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Sopkin to Direct Memorial Gifts Group for R. I. Hospital

A special committee of the Memorial Gifts committee, headed by Alvin Sopkin as chairman, has been organized in support of the Rhode Island Hospital \$5,000,000 building fund, in collaboration with Godfrey B. Simonds, chairman of the Memorial Gifts Committee, and Henry B. Cross, Ronald C. Green, Jr., and Albert H. Poland, associate chairmen of the committee.

Mr. Sopkin and his associates have been planning for several weeks for their part in the community-wide undertaking to finance the construction of the new \$5,000,000 hospital which will replace the original building opened shortly after the Civil War.

Project Discussed

One of the first planning sessions of Mr. Sopkin's committee was held at the Ledgemont Country Club last week when the pro-

ject was thoroughly reviewed and discussed.

It was recognized that even before Pearl Harbor, Rhode Island Hospital was becoming seriously overcrowded and that its facilities and staff were overstrained by increasing demands. The remarkable progress of the medical arts in recent years has led to new techniques of diagnosis and therapy that can be carried out effectively only within a hospital.

Hospital Demand Increases

The growth of the Blue Cross insurance plan, moreover, has brought the benefits of hospitalization to new groups of people. This is dramatically illustrated by the hospital's records which show that in 1940 semi-private accommodations were occupied to 72 percent of capacity whereas by 1944 this rate had increased to 144 percent, or far beyond the normal occupancy for semi-private rooms.

A Voluntary Hospital

The group headed by Mr. Sopkin recognized that since 1868 Rhode Island Hospital has pioneered as one of America's great voluntary hospitals. From the beginning the hospital accepted a responsibility for caring for the sick and infirm, regardless of creed or financial status. It also took leadership in introducing modern methods of nursing care and nursing education and in adopting antiseptic and aseptic methods of combating infection in surgery. Born out of the suffering of the Civil War, the hospital and its staff have given distinguished service in each subsequent conflict.

The Mighty 7th

Chairman Roderick Pirnie of the Rhode Island War Finance Committee made a pointed statement when he issued a reminder that "it is up to us to make the word 'mighty' apply to the 7th War Loan here in Rhode Island."

The U. S. Treasury put the descriptive adjective in the name of the current war bond drive to enlarge and to stimulate the public's conception of the campaign. But, it will not be a "Mighty" 7th unless we, by pouring out our dollars in exchange for these bonds, make it so.

It is a good example of the fact that deeds speak louder than words.

During the past War Loan drives, we of this small State have had good reason to be proud of our War Bond purchases. We have oversubscribed each one of the six War Loans. We have met our E-Bond quota in every case.

The real challenge of the 7th is to reach the enormous goal of 24 million dollars worth of E-Bond sales.

The War Finance Committee is confident that we will again oversubscribe the 79 million dollar over-all quota. It is only in the E-Bond category that any anxiety has been expressed. It is up to us to do the job—to make the "Mighty 7th" mighty.

Good Reply

Were there a Pulitzer prize for the best reply of the year, the First Unitarian Church of Miami would get it for its reply to Congressman Clare Hoffman's charge that Jews constitute a disproportionate percentage in certain occupations. As reported by Walter Winchell, the church bulletin carried the following comment:

"There is some justice in the feeling that Jews tend to monopolize certain occupations. The Jewish Year Book (1944-45) shows Jewish rabbis are exclusively Jewish. There is not a single reformed Presbyterian operating a kosher delicatessen on Hester street, New York City. Jews have consistently refused to become Episcopal bishops. We might pile fact on fact to show their avoidance of typically American endeavors, just as joining the Ku Klux Klan, the 'Christian' Americans or the Deutsches Bund."

Congressman Gets Catholic Award

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — Congressman Samuel A. Weiss, of Glassport, Pa., second vice-president of B'nai B'rith's District Grand Lodge No. 3, will receive the annual meritorious service award of Duquesne University, a Catholic school, which is given annually to the alumnus or alumna of the university who has done the greatest service for the university and the nation in the previous year.

The first Jew to be voted the award since its establishment 12 years ago, Congressman Weiss, who graduated from Duquesne University in 1927, was the first Jew to captain its football team, the first Jew to head its student council and the first Jew elected to its athletic council.

