## 250 Jews Reported Cairo Riot Victims

### GJC Prepares for Cantor Visit

As final details were being added daily, the over-all picture of the General Jewish Committee's 1948 "Year of Destiny" fund-raising campaign this week took on the tangible form of a sweeping canvas.

With the organizational framework virtually completed—as a result of months of intensive Summertime activity at GJC headquarters—there remained less than two short weeks before the unveiling of the local campaign on Wednesday, Sept. 1.

On that evening the all-important Initial Gifts Dinner will be held, with Ledgemont Country Club providing the background—and the central character none other than Eddie Cantor, America's best-loved entertainment artist, who will be the featured speaker.

#### A Dramatic Picture

Back only a short time from an extensive tour of DP camps and heavily populated Jewish areas in Europe, Cantor—according to all reports—will draw upon his observations to give a dramatic picture of the sordid conditions under

which 1,400,000 Jews still exist—three years after the war's end.

The bright tones of his colorful verbal canvas will be represented by the glowing future promised—for tens of thousands of these homeless survivors of totalitarianism's savage oppression—by the new Republic of Israel.

The sombre colors will be expressed by the untold sufferings they have endured, with body and soul held together only by their undying faith in a future etched with peace and security.

GJC officials this week received a telegram from Cantor definitely confirming his presence here Sept. 1.

The celebrated entertainer wired: "Am looking forward to my R. I. visit Sept. 1. Overjoyed to hear that campaign plans are shaping up so well. Sincere best wishes to all Providence GJC workers, donors and friends."

Gov. John O. Pastore, it is expected, will attend the Ledgemont meeting to convey to Cantor the

### BV UJA Women's Luncheon Tuesday



Madame Oppert, born in Paris, was educated in France, England and Germany. After her husband was killed by the Nazis she assumed charge of the Maison d'Enfants, one of the eight children's homes in France administered by the Committee for the protection of Jewish Children and supported by the Joint Distribution Committee.

Madame Oppert has just returned to the United States after a two month survey of Jewish communities in Europe, and is touring the country to bring home to the people of the United States

### Scene of New Fighting



Fighting between Arabs and Jews raged this week along a front extending from Ramat Rahel (south of Bethlehem) to the northern suburbs of Jerusalem. An Israeli communique said the Arabs opened fire with mortar and machine guns. Continuous firing could be heard in the old, Arab-held walled city of Jerusalem, the communique said.

### Centerland Starts Cohen Memorial Fund

A Camp Centerland Memorial Fund, in memory of the late Raymond L. Cohen, was announced

this week by Milton Kay, chairman of the camp committee of the Jewish Community Center. The initial gift was received from Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Samors.

The fund will be used for improving and increasing the facilities at Camp Centerland, which is operating for the first year on its own site of 25 acres on the Pawtuxet River in Hope, R. I.

This summer the camp served nearly 300 children and is one of the largest day camps in the country.

### Jewish Women Urge Price Controls

NEW YORK—The National Council of Jewish Women, hewing to the line of a vigorous progressivism, has called for immediate re-enactment of price control and rationing and strengthening of rent controls.

Mrs. Joseph M. Welt of Detroit, president of the group, warned that the anti-inflation bill passed by Congress at the special session would not halt rising prices.

### First Uncensored Story of Disorders

GENEVA—An account of a week of large-scale rioting in Cairo against Europeans that resulted in death or serious injury to at least 250 Jews at the hands of mobs of Egyptians was published this week in the newspaper National Zeitung of Basle.

The newspaper said that its account was the first uncensored report of events in the Egyptian capital during late July, and that its correspondent had been the first eyewitness journalist to leave Cairo since the occurrences.

The casualty figures tally closely with those in information received in Israel and reported from there. Some of the events mentioned in the Swiss dispatch, such as explosions at two Jewish-owned department stores, which were officially ascribed to bombing raids, and the murder of Stephen A. Haas, a United States citizen, had been reported from Cairo but only as isolated incidents.

The National Zeitung said that rigid Egyptian censorship had prevented both the local and foreign press from publishing anything about any other murders.

#### Explosion in Main Street

The Palestine truce was accepted on Sunday, July 18, and during the night of Monday to Tuesday there was a big explosion in one of the main streets, almost destroying two of the largest department stores—both Jewish-owned—and killing a number of persons. Immediately heavy anti-aircraft fire began and the Government put out a statement that a plane had carried out a raid. One French-language paper that did not print anything at all on the incident had an entire edition

### Editorials

#### A Neat Trick

Great Britain last week summoned the Security Council into an "emergency session" to consider the plight of 250,000 Arabs who have fled Israeli territory since hostilities began.

