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ZOA Head Reiterates Stand on Immigration

Says Palestine Work in Danger

Convinced that immigration, principally to Palestine, is necessary at once, Dr. Solomon Goldman, president of the Zionist Organization of America, who departed from Warsaw for Palestine this week, said that "Reconstruction work in Palestine will be endangered unless 700,000 Jews are permitted to settle there."

"I am leaving Europe," Dr. Goldman further stated, "with the intention of strengthening American Jews in the fight against anti-Semitism both in economic and in more brutal and barbarous aspects."

He said that Benito Mussolini has surrendered to Nazism and would content himself in the future "with being on the back wheel of the Rome-Berlin axis." Dr. Goldman declared that Mussolini had assured him in a private interview six years ago that there would be no anti-Semitism in Italy.

"It is no coincidence that Italy has introduced the Aryan racial theory into her own country just now when Arab trouble makers, incited and financed by foreign Powers, are subjecting the peaceful inhabitants of Palestine to unprecedented terror," Dr. Goldman said. "If and additional evidence was required to demonstrate that Fascism sooner or later breeds anti-Semitism, Mussolini has supplied it," he added.

Jews Are Kidnaped By White Russians

HARBIN, Manchoukuo.—The Jewish community here is in a panic as a result of the kidnappings of prominent Jews, reportedly by Russian White Guardists.

The latest victim of the systematic campaign of terrorism through the abduction is Isaac Klurman, merchant. The kidnapers extort huge ransom from relatives, but the victims are seldom returned alive.

White Guard terrorism, which has gone virtually unchecked for several years, has compelled thousands of Jews to leave Harbin. Several years ago, the Jewish community here numbered 12,000. Today there are only 3,000 Jews living here.

Refugee Director Takes Over Task


LONDON.—George Rublee, Washington lawyer and new executive director of the International Refugee Committee, arrived this week from New York.

Union Congregations Start Campaign on Anti-Semitism

CINCINNATI.—Dramatic plans for aiding in the fight against anti-Semitism by making authoritative correct information about the Jew readily available to the American public have been unfolded here by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, parent body of American Liberal Judaism.

Under the slogan, "The Truth About the Jew," the Union is establishing each of its 294 congregations scattered throughout the United States and Canada, local Committees on Public Information About Jews and Judaism which will distribute literature, contact the press and make use of other publicity made in cooperation with the national committee.

The chairman of the national committee has already been appointed by Robert P. Goldman, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. He is the distinguished Boston attorney and author, Lee M. Friedman. A native of Memphis, Tenn., and

NEW YORK.—All Mrs. Frances Lieberman could see was the picture of her son, Paul, 6, swinging by his neck from a fence post, his face purple, while five screaming boys piled wood at his feet, and prepared to start a fire under him.

All she could remember was rushing out from her ground-floor apartment at 3,108 Brighton Fifth St., Brooklyn, and cutting the boy down, he semi-conscious and limp with a thin red mark around his neck.

"He was so close to death," she said yesterday. "I thought he was dead when I held him. The doctors worked on him and they didn't say anything, but all the time I thought they were fooling me and that he was dead."

Fascists Peeved by Emil Ludwig's Book

ROME.—Fascist Italy is good and sore at Emil Ludwig, eminent Jewish historian for having repeated Mussolini's anti-racist comments in a book he wrote in 1932. The book, "Conversations with Mussolini," included Il Duce's declarations on the race problem as he considered it in 1932, which is in sharp contrast to the official attitude of 1938.

The newspaper *Tevere*, did not mince words in an outburst at Ludwig this week, apparently for not having foreseen the new racist policy when he wrote his book so that Mussolini might have been spared embarrassment at this time.

RABBI DIES

TARNOGROD, Poland.—Leib Teicher, the oldest rabbi in Poland, died here at the age of 99 after 75 years of rabbinical activity. He was the grandson of the Brisker Gaon, famous rabbinical sage.

Czech Law Protects Jews in Nazi Area

All Races Now On Equal Basis

PRAGUE.—Protection for Jews and other non-Nazi minorities in the Sudeten (Nazi) areas of Czechoslovakia is provided in the draft of the Czechoslovakia government's new nationalities statute just made public here.

The statute declares that all nationalities shall have the same rights and emphasizes that race, religion and language are not grounds for designating persons as politically unreliable.

The first article of the statute reaffirms the constitutional guarantee of equality for citizens, regardless of nationality.

