

United Appeal

Adopting the slogan of "Give thanks by giving," Jewish leadership in every section of the country has intensified efforts on behalf of the unprecedented nation-wide campaign of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs, which combines the fund-raising facilities of the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal, and the National Refugee Service, Inc.

Heads of the campaign in Providence are emphasizing to the community the urgency of immediate sacrificial aid in view of the tragically worsened plights of the remnants of Polish Jewry both within invaded territory and in neighboring countries of refuge; and the increased opportunities for Palestine rebuilding and resettlement.

The need is obvious and all that is required now is the wholehearted co-operation of Rhode Island Jewry.

Getting Together

An interesting report on the problems resulting from the evacuation scheme in Britain was prepared recently by the Liverpool School of Social Science.

One of its remarks was to the effect that "Each social group in society has its own standard of living and behavior, but under this scheme the different groups are forced to live together," and that "neither group takes kindly to this new way of living."

No doubt, in many cases, time has done a great deal to render both parties more adaptable. For, often, there was an initial prejudice founded on nothing but complete ignorance — an attitude exemplified in the story of the very small "evacuee" who on the third day of his stay in a country mansion, remarked regretfully: "If I'd only known it was going to be like this, and you was all going to be so decent, I'd have brought my watch!"

America's melting pot has demonstrated that all kinds can adjust themselves to the people that surround them. Any attempts to dissolve this union by pressure groups and use of scapegoats should be fought with determination.

One cannot deduce from the Liverpool report that the more they are together, the merrier they will be.

But a little expert summing-up of the problem presented by a group in which one half does not know how the other half lives, might do much to remove from each a nonplused feeling, and to add all fractions into a working unit.

Providence Resident Seeks Advice From Italian Fascist Newspaper As to His Duties as U. S. Citizen

"Italians and Jews in America"

From "La Difesa della Razza", June 20, 1939, p. 46.

Luigi Scala, president of the Order of the Sons of Italy in America, has written us the following letter from the United States:

"It is obvious that abroad, and especially in the United States, whence I write, where almost the whole body of Italians have taken American citizenship, the Italian laws on the protection and exaltation of our race can have only the force, let us say, of recommendation or, to some extent, guidance to Italians in their relations with Jews and with Jewish sympathizers.

"But if it is easy to define or to ascertain what a Jew is, it is not equally easy to determine or to point out a Jewish sympathizer.

"Of this lot, there are some even among the Italians, some of whom act like Italians when with Italians and act like Jews when with Jews — a feat of equilibrium into which enter both sentiment and profit, with the latter usually prevailing.

"To us the Jewish question is interesting chiefly because the doings, either open or secret, of such a race and of its supporters are directed against Italy, which we feel obliged to defend within the public opinion of this country.

"Many of us, although we are fully aware of our duties towards the United States — duties which we intend to fulfill — are also sensitive concerning the good name and the fortunes of this Italy risen to new life, towards which we feel ourselves to be indebted for the greater respect which our migrants enjoy, here and elsewhere.

"Then there come about complex situations, sometimes painful, in which we should like to conduct ourselves in such a way that our conduct, within the limits prescribed by our duties as citizens, should not imply discord and, even less, disapproval of certain fundamental general rules of imperial Italy.

"If, for example, there is a wealthy Italian who, married to a Jewess and father of her children, one of which he matches with a person wholly Judaic, by Judaic rites, nevertheless contributes to Italian projects and equally — or perhaps with greater liberality — to Jewish projects, what ought to be the attitude of our community in respect to such a one? Can we render him honor the same as to an authentic exponent of Italianism?

"Would I, for example, were I a reserve officer of the Italian army or a consular agent of Italy, expose myself to censure if I were to go to congratulate and to praise publicly as an exponent of true Italianism, in public ceremonies, the individual referred to above, to whom one can't deny the merit of having made a fortune?

"This, which is a case that can occur in one community or another, influences me to write to you to learn, if it be not indiscreet, your opinion and to have assigned to us a certain line of conduct which will not lead the mass of emigrants into confusion: true Italianism cannot be stretched to fit this or that advantage."

