Cagey Coughlin

Father Coughlin was recently invited by the America's Town Meeting Program, heard on WJZ every Thursday evening, to debate the question "What is Americanism?" with General Hugh Johnson, Dorothy Thompson, and Earl Browder, the Communist.

The others accepted; but Father Coughlin telegraphed George B. Denny, Jr., president of Town Hall, that "Americanism is not a debatable subject with me."

This decision makes it impossible, just now, to bring Coughlinism to a head. Father Coughlin prefers, it would seem, his personal microphone where there can be no refutation of his shallow and nefarious arguments.

For The Record

In the last "free" election held in Germany, 6,000,000 voted the Communist ticket whereas the total number of Jews in that country was only about 1 tenth of that number.

And of the 100 Communist deputies elected not one was a Jew.

Save the Children

We do not know the next political step our country will take in regard to the situation created by Nazi inhumanities, but we do know that the heart of our nation goes out to the suffering victims.

Whatever economic objections and fears of increased unemployment Congress may have with regard to enlarging the existing immigration quota, there can be no such objections to the admission of children.

We are certain that there are thousands of Jewish families in the United States, who, in the face of the present crisis, will gladly take refugee children into their homes and provide them with food and shelter as long as necessary. The organized Jewish communities would guarantee that the children receive the proper care. The admission of these children would not undermine the employment situation in the country as for many years these children would be consumers rather than producers. Their presence in the community would stimulate business.

Tens of thousands of innocent children are now exposed to a life of torture or to a slow painful death. The suggested havens in all other countries can care but for a fraction of this number. America must do its share. Let us open our gates to their outstretched hands. American public opinion will approve of it. Let us open our homes to these helpless, suffering boys and girls.

The details can be worked out by a special committee for the purpose. But the main issue is urgent and vital and must be undertaken immediately. We must make homes in the United States for 25,000 refugee children.

The public is ready to have leaders to organize the effort.

A Note of Defiance

Following their ceremony at the King David Hotel, Jerusalem, the newly wedded couple departed for their honeymoon under escort of an armored car. Attached to their own car, however, for the benefit of Arab terrorists, was the sign, "Just Married—Don't Shoot."

A people with such a sense of humor will absorb a lot of punishment before going under. It's very defiance bodes ill for the Arab extremists.

Klan Asks B'nai B'rith Cooperation

MIAMI, Fla. — Unusual in the history of the United States was the receipt of a letter by the anti-Defamation Committee of the local B'nai B'rith from the local Ku Klux Klan asking the B'nai B'rith to investigate charges against a Jewish resident in Miami of wrongdoing which had been sent them.

In a letter from the local Klan, they said that they recognized the wonderful work of the B'nai B'rith and expressed confidence in the ability of the B'nai B'rith to investigate and take care of charges against Jews in this area.

The anti-Defamation committee acknowledged receipt of the letter and took the proper action.

Reich Decides to Try American as Traitor

BERLIN. — A Department of Justice spokesman said that George Roth, naturalized United States citizen arrested last week at Hamburg, would be tried on a charge of treason. The trial date has not been fixed.

Roth, a New York ship steward, was arrested by Nazi police as he left the liner Manhattan and was accused of possessing German language Communist literature printed at Le Havre. He was born April 3, 1905, at Gross Stenheim and his parents still live in Germany.

Woman Nazi Foe Gets Death Threat

BUFFALO. — Mrs. Marcus Reback, anti-Nazi author and lecturer, was provided with a police guard this week after she revealed that she and her two daughters had been threatened with death.

Mrs. Reback, asked for police protection last night after receiving a telephone call threatening her daughters, Judith, six, and Mary Margaret, eighteen.

Mrs. Reback said she had received three letters, two postal cards and six telephone calls.

Discrimination Tactics Reaches New High

Cohen Presents Annual Report

NEW YORK—Prejudice against Jews in employment in the United States, reaching a high never before attained and showing a marked advance since the advent of Nazism, is revealed today by the American Jewish Congress in a report on Jewish non-employment based on a year's investigation with particular reference to the Metropolitan area of New York.

