### Violence in Palestine Increases

#### Martial Law Decree Possible

##### Council Condemns Kidnapings, Attacks

JERUSALEM — A 5 p.m. curfew was clamped on Tel Aviv this week after five British officers were kidnapped there and two others shot in Jerusalem in continued, mounting attacks on British forces by the Jewish underground army.

The death toll in two days of battle rose to 19.

As the Jewish forces added bold, daylight sorties to their night attacks, the fighting assumed the character of undeclared war against the British Army.

The Jewish underground was said to be convinced that only by widespread violence on a mounting scale could Zionist grievances be brought to the attention of the world, especially the United States.

British authorities also were reported considering a martial law decree for all Palestine.

All Tel Aviv was declared off limits for British troops of all ranks. The Tel Aviv municipal council, at a special meeting, condemned the kidnappings and appealed to the extremists to "release your prisoners."

#### TO KEEP ARMS

WASHINGTON — Dr. Nahum Goldman warned this week "that if Britain decides to disarm the Jews in Palestine, they will have to kill 10,000 of them."

### Editorials

#### Bevin's Betrayal

Ernest Bevin's Bournemouth speech, filled with Hitlerian innuendo and slamming the doors of Palestine in the faces of the war-ravaged Hebrews of Europe, failed to catch Hebrew resistance leaders in Palestine unprepared.

Irgun and Haganah leaders, close to the progress of Arab conspiracy and the maneuvers of the British Army in the Middle East, were not relying heavily on the acceptance of the Anglo-American Committee's recommendations for the resettlement of 100,000. Within the last month they followed President Truman's efforts on their behalf with interest but were frankly dubious of the success of his appeals.

Inside Palestine, June has long been regarded as the crisis month. Aware of the intense international pressure operating on the British Government, Palestinians were not surprised at the intemperate character of Bevin's speech. Informed political sources in Palestine interpret Bevin's remarks as presaging a new development of British imperialistic tactics.

It is now expected that Great Britain is prepared to resort to naked force, if necessary, to maintain her unchallenged position in the Middle East.

### Election Board Urges Shekel Holders to Vote on June 30

Dr. Ilie Berger, chairman of the Providence Shekel Board for the election of delegates to the World Zionist Congress, this week issued an appeal to all Shekel holders to vote on June 30. "It is of great importance," he said, "that we register a very large vote now to repudiate the anti-Semitic utterances, delivered recently by British Foreign Minister Bevin, regarding the admittance of 100,000 displaced Jews from Germany into Palestine."

"We know that it is difficult to hold elections in the summer," he continued, "because many people are vacationing, but it is infinitely more tragic for those unfortunates in Europe, who are looking to us for escape from the Hell in which they were thrust by the Nazis, and whose only hope is Palestine."

"As you know," Dr. Berger went on, "the elections were supposed to be held on June 16, but the withdrawal of the Labor Zionist Party, the Mizrahi and the Revisionists made it imperative for the National Shekel Board to advance the date to Sunday, June 30, when all parties in the Zionist movement will vote for their candidates."

"Should you happen to be out of town, you can vote on your Shekel by going to the polling station in that town, according to the rules established by the National Shekel Board."

"I urge again that you do your duty and do not fail us. Vote! Do not say that they can get along without your vote. We need you and your vote!"

### Shortage of Meat Forces Butchers to Close 3 Days

Due to the shortage of meat and poultry, the kosher butchers of South Providence this week voted to close their shops on Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings, in addition to their regular Monday closings. This means that they will be open Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. When asked how long this schedule will be in effect, a spokesman for the men stated that the shops will observe it as long as the present

critical condition exists.

The following butchers are participating in the new schedule: H. Berlinsky, M. Bernstein, S. Bernstein, M. Davis, Fishman's Market, M. Gomberg, Harry Katz, M. Sugerman and Fred Spiegel.

### Pledge \$19,000 Towards Erection Of Day School

Board members of the Lubavitcher Hebrew Day School, who met last Monday evening, pledged to loan the sum of \$19,000 towards the erection of a new modern school building. At a meeting of the Day School \$2,000 was raised to defray current expenses, and \$4,000 was pledged. Harris Miller has announced that additional large pledges towards the loan are expected to be made during the next week.

