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Russia Nationalistic, Says Eugene Lyons Jew-Hatred on Increase There

Eugene Lyons, author, lecturer and foreign correspondent, pinching for Joseph Kennedy, last Tuesday evening at a meeting of the Temple Beth El Men's Club, delivered an intelligent, absorbing lecture on Russia and its post revolutionary effects.

Citing recent happenings in Europe, as proof of the "moral collapse of the world," Mr. Lyons traced the cause and effect of the present march of Nationalism in Russia. "Liberal thought and activity are being replaced by a strong nationalistic feeling and coloration in present day Russian literature and arts," said Mr. Lyons.

"Anti-Semitism, while officially condemned and punished by the state, is steadily increasing. It is part of the chain of Nationalistic tendencies, in which the Jew is the weak link," Mr. Lyons further asserted. "The pretense of economic equality in Russia has been dropped, and individual initiative is being fostered. But the Russian worker, with ability is torn between the desire to bet-

Italians Protest Anti Jewish Policy

HARTFORD. — A committee representing numerous Italian societies drafted a resolution this week to be sent to Premier Mussolini protesting his anti-Jewish policy.

More than 400 prominent Italians attended a meeting here Sunday.

Former Alderman Rocco Pallotti, who presided, said Premier Mussolini's anti-Jewish campaign "is a policy which has been forced upon the people of Italy. It is one that they have been forced to accept. I cannot and will not believe that they are in sympathy with it."

Jews Starve in Trenches Of Sudeten No Man's Land

PRAGUE. — The war Ministry, acting with the Czechoslovak Red Cross, this week ordered immediate relief sent to three groups of Jewish refugees living in the fields near Breclav.

The 204 refugees, Czechs said, were forced to leave their homes more than ten days ago when the German army took over Breclav, now the German city of Lundenberg. Since then they have been without shelter in a no-man's land between German and Czech

territory.

The refugees several days ago telegraphed the American Legation in Prague, asking intervention.

The legation submitted the problem to the Prague government, but official action was delayed until the arrival here last night of a woman Red Cross representative who presented a first-hand account of the situation.

She said the refugees were suffering pitifully and that German troops had forbidden food trucks to go to their encampments.

"The persecution came," she reported, "when the Germans found out that a 6-month-old baby had been 'smuggled' from the camp into Lundenberg."

"The German officers said that if one person was 'smuggled' this way, others might also find a way to enter Germany. In revenge, the Germans cut off all supplies, and the people, living in ditches along the roadside, have been deprived of all food except what they could gather from the surrounding area."

20,000 Are Exempt From Italian Decrees

ROME. — About 4,000 Jewish families or 20,000 persons will benefit by exemptions from anti-Semitic decrees granted by the Fascist Grand Council for war service or service to the Fascist cause, it was understood this week.

All anti-Semitic discriminations, except segregation in schools, will not apply to these Jews, who otherwise will enjoy almost the same rights as Italians.

Italian political circles declared that the anti-Jewish measures decreed by the Fascist Council were not as drastic as Germany's. The Council, it was asserted, even went so far as to state that intentional Jewry had not adopted an attitude of revenge.

Social Credit Head Turns Anti-Semitic

LONDON. — Major C. H. Douglas, chairman of the Social Credit Secretariat, Ltd., and chief exponent of the Social Credit theory, this week joined the anti-Semitic front, he revealed in an article on the Jews in "Social Credit," organ of his movement.

Declaring that "the very last thing which I would desire, or as an individual countenance, would be the association of the Social Credit movement with Jew-baiting," Douglas asserts that

Mexico Reverses Opinion on Refugees

MEXICO CITY. — In a sudden reversal of its previously expressed readiness to do everything possible to absorb political refugees from Europe, the Mexican government announced that it would not admit refugees under tourist visas. The announcement was coupled with an order for the deportation of 200 Jewish refugees from Austria who entered the country as tourists. At the same time the interior department revealed that Mexican consuls abroad have been instructed not to visa tourist passports unless transportation companies or travel agencies guarantee the tourist's return to his country. The government's about-face with regard to refugees is believed to be due to a violent

Continued from page 1) delegates, and Dr. Ilie Berger as alternate. These representatives will be called upon to make decisions not only to safeguard the existence of Jews abroad, but also to meet the problems of the developing Anti-Semitism in the United States.

