

reliable source that the Mayor would include East Side projects in his housing program. Therefore, she said, the slum mothers who took part in the strike have agreed to have more babies. Mrs. Rothman, forty, mother of two children, discussed the stork derby today in the dark, airless kitchen of her tenement flat at 126 Henry street, as five young neighborhood mothers, members of her "executive council," nodded in agree-

A small fat woman, with blackgray hair and gleaming eyes and waving arms and an impassioned voice that is by turns offensively loud and barely audible. Mrs. Rothman told the story from the beginning. "The baby strike," she said, holding the reporters' arm with a vise-like grip, "did the most work on housing. The baby strike made them do it (made them talk about housing, that is). On the East Side there's more crime, rickets, tuberculosis, and heart trouble than anywhere else. Am I right? Or wrong?" Pause.

"Right," the reporter says, struggling to free his arm. "So," she goes on, "we started the baby strike. We started with twenty women and when we finished we had 1,000. Am I right?" Pause. "You know what it is. Slums and crime. Crime and slums. Our boys grow up to be gangsters. In other parts of the city the Government builds houses and the poor people move in. We live in the same rotten houses, worse thany anywhere. Get my point?"

"A few weeks ago there was a big meeting here on the East Side about housing. I wasn't invited, the people running it are afraid of



Geneva-The International conference to alleviate the plight of refugees from Germany worked on a plan to obtain guarantees that if refugees are expelled from another country they will not be forced to return to Germany.

Norman Bentwich, a Briton, told the conference that out of 145,000 refugees who left Germany, 130,-000 were Jewish and that 100,000 of the Jews already had established themselves outside of Europe, chiefly in Palestine.


