Vienna—Dr. William Feurwangler, noted German Opera conductor, will not be invited to participate in the Salzburg Music Festival this year because Arturo Toscanini, internationally renowned conductor has insisted upon his exclusion, according to reports.

Zionists to Fight Ban on Fund Raising

Bucharest (WNS)—Unsuccessful in their efforts to win the revocation of an unexplained ministerial decree outlawing Zionist fund collections throughout the country, Zionist leaders have dispatched M. Rosenstein, Keren Hayesod representative in Roumania, to Geneva to urge Victor Antonescu, Roumanian foreign minister, to intervene with his government.

Mr. Antonescu is attending the League of Nations sessions. Meanwhile 98 persons have been arrested in Bessarabia for illegal possession of the blue and white Jewish National Fund boxes.

Zionist propaganda literature had also been banned and fears are expressed that Zionist meetings will be prohibited.

Scholar From Hebrew University Arrives

New York—Dr. Walter Fischel of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem is arriving in America this month and will remain here through December, lecturing and engaging in scientific research, according to information just received by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations at its Executive Offices in Cincinnati. Dr. Fischel is an outstanding scholar specializing in the history and life of Jews in Islamic countries and is the author of numerous studies, treatises and books in Hebrew, English and German.

BOYCOTTED BAIREUTH

It is well known that Toscanini in 1933 broke his contract to conduct at the Baireuth Festival in Germany, which is rapidly toppling from its position of musical pre-eminence, in protest against the persecution of the Jews in Naziland.

Last year, the first Jewish Symphony Orchestra in Palestine was conducted by Toscanini, who in every way has been striving to aid the Jews dispossessed by the Hitlerites, while taking every measure to strike at Germany.

Grocers Win Right To Be Open Sunday

New York (WNS)—Jewish retail grocers who close their establishments from Friday sundown to Saturday sundown won the right to keep open without interference on Sunday until 11.30 when Mayor La Guardia's impartial arbitrator, Major William Mack, reached an agreement between grocers who observe Saturday and those who observe Sunday.

The agreement exempts Jewish grocers who close on Saturday from the Sunday closing ordinance up to 11.30 a. m.

Both groups pledge themselves not to cut prices on Saturday or Sunday.

Vatican Disturbed by Polish Pogroms

Warsaw—Reports are current here that the Vatican is so disturbed over anti-Semitic violence in Poland that it is sending a confidential emissary to Warsaw to study the situation at first hand.

Jerusalem Mayor "Fired" from Post

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—District authorities at Nablus warned the mukhtars of the surrounding area that all Arabs joining in a strike movement or agitating for a strike would be immediately imprisoned by administrative action. The announcement was taken as an indication of the strong action being planned throughout Palestine by the authorities to avert a resumption of the general strike which lasted for six months in 1936.

The Mufti of Jerusalem is still isolated in his residence in the Mosque area. Although he was demoted from that post by Government edict, the Mufti refuses to budge even though the telephone lines have been cut, giving him no access to the outside world.

Yiddish Culture Congress Launches Plan for Unity

Paris—A scheme to unite all Jewish parties for defence and development of Yiddish language and culture was launched by the World Congress for the Defence of Yiddish Culture at its sessions here.

It was determined at the conclave to found a World Yiddish Culture Union to centralize cultural work in all countries.

A manifesto explaining the aims of the union says: In this tragic moment when the very existence of the Jewish people is threatened in many countries, it is comfort-

ing to note the steady development of Yiddish and the desire to uphold Jewish culture among the widest classes of the Jewish people.

The Congress has also decided to create centers for Yiddish theaters, schools, and publications.

A central committee of five representatives from all countries where Yiddish is spoken has been elected to carry out the proposals resolved upon by the Congress.

Bar Jewess from Playing Concerto

London (WNS)—Seeking to prevail upon the Nazi authorities to waive their objections to a London radio broadcast of the recently discovered violin concerto by Schumann, the German composer, who wrote it for Joachim, a famous Jewish violinist, the British Broadcasting Company has sent a special emissary to Berlin. Miss Darangi, niece of Joachim, was to have been the soloist at the concerto's first performance since 1854.