According to the statute, nationality is henceforth to be determined by the mother tongue, except in the case of Jews who may claim Jewish nationality regardless of what language they claim as mother tongue.

The statute also establishes the principles of proportionality in state employment, allotment of state contracts, elections to legislative bodies and appointment of members of advisory bodies and other organs of public administration.

HIAS to Campaign For Funds Here

Hias, which for fifty-two years has served Jews the world over, is confronted with an emergency, which only ample funds will enable it to meet. Due to the conditions in Eastern Europe, helpless Jews—men and women—are appealing to Hias for aid. Fifteen thousand families have asked assistance in obtaining affidavits and have called on Hias to support them to buy tickets. They are not allowed to take money out of the countries which they are forced to leave.

Hias has organized a campaign for \$250,000. Al Fisher, of New York, is in this city to interest synagogues, organizations and laymen. A special committee is being formed to make a special drive for Hias at the present time. Names and organizations which will respond to the call will be mentioned in the near future.

Danzig Hotels, Cafes Raided by Gestapo

WARSAW, POLAND.—Harsh anti-Jewish measures on Saturday and Sunday nights are reported from Danzig. The Gestapo raided a number of hotels, restaurants and cafes frequented by Jews and demanded that all present establish their identity and explain their presence in the Free City.

Some cases of mistreatment were alleged. It is reported that a number of British Jews on a Baltic vacation tour were caught in the raid and subjected to a search despite their protests.

In most cases the hotel patrons in the raided establishments were dragged out of bed while their papers were examined; even children were rudely awakened. A number of arrests were reported.

Hang Second Jew In Palestine War

Killer Pleads Not To Be Made Martyr

Convicted of Arabs Slaying

JERUSALEM.—The second Jew to be hanged during the British rule of Palestine died in Acre prison this week.

Mordecai Schwartz, twenty-five, police constable, pleaded that Palestine Jewry should not make him a martyr as they did Solomon Ben Joseph whose hanging on June 29 precipitated the bloodiest Jewish-Arab violence in recent history.

Schwartz, a Czechoslovak Jew, was convicted of murdering an Arab policeman with whom he guarded the summer camp of the British High Commissioner last September.

"I am ready to die for an act for which I alone am responsible," Schwartz declared.

Schwartz's case went back to September, 1937, when there were several attacks around Athlit, a thinly populated section near Haifa. Police placed him and an Arab constable there to guard against bandits.

A week after the Arab was found dead Schwartz was arrested. A Haifa district court sentenced him to death, the Supreme Court upheld the sentence and the Privy Council in London refused to reopen the case. Three weeks ago the High Commissioner confirmed the sentence.

In 1936 he was awarded the annual Remington Honor Medal for outstanding service.

Previously, in a poll conducted by a trade paper, he was chosen as the one exemplifying the na-

tion's conception of a druggist.

Evict 4,000 Families from Homes; Restaurants Closed

BUDAPEST.—At least 4,000 Jewish families were evicted from their apartments in Vienna, after two to five days' notice, it was learned here this week.

Reports reaching here said all Jewish enterprises in Austria must be offered for sale in August, Jewish shops failing to display signs reading, "Offered for Aryanzation," will be closed, it was reported.

Eighty-six Jewish restaurant owners in Vienna, whose licenses have been withdrawn, have appealed for aid to the Vienna Jewish Community.

Famous Austrians Made British Citizens

Bergner Couple Receive Papers

LONDON.—Elisabeth Bergner, Dr. Paul Czinner and Sir (formerly Baron) George Franckenstein—Austrians all, exiles all, people of more than local fame—the other afternoon held one of the strangest teas for three ever pulled in this tea-loving land.

At a film studio near London they were toasting each other in the cup that cheers but does not inebriate because they were all now British subjects.

The ex-Baron Franckenstein got his final papers July 9, then soon afterward was knighted by King George. Miss Bergner and her husband got theirs two days later.

Elisabeth Bergner is, of course, the beauty who won fame and fortune as the greatest woman Thespian on the German-speaking stage. Her triumphs in her native Vienna and in Berlin were many. Then came the Nazis. As a non-Aryan, Germany, and later Austria, was closed to her.

She came, saw and conquered London in "Escape Me Never."

It was a signal triumph, because she was acting in a world new to her, in a play depicting a life novel to her and in a language which was strange to her.

Her husband, Dr. Czinner, a well-known film director, also came here to make a new career for himself.

