The News Picture

An AJP Round Up Of World News

UNITED STATES

David Crockett's direct descendants, Mr. and Mrs. Huel L. Crockett and seven children of Tallahassee, Florida, have all adopted the Hebrew faith. For the past 13 years they have accepted themselves as members of the ten lost tribes of Israel. . . . Huel Crockett, an engineer, is a founder and charter member of United Israel World Union. . . . The wife and four children of the California evangelist, Meshumad David Cooper were killed last week in a highway collision at Durango, Mexico. . . . A Jewish couple, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin B. Ellis, of Brookline, Mass., have been arrested for failure to comply with the decision of Judge James F. Reynolds to give up a 4-year old girl they adopted when she was ten days old. The girl being born a Catholic, a Massachusetts law says that "whenever practicable" children shall be adopted by persons of the same religious faith. The court also rejected an offer by the Ellises to bring up the child as a Catholic. . . . Prof. Raphael Lemkin, Father of the Genocide Convention, has announced the 50th ratification of the Convention—that of Syria. . . . The fifty ratifications have eventuated almost exclusively through the efforts of the Jewish professor. . . . Brooks Atkinson, art critic of the N. Y. Times, reports on a new Shylock from Stratford, Ontario: "Let's admit that the play ('The Merchant of Venice') is anti-Semitic. It might also

be observed that Mr. Valk's acting robs Shylock of most of his distinction. . . . But if we are to get touchy about religious matters, the Christians might file a countersuit against Shakespeare for libel and slander—a more serious indictment, since he lived among Christians and presumably was one. In the "Merchant" his Christians are not only fools and prodigals. They are also heartless, arrogant, vindictive and cruel, and they violate most of the principles their Lord tried to teach them. Trust Dr. Guthrie to put the bitter facts on the line. When the trial goes against Shylock, the Christians taunt and jeer him with an animal ferocity that would be horrible if "The Merchant of Venice" were a sensible play."

PEOPLE

Prime Minister U Nu of Burma, addressing the Overseas Press Club of New York last week, indicated surprise "that the United States tends to exaggerate its fear of the menace of communism. When a nation becomes obsessed with fear," he declared, "it is no longer quiet itself. It tends to forget the things which helped to make it great. . . . During his busy schedule in New York, the Burmese Premier managed to receive a delegation of the American Labor Zionist Assembly. There was a cordial exchange of views. 25,000 Entered Israel in 10 Months

TEL AVIV — More than 25,000 new immigrants have entered Israel since last August, and the number of immigrants will rise to 30,000 by August, 1955, declared Dr. Giora Josephthal, treasurer of the Jewish Agency. Since the establishment of the State, he added, more than 750,000 immigrants have arrived in Israel.

Sixty percent of the newcomers have been sent directly to new settlements, and another 25 percent have gone to development areas. Six new settlements have been established since May, he continued, and another 16 will have been established in the Lachish area and other parts of the country by October. Figures showed, it was also revealed, that the cost of maintenance for one family in a new settlement for the first year is 8,000 pounds.

Other Projects

Referring to other settlement projects, Dr. Josephthal announced that new immigrants would be sent to Eilat, Demona, in the Negev, and Afikim, in the northern Negev. All these agricultural townships are slated to become centers of large agricultural areas. Other foci of settlement will be Nazareth and Tarshich in Upper Galilee, where several hundred housing units are now under construction.

Dr. Josephthal indicated that it would be difficult to continue sending 60 percent of the newcomers directly to new settlements because of a lack of funds. He stressed the fact that the United Jewish Appeal's income now was higher than last year. He also stressed that the Jewish Agency had repaid \$23,000,000 of the \$86,000,000 consolidation loan received from the United States.

He will have official conferences and receptions with the Chief Rabbinate, the President, the Prime Minister and various religious and Government officials. Rabbi and Mrs. Chill will leave for Israel on July 26.

Zionist Strife May Lead To New Zionist Party in U.S.

NEW YORK — The split between the Lipsky group and the present administration of the Zionist Organization of America may eventually lead to the formation of a new Zionist party in the United States.

The Lipsky group, which terms itself the "Liberals," is in its political approach closer to the Progressive Party in Israel than to the General Zionist Party. It is, therefore, no wonder that it opposes so strongly the ZOA's official affiliation with the General Zionists in Israel.

It will also be no surprise if the Lipskyites, receiving no satisfaction, organize themselves into a Liberal Zionist Party along the same lines as the Progressive Party in Israel. At any rate, the Lipsky group seems determined to secure a maximum number of delegates to the World Zionist Congress which will be held in Israel next spring.

How they will get them will be seen very soon. The group, according to Lipsky, has the backing of Dr. Israel Goldstein, Dewey Stone, Rudolf Sonneborn, Fred Monosson, Judge Louis E. Levinthal and other well-known Zionist leaders.

Reverberations of the revolt started by Lipsky against the ZOA administration will be felt in the Zionist ranks throughout the country. They may find ex-

pression not only in discussions, but also in the sale of Shekolim.

However, the real danger for the ZOA today may not be so much the Lipsky revolution, as the sudden coming to life of the American Friends of Israel. This organization although incorporated several years ago, has not functioned.

All indications point, however, to the fact that it will start functioning very soon with Henry Montor and the others who left the Israel bond campaign organization. It will be recalled that David Ben Gurion, when he was Premier of Israel, advocated the dissolution of the Zionist groups in the United States and the formation, instead, of an organization of American Friends of Israel which should include non-Zionists as well as Zionists.