Similar Nazi objections prevented Yehudi from playing the concerto in America.

Grange is Warned Against Fascism

TRENTON—The real challenge to American institutions lies in Nazism and Fascism, rather than in Communism, Louis J. Tabor, of Columbus, Ohio, master of the National Grange, had today warned the farmers of New Jersey at the Trenton Fair Grounds for Grange Day.

Mr. Tabor urged Americans to remain free of European war, and said his contacts with farmers in every State indicated a desire for isolation from European disputes.

Reich Jews are Tormented by Nazi District Bosses

Berlin (WNS)—The fate of the Jews of Germany is now in the hands of the Nazi Party. The Nazi Gauleiters (district leaders) will have, according to reliable authority, the sole right to determine the status of the Jews.

Jews Transferred

By legislation and ministerial decree the Third Reich has eliminated or greatly restricted Jewish activity, and by handing over the Jewish question to leaders of the Nazi Party for final liquidation, has fulfilled one of its earliest promises.

Bosses in Charge

Under the new dispensation each Gauleiter will have the authority to issue measures affecting Jews of his district. Undoubtedly anti-Jewish measures will vary widely, depending on the feelings of the individual Gauleiter toward the Jews.

Jewish Badges

The question of compelling Jews to wear distinctive insignia, such as yellow badges, has also been discussed. In fact, it is reliably believed that a yellow badge should be worn by each Jew on his left arm, so that there might be no confusion with the Reichswehr (army) insignia.

The orders to wear these "badges of shame," which are a throwback to the Middle Ages, will not come from any governmental authority, but from the Gauleiter.

Ghetto Benches

This method of treatment of the Jews has already gone into effect as instanced by the placing of yellow benches along the Olivaerplatz, Berlin, for the use of Jews only.

It was on the order of the Berlin Gauleiter, Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels, that the benches were set up. Other districts have not followed this idea, since it was discovered that Aryans disregarded the signs "For Jews Only" on benches and used them freely.

Men Tortured

Another example of the Gauleiters' methods occurred in the States of Allenstein and Schneidmuhl, where Jewish men and women of all ages were regularly summoned to police headquarters and ordered to stand facing a blank wall for hours at a stretch, sometimes until they collapsed.

These recent attempts to harass and torment the Jews are merely a further effort to liquidate the Jewish population. It is now estimated that in four years 100,000 Jews have left Germany, there remaining now 400,000.

Police Informer Killed By Arab

Jews Anticipate Huge Citrus Crop

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcour Agency)—An Arab suspected of being a police informer was murdered today near Mishmar Haemek. An Arab charged with his slaying was arrested.

Several shots were fired at midnight at the Jewish settlement of Givat Ada.

Despite recent acts of terrorism, Palestine Jewry celebrated the Feast of Tabernacles (Succoth) that was similar to the festivities of previous years. One of the most popular events was held on Mount Carmel when Josef Kasstein's Biblical spectacle of the time of Israel's conquest of Canaan was presented.

Preparations swung under way today at the Tel Aviv Port to handle the coming year's citrus crop which is expected to be the largest in history. It is believed that 2,000,000 cases will be exported from Tel Aviv alone. This would represent twenty per cent of the entire shipment for the season.

Execute All Murderers, Woman Lawyer Advises

If Criminal Deserves Life in Prison He Deserves Death, Says Miss Fenberg

New York—Time was when Matilda Fenberg, prominent Chicago woman lawyer, subscribed heartily to the theories of Clarence Darrow regarding the punishment of criminals.

Began Practice in 1924

It was under Mr. Darrow's watchful eye, in fact, that she began her criminal practice in 1924, and for five years she believed as firmly as her mentor that the death punishment was an ineffectual, inhumane and stupid method of disposing of murderers. But that was quite a while ago. The other day at the Waldorf-Astoria, where she is staying during her visit here, she said:—

"I think the sooner a murderer is put to death, put out of society forever, the better. Killing a murderer is a blessing to society." And in the next breath she went miles further, saying:—"In my opinion, if a criminal deserves life imprisonment, he deserves death." Miss Fenberg is a pretty, dark-haired woman, fortyish and feminine. "In court," she said, "I try to be hard-boiled. But one look at me and you've got my number."

