Cardozo to Resign From Supreme Court

To Retire at Next Congress Session

Washington — Associate Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo of New York, sixty-eight-year-old liberal, will not return to the Supreme Court when it reconvenes in October after the summer recess. He is suffering from a serious heart ailment and is understood to have informed his associates that he does not expect his health to permit further active service on the bench.

His formal retirement probably will be deferred until January, even though he is not able to come back to Washington next fall. Since no President has ever made a recess appointment to the court, and it is doubtful whether President Roosevelt would do so, there will be no reason for Cardozo to surrender his seat until Congress reconvenes and the Senate is on hand to confirm his successor.

World Labor Raps Nazi Anti-Semitism

Geneva—A resolution demanding condemnation of discrimination against Jewish workers in Germany and other countries was introduced at the opening of the twenty-fourth session of the International Labor Conference.

Leon Jouhaux, French labor leader, presented the resolution asking action by the United States, Canada and forty-seven other nations, including most of the Latin American countries represented at the conference.

Waldemar Falcao, Brazilian Minister of Labor, was elected president of the international meeting of government officials, workers' delegates and representatives of employers organizations.

Express Concern on Palestine Recession

New York—The Palestine Economic Corporation, reporting that the corporation and its subsidiaries loaned or invested a total of \$2,385,000 during 1937, expresses "grave concern" over the economic situation in Palestine, in its eleventh annual report, which was made public by Bernard Flexner, chairman of the board.

However, the report notes "a basic strength in the economic life of the country. Although recessions have occurred in some fields, development and progress have been made in others."

Mural Depicts Flight of Jews to America

Highstown, N. J.—The story of the flight of Jews from pogroms abroad to a new and happier life in America is unfolded in a series of graphic group studies making up a mural 48 feet long by 12 feet high which was unveiled in the new \$80,000 schoolhouse of Jersey home-steads, the cooperative industrial agricultural settlement of Jewish needleworkers established here by the Rural Resettlement Administration.

H. G. Kretchmer Dies After Leg Amputation

New York—Herman Gabriel Kretchmer, member of the editorial staff of the Jewish Daily Forward for twenty-five years and author of plays and novels written in Yiddish, died last week at Israel Zion Hospital, Brooklyn. He was fifty-five years old. He served as city and labor editor on the Forward.

Mr. Kretchmer died following the amputation of his right leg in an unsuccessful attempt to stop the spread of gangrene, which set in six weeks ago after he had removed a corn from his toe with a knife.

In Russian Revolution

He was born in Riga, Latvia, and in his early youth was active in the Russian liberation movement. He fled to this country after having taken part in the Revolution of 1905, during which Czarist police shot him and left him for dead.

Emir Abdullah Denies Aim to Rule Palestine; Proposes All-Arab State

Jerusalem—Emir Abdullah, ruler of Trans-Jordan, this week emphatically denied any ambition to become King of Palestine and Trans-Jordan.

The Emir told the New York Times correspondent the only reason for his intervention in attempting to find a solution for the Palestine problem was the present deplorable situation in the Holy Land and the continued bloodshed. Partition is impracticable Abdullah said, and will never work out; moreover, there is not a single Arab who does not oppose partition.

The Emir has recently submitted a memorandum to the partition commission in which he proposes the formation of a united Arab state, including Palestine and Trans-Jordan under an Arab sovereign.

This United Arab State, according to the Emir's proposal would grant to Jews the right of self-government (autonomy) in Jewish areas. Jews would enjoy full rights similar to those enjoyed by any other local

Fear Dickstein Bill May Hinder Charitable Jewish Work Abroad

Money for Fascist Countries Prohibited

Bill Referred to House Committee

New York — Well-informed Jewish circles here are reported to be gravely concerned over the results of a bill introduced by Representative Samuel Dickstein to make it unlawful to send money from the United States to European countries maintaining strict exchange regulations on financial transactions outside their borders.

Mr. Dickstein's bill, which has been referred to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, would prohibit individuals in this country from carrying out any financial, monetary or credit transactions, directly or indirectly, with countries that impose a "like restriction" on such transactions with the United States, and would forbid the transfer, directly or indirectly, of any evidence of indebtedness or the ownership of any property to a foreign coun-

Social Agencies Sponsor Camp; Jewish Unit to Send 72 Children

The Rhode Island Camps Incorporated, a new organization in Providence, announces the opening of Beach Pond Camp located in the town of Exeter.

The camp has accommodations for 72 campers every two weeks. In order to make it possible for as many children as possible to take advantage of this camp, the rate has been fixed at \$7.50 per week. Boys and girls will be accepted.