### 25,000 D.P.'s Flee to U. S. Zone

FRANKFURT, Germany — U. S. Military Government officers report that nearly 25,000 Displaced Persons have come to American camps in the last three months.

"We expect thousands more to appear," one officer said. "If there is a feeling in Eastern Europe that Europe is no place for the Jews, we would expect up to 300,000 from Poland and eastern Russia. We will have to open more camps and get more food from the United States to care for them."

### Women Veterans To Organize Post

Paul J. Robin, national recruiting officer of the Jewish War Veterans, has called a meeting of all women of the Jewish faith, who served in the armed forces of the United States. He stated that the purpose of the meeting will be to organize a women's post of the J.W.V. All eligible women are requested to attend the meeting, which will be held this Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in his offices, 1430 Industrial Trust Bldg., or to contact him prior to the meeting.

### Suggest Negotiated Slate for Congress

Members of the R. I. Election and Shekel Board last Monday night voted to request the National Shekel Board to arrange for a negotiated slate to the World Zionist Congress and to cancel the election scheduled for June 30. Because of the confusion caused by last week's postponement and the fact that many shekel holders will be at summer homes and resorts, it was thought advisable to take this action, a spokesman for the Board said. Other cities have taken similar action, he said. But until official word has been received that the petition has been granted, preparations will continue to hold the election as scheduled on June 30.

### Attlee Dodges 'Hasty' Conclusion

LONDON — Prime Minister Attlee refused in Commons this week to make what he called "a hasty conclusion on the recommendation by the Anglo-American Commission for the immediate admission to Palestine of 100,000 Jews. He declined even to answer one questioner who asked when the United Kingdom would decide.

"This matter is one in which we are in close contact with the Government of the United States and I cannot make a statement at present," he said.

### Wise Rejects ZOA Nomination

NEW YORK — Dr. Stephen S. Wise, co-chairman of the American Zionist Emergency Council, and a member of the executive of the Jewish Agency, has announced that he would not accept nomination on the Zionist Organization of America slate for the election of delegates to the coming Congress.

### Amount Double That Raised in '45

#### Speakers Stress Needs, Obligations

In an historic decision, 110 of the larger givers to the General Jewish Committee, last Wednesday night voted to set a goal of \$800,000 for the 1946 campaign so that Providence might fulfill its obligation to the starving Jews of Europe. The amount is more than twice that raised in the '45 campaign.

#### Year of Decision

Before setting the goal, the attendants at the dinner which was held at the Narragansett Hotel, heard Harry Seeve, assistant director of the national UPA, say, "This is a year of decision: The war is not over for 100,000 Jews in Displaced Camps or for 900,000 more who are living in a purgatory in many European countries outside of the American and British Occupational Zones. Providence men and women, as in other cities, must face realities and share the obligations and responsibilities of saving the homeless. People everywhere," he said, "are yearning to do their share. All that is needed is that the leaders of the community take cognizance of this demand. The response, I'm sure, will be surprising and gratifying."

Alvin A. Sopkin, general chairman of the 1946 drive, then introduced Edmund L. Kaufman, former president of the ZOA, whose gift to the UJA this year was \$350,000, who emphasized further Mr. Seeve's request for a goal in line with Providence's ability to give.

#### Accept Obligation

Following a discussion of what the Providence goal should be, in which 20 men participated, Max L. Grant made a motion, which was seconded by Joseph Finkelstein, that the Providence goal be set at \$800,000. The motion was approved almost unanimously. Mr. Grant then stated, "In setting this goal every one here must realize that we have accepted an obligation to fulfill our share of the quota."

Archibald Silverman, president of the GJC, speaking in favor of the \$800,000 goal, said he was confident Providence men and women would do their share in helping to save world Jewry.

More details concerning the opinions of the men who set the largest goal for charitable purposes in the history of the city, will appear in next week's Herald.

### Crum Urges Inquiry Into Mufti's Escape

NEW YORK — Bartley C. Crum, U. S. member of the Anglo-American Inquiry Committee on Palestine, disclosed this week that he has telegraphed Secretary of State Byrnes urging an investigation of the "grave consequences" of the freedom of the former Mufti of Jerusalem who is "lost," presumably in the Middle East, after vanishing from France.