Primer For Nazis Printed in English

Instills Ideas on Race and History

NEW YORK.—At about the age level when American boys and girls are reading "Treasure Island" and "David Copperfield," seven millions of Germany's young are reading a very different kind of book—"The Handbook of the Hitler Youth."

Instilling the Nazi ideas on race, history and national ambition, it is the instrument by which the Nazis hope to rear whole new generations in their own image.

It was published in Germany last year and becomes available here new in a translation published today as "The Nazi Primer," by Harper and Brothers with commentaries by Professor Harwood L. Childs of the Princeton politics department, who translated, and Dr. William E. Dodd, former American Ambassador to Germany.

Summarized by Dodd

As summarized by Dr. Dodd, the handbook teaches German boys and girls from fourteen to eighteen "how sacred was their Aryan race, how great their ancestors had been and how much of Europe properly belonged to the Fuehrer and his followers."

N. Y. Plans Study of Religion for Schools

ALBANY, N. Y.—A special Board of Regents committee of three members has been appointed by Chancellor Thomas J. Mangan to make a study of religious instruction for children attending public schools in New York State.

In announcing the personnel—Owen D. Young, Van Hornellsville; Roland B. Woodward, Rochester; and Susan Brandeis, New York—Chancellor Mangan stated that the study was authorized by the board at its meeting in New York City, July 29.

Public school pupils in many upstate communities as well as in New York City are now released for a half-hour or an hour of religious instruction weekly, outside school buildings. Ministers and priests have cooperated in obtaining the consent of local boards of education for such released time. The one-quarter unit of Regents' credit is said to be authorized under the present law.

Exiles Admitted to City's Free Colleges

NEW YORK.—Reversing a previous decision, the Board of Higher Education this week announced that foreign students, including refugees, would be admitted to the city's free colleges provided they are bona fide residents of the city and present proof that they or their parents have applied for American citizenship or will do so as soon as they become eligible.

80 Jews Die In Concentration Camp

LONDON.—Eighty Jews between the ages of 21 and 70 died during July in the Nazi concentration camp at Buchenwald, Germany, it was reported today by the News Chronicle.

Their deaths, the paper said, was the result of inhuman treatment. Youngest of the victims was reported to be one Erich Loevenberg, 21, while the oldest was a septuagenarian named Ludwig Kahn.

Vatican, Rome Move to Settle Racial Argument

Nuremberg Laws Eased In Vienna

Labor Markets Are Disrupted

VIENNA.—Application of the Nuremberg laws so disrupted the female labor market here this week that officials were forced to call a halt to their efforts in putting them into operation and at the same time effect drastic concessions.

Not only will women between the ages of 35 and 45 be allowed to hold their positions in Jewish households, but women under 35 who have been employed by the same family for two years will be allowed to continue their work "until further notice." However, the order that women who have homes in the country must give up their service to Jews and return for the harvest remains effective.

Another effect of the Nuremberg laws is that many Jews are being forced to give up their apartments by August 1, the Viennese moving day. According to the Nuremberg stipulations, the objections of one Aryan in a block is sufficient to force a Jew to vacate his premises.

Newfoundland Urges Jewish Settlement

OTTAWA.—Settlement of Jewish refugees in Newfoundland is urged by the Ottawa Citizen in an editorial in connection with the recent Evian conference, which says:

"Newfoundland would surely be a happier land than Palestine for hardy settlers from countries like Poland, where the winter is severe, as well as from Germany and Austria.

"Newfoundland's legislature has been closed, but it has never been suggested that Nazi doctrines were being substituted for political democracy. The people of Newfoundland need help to make the island resources more productive, particularly productive of more properous homes.

Funds Collected in Barrington for J.N.F.

A total amount of \$154.50 has been raised for Tischa B'Ab collections for the Jewish National Fund at Barrington Beach, it was announced this week. George Pullman and Abe Heller were co-chairmen in charge of collections, assisted by Maurice W. Hendel and Robert Grant.

First Hint of Italian Boycott in Paris

PARIS.—The first hint of what may develop into a boycott of Italian goods parralleling the anti-Nazi boycott was seen here when an important branch office of an American buying organization received instructions from New York to minimize the purchase of Italian merchandise until the official attitude of Italy toward Jews is clarified.

