactory, and had especially critical words to say about the handling of public information. The famous but controversial academician charged that the Informational Section is staffed by talentless dilettantes whose track record in their field is close to zero.

The professor also disclosed that Ambassador Dinitz was dubious that 76 U.S. senatorial signatures could be obtained on a letter to Pres. Ford in Israel's behalf. According to Morgenthau, Dinitz was under the impression (which he got from Henry Kissinger) that the climate in Congress was not in Israel's favor.

THE ODYSSEY OF THE SS ST. LOUIS

The 9th day of Ab holds tremendous significance for the Jews, and is a day of universal mourning. It commemorates the destruction of the Temple by the Romans under Titus in the year 70 AD and is also the anniversary of the earlier destruction of the first Temple under Nebuchadnezzar in 586 BC.

The 6th day of June 1939 should also be commemorated and held as a day of mourning as it presaged the destruction of European Jewry. On that fateful day, 36 years ago, their doom was sealed. Three weeks earlier they had sailed from Hamburg, bound for Havana, but on arrival the St. Louis was denied the right to land its 937 passengers.

It presaged the destruction, not only of the half million German Jews, but the additional millions that came under German hegemony as her armies swept into Poland and Russia, then into the Balkans and finally invaded Greece and the islands under Greek or Italian domination.

With the advancing armies were special troops under the command of Col. Adolf Eichmann who promptly began collecting all Jews for shipment to concentration camps. It was Eichmann who gloated that if he could destroy the Jews he would jump into his grave laughing. He almost succeeded in accomplishing his mission. History fails to record whether he did indeed laugh as he stood on the gallows.

These refugees on the St. Louis constituted an elite group. Because they had been critical of Hitler and the Nazi regime they incurred his enmity. Hitler was determined to get rid of them, but, still hesitant about antagonizing world opinion, chose this way to dispose of them. Meanwhile an anti-refugee campaign in Cuba was initiated. The majority of passengers were women and children and the others were chiefly professionals or men whose businesses had been confiscated, that the Nazis wanted out of the way.

The United States, that wonderful country that had always extended a helping hand to the immigrant, seemed less eager in their welcome. Obtaining a visa in Nazi Germany for the United States was not only time consuming but fraught with danger. Frequently the long lines waiting outside the consulate would be attacked by Storm Troopers and beaten or herded onto trucks for shipment to concentration camps. Those that did succeed in obtaining a visa found it necessary to resort to bribes to obtain the application and to have it expedited. And finally there was the matter of exit taxes. The consulate officials were ill prepared to handle the vast number of applicants and received scant encouragement from our State Department.

It was difficult to meet the rigid requirements of our immigration authorities who required evidence of good moral character, and the record of an arrest in Germany was often sufficient to bar an applicant, regardless of its nature. Only those that were well off financially had influential German friends or were sufficiently prominent to discourage abuse were able to surmount these difficulties.

In the early years of the Nazis coming to power, they were willing to permit emigration as long as all possessions were left behind. The difficulty was in finding a haven and this became increasingly difficult as the neighboring countries became burdened with destitute refugees.

The St. Louis passengers had purchased in good faith what they considered to be legitimate visas, but which were merely landing permits. Manuel Benitez, director of Cuban immigration sold over 4,000 of these permits on Cuban government stationery, with appropriate seals, at \$150 each, amassing a personal fortune. So great was the demand for these permits that they sold on the black market at several times face value. It was then contingent on the permit holder to find passage on a ship to a country that would accept him. The government allowed several weeks to secure such passage under threat of arrest and deportation to a concentration camp.

Germany saw the opportunity of riding herself of her undesirable Jews and at the same time making a substantial profit. Consequently space was sold on

the SS St. Louis by the Hamburg-American Line to 937 Jews. This ship was one of the last to leave Nazi Germany before World War II erupted. In addition to the financial gain, the propaganda value the German anticipated would be even greater.

The passengers lived in constant dread that they might encounter new difficulties or that the voyage be canceled. Even after it pulled away from the dock they were fearful that it might be recalled and even when it was on the high seas continued to have misgivings. They continued to feel uneasy with a strong presentiment that their travail was not over. Those who were superstitious or religious realized that the sailing date was the 13th which also happened to be the Sabbath. However, they were fortunate in the choice of the captain.

