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GJC PLANS HUGE MASS MEETING ON SEPTEMBER 22

Mrs. Silverman Cites Lack Of Defeatism in Palestine

Mrs. Archibald Silverman, speaking before the Providence Chapter of B'nai B'rith at an open meeting, which was held at the Biltmore Hotel last Tuesday afternoon, declared that "The British are to blame for the reign of terror which is now going on in the Holy Land." Mrs. Silverman who stated that "The world has forgotten its Bible, which after all, through its prophecies, has foretold the difficulties of today," was introduced by Mrs. Irwin Silverman, program chairman. Mrs. Maurice Robinson presided over the meeting, and Mrs. Isaac Gerber gave the opening prayer.

"The ignorance of both Jew and non-Jew is appalling," Mrs. Silverman said, "when anyone can question the right of the Jew to Palestine." Having lived in Palestine half of each year for eight years preceding the war, Mrs. Silverman, upon her return there several months ago, was amazed at the miraculous build-

ing which had taken place during her absence. There were beautiful additions to old colonies, and new colonies built even during war years. Everyone was working to beautify each spot.

She discovered that a new colony, Ezer, was founded as an answer to the arrest of the seven chiefs of the Jewish Agency and the sacking of the Yagur. The four day curfew of Tel Aviv was a challenge which founded Gaza, a colony 40 miles from Tel Aviv. In these, and the six new colonies, which are even now being launched, the slogan is "Our work must go on; we must build and prepare for the 100,000 who will come." Mrs. Silverman stated that wherever she went, preparations were underway for new building projects "for the 100,000 who must come at once." "Despite British plans to bring about an economic crisis, new industries are being created and plans are being laid for the reception of more and more tourists who will be coming into the land." The pioneers are continuing with their effort and although work has necessarily slackened due to the curfew, she found no spirit of defeatism anywhere.

R. I. Zionists To Meet Sunday To Decide Regional Program of Action

Dr. Ruth Gruber, foreign correspondent for the New York Post, will be the guest speaker at the first quarterly conference of the R. I. Zionist Region, which will be held this Sunday at the Jewish Community Center, in Newport. Dr. Gruber, who covered the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestinian affairs, will give a "Report on the Situation in Palestine." A question period will follow her address.

Dr. Samuel Adelson, of Newport, will preside over the evening session of the conference. The invocation will be given by Rabbi Jules Lipschitz, of Newport, and Mayor MacCaughy, of Newport, and Arthur I. Baran, president, of Woonsocket, will extend greetings.

During the afternoon session there will be a symposium on "A Program of Action for the Rhode Island Zionist Region." Participating will be Frank Licht, of Providence, presiding officer; M. Louis Abelson, of Providence; Dr. Gerald G. Feinberg, of Newport; Morris Espo, of Pawtucket, and Joseph Shorr, of Woonsocket.

Not All Jews Plan To Leave Poland

WARSAW — Contrary to reports, not all the Jews left in Poland now are planning to leave. But even those few who are planning to remain admit that they may have to change their minds in a hurry.

It is not a question of economic security and certainly not a question of an unfriendly government. It is simply the fear that tonight or tomorrow the innate anti-Semitism of so many of the Polish people may break out in violence.

Sopkin Urges Jewry to Attend

A huge mass meeting launching the 1946 campaign of the General Jewish Committee, Inc., will take place at the R. I. School of Design Auditorium on Sunday evening, September 22, at 8 o'clock. It was announced this week. A program, including prominent speakers, is being arranged. Further details will appear in next week's Herald.

There will be no solicitation of funds, and admission is free. The meeting is open to the entire community.

Governor John O. Pastore will bring the greetings of the State of Rhode Island, and a film entitled, "The Battle for Survival," and narrated by Orson Welles, will be among the features of the evening.

Archibald Silverman, president of the GJC, and Alvin A. Sopkin, chairman of the campaign, urged everyone in Providence to reserve the date of Sunday evening, September 22, for this affair.

Mr. Sopkin stated, "This is an event you will not want to miss. As the first major assembly of the 1946 GJC campaign, it will serve to give you a vital picture of world Jewish affairs—a basis for enlightened community action."

