Industry Seeks Change in Policy

Berlin (WNS)—Charging that German economy is so critical that half its population "lives on money derived directly or indirectly from the government," leaders of German industry have submitted a secret memorandum to the Chancellor Hitler warning him that he must change his economic policy so that the Reich may obtain a foreign loan.

The memorandum urges major departures in Germany's internal and external policies to placate world opinion so that Germany may obtain a needed foreign loan.

Nazis Withhold Ashes of Hirsch

Berlin (WNS)—That the Nazi regime is hounding Helmuth Hirsch, the 21-year old American Jew whom it beheaded on an alleged charge of high treason, even in death was disclosed by the American consulate-general here when it announced its inability to obtain the ashes of Hirsch, whose body was cremated.

Acting in behalf of Hirsch's parents, who live in Prague, the consulate-general asked the secret police to send the ashes to Prague. But thus far this request has

Italian Jews Split on Zionism

Rome (WNS)—Italian opposition to Zionism and the warnings of the Fascist press to Jews to give up their interest in it on pain of forfeiting Italian citizenship and residence are rapidly splitting Italian Jewry into two sharply opposed factions.

Under the leadership of assimilationist groups, Jews in the smaller towns, where there are from 10 to 25 Jewish families, are making public denunciations of their Zionism, while a national anti-Zionist union was organized in Florence at a conference of leaders from 14 Jewish communities.

In the larger cities, such as Padua, Trieste and Milan, the majority of Jews are holding fast to Zionism. In the latter city a Zionist mass meeting attracted an audience of more than 300 people.

Nazis Launch New Warship

Kiel, Germany — Germany launched the second of three cruisers on her naval building program today with this admonition from the Baltic naval commander, Vice Admiral Conrad Albrecht:

"If war should be forced on us, be you the first in attack!"

The 10,000-ton warship, mounting eight eight-inch guns, was christened Bluecher. Thus she was named both in honor of the nineteenth century Prussian military hero, Genecer Prince Gerhard Leberecht von Bluecher, and for two warship of the same name. One of these, an armored cruiser, was sunk in the battle of Jutland. Von Bluecher's timely appearance at Waterloo upset Napoleon's calculations and completed Wellington's victory.

List Profession Survey of Jews

Cincinnati, Ohio (WNS)—Dental colleges, and not as most people had imagined law schools and medical colleges, have the largest percentage of Jewish students in America, it is revealed by Dr. Lee J. Levinger, director of the B'nai Brith Hillel Foundation Research Bureau, in an article in the June issue of the B'nai Brith Magazine.

Based on an exhaustive inquiry into the status of Jewish students in more than 1,300 colleges and universities, Dr. Levinger's survey shows Jewish students constitute 26.37% of dental students, 25.11% of law students, 22.32% of pharmacy students and 16.68% of commerce students, while Jewish medical students are fifth in the list, with 16.15%.

Jewish students in other professional schools are listed as follows: 13.6% in social work; 11.2% in veterinary medicine; 6.98% in engineering; 3.05% in education; and 2.5% in agriculture.

Reich Excels in Markets of S. A.

WASHINGTON — Commerce Department officials said today this nation's exporters were encountering sharp competition from Germany in South American markets.

Trade between the United States and South America has increased annually since the low point in 1929, but authorities said competition from Germany checked the advance to some extent last year.

Last year's exports to South America increased 17 per cent over 1935 to a total of \$174,341,000. German shipments, however, increased 25 per cent, and for the first time in history Germany held first place as a supplier to Brazil and Chile.

Labor Party Leads 2 to 1 in Zionist Election

Providence Favors Labor Slightly

With nearly 75% of the estimated total of 100,000 votes cast in the nation-wide election for American delegates to the 20th World Zionist Congress already counted and returns in from most of the big cities, Ticket No. 2, representing Labor, led with 29,132 votes, an almost two to one plurality over Ticket No. 1, representing the General Zionists.

In Providence the General Zionists and the Labor group polled practically the same number of votes, the Poale Zion finishing with a 2 vote lead. The final results, as released by J. S. Rabinowitz were as follows: Poale Zion, 414; General Zionists, 412;

Hadassah, 166.

The surprise of the balloting was the failure of the General Zionists, who bear the brunt of Palestine fund-raising activities to do better than they did. Equally surprising was the comparatively small vote of Ticket No. 5, representing Hadassah, which polled 11,284.

The Mizrahi, Ticket No. 3, received 14,982 votes, while Ticket No. 4, representing the Jewish State Party, was far in the ruck with only 680 votes.