Wanted to be a Lawyer

"I was born in the little town of Findlay, O. I wanted to be a lawyer when I was a little girl of 9. I was called as a witness in the case of a man who had bought stolen copper wire. He had a wife and five children, and he was sent to the penitentiary. I promised myself then:—'When I grow up I'll become a lawyer and help these poor devils.'"

Miss Fenberg studied at the University of Chicago and Columbia Law School. Then she became the first woman to matriculate from Yale. "Darrow always had been doing what I wanted to do—helping the underdog. One day, after trying my first case in Findlay, I went to Mr. Darrow's office in Chicago and we talked for three hours. Then he asked me to remain in Chicago and not go back to Findlay."

Became Hard-Boiled

Miss Fenberg defended six murderers successfully her first year. She tried a bank robbery case with Mr. Darrow, and during the preparation of the Leopold-Loeb case, sat in as an observer. For five years she practiced criminal law in Chicago out of her own office. "Then I came to the conclusion that with hardened criminals there's nothing to be done but get rid of them, and get rid of them fast. Death is the only thing any hardened criminal is afraid of."

Must be Realists

"During those five years I gave my clients the sympathy and understanding only a woman can give. And what would they do after I got them free? They'd turn right around and do the same thing all over again. When I was forced to realize that all the pretty ideals I had believed in simply didn't work, I went to pieces. I suffered a nervous breakdown. I went to Mexico for two months and there I decided never to practice criminal law again."

That was in 1929. For two years thereafter she was an Assistant Corporation Counsel in Chicago, and since then has conducted a general practice, which does not include criminal cases.


Illegal Immigrant Commits Suicide

Mrs. Feder Describes Work of Women Pioneers; Comments on Partition

Her hobby:—Helping human beings . . . Her vocation:—The Women Pioneers . . . Her name:—Sarah Feder . . . If you were one of the fortunate persons who heard this young woman, when she addressed the opening meeting of her local Pioneer group, then you already know what's to be said about her . . . But for those of you who have only heard of her, this is one girl's impression of Mrs. Sarah Feder . . .

Charming Manner

She comes under the various headings of charm, intellect, modernity, graciousness and wit-tiness, and really and truly does justice to them . . . She has an ease of manner that is very pleasant to the people with whom she comes in contact . . . Last Monday night at the home of the Alter Boymans, I had an appointment with Mrs. Feder, and no sooner had introductions been made than I felt I'd known the lady for a very long time . . .

Well Educated

Things you probably never knew about her until now are: She's been in the Poale Zion movement since she was seventeen . . . Was born in Milwaukee . . . She has a fine husband and a seven-year-old daughter, whom she adores, and there was that well-known beam in her eyes when she spoke of them . . . About her education I learned that she has attended a normal school, a school of social service administration, the University of Chicago, and received a master's degree in the University of Missouri, and also studied at the Teachers College of Columbia University.

On Women Pioneers

Because she's such an ardent Pioneer it was almost impossible to keep on the subject of her own personal life, and completely without warning the interview turned into a discussion of what, without a doubt, is Mrs. F's favorite subject:—i.e. Women Pioneers and their worthy work . . .

Celebrate Anniversary

"You know," she put in "we're celebrating our thirteenth year of existence now" . . . And then she told me how she originally became connected with the organization . . . "Thirteen years ago my husband and I were living in New York," she went on . . . "He was doing some research work and I was attending the Teachers College . . . I received a letter from Rachael Yenait Ben Zevie, now a director of one

of the Pioneer training schools in Palestine) asking if we could possibly raise \$500 to help build a tree nursery, with women as the pioneer workers . . . The more we thought about the idea, the more we realized that those women who were planning the tree nursery 'had something there' . . . So we ran an affair and helped as much as we could . . .

"It was different kind of work than any other organization was doing . . . We were going to train our women to do rigorous work, and take an active part in the life of their community" . . . Well, that was thirteen years ago, and very successfully are the Women Pioneers accomplishing their purpose . . .