The ZOA strongly opposed this idea, but Rudolf Sonneborn incorporated the name of the organization proposed by Ben Gurion and kept it in reserve. Now that Sonneborn, Montor, Vezeky and the others have stepped out of the bond campaign, they intend to make the American Friends of Israel an active organization.

Their intention has provoked a good deal of suspicion among ZOA leaders who fear that such an organization will undermine the existence of the Zionist movement in this country.

Jacobson — King of the Schnorrers

I wrote about this fellow Jacobson, one of the most adroit schnorrers (beggars) in the business. Now I am convinced he is the King of Schnorrers.

He's the fellow who makes contact with the newspaper managing-editor by phone. The M E says he is sorry, no vacancies. Then Jacobson makes the rounds of the merchants and tells them he is stranded—a job he had expected did not pan out.

After my article appeared, five cities reported that he had "cleaned up" on the idea; Shelby, Gastonia, High Point, Columbia and Augusta; in addition to Charlotte, Winston, Wilmington and Goldsboro, which I had already reported (I do not know about the other 46 states). As luck would have it he got out of Gastonia, his last stop in North Carolina, just under the wire. My paper with the Jacobson article was delivered to his Gastonia readers (the very next day).

The Carolina Israelite "covers Dixie like the dew," and I'm afraid the boy is a dead duck in this section, at least for a couple of years. But this Jacobson is wonderful. I do not know what I'll do without him.

In Gastonia for instance he

called the Rabbi, told him the tale, and asked for some names of "leaders" of the community. The Rabbi gave him the name of the man who handles the "schnorrer fund." A few minutes later Jacobson called again. "The man you mention is out. His phone does not answer, give me another name." The Rabbi gave him another name. Again the phone rang and this time Jacobson was mad as all get-out. "What kind of a community is this—everybody is out. Why don't they stay home?"

The Rabbi asked, "Where are you calling from?" and Jacobson answered "From your office in the Temple." The Rabbi grabbed his hat and drove over to the Temple. Sure enough there was Jacobson sitting at the Rabbi's desk with an open telephone book, and again proceeded to bawl the rabbi out because the "leaders" were not at home.

The next morning Jacobson collected his "schnorrer fund" money and one of the merchants bought him a new shirt. Then he got out of town. The merchant read my article the following day and he's so mad he still can't get Jacobson off his mind.

In another town the Rabbi received a phone call—a very di-

The children were hidden by a gentile family during the Nazi occupation of Belgium. Their father died at the hands of the Nazis, and the mother survived a concentration camp. Charles had become a citizen, was discharged from the U. S. Army in January, and immediately called upon United Hias to bring his mother and sister to this country.

Use Law In Fighting Bias Urged By Community Relations Experts

NEW YORK — The use of law, in conjunction with educational efforts, as a means of fighting anti-Semitism and advancing equal rights and equal opportunities for all, is recommended in a statement signed by 66 social scientists, lawyers, and Jewish community relations experts released here by the National Community Relations Advisory Council, coordinating body of a number of major Jewish organizations and local Jewish community relations councils.

"The first responsibility of Jewish community relations agencies is to deal with matters directly affecting Jews," the statement declares. "Experience shows, however, not only that discrimination against any one group threatens the rights of all, but also that the rights of all are equally affected by legal measures taken in defense of any one." Specific recommendations include the following:

1. That Jewish community relations agencies engage in activities designed to prevent discrimination against any group;
2. That Jewish community relations agencies give support to measures designed to preserve civil liberties;
3. That when shortages or lack of facilities tend to intensify discrimination, as in employment, housing or education, measures to expand opportunities and facilities are a proper concern of Jewish agencies.
4. That when a social welfare bill is pending, (and) there is a question whether Jewish agencies should support inclusion of a provision to insure that it is administered without segregation or other

er forms of discrimination . . . the decision to insist or not to insist on such provisions be made on a case-by-case basis in the light of the relative values involved;

5. That Jewish agencies support efforts to remove procedural barriers that serve to block enactment of legislation embodying desirable community relations objectives; and 6. That there be full support of measures designed to secure effective implementation of the law.

"The complexity of the problems in using the law to advance community objectives places a strain on the limited resources of the Jewish community," the statement says. "We therefore believe it is important to conduct continuing joint planning to deal with questions of priority, strategy, and timing, and to determine the most effective use of the resources available to all the agencies."

Death for Treason Israel Army Law

JERUSALEM — The Israel Parliament gave final approval to a new army code to supersede the Haganah military code which has been in effect in the country's armed forces since 1948. The code will affect members of the armed forces, civilian employees of the army and private firms working for the armed services. One of the major features of the new system of military legislation is its continuation of the death sentence for treason. The House was divided on this point, but accepted it after an impassioned plea by Defense Minister David Ben Gurion.

Denies Jewish Issue in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG — "There is no such thing as a Jewish question in South Africa," former Premier Daniel F. Malan told a Jewish delegation which visited him at his home at Stellenbosch, near Capetown, to present him with a certificate of his inscription in the Jewish National Fund's Golden Book by a group of Jewish admirers.

Dr. Malan expressed appreciation of the contributions of the Jews to South Africa, declaring "It is true that the Jews are a particular racial group proud of their origin and history and determined to maintain their own integrity, but South Africa is a multi-racial country and the Jews are only one racial element among several others. Jewish history is not a monopoly of the Jewish race, but is universal."