Captain Gustav Schroder was a little man, only five feet four inches, but what he lacked in height he more than made up in courage and integrity. He was determined to make his passengers as comfortable as possible and gave strict orders to the crew that they were to be accorded the consideration given cruise passengers, and treated with deference. The crew cooperated completely, many going out of their way with personal acts of kindness.

Fortunately for their peace of mind these passengers were unaware that the "visas" which they guarded so carefully were worthless and that most of them were destined to a miserable death in Hitler's concentration camps. It is difficult to realize that this voyage did not take place during the dark ages, but in our own time. The tragedy that befell these passengers and that later was to encompass the remaining Jews in Europe was not an isolated instance, but simply another dark page in Jewish history.

Massacres of Jews have occurred and recurred down through the centuries. These blood stained records include a grim picture of the Crusaders as they waded through rivers of blood in their passage through Europe on their way to the Holy Land. Later, Jews were expelled from Spain where they had lived for centuries, had made notable contributions and where many had risen to positions of prominence.

The so called "Dark Ages" were much darker for the Jews whose lives and property were never secure. From the closing years of the 19th century into the 20th, six trials for ritual murder took place. In 1911 Mendel Beilis was tried in Russia for ritual murder and after two years of torture and torment was released, broken in health and spirit.

Senior citizens will recall the Kishinev pogroms which took place during the years 1903 through 1917 when Jews were murdered under the direction of the Russian government. Those that tried to defend themselves were shot down by the Cossacks. Finally, alarmed by the brutality of the massacres the Duma demanded the resignation of the Cabinet. Instead the Tsar dissolved the Duma.

When the Nazis came to power Hitler repeatedly threatened the "extermination of the Jews," but neither the German Jews or the world at large paid any attention. It was regarded as meaningless bombast and generally ignored. Visitors to Germany, like Pierre Van Passen, who spoke with Hitler personally, warned that his statements should be taken seriously. However, no one could decide what should be done with Germany's half million Jews and time was dissipated in fruitless conferences and discussions.

The admittance to this country of Jewish refugees was opposed by some southern senators as well as various "patriotic" groups. The American public was stirred up by the Nazi propaganda machine which carried on a massive campaign against the Jews. In an effort to win American support, they warned that the Jews would thrust this country into war. The Americans had no desire to become involved and a strong isolationist feeling was created. The Jews were described as "untermenchen" and the public urged to deny them admittance lest they "defile" the population.

A Kind Word For the Bottle

New York State's Liquor Authority has decided to let distillers and winemakers offer their hooch in fancy bottles. Imported cognac from France and blackberry wine from Japan were offered in crystal falcons and hand-painted porcelain. The American distillers were getting restless.

The reason for the ban goes back to the repeal of Prohibition. Those who framed the law suspected that anything that lent class or prestige or interest to ordinary whisky would do a disservice to temperance.

Most state-controlled stores in the South stock a quantity of rolls of paper towels. When a lady purchases two or three bottles, the clerks stuff the paper towels on top so her neighbors will think she's been shopping at the supermarket. This happens to be a very good deal for the manufacturers of paper wels. It is the o despar of temperance workers.

Some years ago a clever distiller in Georgia decided to bottle "white lightning" legally. White lightning is the bootleg corn liquor that is poured liberally throughout the South.

At first he had relatively little success in marketing it. He could not believe the bootleg lightning was better than his. Then he hit upon the happy idea of bottling the lightning in regular Mason jars, just like the bootlegger.

A variety of disguises were adopted to cloak liquor during Prohibition. Bootleggers used to set up as florists to deliver the stuff inside wreaths and gladioli arrangements. When I worked in Wall Street, the bootlegger looked just like a client coming into the brokerage to go over his portfolio except that he was carrying his portfolio and it was unusually heavy.

All I hope is that the distillers do not take away the ordinary bottle that many of us have dearly come to love. The unadorned fifth of bourbon is a symbol of comfort and help in a world too often rent by distress and tension.

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Almost 90% Of Jews In Israel Concentrated In Five Cities

TEL AVIV — The avowed policy of all Israeli governments since the creation of the State, to see the population spread throughout the length and breadth of the land, has met with no success. Almost 90% of the Jewish population is concentrated in 5 cities, while only 5% of the people

live in agricultural settlements (moshavim) and 2.3% in kibbutzim. Within a radius of 15 kilometers, the center of which is Tel Aviv, there is a dense concentration of 1,250,000 people, which accounts for almost half of the entire population. The remaining half is concentrated in a

small circle around the cities of Jerusalem, Haifa and Beersheba.