The delegates who assemble in New York are faced with the knowledge that minority rights under which the freedom and equality of Jews were guaranteed in Eastern and Central Europe, have been abrogated and that the rights of the Jews in Palestine, guaranteed by the Balfour Declaration are seriously threatened. For the first time, too, a Conference of American Jews will have to consider a program to meet important Jewish problems in the United States, created by the penetration of Nazi propaganda and reflected in a developing discrimination against Jews in employment and other fields.

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Czechs May Go Anti-Jewish

Tie With Germany To Alter Policies

No Concern Now About Refugees

PRAGUE. — Predictions in the Czech press that the government of Premier Jan Syrový will shortly alter Czechoslovakia's traditionally tolerant attitude toward the Jews and adopt measures to de-naturalize all Jews who entered Czechoslovakia since 1918 have created something approaching a panic in Jewish quarters. In the event that such a policy is adopted, thousands of Polish and Rumanian Jews who were naturalized after 1918 will become stateless.

Reports of an anti-Jewish attitude by the newly-established autonomous government of Slovakia and the news that Germany has demanded the return of all German refugees from the Sudetenland, including anti-Nazis, have added to the growing anxiety among Jews.

The Prague government is showing itself to be unconcerned regarding the fate of the Sudetenland refugees. Its attitude is that since England and France robbed the Czechs of the ability to resist Germany's demands, it is up to them to find a haven for the refugees. At the same time the Syrový government is none too anxious to admit the refugees to what remains of Czechoslovakia.

Immigrants Banned Without Permits

MELBOURNE. — Promising to give sympathetic consideration to immigrants to Australia already on ships for this country, the Australian ministry of interior admitted 27 Jews who had arrived in Sydney on tourist visas and had at first been refused permission to land. The ministry, however, made it plain that future immigrants seeking to land tourist visas will be turned back.

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SEN. WM. E. BORAH

WASHINGTON. — Senator Borah said this week that protests against possible British action to close Palestine to Jewish immigrants might involve the United States in "a delicate and dangerous situation."

In a letter to rabbi Stephen S. Wise, of New York, Mr. Borah expressed belief that this country would have to be prepared to assume obligations of a mandatory power if it advised Great Britain what to do in Palestine.

He declined an invitation from Rabbi Wise to speak in New York November 2 at a mass meeting called to protest against any cessation of Jewish immigration.

Brown and Tufts Meet Tomorrow

Brown will rule a heavy favorite tomorrow at 2 o'clock when Tufts invades Brown Field to renew one of the more ancient rivalries on the New England books. The two teams first met 49 years ago in 1889, and this game will be the 22nd on the list.

Following an analysis made of pledges, Curtis B. Brooks, chairman of the Providence-Cranston Community Fund campaign, this week made a special appeal to all contributors that larger donations are needed to meet requirements.

"When we first set our goal of \$688,398," said Mr. Brooks, "we announced that a 22 per cent increase was needed from everyone able to give to make up for pledge losses caused by unemployment or the disaster, and to provide for increased needs." A thorough analysis of this year's contributions compared with last year's shows that the pledges have been approximately the same, making it absolutely necessary that the campaign continue to appeal for the 22 per cent increase. "No one group of individuals can carry the whole burden of our increased goal," Mr. Brooks said. "Each and every individual in the community is asked to assume a proportionate share."

At the meeting of the campaign workers, held last Wednesday at the Biltmore Hotel, Archibald Silverman was the principal speaker. Mr. Silverman urged the workers not to be satisfied with any contributions offered them and always try to get a bigger gift because they were working for a great and worthwhile cause. "I don't know of a thing that makes a person any happier than doing something for somebody else," Mr. Silverman declared. "What you give out, you get back in life."

A special attempt is being made this year to reach everyone in the community. Street directories have been distributed to workers and they have been urged to call at every home. Those who have not been solicited in previous years, or who have not felt able to give, are urged to do whatever they can to meet the emergency needs. The campaign will be closed on Monday November 1.

Nazi Justice

Hitler assured the world after the Munich Pact was signed that the rights of the Czechoslovakian citizens would be respected. According to a dispatch from Prague, it was learned that Hitler now demands that all citizens opposed to Nazi ideology must be punished or placed in camps, where they cannot confuse or obstruct the Nazification of the Czechs.

