"Ashkenazi" Goes Big Time; Gentile Audience Is Large

He is old man and beardless youth. He is hero and villain. He is faithful to his heritage—and unfaithful. He is a character out of Sholom Asch, or Gogol, or Moliere, or Shakespeare, or Gorki, or, more currently, I J. Singer. Thirty years in the Yiddish Theatre have left him with a thousand different-identities.

But in his dressing room at the Yiddish Art Theatre, he is just plain Maurice Schwartz, tall, grave, melancholy-eyed. Might be taken for a prosperous business man, an American Labor Party factotum or an over-energetic settlement worker, but when he begins to speak, you know he is an actor. There is no getting away from it. On stage and off, Maurice Schwartz is an actor playing a part. He talks vigorously, pacing back and forth across the narrow room, his arms in constant play. He talks easily, fluently, half-beseechingly. You don't interrupt; it isn't necessary. Neither, is it possible. He talks effusively, steadily. He covers the ground. Your questions just get in his way.

Egotist? No. Just a fellow who

is bubbling over. It must be, you gather, that there is within him a profound stirring that makes it all surge up and come out in such a way that you just shut up and listen. You don't get annoyed like you would with ordinary people who talk too much.

Right now, Maurice Schwartz, perennial dreamer-rebel of the Jewish stage, has a story to tell: It seems that the gentiles are coming to the Yiddish theatre. Coming, he tells you proudly, happily, in great numbers. This is a surprise. Why, Schwartz remembers when a Jewish theatre audience resembled a House of David meet-

Nazi Propaganda Costs 69 Million

London.—Huge sums of money forcibly extracted from the German people for "Winter Aid" are diverted for the use of spreading Nazi propaganda abroad through the Ministry of Press and Propaganda, the Laborite Daily Herald reported here in an exclusive story.

The Propaganda Ministry receives \$48,250,000 from the Nazi government each year to carry on its activities in other countries. In addition, \$20,825,000 is appropriated each year to furnish Nazi organizations in other countries with funds.

Austrian Workers Ask Ban on Jews

Vienna.—The railroad workers' trade paper "Oesterreichischer Eisenbahner", demanded as a measure of legitimate self defense, that Austria bars further Jewish immigration.

The paper said that the influx of Galician Jews "did enough damage already" and it was feared further immigration might be encountered in view of the anti-Semitic measures in Rumania.

Warns of Building Artificial Ghettos

New York.—Warning that immigrants misunderstand the American spirit when they build artificial ghettos, was given last week at Foreign Language Information Service dinner by Hendrik Willem Van Loon.

"Our duty as immigrants," said Van Loon, an American born in Holland, "is to make ourselves good Americans. If we have left ghettos don't let us build artificial ghettos around ourselves. If in our own countries we have disliked another race, let us forget the dislike because there is no need of

Jewish Federation Sponsors Local Community Calendar

A Community Calendar will be sponsored by the Jewish Federation for Social Services, it was announced today by Jacob I. Cohen, executive secretary of the Federation.

The Jewish Federation which has in its membership the five Jewish Agencies in the Providence Community Fund has been studying the problem of enlarging the scope of the Federation and making it an effective instrument for communal work.

Pending such reorganization the Jewish Federation at its last board meeting approved the recommendation that a Jewish Community Calendar be established for our Jewish groups in the city of Providence. It is felt that there are more than 125 Jewish units in the city of Providence and that a great deal of dissatisfaction and duplication can be avoided if an exchange was provided for clearing dates and other pertinent information.

The office of the Jewish Federation, located at 65 Benefit street, will establish this Jewish Community Calendar not for the purpose of regulating activities but to provide information on events if such information will be supplied by organizations.

The Jewish Community Calendar can be successful only if the Jewish groups cooperate with it and inform the office immediately when a special event is planned.

The League of Jewish Women are conducting a successful calendar with the women's groups and this activity will in no way interfere with their very fine work, Mr. Cohen said.

A letter was mailed to every Jewish organization this week under the signature of Max L. Grant president and J. I. Cohen executive secretary, asking the officers and committees to keep in close touch with the Community Calendar. The telephone number is

New Lighting System Combats Terrorism

Flood Lamps Make Streets Safer

Jerusalem — Soon Jerusalem will be turned into a city of perpetual day in an effort to combat terrorism on its streets.