Prepared by J. X. Cohen, chairman of the Commission on Economic Problems of the American Jewish Congress, the report, entitled "Towards Fair Play for Jewish Workers" presents a study of discrimination as revealed in the classified advertisements, a survey of employment agencies, investigation of individual complaints and an examination of the personnel records and practices of various industries, including public utilities, quasi-governmental agencies, banks, insurance companies, hotels, department stores.

Advertisements Studied

Studying the classified advertisements over six periods, 1917, 1921, 1928, 1932, 1934 and 1937-38, the study reveals that since the advent of Nazism the frequency of discriminatory specifications has grown progressively higher, (Continued on page 7)

75,000 Flee Nazi Rule in Austria

VIENNA. — During the eight months since the Nazis came into power in Austria, almost 25 per cent of the Jewish population of 300,000 has emigrated, a survey showed this week.

About 15,000 fled across the nearby frontier immediately after the Anschluss. At a slower but steady pace, other thousands emigrated.

The property of emigrant Jews as well as that of many who remain here is being "Aryanized." The latter process, however is handicapped by the lack of capital among the non-Jewish population.

Influenza Epidemic Threatens Refugees

BENTSCHEN, Poland. — An epidemic of influenza was threatened this week in the Polish-Jewish refugee camp on the Polish-German frontier as a severe cold wave set in. More than 600 refugees were reported ill of influenza out of a total of 5,000 and hundreds of others had colds.

Ten persons have died since the camp was established, according to camp executives. The hospital at the camp is overcrowded and many who are ill have been taken to private homes in Bentschen.

Reich Refugee Plan Held Boon to Nazis

LONDON. — George Rublee, American vice chairman of the International Refugee Committee, conferred with British, French and Netherlands finance experts this week on a German proposal for emigration of German Jews, as outlined in talks here by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the German Reichsbank. It met with a cold reception.

Schacht's plan involved an international loan to finance the emigration and an increase in American, British and other imports from Germany. Thus, in a sense, foreign nations would pay Germany for permitting them to take care of its Jews, according to interpretations in some quarters.

2,000 Pickets Boo WMCA on Coughlin

NEW YORK. — A yelling booing crowd of 2,000 with many carrying anti-Semitic signs, picketed radio station WMCA for two and a half hours last week in protest against the station's refusal to broadcast the speeches of the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin unless he submits copies forty-eight hours in advance.

The demonstration disrupted pedestrian traffic. It was held under the sponsorship of the Committee for the Defense of American Constitutional Rights. About 120 police were on hand to preserve order.

Highlights of the Week's News

McMahon Clears "Hours" Confusion

Thomas F. McMahon, Director of Labor, announced today that the many complaints received by the Department of Labor indicate confusion prevails with regard to the application of the Rhode Island 48 Hour Law. The assumption that firms within the application of the "Fair Labor Standards Act" (the wage & hour bill) are exempt from compliance with the State 48 hour law is error.

There are no exceptions to the 48 hour law by reason of the season or application of other laws.

No woman or legally employable minor in Rhode Island may be employed more than 48 hours a week. Violations of the 48 hours law are subject to penalty.

Hopkins Considers Employment Drive

WASHINGTON. — Secretary of Commerce Hopkins, it was learned this week, is considering a nationwide drive to put millions of unemployed men and women back to work in private industry.

The drive, according to reports in both business and Government circles, would be carried on by the Commerce Department in conjunction with the Business Advisory Council.

High Taxes Seen as Menace to Schools

Slapping at governmental legislation and increasing taxes Dr. Frederick G. Keyes, Massachusetts Institute of Technology professor, in his dedication lecture at Faunce House this week, predicted a serious regression from the phenomenal rise of American industry and science and a drying up of the sources of public generosity for the institutions of higher learning.

Child Labor

WASHINGTON. — Government officials claimed this week that 500,000 children are still working despite the wage-hour law. They forecast a new fight for ratification of the child labor amendment.