If the present proportion of votes by parties is maintained until all votes have been counted the American delegation to the Zionist Congress will be made up as follows: Labor, 35 delegates; General Zionists, 20; Mizrahi, 20; Hadassah, 14; Jewish State Party,

40th Convention Begins Saturday

Mass Meeting to Protest Partition

New York (WNS)—As delegates from 330 cities assembled in New York tomorrow night (Saturday) for the opening of the 40th anniversary convention of the Zionist Organization of America, American Jewry will hold the key to the critical political situation that has been created by the reported plans of the Royal Commission to cut Palestine in two and deal a severe blow to the future development of the country.

The keynote of the convention will be sounded by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president, in an opening address in which he is expected to summon American Jewry to united action in defense of Jewish rights in Palestine that will not merely avert any threats of partition but will inspire in Jews throughout the world new faith in the responsibility of American Jews.

Climaxing the convention will be a mass meeting on Tuesday evening at Carnegie Hall, where high government officials representing the nation, state and city will join with leading Zionist personalities in voicing opposition of America to any plan that may be proposed by the Royal Commission curbing the Jewish development of Palestine in violation of the Balfour Declaration and the League of Nations Mandate.

33% of Vienna Jews Jobless

Vienna (WNS)—One-third of Vienna's Jewish population is unemployed and living on charity, according to a report by the president of the Vinna Kehillah.

Among those on the dole during the second half of 1936 were 78 Jewish refugees from Germany.

The report also revealed that Jewish youth is rapidly being re-orientated professionally, 1,000 Jews being apprenticed to various trades while studying at industrial training schools.

A sharp drop in the number of Jewish law students is reported for the last decade, the decline being from 669 in the school year 1925-26 to 251 in the school year 1936-37.

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Censorship in Action

We have heard people advocate government censorship of newspapers "to keep them from printing things that are not true." So we are interested in an example how censorship actually operates.

In Berlin, the Nazi newspaper *Der Angriff* devoted a full page to depicting John L. Lewis as America's "Red Napoleon." A photograph of Mr. Lewis reclining in a chair was captioned, "A picture which United States papers were not allowed to print"—although it has been widely circulated in an American magazine. Another was captioned "Lewis shields his colleague, the female 'Minister of Labor' of America, Perkins, from nosy photographers"—although the woman in the picture is not Secretary Perkins, but Mr. Lewis' daughter.

Many Germans, reading *Der Angriff* will get a false impression of what is happening in America. The purpose of the Nazi censors was to give them a false impression. Uncensored newspapers have been known to print things that were not true. But far more harm is done when government, to mislead the governed, suppresses truth and compels publication of untruth. And government censorship always results in that. —World-Telegram

Futile Controversies

The fall of the Blum cabinet in France may mean a complete shift of the European political scenery within the next three months unless President Lebrun will insist on Leon Blum organizing a new government.

In any case, the struggle between liberal and Fascist elements in France will become more tense now that the government of Blum is no longer in power.

It is often very difficult to appraise the importance of contemporary news events and to measure them on the scale of world history, but one would have to be stark blind not to realize that the fate of Europe will be decided within the next six months.

The Soviet Union is in the midst of grave internal changes. The Polish government will undoubtedly be transformed before long into a new combination of Endeks and Naras, under the nominal auspices of the new National Unity Party.

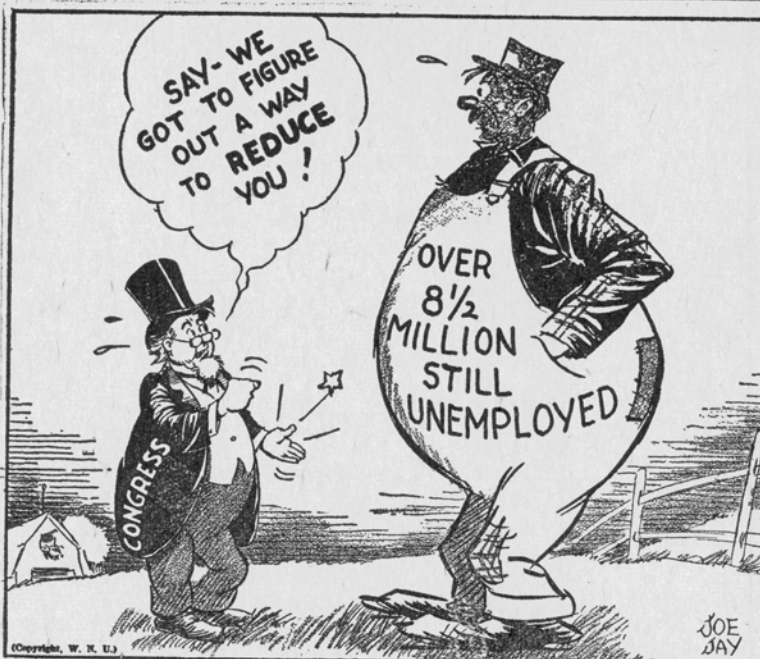
Hitler's declaration of war on the Catholic Church will necessarily have serious repercussions.