This recalls a recent note which announced that Johann Langer, former judge who headed the Tribunal, which passed several death sentences on Nazis, after the unsuccessful "Putsch" of 1934, in which Chancellor Dolfuss was assassinated, has committed suicide in the Dachau concentration camp. These death announcements, many of which will now emanate from Prague, are Hitler's convenient way of saying that his enemies have been liquidated, and aptly illustrate Nazi justice and mercy.

The Cynical Touch

The kite flown by Signor Mussolini in the proposed offer of territory in Abyssinia for Jewish settlement is likely to come to ground with a bump. It has been aptly described by the Spectator as "the final touch of cynicism."

How any ruler with the faintest sense of realism can first revile a people and then ask from them the service and sacrifice that his own people flatly refuse passes understanding. If the Italian dictator imagines that Jews have sunk so far, that in return for the humiliations he has heaped upon them they will flock to help him in his scheme to despoil the lawful owners of the country he has not yet even subjugated, we imagine he will soon be disillusioned.

The answer has in one sense already been given to Signor Mussolini. It has been given by Monsieur Henri Bernstein, the famous French playwright, in returning the distinguished honours conferred upon him by the Fascist dictator. It has been given by Signor Pinto of Alexandria in tearing up his will bequeathing his great fortune to Italian charities. "Neither thy honey nor thy sting" runs the Hebrew saying, and that in effect is what the Jews are saying to Signor Mussolini.

Arabs to Continue Arson Sabotage Despite "Truce"

LONDON. — The News Chronicle's Jerusalem correspondent reported this week that Abdul Rahem, commander-in-chief of Arab rebels in Palestine, had ordered his men to cease shooting at British troops and policemen temporarily, but to continue a campaign of arson and sabotage against Jewish and government property.

The cease fire order was said to have been a gesture of good will in view of the mediation by the Iraq Foreign Minister Sey-

id Tawfik Al Suwaidi, who was in Damascus today, en route from London, where he conferred with British Ministers, to meet Arab leaders in Syria.

The correspondent said the Arabs believed a solution of the Palestine mandate problem might be reached within two weeks.

"Bluff Must Be Called."

He quoted the Jewish official agency as saying that "the Arabs know they cannot complete against the British reinforcements, hence they are stopping their disturbances, thus repeating their tactics of 1936, when

Munich Jews Protest Outrages to Berlin

Streicher's Men Lead Attacks

BERLIN. — Representatives of the Munich Jewish cultural community have arrived in Berlin to confer with Nazi officials on anti-Jewish outbreaks in Franconia, and particularly in the Nuremberg area, within the last week, it was learned here Franconia is the stronghold of Julius Streicher, leader of the extreme anti-Jewish element in the Nazi party.

Some shops in Franconia have been wrecked and there was unconfirmed reports of scattered cases of incendiarism.

Jewish communities in various cities have representatives who are designated to discuss relations with the government.

The United Press dispatch from Vienna said that Nazi guards suppressed new anti-Jewish demonstrations in two sections of Vienna last night. Before they were dispersed demonstrators broke windows in the Wallen-elsewhere, the dispatch said.

Over 400 to Appear In Night of Stars

NEW YORK. — More than four hundred celebrities of the stage, screen, radio and opera will appear at the fifth annual "Night of Stars" in Madison Square Garden, November 16, to aid refugee settlement in Palestine, according to present plans.

One of the features of this year's production will be an enactment of the history of the American theater in the last twenty years by the distinguished actors and actresses whose talents were responsible for its development. These artists will perform scenes from the roles that made them the idols of American audiences.

Refugee Vanishes From Ocean Liner

BRONX. — The Holland-America liner "Veendam," docked this week in Hoboken with \$7,500,000 in gold, the leader of the German Jewish Kulturbund, and minus one of its passengers—a Jewish refugee.

The missing passenger, Mrs. Rosa Sonnenschein, 65, whose husband was put in a Nazi concentration camp because he was a Jew, vanished from her cabin on October 23, when the ship was seven days out of Southampton.

Mrs. Sonnenschein's daughter, Mrs. Bertha Ruckhaus, 40, and Mrs. Ruckhaus' son, Felix, 8, were met at the dock by the missing woman's sister, Mrs. Julie Rosenbloom of the Bronx, with whom they will live.

Czechs May Go Anti-Jewish

Tie With Germany To Alter Policies

No Concern Now About Refugees

PRAGUE. — Predictions in the Czech press that the government of Premier Jan Syrový will shortly alter Czechoslovakia's traditionally tolerant attitude toward the Jews and adopt measures to de-naturalize all Jews who entered Czechoslovakia since 1918 have created something approaching a panic in Jewish quarters. In the event that such a policy is adopted, thousands of Polish and Roumanian Jews who were naturalized after 1918 will become stateless.