Scottsboro Echo

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Echo of the famous Scottsboro trial occurred here this week. Defense counsel for the five youths now in jail claimed that four of the imprisoned youths were to have been released on October 31. He charged the Governor with breaking his word.

Italy's "Spontaneous" Cry Manufactured

ROME. — That "Spontaneous" demand for Tunis which interrupted Count Ciano's speech was carefully planned according to observer's in Italy. It was reported that the government mere-

ly sent out a number of cards to Fascists saying that they were to yell out for Tunis, Corsica and Nice at a given signal.

The cry, when it occurred, was very feeble, but amplified by Duce's press and radio it was made to appear as the great voicing of the people.

Democrats Resign

Charles F. McElroy, director of public works, and Clarence R. Bitting, chairman of the State planning board, resigned their posts this week. Both were officials under the Democratic administration.

Mr. McElroy is the first Democratic State office holder to relinquish his office before the incoming Republican group takes over the reins of the state government. Both resignations become effective on Saturday.

Mayor Hague Calls A Vanderbilt "Red"

JERSEY CITY. — Mayor Hague evidently sampled the brew that brings Alice in Wonderland to reality. In a statement this week, the Mayor, who sees "Red" wherever he goes, called A. T. Vanderbilt, a Communist, or at least, a stooge of the Communists. It appears that Mr. Vanderbilt dared to criticize Mr. Hague's dictatorship.

The mayor now has called all his opponents Communists but they're all laughing.

Deportation May Break Up Family

Four Bristol children face separation from their mother, Mrs. Manuel Silva, whose deportation to Canada has been ordered because of illegal entry from that country ten years ago.

A six months extension for Mrs. Silva is being sought by Edward J. Higgins, secretary to Senator Green. Mr. Higgins said this week that will appear before the U. S. Immigration Department on behalf of Mrs. Silva.

Anthony Eden May Be Re-Instated

LONDON. — Anthony Eden may be reinstated as Foreign Minister if Prime Minister Chamberlain fails to make progress in diplomatic negotiations with Benito Mussolini in Italy next month, some observers predicted this week. Because of the new Italian campaign against France, the belief was growing that the Anglo-Italian conference was bound to fail.

WPA Drops 1000 From R. I. Roster

At a cost to the State of about \$100,000, the State Unemployment Relief Commission will attempt to absorb as many as possible of the 1000 who were dropped today from the WPA in Rhode Island.

William MacLeod was chosen as floor leader. The meeting was held at the Portsmouth home of Governor-Elect William H. Vanderbilt.

Gorman Wins Control of U. T. W.

Paralyzed Women Becomes Mother

RIDGEWOOD, N. J. — Mrs. Arthur C. May, 29, who is paralyzed from the waist down, is resting comfortably after having given birth to a six-pound baby girl. The case is unique in medical history.

Mrs. May was stricken with infantile paralysis August 10. After intensive treatment Mrs. May regained the use of the upper part of her body.

A caesarian operation was contemplated, since she was still paralyzed from the waist down, but to the amazement of her physician the birth and the baby were perfectly normal.

German Fugitives Defy Army Call

METZ, France. — Several thousand young Germans living on the French side of the border have defied orders issued through German Consulates to return to Germany to do military service.

The youths affected are mostly sons of Rhineland and Saar separatists who took refuge in France when Germany regained full control of those regions, after the Saar plebiscite of 1935.

Most of these refugees have remained in France without becoming French citizens and their children also considered German. Orders to do military service are normal for Germans living aboard but in case most of those called fear they will be persecuted if they obey.

Writer Says German People Detect Hitler

NEW YORK. — The people of Germany secretly want their country to be defeated in the next war because they are suffering under Hitler's rule, according to Emil Lengyel, writer.

Mr. Lengyel declared at a meeting at the Astoria Center of Israel that he learned this in conversations with many persons, mostly Catholics and Protestants, on a recent trip through Germany.