The widespread panic among the Palestinian Arabs was not entirely spontaneous in its origins. It was carefully nurtured by the Arab propaganda machine, aided and abetted by its traditional ally—Great Britain. It was no accident that British army vehicles of every description were made available for the evacuation of Haifa and Tiberius, to facilitate the mass exodus. It is also significant that 20,000 Arabs returned to Haifa within a week of its occupation by the Haganah.

So the propaganda stunt backfired to a large extent: it created unexpected tensions in the Arab world and "enlightened" the Palestinian Arabs. But it did not entirely lose its value as a political weapon in the hands of the United Kingdom.

Alexander Cadogan, seeking new grounds for holding back the ten thousand Cyprus "illegals," tries to equate their plight with that of the Arab refugees, knowing full well that the two problems have not the faintest relationship to one another.

He also hopes to impose upon Israel the military and economic liabilities of readmitting at this moment a quarter of a million Arabs—a body of refugees which his government deliberately created!

It will be a neat trick—if he gets away with it.

cancelled, coming out later with the story of the plane's raid.

It was only one week later, after the riots, that censorship permitted the publication of a letter from the director of one of the destroyed stores to the Attorney General. It stated that the explosion had been caused by a "ground mine placed there by a person unknown." This series of incidents, the reports said, laid the groundwork for an outburst of Arab anger and vengeance that kept the city for nearly three days in a state of terror.

Howling throngs of Arabs invaded the Jewish quarter and attacked every visible European with knives and stones. "The exact number of victims will never be known to the world," the report states. Diplomatic and informed sources agreed, however, that the number of dead and wounded was more than 250.

## Friends of Touro to Meet in Newport Sunday

Henry L. McCarthy, executive secretary of the National Citizens Council on Civil Rights, will be the main speaker at the first annual meeting of the Society of Friends of Touro Synagogue, to be held Sunday, August 22 in Newport, it was announced this week by Dr. Bernard C. Friedman, chairman of the arrangements committee.

McCarthy, as a representative of the American Jewish Committee, recently collaborated with the staff of the President's Committee on Civil Rights. A former Dean of the College of Commerce of DePauw University and a member of the faculty of the University of Chicago, he served as the Midwest Regional Director of the Social Security Board in Chicago. Under McCarthy's direction, the Council on Civil Rights is promoting the establishment of a permanent governmental commission on civil rights and is assisting in the civil rights programs of many national organizations.

The event will commemorate the letter, sent by George Washington in August 1790 to the Hebrew congregation of Newport, that contains the widely quoted statement: "For happily, the Government of the United States which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens." The main observance in the synagogue will be preceded by a reception in the Jewish Community Center and a meeting of the society's national board of directors.

## Israel Headed for First Cabinet Crisis

TEL AVIV—Israel's provisional government appears this week to be headed toward its first cabinet crisis.

The issue, beneath the domestic split which appears on the surface, boils down to whether the world's republic leans toward Russia or the U. S. A.

Premier David Ben Gurion insists that Palmach, Commando force of the Israeli army, be dissolved as a separate military organization with its own headquarters. Ben Gurion's political party is the Mapai, the general labor party which corresponds somewhat to the British Labor Party.

Opposing Ben Gurion on the Palmach issue is the Mapaam, the extreme left-wing fusion party, to which most Palmach members belong. Mapaam is a coalition of minorities, including the Hashomir Hatzair (Young Guardians) and leftist splinter groups. The Hatzair party founded and is supporting some two dozen communal

settlements where about 50,000 Jews practice Communist endeavor.

### Resulted in Walkout

The rift already has resulted in a walkout of the assistant defense minister, Israel Galilee.

Ben Gurion insists upon Palmach's dissolution, government sources say, because he will not accept the idea of a political party having an armed force.

In this fight the Revisionists, on the right wing of Israel's political stage, are silent. One of the guiding lights behind the scenes of Mapaam is Dr. Moshe Sneh, underground commander of Haganah, the forerunner of Israel's army. Sneh openly espouses close cooperation with the Soviet Union.

Peculiar People

An ancient quip has it: "Every-one is a little peculiar. If you are not, that is your peculiarity."

We Jews have been called as a whole "a peculiar people." To say that a person has a peculiarity is not necessarily to criticize him. Peculiarity, of a course, may be a negative sort of thing but then again it is the spark of individuality.

As a matter of fact, it is generally the great and profound who seem most rife in peculiarities. The stories are many about the absent-minded professor who put his umbrella in bed and stood himself in the corner all night. These absent-minded stories seldom have a hod-carrier or plain Joe Doakes for their subject.