He pointed to the "remarkable contributions" of the Jews to the material welfare of the country, especially in the areas of commerce and industry. He asserted that the Jew is a "powerful influence" for "mutual respect and goodwill fundamental to the national unity" of South Africa. "His adaptability," Dr. Malan continued, "makes him a good national as well as a good Jew, and a good South African as well as a true son of Israel."

The certificate to Dr. Malan, in Afrikaans, was presented to him together with a silver plate on which was engraved, also in Afrikaans, the inscription: "To a great Afrikaner, a promoter of good relations between Jews and Afrikaners and true friend of the land of prophets."

Puerto Rican Boys Attack Yeshiva Pupils

NEW YORK — Two patrolmen broke up a teen age fight on a lower East Side playground here, after eight yeshiva pupils were taunted by anti-Semitic remarks hurled at them by a group of Puerto Rican boys. According to the yeshiva boys, all students at Yeshiva Ch'san Sofer, the fight began when they entered the playground after classes. They were confronted by three Puerto Rican boys, one of whom shouted, "Do you want to fight? We don't like Jews and we're going to chase you out." At that point, punches were thrown, and when the Yeshiva students replied in kind, 15 more Puerto Rican youths joined in the fray.

Dr. Dov Biegun and Ossip Wollinsky... B'nai B'rith, through its President Philip M. Klutznick, has asked President Eisenhower to urge the U.S.S.R. at the Geneva conference to allow Jews to emigrate to Israel or any other land where they can practice their religion freely... ADL reports that the tourist-minded state of Florida last week had put an end to religious discrimination in resort advertising... Governor LeRoy Collins had signed into law an anti-discriminatory bill earlier in the year... Time Magazine, devoting three full columns to the Kastner-Greenwald case which has touched the very foundations of the Israel Government, writes: "To the proud, nationalistic Jews of Israel, it is not pleasant to have to recall a time, only too recent, when survival itself depended on the capricious favor of hated oppressors. Yet many a transplanted European in Israel remembers well the days of Nazi power when his life and welfare hinged on the diplomatic skill of a stadlan (fixer), some fellow Jew either tactful, suave, or thick-skinned enough to curry favor with the enemy and thus win a measure of reprieve for his people. That memory, stirred by a court trial, agitated all Israel last week and brought down the

Time also published pictures of Greenwald ("Blacker than night") and Kastner ("Darker than hell")... Twentieth Century-Fox is planning to make a movie on Dr. Jonas E. Salk and his discovery of the polio vaccine... Attorney General Jacob K. Javits, mapping ways and means for curbing delinquency, proposed at Syracuse, N. Y., last week a "very much longer school day" for children from broken homes as one means of combating the evil.

ISRAEL

Many Israelis in the cities, towns and Kibbutzim view Premier Sharett's purge of the General Zionist party from the government so close to election time as a grave mistake which may cost the Mapai many votes... Sharett's apparent justification of Dr. Kastner, charged with treachery against his own fellow Jews in Nazi Germany, has not gone well with the average Israeli... A military investigator in Syria has accused the United States of having negotiated with a Syrian political group concerning a plot for the overthrow of the Syrian Government. The investigator said the April 22 assassination of Col. Adnan Malki was only a preliminary step in the coup... (State Department officials said there "was no truth whatsoever to the allegations.")... Frontpage Magazine says: "Look for an Israeli-American mutual defense agreement to be signed this year." Also: "Peace in the Middle East may occupy a separate paragraph in the Big Four discussions to be held this month... The Russians will support direct Israel-Arab talks."

David Ben Gurion, speaking at a dinner given by the Israel-American Friendship League in honor of American Independence Day, declared that the friendship between Israel and the U. S. preceded the birth of the State. The new Defense Minister said three facts had made American history unique: 1. the conquest of waste land by pioneers; 2. the welding together of people from a multitude of countries; and 3. the growth of democracy and freedom... "These ideals," BG said, "are also shared by Israel reborn."

Reports from the Gaza armistice line indicate that the Israeli-Egyptian talks moved forward after Major-General E. L. M. Burns had succeeded in getting the Egyptians to agree to an agenda... Malkiel Greenwald has made another move against Dr. Israel Kastner: He has lodged a private complaint of perjury... The disclosure by the former Jewish police chief Shelomo Arazi that Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, Histadruth's chairman of the Vaad L'umi, had been murdered in Tel Aviv by Arabs and not by Revisionists, has created another political storm in Israel. The true facts, held secret for 22 years, were known by many prominent people in official circles, it is held. Abrasha Stavsky, who had lost his life on the ill-fated Altalena, was originally accused of the crime.

EUROPE

Samuel Reshevsky, chess champion of the U. S., has scored a clean-cut victory over the chess champion of the world, Mikhail Botvinnik of the Soviet Union... Reshevsky, a pious Jew observing the Sabbath, refused to play on Friday night and Saturday

"Picnic" Is Next Feature at Somerset

"Picnic", the Pulitzer Prize, Critics Award Play, starring Melinda Markey, will be the attraction at the Somerset Playhouse starting Monday, July 18.

"Picnic" takes place in a world of women. The scene is the adjoining back yards of two houses in a small town in Kansas. In one house lives Mrs. Potts whose life is caring for her cranky, invalid mother. In the other lives Flo Owens, fortyish, a widow with two young daughters, Millie, an awkward tomboy whose mind and talents have already earned her a college scholarship for the next year, and Madge, eighteen, sweet, incredibly beautiful and now clerking in a local dimestore. Boarding with the Owens is Rosemary Sydney, an almost-old-maid school teacher, the life of the party type, clinging desperately to her youth and to her reluctant boy friend.