Powerful daylight floodlamps will be erected at all the principal crossings in the city. Fifteen stands of these lights, costing £200 (\$1000) each, are being installed by the municipal government.

The lamps throw a bright greenish-blue light, similar to the Cooper-Hewitt light used in film studios, illuminating a radius of several hundred feet so brightly that fine print can be read with ease.

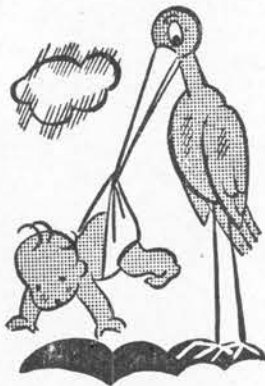
The fifteen new stands will turn Jerusalem's main arteries into rivers of blue. Later the city council plans to set up more of the lamps.

End Will Justify Means In Ghetto Stork Derby

New York.—A stork derby this week replaced the lower East Side's No More Babies strike, which started last October as a protest against slum conditions.

Mrs. Yetta Rothman, the Henry Street steamroller, who promoted the strike, is the moving spirit behind the stork derby. The idea, she says, is sweeping the Ghetto.

"No houses. No babies." That



was the by-word of the baby-strike, staged in an effort to induce Mayor LaGuardia to build low-rent housing projects on the East Side.

World United Front Against Goga Sought

Iron Guard Bolts Goga

BUCHAREST — The Fascist Iron Guards withdrew from participation in Rumania's electoral campaign.

After a meeting of the Iron Guard Senate, Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, Iron Guard chief, referred in a communique to the incident of last Sunday in which two Iron Guardists were killed by gendarmes.

Addressing the government, Codreanu said:—

"We do not want to hinder the government's work but we want to emphasize that we will never forget what happened and that the government in the future will seek our hand in vain."

Demand Equal Status For Jews

Roumanian Govt. Informed of Action

New York.—The American Jewish Congress served notice on Rumania this week that it would seek a united front of Christian and Jewish opinion throughout the world to compel Rumania to bring about the restoration to the Jews of the rights of which they are now being deprived and the setting up of new safeguards which would assure them full equality status in Rumania.

The Rumanian Government was informed that American Jewry would fight the attempt to seek solution of the Rumanian Jewish problem by forced migration from Rumania and that the action to assure legal redress for them would continue.

Anti-Semitism in Rumania was described as an extension of the anti-democratic front bound to be followed by an attack upon other minority groups in Rumania and the suppression of civil liberties.

That Man's Here Again! Kuhn Chides Legion, Jews

New Milford.—A stinging attack on Jews was made by Fritz Kuhn, of New York, national leader of the German-American Bund, in a meeting at the home of Miss Caroline Meade here.

Mr. Kuhn said the Jews in this country would have to be ousted from their high places in government, finance and education, "if the United States is to be saved from Communism."

The Committee for Industrial Organization, he said, is "a Communist organization", of which John L. Lewis is just the "figure-head".

He charged that \$2,500,000 "in Russian gold" has been dumped into this country to propagandize for Communism, but that "not even Germany" is supporting the Bund.

About 200 persons attended the meeting, including, as guests, seven Legionnaires and Mayor George Mack.

Kuhn chided the Legion for its opposition to the Bund, saying it and the Legion had a common foe in Communism. He denied that he advocated Nazism for this country.

Sentence Imposed for Use of False Passport

Rotterdam. — Freidrich Adler, world renowned leader of the labor movement in the Socialist International was sentenced to four months in prison for gaining entrance into Holland on a false report.

Charges were brought against Mr. Adler, who is the general secretary of the International, by the reactionary mayor of Rotterdam. The arrest was made last August, but due to intervention on the part of prominent Socialist leaders, he was freed on bail until his trial this month at which he was convicted and sentenced.