I got to thinking about this the other day, when someone mentioned with horror that Prof. Albert Einstein does not wear any socks. I don't see why this is so peculiar in Einstein. After all, many of the women can do it, why shouldn't Einstein? Not so many years ago, there used to be a man in Congress who was called "Sockless Jerry Simpson" and who represented Kansas. One day, he rose in Congress, read some figures showing how the protective tariff increases the cost of clothes, and ended by saying that Americans pay 50 percent more

for their socks on account of the tariff. As a protest against the tariff, he announced that thereafter he would wear no socks.

The story is told that a lady once wanted him to show her whether he really didn't wear socks. Simpson replied he believed in reciprocity.

Today Simpson wouldn't have to make such a remark, for girls take the not wearing of socks quite casually. Simpson discarded socks as a protest against the tariff. Einstein doesn't wear them for a different reason. He once explained that he tries to simplify life, and since socks are not absolutely necessary, he doesn't wear them. He would rather not, one would surmise, spend time in taking off and putting on the socks, but in thinking about some mathematical or physical problem.

These higher mathematics are seemingly very often the butt of these stories of peculiarities. Twenty-five years ago, they used to like to tell these stories about another great Jewish mathematician, Prof. James Joseph Sylvester of Johns Hopkins.

One story had it that Sylvester once kept walking along the street, lost in thought, one foot on the street and the other in the gutter, and then remarked that one of his legs must be shorter than the

other. Then there was the story how Sylvester once mistook the back of a carriage for his black-board, and went running after the carriage, working out some mathematical equation on the carriage back.

We like to tell how Naphthali Herz Imber, who always had to be supported by others, once rose at a Zionist meeting and nominated himself for treasurer of the organization.

When Prof. Schechter first came to the faculty of Cambridge University, a Catholic theologian once paid him a visit. He sent in his card to Schechter. It read: "Fa- (Continued on Page 7)

## Problems Facing Israel

From JON KIMCHE

While the country has, without doubt, enjoyed the continued breathing space from war, the political storm clouds have been approaching over the horizon. The period of stress and trouble is not past, and the array of political, economic and religious problems which face the new State of Israel are serious indeed. This is not to suggest that the Israel Government will be unable to survive it. The main political issue facing the Government is the future of Jerusalem and the question of the Arab refugees and the Jews in the Middle East.

### Inflation is Problem

The main economic problem is a galloping inflation in the cost of living which is now at least double that in the United States and treble that in Britain—and is increasing daily. But hardly less important is the manpower shortage and the general economic problem arising from the maintenance of the army at full strength.

Beyond that comes the clash between the protagonists of secular and religious Law in the working out of the civil laws for the new State. There is now the greatest pressure from the Orthodox religious parties to see that the Civil Law is based entirely on the Jewish traditional Law, but this view is strongly contested by virtually all judges and most lawyers in Israel. It is expected that this may become one of the fiercest controversies in the process of creating the new Constitution and Laws of Israel.

### Action Inevitable

The whole Jerusalem issue has blown up with suddenness and force, and was taken up by all parties from right to left (including the Communists) with such unanimity and vigor that Government action clearly became inevitable. Feeling was so strong, that the Ben-Gurion Government might easily have been defeated had it acted with less determination.

For all practical purposes now, the Jewish-controlled part of Jerusalem and the road approach in Jewish hands has been incorporated in the Jewish State. The foundation has been laid in this

way for the partition of Jerusalem, with the New City in Jewish hands, and the Old City in Arab hands. Such a solution would be generally acceptable, but has been further complicated by an Irgun demand that Jerusalem be made the capital of the Jewish State and not partitioned. In this demand, Irgun has the support of most Rightwing and Orthodox parties.

**No Separate Action by Irgun**  
Irgun had evidently prepared itself for possible separatist action in Jerusalem, and its entire force still outside the Israeli Army, is concentrated in Jerusalem. Reports of this strength vary. But the possibility of Irgun making separate political moves has been greatly discounted by the appointment of a military commander of the Jerusalem area. He is one of the toughest COMMANDO Commanders in the Israeli Army, and extremely popular with his men. His instructions about Jerusalem are understood to be explicit, and do not allow for any parallel military or civil authority by Irgun.

Certainly no smaller than the Jerusalem problem is that of the Arab refugees. There has been a remarkable change in public opinion on most sides and also Government opinion is more cautious. When the Arabs first started leaving Haifa and the villages near the Jewish settlements, almost frantic appeals were made to them by Jews to stay or come back. Jewish public opinion was distressed and worried by the departure of the Arabs which was seen as part of a deep-laid Arab plan.