Fond of Women

From her conversation it is very obvious that Mrs. Feder is fond of women . . . Her fondness for them is an inherent part of her—and moreover, being a Pioneer she subscribes to the idea that every woman is as good as every other woman, no matter how high or low her station in life might be . . .

Partition a Compromise

Being a delegate to the Zionist Congress this year was the second experience of its kind for her . . . She was also a delegate in 1929 . . . Is a definite naysayer as far as Partition is concerned, but is not so biased as to be unable to fathom the arguments of those in favor of the proposition . . . "The Royal Commission" said she "considers partition as the only solution to the situation . . . But the delegates at the Congress disagreed . . . They believed that had the administration been more efficient in Palestine, the entire situation might not have been created . . . The delegates of course, did not feel that they had the right to decide on the question . . . Hence, the compromise resolution was adopted, permitting an investigation into England's plan . . . And if any matters regarding partition had to be solved, it would be brought to a specially elected Congress . . ."

Junior Pioneers

At this point the doorbell buzzed . . . It seems that the Junior Pioneers were unwilling to let Mrs. Feder leave our city without also having the privilege of an address at their meeting—and furthermore, I believe they wanted to have a nice chummy chat with her—Because, you see, she knows them all by their given names, having been in Providence before . . . So—the interview was ended, and before I knew it, Mrs. Feder was completely surrounded by girls and more girls . . . But then, that's exactly the way I'll always think of her . . . With women and girls always around her—and she at her happiest . . .

Nazis Again Balk Playing of Concerto Refuse Permission to Yehudi Menuhin

Los Gatos, Calif. (WNS)—Yehudi Menuhin, world-famous Jewish violinist, is beginning to abandon hope of being allowed to play Robert Schumann's long-lost violin concerto, the rights to which are controlled by Germany.

After first refusing to allow Menuhin to render the world premiere of the concerto in St. Louis on November 12th, the Nazi authorities relented and informed him that he could play it on November 14th.

Now he has received a cable from Germany advising him that he may not play the concerto until November 25th.

The orchestral material for the concerto is on its way to San Francisco but the American agent of the German copyright owner has been instructed to withhold its release.

Manchester, England (WNS)—The dismissal of six Jewish typists employes of a Christian firm, because they refused to work on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur has created a stir here.

Nathan Laski, father of Neville Laski, president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, has taken up the case and is seeking to determine the legality of the dismissals.

Finds Jews' Status Never More Tragic

NEWARK — Members of the newly-formed New Jersey Division of the American Jewish Congress had before them a warning by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise that the status of the Jew throughout the world "was never more tragic."

"The American Jewish Congress has a big job ahead of it," said Dr. Wise. "It is not only as Jews but as Americans that we must help keep America an indestructible democracy. Unless we remain on guard, we face an enslaving Fascist state. We must strengthen the hands of our governmental leaders like President Roosevelt in keeping Democratic principles alive."

League May Call Refugee Conference

Geneva (WNS)—A suggestion that the League of Nations Assembly authorized the High Commission for German Refugees and the League's secretariat to convene an international conference early in 1938 to draft a convention for German refugees is contained in a report submitted to the League's sixth commission by one of its sub-committees.

The report also recommends that the Assembly review the refugees beyond 1938 and proposes that the High Commission submit a plan of action in their behalf to the various governments before May 15, 1938.

10-Year-Old Hailed as Talmudic Prodigy

Chicago (WNS)—A ten-year-old student at the Chicago Hebrew Theological College who plays a good game of baseball is being hailed here as a Talmudic prodigy. The young genius is Morris Zachariash, son of a Los Angeles junk dealer. Morris was born in Shanghai where his parents settled after fleeing from Russia. Rabbi Saul Silber, dean of the College, declared that Morris knows more of Talmudic literature than most experts. He is studying Rabbinic commentaries in a class with students six and seven years his senior.

Demand Release Of Jewish Settlers

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The representatives of the Hadera Council called upon the Assistant District Commissioner urging the release of the Jewish settlers arrested on the eve of Rosh Hashana, as a result of the round-up following the slaying of several Arabs.

