## The Sixth Column

We quote from a leaflet published by the National Conference of Christians and Jews:

Who Are We of the United States?

"We of the United States are:

One-third of a million, Indian, One-third of a million, Oriental, Filipino, and Mexican, 60 million, Anglo-Saxon; 10 million, Irish, 15 million, Teutonic; 9 million, Slavic, 5 million, Italian; 4 million, Scandinavian, 2 million French; 13 million, Negro, 1 million each, Finn, Lithuanian, Greek.

In addition, we are:

2 million, Anglican Episcopalian, 40 million, Evangelical Protestant, 1 million, Greek Catholic, 4½ million, Jew, Two-thirds of a million, Mormon, One-tenth of a million, Quaker, 22 million, Roman Catholic, One-half million, Christian Scientist."

What an extraordinary invitation to racial and religious intolerance! And yet what a magnificent opportunity to put racial and religious intolerance where it belongs—on the dump heap of prejudices destroyed by common sense! For no American can read this table of situations without realizing that racial and religious intolerance in the United States is dynamite—guaranteed, if it explodes to blow up everyone.

Henry Seidel Canby, editor of the Saturday Review urges the creative American writer to cultivate this field of prejudices in which subtler dangers lurk than in Uncle Tom's cabin or the wayside camp of the migrant laborer. This great theme, says Mr. Canby, of what happens to minds diseased by bigotry, of what happens to a complex country that lets fanatics and the too human ignorant slash at leg and arm and liver and heart to stop a headache, this great theme is not one on which books can be written to order. If written to order they will not be read. It is not necessary to order them; they will write themselves once the American imagination becomes aware of the dramatic danger which threatens our majorities.

In this battle against the Know Nothings, the ammunition will come from the social scientists who have plenty in stock; but if the country is to realize what the Sixth Column in our midst is blindly trying to accomplish, concludes Mr. Canby, it must be made to see and feel a crisis—and that is a job for literature!

## Pro-Nazi Teacher Forced to Resign

PHILADELPHIA. — Miss Bessie R. Burchett, teacher of Latin in the Philadelphia public schools, has submitted her resignation, shortly before the Board of Education was to consider her dismissal on charges of fomenting race hatred and insulting the President of the United States.

Miss Burchett has attracted attention in the past six years by extolling Nazi theories, addressing meetings of the German-American Bund and similar groups and distributing anti-Semitic literature. She will receive a \$1,500 annual pension.

## Favors Palestine

WASHINGTON. — Governor J. Howard McGrath, of Rhode Island, has joined the American Palestine Committee under the chairmanship of U. S. Senator Robert F. Wagner to support the movement for developing Palestine as "an outpost of freedom and social justice" and preparing the Holy Land for large-scale colonization of hundreds of thousands of Jewish refugees from war-torn European lands during the post-war period, it was announced this week at Senator Wagner's office.

## Reveal Food Package Racket As Nazi Espionage "Front"

NEW YORK. — Although generally regarded as a petty racket whereby Germany is able to obtain a certain amount of foreign exchange here, the sending of food packages to Germany is merely a "front" for Nazi espionage, it was revealed this week by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi

League.

Duties of the directors of the "food" concern consist for the most part of keeping members of the National Socialist Party in the U. S. prepared for any assignment that propaganda headquarters in Berlin may hand out.

The "food" service, incidental to the real purpose, will provide packages of food which the Anti-Nazi League claims have been stolen from victim-nations of the Nazis such as Denmark, Norway, France, etc. As an example of typical prices the League quotes \$13 for a package named "Herbert" which will provide about 8 pounds of coffee.

## Call on Public To Force Action

N. Y. Legislative Attempt Strikes Apathy Snag

ALBANY. — Two bills, designed to eliminate discrimination in employment in New York are now pending in Committee and will not be voted on unless public opinion demands action, advocates of the measures declared this week.

Recommended by Governor Lehman in his annual message to the State legislature, the two bills were introduced by Senator Gutman and Assemblyman Wagner. The first would eliminate discrimination because of race, color, creed or religion by the utility companies, insurance companies, banking organizations and businesses affected with a public interest. The Wagner bill prohibits discrimination in employment by contractors or subcontractors for public works, on account of race, creed, color, or religion.

Unless the measures are voted out of Committee by the first week in April they will accumulate the dust of interesting but forgotten reforms.

Those sponsoring passage of the bills have embarked on a campaign to waken the public so that their legislators will be forced to give the bills their attention.

## U. S. Jury Indicts German Agency

WASHINGTON. — Transocean, a German news agency, and two of its officials were charged with violating the foreign agents registration act in indictments handed down here by District of Columbia Federal grand jury.

The individuals indicted were Dr. Manfred Zapp, American manager for the agency, and Guenther Tonn, an assistant. The indictments charge that Transocean established a subsidiary in this country in 1938 to disseminate propaganda for the German Government and the Nazi Party and failed to register in compliance with the law.

## Questioned by Court On Kosher Sign

NEW YORK. — Dinty Moore, the restaurant owner, had to appear in court the day after St. Patrick's to answer the charge that he advertised kosher calves' liver with bacon. He admitted that there was somewhat of a contradiction but argued that anyone not wanting bacon could order liver and onions. After the magistrate agreed and dismissed Dinty, the Irishman said he was foolish in the first place to have a kosher sign under the name of Dinty Moore and wouldn't do it again.

