Mischa Elman Refugee Concert

All Americans, whatever their faith, creed, or political beliefs may be, are banding together this new year in a humanitarian cause which has as its goal the giving of aid to hundreds of thousands of unfortunate German refugees.

All will be helped — the Protestant, the Catholic, the oppressed Jew — all who have been persecuted and driven out of Central Europe because of their religious beliefs and their racial inheritance. Aid will go to all the sufferers from the Nazi programs of persecution which is driving to desperation the men and women who believe that "men were created equal," who believe that Protestant or Catholic youth has a right to join Protestant or Catholic youth organizations, who object to the merciless hounding of the men and women who have intermarried with what Nazidom chooses to call "inferior" racial groups.

A great man — an eminent violinist and a distinguished humanitarian — Mischa Elman — has donated his services to this great cause. Mischa Elman is giving his genius. All that is asked of us is that we give our support.

For three months, Mischa Elman is touring the United States and Canada, appearing on the concert stage in twenty-five cities. Proceeds of each and every one of those concerts will be distributed equally among three huge Refugee organizations joined together in sponsoring the Mischa Elman Non-Sectarian Refugee Concerts.

The Committee for the Non-Sectarian concerts is composed of the American Committee for Christian German Refugees, the Committee for Catholic Refugees from Germany and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Through the three agencies which will benefit the tour, thousands of refugees — Protestants, Catholics and Jews — have obtained emergency assistance and have been helped to migrate and settle in new homes in other lands. These agencies have given aid not only in behalf of the victims of persecution within Germany, but in the various countries of refuge in Europe and overseas lands.

The need for further and continued assistance to the refugees — the number is increasing hourly as the unbelievable havoc and distress in Germany increases — prompted this concerted action on the part of the three refugee organizations and Mr. Elman. In every city where Mr. Elman will give a concert — including this — men and women who are generous of heart are giving their time to help in this cause.

Mr. Elman's three months' tour is the most strenuous he has ever undertaken — in the name of charity — during the thirty years he has been delighting the music-lovers of America.

We ask you this day to give YOUR assistance — to attend the concert which Mr. Elman will give here Tuesday. It will be a way to stretch a helping and sympathetic hand across the sea.

Col. Samuels, Outlet Store Founder, Dies

Rose from Errand Boy to Executive

Private funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon for Col. Joseph Samuels, founder and president of the Outlet Company, who died on Monday afternoon of pneumonia at the Beth Israel Hospital in Boston.

Born in Washington, D. C., on June 7, 1865, the son of James and Caroline (Katzenberg) Samuels, Col. Samuels was educated in the public schools of that city, before his family moved to Philadelphia. His schooling was interrupted at the age of 11, when his father died and he had to start shifting for himself.

For several years, the man who later was to employ more than 1400 persons, worked as an errand boy in Philadelphia. He held other minor jobs in Philadelphia business houses, before finally deciding that the way to get ahead in the world was not on a salary basis. He set himself up with a

Anti-Nazi Germans In U. S. Fight Firings

PHILADELPHIA. — American employers should not "discriminate" against Germans opposed to the Hitler regime, says Walter Mueller of Milwaukee, president of the German-American League for Culture.

Addressing nearly 100 members of groups representing themselves as anti-Nazi Germans, Mueller said that many Germans living in the United States are thrown out of jobs or refused employment because of their nationality.

Mueller said Nazis in America "should be deported to their own shores, but Germans who oppose the present regime should be treated as Americans."

Nazi Blight Falls On Jewish Dentists

BERLIN.—The Government decreed this week that diplomas of Jewish dentists, veterinarians and druggists are to be voided, effective February 28.

It was decreed also that Jewish nurses and assistants should be permitted henceforth to practice only among Jews or in Jewish institutions.

Local Zionists Open Campaign For 2500 New Members



Schuman-Heink Kin In Nazi Spy Film

HOLLYWOOD. — German-born Ferdinand Schumann-Heink, son of the late singer, Ernsteine Schumann-Heink, said this week he would play a part in the new Warner Brothers picture "Confessions of a Nazi Spy," although he said he had been advised against accepting the role.

A naturalized American, Schumann-Heink described himself as "a German of the imperialist school" and added "it is a privilege to contribute my humble share toward correcting evil conditions that exist today."

Foreign Exchange Needed for Proposal

Ruble Resigns As U. S. Director

LONDON. — The intergovernmental committee on refugees provisionally accepted a German plan this week for removing Jews from Germany and authorized establishment of a private international settlement corporation to help pay the \$300,000,000 cost.

