Pope Aids Survivors Of Wireless Inventor

Helps Widow Of German Jew

Vatican City—Pope Pius instructed Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, London, to deliver all generous sum" to the family of Heinrich Hertz, famous German physicist, after learning they were in financial straits.

Hertz's widow and two daughters, who fled from Germany and live in England, are Protestants. He was the son of a baptized Jew.

Hertz died in 1894 when he was not yet 37, after discovering Hertzian waves and proving their existence by transmitting the first wireless telegraph signal. His invention made both wireless and radio possible.

He narrowly missed discovering X-ray in his researches into the discharge of electricity in rarefied gases and made a number of discoveries of great importance.

Congress Arranges Direct Vote Dates

New York—The American Jewish Congress today made public "A Call to American Jews" to participate in elections to be held June 25, 26 and 27 for delegates to an emergency convention of the congress in New York in September.

The convention, second of its kind in the history of American Jewry, will deliberate on the defense of Jewish rights in Austria, Germany, Poland, Rumania and other parts of the world. It will be held in conjunction with a session of the Administrative Committee of the World Jewish Congress, which is also being arranged for September in New York.

Fascists Create Riot In Theatre District

London—British Fascists staged one of their biggest demonstrations last week end when they invaded London's West End.

Mounted police were called out to break up the throngs that gathered to participate and watch the street fighting. The demonstration took place during the height of night club and theatre activities. Some of the night spots closed their doors to regular patrons, admitting only those who had reserved tables.

The London Fascists, led by Sir Oswald Mosley, have been active in anti-Semitic activity for the past two or three years and have been met with physical resistance a number of times during their demonstrations and parades.

Ban Anti-Semitic Newspaper In Harbin

Harbin, Manchukuo — Nash Put, the extremist anti-Semitic White Guardist newspaper was padlocked by authorities here. During the past five and one half years, this paper carried on a violent anti-Jewish campaign throughout the Far East. Several prominent Jewish citizens of Manchukuo were hurt as a result of this campaign; stores owned by Jewish merchants were burnt and several Jewish students have been attacked in local universities.

Los Angeles.—Joe Axelrod didn't mind so much being held on a charge of assault, but he would appreciate a few minutes of freedom to apologize to two of his best customers.

Axelrod was turning up the fire under a pot of gravy when two drunks sauntered up to his lunch counter, where T. Rosner and Nathan Gooden, customers for years, were sitting.

Axelrod saw one drunk dripping catsup onto a showcase and the other drawing figures on the walls with mustard.

He reached under the counter and whipped out an antiquated revolver. He commanded the strangers to stop. Without even looking at him each picked up a counter

stool and began taking it apart.

Axelrod fired. The bullet struck Rosner in the right arm. Axelrod pulled the trigger again. Gooden was hit in the arm.

The strangers sauntered out and Axelrod went to jail.

Hadassah to Help Austrian Youth

Austrian Jewish youth can be saved, cabled Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah and of its Youth Aliyah movement to Mrs. Saul Abrams, head of the local Hadassah Chapter. Jewish youth, at least, can be rescued from the horrors of Nazi persecution and the slow strangulation of Jewish life, continued the cablegram.

At present, an unlimited number of Jewish students can be brought into Palestine without regard to the regular immigration quotas. As students, Austrian Jewish youth can be brought into Palestine in as great numbers as Youth Aliyah movement can finance.

In this crisis, Austrian Jewry looks to America as its greatest single aid.

Future of Palestine Depends on Path Britain Takes, Says Journalist

America and Palestine are the two focal points on which the survival of the Jewish people must be based and the future of the Jewish people as a whole lies in its indestructible hope in Palestine, it was declared by Alexander L. Easterman, famous British journalist, who arrived here last week on the S. S. Queen Mary for a tour of the United States.

"The future of the Jewish people as a whole lies in its indestructible hope in Palestine. The Jewish state is still, however, far from realization and the prospects are none too bright, Mr. Eastman said.

"Britain does not, I think, consciously betray the Jewish people of its Palestine destiny but the distractions of a threatening European imperil the honor of her promise to the Jews.

"I cannot honestly eradicate a feeling of pessimism about Palestine. The nearer another great war approaches the less inclined will Britain be, in my view, to create the Independent Jewish State foreshaw-

port in any emergency of war because that coming struggle will be, in the last analysis, a struggle between Fascism and Democracy and it is unthinkable that the Jews could be on any other side but democracy.



America Not Immune To Fascist Peril-Ickes

Find Leader and Hitler Will Fall, Says Publisher

New York—The April issue of Judge Magazine contains an editorial which proposes that some one great Jew come forward to lead world Jewry in a militant fight against anti-Semitism. Written by the magazine's publisher, Harry Newman, who despite his name is an Irishman, the editorial declares that Jews "need some great figure to step from the ranks of business, or the law, or finance," to lead their "legions in attack."