Mr. Lengyel declared that Hitler was not ready for war and was bluffing last September; that when he is ready he will strike without warning. He said the next world war may break out within a year.

Indefinite Stay For Aliens Barred

Co-operatives an Old Story To Students in California

LOS ANGELES. — Self-help co-operatives, by means of which California's elect Culbert S. Olson proposes to solve unemployment and relief problems, are no new thing among students on the Los Angeles campus of the University of California.

Today 115 men and twenty-five co-eds are eating, sleeping studying and playing in a co-operative design for living which John Essene, U. C. L. A. student originated two years ago in his sophomore year.

All Wash and Sweep

In a series of establishments scattered within a short distance of the 384-acre Westwood Village campus the students ten, twenty-five or thirty to a house, take weekly assignments at washing dishes, sweeping, dusting, washing clothes and doing other household chores. Each member works four hours a week. By doing their own housework the students are able to obtain good quarters, three square meals, a day, study rooms and a congenial social atmosphere at about \$22 a month each.

In 1936 Essene, baffled like many a U. C. L. A. student by inadequate housing facilities, decided to solve the problem. Gathering

around him a small group of ten willing and able students, Essene rented a house in nearby Swatelle, borrowed some furniture and set up housekeeping.

Getting Money Biggest Job

One of the biggest obstacles to surmount was the lack of funds. At that time the State administration would have no truck with co-operatives so that all personal resources were brought forth to aid the construction of the self-aid house.

Today the U. C. L. A. co-operatives are launched on the road to permanence. The buying power of their association enables them to effect considerable economies in their marketing, the savings being passed along to the members.

Hoare Warns Nazis On Resident Germans

Britain Opposes Nazifying Jobs

LONDON. — Sir Samuel Hoare, Home Secretary, informed Commons this week that any German attempts to compel German nationals in Britain to join a British branch of the Nazi Labor Front would be "a punishable offense."

He promised questioners he would take "appropriate action if evidence of intimidation" were brought before him.

He said he was "causing immediate inquiry to be made" into reports that one London firm was dismissing Jewish employees.

He told a questioner he would "disapprove" if it were shown that German servant girls employed in Britain were compelled to go to some organization "and give information of what they heard in houses" in which they worked.

BERLIN. — Existing marriages between Jews and non-Jews must be dissolved or the Gentile partner will be declared Jewish, is the new anti-Jewish legislation given to foreign diplomatic agencies.

Officials Say Refugee Rules are Unchanged

Must Enter Under Quotas

WASHINGTON. — Labor Department officials declared this week there are no special arrangements in effect by which refugees in the United States on visitors' visas may remain in this country, by repeated visa extensions, as more or less permanent residents.

More than a month ago, at the height of the refugee crisis, President Roosevelt said he had instructed Secretary of Labor Perkins to extend visitors' permits for six months, and for like periods as long as necessary.

Can't Remain Indefinitely

This does not mean, Labor Department officials say, that a large number of German refugees, aside from those who come in under the regular immigration quota, will remain in the country on a permanent basis or for a long period.

There is no disposition to force the return to Germany or other countries of visitors who may be in any danger, but nevertheless visitors cannot remain here indefinitely, and sooner or later must return to their homes, it was explained.

Labor Department officials insist the only way an alien can become a permanent resident is to come in under the immigration quota set for his country.

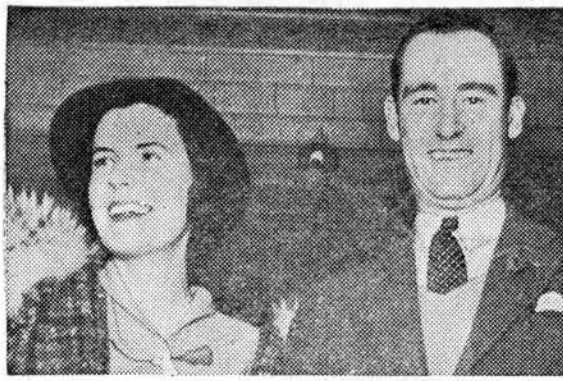

Dear Grandma:
I hear you're down with the pneumonia again. Yep, that's the word that reaches me from Oklahoma these days. What's the matter? I bet you pulled the same trick this year that you did last—waited till too late in the fall to start wearing your shoes.