Elsewhere the population is small and scattered. In the entire Negev south of Beersheba, which accounts for half of the total Israeli territory, there are only 30,000 souls; while in the center of the Galilee it is the Arabs who are a majority.

Demographers point out that precisely after the 6-Day War, in which Israel's borders were substantially enlarged, the influx into the circle around Tel Aviv was the greatest and the population there rose by 212,000. At the same time, the population in the Galilee declined by 7%, and the vast open

territories of the Negev continue to remain unpopulated. This situation, say the demographers, is fraught with much danger to Israel's security and the consequences are no less perilous from a political and social standpoint.

Only two Declarers out of twelve made today's hand mainly because they didn't know how to handle a 4-3 fit in the Trump suit. Most Declarers dread playing hands with only that kind of a Trump holding even though often their contract is by far the superior one and in most cases the only makable one. That is why they are there in the first place, probably they had no stopper in one suit and could not bid No Trump because of that.

have that stopper. His best bid at that time was to raise his partner with his three good cards in Hearts. South had quite a bit to spare plus a singleton in that fourth suit, certainly not an asset now, so he couldn't bid No Trump either so pushed on toward game in Hearts. North, with the upper part of his bid, accepted the invitation and went on to game.

Now to make the hand. West had a natural Spade lead and continued with most Souths I watched ruffing that second lead hoping that the Trump suit would break evenly. When it didn't West was able to ruff a Club and run enough Spades along with East to set the hand. Most of the Declarers felt they were unfortunate to get that bad Trump split not realizing that the 4-2 split is more likely to be found but also not seeing that the hand should be made even with the break they received.

As soon as Dummy goes down Declarer can see that he has ten tricks if he can be able to cash all of them. He has four Trumps, five Clubs and the Diamond Ace. But he must maintain control and this is what the losing Declarers failed to do. Here is how: Instead of ruffing the second Spade he simply discards a losing Diamond. West will continue Spades and he does the same thing and throws off his other Diamond loser. Now if West persists in Spades, Dummy can ruff without costing Declarer one of his Trumps; it is usually better to ruff in the short Trump suit. If West leads something else, De-

clarer can win, pull Trumps and cash his ten tricks, they are still all there. Either way, the rest of the tricks are his and there is nothing the Defenders can do about it. Of course, ten tricks can be made at No Trump if the opening leader does not play a Spade but I am certain that whichever happened to be on lead against that contract would definitely lead that suit and the first five trick would belong to the Defense.

Moral: Ruffing in the long Trump usually doesn't gain anything whereas ruffing in the short hand usually does. This may help in situations that offer a choice even should that choice come later when you might well postpone it.



pimpled gangster of today may find himself the bilious guinea pig of tomorrow. It seems a little hard, perhaps, for a boy who has spent his formative years learning how to dodge flick knives to fall victim to intercostal perforation by a liver puncture needle.

The position of the incurably ill whose condition is progressively deteriorating is specifically precarious. He will submit to any procedure even if hazardous, and if pressed to volunteer, he will give his consent. The hope and will to live are strong.

The patient may volunteer for an experimental or hazardous situation provided that the physician has informed him properly, within the rules of the Nuremberg Code.

But what about the insane and mentally handicapped in institutions, who are forced to submit to experimentation with considerable risk; are they also volunteers?

Patients in mental hospitals, once classified, become objects for experimentation. The purpose of this classification is to provide para-legal control disguised as benevolent medical treatment of certain types of deviant behavior.

This classification is necessary because openly to classify mental hospitals as agencies of social control would be in ostentatious violation of the constitution for their inmates have been deprived of their freedom without having been convicted by due process of violating the law.

Thus the psychiatrist achieves enormous power, protected by the community, society and the establishment. The hospital psychiatrist has practically absolute powers over the inmate's life within the walls of the institution. Often he determines whether or not powerful drugs should be administered, electro-shock therapy given or even exploratory brain operations performed.

The real power, common to even the most paternalistic institutions, is the power to hold the person without consent and without "due process."