Now suddenly, Jews have awakened to the fact that it is advantageous all round to have no large minority in the new State, and feeling is hardening that a permanent settlement has to be considered which visualizes that the Arabs will not return to Israel.

### Immediate Demand

There has been an immediate demand by parties of the Right, including the Mizrahi Party, that (Continued on Page 6)

## The Scandinavians

By DAVID SCHWARTZ

This is being written on a visit to Minnesota where every girl is a Greta Garbo and "smorgasbord" is as common as borscht in New York. It is the land of American Scandinavia.

I suppose the two most famous products which Minnesota exported to the nation this past year were Harold Stassen and "Toni." Stassen was something of a political wave—how permanent he is remains to be seen but "Toni" is definitely a permanent wave. You have seen those ads all about the country asking, "Which twin has the Toni?" Two young Jewish brothers, one a graduate of Princeton and the other a Phi Beta Kappa of Harvard, manufactured a chemical which has almost completely emancipated the women of the country from the beauty parlors, by enabling them to make their own permanents. According to an account in Time magazine, the Toni people netted \$4,000,000 in profits last year. They have in St. Paul a factory which employs around a thousand people—and they are just beginning.

I don't know if any particular Jewish lesson can be derived from their success story, but you remember the old Hassidic rabbi who said that everything has a moral lesson. The telephone, for instance, said he, teaches that what is said here is heard there. The telegraph teaches us the importance of counting our words. The railroad train, that we may miss our chance by a minute.

The Toni company, I am told, first sold its product for twenty-five cents. At this low price, it was not a success. The makers began to sell their product widely only when they raised the price. Perhaps people only esteem your product if you yourself prize it sufficiently high.

The Scandinavians of Europe are one of the most remarkable and liberal of peoples. At the commencement exercises of the University of Minnesota, Dr. Morrill, the President, happily recalled that the Scandinavian people had undergone a "partition," Norway and Sweden separating without any bloodshed. The relations of the Scandinavians with the Jews have been exemplary. Perhaps the foremost interpreter of Scandinavian literature to the world was the late Jewish George Brandes. Vice versa, Sweden did more than any country in the world to save Jews from Hitler. Yet Minneapolis has been branded as the "capital of anti-Semitism" in America.

To the casual visitor, the overt evidence of this anti-Semitism is not perceptible. There is a preacher who steadily harangues against

the Jews, but either his spell-binding is deficient or the people are unresponsive. He attracts small audiences. McWilliams based his characterization of Minneapolis on the fact that such national organizations as the Automobile Association, the Kiwanis and Lions Clubs, which everywhere else admit Jews to membership, are closed to Jews in Minneapolis. McWilliams attributes this discrimination, however, not to the Scandinavian element, but to the earlier "Yankee nucleus" which at first even discriminated against the Swedes but later had to give in to the inevitable dominance of the Scandinavian group.

To a Jew from the east, it is interesting to compare the situation of the Scandinavian in Minnesota with the Jews in New York City. While the Jews of New York City, although the largest element of the population of that metropolis, have never yet elected a Jew mayor of New York—La Guardia was only half Jewish—in Minnesota, on the other hand, in recent years at least none have more solidarity or clannishness than the Jews.

The first Jews came to Minnesota in the 1850's. The whole white settlement virtually dates from about the same time. The first Jewish pioneers were Indian traders. There still is a large Indian reservation in Minnesota.

Minnesota Jews have made something of a contribution to national literature. The late James Oppenheim, poet and mystic, was born in St. Paul. A few years back, Leo Rosen cut something of a figure with his "Hymie Kaplan" stories in the New Yorker magazine. Max Shulman, beginning with his "Barefoot Boy with Cheek," has come to be recognized as one of the best humor writers of this generation. The translation of Shalom Aleichem stories which enjoyed such a wide popularity last year was done by a Minnesota couple.

At the University of Minnesota, there is a considerable sprinkling of Jews on the faculty. Frank Oppenheimer, a brother of Robert Oppenheimer of atomic fame, is one of the faculty engaged in research. He sends up balloons to ferret out the secrets of the cosmic rays. A professor of economics, Rosen, not yet thirty, commutes to Northwestern University, where he also teaches. He is very popular in his classes. The students, I am told, have been known to shout, "Rosen for President," after one of his lectures on economics. Lectures in which he expounds the doctrine of anti-monopoly and pure free competition as the hope of the nation.

