Brother, Sister Quit Professional Jobs for Farm in Israel

NEW YORK—When the S.S. LaGuardia docks June 14 at Haifa, the State of Israel will be richer by a 25-year-old commercial artist and a 31-year-old psychologist.

But Lenore Smith, and her brother Al, who was chief psychologist for the National Hospital for Speech Disorders here, are not going over to draw, or to work in a Tel Aviv clinic.

They will dig irrigation ditches, raise chickens and milk cows, just like other Cholutzim (pioneers) in

the Jewish state. For two years they'll make their home at Kibbutz Kfar Giladi, a collective farm, and then they'll join the others in building their own community based on American know-how and social life.

Lenore and Al Smith are the first graduates of Beth Hashavim (House of the Returners), a 20-acre training farm in Vineland, N. J., designed specially for young American professionals who want

To Approve Decisions of Allocation Group

Pegging of an overall goal, which traditionally marks the beginning of campaign activity in the men's division of the General Jewish Committee of Providence, will be among the issues to be decided at a meeting of the GJC's board of directors, this Monday evening, at the Wayland Manor Hotel.

Henry Montor, executive vice-chairman of the National United Jewish Appeal, will be a guest at the dinner meeting which is slated to begin promptly at 6 o'clock.

The local fund-raising agency granted a request by Montor to meet with its 70-member board of directors and discuss UJA participation in the forthcoming drive.

The board also will act upon the recommendations of the allocations committee.

Personnel of a new executive committee and allocations committee will be appointed at Monday's meeting by Alvin A. Sopkin, newly elected president of the GJC. This will be Sopkin's first meeting in the chair as head of the community-wide service and fund-raising agency.

Announcement of a chairman for the overall Trades and Industry Division of the GJC is expected to be made on Monday evening. There is a possibility that appointment of the 1950 chairman of the Young Adults Division also will be announced.

Montor will come to Monday's meeting direct from the National Report Conference of the UJA, to be held in Chicago this weekend. Golda Myerson, Minister of Labor in the Israeli government, and Aubrey Eban, Israel's ambassador to Washington, will be among the world's top governmental officials present at the affair in Chicago.

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Award Alprin, Cohen Honorary Degrees

to pioneer in Israel. The farm, one of eight operated by the American Hechalutz Organization, is the first that appeals primarily to college-trained men and women who give up promising careers in America to farm in Israel.

The Smiths, who were born in Pittsburgh, had eight months of rigorous training at Beth Hashavim, on the farm itself and working for neighbors. On Memorial Day, they sailed on the LaGuardia, eager to make a constructive contribution to Israel's growth.

Some day, when Israel has a stable economy, Lennie and Al perhaps will make their contribution to the new land in their own fields. But right now they are thinking only of farming.

"There's a great need for psychologists in Israel to do rehabilitation work among vets and DPs," explains Al, who has submitted his Ph.D. thesis to Columbia. "But there's an even greater need for pioneers, so I'll be a pioneer."

Lennie won a fine arts scholarship to Carnegie Tech and had worked as a commercial artist and designer since graduation in 1946.

"We're going to create a new, dynamic society," she says. "Even in our infant kibbutz (collective) here in America, I could feel myself growing and see others growing around me. It's a healthy life."

Budget Proposals

HATZOFER, commenting on the budget recently presented to the Knesset by the Finance Minister, Mr. Kaplan, feels that every effort should be made to balance the development budget to prevent inflation.

Calling on the people to be prepared for sacrifices and economy, the paper points out that the admittedly heavy taxes are now being paid for their own welfare and not for the benefit of foreign rulers.

HABOKER asserts that the three main weaknesses revealed by Mr. Kaplan—low output, investment lag and inflationary tendencies—have long been exposed by the opposition, which blames all three on Government policy. Investors will find it hard to take seriously, the paper adds, the Minister's "pathetic" declaration that talk of discrimination against investors is unfounded.