Now having Doc Childs out to the farm to treat you is it o o expensive, Grandma, and the

family wishes you would not catch pneumonia any more till they get a medical co-operative in Tulsa County and it won't cost you so much to let you enjoy an illness.

Have you heard anything about these medical co-operatives, Grandma? They are organizations where a bunch of people go in together and pay so much apiece and hire a few doctors to look after them.

I understand from the people that belong to the one called "Group Health Association" down in Washington, D. C., that it's a lot of fun. Whenever you have a pain that you wouldn't notice if you weren't a member of the Association you call up the Association Doc and say: "I wish you would look to see if my dues are paid up. If they are, I'm sick."

Barred From Hospital

The only drawback is that you need to have an appendix cut from the Group Health Association Doc is liable to have to stretch you out on your kitchen table to get the job done, as he is barred from using the Washington hospitals—thanks to Dr. Morris Fishbein, who is just a director of the American Medical Association but also who talks so much he is generally thought of as the organization's president.

"I am against medical co-operatives," he says, "because they are the first step on the road toward a totalitarian state."

"Everyone should have good medical service, but I insist that medicine is still a profession. It must never

become a business or a trade. Never the subservient tool of a governmental bureaucracy."

You might guess from the doctor's rhetoric that he is no slouch when it comes to slinging the words around. He never practiced medicine a day in his life, but quickly after being graduated from the Rush Medical College he fell into an associate editorship on the "Journal of the American Medical Association."

He makes 130 speeches a year, and is asked to make nine times that many. He speaks so much that one of his critics hinted once that it was just as well Morris never had actively practiced medicine, as chances are he would have talked his patients to death.

His speeches, though serious, are nevertheless seasoned with such things as his definition of "melba toast": "Bread cut so thin it curls up in disgust."

Yessir, he can sure make a speech. But good though he is as a speaker, he's even better as a promoter. If he wasn't the bill-wheel of the American Medical Association he would certainly be secretary of somebody's chamber of commerce.

He'd do wonders for somebody's town, too. Look what he's done for the A. M. A. It was just a weak little organization when he took over. Now 110,000 of the nation's 140,000 doctors belong, and the "Journal" makes a net profit of over a half-million yearly.

No wonder the trustees of the A. M. A. feel justified in paying the stocky but energetic Fishbein a yearly salary of something like \$20,000. They might pay him more if he wasn't making about the same amount from his writings. An income of \$40,000 a year, they feel, will keep his wife and three children from starving.

NEW YORK. — Bernard Spindle, 17-year old Bronx schoolboy, spent one night this week in jail. Police caught and arrested him after he had been charging other boys ten cents each to admit them into the Roxy Theatre at 50th St. and Seventh avenue through an exit door.

The theatre management has been complaining for some time that boys have been getting inside the theatre without paying at the box office. In order to halt the practice ushers were assigned to the exit doors.

On Tuesday an usher saw young Spindle open one of the exit doors and admit five other boys, collecting a dime from each. He was arrested by a patrolman.

At the W. 47th street station, Spindle was identified by the five boys who had been admitted. The boy, whose home is in the Bronx, was then taken before Magistrate Louis Brodsky in Night Court. The Magistrate adjusted him guilty of disorderly conduct and sentenced him to one night in jail.

Germans Here Clear People of Reich

NEW YORK.—Hitler and other Nazi chiefs responsible for the reign of terror against Jews, Catholics and other minority groups in Germany represent neither the will nor the temper of the German people, it was declared in a radio broadcast last week by two German-American leaders—one of them German-born.

The speakers were Victor Rieder, publisher of the New Yorker Staats Zeitung und Herold, a native German, and Justice Gustav W. M. Weiboldt of the Court of Special Sessions, former State president of the Steuben Society an organization composed of American citizens of German birth or background.