The Council spokesmen emphasized the bad treatment being given the prisoners and requested their transfer to a concentration camp until their final release is secured. Consideration of their request was promised.

Spaniard Acquitted For Defiling Hitler

Montreal (WNS)—Destroying a picture of Adolf Hitler in the German consulate is no crime when the destroyer has a justifiable reason.

Such was the verdict of a Montreal jury in acquitting Joseph Fuentes, a Spaniard, who was arrested last June after he had smashed a life-size photograph of Der Fuehrer by throwing a chair at it.

Fuentes testified that he had gone to the consulate to protest the bombing of his native town of Almeria by a Nazi warship, and that when the acting-consul refused to give him a satisfactory explanation he lost his head. The jury found that the plaintiff had justifiable provocation.

Paraguay Names Jew as Colombian Envoy

Asuncion, Paraguay (WNS)—Dr. Isaac Rosenzweig, Roumanian-born physician, has been appointed Paraguayan minister to the Republic of Colombia.

Dr. Rosenzweig came from Czernowitz 20 years ago and settled in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where he gained fame as a surgeon.

He served with distinction in the Paraguayan army medical corps during the recent Chaco War between Paraguay and Bolivia.

Polish Alliance Bars Hall for Nazi Rally

Schenectady, N. Y. (WNS)—Following numerous protests by Jews and non-Jews, permission for Fritz Kuhn, fuhrer of the pro-Nazi German-American Bund to speak in the hall of the Polish National Alliance on October 16th was revoked by leaders of the Alliance.

Kuhn was to speak at a founders' day rally of the Schenectady German-American Club.

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Anti-Nazi Germans

Quietly but effectively influential elements
among the German-American population are
mobilizing for a fight against Nazism.

The anti-Nazi resolution adopted by the
German-American Citizens League of Illinois,
the opposition of the German-American League
for Culture to a Nazi celebration in San Fran-
cisco and the reported anti-Nazi activity of
Speaker Heck of the New York State Assembly
are straws in the wind.

Anti-Nazi feeling is reaching such inten-
sity that it may easily become anti-German-
American. That would be tragic for millions
of Americans of German ancestry are quite as
anti-Nazi as any Jew.

Nazi activities in this country have done
grave harm to the loyal and patriotic German-
Americans.

For several years they have tried to ig-
nore the Nazis. Now they realize that silence
is futile and they are ready to fight. If they
really mean business it ought not be long be-
fore the Nazis are branded for what they are
—aliens seeking to undermine American demo-
cracy.

The Lion Roars

Unlike other colonial powers, England
is slow to retaliate against terrorism and blood-
shed because she must carefully weigh the ef-
fect of her actions in one colony on the popu-
lations of her other possessions.

But when she hits back she leaves no doubt
that she means business.

For more than a decade Britain has looked
the other way at Arab violence in Palestine.
Twice Arab terrorism was climaxed by bloody
riots. But still England did nothing.

Only when one of the highest ranking Brit-
ish officials in Palestine was assassinated did
the British Lion translate his roar into action.

The outlawing of the Arab High Commit-
tee, the deportation of many of the leading
Arab politicians, the deposition of the Grand
Mufti and the arrest of numerous Moslem dig-
nitaries in a swift and drastic series of moves
were England's answer to Arab terrorism.

This cracking down on the Arabs respon-
sible for the renewed wave of violence and
bloodshed may provoke a reaction in the form
of new riots.


But regardless of its consequences it is

Acquit Nazi-German Of Desecrating Flag

Had Superimposed Swastika on Flag

New York (WNS)—A charge
that John Szabo, owner of a trav-
el bureau in Yorkville, violated a
state law forbidding the desecra-
tion of the American flag by dis-
playing in his window a poster
containing an American flag on
which the swastika is superimpos-
ed, was thrown out of court by
Magistrate Leonard McGee after
listening to Mitchell Salem Fisher
attorney for the Non-Sectarian
Anti-Nazi League and the German
American League for Culture, out-
line a complaint.