Reports of an anti-Jewish attitude by the newly-established autonomous government of Slovakia and the news that Germany has demanded the return of all German refugees from the Sudetenland, including anti-Nazis, have added to the growing anxiety among Jews.

The Prague government is showing itself to be unconcerned regarding the fate of the Sudetenland refugees. Its attitude is that since England and France robbed the Czechs of the ability to resist Germany's demands, it is up to them to find a haven for the refugees. At the same time the Syrový government is none too anxious to admit the refugees to what remains of Czechoslovakia.

Immigrants Banned Without Permits

MELBOURNE. — Promising to give sympathetic consideration to immigrants to Australia already on ships for this country, the Australian ministry of interior admitted 27 Jews who had arrived in Sydney on tourist visas and had at first been refused permission to land. The ministry, however, made it plain that future immigrants seeking to land tourist visas will be turned back.

WASHINGTON. — Senator Borah said this week that protests against possible British action to close Palestine to Jewish immigrants might involve the United States in "a delicate and dangerous situation."

In a letter to rabbi Stephen S. Wise, of New York, Mr. Borah expressed belief that this country would have to be prepared to assume obligations of a mandatory power if it advised Great Britain what to do in Palestine.

He declined an invitation from Rabbi Wise to speak in New York November 2 at a mass meeting called to protest against any cessation of Jewish immigration.

Urge Increase in Donations to Fund

Campaign To End On November 1

Following an analysis made of pledges, Curtis B. Brooks, chairman of the Providence-Cranston Community Fund campaign, this week made a special appeal to all contributors that larger donations are needed to meet requirements.

Nazi Justice

Hitler assured the world after the Munich Pact was signed that the rights of the Czechoslovakian citizens would be respected. According to a dispatch from Prague, it was learned that Hitler now demands that all citizens opposed to Nazi ideology must be punished or placed in camps, where they cannot confuse or obstruct the Nazification of the Czechs.

This recalls a recent note which announced that Johann Langer, former judge who headed the Tribunal, which passed several death sentences on Nazis, after the unsuccessful "Putsch" of 1934, in which Chancellor Dolfuss was assassinated, has committed suicide in the Dachau concentration camp. These death announcements, many of which will now emanate from Prague, are Hitler's convenient way of saying that his enemies have been liquidated, and aptly illustrate Nazi justice and mercy.

The Cynical Touch

The kite flown by Signor Mussolini in the proposed offer of territory in Abyssinia for Jewish settlement is likely to come to ground with a bump. It has been aptly described by the Spectator as "the final touch of cynicism."

How any ruler with the faintest sense of realism can first revile a people and then ask from them the service and sacrifice that his own people flatly refuse passes understanding. If the Italian dictator imagines that Jews have sunk so far, that in return for the humiliations he has heaped upon them they will flock to help him in his scheme to despoil the lawful owners of the country he has not yet even subjugated, we imagine he will soon be disillusioned.

The answer has in one sense already been given to Signor Mussolini. It has been given by Monsieur Henri Bernstein, the famous French playwright, in returning the distinguished honours conferred upon him by the Fascist dictator. It has been given by Signor Pinto of Alexandria in tearing up his will bequeathing his great fortune to Italian charities. "Neither thy honey nor thy sting" runs the Hebrew saying, and that in effect is what the Jews are saying to Signor Mussolini.

Arabs to Continue Arson Sabotage Despite "Truce"

LONDON. — The News Chronicle's Jerusalem correspondent reported this week that Abdul Rahem, commander-in-chief of Arab rebels in Palestine, had ordered his men to cease shooting at British troops and policemen temporarily, but to continue a campaign of arson and sabotage against Jewish and government property.

The cease fire order was said to have been a gesture of good will in view of the mediation by the Iraq Foreign Minister Sey-

id Tawfik Al Suwaidi, who was in Damascus today, en route from London, where he conferred with British Ministers, to meet Arab leaders in Syria.

The correspondent said the Arabs believed a solution of the Palestine mandate problem might be reached within two weeks.

"Bluff Must Be Called."