N. Y. Amusement Groups Vote to Aid Refugee Jews

NEW YORK.—In response to the intensified plight of refugees from Central Europe, the amusement industry of New York voted to raise \$100,000 as an emergency fund for the settlement in Palestine of oppressed Jews through the presentation of the fifth annual "Night of Stars" at Madison Square Garden on November 16.

Christian and Jewish notables in motion pictures, radio, stage and other branches of entertainment, joined hands to form the Producing and Sponsoring Committee of "Night of Stars" at a luncheon given last week at the Empire State Club.

Messages of appreciation to the amusement leaders for undertaking the emergency project were read at the luncheon from Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Grover A. Whalen, president of the New York World's Fair, Nathan Straus, United States Housing Administrator, and Dr. Stephen S. Wise, national co-chairman of the United Palestine Appeal. These four, together with Samuel Untermyer and Federal Judge Julian W. Mack were named Honorary Chairmen of the "Night of Stars" Sponsoring Committee.

As chairman of the New York United Palestine Appeal, Harold Jacobi expressed appreciation to the amusement leaders gathered at the luncheon for their decision to present the fifth annual "Night of Stars" at Madison Square Garden on November 16 as a means of raising a minimum of \$100,000 for the emergency fund to settle refugees in Palestine.

Nazis Will Release Baron Rothschild

LONDON.—Relatives in France of Baron Louis de Rothschild have been informed that the famous Vienna banker will be released from custody of the Nazi authorities this week, the Daily Herald reported. The Nazis have confiscated the family's foreign holdings in Vienna, equivalent to \$10,000,000 ransom originally demanded for Baron Rothschild, the paper said.

Reich Defends Italy's Program

ROME.—A reliable Catholic Church source said this week that negotiations had been opened between the Church and the Italian Government to settle their current dispute.

The racial policy of the Government, conflicting with Pope Pius' warning against supernaturalism has brought disagreement as to the activities of the Catholic Action organization to which the Church attaches great importance.

Both the Pope and Premier Benito Mussolini are said to be eager to effect an agreement and avoid unpleasantness such as resulted from a disagreement in 1931, also over Catholic Action.

Down The Red Trail

After scratching the surface of Nazi activities in this country, the Die's House Committee probing un-American activities in this country, suddenly dropped the hot potato and skipped over to the national pastime of chasing the Reds. Cutting Off Their Noses...

One of the principal economics excuses advanced by anti-Semites for excluding Jews from the professions and commercial and industrial positions is the claim that room must be made for non-Jews. That argument was the basis of the recent numerous clausus law in Hungary, restricting to 20% the proportion of Jews who may be employed in commercial, industrial and cultural enterprises. Presumably, there were thousands of non-Jews equipped to the take places from which Jews were ousted.

But what de we find? Unemployment Commissioner Stefan Kulstar has announced that 6,500 persons are being trained for jobs made available by the elimination of Jews. Each person so trained is receiving a government subsidy of \$29 per month.

In other words to create jobs for unemployed experienced and talented non-Jews, but to get rid of the Jews. If there were a substantial number of jobless Hungarians able to replace the ousted Jews there would be no need for a government program of training.

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Brazil Dissolves Zionist Centers

RIO DE JANEIRO.—Dissolution of Zionist centers in Brazil was ordered under the new law forbidding foreign political groups. The Ministry of the Interior ruled that the principal object of the Zionist centers was to cooperate in getting homes for Jews in Palestine and that this constituted political activity.

Fear Italy May Add To Refugee Burden

Fascist Decree Affects 60,000

LONDON.—The plight of Italian Jews added another worry to the task of the intergovernmental refugee committee which seeks sanctuary for the thousands fleeing Nazi Germany.

Italy announced she intended "no special persecution" of Jews, but the committee placed the tentative figure of 60,000 Italian Jews on its records.

Jewish sources gave the number of Jews in Italian home territory as 44,000 about one Jew to every 1,000 non-Jewish Italians. Participation of Jews in "the full life of the State must be leveled" at that proportion, an officially-inspired Italian statement said.

The most acute immediate problem is to find a haven for the mass flow of emigrants from Germany. It was understood that Myron C. Taylor, head of the United States Delegation, has indicated to the other twenty-six countries represented that a total of 600,000 persons in Germany and German-Austria must be settled elsewhere perhaps at the rate of 100,000 annually.