Nazi doctors were not ordered to perform experiments and selections for the gas chambers. They volunteered, programmed and took an active part in all phases of the euthanasia program. They were convinced that the inmate and patient was a subhuman, who had no rights. He was classified as a "thing" which could be subjected to any kind of experiment and cruelty.

An increasing number of medical men express their abhorrence regarding prevailing conditions in various fields of medicine which indicates that the spirit of the devaluation of human life, as practiced under Hitler's regim, has survived.

The laws in many countries provide the psychiatrists with enormous powers. Government and private funds finance experiments on human beings over which the donors have little or no control.

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

Thinking that they might have mistakenly consecrated the New Moon of Av too soon, they returned to their graves on the nights of the tenth of Av, and again on the eleventh, the twelfth, the thirteenth, the fourteenth. When the fifteenth day of Av came they looked up and saw the full moon. They then realized that the ninth of Av had come and gone and no one had died. They then understood that the death sentence had been annulled and as a result they made the 15th of Av a festival.

Why was the amount given to the Kohan for the redemption of the first born set at \$5.00?

Hebrew Version Of Pentateuch To Be Published In USSR

NEW YORK: A Hebrew edition of the Pentateuch, the Five Books

of Moses, with Russian translation, will be published in the Soviet Union for the first time since the 1917 revolution, it was announced at a press conference here. The conference marked the return of three religious leaders and trustees of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation from their June 3-10 visit to the Soviet Union and Hungary; Rabbi Arthur Schneier, of Park East Synagogue in New York and president of the Foundation; Bishop Silas, head of the largest Greek Orthodox Diocese in the United States and chief aide to Archbishop Iakovos of the Greek Orthodox Church of North and South America; and the Rev. Donald R. Campion, editor-in-chief of the Jesuit national weekly "America."

Free emigration and the opportunity for religious and cultural survival for those Russians who wish to remain in the Soviet Union stand as the main purposes of the Foundation and of this trip, they said. The three-man team acknowledged on behalf of the Soviet government officials much greater receptivity and willingness to admit that there does exist a problem in the matter of religion which cannot be solved with the old methods of repression that had been witnessed on their previous trip in 1966.

Yet, although they received assurances on the publication of the Humash and the promise to consider the creation of a central organization for Russian synagogues, Rabbi Schneier agreed that, taken in itself, this display of "gradualism" holds little importance. Viktor N. Titov, the newly appointed Deputy Chairman of the USSR Council for Religious Affairs, refused to discuss the possibility of free emigration, Rabbi Schneier stated. But the Foundation is also deeply concerned with the condition of religious life within the Soviet Union itself, and therefore these gradual considerations are vitally important, he stressed.

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
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German Youth Feel Need For 'Normal' Relations With Israel

BONN: Premier Yitzhak Rabin's visit to West Germany is, from the German point of view, a turning

point. Chancellors of West Germany have visited Israel, but when Willy Brandt, visiting Jerusalem in 1973, asked Premier Golda Meir if she would accept an invitation to Bonn, she replied, "I'll have to think about it."

Now Premier Rabin is returning the visit of the former Chancellor, who was succeeded by Helmut Schmidt last year.

Yet it is still not possible — indeed, it may never be — to speak of a "normal" relationship between Germans and Jews. The number of Jews who live in West Germany and West Berlin today — 28,000 — is certainly not "normal" in the light of history.

A Young Jew Looks Back

There were 500,000 to 600,000 German Jews before the Nazis took over in 1933. Most had been exterminated by 1945. Few of the survivors wanted to stay in a country that had shown them such terrible hate.

The largest West German Jewish Community today is that of West Berlin, about 5,000. "There is a great conflict here," said one, Hans Rosenthal, a television entertainer. "You are constantly asking yourself, 'Am I a Jew who happens to live in Germany or a German who happens to be Jewish?'" The other main West German Jewish communities today are in Frankfurt and Munich.

The average West German has learned from the past that many of the great figures of German history — Albert Einstein, Arnold Zweig, Heinrich Heine — were both German and Jewish. Today there are no prominent figures in German public life who are Jewish, but a German with even distant Jewish relations is apt to cite the fact almost with pride, as Egon Bahr, the negotiator of much of the Brandt policy of accommodation with Eastern Europe, did recently on a television talk show.