Not to Restrict Jewish Rights in Austria

VIENNA.—Sholom Asch, noted writer, was assured by Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg that Jewish rights in Austria will not be restricted. The statement was made during the course of a private interview granted the Yiddish novelist. At the same time the Chancellor donated 10,000 schillings to the Jewish community's winter

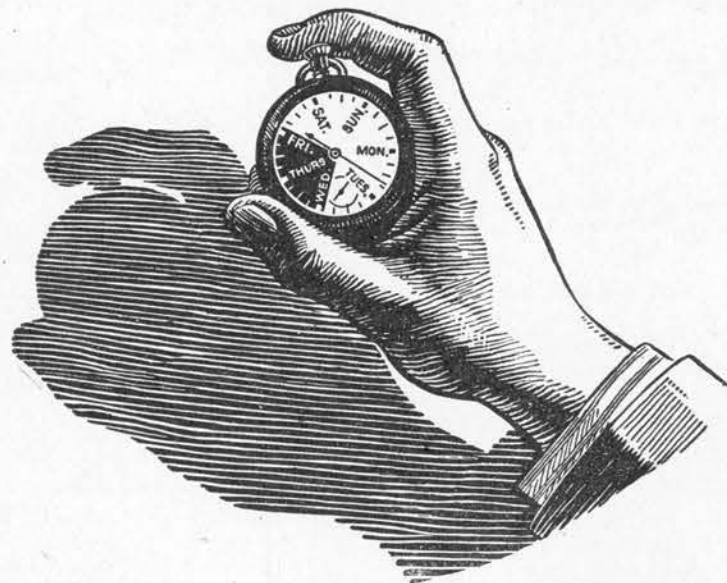

Hitler's Paintings Sought— Not Because They're Art

VIENNA — The market is booming for the pictures which Adolf Hitler painted during his youth in Vienna.

Although they are simple water colors, of uncertain perspective, showing rather conventional street scenes, the asking price for the few still available is about \$400 each.

Art dealers say Hitler produced twenty pictures at most in the

two years when he eked out an existence by selling his paintings for a few pennies each. He was then about twenty years old, and lack of artistic talent barred his entry to the Vienna Academy of Art.

Dealers say that it is hardly the artistic value that makes the paintings sought after. It is the Hitler autograph.

The market is kept strong by sales to Germans living in Vienna to whom two motives are attributed:

- (1) Interest in the early years of Der Fuehrer's life.
- (2) A desire to get the pictures out of circulation.

Sent Back to Germany

A German journalist and an official of the Reich are the two most avid collectors. Both send whatever Hitler pictures they can find back to Germany.

Faked Hitlers have appeared in Vienna, and at least one painter was charged with attempts to swindle by passing them for originals.

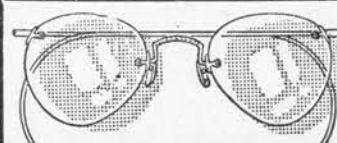
At the annual meeting of the Jewish Center Council held Thursday evening plans were made for this affair.

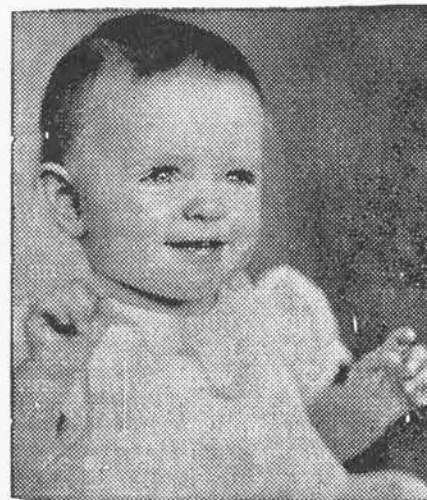

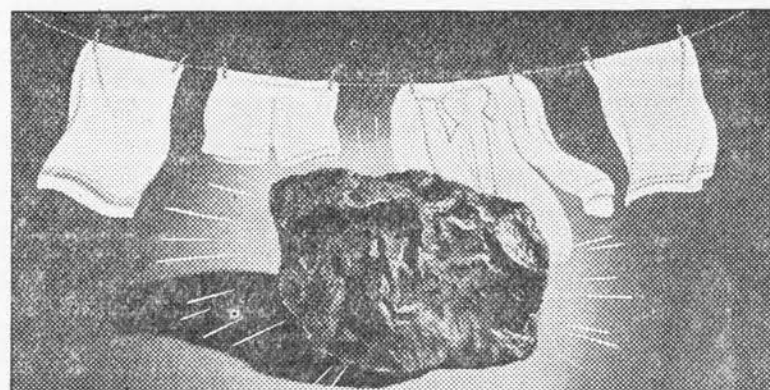