The change in foreign policy in Great Britain as well as the fall of Blum bring the European situation to a crisis more acute than ever during the last five years.

In all this scramble and diplomatic chess-playing the Jew stands a bewildered figure. His fate necessarily depends on decisions made at political conversations and conferences in which he does not participate. The political status of Palestine also hangs in the balance.

In this crisis all Jewish controversies must appear futile indeed, as futile as a manicure administered to a patient lying in the agony of death.

Expert Says Nazis Have Ended Capitalism

Process of Destruction Told
by Writer, Who Declares
Fascism Is Like Communism

Under Nazi rule Germany has long since ceased to be a capitalist country, it is contended by a writer intimately connected with German affairs in an article appearing in *Foreign Affairs*.

How the Nazis have destroyed capitalism is described by the author, whose identity has had to be concealed under a pseudonym.

"Private property long since has ceased to be more than a mere legal form which has almost completely lost its content," he writes. "The German industrialist has no more control over the means and ends of production than the German worker has over the conditions over his job, the German peasant over the products of the soil, the German tradesman and dealer over the goods he handles or their price to purchase and to sell, or the German banker over the creation and distribution of credit. All are under the complete direction and control of the State, the policy of which again is determined by the exigencies of its political and social aims in general and by the 'Second Four Year Plan' in particular.

"The basis of planned economy is complete control of exports and imports. Not one carload, not one parcel crosses the German border in either direction without special permit of the government. No German is even supposed to sell anything abroad without such a permit. Whether and when it is granted is not primarily a matter of market considerations.

"The German importer cannot buy where he gets the best quality at the lowest price; the German exporter cannot sell wherever he might find a competitive chance. An extremely elaborate system has been built up for the control of foreign exchange and it tends in Germany, as well as in Russia, to become more and more rigid.

"Since markets and prices no longer function, the government has to pass on capital investments. Construction of all kinds requires a special governmental permit. Factories for certain products cannot be erected, for these products are designated as 'unnecessary.' The same rule applies to the extension of the existing plants or the enlargement of their capacity. New construction must also be approved according to a descend-

ing scale of urgency—(1) armaments, (2) food supply, (3) domestic raw material production, (4) promotion of exports, (5) housing, if materials and labor remain."

"It is but the logical conclusion of, and unavoidably consistent with, both the philosophy and practice of National Socialism that private contracts are no longer respected by the State, that any private contract is at any time subject to modification or termination by legal or administrative action of the government. Whoever tries to arrive at a fair and well-balanced opinion of the German system must keep in mind especially this:—There is no legal limit to government or party interference in the routine life of business any more than there is a habeas corpus act for the protection of civil liberties.

What is taking place in Germany then is the creation of "war economy on a Socialist ideological foundation. National Socialism is genuine Socialism as it is genuine Nationalism." Which leads the author to conclude that:—"Capitalism is lost where it is not built on liberalism and democracy. And liberalism and democracy are lost where they fail to convince the people of the necessity of capitalism as the only available economic safeguard of political, intellectual and spiritual freedom."

"For years," he observes, "Fascist propaganda has offered Fascism as a safeguard and panacea against Communism, and Communism has exposed Fascism as its arch foe and antithesis. In fact, the world has never seen two supposedly hostile economic and social systems more alike in essentials, both of practice and ideology, than National Socialism and Communism."

World Music Center Planned in Palestine

Jerusalem (WNS)—A world center for Jewish music in Palestine has been established here with the purpose of organizing committees in every country to cultivate Jewish music.

Such world-famous composers and musicians as Darius Milhaud, Ernest Bloch, Ernst Toch and Heinrich Schalit are among the sponsors of the movement.

Schacht Warns of Trade Talk

Should Know What We Want

Paris—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, German Economics Minister and President of the Reichsbank, warned at a press conference last night against premature convocation of world economic conference.

Of the visit which Premier Paul Van Zeeland of Belgium is to make to the United States to sound out possibilities for a conference, Dr. Schacht said:—

"It seems to me to be premature for him to report favorably on calling a world economic conference now. We have first to know what we want. Only then should we call a conference—when there is a chance of success.

"All countries in the world are suffering economically. Those who are suffering the least should help the others, which suffer more.

"Our situation in Germany is not easy. But we are far from the debacle which many predict for us. I have not come to Paris to borrow money, only on an economic mission.