The Board of Directors of the camp consist of various leaders of several social agencies in Providence including the Jewish Community Center. The officers and directors are as follows: president, Walter Adler; vice president, Charles P. Sisson; secretary, Mrs. Winthrop B. Field; treasurer, Ernest L. Anderson; and assistant treasurer, Frank E. Traficante.

A two week period beginning July 10 and continuing till July 24 has been granted to the Jewish Community Center and other Jewish agencies which makes it possible to accommodate 72 Jewish children for a period of two weeks.

Agencies that have expressed a desire to take advantage of these facilities are the Womens Committee of the Jewish Community Center, which will send 45 children, the Council of Jewish Women 5, the Ladies Auxiliary of the B'nai B'rith 3, and several children by the Jewish Family Welfare Society.

Thousands Picket Bund Convention

San Francisco—Thousands of anti-Nazis, including many war veterans picketed the first Pacific Coast convention of the German-American Bund which was held here without disorder. The pickets booed the delegates.

Hermann Schwinn, Pacific coast leader of the Bund, told the convention that what is needed is "a Gentile nation, run by Gentile Americans." He boasted that the Bund is getting "a high degree of cooperation with other patriotic American organizations in our activities."

Protest of U. S. to Germany is Emphatic

Washington—The protest of the United States to Germany against the decree aimed at Jewish owners of property in Germany is most emphatic and emphasizes the urgency of the situation.

This was disclosed when the State Department released the text to the note delivered to the Acting Foreign Minister of Germany by Hugh R. Wilson, the United States Ambassador.

It made "emphatic protest" against application of the decree to American citizens, referred to "the urgency" of the matter, and requested an "early reply."

Sari Maritza Divorced from M-G-M Executive

Los Angeles—Sari Maritza, former actress, won a divorce from Sam Katz, M-G-M studio executive, when she testified in a Los Angeles court. "He said I interfered with his work, he called me 'stupid' and he went out nights and left me alone."

Katz agreed to pay her \$1,400 a month as long as his gross income is \$3,000 a week; \$10,000 in cash and \$15,000 in three installments. They were married in 1934.

Montreal—The swastika flag flies prominently in the City Hall of Sorel, a community of several thousand on the south shore of the St. Lawrence river, 45 miles from Montreal. The city is being governed by a Fascist mayor and two Fascist aldermen, all nominees and officers of Adrien Arcand's anti-Semitic National Social Christian Party.

The control of the Canadian city, one of the greatest victories yet won by Arcand's Fascists in their drive for a totalitarian government in the dominion, was the cause of great celebration. Arcand and members of his Fascist Grand Council, all in uniform, visited here, while Fascist delegations came from Ste. Hyacinth and St. Ours to present the mayor with a swastika.

Recipes

A DELICIOUS MILCHIG RECIPE

(Presented to the readers of this paper by Miss Frances Peck of the Heinz Home Institute).

For those who like the taste of mushrooms (and who doesn't?) here is a dish to tempt the family's appetite. It is for dairy meals only as it calls for butter as well as a can of Heinz Cream of Mushroom Soup, which, being a cream soup, is naturally a milchig product (endorsed, by the way, by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America.) We call this dish FISH CROQUETTES. It is easy to prepare:

Melt

2 tablespoonfuls butter, add 5 tablespoonfuls flour and blend well. Cook until bubbling, then add 1 10 ounce can Cream of Mushroom Soup and Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

Add

1 cupful flaked tuna fish and 1 cupful dry bread crumbs, then cool.

Form into croquettes, dip into slightly beaten egg, then roll in dry cracker crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat until a golden brown in color. Serve with mushroom Sauce (recipe below)

MUSHROOM SAUCE

Melt

2 tablespoonfuls butter, add 3 tablespoonfuls flour and blend well. Cook until bubbling, then add 1 16 ounce can Cream of Mushroom Soup and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

Add

½ teaspoonful Worcestershire Sauce. Serve over croquettes.

Nazi Paper Admits "Protocols" Plagiarized

London—Nazi sources have admitted, for what is believed to be the first time, that "The Protocols of the Learned Elders of Zion," discredited record of a purported plot for Jewish world domination, was plagiarized from another work, but claim the plagiarism was committed by a Jew.

A new pamphlet in English issued by the anti-Semitic publishing house of Col. Ilrich Fleischauer in Erfurt, Germany, confesses that the "Protocols" was taken in large part from Maurice Joly's "Dialogues in Hell between Machiavelli and Montasquieu," written in 1864 as an attack on Napoleon III.