He quoted the Jewish official agency as saying that "the Arabs know they cannot complete against the British reinforcements, hence they are stopping their disturbances, thus repeating their tactics of 1936, when

Munich Jews Protest Outrages to Berlin Streicher's Men Lead Attacks

BERLIN. — Representatives of the Munich Jewish cultural community have arrived in Berlin to confer with Nazi officials on anti-Jewish outbreaks in Franconia, and particularly in the Nuremberg area, within the last week, it was learned here Franconia is the stronghold of Julius Streicher, leader of the extreme anti-Jewish element in the Nazi party.

Some shops in Franconia have been wrecked and there was unconfirmed reports of scattered cases of incendiarism.

Jewish communities in various cities have representatives who are designated to discuss relations with the government.

The United Press dispatch from Vienna said that Nazi guards suppressed new anti-Jewish demonstrations in two sections of Vienna last night. Before they were dispersed demonstrators broke windows in the Wallen-elsewhere, the dispatch said.

Over 400 to Appear In Night of Stars

NEW YORK. — More than four hundred celebrities of the stage, screen, radio and opera will appear at the fifth annual "Night of Stars" in Madison Square Garden, November 16, to aid refugee settlement in Palestine, according to present plans.

One of the features of this year's production will be an enactment of the history of the American theater in the last twenty years by the distinguished actors and actresses whose talents were responsible for its development. These artists will perform scenes from the roles that made them the idols of American audiences.

Refugee Vanishes From Ocean Liner

BRONX. — The Holland-America liner "Veendam," docked this week in Hoboken with \$7,500,000 in gold, the leader of the German Jewish Kulturbund, and minus one of its passengers—a Jewish refugee.

The missing passenger, Mrs. Rosa Sonnenschein, 65, whose husband was put in a Nazi concentration camp because he was a Jew, vanished from her cabin on October 23, when the ship was seven days out of Southampton.

Mrs. Sonnenschein's daughter, Mrs. Bertha Ruckhaus, 40, and Mrs. Ruckhaus' son, Felix, 8, were met at the dock by the missing woman's sister, Mrs. Julie Rosenbloom of the Bronx, with whom they will live.

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

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

Britain to Keep Palestine Open

Retain Reduced Quotas for Jews

LONDON. — Reduced Jewish immigration into Palestine will be continued for a number of years, the News Chronicle reported from Jerusalem this week.

The newspaper said that unofficial but informed sources reported that a new British policy already was being framed and would include:—

A vigorous, new attempt to enforce the British mandate after the suppression of disorders.

Establishment of a legislative council based on proportional representation at a ratio of eight Arabs, four Jews and one Christian Arab.

Local autonomy, probably by cantons, in predominately Jewish and Arab districts within this framework, and a firm British grip on mixed areas and holy places.

Reduced Jewish immigration "for a period of years."

A possible promise to Arabs for a review of the entire situation leading toward an ultimate, final solution.



"No Solution for Palestine Trouble", Says Mrs. Lind

NEW YORK. — Mrs. Nils Lind doesn't see any solution for the present trouble in Palestine. The present situation touches home. Her mother, Mrs. Frederick Vester, is head of the American colony in Jerusalem. Mrs. Lind was born there. She is one of the few foreign women who dared enter the Old City. She feels that the English will have a hard time trying to fulfill two difficult promises made in times of stress—one to the Jews, the other to the Arabs.

"It is suicide for anybody who is not known to go to Jerusalem," she said. "But because the people knew my family they were very friendly. I never felt afraid, although most of those who stopped me were either murderers, pickpockets or bandits." Looking at this very young, very pretty,

yellow-haired woman, with level gray eyes, your first thought would be the interest such an Anglo-Saxon type might stir up in a foreign quarter.

Mrs. Lind's husband, a quiet, rather shy and reserved man with a serious manner, is even more pessimistic than she about the present problem in Palestine. "The trouble is that the Arabs had this dream of independence," he said. "Then the Zionists came along with their claims. The moderate Jews would be quite willing to share the rule, but the National Jews represented by the Revisionists can't see the Arabs in the picture. The Arabs could have been influenced very easily by some kindness and a little consideration, but the chance for that has passed now."

Union City Police Criticized By N. J. Civil Liberty Group

UNION CITY, N. J. — The New Jersey Civil Liberties Union's special committee that investigated the breaking up of a German-American Bund rally and stoning of National Bundes-Fuehrer Fritz Kuhn on October 2, made its report this week.