HA'ARETZ holds that the Finance Minister warned the people not to expect any higher standard of living at present, and in fact that the standard may drop if production is not increased. The paper asks, however, why Mr. Kaplan did not propose any tax alterations in view of his admission that the present income tax affects both the worker and private initiative adversely.

It also suggests that the sums spent on administration and social services be reduced, to lessen the ordinary budget, and that plans not likely to raise the productive capacity of the state in the near future be eliminated from the development budget.

In conclusion, the paper says that the greatest success Mr. Kaplan can achieve is to have the Knesset amend his budget in the spirit of that bitter economic reality which he himself has described.

W.F.T.U. Withdrawal

DAVAR, commenting on the Histadrut resolution to secede from the World Federation of Trade Unions, says the decision was taken only after it became clear that there was no hope of mending the rift in the international labor movement.

The paper points out that a national trade union organization belonging to either the W. F. T. U. or the western group of unions becomes, by the very fact of its membership, an active participant in the war now being waged inside the world labor movement. Any desire to maintain contact with both sides and to tighten existing links with all sections of world labor demands, therefore, an alignment with neither.

AL HAMISHMAR, on the other hand, terms the Histadrut resolution "fatal, shameful and a far-reaching step towards complete subjection to the imperialist powers." The paper feels the move severs Histadrut's last and only tie with those who fight for peace.

Education

HABOKER objects strongly to a new ruling of the Ministry of Education under which parents must state which system of education they wish their children to receive. This move will undermine the respect of the child for education, it says, "since political propaganda will now be waged at the very gates of their school." It demands immediate cancellation of the order.

HATZOFER calls on the rabbis and other personages of the religious bloc to do all they can to persuade parents to choose a religious education for their children. Each head of a family will have to decide before registration day whether to give its children an education based on the traditions of the Torah or to bring them up as heretics, ignorant of its precepts.

AL HAMISHMAR calls on all Histadrut members to demand a labor education for their children. There is no doubt, it states, that the character of the state in the future will depend to a large extent on the character of its schools.

ISSUES IN ISRAEL

Future of Potash Industry Linked To Policy Toward Foreign 'Concessions'

HOW should Israel's sole great mineral resource—the salts of the Dead Sea be exploited? What should be the future status of the present concessionaire, Palestine Potash, Ltd.? Should the concession be withdrawn or the company be allowed to resume work? If so, under what conditions? Should any foreign company be permitted to control so important an enterprise?

These are a few of the questions around which a heated debate has been going on in Israel for the past two years. They have been discussed at several Cabinet meetings, then by the Knesset's Finance Committee, and now the Finance Committee's recommendations are before the Knesset itself.

History

It was in 1906, when Palestine was still part of the Ottoman Empire, that Moshe Novomeysky, a Russian engineer and ardent Zionist, first thought of exploiting the mineral resources of the Dead Sea. In 1910 he came to Palestine and made his first survey, taking back with him samples of water for analysis and experimentation in his laboratories. Ten years later, Mr. Novomeysky returned to settle in Palestine. The British were now ruling the country, and Mr. Novomeysky applied to the then High Commissioner, Sir Herbert Samuel, for a Dead Sea concession. On the latter's advice, he proceeded to London and entered into direct negotiations with the Colonial Office.

Nine years were to elapse before the British government decided to grant the concession to Mr. Novomeysky and his colleague, Major Tulloch of London. First he had to prove his ability to finance the development of the concession, and to set up a board of directors which would include well-known men in the City of London, to impress the British Parliament.

