Weisman, acting chairman of the United Palestine Appeal and by Edwin Rosenberg, first vice-president of

the National Refugee Service. It was reported, some three weeks ago that a hearing has been held in Washington before the president's War Relief Control Board, at which representatives of the UJA's constitutent agen-cies were requested to state their reasons for not continuing the United Jewish Appeal.

The Navy Department announced the following guide to all organizations that sponsor campaigns for public contribution of Christmas packages or funds with which to purchase Christmas who may receive no packages of their own.

"Parcels presented by private individuals, firms, corporations, or associations sponsoring such cam-paigns, shall not be accepted for mailing unless they are addressed to the individuals for whom in-tended, the addresses to show, in addition to the full name addressee, his rank or rating and the naval unit to which he is as-signed with the Navy number assigned thereto, or the name of the ship and fleet postoffice through which the parcels are to be routed."



DISTRIBUTING telephones on a bargain counter basis (everyone for himself) would be a quick way for us to dispose of available facilities. But would it be best for all concerned? For example, shouldn't those whose work is important to the war effort or to the safety and health of the community have preference?

Communications are very close to the public welfare, especially in wartime. That is why we distribute telephones only in strict conformity to Government regulations set up for that purpose.

People agree that this system is fair. Under it, no one can get a telephone out of turn.

As each new application for service comes in, we check it in the light of these regulations and existing facilities. The waiting applications are reviewed periodically . . . none is overlooked. And applicants are asked to keep us informed of any change in their circumstances which would alter their application status.

So, because available facilities are distributed according to a well-considered plan, there is no opportunity to get service except under rules which people tell us they think are fair rules, fairly administered.

(Continued from Page 5) in 1940. Taussig was the found-er of the Harvard Graduate school of Business Administration. He edited and contributed to Journals of Economics and wrote numerous books in his field.

Benjamin Cordozo

The last Jew of fame to be honored by Brown was the late Ben-jamin Cordozo, Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. The came to him in 1933, year after he was appointed by President Herbert Hoover to the bench of the Highest Court in the Previous to that Cordozo was the Chief Justice of the New York Court of Appeals, in which body he served for 18 years. His untimely death was sincerely mourned by the entire country. The high esteem in which he was held can be judged by the many institutions, who conferred honors upon him. Among these besides Brown were Yale, N. Y. University, Harvard, St. Johns, St. Lawrence, Williams, Princeton, Pennsylvania, Chicago, London and the Yeshiva College.

As we look back at the list and reflect on these men and their work we thought of an old truth:

He who bestows honor upon a cholar, does honor unto himself.

For just as these men were hon-ored by Brown, the university was honored by their presence.