Newspapers Score Ramsay For Anti-Jewish Motion

LONDON — In a two-column editorial headed "Enter the Jew-Baiter," the Daily Mirror warns against the motion introduced in Commons by Capt. Archibald H. M. Ramsay, which urged the revival in Britain of medieval anti-Jewish laws.

"Released from incarceration, this gentleman returns to Westminster in the last hours of the dying Parliament and impudently puts forward a proposal likely to endanger all hope of peace and goodwill in the country," the Mirror says. "Anti-Semitism is always the first rung of the fascist ladder and must, therefore, be regarded with intense revulsion."

"The Mirror bases its policy on the common rights of man," the editorial continues, "and Jews are

Sen. Brewster Hits British Palestine Policy '45 UJA Agreement Signed

Action Forced by War Relief Board

Estimate Needs Exceed 80 Million

NEW YORK — An agreement was signed last week, reconstituting the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees, Overseas Needs and Palestine as the combined national fund-raising body for overseas relief and rehabilitation, for the rebuilding of the Jewish homeland in Palestine and for refugee aid in the United States. This announcement was made by Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, campaign chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, by Herman L. Weisman, acting chairman of the United Palestine Appeal and by Edwin Rosenberg, first vice-president of the National Refugee Service.

It was reported, some three weeks ago that a hearing has been held in Washington before the President's War Relief Control Board, at which representatives of the UJA's constituent agencies were requested to state their reasons for not continuing the United Jewish Appeal.

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Captured Streicher



PARIS — Major Henry Plitt of New York, wanted to capture Hitler but had to be satisfied with the next best thing when he caught Julius Streicher, notorious anti-Semite. In addition to this feat, Major Pitt's deeds have been recognized by eight awards, the Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, Two Presidential Citations and the Purple Heart with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

Synagogue Seeks to Prove Mortgage Not Authorized

Members of the Congregation Sons of Abraham sought to prove in Superior Court this week that a mortgage for \$29,240 on the Synagogue, now held by Samuel Bomes, former treasurer and now honorary treasurer of the Congregation, had not been authorized by the board of directors.

Bomes is seeking to foreclose on the mortgage and the present suit is to enjoin him from taking that action.

Morris Kirshenbaum, financial secretary of the Congregation, testified he was unable to find in the corporation records any action authorizing execution of the mortgage on or about January 29, 1940, when it was signed.

Harry Lerner, one of the signers of the mortgage, testified that he was approached by Harry

Leach, who was president of the Synagogue at the time, and asked to sign the instrument.

When he said "There never was a meeting," Lerner testified, Leach responded, "What do you care? Mr Bomes doesn't need the money. He'll never bother us for it."

Other members of the Congregation who testified this week included Louis Bedrick and Mitchell Shulkin, Louis Trostanoff and Isadore Lazarus.

Ship-Owner Sues To Recover Line

NEW YORK — Claiming he was compelled, under threat of death, to sign the Red Star shipping line over to the German Government in 1938, Arnold Bernstein, German-Jewish refugee, former owner of the Arnold Bernstein Steamship Line, and the Red Star Line, filed a recovery of assets suit for \$4,800,000 against the Holland American Line, which acquired the Red Star Line from the Nazi Government in 1939.

Mr. Bernstein's suit set a precedent and its outcome is awaited with interest.

Commission May Restore Property

LONDON — The Allied military authorities have established a special commission to examine the value of properties confiscated from Goering and other Nazi bigwigs. It is reported that a commission will be established of representatives of all states overrun by the Germans for the purpose of restoring property especially to the first victims—the Jews.

Speaks at Dinner To Dr. Ilie Berger

Dedicate Roger Williams Colony

Britain's reluctance to open the doors of Palestine in accordance with its pledge, was scored last Tuesday night at the Narragansett Hotel by Senator Ralph O. Brewster, (R., Me.) who was guest speaker at a testimonial dinner to Dr. Ilie Berger and the celebration to mark the successful conclusion of the Nachlath Roger Williams campaign.

Hinting that Britain's action might be tied up with the competition for oil in the Middle East, Senator Brewster said that "if another war starts, it will start in the Middle East."