Its conclusions were:

"(1) The police were derelict in their duty toward Kuhn and the Bund. The police should have rendered adequate protection to Kuhn so as to permit him to speak in the hall which had been engaged for him.

Instigated No Trouble

"(2) The committee does not find that the police in any way aided or instigated any disorder—in this respect the Union City occurrence is to be differentiated from the Jersey City incidents.

"(3) The police are to be commended for upholding the rights of the members of the anti-Nazi groups who engaged in peaceful picketing.

"(4) The committee feels strongly that under the circumstances the police could have rendered adequate protection and recognition of the civil and constitutional rights of all groups—the right of all German-American Bund to hold a peaceful meeting and the right of the anti-Nazi groups peacefully to picket against such

FCC Clamps Down on Radio Station for Fascist Talks

WASHINGTON. — The Federal Communications Commission has clamped down on a Jersey City radio station for disseminating pro-Fascist, anti-Semitic foreign propaganda from the bailiwick of Mayor Frank Hague, it was learned this week.

Already nationally famous as the place where civil liberties are ignored, Jersey City became known as the first American center of totalitarian radio propaganda when the commission refused to extend the license of station WHOM for the usual six-month period.

On the basis of a report filed by its legal staff after receiving complaints from listeners against propaganda broadcast in German,

Italian and Arabic, the commission issued only a ninety-day renewal and ordered that the programs of the station be scrutinized during this period to determine whether further action should be taken.

Recommended Renewal

The report of the legal staff concluded that an Italian program which was a weekly feature of WHOM for three months before its discontinuance September 29 "may be calculated to incite race hatred and therefore cannot be regarded as in the public interest." Nevertheless, commission lawyers recommended unconditional renewal of the station's license.

Taylor Reports Refugees Own 6 Billion in Germany

NEW YORK. — Estimating the total wealth in Germany of German and Austrian refugees at from two to six billion dollars, Myron C. Taylor, American vice-chairman of the Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees, this week told the Council on Foreign Relations that he was confident that despite difficulties "means can be found which will be acceptable both to the German government

and to the governments of the countries of refuge whereby a considerable portion of this wealth can be saved for the emigrants to enable them to find, reach and establish themselves in new homes."

In his first public report since his return from Europe, where he spent five months in behalf of the refugees, Mr. Taylor warned against the belief that "there is any possibility of changing policies which are forcing these people from their former homeland."

Mr. Taylor also expressed confidence that the German government "will recognize that extreme persecution is unnecessary to accomplish the emigration of these unwanted people from Germany, and that if it is to have the cooperation of the other governments of the world in solving this problem, it must to some extent relax the unceasing pressure which is driving these people to flight rather than to organized emigration."

In a resolution adopted, Hebrew University pledged help to the Jewish exiled scholars.

Chairs will be established and new laboratories equipped and facilities must be provided for a large number of students.

Scopus in Jerusalem, will now be concerned primarily with the "threatened abrogation of Jewish rights in Palestine," Mrs. Robert Szold, of this city, convention chairman, revealed.

Ask Open Door Policy in Palestine 1000 Sign Cable To Roosevelt

A telegram bearing more than 1,000 signatures of Rhode Island Jewry, as a result of the mass meeting held last Sunday at the Biltmore Hotel, was sent this week to President Roosevelt, asking that he act in opposition to the proposal to close the gates to immigration of Jewish refugees into Palestine. Held here under the auspices of the United Jewish Emergency Committee, the meeting took place simultaneously with meetings in 500 other American cities and towns.

Governor Robert E. Quinn, speaking before the meeting, expressed his sympathy with its aims, and read a letter from President Roosevelt to him, in which the President said that the Administration has the interests of the Jewish people in mind. The Governor said he felt that at the present, with Jews being persecuted in Europe, it is not the time to restrict the influx of Jews into Palestine.

Following is the contents of the telegram sent to the President: "We, the undersigned, respectfully petition you, Mr. President, to give public expression to the American Government's sympathy with the Jewish National Home Policy, under the Palestine mandate and to intercede with the British Government to the end of keeping open the gates of the Holy Land for a large scale of Jewish immigration and as a haven for the refugees."

Presiding at the meeting, Philip V. Marcus, chairman of the Emergency Committee, explained the purpose of the mass meetings. Other speakers were Mayor James E. Dunne, Judge Max Levy of Newport, Mayor Albert P. Ruerat of Warwick, Isaac Carmel of New York and Former Mayor Joseph H. Gainor.

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
