



Mass Meeting Sun. to Urge Open Door Policy in Palestine to Jewish Refugees



Bishop Bennett, Governor Quinn and Rep. Aimee J. Forand (from left to right) have been invited to speak at the State-wide mass meeting, to be held on Sunday afternoon at the Biltmore Hotel, to urge Great Britain to keep the doors of Palestine open to Jewish refugees.

Asserting that Great Britain must be given unmistakable evidence of the profound concern not merely of all Jews in the United States but many enlightened Christian clergymen and lay leaders who recognize that the closing of the doors of Palestine to Jewish refugees at this time would not only be a cruel blow to the victims of oppression but another capitulation to force and violence, the Emergency Committee on Palestine, of Rhode Island representing all Jewish organizations in the State, has set aside Sunday afternoon, 2:30 o'clock for a mass meeting at the Biltmore Hotel.

Members of the Christian clergy and high ranking Christian officials of the State will join in the appeal. Guests invited to speak include Bishop Granville Gaylord Bennett, Gov. Robert E. Quinn, Sen. Theodore F. Green, Sen. Peter G. Gerry, Rep. Aimee J. Forand, Bishop Francis P. Keough, Joseph Gainor, Mayor James E. Dunne, and William Conolly, president of the R. I. Federation of Labor.

Maurice W. Hendel, a leader of the Providence Zionist District, which is cooperating in the meeting, said today that a spirit of brotherhood and tolerance will be emphasized by the fact that only Christians will speak at the mass meeting.

"Although it is a Jewish meeting, the speakers will be Christians, who are anxious to see the Jews have a fair chance to establish their national homeland," he said.

Community Fund Asks Increased Contribution

Kuhn Swears Denial To Metcalf Charges Statement Mailed To U. S. Leaders

NEW YORK.—President Roosevelt, members of the United States Supreme Court, many Congressmen and other officials this week received a protest from Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German-American Bund, which denies charges made against the Bund before the Dies committee.

The notarized statement denies the testimony before the committee by John C. Metcalfe that it had political and financial ties with Germany, that it was subsidized by the Nazi government, that it planned measures against American institutions and that it was connected with the German espionage ring.

Mr. Kuhn labeled the charges "a fantastic nightmare of one Samuel Dickstein" (Representative Dickstein). He called Mr. Metcalfe, who joined the Bund for a short time and then reported on its activities, "a reporter for a sensational yellow tabloid sheet." Mr. Kuhn said Mr. Metcalfe had only a two-minute talk with him and never was conversant with the Bund policies or plans.

Hebrew U- Refuses Italy's \$2000 Grant

JERUSALEM.—The Hebrew University will not accept this year the Italian Government's annual \$2,000 grant in view of anti-Jewish legislation in Italy, President Judah L. Magnes notified the Italian consulate this week.

The decision was made by the university's Board of Governors at its recent London meeting, Dr. Magnes said. He added that teaching of Italian literature would continue.

Need Larger Sum to Meet Added Services of Agencies

In a special plea issued to the Jewish community this week, Jacob S. Temkin chairman of the Special Prospect B Division urged liberal contributions to the Providence Community Fund to help the Fund reach its quota of \$688,393.

The Special Prospect B Division is responsible for more than 700 prospects. All cards were distributed at a rally held Thursday evening, October 13 at the Biltmore Hotel.

Curtis Brooks general chairman of the Campaign explained in detail the reason for a larger quota this year than a year ago. Mr. Brooks said that there will be many persons in the community who will require additional services from Fund agencies and if this extra service is to be given the Fund must have more money.

The workers in Special Prospect B Division held luncheon meetings at Weinstein's Restaurant this week and will continue their efforts until the campaign closes November 1.