Public Favors Stand on Hitlerism

Minister Exposes Untruths In Coughlin's Jew-Baiting

NEW YORK. — That the actual source of Father Coughlin's recent attacks on the Jews was a Nazi propaganda service is disclosed in the current issue of The Nation. Other charges made by the "radio priest" are shown to be without factual bases, and "misinterpretation" of data is also proved.

The counter-charges are made by William C. Kernan, rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, Bayonne, New Jersey. In the course of his investigations he unearthed "a Nazi paper called 'World Service,' published in Hamburg twice monthly in six languages" and reporting "the machinations of the Jewish underworld." He shows that passages in the February 15, 1936 issue of "World Service" tally exactly with the words quoted by Coughlin.

Rev. Kernan likewise disproves Coughlin attacks on the Jews as being "responsible for the economic and social ills" of Germany, and as being principle fomenters of the Russian revolution. On the latter point, Kernan demonstrates

that Father Coughlin misquoted an article in the magazine "American Hebrew" to make it seem that the Jews themselves conceded chief responsibility for the Bolshevik revolution.

The Nation's contributor present authoritative statements disproving that any of the Jewish banking firms mentioned by Coughlin ever contributed to be Bolshevik cause. Kernan labels as "grossly incorrect" the priest's charge that all but three members of the Russian party's central committee were Jews.

300,000 Awaiting Migration to U. S. A.

WASHINGTON. — Nearly 300,000 persons await permission to migrate to the United States from Germany according to information received by Governmental officials. Inasmuch as the regular quota permits only 27,000 to enter annually, it would take 11 years to absorb the present waiting list.

Grynspan Returns Fund for Defense

Asks Cash Be Sent to Refugees

SAN FRANCISCO. — Herschel Grynspan, Jewish youth awaiting trial in Paris for killing a German Embassy attache, whose death brought an assessment by the Nazi government of \$400,000 on Germany's Jews, says he wants no contributions toward his defense.

He returned a contribution, the amount of which was not disclosed, to Dr. George Herzog, San Francisco physician and war-time colonel, with the wish that money be given instead to "the 1,200 innocent Jews robbed and exiled and suffering from cold and hunger on the Polish border."

Herzog said that instead of contributing to American sources which are raising a defense fund for the youth, he sent his donation directly to Grynspan.

Louis Bloom Heads Providence Fraternal

At the annual election of officers of the Providence Fraternal Association, held last Tuesday night in Swedish Workmen's Hall, Louis S. Bloom, was named president of the organization.

Greenstein, Frank Jampolsky and Mrs. Morris Sheer.

The association has endorsed the Rhode Island drive for the Relief of Oppressed Minorities and has formed a committee to aid in raising the \$150,000 State quota.

REFUGEES GO TO CHINA

SHANGHAI. — A group of 150 Jewish professionals and business men, refugees from Austria and Germany, arrived in war-torn Shanghai on the S. S. Conte Rosso this week. Many of them, coming directly from concentration camps were without funds.

he's too good a player.

An Old Age Conflict

His critics say Dr. Fishbein is smiling even to the back reaches of his bald pate over the struggle the A. M. A. and Uncle Sam are soon to have in the courts. Isn't it ideal for getting the organization publicity (and new members).

It's the older doctors who are with Fishbein—older doctors who have gone through deprivation to get where they are and they don't want to give up their hard-won advantages.

Almost all the young doctors are for the medical co-operatives, and so are many of the older-men—men like Dr. Joseph Slavitt, who says "Dr. Fishbein declares medicine is medicine and business is business and never the twain shall meet. That isn't true. It's only wish fulfillment. They met years ago and have been carrying on the most intimate relations, both legal and clandestine, ever since."

"Until Dr. Fishbein changes his attitude on the matter—and I know he will, or it will be changed for him—doctors like myself will struggle to bring about a day when we can start treatment without first looking into the patient's hand to see that the money is there."