LONDON. — George Rublee, American director of the Intergovernmental Refugee Committee, placed his resignation from that position and Chancellor Hitler's promise of a conditional truce with Jews before the committee this week. The resignation was accepted, it was understood, and a new director, not an American, appointed.

Hitler Proposals

The committee met this morning in the London Museum and studied the Hitler refugee plan, which was understood to stipulate:—

1. Jews would be permitted to return to jobs from which they were ousted until an emigration scheme is accepted or rejected by the committee.

2. Young, active Jews—estimated to number 150,000 of the nearly 700,000 Jews in Germany—would be given permission to emigrate provided they arrange later

Says German Jews Are Smuggled Out

BUFFALO. — An attorney for a German-Jew awaiting a hearing on an illegal entry charge last week quoted his client as saying Jewish people in Germany were being smuggled out of the country by an international ring operating from Paris:

Attorney Gordon Gannon said Isadore Celnik, 35, told him how he sneaked across the German border into France after being held in a German concentration camp for weeks.

Celnik said he then joined a group of other German refugees and made a deal with an agent of the smuggling ring to be smuggled into Canada for 2,800 marks. Gannon declared.

Celnik was arrested by immigration agents as he landed on the American side of Niagara River in a rowboat.

Tel Aviv Port Traffic Grows

TEL AVIV.—Ship traffic at Tel Aviv Port has increased 50 per cent during the past year, and goods traffic has increased 60 per cent, a statement issued by the Directorate of the Port announced. 818 ships registered during 1938 at the Port, which began operations in October, 1936, as a result of the continuing Arab strike at nearby Jaffa Port.

16,900 travellers passed through the Port of the all-Jewish city since last May. The two-year-old port has grown to such proportions that its permanent staff, in all classifications, now consists of 1,070 persons.

Highlights of the Week's News

Mercy "Killer"

NEW YORK. — A doctor here will risk jail to help end suffering of persons with incurable diseases, as long as euthanasia is forbidden by law. The doctor insists "the law is an ass" and must be changed.

Luongo Indicted

Charged in three separate indictments with attempted bribery of election officials and in a fourth indictment with voting more than once, Alderman Thomas S. Luongo, headed a list of 26 persons in Providence and North Providence who were named in a series of election fraud indictments returned this week by the Providence Grand Jury.

Two Hold On Sticker Charge

NEW YORK. — While the case of Lyons Schreck, 35, charged with pasting a sticker with the words "Buy Christian" on a newspaper was being heard in Night Court, a court attendant saw Joseph Hartery, an unemployed clerk, pasting one of the stickers to a seat. Magistrate Louis Brodsky, who found Schreck guilty,

ordered Hartery before him and held both Schreck and he for investigation and sentence.

Foreign Goods Bill Proposed

Drastic regulation of the manner in which foreign-made goods may be displayed for sale in Rhode Island is provided for in a measure introduced in the Senate this week by Senator Thomas J. Donnelly. Signs not less than seven by eleven inches in one inch type, or larger, carrying the words "foreign-made" or the name of the country of origin, would have to be displayed in stores handling such merchandise.

Big Money "Tip"

JERSEY CITY. — An investigation to determine the source of a tip that enabled a number of large depositors of the closed New Jersey Title Guarantee and Trust Co., of Jersey City, to get their money out of the bank between 9 A. M. and noon on Saturday was under way as arrangements continued for early payment by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. of all deposits up to \$5,000.

Louis A. Reilly, New Jersey State Commissioner of Banking, confirmed the heavy Saturday withdrawals.

Mayor Offers City Charter

The proposed revision of the Providence City Charter, drawn up by Mayor John F. Collins, giving sweeping appointive, removal and administrative powers, to the Mayor, was introduced in the General Assembly this week. The measure makes no provision for a referendum on his proposed revisions.

Predicts New Social Order

NEW YORK. — It's a mistake to think we shall ever return to standards of 1929, Rabbi Sydney Goldstein told members of the Urban League. A new social order must emerge, said Rabbi Goldstein, that will utilize America's surplus in men, materials, machinery and money.

National Guard Air Squadron

A National Guard air squadron will be established in Rhode Island if Congress approves a bill

to increase Army Air Corps strength to 5500 planes, Governor William H. Vanderbilt said this week. The unit composed of 31 officers and 138 men of the R. I. National Guard would use the new Hills-grove airport hangar. If established the unit will be organized this summer.