Mr. Fisher was acting for Sam-
uel Untermyer who had threaten-
ed legal action against persons
displaying the poster, which is an
advertisement for the Nazi cele-
bration of German day.

Magistrate McGee ruled that the
statute did not apply in this case.

In a statement issued after
Magistrate McGee's ruling Mr.
Untermyer intimated that he was
planning further action.

Ask Exclusion of Jews From Polish Army

Warsaw (WNS)—Exclusion of
the Jews from the Polish army and
their incorporation in a special
military labor battalion were
among the demands voiced in res-
olutions adopted at a conference
of the Poznan section of the Union
of the Polish Army Volunteers.

The resolutions, which were sub-
mitted to Marshal Edward Smigly-
Rydz, called upon parliament to
enact legislation barring Jews from
living in frontier areas and from
adopting Polish names and forcing
them to resume their former fam-
ily names.



Political Unrest Causes Depression

Keren Hayesod Holds Conference

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Deeply disturbed by the present economic situation in Palestine, the Jewish community has issued an appeal to Jews throughout the world to strengthen the Yishuv's economic structure by supplying large funds to the Keren Hayesod, the financial instrument of the Jewish Agency.

"Palestine Jewry faces a grave hour" was the keynote of a meeting held here under the auspices of the Jewish Agency and the Keren Hayesod attended by representatives of all the Zionist parties who met to consider how the national funds could offset economic difficulties arising out of the present political situation.

In a frank survey of the "difficult economic position now obtaining in Palestine" and expressing the "general perturbation concerning the welfare of the Yishuv and of Palestine," Eliezer Kaplan Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, emphasized that national capital was urgently required to overcome obstacles arising out of the unwillingness of private institutions to undertake large-scale constructive action at this time.

Melchett, Reading Head Committee

London (WNS)-Palchor Agency—Lord Melchett and Lord Reading were elected joint chairmen of the political committee of the Jewish Agency at the first meeting of that group of twelve named by the Zionist Congress and the Council of the Jewish Agency at the recent meeting in Zurich.

At the meeting a preliminary decision was made with regard to the procedure to be followed in assisting the Jewish Agency Executive in the current political negotiations with the British Government with respect to Palestine's political future.

Jewish Movies at Playhouse Sunday

German-Americans Boycott Nazi Day

San Francisco (WNS) — Anti-Nazi German-Americans represented in the German-American League for Culture are boycotting the San Francisco celebration of German Day on the ground that it "is not a meeting of American citizens but a gathering dedicated to furthering the Nazi cause."

Erich Spiekermann, secretary of the League, which claims 40,000 members here, said that "the swastika will be displayed at the California ball during the celebration. The Horst Wessel song, official Nazi anthem, will be sung and the speaker will be Baron Manfred von Killinger, official Nazi representative in San Francisco."

Silence becomes a wise man better than it becomes a fool.

New York—Let scholars and trained thinkers take the place of men of wealth as leaders of American Jewish life!

That was the thought advanced this week by Prof. Morris R. Cohen, philosophy teacher at the College of the City of New York and widely known in Jewish affairs. He taught at Stanford University this summer. The kindly-eyed philosopher whose brain is sharp and keen-edged, explained.

"It seems to me vain to deny the obvious statistical fact that the great mass of intellectual Jews in the United States have not hitherto participated in Jewish affairs."

"They have not been interested in synagogues or in specifically Jewish charitable institutions. And for this, I take it, no one has a right to demand of them any excuse or apology. These are matters on which civilized men may honestly differ. If the advent of Hitlerism and the rapid growth of anti-Semitism today has brought a number of thoughtful people to be more actively interested in Jewish problems, it is because the latter involve more than matters of religion and philanthropy."

"Despite our differences, we may all agree that it is important to prevent our degradation as human beings, to protect our rights so that we and our children can live with dignity and self-respect."

"To meet this challenge of contemporary life," the philosopher went on, "a great deal more study and factual knowledge is required than has hitherto been available. That, I think, is a field to which intellectual Jews of all shades of opinion can greatly contribute."