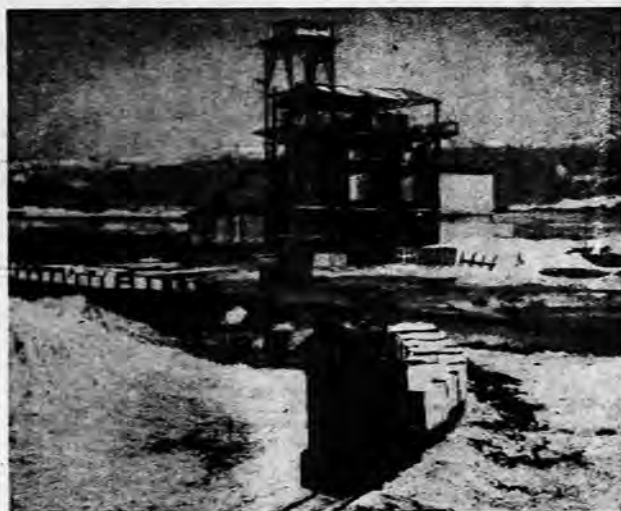
Unexpected help came to Mr. Novomeysky from the U. S. during this period. With the encouragement of the late Justice Louis D. Brandeis, Israel Brodie of New York came to Paris and offered to subscribe £100,000 (then a half-million dollars) on behalf of himself and friends in the U. S. The Earl of Lytton, late Governor of Bengal and acting Viceroy of India, agreed to become chairman of the company which would be formed, and Lord Glenconner and some others consented to join its board.

In August, 1929, the concession was granted, and in January, 1930, the concessionaires transferred it to Palestine Potash, Ltd., just formed.

The company began to market bromine in 1931, potash in 1932. Both were then produced at its works at the northern end of the Dead Sea. In 1937 the first plant at the southern end came into operation.

The potash works shut down at the end of 1947 following the outbreak of hostilities. In May, 1948, the works at the northern end were destroyed by the Arabs; the Jewish population there was evacuated at the last moment.

With the establishment of the state the

concession's future became an important issue. In certain quarters the opinion was voiced that the entire enterprise should be nationalized and taken over by the government. These circles held that the company had failed to develop the undertaking adequately, and was unfit therefore to continue with such development in the future. On several occasions Mr. Novomeysky replied to these accusations, stating that if the company did not expand overall production or did not manufacture certain products, this was due not to ill will but to factors arising out of world market conditions. For example, in connection with magnesium, Mr. Novomeysky pointed out that world productive capacity had been so enormously overexpanded during World War II that plants in the United Kingdom and the U. S. have since had to close down.

Majority View

The Cabinet has now put before the Knesset a detailed proposal under which Palestine Potash, Ltd. may resume operations. Approved by the Finance Committee, they provide that the company be granted \$2,500,000 out of the U. S. Export-Import Bank loan—if it meets a number of conditions.

The first concerns the character of the company, which must transfer both its headquarters and incorporation to Israel from England by the end of 1950. A majority of board members, as well as the chairman, must be Israel citizens. Furthermore, the majority of shares with voting rights must pass to Jewish owners, institutions or persons.

Second, the company must provide—in addition to the sum the Government recommended it receive from the Export-Import Bank loan—approximately \$6,500,000 of capital in hard currency. These

funds will be used to restore and expand the works at the southern end of the Dead Sea and to build adequate housing facilities for the company's workers. This condition also carries a deadline of Jan. 1, 1951.

Another stipulation put forward is that the company will for the time being resume work only at the southern works, which lie within the area of the Jewish State, and will not start work at the northern end of the Sea, territory now in the hands of Abdullah. Nor may the company start negotiations with any foreign factor without previously having acquired the consent of the Israel government. It was agreed, however, that if Trans-Jordan supplies the needed fresh water, she will receive royalties under certain specific conditions.

If these conditions are accepted, then, under the proposals of the Finance Committee, the company would enter into negotiations with the government to make them effective and to secure adequate representation for the government on the company's board.