"Defense of Race" Answer

"That is what Luigi Scala wrote to us, and we answer him that the rule of separation and non-mingling of Jews and Italians is the rule of the defense of the Italian nation, abroad as well as in Italy: an absolute rule for every real Italian, an imperative dictated by the national conscience, by which one must henceforth recognize Italians and by which one recognizes the national feeling of those who have emigrated.

"In giving this rule to Italians, the Italian law has been clear and just and has gone as far as equity has allowed. To go beyond equity, or worse, to bow before money, is an immoral act which no Italian who wants to be called Italian can commit, all the more so if he lives abroad.

"We have the same duty, the Italians of Italy and those abroad. We must all fulfill the same duty, wherever we may be. Everyone must understand he is serving Italy, not himself, in fulfilling it. Everyone must pay heed to the fulfillment of his duty; make sacrifices to fulfill it; make of it a question of love of fatherland; obey, however, rather than judge; set an example for the guidance of others; do so, and bear the burden; have faith that in doing so, this new duty of serving Italy will be a thing of great dignity and respect."

IL Mondo Magazine Reveals Scala Letter Attitude Toward Jews is Defined

LA DIFESA DELLA RAZZA, a weekly magazine issued in Rome, Italy, by the Italian Fascist Party for the purpose of enlightening the Italian population on the meaning and extent of the racial policy adopted by the Italian Government, published in its issue of June 20, 1939, page 46, a letter it had received from Mr. Luigi Scala of the United States, a Providence resident, in which he asks advice on how to deal with an American citizen of Italian extraction, who married a Jewish woman and is a Jewish sympathizer, it was revealed in the November issue of IL Mondo (The World) a publication dedicated to unfettered Italian opinion on World events.

In an adjacent column appears a translation of the letter which appeared in IL Mondo, under the heading "Italians and Jews in America."

"No Comment"

When interviewed by a Herald representative in his office at the Columbus National Bank, of which he is president, Mr. Scala, in answer to an offer of space in the Herald for a denial of the letter as a forgery, if he hadn't written it, said: "I owe you (the Herald) no explanation. I have no comment to make."

In their editorial discussion on the content and intent of the letter, the editors of IL Mondo said: "We do not consider it necessary to comment at length on the action of Mr. Luigi Scala. It is an old story, this conduct of American citizens of Italian extraction, who consider their citizenship duty nothing more than a formalistic observance of the laws of the United States and practice in their daily life a sort of double allegiance. Mr. Scala finds it natural to ask and receive orders without 'discussion' from a foreign government of civil rights affecting citizens of his adopted country. But why should he feel differently? Italian fascists in the United States have enjoyed, and still do enjoy, an immunity, which baffles many who are deeply concerned with the preservation of Democracy here.

Clarifies References

"To enable our readers to understand better the meaning of Mr. Scala's letter, we wish to add that the 'wealthy Italian who married to a Jewess' to whom he refers, is understood to be Mr. Vincent Sorrentino, a respected business man of Providence, Rhode Island, recently appointed by the Governor of his State as Director of Public Welfare. When he was inducted into office, a public ceremony was held in his honor, attended by several leading representatives of Italian communities from several eastern states. Sinclair Lewis Hits Spread of Prejudice

Must Expose Libels and Lies

Washington, D. C. — Anti-Semitism is "treason to America", according to Sinclair Lewis, novelist and winner of the Nobel Prize for literature, who is interviewed by Bernard G. Richards in the December issue of The National Jewish Monthly.

"Any organized attempt to spread hatred in the United States," Mr. Lewis declares in the interview, "or any attack upon individuals or groups here on the ground of race or religion is, in the light of the Bill of Rights — treason to America. By the same token, it is a betrayal not only of the guarantees of freedom and equality contained in the Constitution, but of the whole of our traditions and ideals as a free Republic."

Race Hatred Anti-American

"Anti-Semitism is as anti-American as any other subversive, mischievous, and inimical idea. But outside of the utter injustice, the basement that is involved in all such wholesale charges against Jews or any other minority group, it is ridiculous and thoroughly nonsensical to condemn a whole race, or to advance that archaburdity of superior and inferior races."

Asked for his advice to American Jewry, he replied: "They must join up with all the progressive forces of the country and expose all the charges against them for libels and falsehoods that they are."