School Reform

ROME. — The Fascist Grand Council this week approved a program of extensive reform in the national school system designed to replace all educational institutions "from kindergarten to university on a strictly Fascist plane."

Civil Service Bill Radically Altered

Radically altered from the Broomhead original by amendments providing for "five and ten" veterans' preference and holding up competitive examinations until Jan. 1, 1940, a substitute civil service bill received the approval of Senate Republican members this week.

Found Guilty

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Commonwealth and Southern subsidiary charged with giving illegal preference to newspapers which was friendly to it, and opposed the TVA, was found guilty on 917 counts by the Tennessee Utilities Commission.

Suggests U. S.

Choose its Friends

The United States should begin "choosing its friends" to show the totalitarian Powers that American resources will be available to the democracies in the event of war as a warning to dictators to keep peace, Prof. William Brown, Jr., said this week during a panel discussion on international affairs at Alumnae Hall, Pembroke College.

Ask Revamping Of Wagner Act

WASHINGTON. — A complete revamping of Wagner act to confer all Labor Board's judicial powers on courts and make it a prosecuting body only and require it to give preference to craft unions was asked this week by Senator Burke.

Disillusionment

NEW YORK. — Tom Harris, who bid \$40,000 for the right to demolish the Sixth Avenue El, has supplied the city administration with affidavits attesting to the fact that he was not selling any of the scrap iron to Japan... Mr. Harris has just learned that he can't possibly make any profit. The El's pillars, which for 40 years were believed to be constructed of all-steel, actually are hollow shells-filled with concrete.

Last Stand

MADRID. — Loyalists rallied their forces this week for a last stand against heavy odds in Central Spain. Various Cabinet members toured regions to bolster morale in expectation of early insurgent attacks.

New Hospital

A bill, proposing establishment of a 400 bed neuropsychiatric hospital in Rhode Island at a cost of one million dollars was introduced this week by Congressman Charles F. Risk in the House of Representatives. The State Department of the Legion recently passed a resolution asking for a 300-bed hospital for Rhode Island.

No Faction Fights

WASHINGTON. — C. I. O. leaders who sit on U. A. W. advisory boards revealed this week that a report was issued with Homer Martin's backing, recommending that Communist sects be compelled to keep faction fights out of union affairs.

On Proper Attire For Weddings

DENVER. — Birthday suits are proper attire for weddings, Colorado Attorney General ruled this week after intensive search of laws of God and man, provided couple are "properly modest about it."

VOCATION COURSES

Under the leadership of Harold Stanzler, a Vocational Guidance course for Jewish youth, has been started by Roger Williams Lodge, B'nai B'rith. The course will include lectures by outstanding authorities on vocation adjustments.

Arab Terrorism Mounting Again

JERUSALEM. — Arab terrorism in Palestine has increased recently. For a time the terrorists had directed their activities almost entirely against Arabs who refused to co-operate, but Jews and Britons are again victims in the campaign of kidnapping and murder. Three Jews were killed and two severely wounded last week-end.

Supreme Court.

Amid the universal expressions of admiration and regret evoked by his retirement it is difficult to realize that Louis Dembitz Brandeis was once denounced as a dangerous radical, an enemy of American institutions, unfit for the high office to which Woodrow Wilson nominated him nearly a quarter of a century ago.

And, through all the years since, Mr. Justice Brandeis has proved how false were the charges of his enemies, how truly he is in the best sense of the word a conservative, standing with those "who wish to leave unrestricted the power of wealth" but with those "who in relations are working for justice to capital and the public alike."

He has withdrawn from activity on the Supreme Court, and we trust that he may be spared for many years to enjoy that happy leisure which he so richly deserves. He could not withdraw from the place of affection and trust which he occupies in the hearts of the American people.

Susan Brandeis Tells Aim Of Jewish Crisis Group

NEW YORK. — Lively, dark-eyed Susan Brandeis, lawyer-daughter of Associate Justice Louis D. Brandeis of the Supreme Court, believes that crises should be met with action.

Her reaction to the crisis facing Jews throughout the world is characteristic of a woman who has managed to combine a man-size professional career with wifehood and motherhood.

She is working on a plan to or-

ganize Jewish professional women throughout the country into a vanguard of the Zionist Hadassah organization.

Miss Brandeis, who in private life is Mrs. Jacob H. Gilbert, wife of a lawyer and mother of three sons, has already helped organize sixty similar groups in thirty-five States.

Has Double Program

The organization's aim is to work for a two-fold program of education in this country and health, immigration, land rehabilitation and child refugee settlement in Palestine.