## Off the Record



Political debate is rampant in Israel—a sure sign that the general election and the establishment of a permanent government is drawing close . . . War talk in the land is giving way to discussions about the nature and character of the government and the constitution . . . A former American GI, Paul Siegel, is being hailed by Viennese music critics as "another George Gershwin" . . . Paul served five years in the U.S. Army, but remained in Vienna after his discharge . . . If the New York Yankees win the pennant, a good deal of credit for the accomplishment will go to their Yiddish-speaking pitching star—Ed Lopat—who is not a Jew. Ed was raised on the lower East Side among Jews, and he speaks Yiddish fluently . . . Israeli linguists are busy creating baseball terminology in anticipation of the arrival of Al Schacht, baseball's "clown," who is to teach Israeli youth how to play America's national game. Al is studying Hebrew . . . As first disclosed in this column weeks ago, Sir Oswald Mosley, Britain's outstanding fascist and anti-Semite, is planning to visit this country for a confab with Gerald L. K. Smith and others of his ilk . . . In December of 1947 we predicted in this column that America's anti-Semites were planning to hold a political convention in 1948 prior to the election. Such a meeting will take place when the Christian National Party holds its convention at St. Louis late this month.

plans should be made for exchanging the Palestine Arab refugees for Jewish minorities in the Middle East countries, numbering about 250,000 Jews. While this plan has received much popular support and some cautious approval in Government circles, the difficulties of the plan are gradually being recognized. It is expected that the Arabs will probably not agree to any such organized plan, and to carry out a mass transfer of population without agreement from the Arab side would not be practical, besides being without precedent.

### Arab Tone Changes

On the Arab side, also, interesting developments are noted in the remarkable change of tone in Arab radio broadcasts. Especially a double-edged subtle line is now pursued by Radio Ramallah, the mouthpiece of the Palestine Arabs,

but under King Abdullah's control. Two days ago, its political mentator explained that the old leaders of the Palestine Arabs who had gone to Hitler during the war were not real Fascists but only pro-Fascist opportunists. They belong to the old feudal caste who have a certain amount of personal following, but they have no understanding of the real needs of the mass of Arabs. This was obviously Abdullah having a good dig at the Mufti and also at Jamal Husseini and the present Syrian Arab leaders.

This is the first time that the question of a settlement with the Jews has been publicly suggested by Arabs. Almost at the same time, Cairo's political commentator was speaking about the importance of the engagements in the Negev, and concluded his review by saying: "Unless the Arab armies can produce some early success, there will be serious internal consequences, and the Arab States will have to recognize the existence of the Jewish State in Palestine." Also significant was the Damascus radio, which reflected the silent war going on apparently in Syria.

## Recollections of Babe Ruth

I am among the privileged few of baseball fandom.

I saw Babe Ruth hit a home run.

I will never forget that home run or any other feature of that day, August 25, 1932 at Yankee Stadium. It was the first major league game my father and I had ever attended—and we saw the Babe hit one into Ruthville—our first major league home run.

I remember how the Babe lashed a savage line single to right in the first inning and how he walked in the third, trotting to third on a single by Lou Gehrig and scoring on a long fly by Tony Lazzeri. But never will I see the likes of the sixth inning of that game when Ruth came to bat for the third time with Earle Combs on first base.

Along with just about everyone else in that stadium Dad and I "sensed" what was about to happen. There was an electric something in the atmosphere that I have never felt since. Probably, we felt it every time the Babe came to bat that day. Nevertheless, we were charged with it, and when the Babe swung, there was no need to wonder. We knew where the ball was going.

To this day, undoubtedly because it was the Babe's homer, it stands out in my memory as the most majestic home run I ever saw. It started up in a graceful arc, then leveled off and rode toward the stands as if that ball knew that upwards of 8000 pairs of eyes were watching a Ruthian circuit wallop—and finally settled easily into a sea of hands that went up throughout the shirt-sleeved masses of Ruthville, in right field.

It was not a line smash, nor the longest drive I have seen, but it didn't need to be. It was a Babe Ruth home run.

It didn't matter that Earl Averill hit a homer in the eighth and that Lou Gehrig broke up the game with a round tripper in the ninth, both drives landing in exactly the same section as his. The Babe had hit a home run.

To make the day complete, we saw the Bambino strike out swinging in the eighth.

You had to see it to appreciate it, the way he swung. His amazingly slim legs close together deep in the batter's box, supporting that massive torso—the automatic stride forward with each pitch—the wonderful swing that

involved his entire body and carried him around to the most perfect follow through any athlete could hope to attain, so that his trunk and feet faced in opposite directions at the windup. It was such an effortless but beautiful operation, the way he swung.