Minority View

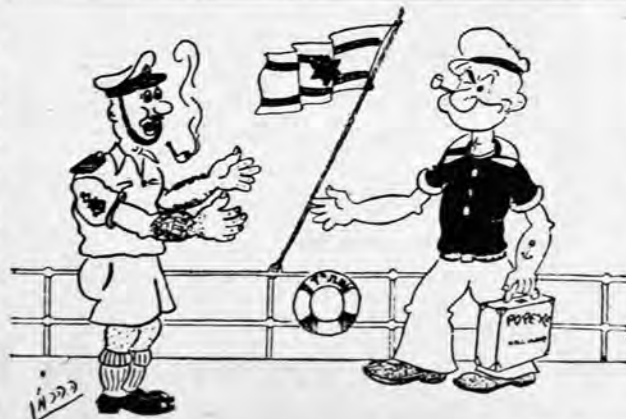
These conclusions were accepted by a large majority of the Knesset's Finance Committee. Dr. Moshe Sneh, Mapam (left-wing labor) leader, is perhaps the foremost exponent of the minority view.

Asking the Knesset to reject the Committee's findings, Dr. Sneh argued: First, that even \$6,500,000 in hard currency are not worth placing the country's natural resources in the hands of a monopolistic foreign company. Legally, he points out, the concession granted by the British to a British company is now void. We did not merely "take over" from the British, but won our sovereignty through a national struggle.

Second, for several years, about four-fifths of the company's production came from the southern works, which are in our hands and therefore any kind of partnership with Trans-Jordan is not necessary, but instead is harmful. He also declared that more modern methods of production would eliminate any need to rely on Trans-Jordan for fresh water.

Perhaps Dr. Sneh's most important political point concerns what he called the contradiction between the interests of foreign capital and those of Israel. Israel wants to speed up production as much as possible, while foreign capital, with investments in similar enterprises elsewhere, may seek to limit production. Foreign capital, he claims, would prefer to hamper the development of a chemical industry in Israel, with a view to keeping Israel as a market for its goods, rather than aid its transformation into an exporting country.

These are the two points of view now before the Knesset. One may assume that the findings of the Finance Committee's majority will be approved. But it is equally safe to assume that the vote will be preceded by several hours of stormy debate. Reprinted from Israel Speaks

Y-Day, A Significant Development

As a father waits for his sons to grow to maturity in order that they may join him in his business ventures, so a community waits for its youth to grow to maturity in order that the welfare of the community may be improved and advanced. Often—too often—this important youth group will delay its development to the point where the elders despair of their ever being of any constructive value to the community. Sometimes too, the leaders resent the attempted intrusion of the youngsters into their councils.

Neither eventuality, happily, is the case with the Jewish Youth Council of Greater Providence, which has chosen to conduct its Y-Day census of Jewish youth this coming Sunday morning. Here is a group of young men and women who realize that there is work to be done—important work—and who are ambitious enough to tackle the job on their own. They very probably have the honor of being the youngest group ever to undertake such a massive operation as a city-wide census of their own age level.

Nor are they conducting a census alone. The so-called roll call will have a secondary function of registering those boys and girls who are contacted, and determining where the interests of this large group lie. And last, but certainly of no lesser importance than any of the other reasons, the Youth Council will attempt to rally support for a new, centrally-located Jewish Community Center in our city.

The last-mentioned virtually amounts to a project in itself. The failure of our Jewish community to provide a modern Center with ample facilities for all elements of its population has been a blot on our communal record for several years. The impetus for a new building should have come from some adult group or groups. Instead, it comes from one of the youngest.

Regardless of the source of sponsorship, the project of a new Center is a worthy one and important to all of us. It is to be hoped that the Y-Day participants will find a ready and enthusiastic response to their plea. We may all contribute toward the success of this triple project by reminding the youngsters to remain at home for the few hours on Sunday morning that will be required for the roll-call.

If Y-Day accomplishes nothing else, however, its attempt to conduct a census of the number of young men and women in our community, and the compilation of their interests should prove of inestimable value. It may have vital significance in future planning for Jewish education in Providence and in discussions for the further growth and development of our communal life.

The members of the Youth Council of greater Providence are to be congratulated for their Y-Day campaign, and they deserve the co-operation as well as the best wishes of the entire community.



