## James W. Wise Returns From Spain

Says Jewish Boys Making Fine Record

New York—"The morale of the Spanish people is magnificent and their victory over Franco is inevitable," declared James Waterman Wise before reporters last week, upon his return to this country from Spain. Mr. Wise went to Spain as a special correspondent for the New York Post.

He said that he met a number of Jewish boys from various parts of the U. S. and stated that "... they are establishing a great record as good fighters and friends of the Spanish, of which all Jews should be proud."

Mr. Wise said there are thousands of German-Jewish refugees in Barcelona who, owing to war conditions and their unfamiliarity with the language, are in great need. The Loyalist government is helping them as much as it can, but Mr. Wise opined that such organizations as the American Jewish Congress and the Joint Distribution Committee, should take energetic steps toward aiding them.

## Bund Handbill Passer Picks Dispute With Wrong Person

New York — Mrs. Esther Eichel testified in Yorkville Court this week that when she remarked to her husband that "the Nazis are getting active again," a man who

was passing out German-American Bund handbills shouted at her:—

"Oh! You don't like it. Wait, the Germans are coming over here and will chase all you Jews back to Jerusalem. You Rebecca!"

Mrs. Eichel found a policeman who arrested Carl Krash, 27, unemployed, on a charge of disorderly conduct, and Magistrate Morris Rothenberg held him in bail of \$1,500, over the protest of a large group of persons from Yorkville who went to court in his behalf.

Mrs. Eichel said she was walking with her husband, Dr. Emil Eichel, a dentist, when two men pressed circulars into their hands advertising a meeting and saying:

"Help build the fighting movement of the 100,000,000 Aryan (white Gentile) Americans to stamp out Jewish-Atheistic Communist international outlawry."

Mrs. Eichel said:—As a Jew and as an American, I resented the circular.

She swore to complaints against both men, but only Krash was held in bail, a summons being issued for his companion.

## Nazis Extend Rule To Foreign Germans

Berlin.—The German Government by a special law published here required Germans abroad to register with German authorities just as citizens at home must be registered with the police.

It is prescribed that Germans who live in other countries longer than three months must register with German Consular authorities, in this way extending the influence of the German Fascist state into all democratic countries where Germans reside.

## Dickstein Assails Reich Order Here

Rule Affects More Than 500,000

Washington — Representative Dickstein (Dem., N. Y.), questioning the good faith of a Berlin edict against German membership in the Amerika-Deutsche Volksbund, called for an expanded investigation of Nazi activities in the United States.

"I wouldn't believe them, German officials) under oath when they say they have ordered all German citizens to get out of the Nazi groups in this country," said Dickstein, chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

500,000 Nationals in U. S.

Official quarters at Berlin said that Germany has forbidden her nationals in the United States—some 500,000 persons—from future membership in the Bund or any similar organization. Those who already belong, it was added must resign.

German Ambassador Hans Dieckhoff handed Secretary Hull a copy of the order.

## Clean Nazi "Spots" In New Orleans

New Orleans.—The Jewish Community of this city gained a victory over the local Nazis when the State Board of Education announced that it will completely reorganize the Italian and German afternoon classes that are being conducted in the public school buildings.

Rabbi Emil Leinitzer, heading a delegation of prominent Jewish leaders protested against these classes stating that they were a nest for fascistic and Nazi propaganda.

## Husband Cancels Stop-Credit Ad

New York—Michael Goldstein, of the Bronx, advertised in the papers that he now was responsible for his wife's debts, reversing the usual public declaration in such cases.

Mrs. Lillian Goldstein, asked why her husband did it, replied, "Because I'm back again."

"Were you away long?"

"Just a few weeks."

"What was the trouble?"

"A misunderstanding."

"Did Mr. Goldstein advertise at first that he would not be responsible for your debts?"

"Yes."

## Holland Admits 1317 Refugees in 1937

Amsterdam, Holland. — The stream of Jewish refugees from Nazi Germany continued unabated in the fifth year of the Nazi regime, figures for 1937 published by the Amsterdam Committee, an affiliate of the IASICA Emigration Association, show. During the year, 1,317 refugees were admitted for temporary refuge in the Netherlands.

Berlin.—The Nazi Women's Organization is to have a school for brides in the belief that preparation is required for happiness in marriage.

The Japanese idea of carefully instructing girls to become perfect wives will find practical application in Germany when the first bride school opens this month.