Into this world of unfulfilled womanhood comes one morning a young wanderer, Hal Carter, handsome, lithe, uncouth but ingratiating, a complete no-good, but with a brawny virility that is both disturbing and fascinating. The life of the two households which had been so stiflingly quiet is visibly quickened by his very presence. Before nightfall Hal has the effect of making all the women, each in her own way, grab frantically for the world of masculinity.

"Picnic", written by William Inge, the author of "Come Back, Little Sheba" was first produced by the Theatre Guild and Joshua Logan at the Music Box. The play opened on February 19, 1953 and continued for 485 performances.

Melinda Markey, who will play the role of Madge, is the daughter of Joan Bennett and producer Gene Markey. She has appeared on the radio and on TV and in summer stock with her mother in "Susan and God". She made her Broadway debut in the revival of "On Borrowed Time".

Mark Miller will appear in his third Playhouse role as Hal while Nikki Bruno, long a Somerset favorite, will return after a three year absence to play the role of Rosemary Sydney, the school teacher.

The Story of a Boycott Against an Anti-Semite in 1877

Dr. Jacob R. Marcus, professor of history at Hebrew Union College, recently spoke at Temple Beth El in Detroit on the subject of the memorable American Jewish Tercentenary celebration. He made reference to the formation of the Reform movement in this country and to the activities of the organizer of Hebrew Union College, Dr. Isaac M. Wise. He then proceeded to relate this interesting historical episode.

"This man, Isaac M. Wise, was a rather remarkable person. He was also a great journalist, and he had a newspaper called The American Israelite, which went into every home, almost every home, in this country. In 1877, he had an interesting bit of news to report to his readers. He reported the fact that the richest Jew in America, and a man who had been one of the outstanding bankers helping the Union during the Civil War, Joseph Seligman, of the firm of Seligman Brothers, had been refused a night's lodging in the Grand Union Hotel at Saratoga, the spa in New York state. Why is it Wise and Jews of this country were so very much disturbed? Not because Mr. Seligman would not have a place to sleep, because he could well afford to buy all the hotels in Saratoga and not miss the money. He was reputed to be worth \$30,000,000. But they were indignant at the thought that a man should be discriminated against because of his religion. They considered that bigoted and un-American.

"What did the Jews do when they noted this action? They didn't do what our generation has been accustomed to do. In our generation, we do things differently. When we notice any type of discrimination like that, we call a meeting of the most prominent Jews, we very carefully lock the doors, we look under the chairs, under the tables, to see that nobody is listening to us and then we do absolutely nothing. These Jews were conscious of the fact that the firm that owned the Grand Union Hotel was a firm that also owned the largest dry

goods wholesale concern in America, known as A. T. Stewart and Company. Most of the Jews in the 1870s were in the dry goods and the furnishing business. They determined to boycott that un-American institution. They did not do it secretly. They came out with notices in the press, and they signed their names.

"It wasn't long after that, because of this boycott, in all probability, that A. T. Stewart and Company went into bankruptcy and was bought by a more enterprising and more liberal businessman by the name of John Wanamaker.

"The Jews of that generation were able to do what they did because they were a small compact group of about 250,000. Most of them were Central Europeans, most of them were petty business people, most of them were members of the Reform synagogues."

Whom could Prof. Marcus have meant, in his reference to the door-locking-under-the-chairs-searching Jews of our generation, if not the ADL and the American Jewish Committee? Is he justified in his conclusions, and in his assertion that the direct boycott method of the last century was the more honorable, the more effective way of dealing with anti-Semites?

The eminent historian may be overlooking one fact: that in an era when there were only a quarter of a million Jews in this country it was possible to act unitedly.

While we are convinced that very many Jews will applaud any criticism of look-under-the-chairs and of locking-the-doors when discussing anti-Semitism, we are not so sure that even the elements whose tactics are distasteful to us "do absolutely nothing." That's being a bit unfair. Yet, it is easier to subscribe to action and to reject hush-hush policies.

Dr. Marcus, whom we quote from a stenographic report of his address, assumed a bit too much in his conclusion that the Jews in 1877 were able to accomplish more with a firm boycott because most of them were Central Europeans and members of the Reform synagogues. We doubt whether he could prove the claimed membership and we challenge anyone to prove that the Orthodox were not in the majority at that time; and it is our contention that the Russian Jews, upon coming here, hating Russian despotism as much as the Central Europeans may have loved German culture, acquired as much courage as fighters for liberty as was evidenced by their predecessors who came from Central Europe. Only the changing times are responsible for changing approaches and diverse results in the battle for human dignity.

comments to indicate that there are dissatisfactions with some of the methods pursued by the currently - functioning civic-defense groups and with the Joint Defense Appeal, the fund-raising medium that represents the B'nai Brith Anti-Defamation League and the American Jewish Committee. Since our community's dollars go to the latter through the JDA, we feel justified in expressing protest against the utilization of a fund that approaches the \$200,000 mark for support of this committee's magazine whose ideology frequently runs counter to fair play; whose editors are so facetious in their Jewish attitudes that they often—too often—offend Jewish sensibilities.

Not so long ago, the late Dr. Milton Steinberg delivered a sermon exhorting the mocking of Jewish customs by Commentary's writers. The magazine's editor was forced to apologize for one piece of writing which humiliated the entire Jewish community. But the tactics of mocking and mimicking Jews continue and an otherwise great magazine becomes a mockery in itself.