A Jewish education for both adults and children has two objectives: 1—to conserve and enrich Jewish values; 2—to advance Jewish life in its relation to the entire Jewish and American community. The Jewish community of Pittsburgh—recognizing that these objectives must be met—recently initiated a three month study to determine what steps should be taken to augment the strength and eliminate the weaknesses of its Jewish educational school system. The survey, authorized and financed by the United Jewish Fund,

is being conducted by a Self-Study Committee on Jewish Education composed of representatives from congregations, adult organizations, Jewish educational institutions and the community at large. Two consultants—one each from the American Association for Jewish Education and the National Jewish Welfare Board—are working hand-in-hand with the study committee.

Eight sub-committees have been established to conduct their own discussions and to reach their own conclusions. However, these con-

"One Man's Opinion"

J for Joyland

On the last day of June, on a Friday morning, busses will carry 80 excited youngsters, from 100 North Main Street, in Providence, to the land of Joy, in Point Judith, Rhode Island.

This will be the first trip of the 1950 season to Camp Jori. Three more trips, two weeks apart, will follow during the summer. Each trip will take 80 children away from the heat of the city, and will bring them to the pleasant breezes of the seashore.

By the end of the camp season, in August, some 320 boys and girls, ages 6 to 14, will have enjoyed a two weeks stay in what is said to be the coolest spot in the state, at Point Judith.

Camp Jori, the Joyland Of Rhode Island, is sponsored by the Jewish Children's Home and Foundation. The camp was founded in 1938, and grew steadily under the guidance of two presidents, Benjamin Brier and Alexander Rumpel. Today the camp owns a choice tract of land a quarter of a mile away from Scarborough Beach. The children are housed in comfortable bungalows, they eat in a spacious dining hall, and play in a large recreation hall. The grounds of the camp are equipped with athletic field for the older campers, and a play-ground for the younger ones.

Special attention is given to the health of the children. Pediatricians examine the children carefully before they are sent to camp. A nurse watches over their well-being at camp. Experienced personnel of the Jewish Family and Children's Service help children in overcoming difficulties they may have in adjustment to other children, so as to make their stay at camp enjoyable. With consent of the parents, such children are helped along in solving their problem after the camp period is over. This is a unique service, offered by no other camp. The effects of this help will stay with the child long after the sun tan of the camp season has faded and vanished.

What do the children do all day long at Jori?

The camp director, Leo Weiss, who with his wife as camp mother and dietician is now starting his fifth season at Jori, unfolded a large chart to point out the sche-

dule of activities for each hour of the day. He divides the camp into four age groups, and calls them Freshmen, Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors. Each group is engaged in a type of activity suited to that age level. Leo Weiss, a popular teacher at Hope High School, is equally at home with camp children. Out of his 14 years of camp experience, he compounded a program for Jori that compares favorably with that of expensive private camps.

The day time activities include swimming, arts and crafts, track, baseball, basketball and volleyball. For the younger children, there are the sand box, the slide, the swing, and the jungle gym.

In the evening there is the magic of the camp fire, and singing, and social dancing, and the story hour.

Every Wednesday is hike-day. Trips are undertaken to nearby towns and villages, to places of historic interest, to the State College at Kingston.

Services are conducted every Friday night, and Saturday night is movie night at Jori.

With a program such as this there ought not be a dull moment for any child at camp.

The only fault one can find with this program, is that it does not last longer than two weeks, and that it does not benefit twice as many children.

What does all this cost?

This point is important to clear up. Jori is not entirely a free camp. There is a fee of \$20 per week. But the rates are flexible, and the payment is as low as the parents of the child can afford. The camp committee grants partial or full scholarships to deserving children, depending upon the financial circumstances of the family.

So if you know of a child who needs two weeks of Joyland, Camp Jori will make room for him. Direct the parents of that child to the office of Mr. Joseph Galkin, director of Family and Children's Service, at 100 North Main Street, and the best possible arrangement will be made for that child.