I saw the Babe again in Philadelphia the following year when my sharpest memory is that of standing directly behind him in the street following the double header while he autographed baseballs in the midst of a mob of kids. In street clothes he was a true giant. There are some big men in baseball but never have I seen such a back on any other man. Everything about the Babe, you see—the way he walked, the way he talked, the way he swung, the way he lived, the way he was built—was different.

In 1934, in his final year with the Yankees, I attended the farewell-to-Babe-Ruth doubleheader at Fenway Park, advertised as his final Boston appearance. The crowd was so great that it flowed over onto the field and a roped off area was established from the right field foul line to the center field wall; and thousands of fans stood there all day.

The Babe managed to hit a twisting liner into the crowd for an automatic double. But, try as he might, with the crowd audibly imploring Wes Ferrell to let him hit one, he could not lift a home run into the stands and that was the day's biggest disappointment.

I have never heard an ovation to challenge the one the Babe got that day when, after seven innings of the nightcap, he left the game, walked to the runway, tipped his cap to the crowd—and was gone. He was back the next year, with the Braves, but that was an anti-climax.

Last year we traveled to New York specifically to attend Babe Ruth Day at Yankee Stadium on April 27. It is my last recollection of Babe Ruth. It was pathetic to see his shrunken face and figure, to hear him whisper into the microphone; and if there was a dry eye in the place it is a lie.

My biggest regret is that I allowed my loyalty to the softball league to prevent me from taking in the Yankees' silver jubilee celebration earlier this season when the Babe was honored for the last time and his famous number 3 retired. As one of the countless Yankee fans created by Babe Ruth I know I should have been there.

And so the Babe joins the other celebrated members of that wonderful 1927 Yankee team—Miller Huggins, Urban Shocker, Jake Ruppert, Lou Gehrig, Tony Lazzeri, John Grabowski and Herb Pennock. What a team they must have Up There!

### Anti-Semitism Still Rampant in Germany

NEW YORK—Dr. Henry N. McCracken, co-chairman of the International Conference of Christians and Jews, said last week that it will take 20 years to eliminate anti-Semitism in Germany. McCracken returned to the U. S. after presiding at an international conference of the Council in Fribourg, Switzerland.

He said a "legal tolerance" of Jews exists now in Germany, but added he was optimistic about the prospects for "true tolerance."

## Old Age Security For Orthodox Rabbis

A plan for providing security in old age for Orthodox Rabbis who are members of the Rabbinical Council of America has recently been implemented, according to the announcement of Rabbi Morris Max, executive vice-president of the organization.

This plan will eliminate the tragedy that occurs occasionally in Orthodox congregations whereby older Rabbis who have given a life-time of service to the Jewish community and to all Jewish causes, are left stranded and forsaken when they have to make way for a younger Rabbi. According to this Pension and Insurance Plan monthly annuities at the age of 65 as well as life insurance are provided by the congregations by the payment of an annual premium for that purpose.

"More and more attention has been given to the general problems of Social Security", said Rabbi Max. "The Federal Social Security act, from whose benefits ministers of religion are excluded, as well as the various pension plans, set up by private business and public corporations, are examples of the general acceptance of 'security in old age' as a basic philosophy in the social and economic field. This plan will now provide the same benefits for the Orthodox Rabbis".

The pension and insurance benefits have been underwritten by the Continental Assurance Company. Mr. Sidney E. Leiwant, C. L. U., the Administrator of the plan has already signed up the minimum number of Rabbis required to inaugurate the plan. It is the hope of the Rabbinical Council to enlist the interest of all congregations in the United States so that everyone of its 400 members will be ultimately enrolled in this plan.

## Compton to Speak At Brandeis U.

WALTHAM, MASS.—Dr. Arthur H. Compton, famed physicist, Nobel Prize winner and chancellor of Washington University at St. Louis, will be the principal speaker at the ceremonies inaugurating Brandeis University on Oct. 7, it was announced this week.

The inauguration of the new, Jewish-sponsored, non-sectarian University, together with the installation of the first president, Dr. Abram Leon Sachar, will be held at Symphony Hall, Boston. The program will be broadcast over a nationwide network.

## Kinsley Aids Newport Center in New Project

Simeon Kinsley, executive director of the Jewish Community Center, addressed the board of trustees of the Newport Community Center this week.

Kinsley, who also is president of the Rhode Island Chapter of the American Association of Group Work, was asked to meet with the Newport group, which operates a Center for the entire community, in order to advise them on the operation of their venture in recreational programming, a comparatively new project in that city.

## Nation's Press Backed Creation of Israel

NEW YORK—A survey of 200 leading newspapers from all sections of the country, conducted by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, disclosed last week that editorial opinion in the majority of the nation's leading newspapers supported the creation of the new state of Israel.