A typical example of this lack of responsibility was a recent review of Israel Cohen's "Travels in Jewry." The reviewer is entitled to his opinion, but not without knowledge of Jewish conditions and history—and he certainly displayed much ignorance on that score. A Ph.D. degree did not give that reviewer the right to distort an eminent historian's re-

When Israel Cohen, who is a distinguished Anglo-Jewish leader, wrote a dignified letter of protest against the distortions in the review of his book, Commentary's editors permitted the reviewer to continue the ridiculing act with a response that neither touched on the issues nor respected the dignity of a veteran leader in Jewish ranks. We make reference to this incident in order to call attention to the high price our communities pay for mockery.

If the arbitrary manner in which the Jewish Committee's Magazine functions is a criterion, then the reader will be able properly to judge the validity of a statement its editor made in Newark, N. J., recently, about our press, that "community subsidy is necessary because you can't get a free paper without it." He proceeded to commend the no-better-than-average Newark Community - Council - owned periodical as "either the best or one of the best" Jewish papers in the country—thus displaying ignorance in another area: his own field of journalism. What he is trying to do is to encourage a system of community control under a false flag of freedom—as evidenced in his own suppression of it—and that our communities will never endorse.

Defendant Cleared On Major Charges Of Collaboration

JERUSALEM — A sensational libel trial which lasted for about a year and which has excited the Israel press and public came to an end with a marathon 10-hour reading by District Court Judge Benjamin Halevi of summary of the case and a verdict which provoked Acting Attorney General Joseph Kokia to announce that he will appeal to the Supreme Court for a review of the conclusion drawn by the judge.

The principals in the case were Malkiel Gruenwald, a pamphleteer, and Dr. Israel Kastner, former head of the Hungarian Jewish Rescue Committee and currently employed by Kol Israel, the government radio network and "Uj Kelet," the Hungarian-language newspaper in Israel. Mr. Gruenwald charged Dr. Kastner, in a pamphlet, with collaboration with the Nazis. The latter complained to the state prosecutor that he had been libelled. The state prosecutor brought the case to court since Dr. Kastner was a government employee, then working for the Ministry of Trade. This made Mr. Gruenwald the defendant, but Dr. Kastner's only standing in the case was that of a witness.

Considering all the tough luck the Boston Red Sox have had down through the years, culminating with the death of Harry Agganis, it is only fitting that the Sox should finally get a good break not entirely of their own doing.

Joe Cronin was perfectly willing to suffer along with Lou Boudreau as manager for at least another year, but was forced to make a quick, decisive move (a rarity for Cronin) when a couple or three big league clubs began to talk about acquiring Pinky Higgins as their field pilot. That's how Higgins happened to come up for this year.

Now Pinky is raved about as manager of the year, with all the trimmings of praise that go with a fellow whose club is on fire. You didn't hear such accolades, of course, before the Bosox began their move toward the heights, but that's how it goes.

Most of the baseball observers who now sing Pinky's praises to the skies were skeptical of his judgment early in the season, and except for lauding his patience, cannot even now give you details of his managerial genius.

I'll tell you why I like Higgins; at least, it is an example that brings Mike's methods into sharp contrast with those of his predecessor, Boudreau.

It happened last Thursday, when the Red Sox were playing Washington. Actually, the story starts on July 4, three days earlier, during the double header with the Yankees. You'll recall that Tommy Hurd turned in a brilliant 6 1/3 inning stint in relief on that day. Hurd does not customarily pitch that long a stretch.

Now, on Thursday, Higgins wanted a relief pitcher, and his first thought was of the red-hot Hurd. Then he deliberately decided against the pitcher of his choice, and called for someone else. His reason? Simple — Higgins figured that Hurd could use another day of rest after that long, tough job against the Yankees. Pinky would rather risk losing the game than hurting the pitcher.

Such consideration of a pitcher — especially of a relief pitcher — is highly unusual in major league managing circles. With Lou Boudreau such a thing would be unthinkable. With Boudreau the theory seemed to be that the best time to overwork a pitcher was before his arm had cooled off after a good performance.

I remember a game just a few years ago that involved Mickey McDermott, then with the Red

Sox. The skinny southpaw had turned in a beautiful shutout pitching job just two days earlier. He had had one day of rest. Yet, when the Yankees threatened late in the game, it was Mickey whom Boudreau called in from the bullpen, where McDermott shouldn't have been in the first place.

The results were exactly what the manager deserved, although it was the pitcher who was made to look bad. The bases were loaded with Yogi Berra up, and Yogi hit McDermott's first pitch into the bleachers. The fans blamed Mickey, called him a bum, when they actually should have suggested booting Boudreau out of town.

This is just one example of the difference between the Red Sox of last year and this. It's no wonder, is it, that the Sox have good spirit this year, that even Ted Williams is more excited about playing than he has been since his early days in the league.

What a break that those blessed nameless teams inquired about Higgins, and scared Joe Cronin into hiring him for Boston! On such minor miracles are pennants wrought.

Up-And-Coming

Some time ago—last year, if I recall correctly—I had occasion to mention the exploits of some of the younger golfers in the local Jewish community. After reading that column, several leading golfers pointed to the name of one of the young golfers about whom I had written, and predicted that this one had a great potential and would go far. Watch him, they said.