Concerning the closing of Palestine to immigration he said that "the Congress of the United States is ready to ask Churchill to re-open the doors of Palestine whenever he finds it practicable to withdraw the military veto which has been imposed."

In addition to the talks by Senator Brewster and Governor J. Howard McGrath (honorary president of the committee which raised the money to establish the Roger Williams Colony in Palestine) the audience heard tributes to Dr. Ilie Berger's work in behalf of the community and Zionism.

White Paper Quota Reduced to 1000

JERUSALEM — Only 1,000 immigration certificates for Jews remain under the White Paper quota, it was disclosed by Eliahu Dobkin, chief of the immigration department of the Jewish Agency.

Commenting on the allotment of 3,000 certificates this week by the Palestine government, Dobkin described the allocation as "miserable and insulting in light of the tremendous need and the demand for certificates. In every corner of Europe" he said, "people released from concentration camps by the tens of thousands, who can find no rest or peace, wish to emigrate to Palestine which is ready to absorb them."

Zionist War Bond Drive Reaches \$1,362,250 Mark

War Bond purchases credited to Rhode Island Zionists climbed to \$1,362,250, more than three times the amount reported last week, it was announced by Dr. Myron Keller and Dr. Ilie Berger, chairmen of the Providence and Rhode Island committees.

Both men urged that buyers of bonds remember to have them credited to the Zionists. "We have a long way to go," they said, "to exceed our total of last year and there are only two weeks remaining of the Seventh War Loan Drive."

Estimate Current Needs 80 Million

A high official of the War Relief Control Board confirmed the report of the board's intervention. "Frankly we expected an agreement and are glad to hear an accord was reached."

It was stated that the estimated needs of the agencies comprising the United Jewish Appeal amount to more than \$80,000,000 for the current year. Last year American Jews contributed approximately \$30,000,000 to the United Jewish Appeal for the rescue, relief and reconstruction programs of its constituent agencies.

The following is the text of the announcement of the re-establishment of the United Jewish Appeal:

Text of Statement

The Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service have reached an agreement whereby the United Jewish Appeal will serve as the combined national fund-raising instrument for these agencies.

"The separate appeals which have been conducted by the constituent bodies during the past four months have been abandoned and all funds raised throughout the year 1945 will be distributed among these agencies in accordance with a mutually acceptable formula."

Services List Dates, Restrictions For Pacific Mails

The War Department announced this week that the mailing period for Christmas parcels to Army, Navy, Coast Guard, Marines and Merchant Marines personnel overseas will be from September 15 to October 15, during which period no requests from the addressees will be required for the mailing of Christmas parcels.

The Navy Department announced the following guide to all organizations that sponsor campaigns for public contribution of Christmas packages or funds with which to purchase Christmas packages to be sent to Navy Coast Guard and Marine Corps personnel who may receive no packages of their own.

"Parcels presented by private individuals, firms, corporations, or associations sponsoring such campaigns, shall not be accepted for mailing unless they are addressed to the individuals for whom intended, the addresses to show, in addition to the full name of the addressee, his rank or rating and the naval unit to which he is assigned with the Navy number assigned thereto, or the name of the ship and fleet postoffice through which the parcels are to be routed."

Providence, for two and a half generations, have shown an intense pride in improving the hospital and increasing its usefulness. Many of the present units on the hospital grounds honor the names of these men or stand as memorials to their loved ones. Examples are the Royal C. Taft out-patient building, the George I. Chace home for nurses, the Jane Frances Brown Building, the Jesse H. Metcalf dormitories, the Grosvenor Building, the Aldrich House for Nurses, the Joseph Samuels Dental Clinic for Children and the Gladys A. and Isaac M. Potter Memorial Building.

Memorial Gift Plan

Anticipating that in the honored traditions of the past a response to modern needs will be found, the Memorial Gifts Committee has developed a plan by which present-day families and individuals may dedicate a children's clinic, a diagnostic laboratory, an x-ray therapy room, a patient's room or some other suitable unit of the new hospital in memory of a departed relative. Similarly a memorial may honor a living person, such as the founder of a business. A bronze tablet, suitably inscribed, will be placed on the door or wall of the unit selected.

