Unrelaxed Tension Exists Throughout Berlin and Provinces

Thuringia Bans Union

Berlin, Mar. 10—(JTA)—The general election has passed off both in Berlin and the provinces without anti-Jewish disturbances.

During the whole of the week-end German Jewry lived in a state of unrelaxed tension, which was not diminished by the marching and counter-marching of Nazi torch-light processions and parades throughout the country.

There was, however, a recrudescence of activity against the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith during the week-end. At Erfurt, Dortmund and Essen the local offices of the Union were raided by Nazi Auxiliary Police. In these three cities a great deal of alarm was aroused among Jews by these raids, though nothing incriminating was found.

The demost decisive action yet taken against the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith is the complete dissolution of the Union in Thuringia, ordered by the Thuringian government over the week-end.

The official statement declares that "following a report spread abroad regarding a Thuringian pogrom on Jews, the government condemns this as lies and libels, as if pogroms could ever occur in Germany. The government is determined to protect all of foreign race or origin, but suspects the Central Union of responsibility for the circulation of this false information abroad. It, therefore, orders the dissolution of the Central Union all over Thuringia."

PURIM — THE FEAST OF LOTS

Purim, a minor feast in the Jewish calendar, will be observed

Sunday. The reading of the Book of Esther from a parchment
scroll on that day and on the preceding evening constitutes the
principal feature in the synagogue service. The feast recalls principal feature in the synagogue service. The feast recalls the deliverance of the Jews of Esther and her kinsman, Mordecai, from a threatened massacre planned by Haman, the king's vizier. In the words of the Book of Esther it commemorates "the days wherein the Jews had rest from their enemies, and the month which was turned unto them from sorrow to gladness and from mourning into a good day." It was decreed that the day be observed in increase of the state of the st

mourning into a good day." It was decreed that the day be observed in a joyous spirit that finds expression in sending portions to one another and gifts to the poor.

The feast bears the name of "Purim" because it is recorded that Haman, the arch enemy of the Jews, sought to fix the day of their destruction by casting "Purim," which, according to a popular etymology given in the Book of Esther, means "lots." The feast is more social than religious. It does not require cessation from labor or any special religious ceremony other than the reading of the Book of Esther and the reciting of a few special mayors inspired by the event commemorated.

In former times the celebration, in some places, partook of the nature of a carnival. At present the story of the Book of Esther is frequently presented in dramatized form. The injunction to remember the poor was and is observed faithfully. During the centuries of persecution, the Feast of Purim was quite popular, due, perhaps, to the fact that the story of deliverance from the plottings of the tyrants, which the day recalled, brought hope of a similar deliverance from the evil designs of existing Hamans.

LEVINSKY LOSES BUT FELDMAN COMES THROUGH

The slug fest at Madison Square Garden last week gave two popular Jewish heavyweight fighters a chance to show their wares to a packed assembly of fight fans. King Levinsky, nee Harry Karnow of Chicago, managed to allow himself to be beaten by an old veteran, Johnny Risko, of Cleveland, while Abe Feldman kept his record intact by decisively defeating Johnny Rousseu.

Feldman stole the show. Although Levinsky was the headliner, it was Abie who got the cheers. Meeting Rousseau in a return bout, our new East Side hero, put on a slam bang battle for six hectic rounds. The bell saved Rousseau in the fourth when Feldman knocked him down with a right uppercut to the chim. The French philosopher was wobbly thereafter. Feldman earned his decision and there was no doubt about it this time. In their previous meeting the crowd thought that Feldman had been given a present, but now they are convinced who is the better fighter. Levinsky's defeat was a disappointment, even though Risko had earned two decisions before this meeting. Risko has been receiving beatings for years and is getting no younger. If Levinsky was unable to take him, it means he is at best just another heavyweight with no chance of getting into the championship class.

The only thing in Levinsky's favor is his gameness. He can take it and he had to.

The crowd was delighted with the spectacle. Both boys showed a willingness to mix it. Even when the bell rang announcing the end of a round the boys would continue to throw punches. At one point the referee and some of the seconds had to pry the two fighters apart. You'd think the boys enjoyed feeling leather.

The annual Golden Gloves Tournament, sponsored by the New York Daily News is putting on its show. In Chicago and New York eliminations will be held after which teams from each city meet in a dual match. The kids are all amateurs and fight for the honor of it—and that, strangely enough, makes a goodfight. There will be a number of Jewish boys fighting for the metal that so many of us are trying to get.