Authorities defined the purpose of the school thus: "In circles of twenty students, the young girls should attend courses at the Institute preferably two months before their wedding day, to recuperate spiritually and physically, to forget the daily worries connected with their previous professions, to find the way and to feel the joy for their new lives as wives."

Molding the factory girl and office worker into a hausfrau is the school's main aim.

## Sinclair Lewis Takes Academy Nomination

NEW YORK — Sinclair Lewis, the only American novelist ever to win the Nobel Prize for literature, has accepted membership in the American Academy of Arts and Letters, which some years ago he denounced with all the vigor of a George F. Babbitt speaking against poolrooms before the Zenith Rotary Club.

When he appeared before the Swedish Academy back in 1930, to accept the Nobel award, Mr. Lewis castigated the American Academy declaring that "it does not represent literary America today; it represents only Henry Wadsworth Longfellow."

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## Rich Endek Leader Jailed for Activities

Lwow, Poland.—A court yesterday sentenced to a two-year prison term at hard labor Adam Doboszynski, wealthy land owner and Krakow Endek Leader, who on June 23, 1936, led a uniformed band of his followers in a midnight anti-Semitic raid on the town of Myszlenice. Doboszynski will have to serve only four months of the term, the court deducting 20 months for the time spent under preventative arrest.


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
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### Anti-Jewish Boycott

To what extent the recession in the wave of violence in Poland against the Jews may be considered a permanent improvement depends upon two factors; on the easing of the boycott and the vigilance of the Government authorities. The experience of the past two years has shown that most of the anti-Jewish excesses took place in connection with the boycott.

And, it must be noted that the boycott is legal, becoming illegal when it is carried out in a manner affecting the public peace and order, a distinction which is maintained with difficulty.

Despite the fact that conditions in Poland have taken a back seat because of disturbances in Roumania and Austria, the anti-Jewish boycott in Poland has increased in extent and intensity.

To this end proclamations have been issued calling upon the Christian population to support Polish commerce, industry and the liberal professions. There is to be no compromise with the Jews; and this less dramatic, but effective method, of pogrom has placed the Polish Jew in a precarious position.

### Guilty

We don't know whether Pastor Niemoeller is guilty of the charges for which he was now on trial in Berlin.

Some of the charges are of a kind to which a true Christian would be proud to plead guilty.

We do know that Pastor Niemoeller has at last fallen into a Nazi trap. His accusers picked his counsel; the trial is being held in secret.

Niemoeller, in indignation, is reported to have told his friends that if this was the sort of fairness he could expect, "he would act like Jesus before Pilate."

To act like Jesus, in the Third Reich, is to convict oneself under the non-Aryan clause.—N. Y. Post.

### Rumania Plans Crown Council; to Limit Vote

BUCHAREST — The Rumanian government was reported today to be planning further reorganization providing for a crown

council headed by the new Premier, Dr. Miron Cristea, patriarch of the Rumanian Orthodox church.

Former Premier George Tatar-escu was favored to replace Dr. Cristea as Premier, but there would be no change from the present course of Dr. Cristea.

Meanwhile, Octavian Goga, the anti-Semitic Premier whose government was dissolved by King Carol, has gone to Switzerland to be treated for a heart attack he sustained last Saturday.

### Hadassah to Buy Galilee Acreage

#### Chapters Asked To Raise Funds

In order to "extend the frontiers of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine" Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, and Junior Hadassah will purchase 20,000 dunams (5,000 acres) of land in Upper Galilee for the Jewish National Fund, Zionist land-holding agency.

Mrs. Herman Shulman, national secretary of Hadassah, said that the senior and junior divisions of Hadassah will ask their 500 chapters throughout the country to raise \$500,000 for the purchase of the Galilee area, which is a portion of a 27,000 acre tract in northern Palestine, bordering the Syrian frontier, that the Jewish National Fund hopes in time to acquire.

**BOOK NOTES**

Maurice L. Stollerman, Orphanage Head, Writes Book on Child Guidance

By MRS. MORRIS L. COWEN

It is a privilege to review a book written by a Providence author—especially when the author is so well known to us all. For many years Maurice Stollerman has been superintendent of our Jewish Orphanage, and has endeared himself not only to the many children who have come under his supervision, but also to all members of our community.

Mr. Stollerman's excellent training and years of experience have made it possible for him to write a book on child guidance. He knows and understands children and writes with that realism that comes from sure knowledge. In his book, called "Cornerstones in Child Guidance," the author offers a sound philosophy regarding the relationship between parent (or guardian) and child. Mr. Stollerman states that "... the guidance of children in sound social behavior is as much of an education process, involving the philosophy of pedagogy, as is the teaching of reading, writing and arithmetic."