In the 40 agencies that are included in the Fund budget, there are five important Jewish agencies that will benefit from Fund

contributions. The agencies are Jewish Community Center, Jewish Family Welfare Society, Jewish Orphanage of R. I. Miriam Hospital, and the Jewish Federation. (Continued on page 6)

Nazis Employ Slave Tactics of Old Egypt

PRAHA.—It is reported from Berlin that Jews ousted from jobs are now forced to work in public projects without payment, except for the destitute, who receive a small sum, insufficient to buy enough food. Jewish circles here called to enforced work a form of slavery and compared the situation of the Jews to that of the Biblical Hebrews in Egypt.

Jews are being forced to do demolition work and to clear areas for new buildings. Eight hundred are employed for demolition in the former municipal gas works in the Berlin district of Schmargendorf and others to prepare Nazi sport grounds and to lay out parks in Greifwalderstrasse in north Berlin.

Cops Vexed - Ordered to Avoid "Nazi" Traffic Salute

NEW YORK.—Traffic police are facing a vexing problem as a result of a letter written to Commissioner Valentine by a citizen who contends that when a cop holds up his hand to halt traffic he is giving the Nazi salute.

According to report, Commissioner Valentine has issued secret orders to commanders of traffic squads, suggesting that the cops find a new signal.

The cops are perplexed. The handraising signal has become a

Refugees in England Give Jobs to Britains

LONDON.—Some 25,000 Englishmen have been employed by refugees who have made their home in England, it was pointed out here by Sir John Hope Simpson in a lecture before the Liberal Summer School at Oxford. Sir John, who is director of the Refugee Survey of the Royal Institute of International Affairs, declared the figure exceeded the number of refugees. He praised Jewish organizations for their assistance to the refugees and urged the British Government to withdraw the regulation obliging refugees to sign declarations that they would not take work, whether paid or otherwise, after admission to the country.

Reich Jews Holding U. S. Visas are Safe

BERLIN.—German Jews already in possession of the American immigration visas will not be affected by the new Nazi order invalidating all passports held by Jews of October 7th. United States Consul General Raymond H. Geist was assured by the Gestapo. He was told that Jews holding such visas would have their passports revalidated by stamping them with large red letter "J" for Jew, about an inch and a half high on the first page of the passport.

It is understood that all Jewish passports will be so marked in order to identify Jews as such wherever they go.

Children's Home To Derive Benefit

Hedera is one of the oldest Jewish colonies in Palestine and one of the most important centers of Jewish workers, where hundreds of wage earners live and work in orange groves. The work is seasonal and the wages are inadequate for the support of the family, making it necessary for the mother to add her contribution by working. Thus, the problem of greatest importance to her is where to leave her children. The Pioneer Women, therefore, have answered the call by planning the building of a nursery and kindergarten, for which funds are now being raised.


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Plan Program For Night of Stars

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
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Jews Form Federation to Combat Communism To Counteract Subversive Influences Among Colleges

New York—Formation of the American Jewish Federation to combat Communism and Fascism, Inc., with headquarters at 170 Broadway was announced today by Milton Solomon, former City deputy controller. Its chief aim is "to counteract Communist and Fascist influences among the Jewish youth of the nation in schools, colleges and other educational institutions." It seeks a million members of both sexes within six months.

A False Impression

"Communism," they said, "has infected a small percentage of Jewish citizens. Because of the vociferousness of this minor element an impression has been created that a much larger proportion of American Jews has been impregnated with the Communist poison and that Jews are largely in the forefront of Communist propaganda and activities."

"This," they added, "is an entirely false impression, fanned in to prejudice by anti-Semites and Fascist Jew-baiters among us, that is doing incalculable harm to the Jewish people in America, of whom 99 per cent are loyal Americans, as much opposed to Communism as to Fascism."

The Primary Aim

The Federation is described as "the first strictly Jewish undertaking in the United States having as its aim the destruction of the Communist virus." It is to be non-profit making, according to Solomon.

Brown Favored in R. I. State Game

Brown rules the favorite over Rhode Island State College as the intra-state rivals meet this Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, in the 27th game of a 29 year old series that dates back to 1909. Brown has won 25 games and Rhode Island has won one, but Brown holds only a 27-25 margin in points in the last three games.