Of those papers investigated, the report revealed, 64 per cent favored the creation of the Jewish state, 32 per cent were non-committal and only four per cent were actually critical in tone. Most editorials expressed sympathy for Jewry's long struggle for a homeland and some likened Israel's independence to the United

toward Israel but criticized Mr. Truman's recognition as "a political device."

Analysis of Congressional sentiment was based on an examination of the Congressional Record. Every senator who spoke on the issue—19 in all—expressed unqualified endorsement of the new state. Many suggested legislation or administrative action that would help Israel maintain its independence against the Arab coalition.

In the House of Representatives 17 congressmen likewise voiced approval. Two legislators, prominent for their Jew-baiting, were quick to express their antagonism. They were Rankin (D.-Miss.) and Gossett (D.-Tex.)

### GRIM HUMOR

Behind the tragedy of present day events, there lurks also the spirit of humor. A kind of grim humor, to be sure, not the cheerful kind that makes for complete happiness, but the kind in which the humor rather serves to palliate the pain.

Take the remark recently of Gromyko appealing for the enforcement of peace in Jerusalem. The Soviet delegate caustically remarked that perhaps it was necessary for the atheists to save the Holy Places of Jerusalem since the Christians had fallen down on the job.

It reminds me of the story the late Prof. Schechter used to tell of the little Rumanian town of which he was a native. It seems that in this particular town, the Jews were good craftsmen and carried on a considerable business in the manufacture and sale of irons. Schechter related how the Jewish craftsmen would sometimes say to their customers: "Believe me, I am not making a penny on your god. This god is easily worth twice the price I am asking."

I am afraid that the governments of Christendom would have acted quicker about Jerusalem if oily places rather than Holy Places were concerned.

There is something of grim humor, it seems to me, also in the remarks made not long ago by Winston Churchill in Parliament. Churchill was upbraiding Bevin for his ineptness in handling the Palestine question. He reminded Bevin that the British are "pensioners of a friendly government" and it was not well to create tension with the government granting England the pension.

It must be pretty galling for the English to have to admit that they live on a U. S. pension, yet I am afraid that the joke is on America rather than on England. Think of a man to whom you give a pension

telling you how to conduct your affairs. I imagine that no little part of the "pension" has been spent by Bevin on the Arabs. It would not be exaggeration to say that the British have in the last few years spent some four hundred million dollars trying to keep the Jews down in Palestine. It takes plenty of money to maintain 100,000 soldiers and arm the Arabs—and all of this money has come

from the American "pension" to England. This money has come in part from the receipts of the American government from the income taxes of Jews.

Yes, these are days of fun, too—and how we need it. The prize story I think is that of the two little children in Israel. I am told this is an authentic incident. As the story goes, a little child who was a newcomer to Palestine complained to his playmate who had been there longer. Said the newcomer, "I don't like this country.

Ever since we came here, it's been shooting, shooting, shooting."

The child who had been in Palestine longer replied: "Aw, you'll get used to it—you remember how you didn't like spinach at first?"



**U. S. Warns Lines on Israel Immigrants**

WASHINGTON—The State Department has informed shipping and air lines that the official U. S. interpretation of the UN Palestine truce was that it banned the immigration of men of military age into the Middle East, including Israel.

In at least one instance an official of a U. S. air line operating between Haifa and Rome was "politely warned" by State Department officials that he might lose his permit to operate if he accepted as passengers U. S. citizens of military age.

This interpretation of the terms of the truce parallels that adopted by the United Kingdom, which has refused to allow 10,000 young male Jews to leave Cyprus for Israel. It is flatly rejected by the Israeli government, which currently has a formal complaint before the Security Council on the Cyprus matter.

The only direct shipping connection between New York and Haifa is via the American Export Lines. However, air connection is possible via Rome, where passengers can board the planes of Great Circle Airfreighters, Ltd.

A local Great Circle official said:

"I was informed by State Department officials in Washington recently that the Palestine truce terms barred the transport of men of military age into Haifa. They made it quite clear to me that my company could carry such passengers only at the risk of revocation of our permits to operate.

**Will Abide by Ruling**

"It is my understanding that similar instructions have been sent to the U. S. Embassy at Rome.

"No official of my company, of course has any official knowledge of the truce terms, and we must

naturally abide by the ruling of the State Department. We have done so, and intend to continue to do so."



# SYD COHEN:

Chiefs Plan Tieup



The third season of Class B baseball is drawing to an unhappy close in Providence and while I have not covered the New England League up to now I do want to make some observations before the schedule is completed.