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War is Inevitable, Says Nazi Writer

World Has No Substitute for it

BERLIN.—The well-known Nazi writer, Eugen Diesel, comes to the conclusion in an article published here that war is inevitable. Speculating on the fact, "that no two European countries have been at declared war against each other since the World War, although no other generation has been as rich as those incidents and situations that have hitherto evoked war," he continued:

"That is no cause for optimism, since the non-European wars of the last generation have demonstrated that the world has found no practicable substitute for war. It is not only foolish to consider a European war impossible; one must consider it quite probable.

Culture Always Behind
"Culture has always limped behind technical progress," says the author, "and the increase in armaments alone will not halt war. Perhaps, however, our great statesmen will find a way to obviate war."

Portugal Planning New Racist Policy

LIBSON, Portugal.—Portugal is preparing to follow Italy in adopting a racist policy, the official government organ, Diario Demanha, indicated in an article accusing the Jews of being responsible "for all the troubles of the world." The paper asserts that the "only solution is to introduce a policy of racism."

French Press Hits Chile's Racial Policy

SANTIAGO.—Chile's racial policy in the face of possible Jewish immigration was brought sharply into the foreground again with the reproduction in the local press of a letter sent by the Chilean Consul General in Paris, Alfredo Viel, to a would-be immigrant inquiring regarding the requisities for admission.

This communication, which the official ended with the sentence "if you are a Jew, it is useless for you to do anything in the matter," was published in facsimile in the French press with bitter comment.

70,000 Women Petition Against Palestine Partition

NEW YORK.—Reiterating its previous stand against the proposed division of Palestine at a time when it is rumored that England's Partition Commission will recommend a greatly restricted "Jewish State," Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, largest organized Zionist group in the world today made public a memorandum sent to London stating its continued "objections to the partition proposals" and its belief that division of Palestine would not "bring about peace between the Arab and Jewish peoples."

The memorandum has been sent to the Jewish Agency for Palestine, recognized by Great Britain as the sole executive body for

World Zionist groups, for transmission, to Sir John Woodhead, chairman of the Partition Commission. The Commission, which sat as an evidence-gathering body in Palestine for thirteen weeks is expected to arrive in London shortly to collate its findings and make its recommendations on the partition scheme. It sailed from Palestine for Great Britain on August 3.

"Our national board is speaking on behalf of a 95% majority of Hadassah's 70,000 American Jewish women members," Mrs. Moses P. Epstein, national president of Hadassah said in making public the memorandum. "We wish to point out that the condition of Jewry in Europe is steadily growing more desperate and that the need for Palestine as a home and center for Jewry should not be denied."

Dr. Adler Replies To D'Annunzio Letter

Says Conditions Caused Attitude

NEW YORK.—Challenging the attitude of Ugo V. d'Annunzio, son of the late Gabriel d'Annunzio, who declared in the letter to the New York State Herald Tribune that Jews outside of Italy had made themselves responsible for the anti-Semitic campaign in Italy by expressing themselves in favor of democracy and against dictatorships, Dr. Cyrus Adler, in a letter to the Herald-Tribune, charged that d'Annunzio's position "simply represents an endeavor to suppress the opinion of the Jews of the world upon what is happening in Italy."

Dr. Adler said that the new turn in Italy, "the possibility of which was denied by Signor Mussolini as recently as a year ago, and steadily denied by him ever since 1933, is an acceptance for political reasons, of the fraudulent race theory of Nazi Germany."

Sylvia Sydney Wed To Adler in London

LONDON.—Sylvia Sidney, American movie actress, was married to Luther Adler, New York actor, at Caxton Hall this week.

The bride, who is 28, and the bridegroom, 35, entered the hall through the workmen's entrance. She wore a brown costume and a large blue hat.

Their plans are indefinite. There was no indication whether Mr. Adler would leave the mast of Clifford Odets' "Golden Boy," in which he plays the lead.

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
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If Hitler Meddles, U.S. Should Medal Suggest Medal For Those True to Democratic Ideas

NEW YORK.—When Hitler meddles, Democracy should medal. At least, that's what the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League advised Secretary of State Hull in a facetious telegram sent to the State department at Washington today.

"During the past year, James Mooney of General Motors, Henry Ford of Ford Motors and Thomas Watson, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, have been decorated by Hitler for services to the Nazi government," the League's message said. "If the totalitarian-Democracy struggle is to be waged on a medal front, we suggest that the U. S. get into stride immediately by allocating one billion dollars of the gold reserve for the manufacture of medals to be presented to any citizen, Fuller brush salesman or diplomat who will abide by the principles of Democracy for five years."