"I do not seek any more loans, as I now have too many to pay off. I do not want to take on another."

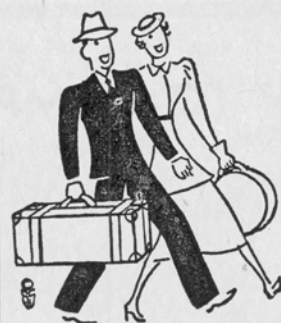

Between the Lines

On "News Not Fit to Be Read", Friendships and Popularity

By WALTER RUTMAN

"News not fit to be read", is the excuse offered by newspapers for suppressing news of the strike massacre in Chicago on Memorial Day in which nine persons were fatally wounded. Paramount News has secured the only pictures of the fearful scenes has shelved the pictures with the terse comment: "We reserve the right to suppress the films for fear of inciting riots throughout the country."

Thus, while we rave about censorship of news in other countries and point with pride to the "free" press here, incidents occurring under our very noses are smothered because newspapers are apprehensive of public opinion.

A private showing of the film was given before members of the LaFollete Civil Liberties Committee. They were shocked and amazed by scenes showing scores of uniformed policemen firing their revolvers point blank into a dense crowd of men, women and children who were participating in a steel strike demonstration near the Republic Steel Company plant in South Chicago.

They further saw the policemen pursuing and clubbing the survivors unmercifully as they made frantic attempts to escape. The impression produced by these scenes was heightened by the sound record which accompanied the picture, reproducing the roar of police fire and the screams of the victim.

As an ironic climax Paramount released the films for audience in England whom we blasted a short while back for withholding and coloring news of the King Edward-Simpson affair. The London News Chronicle, as other English papers commented vigorously on the affair. "What one does see from a film previously mutilated, are heaps of injured lying on the ground, truncheons whirling like windmills gone mad, rising and falling, smiting a fleeing crowd, smashing down on isolated resisters, beating senselessly at men and women already prone."

Many of the American newspaper which carried partial stories of the "disturbance" differed considerably in their interpretation as compared with the visible recording by the Paramount camera-men. Credit must be given to the St. Louis Post Dispatch for making available the only description of the "Memorial Day Massacre" in South Chicago.

Nazis at Fair in Uproar As Aryan Weds Jew

Paris (WNS)—What happens to supposedly good Aryans when they are permitted to escape, even for a few weeks, from the network of Nazi prohibitions against doing this or that was brought home to the Nazi powers—that-be when the telephone service at the German Pavilion in the Paris Exposition was temporarily thrown

out of gear because the switch-board operator, a pureblooded Aryan girl, fell in love with a Swiss Jew.

The girl in the case, Fraulein Hertha Rost, was fired by Herr Ruppel, pavilion manager, because she married Hans Bopp, a Swiss Jew, whom she had met since the fair opened.

Mrs. Bopp was given a ticket back to Germany but refused to go, first because she intends to make her home in Zurich and second, because her marriage to Bopp makes her liable to imprisonment in Germany as a violator of the Nuremberg laws.

Blind to "See" Through Sound

Vienna (WNS) — Experiments which are expected to make it possible for the blind to utilize the sense of hearing as an auxiliary sense even more than the sense of touch are being conducted at the Jewish Asylum for Blind Children by Dr. Friedrich Mansfield, a Jewish physician who has been sightless since he was eight years old.

Dr. Mansfield has perfected a new theory which claims that a sense of calculating distance and the nature of materials by sound can be developed easily in blind adults and still more easily in children born blind.

Colonists Get Factory Funds

Commitment made for Output Sale

Hightstown, N. J. (WNS)—From private sources and consumer cooperatives in the East and Midwest the Jewish needle trade colonists at Jersey Homesteads, the industrial-agricultural model community built by the Federal Resettlement Administration, have obtained \$50,000 needed to operate their clothing factory for next season.

Spokesmen for the colonists claimed that operation of the factory had been delayed because the Resettlement Administration had refused to lend the colonists \$50,000, as it had promised. This has been denied by the R.A.

Benjamin Brown, executive secretary of the colony said that counting on the R.A. promise to have all of the settlement's 200 houses ready by September 1936 they had made commitments in connection with the development of the factory and for the sale of its output.

When these promises were not kept the colony found itself in financial difficulties and needed \$50,000.

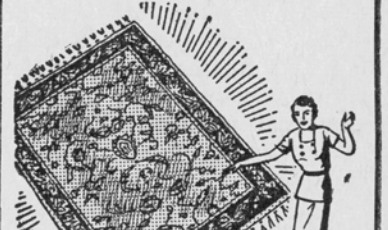
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At the Theatres