## FINE AMSTERDAM JEWS

GENEVA. — A heavy fine will be imposed on Amsterdam's 100,000 Jews for alleged participation in anti-Nazi demonstrations in which one uniformed Nazi was killed and scores of others injured.

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## N. Y. News Hits Whispering Campaign Aimed at Jews

NEW YORK. — Condemning a "whispering campaign" blaming American Jews "for our being as deep in the war as we now are," the New York Daily News presented facts this week refuting the anti-Jewish arguments.

"In the Senate," said the paper, "the leaders of the fight for the bill were Barkley of Kentucky, Brynes of South Carolina and George of Georgia. Those men are all from regions where the Ku Klux Klan was strongest. To say they are subject to Jewish influence in their bailiwicks is ridiculous.

"Of the three House leaders of the fight for the bill, the most powerful, Speaker Sam Rayburn,

is from Texas; Majority Leader John W. McCormack of Massachusetts is a Catholic, and House Foreign Affairs Committee Chairman Sol Bloom is Jewish.

"And in the real test vote in the House on February 8 (Tuesday's House vote was just a bandwagon affair), all the Southern Democrats except Peterson of Georgia and Cannon of semi-Southern Missouri voted for the bill. The only Southern and semi-Southern Senators to vote against H.R. 1776 were Reynolds of North Carolina and Clark of Missouri.

"Interventionism is evidently the majority American sentiment; and the most war-minded part of the whole country is the South, which has the highest percentage of native American stock, and where Jewish influence in politics is almost non-existent."

## Palestine for Jews Would Solve Post-War Problem, Says Weizmann

NEW YORK. — Declaring that the Jewish problem is a world problem representing a challenge to those who will guide the post-war reconstruction efforts of the world, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and of the World Zionist Organization, said this week in his first public declaration since his arrival by Clipper in the United States, that British statesmen and the leaders of democracy everywhere must recognize that the solution of the Jewish problem lies in giving the Jewish people an opportunity to build a land of its own.

Sounding the warning that mass deportations and expulsions of Jews are being used as weapons against democracy by the Nazis, Dr. Weizmann said that "wherever a refugee problem can be developed that situation will benefit the totalitarian forces. That is why the problem of Jewish homelessness becomes vitally bound up with the world problem as a whole. That is why

the task of rebuilding the Jewish National Home in Palestine becomes a responsibility of the entire world. The Jew is being used not only as a scapegoat but as a weapon as well.

"What has at long last been borne home to the great majority of Jews and of democratic statesmen is, that the solution of the Jewish problem lies in giving the Jewish people an opportunity to build a land of its own. In the words of Lord Halifax uttered only yesterday: 'Every nation, great or small, will have its place and make its own contribution.'

## Britain to Observe Day of Prayer

LONDON. — Chief Rabbi J. H. Hertz announced that British Jewry will participate in the national day of Prayer on Sunday which was proclaimed by King George. The Chief Rabbi's statement said:

"His Majesty's subjects will loyally obey the royal summons and all congregations under my jurisdiction will, receive the order of service containing supplications to Father in heaven for strength and guidance in the stern struggle before us, as well as prayers of thanksgiving for the merces and victories hitherto granted to the forces of freedom."

TEL AVIV. — Jewish longshoremen from Tel Aviv and Haifa have been transferred to the ports in Africa from which the Italians have been driven out by the English in order to assist in moving the regular military transports.

### CREAM CHEESE DAINTIES

1 cup sifted cake flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup shortening  
 1/2 pound cream cheese  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 1 tablespoon caraway seeds  
 Sift together flour and salt. Cream together shortening and cheese, and blend in sugar, gradually stir in flour. Shape in two-inch rolls, wrap each in waxed paper and chill thoroughly in refrigerator. Slice thin, sprinkle with caraway seeds and bake in hot oven (400 F.) about six minutes. Makes about 40 cookies.

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## British to Expedite Prisoner Swap

### Nazi-Zionist Exchange Approved by Parliament

LONDON. — The British Government has done everything possible to expedite the exchange of German women, children and old men now detained in Palestine for Palestinians detained in Germany.

The question of reciprocal repatriation was raised this week by Captain William Frederick Strickland, Conservative M. P., who two months ago had inquired whether in view of the privations suffered by the women, children and old men of Palestinian nationality who are detained in Germany the Government would not expedite an interchange with similar German internees in Palestine.

At that time the Colonial Undersecretary replied that action had already been taken and that it was hoped that through the good offices of the United States Embassy such an interchange would soon be effected.

## Introduce "Jewish Money" in Poland

ZURICH. — Introduction of special "Jewish currency" whose circulation will be restricted to Jews is now being contemplated by the Nazi authorities in Poland according to reports from Cracow.

The reports state that under the new plan all Jews will be ordered to submit their cash to the National Bank in exchange for bills which will be marked "Jewish money." Similarly Jews receiving a limited monthly allowance from their blocked accounts in Polish banks will receive these sums in "Jewish currency."

The measure will be introduced first in Lodz, where some 160,000 Jews are herded in a ghetto, the reports state. According to the Nazis, it was necessary "in order that Jews should not be able to smuggle their money out of the country."