A memorial may be established through a subscription covering the estimated cost of constructing and equipping the chosen unit in the new hospital. Memorial opportunities are listed in an illustrated brochure prepared for the building fund committee.

To Increase Capacity

Harris H. Bucklin, president of Rhode Island Hospital and chairman of the building fund, in commenting on the new 10-story hospital, said it would be one of the largest and most completely equipped voluntary hospitals in the United States. The enlarged hospital will accommodate more than 800 patients and its total capacity will be increased by 255. Patient beds will be grouped in four-bed units for both semi-private and ward service, in accordance with enlightened modern practice. A new out-patient department serving thousands of clinic patients,

will be closely integrated with the hospital's laboratories and x-ray and physical therapy departments, forming a powerful buttress of preventive medicine.

First Response Encouraging

The Memorial Gifts Committee, now in the initial stages of its work, is meeting a very encouraging early response, according to Mr. Simonds. A score or more of subscribers have under consideration units of the new building as memorials to husbands, wives, parents and children, he said. These prospective memorial sections range from individual beds in a four-bed room to entire suites or departments.

Mr. Sopkin, in reporting on the progress of the committee he heads, expressed confidence in the success of its forthcoming efforts.

Hospital a Vital Need

"The citizens of Providence are known for their alert civic conscience and may be relied upon to respond fittingly to this hospital program," Mr. Sopkin said. "The \$5,000,000 Rhode Island Hospital building program is the answer to a vital need. Its completion will mark a most timely contribution toward the completion of a hospital system adequate to meet the expanding demands expected in the postwar period when the new therapies and techniques developed at the battlefronts will be made available to citizens.

"I am sure that those with whom our committee confers will wish to avail themselves of the opportunity to participate generously in this magnificent community undertaking which is destined to bring health and happiness to thousands in years to come."

Famous Jews Honored by Brown University

BY BERNARD SEGAL

When June comes, a college man's memories and nostalgia turn towards grass carpeted and tree shaded campuses. No matter how long one has been relegated to that clan of forgotten men, the alumni, the emblem of commemoration day orations and Ivy chain parades, stir up half dormant emotions. So you will hear with me, if I go back to the campus on the hill, now that June is here.

Our last paper dealt with the "First" of the Jews at Brown University. This time we will record some of the men of fame and distinction of the Jewish Faith, who were honored by Brown for their achievements, in their fields.

Answers to Inquiries

But first, a few remarks in answer to the many inquiries concerning Israel Strauss and Oscar Strauss, of whom we wrote in the last article. No, they are not related. Notice the spelling of the

last names. Israel is a native of Pawtucket, the son of Alexander and Hanna (Falk) Strauss. The father has the distinction of having served as president of the Congregation Sons of Israel and Deaf for nearly three decades. Dr. Israel Strauss is a well known neurologist. He served as the president of the Jewish Mental Health Society. He was the chief neurologist of the Beth Moses Hospital in Brooklyn. He published numerous papers on neurology and psychiatry. Dr. Israel Strauss now resides in New York City.

Straus Background

Oscar Strauss was one of the three famous Straus brothers, Isidor, Oscar and Nathan. They were brought as little children by their father from Germany in the middle of the last century. Their grandfather, Jacob Lazar Strauss, was a member of the Sanhedrin (Jewish Tribunal) instituted by Napoleon in 1806. Oscar Strauss was appointed as U. S. Envoy to Turkey by President Grover Cleveland and again by President Harrison. He returned as Ambassador to that country under President Taft. His greatest triumph was when he was given a place in President Theodore Roosevelt's cabinet, as Secretary of Commerce and Labor.

Oscar Strauss was the first Jew to hold a Cabinet office in the U. S. Government.

We like the way the President put it, in the characteristic Teddy Roosevelt manner, in offering the post to Oscar Strauss:

"I have a very high estimate of your judgment and your ability, and I want you for personal reasons. There is still another reason: I want to show Russia and some other countries, what we think of the Jews in this country."

Held Many Offices

That was the Russia of 1905, the year of the bloody pogroms. By other countries, he had particularly in mind, Austria-Hungary, who at that time objected to a U. S. Council, because of his Jewish descent. Oscar Strauss, the recipient of the honorary degree

from Brown, has the distinction of holding offices under five presidents of the U. S., his last appointment coming from President Woodrow Wilson, to serve on the Court of Arbitration at the Hague, in which post he remained until 1920.