Two weeks ago that prediction started to come true, as Marvin Lerman provided the big surprise in the State Junior Golf Championships. Lerman, a 17-year-old Classical High School senior, made his second appearance in this competition a memorable one by upsetting opponents right and left and going all the way to the finals.

Among the men he conquered along the way was Larry Mowry—and who is Larry Mowry? Why, he merely was one of the finalists in the State Amateur Championship last weekend!

Taking a closer look at Lerman's performance in the junior tourney, we find that Marvin started off by qualifying third with a 76, eliminated the medalist of that competition in the semi-finals, and that he was waging a strong battle for

the title all the way to the 16th hole — just two holes before the end. All this, you will note, from a young fellow who has been playing golf only four years!

Previous Winners

With the start of the Herald's annual golf tournament only a couple of weeks away—the competition begins on Saturday, July 30—it's time to review what has gone before; and in this connection let's look at the list of previous winners in all categories. It may prove surprising to many men to find that so many awards have been presented in this brief series.

Last year brought to the tournament a new champion—Maurice (Moe) Kessler, who outdueled Dick Loebenberg, defending champion. The Seagrams VO Trophy, emblematic of the First Flight title, was won by Bill Gollis, the other finalist and trophy winner being Dick Chase. The winners mentioned above included a couple of repeaters from previous years, but not many, as seen in this list of 1953 Herald Golf Tourney leaders:

Dick Loebenberg was the champion, having beaten Julie Bloom in the finals. First Flight honors went to Moe Kessler, with Howard A. Fain runner-up. In the Second Flight it was Milton Isserlis, first, and Ben Weiner. As for the beaten eights, the winners were Milton Tinkoff, first, and Al Taber, second, championship division; Frank Darman, First Flight, and Gene Aaronson, Second Flight. Henry Byroade Finally Makes It

Where, oh where, is Henry A. Byroade? He is that ambitious young man who was Assistant Secretary of State for Middle Eastern Affairs and who, one day in an "unofficial" address subsequently published by the Government Printing Office, warned Israel it had better forget American Jewry and become part of the Near East world" or else."

He is the young career man in the U. S. State Department who had previously helped our government fashion foreign policy for the trouble spot in such a way that Israel could never take his advice, try as its leaders might—try as its leaders sincerely wanted.

He is the young man who thinks the Arabs are right without question and who considers the American Council for Judaism to be the only significant Jewish organization in the U. S. He is the young man who would have secret meetings with Elmo Berger, AIC's high-powered executive, before our government issued policy statements with regard to Israel and the Near East.

He is now U. S. Ambassador to Egypt. Mr. Byroade is finally home.

"Don'ts" for the Diplomat

American Jewish Personalities

Joseph Baroness — Great Labor Leader Who Aided Zionist Cause

Joseph Baroness came to America from Kamenetz, Podolsk, when he was 21 years old and lived here for 40 stormy years. He was a man whose name could truly be written as "one who loves his fellow man." When there was suffering anywhere Baroness suffered. When he heard of people anywhere who were cold or hungry or maltreated it hurt him.

Baroness was extremely tender-hearted, but, unlike some tender-hearted people who only suffer with the afflicted he took definite steps to help those in need. No one who ever came to him for help was turned away. He not only had a good word for all but stood ever ready to help.

His deep sympathy for the suffering and needs of the underprivileged first led Baroness into the ranks of the Jewish Labor movement, which was then under the influence of various radical Socialist movements but the party line of cosmopolitanism which opposed Zionism and even the Jewish religion itself, was extremely repugnant to him and he afterward found much more fertile fields for his talents and sympathies in public service and in the Zionist Movement.

In 1903, largely because Zionist leaders were the first to come to the aid of the victims of the pogrom against the Jews of Kishinev, Russia, Baroness joined the Zionist Movement and served it faithfully until his death.

His withdrawal from the radical labor movement and his affiliation with Zionism didn't cause Baroness to abandon the cause of labor. He was blessed with a great oratorical talent, an imposing personality and a tremendous capacity for leadership which enabled him to be a great labor leader as well as a great Zionist leader.

Baroness was instrumental in organizing the Hebrew Actors Union, the Hebrew Typographical Union, and the Ladies Garment and Cloak Makers Union. Baroness was one of the leaders of the bitter and prolonged strike of the Cloak Makers Union in 1909. During the mass picketing and demonstrations he was arrested and led in chains through the streets of the garment district and finally sentenced to a long prison term. His arrest stirred public opinion and many of the country's liberals, including Louis D. Brandeis rallied to help the strikers. A settlement with great gains for the workers was reached and when Baroness was released from jail the unions celebrated with a huge street demonstration headed by Baroness on a white horse.

His popularity prompted New York's Mayor Mitchell to appoint him a member of the Board of Education and the great distinction with which he served prompted his reappointment by New York's next mayor, Gaynor. Baroness appeared frequently at both elementary and high school commencement exercises where his very presence elated the children and his tremendous oratory inspired children and adults alike.

That all who came into contact with Baroness benefitted by the experience is best exemplified by the fact that Baroness met Brandeis at the time of the Cloak Makers strike and his influence helped lead Brandeis to Zionism, the cause he was destined to lead.

Baroness, the friend of labor, Zionism, Hebrew education, and in truth, of all humanity and all good causes, died in 1928, a month after he was elected president of the Jewish National Fund. His death plunged New York's masses into a genuine demonstration of

As We Were Saying:

Let's Look at the Record On Past Praise of Russia

By ROBERT E. SEGAL

The decision of the Fund For The Republic — established by the Ford Foundation — to back the Quakers of Plymouth Meeting, Pa., in their determination to stand behind their librarian serves to reassure us once again about America's comeback on civil liberties.