Belligerency Towards Dictators on Upgrade

Survey Indicates War is Barred

The American public, according to Fortune Magazine this week, is growing more belligerent toward the dictator nations.

A clear majority of persons questioned in a survey by the magazine thought the democratic Powers, including the United States, should "now stand firm together, at any cost, to prevent Hitler or Mussolini from taking any more territory at the expense of other nations."

But when the questioning came down to specific cases, it developed that a majority of those whose opinions were sought were unwilling to go to war to defend any neighbor but Canada, and would not fight to save Mexico, the Philippines, Brazil, England or France.

Reversal of Attitude

Fortune, however, interpreted the results as "a remarkable reversal of attitude by a people that has shied away from the principle of concerted action."

It pointed out that after the Panay incident, the nation emphatically felt that the United States should withdraw from China rather than take measures to protect its rights there.

The response to the magazine's general question whether the democratic nations should unite to stop Hitler and Mussolini "at any cost" was Yes, 56.3 per cent, No, 31 per cent and Don't Know, 12.7 per cent. The men were somewhat more bellicose than the women and poor more war-like than the prosperous.

"Jewish Nose" Not Semitic; Is of Indo-Germanic Origin

Scientists Have No Answer To What is Race That Nazis Hate

What is this Jewish race that the Nazi leaders hate so much they are willing to incur the enmity of the whole world in order to suppress it?

Scientific anthropology has no answer according to W. Frank Thore, editor of Science Service. There isn't such a thing as a "typical" or "full-blooded" Jew. He is even rarer than that mythical blond animal—the "true" Nordic. The Jew as he stands before us today, far from being a race is about the most thoroughly mixed product of history's melting pot that the world affords.

Consider his story. The Jew first appeared over the horizon as a small nomadic tribe, speaking a Semitic language. He settled in Palestine and immediately intermarried with the people already there—some of them Semitic, some not. He migrated to Egypt and, after several centuries, migrated out again—by now a numerous folk who in the course of a few more centuries completely reconquered the old home in Palestine and founded a kingdom there.

He married the widows and daughters of his late enemies, and his kings took unto themselves in rather wholesale fashion the sisters and daughters of their neighboring monarchs. Conquered and taken into Babylonian exile, a large part of the people disappeared; descendants of the rest brought additional racial admixtures with them when they returned to rebuild the Temple.

Overrun by the Greeks under Alexander, then by the Romans, finally blotted out as a political entity and scattered to the ends of the earth as a people, the Jews have persisted amazingly for 2,000 years. As a race? Hardly. As a culture built around a religion, yes. But long before they were scattered like windblown seeds over the world, and certainly increasingly so since, the Jews have been a mixed race.

In their present European distribution the Jews of any given country or region are physically more like the Gentiles of that re-

gion than they are like the Jews of some place farther away. A German Jew is more like a German Christian in the shape of his head and his complexion than he is like a Jew of Portugal or Spain.

Extreme Cases

As extreme cases might be cited the small colonies of Jews in China and Africa, isolated for many centuries after the wave of Jewish missionary effort about the beginning of the present era. These people are Jews without question, and are so regarded by themselves and their neighbors. But the Jews of China are Chinese by any possible standard of racial determination, and the Jews of Africa are as definitely Negroes.

The Jewish "race" is a type that people have set up in their own minds. If a man has dark eyes, dark, curly hair; swarthy or olive complexion and, above all, if he has a prominent nose we think of him as "typically Jewish," if he doesn't look like that we say he "doesn't look like a Jew," though he may trace his lineage back without a break to Abraham.

There have been many jokes made about the Jewish nose, but the nose itself is the biggest joke of all—on the jokesters. For it is not a part of the original Semitic facial equipment but a Hittite contribution—and the Hittites were an Indo-germanic people!

Nazis Check Shops To Provide Labor

BERLIN. — The labor shortage in Germany has become so acute that in Berlin the police and labor authorities have made a joint appeal to business men to check their staffs and see if young healthy men are not doing some jobs which could be performed equally well by "other labor."