And now for the other men of fame:

Simon Flexner

In 1914, Brown conferred the degree of Doctor of Science on Simon Flexner, who held similar degrees from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Penn., Maryland, Johns Hopkins, Washington, Cambridge and by Universities in Germany, France and Belgium. Rather an impressive list. To men of science, he is known as the discoverer of the typhoid bacillus, which bears his name. He isolated the organism, which causes Infantile Paralysis and devised methods of treatment. But his greatest achievement and contribution to Medical Science was attained in the 33 years as Director of Medical Research at the Rockefeller Institute in New York. In this capacity, he directed and encouraged medical research that benefitted mankind.

Musicians Honored

From science to the realm of music, and we find two brilliant names among those to be honored. Serge (Alexandrovitch) Koussevitzky, director of the Boston Philharmonic Orchestra, and Walter Damrosch were given the Degree of Doctor of Music, in 1926 and 1932 respectively. Koussevitzky hardly needs introduction to Providence readers. At least once a year, he honors the City by a visit with his Orchestra. The writer was a Junior at Brown, when Koussevitzky was given his Honorary Degree. At a chapel assembly the guest of honor was introduced and in the words of President Faunce, he was to speak "in the only language all humanity understands." He played on the Viola. That chapel hour stands out as the most enjoyable of them all.

Walter Damrosch

Damrosch achieved recognition as the "Dean of American Conductors" through his long years of conducting, teaching and writing music. He is often referred to as the nation's music teacher. The Friday Music Appreciation Hour, conducted by him for many years, was a part of the American scene. His voice over the air, saying, "Good afternoon, my dear children" was an invitation to millions of school children in their classrooms all over the country, to the enjoyment of good music.

Frank W. Taussig

In 1914, Brown honored an economist and teacher of fame in the person of Frank W. Taussig, of Harvard. Born in St. Louis in 1859, he came to Harvard as a young man of 25, and remained there for a period of 34 years, as instructor, assistant professor, professor and professor emeritus, until the end of his fruitful life.

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Cpl. Kleinman, in Germany, Encounters First Refugees

Cpl. Victor Kleinman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Kleinman, of 127 Pembroke avenue, in a recent letter to his parents, described his first meeting with Jewish refugees while stationed at Berg Gladbach, Germany.

"They were traveling," he said, "in a caravan drawn by horses. They were shabbily dressed and looked like they had gone through Hell. I questioned them in German and the spokesman, a woman about 70 years old, was too frightened at first to speak. I'll never forget the look on her face when she learned I was Jewish. She threw her arms around me and kept jumping up and down.

"She told me of all her trials and tribulations. Two of her sons

were killed in front of her because they refused to fight in the German Army. Many of her family had died of starvation and ill treatment. They had very little food and less clothing. They were on their way home to Poland.

"I drove back in the truck and got my blankets and rations of candy and sweets for the week and brought it out to them. The look on their faces was ample repayment. You just can't imagine what these people have gone through. Any ordinary people would have died long ago. They had courage, faith and the will to live in spite of all their hardships. Hitler thought he could kill our people but he couldn't obliterate the spirit and soul of the Jews."

In 1940, Taussig was the founder of the Harvard Graduate school of Business Administration. He edited and contributed to Journals of Economics and wrote numerous books in his field.

Benjamin Cordozo

The last Jew of fame to be honored by Brown was the late Benjamin Cordozo, Associate Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court. The honor came to him in 1933, one year after he was appointed by President Herbert Hoover to the bench of the Highest Court in the land. Previous to that Cordozo was the Chief Justice of the New York Court of Appeals, in which body he served for 18 years. His untimely death was sincerely mourned by the entire country. The high esteem in which he was held can be judged by the many institutions, who conferred honors upon him. Among these besides Brown were Yale, N. Y. University, Harvard, St. Johns, St. Lawrence, Williams, Princeton, Pennsylvania, Chicago, London and the Yeshiva College.

As we look back at the list and reflect on these men and their work we thought of an old truth:

He who bestows honor upon a scholar, does honor unto himself.
For just as these men were honored by Brown, the university was honored by their presence.