There is just about one good thing that can be said about the Providence Chiefs this year and that is in the plans being made for next season. Stockholders of the club freely admit that operating an independent team is not the wisest course to follow and are working on an agreement with a major league club—one that is now involved in the American League pennant race. While I am not permitted now to mention names, anyone who knows his major-minor affiliations should have little trouble arriving at the answer.

It is conceded now on all fronts that an independent must inevitably fall by the wayside when the major league clubs start sending

their embryo talent to the various bush leagues for more seasoning. Farm teams benefit from this shuffling at a great financial saving and by better teams. The independents, left to their own devices, must pick up what they can, which too often is not much, since they cannot compete with the majors.

The fans of Providence can rest assured, then, that things will be better—more progressive, at least—in 1949.

There is one catch—attendance. So far the fans have not supported the Chiefs, even when the club was briefly in the running. In fact, attendance figures since the Class B circuit began have been very disappointing here. Without a concrete display of interest on the part of the populace baseball cannot last long. It is too late for this year, of course, but with the announced new policy of the stockholders, men who are genuinely interested in seeing baseball go over in Providence, the future seems a little brighter.

### Softball Setup Questioned

During recent weeks the Herald has received numerous comments from players and sponsors of the Centre Softball League protesting against the announced system of resuming play next month with the standings remaining as they were in June. The opinion has been just about unanimous that the second half should be started from scratch, with the winners of each half meeting for the championship in a special playoff.

In answer to those who ask "how come?", the decision to play with only one pennant winner was made at a meeting of the league's delegates and the commissioner shortly before the schedule was concluded two months ago.

Now it seems that the continued agitation may have results. I learn that Tex Rabinowitz will call a meeting to settle the issue, whether or not to have two separate (spring and fall) pennant races. The rest is up to the members of the teams. If you players have an opinion on the matter, make it known to your delegate before that meeting.

### Sponsors Unsong

I have been asked more than once to mention the support that the sponsors have given their clubs in the way of equipment, entertainment and the like. I am only too happy to give credit to these men, who are so important a part of the softball league. There is just one catch. I must have the needed information before I can do anything about it. So—let me know what you want mentioned about your sponsors and it will be taken care of. But I cannot write what I do not know.

One sponsor who remains on the ball is Jake Kaplan of the Olympics. Jake is tossing a catered picnic for his charges late this month and present plans indicate that it will be quite an affair. The Olympics may or may not win the championship but if they don't they cannot lay the blame at the door of the Trinity Auto head.

### DACHAU CLOSED

BERLIN—Dachau, Hitler's first concentration camp, in which more than 225,000 persons were shot, tortured or starved to death, will be closed Sept. 1.

Established in 1933, a few weeks after the Nazis came to power, it was occupied by the Allies in April, 1943, and has since been used as a DP camp.

## U. S. Favors 3-Point Program for Israel

NEW YORK—Support of Israel's application to gain United Nations membership constitutes one of the three points in the United States' program to tighten relations with the new Jewish government, the State Department has revealed. Other points, said to have the approval of President Truman, include the granting of a \$100,000,000 loan and "De jure" recognition of the new state.

Reports that Secretary of State George C. Marshall has threatened to resign if the President insists upon adoption of his program were denied by Truman, the State Department and the presidential press secretary, Charles G. Ross.

A formal request for de jure recognition by the U. S. A. is already on file in Washington. The question of the loan is in the hands of the State Department or perhaps of Congress, if it wants to stretch its hands out for it.

On the question of admission to UN, however, sources very close to the Israeli delegation at UN revealed that the Jewish state would take its first official step in this direction within the next week.

To be circulated to UN delegations, it is learned, is an Israeli memorandum urging that the Jewish state as an "independent and sovereign and peace-loving state" is entitled to membership under the charter. A formal application for admission will thereupon follow.

While State Department spokesmen have been explaining that it was impossible for the U. S. A. to take any official step to support Israeli membership until the application was filed, circles close to the Israeli delegation indicate that Jewish statesmen had, in their turn, been delaying application in hopes of getting some overt gestures of encouragement from the western powers.

The question of de jure recognition was considered important by Israeli partisans in its possible effect on UN reaction to the forthcoming request for membership.

Competent observers say that de jure recognition from the U. S. A. at this time would break down any possible doubts of Israel's UN membership qualifications in the minds of many delegations.

As to the new loan, officials said representatives of the Israeli government recently had supplied the bank with information on how

the money could be used.

They said that one consideration in finally approving such financial assistance would be the degree of stability existing in the Middle East.






