

48 U. S. Publishers Snub Nazi Book Fair

Cite Censorship of Science and Arts

New York — Leading book publishers of the United States will take no part in the International Congress of Book Publishers to be held this year in Leipzig, "because in Germany the book trade is gagged, as is the newspaper press."

Another reason is that Propaganda Minister Paul Goebels has been made honorary sponsor for the congress for the declared purpose of showing the visitors advances made under Hitler

Called Puppets

"No German publisher will dare at Leipzig to express opinions other than those dictated by the National Socialist officials who rule the publishers," says a declaration signed by forty-eight outstanding publishers of this country.

"It will be a display of ventriloquism; the publishing trade will be the puppet, but the voice will be the voice of German bureaucracy.

"Participation in a meeting in Germany, with all the implications of such co-operation, would be a contradiction of the very essence of our function as publishers."

Claudette Colbert Spurns Nazi Wreath

New York.—Claudette Colbert, noted screen actress, refused to be photographed with a floral wreath presented to her before sailing for Europe on an Italian ship until a swastika flag attached to the wreath was removed. When Miss Colbert was given the wreath she noticed that it was decorated with many flags, among them the swastika. When the photographers tried to get her to pose with the floral decoration she angrily refused until the swastika was removed. In private life Miss Colbert is the wife of Dr. Joel Pressman, noted Jewish physician.

Jewish Problem Held That of All Mankind

Committee Report Points to World

New York.—The world crisis facing Jews today is "part of the crisis confronting all mankind," declared the executive committee of the American Jewish Congress.

"It has been increasingly clear," the report stated, "that the problems of Jews, never wholly absent from the world scene, have, during the last year, been thrust into a more conspicuous place, and that those problems cannot intelligently be dealt with except against the background of international developments.

"The Nazi German government has, since 1933, taken the lead in tearing up treaties, in undermining the independence of other states, in starting a worldwide armaments race, and in making war and conquest the supreme goals of national policy."

Praha — The Leipzig Criminal Court today sentenced a Catholic of mixed "Aryan" and Jewish ancestry to four months' imprisonment for hiding his part-Jewish origin when applying for a job, it was reported here.

Palestine Artists to Present Recital at Plantations Club

Brachah Zfirah and Nahum Nardi, who will be presented in a song recital of Palestinian and Oriental folk lore on Wednesday evening, February 2, at the Plantations Auditorium, bring to Providence Jewry a new high in Palestine musical art.

Educated in Palestine, Brachah was graduated in 1925 from a school at Meier Shfeyeh, maintained by Junior Hadassah. Ambitious to go further, she went to Berlin in 1927 and studied with Max Reinhardt.

In Berlin she met a Palestinian from a different world, a Russian born artist with a fine Western training in piano and musical composition. Nahum Nardi had come to Palestine after the World War and immersed himself in studying the remnants of Oriental Hebrew music, and in the idea of writing genuine Palestine music, which would be modern, yet Oriental. Since 1927, as husband and wife, they have worked together with increasing success.

Zfirah and Nardi will tour jointly with the international artist, Michel Gibson, formerly of the Maurice Schwartz Art Theatre. Gibson will complete the program

Asks Safeguarding Of Minority Rights

Charge Persecution By Goga Regime

GENEVA—The World Jewish Congress circulated a 100-page petition among members of the League Council urging the League to act in behalf of 758,000 Jews threatened by the anti-Semitic program of the new government of Rumania.

The petition attacked the government of Premier Octavian Goga and charged it with having violated the 1919 minority treaty guaranteeing liberty and justice for all.

The petition contained photographs reproducing "offensive pictures published in the Rumanian governmental press" and testimony of ill treatment of Jews derived from Jewish, English, French and German sources.

The document also charged that the Rumanian government put into practice anti-Semitic doctrines designed to remove Jews entirely from Rumanian life.

Refugees to Run Trains in Palestine

Jerusalem — American students who may travel on Palestine railways next year will not lack intellectual conversation, if they chat with conductors, baggage masters, clerks or even members of the crew.

The railways will run, according to authoritative advices from Jerusalem, via Paris, by refugee German A. B.'s A. M.'s and Ph. D.'s, who have just finished courses in railroading under the auspices of the French Government and have been accepted by the British authorities of the mandate with the approval of the local Jewish organizations.

Bluebeard "Victim" Found Safe in U. S.

Paris.—Authorities announced that Michael Stein, sixty-nine, whose name had been found in a notebook belonging to Eugene George Weidmann, confessed Bluebeard killer, had been found in Baltimore.

For a time the police had considered the possibility that Stein had been another victim of Weidmann, who has confessed he killed Jean de Koven, Brooklyn dancer, and half a dozen others.

A court commission will be sent to Baltimore to question Stein.

Attempts Suicide to Avoid Deportation

Hewlett, L. I. (WNS) — Faced with deportation to Germany where he may be shot because of his confessed anti-Nazi activities in the German navy, Hans Goepel, 28-year-old son of a German mother, made an ineffectual attempt at suicide in his room at an inn here where he is employed as a waiter.