Jews Restricted by Salzburg Spa Laws

Rules Also Apply To Foreign Jews

Munich, Germany—The following was announced today by the resort committee of the well-known Bad Ischl Spa near Salzburg:

"Jewish guests will be separated from other guests in Jewish hotels, boarding houses, etc., where no woman of German blood under forty-five will be permitted among the personnel.

"Restrictions apply to foreign as well as German Jews.

"Jews must register as such upon arrival.

"Jewish guests will receive a yellow card which will entitle them to the cure, but will not permit entry to concerts and other general gatherings.

"Jews also are not allowed at promenades, reading rooms, restaurants, music rooms, playgrounds, tennis courts, athletic fields or swimming pools.

"Jewish guests without exception will receive no reductions in prices.

"Furthermore, Jews are not wanted."

hitting a constable with a rock during a demonstration in front of a hall where the Union of Fascists was meeting.

Danzig Establishes Ghetto Beaches

Danzig — Declaring the time had come to fulfill unification of the Free City with the Reich in all respects, Nazi leader Albert Forster announced that separate bathing beaches and hotels would be allotted to Jews at Zoppot, bathing resort. American, British, French and Polish visitors of Jewish origin, he said, would be treated as "undesirables."

U. S. Fund Ransomed Sigmund Freud

Psycho-Analytic Unit To Aid Persecuted

No Details of Method Revealed

New York—Funds contributed largely by Americans paid for the freedom of Dr. Sigmund Freud, the famous psycho-analyst, from the Nazi authorities in Austria.

This was admitted by New York physicians who helped obtain his release and arranged for his new home in London.

But they would not say how the release was arranged, and they did not deny reports that a ransom had been paid to Nazi officials.

The fund was contributed by former students of Dr. Freud, other physicians and persons of wealth and was handled by an emergency committee on relief and immigration of the American Psycho-Analytic Association, which is working to obtain the release of a number of Austrian scientists.

The State Department co-operated in the efforts on behalf of Dr. Freud and saw that he received safe passage to France.

Dr. Lawrence S. Kubie of 34 East Seventy-fifth Street, New York City representative of the emergency committee, would reveal no details of the manner in which Dr. Freud obtained permission to leave Austria.

"There have been a small group of physicians and educators trained in psychoanalysis who have worked in close association with Dr. Freud a great many years," he said. "Gradually this small group is dispersing to many parts of the world to continue the painstaking investigation which they had been carrying on in their old homes."

Mr. Silverman was a member of the Robinson street Congregation, the Home of the Aged and the Hebrew Free Loan Association.

He is survived by six sons, Philip of Boston, Albert, John and Irving, of New York City, and Harry and Charles L. of Providence; six daughters, Mrs. Rose Tanenbaum, Mrs. David Lang, Mrs. Morris Abrams, Mrs. Samuel Galkin, Mrs. David Krasnoff and Mrs. Adolf Hirsch; 16 grandchildren and a great grandchild.

New Fears Spread Among Berlin Jews

Stores Defaced Boycott Renewed;

Berlin—Jews were freshly alarmed because of the reappearance of Nazi boycott activities.

Unknown persons splashed the word "Jew" in red and white paint across the windows of more than 100 Jewish-owned stores in the middle class Frankfurterallee district.

In the window of one of the stores the proprietor had placed a certificate which read:—"Honored for bravery in the World War."

The week-end saw a fresh drive by police against profiteers in Vienna and by Nazi storm troopers against Vienna Jews.

Vienna newspapers published a column-long list of persons, chiefly food retailers, who had been punished as profiteers.

Poison vs. Poison

There are some anti-toxins that are made from the virus of the disease they are intended to prevent. That's all right in medicine but when the same principle is adapted to politics it doesn't always work.

The resignation of the Daranyi cabinet in Hungary because it could not successfully cope with the rising tide of Nazism is a case in point. To succeed Daranyi, Regent Horthy named Bela Imredy, former minister of commerce.

The first move of the new premier was to outline a program which embraced many Nazi ideas, such as labor camps, a "strength-through-joy" movement, curbs on labor unions and, of course, the intensification of anti-Semitism. Imredy hopes, in the words of Anne O'Hare McCormack, "to build up national resistance by inoculation." He feels that by giving Hungary a dose of native Nazism, he will ward off the genuine article.

Imredy took office on the same day that the lower house of Parliament passed the Daranyi bill to set up a 20% numerus clausus for Jews in trade, industry, the professions and cultural life. It is certain the upper house will approve the measure and usher in an official policy of anti-Semitism.

At the same time, however, the government is taking firm measures against all the Nazi and quasi-Nazi groups while efforts are being made to create a coalition of all conservative factions in support of Imredy.

Hungary's determination to resist Nazi encroachments can only be viewed with the utmost sympathy but she ought to be warned against fighting one poison with another that is equally dangerous.