Riot Results from Fascist Procession

London Police Arrest Hundreds

London (WNS)—Hundreds of Fascists and anti-Fascists are nursing bruises and cracked heads as an aftermath of the fifth anniversary march of Sir Oswald Mosley's Union of British Fascists through the South End of London during which thousands of anti-Fascists fought with police and blackshirts to prevent the demonstration.

More than 100 persons were arrested after the police had strug-

gled desperately to break up hastily built barricades designed to impede the Fascists march through the streets of South London.

The parade was routed through the South End after the Home Office had forbidden the march to go through the heavily populated Jewish districts in the East End.


Among the debris littering the streets after the marchers and Fascists had been dispersed by the police were hundreds of false "Jewish noses" which some Fascists had worn.

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

Appeal Committee Begins Campaign

The Providence Ten Day Campaign for the American Committee Appeal for the Jews in Poland is now under way. The aim of this agency is to raise money in America for the relief of the impoverished Jews in Poland. The funds collected for this purpose are distributed by a committee in Poland, comprised of outstanding leaders of Polish Jewry, and are used for constructive aid to artisans, financial assistance to small merchants, training for young people preparing to emigrate to Palestine, help for Jewish professionals, and relief for victims of pogroms.

Walter Adler, chairman of the committee, said yesterday, "Beyond question this largest Jewish settlement in Europe is the greatest relief problem in the world. The terrible distress of the Jews there can be alleviated only if American Jews rush funds immediately."

With the news from Poland so disquieting, it is not necessary to describe in detail the tragic conditions of the Jews in that country. Benjamin Winter, national chairman of the committee, said this week, "I am very happy to note that Providence Jewry will do its share toward our million dollar drive for the suffering Jews in Poland."

He further stated, "A member of the Providence Committee will call upon you to ask help for those unfortunate people. I appeal to you to make this short campaign in Providence a success, and share with the Jews throughout the United States in assisting their less fortunate brethren overseas." The Ten Day Campaign was chosen in Providence, so as not to interfere with the Community Fund Drive, which begins in a few weeks.

Roumanian Farmers Launch Boycott

Bucharest (WNS)—A nationwide boycott of all goods made or sold by Jewish firms was voted by the syndicate of Roumanian landowners, representing thousands of farmers, as M. Icatanasiu, one of the leaders of the National Christian Party, made public details of his party's plans for dealing with the Jews when it comes into power.

In an article in the nationalist newspaper, Porunca Vremi, Icatanasiu explained that the party would move for a constitutional amendment authorizing the expropriation of Jews' property and would demand the revision of Jewish naturalizations.

Pending the revision, he said, the Jews will be held in concentration camps.

Sisterhood Names Annual Chairman

"The Jew Considers America" was the topic of the lecture given by Rabbi Schussheim last Monday night at the first meeting of the Sisterhood of Temple Beth Israel, at which Mrs. Barney Taber presided. Alex. Kahn Says JDC Aid Preserves Peace in Poland

"One of the few forces directed toward peace in Poland is the aid being extended by the Jews of America through the agency of the Joint Distribution Committee."

So declared Alexander Kahn, chairman of the J. D. C.'s Committee on Poland, when he returned on the S. S. Champlain, after a three months study and investigation of conditions among Jews in Poland. He is shown here with Mrs. Kahn who accompanied him.

There are 3,500,000 Jews living in that country and naturally aid to them who are struggling against

depression and oppression materially is helping in the economic restoration of all the Polish people, Mr. Kahn said.

"This aid extended to Poland, and to Rumania and other European lands is all the more significant because those countries constitute an area whose well-being may be decisive in determining peace or war on that continent."

Unfortunately, there are forces now at work in Poland which gravely compromise this work of generosity and good will, said Mr. Kahn.

Hitler Dominates Nazi Artist League

Puts Emphasis on Order, Not Taste

Berlin — Artists are cultural soldiers and art must strive primarily to show order and unity in its aims, not taste.

This was the statement of Professor Klaus Richter in the Verein of Berlin Artists, one of the most famous artists' leagues in Germany, after Professor Ludwig Dettmann and several other prominent sculptors and painters announced their resignation from the association, giving their reasons as the present political domination of artists in Germany.