How, then, can we apply child guidance in the rearing and developing of our children? We are told that it cannot be applied "as if it were a coat of paint."

We, as parents, must first be equipped with knowledge and understanding. This parent-child relationship is felt to be the very core of our whole problem, and we cannot—we must not—escape this relation and its obligations. Hence, our best recourse seems to be to understand it; and understanding ourselves first may be the quickest and most expedient way to understand our children.

Parents are all too ready to administer punishment for any misbehavior their children may be guilty of, without first analysing the whole situation. Usually the punishment is entirely unrelated to the crime, and therefore, is most ineffective as a remedial measure.

Mr. Stollerman cites an incident of an adolescent youngster, who persisted in breaking windows in his neighborhood. The youth's father punished him by sending him to bed after his supper. Now, then, what relationship can there possibly be between sleeping and breaking windows? None, whatever—and such treatment will do no good. True enough, the father has asserted himself, has displayed his authority, but he has not done the youth one mite of good. The destructive tendency in that child has not been discouraged. "The

wrongful act of breaking windows must be capitalized on as a medium for an educational object lesson for the child." The author then proceeds to give us some sound practical advice that will help us cope with such problems more intelligently.

Very often a child becomes a behavior problem because he is misunderstood at home. He may not be endowed with superior intelligence, he may even be a bit slow, but his parents continually find fault with him. They hold up as examples his brighter brothers and sisters, and parents often feel that the fault lies with the child. Every child wants encouragement—must be given attention so that he will not develop an inferiority complex.

Mr. Stollerman proceeds to build his structure in child guidance, adding block after block of sound advice and methods of procedure. There are chapters dealing with the growing child, the adolescent, and on the need and importance of the juvenile court.

This should prove a valuable handbook to all parents and should help to make for a better understanding in the home.

## Constant Blood Transfusions Needed By Brooklyn Woman

New York—A woman who lives a normal life, though she has not a drop of her own blood in her body, is in Kings County Hospital today for her fortieth transfusion.

Medical science is perplexed by her case. She keeps alive and active on blood supplied by other persons, but her body fails to create its own blood supply.

Yet, Mrs. Esther Feuer, who is 51, goes daily about the burdensome task of trying to keep her little home together in Brooklyn. She has the color of death in her face and a strange blue-white cast to her eyes.

Her affliction is called aplastic anemia and has attracted the attention of specialists, including several from the Rockefeller Institute, but they have been unable to explain her case fully.

There is hope for her, hope that, eventually, her body may return to the normal function of creating its own blood; but until that time she must be given a transfusion about once every two weeks. The hospital needs about a dozen donors and each of these must be capable of providing two or three transfusions.

Up to now, relatives have been able to borrow money enough to pay for about half the transfusions. The social service unit of the hospital has advanced funds for the rest. "If," said one of her doctors, "she gets these transfusions punctually, she may go on to live a useful existence and it

is possible that after a series of steady transfusions, she might start creating her own blood. As it is, she could not live more than twenty days if the transfusions were ended."

Mrs. Feuer is stoutly built, pleasant in her personality, educated and entertaining. She eats well, maintains her weight, but her color is that of death. After a transfusion she is active, goes shopping, entertains and leads a perfectly normal existence.

"But there is always that fear that the next blood donor will not be forthcoming."

## Not Home To An Emperor; Slept While Selassie Knocked

NEW YORK: Deborah Kallen is back in America—for a visit. A half-hour with Miss Kallen convinces one that Palestine has become the "homeland" of this daughter of a cultured Boston family.

Interviewed in the home of her equally well-known brother, Dr. (and Professor) Horace Kallen, 417 West 120th street, Miss Kallen was as demure as her first name about her adventures in Palestine. "My permanent home?—well, 'permanence' is a far-reaching term—but I can't conceive of myself working anywhere else except in Palestine," said Miss Kallen. This statement is the keynote to Deborah Kallen's character. Friends and co-workers sit around in this razzle-dazzle town and listen, open-mouthed, to Deborah Kallen's adventures as head and founder of the School of The Parents Association, devoted to art education in Jerusalem, Palestine.