"Strong men with healthy bones," the appeal said, "should not be wasted on work which could be given to women or could be done by the physically handicapped or the elderly."

Hungary Explains Barrier to Jews

Fear Influx Of New Exiles

BUDAPEST. — The government announced this week that the new laws restricting Jews were intended to keep Hungary from being swamped by exiles from Czecho-Slovakia, Yugoslavia, Rumania, and Italy, all of which have applied new Jewish restrictions.

"Hungary, therefore, is surrounded by a ring of peoples 200,000,000 strong which wants to drive out Jews. By natural laws would be gravitated to the point of least resistance," the statement said.

It stated that Jews were a special racial group, biologically and spiritually and that the new Jewish laws were based on experience with the operation of former Jewish laws, as well as the "participation of Jews to a great extent in crimes."

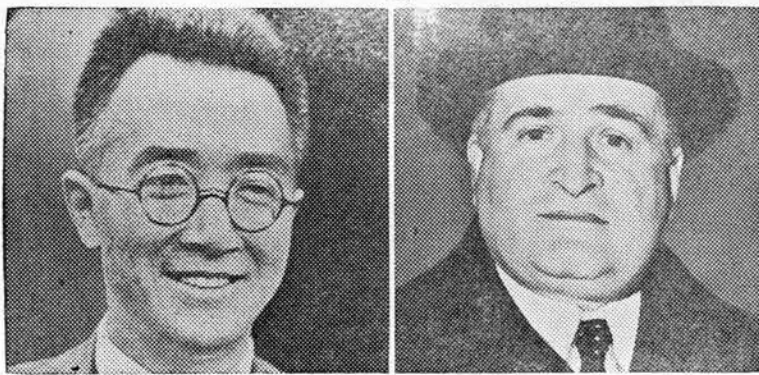

Prejudice In Employment Reaches New High In U. S.

until in 1937-38, these frequencies have reached heights far in excess of the preceding years. This finding, says the report, was substantial through data obtained by a survey of the lending employment agencies in New York City. About half of the 90 mapor agencies interviewed stated definitely that "discrimination is on the increase." They sense a marked tendency to make Jews marginal workers, that is, to be the very last hired and the very first fired when entering the period of economic decline.

Industrial Discrimination
In the technological field, the

report says, "upon inquiry of a large list of American universities and college scientific schools, it was elicited that they have found more and more doors and many important industrial firms being closed to their technical graduates who are Jewish. A mid-western university, though a trustee, recently notified Jewish leaders of the community in which the university is located, that it was being forced to action which it did not wish to be interpreted as anti-Jewish. The university is planning, most regretfully, to limit the enrollment of Jewish students in its technical schools, because the trustees had found their Jewish graduates very difficult to place."

The daily broadsides of columns of advertisements marked "Christian," "Christian firm," "Anglo-Saxon" and similar limitations "deliver a steady flow of serious anti-Jewish propaganda penetrating millions of Americans homes" says the report.

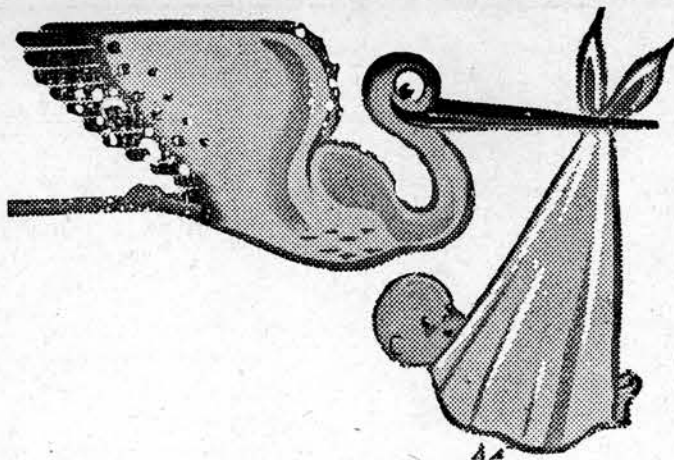