Jewish Agency Called Obsolete

WASHINGTON — Charging that the Jewish Agency is "an obsolete body dominated by Englishmen like Weizmann, Brodetsky and others" which "in no way represents the Hebrew people," Peter Bergson, chairman of the Hebrew Committee of National Liberation, this week said that "should it persist in its present course, it will be vigorously repudiated" by the Jews.

Baruch to Receive '46 Freedom Award

NEW YORK — Bernard M. Baruch will receive the 1946 Freedom Award at a dinner in the Hotel Commodore on October 8. The plaque cites Mr. Baruch "for serving with vision and statesmanship in the world's quest for peace."

Making a Living

Some interesting figures appear in the Intermountain Jewish News of Denver on how the Jews of New York make a living: retail and wholesale business 17%; brokers and salesmen 16%; skilled and unskilled trades 14%; clerks 12%; needles trades 10%; professional, including 4,500 physicians 6 1/2%; building trades 4%; domestic service 3%; transport and communications 3%; managers 3%; city, state, and federal employees 1.4%; and building contractors 0.3%. This comes roughly to 90%.

The other 10% probably includes the huge crowds which rush about in all directions at all times of the day and night.

White Sheets And Brown Shirts

If the Federal Bureau of Investigation continues its fine record of solving the majority of its cases and tracing all guilty persons, then the leaders of the Ku Klux Klan must watch their actions more closely.

The Justice Department has disclosed it is investigating the Ku Klux Klan in New York, Michigan, Tennessee, Florida, California, Mississippi and Georgia, and will direct action against the organization wherever violations of Federal laws were found.

Government action is finally being taken to bring before justice these so-called "Americans" who make their land a tougher place in which true Americans desire to live, and it is about time that such was done.

The white-sheeted Klansmen might finally take their place along the line with the Brown and black shirts who blackened the name of humanity in a world attempting to produce decency.

26 Seditionists May Avoid Trial; Evidence Insufficient

WASHINGTON — The 26 Americans accused of conspiring to undermine morale and cause insubordination in our armed forces are about to go scot free, it was predicted in informed quarters this week.

These are the same 26—including Joe McWilliams, Elizabeth (Liz) Dilling and Edward J. Smythe—who escaped a verdict in 1944 when their mass sedition trial was ended by the death of Justice Edward O. Eicher. The trial had lasted eight months.

The Government now must decide what it is going to do by September 20, the date set by Eicher's successor, Chief Justice Rolihtha Laws, for a hearing on fixing a date for a new trial, if any.

Judge Laws' action brought into focus the attitude of Asst. Atty. Gen. O. John Rogge, who prosecuted the first mass sedition case. He has said that he is "troubled" about the unlikelihood of getting convictions in view of a U. S. Supreme Court decision which reversed a Chicago court conviction of Elmer Hartzel on the ground

that the Government had failed to prove Hartzel "intended" to undermine the loyalty of the armed forces.

Rogge also is known to be disappointed with the evidence obtained on a recent trip to Germany, where he searched for documents relating to Nazi and Bundist fifth column activities during the war.

Beth-David to Transfer Scrolls to New Synagogue

Beth-David Congregation will transfer its scrolls from the old Synagogue on Chalkstone avenue to the new structure on Oakland avenue and Sparrow street in a colorful ceremony which will begin at 1:30 o'clock this Sunday afternoon. It was announced this week by officials of the Congregation.

The ceremony, known as "Hachnunas Hatorah" or "Escorting of the Scrolls," will be attended by communal officials and many members of the rabbinates. Goldman, of Temple Emanuel, Rabbi Morris G. Silk, of Congregation Ahavath Shalom and Rabbi Maurice Savitzky, of Dorchester, Mass.

Jacob J. Alprin, president of the Congregation, Henry Brill, chairman of the building fund, and Julius Gilden, treasurer, this week issued an invitation to Providence Jewry to attend the ceremonies. Mr. Alprin will be toastmaster for the occasion.

Mr. Brill revealed this week that services for the High Holidays will be held in the upstairs auditorium of the new Synagogue. There is still time, he said, to have names of beloved ones inscribed in the Beth-David Golden Book which will be read during the Holiday services.

Refreshments this Sunday will be under the direction of the Ladies' Auxiliary. Mrs. Esther Resnick, president, assisted by Julius Gilden. Music will be under the supervision of Bernie Perelman.