### Emperor to Call

Because we honestly believe Deborah Kallen is unaware of her shining courage, we tell the stories of Palestine on which she sets least store. There was the day the British Consul called her up. Her school at that time was housed in an Abyssinian palace built by a grandparent of Haile Selassie. "The Emperor is here. He will visit the palace tomorrow at 4 o'clock in the afternoon—the Queen will be with him, possibly other members of the royal family," said the British Consul.

"I lived alone in the palace," said Miss K. "The pupils and the other members of the faculty lived out. The next morning at 8 o'clock the bell of the postern gate rang. I looked out the window—there was the Emperor standing before my gate. Is this 4 o'clock, I said to myself. It took me some time to get dressed, and when I got to the door, the Emperor was gone—gone!"

A few hours later, the British Consul called, "Miss Kallen, the Emperor was there this morning

—and you did not answer the door," he said sorrowfully, a little awfully. "He came very early—he was to come at 4 o'clock. He was gone when I was dressed to answer the bell," she explained. But the Emperor and the Queen, a prince and a princess of the royal family came back that morning at 11 o'clock. "They were quiet, cultured folk. I liked them," said Miss Kallen.

### Trough Trip Bullets

One night Miss Kallen heard a shot. An Arab uprising. A bullet whizzed through her window. The palace was built a la dormitory; a wide hall—rooms opposite each other. "I thought it best to close the window—then though again. If I closed the window, the bullet might be deflected by the glass—there was no one occupying the room opposite. For the rest of the night the bullets came through went straight through the room, across the corridor of the Palace and out the window of the unoccupied room."

Thus does Deborah Kallen talk of Emperors and of bullets whizzing through her bedroom. She'll go back to Palestine as soon as she is through with her committee here. "We need scholarships for our school—America will provide them," she declared.

## Habimah Successful Despite Press Attack

Belgrad—The world tour of the Habimah theatrical troupe had a narrow escape from tragedy in Belgrade when a high-powered bomb set to explode during one of the company's performances was accidentally discovered in the nick of time. The attempt to blow up the theatre climaxed a bitter campaign against the Habimah in the anti-Semitic press which has been warning that the Hebrew players are provoking the people by giving plays in Hebrew. Despite these attacks, however, Habimah has had an amazing success in Yugoslavia.

## Hits New High at Carnegie Hall Debut

### Cantor Kusewitsky Impresses Audience

NEW YORK—A Jewish cantor, Mojzesz Kusewitsky of the Tlomatzka Orthodox Synagogue of Warsaw, Poland, made his first American appearance on the stage of Carnegie Hall last Saturday evening, and there displayed one of the most sensational tenor voices heard in many a moon. It may be that in Southeastern Europe, the traditional land of florid male singing, there are other tenors who can equal him in range and dexterity. However, he is unmatched by anyone before the American public.

Here is a tenor who takes one high d after another, with full brilliant chest voice, who sings rapid coloratura and who has a perfect trill. A real trill is a rarity in any day, but a tenor who can do a perfect trill with full voice on a high B flat has been practically unheard of in this country.

For his own racial music, the thirty-eight-year-old cantor has an authentic great voice, which he uses with unusual communicative fervor. Doubtless if he could be trained in European traditions of song, he might become one of the great singers of our concert and opera stage.

## Dr. Goldstein Names Eight Great Jews

New York—Who are the greatest living Jews? Eight men—out of 15,525,000 Jews.

"In the first rank of greatest living Jews," said Dr. Goldstein, "are Professor Albert Einstein, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Leon Blum, Justice Louis D. Brandeis, Lord Herbert Samuel, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Prof. Sigmund Freud, and Dr. Cyrus Adler."

Dr. Goldstein is himself famous as leader of New York's 104-year-old congregation, B'nai Jeshurun, and is the fifth-time president of the Jewish National Fund of America. This is the way he figures it:

"The Criteria for judging a great Jew should take into account not only his contribution to science, culture and human relations, but also his self-recognition as a Jew and his self-identification among Jews."

## Mexico Orders Census of Aliens

### Measure Aimed Chiefly at Jews

MEXICO CITY — The Department of the Interior asked all State Governors to make a census of foreigners under their jurisdictions and report their occupations.

The order was a belated result of the campaign waged last year against "undesirable immigrants" aimed mostly at Jews alleged to have entered the country promising to follow agricultural pursuits but instead displacing Mexicans in commerce.

The campaign caused President Lazaro Cardenas last July to decree measures aimed at protecting small merchants. Included in the decree was a provision for a census to determine whether the activities of foreigners were in accordance with their admission pledges.