Rhode Island, victorious in three of four starts, boasts in Louis "Duke" Abruzzi, celebrated sophomore, the fourth highest scorer in the East, and one of the land's trickiest ball carriers. Abruzzi ran wild to give the Brown freshmen their first defeat in late season a year ago, and he has been a sensation in every Ram game this season. Working as the spear-head of the attack from the celebrated spread formations that Coach Frank Keaney has installed, Abruzzi is a dangerous man on every play.

Swastika Carved on Arm of Jewish Boy

Judge Lectures, Warns Offenders

IRVINGTON, N. J. — A 9-year-old Jewish boy bears on his forearm a crudely shaped double swastika, carved into the flesh with a penknife by two older youths who, in the words of a police judge, imitated in a land of liberty the hatreds of an Old World.

Judge Thomas J. Holleran took the Jewish lad and his tormentors, a 14-year-old of German descent and a 17-year-old of Italian descent, into his chambers.

There he lectured the older youths last night on Americanism, and told them that the American flag was a symbol of liberty and decency, while the swastika was symbolic of "bestiality and bullying."

As he cautioned them against carrying over into this country Old World hatreds by "bullying smaller boys contrary to good sportmanship," the offenders wept.

Then the Judge turned to the parents of the youths—against whom no formal charges were made—and lectured them.

The father of the Jewish boy, a federal employee attached to the Internal Revenue Department, told the court his son came home crying Tuesday and told how two boys seized and branded him.

British Strengthen Forces in Palestine

JERUSALEM. — Three British ships conveying respectively 300 cavalymen from England, two regiments from India and a large quantity of ammunition from England arrived in Haifa harbor this week to aid the British forces already in Palestine in a new determined drive to stamp out terrorism.



He will administer the Government until Sir Harold MacMichael who flew to London on October 5 to confer with Col. Sec. Malcolm Mac Donald and other British officials on the Palestine situation, returns today.

Vienna Allows Only 430 Jewish Doctors and Dentists

VIENNA. — Only 300 Jewish physicians and 100 dentists are allowed to practice in Vienna since October 1st when the decree purging the medical and dental professions of non-Aryans went into force. Publication of regulations for enforcing the decree reveal that in small towns and rural areas no Jewish doctors or dentists will be permitted to practice although a small number be allowed to practice in Linz and Graz, which have substantial Jewish populations. Although the list of Jewish physicians and dentists is believed adequate for the protection of the health of the Jewish population, they are not expected to be able to earn a living in view of the impoverishment of the Jewish community and the fact that they must limit their patients to full-blooded and part Jews. Only in emergencies may Jewish doctors treat Aryans and vice versa. By classifications

the 330 Jewish doctors are divided as follows: 150 general practitioners; 100 specialists; 56 for the Rothschild Hospital, Vienna's only Jewish hospital; 6 for the Old People's Home; 5 for Jewish schools; and 5 for problems relating to child welfare.

Community Fund

This year member agencies of the Providence-Cranston Community Fund have again joined hands in order to relieve contributors from the annoyance of numberless appeals, and in order to win the united community support for the vital and important activities of the Fund.

The agencies of the Providence-Cranston Fund are serving constantly, yet they ask for public cooperation and support but once a year, during the period of the annual Community Campaign. This is the time to show a personal interest in the welfare of the neglected, the weak, the forlorn, the children and the aged in need.

The budgets of these various agencies are not simply arbitrary figures, set down by chance. They represent the most painstaking accounting and planning on the part of the officers directly in charge. Before being placed before the contributing public, these budgets are scrutinized in detail by the businessmen in the Community Fund, who are giving their time so willingly and generously to administration and distribution of the Fund.