Mrs. Mary Knowles is the key figure in the drama. She was discharged in 1953 as librarian in Norwood, Mass. because she invoked the Fifth Amendment to avoid testifying against herself before the Jenner Committee. When she found the usual job channels closed to her, the Quakers of Plymouth Meeting, near Philadelphia, made a place for her.

Eventually, the Fund For The Republic sent \$5,000 to the Quakers of Plymouth Meeting when township and community chest funds were cut off.

Mrs. Knowles was in bad with America's vigilantes because she had been a secretary in the Samuel Adams School in Boston from 1945 to 1947. The Samuel Adams School is on the Attorney General's list as a communist-front organization. The librarian convinced her present employers that she was a loyal citizen and had not been connected with any subversive group since 1947.

"Agonizing Reappraisal"

Inasmuch as the custom of some of the guardians of our Republic these days is to blacklist people who were caught up in movements of the 1940s, now adjudged pro-communist, it is about time for a genuinely agonizing reappraisal to be made of views and activities in high places during the turbulent '40s.

Paul Willen, a graduate of the Russian Institute at Columbia University, has made a short start in that direction with a revealing article on "Who Collaborated With Russia?" published in The Antioch Review in the fall of 1954. Willen points out that:

1 In 1943, Eddie Rickenbacker, currently a solid citizen of the right, expressed the view, after a trip to Russia, that Stalin's dissolution of the Comintern was "sincere and permanent."

2 Again in March, 1943, Gardner Cowles, Jr., publisher of Look and at that time director of the domestic service of the Office of War Information, demanded that the people make an "unequivocal commitment" to postwar cooperation with Russia. In his judgment, Stalin wanted just what we wanted: security and peace. "We need

mourning such as has seldom been seen in that city. His remains were taken to Eretz, Israel for final burial.

to set over the strange notion which too many Americans have that we will still have to fight Russia another 20 or 25 years." Cowles stated.

3 Three months later, Jim Farley said that it was the obligation of all of the allies to band together in the postwar world, and it was therefore necessary to allay the fears of those who still suspected the "ultimate aims of our Russian ally."

4 In 1945, General Eisenhower, following a trip to Moscow, told a House Committee that "nothing guides Russian policy so much as a desire for friendship with the U. S."

What to Do?

In the light of the present-day determination on the part of congressional and state legislative committees to rake yesterday's embers for clues to subversion, what shall we do with people like Rickenbacker, Cowles, Farley and Eisenhower?

What shall we do with General Douglas MacArthur who declared Feb. 23, 1942: "The hopes of civilization rest on the worthy banners of the courageous Red Army?"

What shall we do with Herbert Hoover, co-author of The Problems of Lasting Peace, who in that 1942 publication did not even consider the Soviet Union was one of the problems involved in achieving a lasting peace? What shall we do with that great reservoir of editorial guidance, Life, devoting its entire March 29, 1943, issue to "Soviet-American cooperation?" And with the latter-day darling of the McCarthyites, Walter Winchell, who assured his millions of readers in 1944 that the fear of Russia was a booby?

New Chance?

What shall we do? Well, we shall hope that other courageous Americans, like those who guide the activities of the Fund For The Republic, will help to give more people like Mary Knowles a new chance to prove her loyalty to America.

We shall hope that our Government will continue to be big enough to acknowledge such mistakes as publication of the recent Army pamphlet, How to Spot a Communist, advising the red-hunters of our day that clues to Communist sympathies are such words as chauvinism, "book-burning," "colonialism," "witch-hunt" and "reactionary," and that other clues include "specific issues in the Communist arsenal for a long time" such as "McCarthyism," "violation of civil rights," "racial or religious discrimination" and "immigration laws."

It didn't take the Army long to see the unwisdom of issuing such directions, and the booklet was withdrawn.

No fair-minded person will argue today that America isn't healthier, civil liberties-wise than it was a year ago. Sanity seems to be seeping back into the judgments and views of many people who were temporarily thrown off balance by the all-outers in our American community.

And meanwhile, if it's collaboration with the Russian that people want to evaluate honestly, a few good long looks at the newspaper files of only yesterday should serve to bring some folks up with a start.

Injured Scientist Is Brought By Plane from Arctic Circle

NEWARK—One of the longest rescue flights ever made by the RCAF last week brought Bernard Weiss, 34, of Irvington, 1,900 miles from the barren lands of the Northwest Territories to Edmonton, Alberta.

He has been partially paralyzed in his right leg since he fell a week earlier at the lonely weather station where he was serving.

An RCAF Dakota of the search and rescue section of the Air Force Tactical Command picked up Weiss from Isachsen, which is roughly half-way between the Arctic Circle and the North Pole.

Mrs. Weiss, who lives in Irvington, reports that he plans to return home as soon as his condition permits. Weiss is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Weiss of Newark.

Weiss was injured while on an expedition with 10 other men sent by the U. S. Government to study weather and living conditions near the North Pole. The expedition

left this country in April and was expected to return this year.

Previously, Weiss had worked for the Government as a weather observer in Iceland for four years. He returned in 1951 and attended the University of Miami.

Weiss had planned to return to the university in the fall of 1956 to study for a master's degree in mathematics.