JERUSALEM — The Jewish underground radio declared this week it had uncovered a "highly secret" British plan to deport Zionist leaders from the Holy Land "if the position in Palestine takes a more serious turn."

Saying that the plans called for wiping out Haganah, the illegal Jewish defense organization, and bombing and shelling of any Jewish settlements which resisted search, the broadcast added:

"We Will Fight"

"Let the Jews the world over and the whole civilized world know what Masters Bevin and Attlee and their henchmen are preparing for us, and let the world know that we will fight."

## Learn Secret Codes

"It is perfectly obvious," the announcer said, "that this blacklist is aimed not only at the liquidation of Haganah, but at the liquidation of the entire Jewish community."

The broadcast said the resistance movement had learned from the document all the secret codes it said the British planned to use in an attack to "disrupt and disarm Jewish forces."

## Forty Americans to Settle in Colonies

NEW YORK — Forty American members of the Hechalutz movement, pioneer youth training organization, sailed for Palestine to settle in various cooperative colonies there. Five children, the youngest eight months old, sailed with their parents aboard the S. S. Marine Shark.

The prospective settlers were trained for several years at two training farms at Hightstown and Cream Ridge, New Jersey. They will enter agriculture, engineering, education and other fields as members of the Histadruth, the Jewish labor federation. This is the fourth Hechalutz-trained group to depart for Palestine within the last eight months. Also sailing are eight American ex-servicemen who will attend the Hebrew University and the Haifa Technicon under the provisions of the G. I. Bill of Rights.

## Good-Will Pledges Scored at Congress

## Least Effective Way to Fight Bias

NEW YORK — Trying to fight intolerance by raising a lot of money and putting on high pressure tolerance campaigns is not only useless but actually dangerous, Dr. Gene Weltfish told delegates to the American Jewish Congress convention at the New Yorker last week.

"Getting people to make good-will pledges," she said, "is not only the least effective method of influencing conduct. It is dangerous because it permits people to go on doing what they want to do while hiding behind fine phrases and saving their consciences with ineffectual gestures."

Malcolm Ross, director of the dying Fair Employment Practices Committee, told the convention that wartime employment gains of minority groups were rapidly being lost. "There is no way to give minority groups equal opportunity to use their full skills except through Federal intervention by Federal law," he said.

Eisenhower recommends broad program of inter-American "military co-operation."

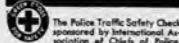

## Camp Centerland to Open July 1; List New Activities

Camp Centerland, day camp of the Jewish Community Center, starts its sixth season on July 1. It was announced this week by Simeon Kinsley, Center executive director. Under the leadership of Charles M. Browdy, newly appointed director of activities, a number of changes have been introduced, which will enable the camp to give improved service to the campers.

### Bus Transportation

For the first time transportation will be available daily to and from camp. School buses will pick up

and leave the children at a point near their homes. Places where the children will be picked up and returned have been arranged so that no child will have to cross a street to reach the bus or his home. Counselors will accompany the children on all bus trips.

### Nursery Group

A second innovation is a nursery group of four and five year olds who will be under the direction of a counselor trained in working with nursery children. A program of creative activity, free play, music, dramatics, and story-telling, spaced to provide adequate rest periods, has been arranged for this group.

All children will receive milk twice daily. Daily inspections and regular weighing-in will be conducted to provide a careful check-in on the children's health. The services of a visiting doctor will be available and activities will be regulated to the physical abilities of the campers.

Greater use of wooded parks will be made to provide the children with a maximum of real country camping. Trips to Lincoln Woods, Johnston Memorial Park, and other safe rural places will be featured twice a week. Swimming instruction and free splash periods will be a part of the regular camp program, the use of the Hodgeman pool having been secured for this purpose. Qualified counselors will teach swimming and life saving.

A staff of specialists in athletics, arts and crafts, dramatics, and music will be supplemented by mature general counselors assisted by junior counselors.

Hope Field, a short distance from the Center, will be used for athletics and field games. A further innovation will be the formation of a pioneer group of older boys and girls who will carry on a camp construction project in a wooded area accessible to the city.

The camp day will start at 9 o'clock and close at 4:30 o'clock. The camp will run Mondays thru Fridays from July 1st to August 16th.

Registration, including registration for bus transportation, can be made any day or evening at the Jewish Community Center. The capacity of the camp is one-hundred twenty-five children.