J D C 1938 Quota 5 Million; Rabbi J. Wise Is Chairman

St. Louis—With a national fund raising quota of \$5,100,000 in 1938 for the relief and reconstruction of Jewish populations overseas, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise of New York was elected National Campaign chairman, heading the campaign in the United States and Canada of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Dr. Bernhard Kahn, the European director of the Joint Distributing Committee here on a brief visit from the European office in Paris, stated that a major crisis had arisen in the lives and fates of 5,000,000 Jews overseas. American aid, he said, represented the primary hope of these millions of human beings and they looked chiefly to the American Joint Distribution Committee for aid.

"Persecution and proscription are making their existence all but impossible in many regions at a time when it is difficult, if not impossible, to find havens where most of them can flee to," said Dr. Kahn.

Roumania Turns Fire On Jewish Doctors

Vienna.—News agency dispatches from Bucharest reported that Minister of Labor George Cuza in a decree ordered the immediate replacement of Jewish "panel" physicians with non-Jewish Rumanians.

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
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Will They Backslide Again?

Because of Roumania's threat to renounce the Paris minorities treaty which she signed in 1919 if the League of Nations Councils undertakes any inquiry into Roumania's anti-Jewish program, it is believed that the Council will pigeon-hole the World Congress' petition which is up for consideration this week.

This threat, coupled with Goga's intention of conducting a general election along strictly fascist lines, which can only result in an overwhelming vote of confidence in Goga's policies, can only strengthen the web of tolerance the spider-eyed Premier has spun for his newly acquired enemies.

The League has nothing to gain by their pussy-footing. Whether they draw the sheets over their heads or loudly proclaim Goga's treachery in ignoring treaty rights, the result to Roumania's Jews remains the same.

It is time the League stiffened its backbone and by denouncing Goga regain some of the respect they have lost in recent years.

Alter Boyman Talks Before Poale Zion

At a meeting of the Poale Zion, held last Sunday at 385 Westminster street, Alter Boyman told its members that the present anti-Semitic drive in Roumania is even more tragic than the German execution of Jews, because the gates of Palestine are now virtually closed to immigrants, and there appears to be no avenue of escape for Roumanian Jewry.

Mr. Boyman pointed out that thousands of German Jews had found a haven in Palestine since Hitler's advent to power, but that there were no such opportunity offered to Roumanian Jews. He said that Jewish leaders the world over were demanding that the English Government lift the ban on immigration to Palestine, so as to enable Roumanian Jews, forced by the present government to leave the country, to settle in the Holy Land.

Hits at Discrimination By Jewish Employers

Believe Boycott May Modify Policy

Pittsburgh—Rabbi J. X. Cohen of New York City left an admonition with the American Jewish Congress to become "militant or perish."

He charged in an address before the congress that discrimination against the Jew in New York City "is rampant" and declared that help wanted columns there should read "gentile help wanted" because "hundreds of advertisements specify 'Christian' or 'Anglo-Saxon'."

"I wonder how many of you," Rabbi Cohen said, "are asking yourselves whether Jewish employers are joining in this discrimination, and I must answer yes many Jewish employers are discriminating against their own people."

"When we have prepared a case against these Jewish employers that cannot be attacked as libelous, we will go before them and ask them to modify their policy. If they say no, God have pity on them."

"I don't care how high their position is. How great their

wealth, how broad their philanthropies, we will crush them forever from the face of Jewish life."

Wants a Square Deal

"We do not ask any employer, Gentile or Jew, to give a Jew a job. We ask them only to give the Jew a square deal, to give him justice."

The speaker said the congress is investigating "hundreds of corporations" and warned that Jews of America may be forced to boycott those corporations which bar Jews from jobs.

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Ickes Tells U P A of Peril in Power Concentration

Conference Seeks \$4,500,000 Fund

Washington — Secretary of Interior Ickes told the WPA conference her that only despair causes men to yield "their liberty and their democracy to a dictatorship of the Right or Left in exchange for the illusion of living."

The national conference of the United Palestine Appeal, seeking \$4,500,000 this year to provide homes in Palestine for Jews excluded from Rumania, Poland and

*Germany, heard the Cabinet officer declare:

"Subtle pressures may be exerted on you as on other minority groups to array yourselves not with, but against, those battling to preserve democracy."

"Never forget that the foes of democracy in other lands were financed by economic groups that professedly were only attempting to protect their property from political incompetence."

Ickes said danger to democracy lay in a growing concentration of economic power over other peo-

ple's wealth, labor and lives, but that political power of the people did not surrender to economic power where the ownership of property was sufficiently spread among the people.

The conference expressed hope that Great Britain would continue to co-operate in establishing a Jewish national home in Palestine "on a basis essential to meet the needs of great masses of Jews."