These committees will study and examine the following areas relating to Jewish education: (1) gathering vital statistics on school population, enrollment and attendance; (2) facilities in the various schools; (3) finances—the amount of money being spent, how the money is being spent and where the money comes from; (4) curriculum and standards of performance of the various schools; (5) personnel and teacher training as well as teacher training needs; (6) the responsibility of the community and its central organizations for Jewish education; (7) adult education programs conducted by educational agencies and adult organizations; (8) parent attitudes toward their children's present Jewish education program.

Community Briefs: Two weeks ago, Lancaster celebrated the formal establishment and appointment of officers for its new central Jewish agency—the United Jewish Community Council.

The new organization's constitu-

tion was accepted and ratified by every Jewish organization in the community. Membership in the Council is open to all Jewish adult residents 18 years of age and over who contribute to Lancaster's married couples and families. San Francisco's Mt. Zion Hospital has initiated a new and unique pre-payment protection plan for the benefit of its outpatients. The program, put into effect last month, will aid those persons who are not able to afford private medical and hospital care.

Under the plan, persons who have been treated at the outpatient clinic of Mt. Zion for six months or more, are entitled to 50 days of complete hospital care annually by advance payment of stipulated fees. Larger fees cover married couples and families. To better acquaint members of Boston's year-round women's division with the work which they support through the community's welfare fund drive, an All-Day Educational Institute was held recently. The event marked the second consecutive year that the community dramatically presented Jewish needs overseas, nationally and locally. Plans are now underway to es-

A Historical Document of Temple Beth-El

Constitution
"Preamble"

Whereas The preservation of the cultural heritage of Judaism is the foremost objective and duty of every true Jew, and the maintenance of a Jewish life and thought is the responsibility of the community of the education of our children, and the moral and intellectual progress of the people.

And Whereas an existing or a common platform, thereby enabling Jewish life, its strength and religious commitment and identity.

Therefore We, the undersigned, Jewish members of the City of Providence, hereby covenant and agree, each with the other, and jointly together, to form a new Jewish religious "Union" or Congregation.

Sons of Israel and David and all Jews, from the East of the River, who recognize and wish to participate in this Holy Law, may enter and be at peace.

And We do hereby Agree, That each Congregation will be established, in the following laws, and with the following aims, to wit:

First To preserve the Jewish character of our Holy Religion by conforming to the duties and obligations imposed on us

by our Law and the Constitution which shall together adopt, to establish a Religious School for our children, where in addition to our religious, the Hebrew language shall be taught.

Second. The ritual of the Congregation shall be that of Moderate Reform, and all prayers, both in the east, shall be that of the Rite of the Holy Synagogue.

Third And it shall be our early purpose to secure a plot of ground and to erect a suitable building to be dedicated as a place of worship to the Almighty God of Israel.

THE COURSE OF THE WORLD

Cost and Risks of Modern War

A dangerous pattern has been established in this country, with every diplomatic crisis being followed by war rumors. President Truman's recent remark on the no-war-danger situation has caused some frowning and critical retort. The President has been assailed as a superficial optimist, almost an appeaser.

The international military situation is obviously being misunderstood and misinterpreted. We are willing to discuss single weapons, but we fail to grasp the overwhelming change in conditions of war as a whole. While our military experts stress, time again, the deep transformation of war which has occurred since 1945, our politicians and diplomats talk about war as though it still were the limited old-fashioned war of yesterday. In spite of all the loose talk about super-weapons, the cost and risks of modern war still have not been assessed.

We know that the cost of World War II amounted to an astronomical figure of some 2,000 billion dollars and some 50 million human lives. World War II was five times more costly than its predecessor. Yet it, in its turn, has been already surpassed. World War II also demonstrated that the risks of war imply more than the price of material destruction and human lives. It brings social catastrophes and political dislocations. The architects of the Atlantic Pact are still unable to understand that in the wake of World War II, France and Britain have ceased to be military powers.