O'Connell Charges Jersey City Police Chief With Anti-Semitism

Jersey City, N. J. — A point-blank unequivocal denial that he had said anything critical of or uncomplimentary to Jews was made by Chief of Police Harry Walsh in replying to assertions by Representative Jerry O'Connell of Montana that the Jersey City Police chief had given vent to anti-Semitic utterances during an argument about free speech and civil rights.

O'Connell, who was escorted out of the city after a mob had gathered

in Pershing Field to prevent him from speaking, told a press conference in Newark that while the police held him in custody "we argued about free speech and constitutional rights and throughout the discussion, if I can call it that, the thing that impressed me most was their terrible anti-Semitism, saying that all my supporters were Jews, just Jews, that Jews were the cause of all the trouble and they were going to put an end to it."

Ritz Brothers to Umpire Baseball Game for Mt. Sinai Hosp. Fund

Los Angeles:—Baseball will go "screw ball" Saturday, July 30, at Wrigley Field, when the Three Ritz Brothers combine their insane minds into one, and become the umpire for the great Comedians' vs. Leading Men's baseball game for the benefit of the clinic fund of the Mount Sinai Hospital and Clinic.

Charlie McCarthy gracefully yielded the position to the Ritz Bros. because Charlie's weak heart couldn't stand any of his relatives—the bats—being beaten up by baseballs. After a great deal of ne-

gotiation with Mervyn LeRoy, M-G-M executive and general chairman of the great baseball classic, the Ritz Brothers, on the promise they wouldn't have to wear any long beards in their next picture, signed on the dotted line to "ump" the game.

Nazis Push "Purification" Drive; "Desirable" Physicians Given Jobs

Vienna—A new Nazi campaign of "purification" of Austria by eliminating persons held undesirable is being intensified, according to reliable informants.

Jews have been particularly affected, it was said, especially those who entered Austria after the World War.

At the same time, much to the surprise of many observers, it is understood that numbers of Jews held to be "desirable" have been given jobs as engineers and physicians in Germany proper.

It seemed from reports that the Nazi plan might be to use whatever measures were found most efficient to induce Jews classed as undesirable to emigrate.

According to reports, several

scores of Jews are arrested daily and are sharply cross-examined. Questions, it was said, include how they made a living during the last twenty years.

It was indicated that the questioning campaign had been systematized so that as one group was questioned and then released or held for trial, sent to concentration camp or advised to emigrate, another group was arrested.

It was reported today that conscript labor, in addition to volunteer workers, was being used by Nazi authorities in reconstruction work in parts of Southern Austria damaged by floods last month.

Most of the pick and shovel conscripts are Jews, but some are Aryans, it was understood. The Aryans were said to have been chosen from would-be "loafers," while the Jews were recruited from those who were active in anti-Nazi activities before Austria's annexation to Germany.



Isobel Steele Warns Against Fascism

"Things are starting in this country just the same as they started in Germany," was the indictment made by Isobel Steele, the American girl, whose four months imprisonment by the Nazis in 1934 made front page headlines, as she addressed some 200 Jewish War Veterans and their guests last Tuesday night at 100 Niagara Street. "The same racial prejudices are being raised" she said. "The whole thing looks most threatening."

As a combat to rising Fascism, she could only recommend individual effort. When asked by one of the veterans what such groups as the Jewish War Veterans could do in such a case as Jersey city, "where Mayor Hague has denied the right of free speech, one of the very foundations of democracy," Miss Steele replied, "There's nothing that seems more terrible to me than shouting about 100 per cent. Americanism. That just leads to prohibiting free speech. A person has a perfect right to be a Socialist. I can't stand that 100 per cent. Americanism talk. It sounds as if we're the only country in the world. Pretty soon we'll be sitting in a Fascist State."

In response to a question, she said she felt the German boycott in America was not as effective as it might be because it was conducted almost entirely by Jewish groups, when it should be participated in by all groups.

Paul J. Robin, past commander, presided at the meeting, and Chester Follette, Americanization officer of the State Department of American Legion, also spoke briefly.

try or to any person therein, if such foreign country imposes a like restriction on similar transactions to the United States.

Stop Aid to Jews

Jewish observers point out that the bill would serve to kill off all charitable, educational and reconstruction work among Jews residing in Germany, Poland, Rumania and other European lands which maintain strict foreign exchange restrictions by leaving impoverished Jews overseas without any support from American organizations or individuals.

The Dickstein bill, if enacted into law, it is claimed, would make it a crime, subject to a fine of not more than \$5,000, or imprisonment for not more than five years, for American Jews to send money to needy relatives abroad.