The campaign, this year, is carried under special difficulties, chiefly because of the recent hurricane and flood. This necessitates at least a 22% increase in each individual gift this year, in order to meet the added burdens thrown upon the shoulders of the Community agencies. This comes, as a challenge which we must acknowledge, and which with determination and sacrifice, we must accept.

The Fund is a great and worthy work. It appeals to all who care for their fellow men, who see disaster and want to lend a hand. Each person rich or poor—who has compassion for his neighbor in need—will surely do his part.

England's Dilemma

While the British government has assured the world that no decision concerning Palestine will be made until the report of the Woodhead Commission is public, furor caused by world Jewry's protests of the possibility of the repudiation of the Balfour Declaration, leaves no doubt that any solution which would condemn the Jewish people to a minority status in Palestine will be refused.

The problem Britain faces is deeper than the Arab-Jewish disagreement. In spite of the very obvious desire for peace, trouble is dogging her every step. The advent of Italian propaganda over the radio since 1935 has given the Arab leaders new hope and encouragement. Italian espionage in the near East is supremely clever, and aided by willing Nazi agencies, it has caused Great Britain embarrassment with the Moslem people.

The Munich Peace Pact has made the Fascists bolder. In turn the Arabs, sensing that England's back has been bent, have assumed a stronger attitude in their relations with the government and with the Jews in Palestine. Thus, aided by Fascist arms, money and propaganda, the Arabs are striking at England "life line."

This places Great Britain between the devil and the sea, and it is feared, and rightly so, that England might throw the Balfour Declaration overboard in an effort to save the ship. Once more the Jew becomes a scapegoat.

Bund Has New Name; Will Try to Absorb Older Groups

UNION CITY, N. J. — Leaders of the German Nazi movement in New Jersey were engaged this week in a new effort, under a new name, to capture control of the German-American organizations of the country.

The officers of the New Jersey division of the German-American Bund have incorporated the German-American Front which is, like the Bund, pro-Nazi and anti-Semitic.

The leaders of the Front, it was learned, expect to make it a nation-wide organization which will

will be directed by the present officers of the Bund. Under their new guise, the Nazis will attempt to do what the Bund was unable to do—absorb the long-established and democratic organizations of German-Americans.

Second Change in Name

This is the second time the German Nazi movement in the United States has changed its name.

Plans for the Front were discussed by Fritz Kuhn, national Bund leader, and heads of the New Jersey Bund at the meeting here two weeks ago when Kuhn

Charges U. S. With Aiding Reich Trading

HOUSTON, Texas — The United States Treasury Department is illegally facilitating German imports of war materials from the United States by failing to impose tariff law penalties on subsidized German goods exported to this country, Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, charged in an address before the Federation's annual convention.

Woll demanded that Secretary Morgenthau "put an end to this unwarrantable, unjustified and unholy alliance between free and democratic America and the Nazi regime with its enslaved workers and its persecuted minority races."

NEW YORK. — Sholem Asch is here to stay this time.

The Poland-born Yiddish writer, convinced that America has taken the place of pre-Hitler Germany as the center of world literature and dissatisfied with affairs in Europe generally, announced today that he is going to make America his permanent home.

Asch, tall, solemn, gray-haired, is the author of "Salvation," "The War Goes On" and "Three Cities." Maurice Schwartz's dramatization of "Three Cities" opened last Monday night at the Yiddish Art Theatre.

Now fifty-eight, Asch first visited America in 1910. In 1914 he returned and became a naturalized American citizen. In 1925 he left for the south of France, declaring that the cost of living was too high here and that the terrific tempo of New York life hurt "the creative impulse."

"I once felt," he said today, "that I could no longer live here and write, but I was wrong. It is the American artist's duty to experience the full pressure of life today and from it to create something American. I shall write of American-Jewish life."



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

Mrs. Arthur Anker, speaking for the family, said, "It is possible that Hitler will take over Danzig within three months." According to Mrs. Anker, their holdings in the grain business and real estate in Danzig amounted to more than \$1,000,000 but they sold out for a little more than half value.



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


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