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"One Man's Opinion"

Wanted: A
Community Spokesman

The Jewish community of Providence, like many of its sister communities all over America, has been subject to venal and written attacks in public speeches and in the press. As we have seen, the Evening Bulletin has printed some of these overtly invidious soundings, but actually invidious letters.

Recently a lady, no doubt a kind lady, a philanthropist at heart who wishes nothing but good for her fellowmen, became alarmed when she read that, thanks to American contributions, European Jews living in Displaced Persons Camps were receiving in support about four thousand dollars each. Why, oh why, she weeps, didn't Americans contribute the same amount in 1929 to each person who was unemployed due to the depression? Weren't they worth saving, merely because they did not belong to the Jewish faith? she asked innocently in her letter to the Editor.

Each phrase in the lady's letter was a deadly barb of bigotry, aimed at showing the Jews as a selfish people, caring for nobody but their own.

Should freedom of speech and the press be abused in this way? Treatise on Tolerance

Then another citizen complained that he was sick and tired of hearing sermons and reading articles on tolerance toward the Jew. It is about time that the Jew was taught tolerance, says

the man who signs his name "Tolerant".

These are but a few of the attacks that have managed to seep by the watchful eyes of the reporter who reads and selects the letters to be published in the Journal-Bulletin. No doubt it was a mere oversight, and to use an oft-quoted phrase, "does not necessarily reflect the opinions of the publishers".

Individual's Reply Insufficient

A reply to these letters by an individual, protesting an item in the column is not sufficient. These attacks are not aimed at an individual Jew. Nor are they meant for one segment of the Jewish community. Mr. Mumford of Oakland Beach, the kind lady, and the gentleman who thinks that the Jews are in need of a lesson in tolerance, all of them direct their slander at the Jews as a whole. They do not distinguish between Zionist and non-Zionist, religious and atheist, manufacturer and pushcart peddler. It is a mockery on a most disgusted people, that it is always attacked as a unit.

No Single Unit Representative

No single society, therefore, no particular fraternity, club, or group, can take upon itself the role of defender. We have seen, in the past, that this method has failed utterly and completely. No matter how strong and influential these organizations are, they are merely a part of the whole, and are not authorized to speak for the entire Jewish community.

The great need is for a community spokesman.

This spokesman is to be above party lines, is to include all social and economic groups, and to represent all religious and cultural gradations of the community.

Recommends the GJC

We can think of no fitter agency for this task than the General Jewish Committee of Rhode Island.

Formed about two years ago, for the purpose of more effective fund raising for relief purposes, this committee has met with a high degree of success, and has won the trust of the community. The GJC represents a fair cross-section of the population; and can speak with authority. In its present composition it can command the respect and the support of all men of good will in our state. Fortunately, men of good will and fair play are not lacking among our Gentile neighbors in this state as in all the other states of the Union.

The primary function of the GJC has been to collect funds for "healing the sick, aiding the poor, and freeing the captives". The additional task of defending the name and the honor of the Jews in the state against evil tongues and evil pens will be right in line with its original purposes.

The community is in need of such a spokesman.

It is in need of a spokesman who can act in all matters that pertain to the entire Jewish community with courage, yet without alarm; act quickly, yet in good judgment, and, above all, in good taste.

- ¼ cup bread crumbs, sautéed in butter (or vegetable shortening)

Cook cabbage and onion separately in boiling salted water just until tender. Drain thoroughly. Place in alternate layers in casserole, dotting each layer with butter (or vegetable shortening). Pour Soup over all and cover with crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Serves 4.

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

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Intern Assaulted To Make Him Quit

Forced to Walk On Glass Splinters

BUENOS AIRES — Anti-Semitic interns at the hospital attached to the Buenos Aires University medical school have assaulted one Jewish intern and threaten three others in an attempt to intimidate them into quitting their posts, it was learned here this week.

Leonard Chait, the victim of the attack, was forced to strip and plunge into a pool of icy water and was then compelled to walk barefoot on glass splinters.

"What happened to Chait is nothing compared with what we are going to do to you," his assailants warned the other three students, one of whom is a woman. A detailed report on the attack was presented to the University authorities by the Democratic Association of Medical Students.

Following receipt of the report the University authorities issued a strongly worded warning against further anti-Jewish attacks. However, it is not expected that the warning will have any effect on the pro-Nationalistic students.

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