There is a very weighty reason why the Americans misjudge and underestimate the devilish nature, the cost and risks, of modern war. In World War II we occupied a unique privileged position among the belligerents. Then we really had absolute security, and Germany Gen. von Dittmar, the spokesman for the German Army, stressed the "riskless Krieg"—the war without risks—waged by the U. S. The United States was then threatened by no air assault and no blockade, by no material devastation and no bleeding white of its army. In addition to the security offered by two oceans and our own technology and war effort, we were defended them, as the report of Gen. George C. Marshall stated, by 25 million fighting Russian and Chinese soldiers.

This privileged position of the United States has been irretrievably lost. Atomic bomb, super-technology, the entire set of super-weapons are now being turned against the security of the United States as a War Department paper stated as far back as 1947. War now means a terrible threat to the continental United States, to our industrial areas and our civilian population.

Our military experts and our atomic scientists unanimously agree that what we can do to the Soviet Union, the Soviet Union can do to us. There is no longer any doubt that in the postwar years an equalization of war technology has taken place between two countries. In the 30s the Soviets achieved a technological revolution of coal and iron by building up their new heavy industry. In the 40s they achieved the technological revolution of atomic energy and electronics. In World War II the Russians may have produced poor consumer goods, but they did produce the best tanks and guns. Now they are producing jets, atomic bombs and radars.

War with super-weapons is therefore not merely a threat to the Soviet Union, but an equal threat to the United States. This threat is all the more substantial because the United States is more vulnerable to atomic destruction than Russia. Along the Atlantic seaboard 65 per cent of the American industries are concentrated on only 8 per cent of the U. S. area, and they are exposed to the A-bomb carrying submarines. In military and technological terms, the vision of Sen. McMahon of 50 million Americans being incinerated in the first hours of modern war may be exaggerated. But all the horrors of modern super-war now menace the United States, too.

The situation is, of course, far worse for our main allies, Britain and France. British experts agree that Britain is indefensible in the air. An editorial in the March issue of *Aeronautics*, England's leading aviation magazine, stated that 16 to 12 atomic bombs could knock Britain out of war. But if Britain is indefensible in the air, if no Battle of Britain can be won in the air any more, then Britain is altogether indefensible. The British military specialists are right in stressing that Britain's chances in fighting off invasion depend on her possibilities of air defense, and that without effective air defense no sea and land defense of the British Isles can succeed.

The risks of war for France are even higher. France has no chances of defense at all. France is neither defended by the Channel, nor has she any single element of military strength, like the war industry or war experience Britain has. France is indefensible against land offensive, and against air offensive, and against the atomic bomb. The assessment of France's absolute defenselessness made by leading French generals is appalling. By the way, the French generals made the interesting and enticing discovery that defeat is less expensive than victory, and that the losses of the victorious Soviet Union were higher than those of defeated Germany. From this recognition there is only one step to the conclusion that capitulation is even less expensive than defeat.

But modern war is fraught with terrible dangers to the Soviet Union, too. Soviet air defenses can prevent atomic defeat, they cannot prevent indescribable atomic destruction and losses to industrial values and human lives. The Russian concept of defense is defense by industrial strength. Soviet policy would, therefore, be the least inclined to expose the unfinished Soviet industry and the Soviet cities still bearing the marks of destruction of World War II to new devastation. Recent talk about Soviet readiness for war between 1962 and 1964 ignores the fundamental fact that the Soviet leaders know exactly the cost of modern war and are unwilling to add new devastation to that of World War II.

It is time to draw the conclusion that the cost of a new war is prohibitive, and that nobody can have his war.

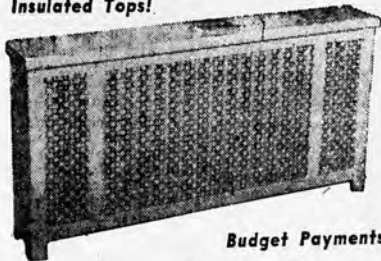