Professor Richter emphasized that the Verein in future would follow closely the artistic directions given by Adolf Hitler in his various speeches on artistic subjects.

Art has always been looked upon from the viewpoint of sensualist. From now on it must be looked upon from the standpoint of the state, which was able to support art without putting restrictions on it. In future there will be no struggle between rivaling artistic convictions. There will be unity and order.

Spain Reaffirms Religious Liberty

Promise Jews Freedom, Equality

Valencia, Spain (WNS)—The uninterrupted Jewish religious services in Barcelona for the past year is cited by the official information service of the Spanish Loyalist government in a proclamation reaffirming its determination to maintain religious freedom.

The communique declares that "the Jewish community in Barcelona voluntarily interrupted services in its small synagogue only during the first days of the revolution. For more than a year services in the Barcelona synagogue have been proceeding without interruption. If the former synagogue on Calle Principe in Madrid is now closed, this is due to the fact that the few Jews who resided in Madrid before the outbreak of the civil war were mostly foreigners and have now forsaken the city."

A statement by Jose Maria Semprun, Spanish charge d'affaires in The Netherlands, that "after the war the Jews in the Spanish Republic will enjoy full freedom and equality" and that "Jewish immigration to Spain will depend upon the international situation at the end of the war" is also included in the communique.

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Leadville Synagogue Is Sold for Junk

Jewish Community Only 2 Families

Leadville, Colorado (WNS)—A forgotten chapter in American Jewish history was recalled here when the Leadville synagogue, built when this once famous mining town boasted of 200 Jewish families, was torn down because the Jewish community has dwindled to two families.

Built in the 1860's before Colorado was admitted to the Union, the synagogue stood on ground donated by the famous Senator H. A. W. Tabor.

The proceeds from the sale of the wreckage were turned over to the National Home for Jewish Children in Denver, after a sum was set aside for the upkeep of the old Jewish cemetery. The synagogue had been abandoned since 1922.

Before that it had been used for many years only on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The reform temple here, which has also been unused for years, will also be torn down shortly.

Budapest (WNS)—Some 60,000 Galician Jews who have been living in Hungary since the end of the World War are threatened with deportation. The Hungarian government has informed them that they must leave the country because they are aliens.

Stating that return to Germany would in all probability endanger his life, Herzmann, had previously been granted a stay of deportation and the right to depart voluntarily. However, so far it has been impossible for him to find refuge elsewhere.

Marshall Goldberg, of Pitt, who had plenty to do with the 59-0 rout of Ohio Wesleyan; Alex Schoenbaum, Ohio State wingman, who was a tower of strength in the defeat of Texas Christian; Bernstein over Brown, who scored one of the three touchdowns in the opening triumph over Connecticut State; and Plevinsky and Gottlieb, who had lots to do with Rutgers' defeat of Susquehanna.

HERO BARNEY

He's sitting in a box at the World Series in New Yawk. Now he waves to friends and admirers—their number is legion; now he stops to talk with a moocher who

puts the bite on him. He's Barnet Rosafsky—Barney Ross to you, my fran—who saved the nite for Mike Jacobs little more than a week ago in the very same spot where he now is watching the Yankees and Giants.

Even the folks in the hinterlands, who have nothing more reliable than a radio announcer for their information, know it was Barney who waged the only thrilling fite in the Carnival of Champions. But not many folks know that: A bloody and battered Ross returned to his dressing room after beating Ceferino Garcia in the Polo Grounds.

His left hand hung limp as he slumped into a chair, surrounded by reporters who asked him everything from what round he first was dazed in to what he eats for breakfast.

But he talked freely, but refused to mention the fact that his left hand was injured. Sam Pian, his manager, whispered it softly to this goggle-eyed reporter. "His left hand is in a bad way, but he's afraid the newspapermen will think he's alibi-ing if he says so. In the second round I told him to keep that left hand up. He turned to me and said, 'It's paining me, Sam.' And with that he turned in one of the best fites of his life!"