Voice of Israel Explains Functions

NEW YORK — Israel's radio broadcasting system is government-controlled, but unlike similar set-ups elsewhere, the Voice of Israel is not under one government agency. It reports, instead, to the Foreign Office, the Post Office, the Ministry of Information and the military.

The organization of the system was explained here in an interview with Variety, show business trade newspaper, by Itzhak Shimony, VOI program producer now in the United States to study radio and television techniques.

The interview notes that the "atmosphere being like wartime," there is greater necessity than usual for strict security regulations. This is especially true in the case of Arab-language broadcasts to which Arabs outside Israel also listen. There is also the matter of Foreign Office concern with anything which might tend to exacerbate the border situation unnecessarily.

Commenting on the fact that the organization of the service is still largely a legacy of the British Mandate, Variety quotes sources other than Shimony to the effect that this sometimes leads to dissension and confusion. For one thing, the newspaper notes, the fact that the engineers come under the Post Office's jurisdiction, while the announcers are employees of the Information Ministry, has led to a wage inequity. This inequity results in higher wages for beginning announcers than for all save the very top level technicians.

The Israel program producer described to the trade paper the linguistic set-up, under which VOI broadcasts in Hebrew, Arabic, French and English — not to mention one slowed-down Hebrew broadcast for beginners. Nor does that breakdown take into account the overseas service, operated by the Jewish Agency, which broadcasts in Hebrew, Yiddish, English and French.

Shimony said that he specializes in "entertainment" shows, including a telephone quiz show, a music show, and an unusual program which features three novelists and three poets at each session, whose job it is to "ad lib" stories around three items provided by Shimony.

Berlin Teacher Bars Jewish Students From His Classes

BERLIN — A local high school teacher who refused to admit Jewish students to his class "because I am and shall always remain an anti-Semite", was separated from his post, but granted 75 percent of his salary for 18 months "in view of the fact that he served honorably in the war."

For the first time in the ten post-war years during which educator Paul Joseph Rump has taught school in the Kreuzberg section of Berlin, Jewish students—a pair of twins—were assigned to his class some months ago. He stated bluntly that he would not accept them because they were Jewish, but offered to take in their place, two retarded or obstreperous boys from some other class, so that he would not gain an "undue advantage" from his refusal.

The parents of the twins forced the issue to a showdown. Since Rump would not yield and, as his superiors suggested, represent the incident as a misunderstanding, the case was brought before the Civil Service Disciplinary Chamber of the West Berlin Administrative Court.

The judge, Dr. H. Graeser, found that Rump must be separated from civil service, since he had disobeyed a legal assignment and persisted in his disobedience. Yet Rump's anti-Semitism, Dr. Graeser ruled, is "understandable from the human aspect" and he is not unworthy of substantial severance pay "in view of the fact that he has no record of prior convictions and that he served honorably in the war."

Foods to Remember

In Israel today there is gradually emerging an Israeli Cuisine. But, because Jews from many lands have brought their food customs along to the New Land of Promise and Ancient Heritage, there are many varieties of meat dishes. For instance, Lamb Breast. Sephardic Jews combine Lamb with rice in many ways, but there's nothing more delectable than the following Sephardic Recipe for

RICE FILLED LAMB BREAST

- 1 breast of lamb, average size
- 1/2 cup cooked rice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- A dash of pepper or paprika
- 1 onion, diced or grated
- 3 or 4 tablespoons crushed pine nuts (pecans or peanuts will do)
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- 4 tablespoons olive oil or other vegetable oil.
- 2 cups boiling water

Trim off some of the bits of fat from the meat and chop fine. Cut a pocket in the lamb breast for filling. Combine cooked and well drained rice, seasonings, onion, nuts and minced parsley. Fill the cavity or pocket in the meat and close the opening with wooden toothpicks or metal skewers. Brown lightly on all sides in some of the oil, using a large frying pan. Dust lightly with flour to prevent the oil from spattering all over the kitchen. When the filled meat is browned, dust generously with flour on all sides and place it in a roasting pan. Add a half cup of boiling water at a time, every 15 minutes while roasting the meat at 350 deg. F. Allow 25 minutes per pound or till nicely browned. Yes, by all means use the oil in the frying pan to grease the roasting pan, also to brush top of meat. We're opposed to waste of any kind! Besides, it adds up to a browner crusted roast of Lamb Breast! Serve this dish with tomato sauce and call it "American Version," but give credit to our Sephardic brethren for a tasty dish. Serves 4.

MIDSUMMER SALAD DESSERT

- 1 medium size fresh pineapple
- 1 pound sweet cherries, pitted
- 2 bananas, thinly sliced
- 8 ounces creamed cottage cheese
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- A dash of salt
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans or walnuts
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise type dressing
- 4 tablespoons sour cream
- 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- Lettuce

Trim pineapple, cutting out all "eyes." Slice down center lengthwise 1/2 in cut each half lengthwise for easier handling. Cut away hard core from each of the four sections. Slice into quarter inch thick wedges. Combine with sliced bananas and pitted cherries and chill in the refrigerator while preparing remaining ingredients. Combine cheese, sugar, salt and chopped nuts. Form into cheese balls the size of walnuts or smaller, allowing at least two per serving. Arrange lettuce leaves on 4 to 6 serving plates. Place some of the mixed fruit combination in the center of each and top with cheese balls. Combine Mayonnaise with sour cream and confectioners' sugar and spoon over top of salads or serve separately. Serves 4 to 6.

Variations: Canned pineapple.