Mr. Newman asserts that the time has come for Jews to fight. "Too long," he claims, have they left explanations to their rabbis, but this will not do "since the world accepts their statements as part of their job."

New York—A \$4,500 Exile Prize Contest for the best German-language manuscript submitted by any writer now in exile for political reasons was announced by Little, Brown Company, publishers, in cooperation with the American Guild for Cultural Freedom and four European publishing houses.

The manuscripts, fiction or non-fiction and between 50,000 and 200,000 words in length, must be submitted to the guild by October 1.

Warning Given At Dinner For Paper

Chicago—Secretary of the Interior Ickes has sounded a warning that "Fascism—arrogant, devoid of conscience and knowing no mercy for man, woman or child—is on the march."

Speaking at a dinner commemorating the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the Jewish Daily Courier, Ickes said "Fascism is the deadly and insidious foe that we must prepare to combat without loss of time."

His address, entitled "Progress by Purges," was broadcast over a nation-wide hookup.

"Let us make no mistake," he said. "Totalitarianism is a real threat to our institutions. More and more people are coming to recognize the danger even to America of this ruthless political monster that hunts by day and prowls by night.

Increasing Concern

"They are coming to realize that unless we are luckier than we are likely to be, our concern for the safety of our democratic institutions will increase rather than diminish."

not in sympathy with such tactics."

Mr. Newman suggests as candidates for Jewish leadership Justice Brandeis, Governor Lehman, Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau and Bernard M. Baruch.

He urges them to proclaim their withdrawal from public life and business to lead their people against their enemies.

He also calls upon such noted newspaper publishers as Arthur Hays Sulzberger, J. David Stern, Paul Block and Moses Annenberg to "roll your mighty presses into the teeth of your petty attackers."

Mr. Newman calls on the Jews to fight. "You don't need armies and navies," he says. "You need only a fighting leader to mass behind him the great intelligence and ability you already possess, to make a mass attack. Fame beyond the power of man to measure waits for such a leader."

And if such a leader is found Mr. Newman predicts that within 30 days Hitler will be made "the most ridiculous man alive" and in six months he will be removed from the leadership of the German people by the Germans themselves.

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Palestine to be Represented at Fair Without British Indorsement

New York—Although Great Britain has withheld her official indorsement, Palestine will be represented at the 1939 New York World's Fair through the support of an American committee, it was announced this week. Plans for a Palestine building to be located near the Hall of Religion are now being drawn by Architect Norwin R. Lindheim and El-Hanani, a Tel Aviv designer. Mr. Lindheim arrived from Palestine five weeks ago. El-Hanani, who has lived in Tel Aviv for fifteen years, migrating there from Kiev, Russia, arrived in New York last Monday.

The two Palestine artists are working in the World's Fair headquarters in the Empire State Building, under the direction of Meyer W. Weisgal, executive director of the governing board in charge of the Palestine building.

While Great Britain withheld the indorsement that would make the building an official national exhibit, British and Palestine officials are co-operating in producing the Palestine Center, Mr. Weisgal said this week. Difficulties between Arabs and the Jews in Palestine prevented the country from erect-

ing its own building, Mr. Weisgal explained.

Plans show a long, low building with a large domed annex, to occupy 12,444 square feet. Its form is to suggest the level coastal plain and the low, round mountains of Palestine, the architect explained. Through a series of halls in the main part of the building, past and present Palestine will be portrayed.

The domed section will house a diorama more than 100 feet wide revealing in miniature the whole Palestine country. By use of lights, a full twenty-four-hour day in Palestine will be portrayed through the diorama.

"We shall make no attempt to introduce propaganda against any government, no matter how brutal that government may have been to Jews," Mr. Weisgal explained. "We will show what a people can accomplish if left to themselves to live in peace." It is understood money for the building will be subscribed privately.

The campaign is being conducted by the Joint Home Finding Committee for Jewish Foster Children, 329 East Sixty-second Street.

The child adopted by Mrs. Rosen was born in a city hospital two months ago. He mother was too ill to care for her, her grandmother too old and infirm to take her in charge.

Enjoyment of the job is the first requisite for good foster parents, according to Mrs. Arthur Lehman, chairman of the home-finding committee. The agencies behind the committee, affiliated with the Fed-

eration for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, provide board, clothing and medical and dental care for the children as long as they remain with the foster parents.

The children may not be adopted, the way being kept open for their return to their real parents if circumstances permit.

Denies Tie-up With Austrian Bayer Firm

New York—Profits of Bayer aspirin sold in this country ultimately reach Germany because the Bayer Company here is connected with the German dyes trust, the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League declared in commenting on a statement by Harvey Mann, president of the Bayer Company, that his firm had no connection with Germany because it had purchased the American firm from the Alien Property Custodian after the World War.

Mr. Mann's statement was made in connection with reports from Budapest that the Hungarian Pharmaceutical Company, Hungarian representative of Bayer's aspirin, had dismissed 13 employes, because they are of non-Aryan origin.

Polish Sejm Passes Bill to Ban Shechita

Warsaw—The Sejm (Chamber of Deputies) has passed the Dudzinski bill for complete prohibition of shechita, which has been under partial ban since the beginning of 1936. The bill then went to the Senate, where no date for discussion of the proposal has been set yet.

The measure was voted over the objections of the government, voiced by the Vice-Minister of Agriculture. The only other votes against it were cast by the three Jewish deputies, the Ukrainian representatives and a few Polish legislators.



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

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Wanted: a Leader

In the April edition of Judge there appears an article written by Mr. Newman, the publisher and an Irishman, to the effect that if Brandeis, Cardozo, Morgenthau and Baruch resigned their present positions and assumed leadership of the Jews they could inspire sufficient co-operation to drive that devil Hitler from his Aryan throne within six months.

Although Mr. Newman's proposal isn't as simple as it sounds, the idea projected will be welcomed in many Jewish circles who have insisted that the need for virgorous leadership has grown imperative. Many of the old stalwarts have gone or have lost their magnetism.

The names suggested by Mr. Newman virtually eliminate themselves. Brandeis is past 80. Morgenthau hasn't the prestige or the dynamic energy needed. Lehman would probably shy at such a task. And Baruch has rarely been identified with things Jewish.

But the probability is that the fight will continue to be waged by a slowly uniting Jewish community with the increasing aid and co-operation of the Christian world.

To Fine Community If Jews Avoid Tax

Berlin.—It was announced here by Herr Mutschmann, Gauleiter of Saxony, the possibility that the whole Jewish community will be held liable if a Jew leaves the country without settling his tax bills. Addressing a crowded meeting in Dresden, Herr Mutschmann stated that a Jewish shop owner recently succeeded in fleeing to a foreign country while still owing the government several hundred thousand marks.

"It is necessary to consider," he declared, "whether in such cases all the Jews in the town should not be held responsible for losses of this kind."



As A Race, Jews Have Vanished, Says Traveling Artist-Author

New York: Lionel S. Reiss, who has traveled the seven seas and on four continents to seek out and paint members of the Jewish race, believes he has at last established a new anthropological fact, or rather dis-established an old one.

A short, stocky man with a shy smile and stiff gray hair and mustache, he sat in his skylighted studio-workshop the other day and announced there is no such thing as a Jewish race as such. "The Jews were thought to be the purest of all races," he said, edging forward in his chair and flicking ashes on the bare floor, "But the people who thought so didn't take the trouble to look up the facts."

On European Jews

In Europe, he continued, the Jew is as much European as any other race. "Old Jewish families in Germany are so Germanic they would be insulted if called anything else," he added. From a sheaf of sketches on a battered drawing table, he sorted out a picture of an old German-Jewish woman. "She's a typical German hausfrau," he said, "ruddy-faced and stout. As you can see, her entire facial arrangement is German." Mr. Reiss has spent twelve years in pursuit of his idea. The results of his journeys and studies are a pile of 300 paintings and drawings, and a new book, "My Models Were Jews."

He fingered a second drawing and offered it for inspection. "This is an English girl," he explained. "She's fair-haired, athletic and has gray eyes. The structure of her face and head is definitely English and she speaks with a cultured English accent, but she's Jewish none the less." Mr. Reiss said that the Jews, even in language and motions, become a part of races with whom they live.

Further Proof

As additional proof of the outgrowth of what he calls "this leveling-off process," the artist held up a picture of a Russian refugee. "I met him at Vilna," he said. "He wore the typical garb of a Russian workman. He had Slavic cheekbones and slanting Mongoloid eyes. He had the straggly hair, beard and

mustache of a Russian, but he spoke to me in Yiddish."

Mr. Reiss crossed many strange borders and little-traveled frontiers in northern Africa and Asia. In Palestine he found a Bokharan Jew. "That man," he recalled, "could not be told from his Persian or Arabian neighbors and might easily be mistaken for a Bedouin tribesman. But he has moved into Palestine and has become a farmer."

Putting down the picture, Mr. Reiss lighted another cigaret and watched the smoke drift into the brilliant sunlight. After a long pause he observed:—"The Bedouins of today in Palestine and Arabia are nearer to being pure Semites than any Jews in the world."

Fire Traps Dog; Fireman Saves It

New York—A black spaniel, trapped by fire and smoke on the third floor of Morris Chorost's upholstery plant at 1,025 Broadway, Brooklyn, was rescued by a city fireman.

Hero of the rescue was Fireman Raymond Weiss, of Hook and Ladder Co. 129, who observed the dog at a top floor window.