Miss Brandeis, who was appointed in 1935 to fill a vacancy in the State Board of Regents, was reappointed in 1937 to the full term of twelve years. A graduate of Bryn Mawr College and the University of Chicago Law School, she was formerly arbitrator for the Municipal Court here.

NEW YORK. — David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, was awarded this week the Marconi Gold Medal of Achievement, by the Veteran Wireless Operators' Association "as the outstanding radio executive of today who was in earlier years a wireless operator."

Poland, Reich Reach Refugee Agreement

BERLIN. — German-Polish negotiators have reached an agreement permitting 10,000 Polish Jews expelled from the Reich last October and held on the Polish border to return to Germany for settlement of their affairs, it was reported here.

According to the arrangements, the deportees would be permitted to take away their movable goods. The value of their immovable property would be deposited in a special account, to be transferred to them later in Polish currency. It was predicted the negotiators would soon tackle the entire problem of reaching a settlement concerning those Polish Jews still residing with the Reich.

JACKSON, Miss. — Famed as radio orator, vaudeville entertainer and baseball pitcher, the great Dizzy Dean now becomes a professor. Dizzy arrived here last Tuesday to join the faculty of Promoter Ray Doan's baseball school. He will teach youngsters how to become a great hurler—like Dean.

Kleiber Quits La Scala Hits Anti-Jewish Bias

LONDON. — Erich Kleiber, famous conductor, has cancelled all engagements to appear at La Scala, Milan, because of Italy's anti-Jewish campaign.

In a letter to authorities of La Scala, Kleiber wrote: "I have just heard that the doors of La Scala Theatre will be closed to your Jewish fellow-citizens. Music is made for every one, like the sun and air. When this fountain of consolation, so necessary in these hard times, is denied to any human being — and that merely because he belongs to a different religion and race — I cannot collaborate either as a Christian or an artist."

Ersatz Coffee Gives Nazi Residents Chance to Joke

BERLIN. — German residents joked about the "weak coffee" situation this week, the result of a shortage which has occasioned in some cases the use of "ersatz" coffee. Prominent restaurants stopped serving "mocha"—a strong-brewed after dinner coffee—and served only ordinary coffee in demitasses.

A foreigner sifted his quarter-pound ration from a shop yesterday and discovered that forty-one of its 125 grams consisted of what appeared to be

parched and certainly was not coffee.

One coffee shop displayed three baskets, apparently brimful of coffee, in a show window. It was marked, "For exhibition purposes only."

The coffee situation gave rise to a new joke:—"There's plenty of coffee. Any store, will give you a pound free if you buy two pounds of butter and a dozen eggs. All you have to do is find a store with that much butter and eggs."

Palestine Immigration Vital, Says Dr. Wise

PLYMOUTH, England. — Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York declared this week "there must be no stoppage of Jewish immigration into Palestine at a time of desperate need."

Rabbi Wise is a member of an international committee of prominent Jews who will attend a round table conference in England on the future status of Palestine. "Palestine cannot solve the problem of the Jewish refugees," he said on his arrival, "but sixty years of experience in the resettlement of Palestine makes it possible for us to make room for the maximum number of refugees. The others must be absorbed by other friendly countries."

Ohio Censors Ban "Prof. Mamlock"

COLUMBUS. — Although approved in every other state, "Professor Mamlock," a film depicting the persecution of Jews in Germany, has been banned by the Ohio Board of Censors on the ground that it would be "harmful" and might "stir up hatred and ill will and gain nothing."

The National Council on Freedom from Censorship is cooperating with branches of the Civil Liberties Union in Cleveland, Columbus and Cincinnati in efforts to lift the ban.


Moes Chitim Issues Appeal For Funds

On Jewish Policy

BY LEON DENNEN

The group of influential American Jews who, according to Secretary Harold Ickes, advised President Roosevelt not to appoint Felix Frankfurter as an associate justice of the United States Supreme Court for fear that this appointment might fan the flames of anti-Semitism in this country can now rest in peace.

If they have any self-respect left, they will also hang their heads in shame.

On January 30 Felix Frankfurter took the oath of office. In firm, clear words, read the newspaper accounts, he swore "to administer justice without respect to person." And America still stands in its old place!

More than that: far from kindling the flames of anti-Semitism, it seems, the appointment of Professor Frankfurter may yet, according to the Institute of Public Opinion (the Gallup Poll), prove to be the President's most generally accepted appointment.

In a survey, the results of which were published in the New York Times of January 29, the Institute asked:

"Do you think Felix Frankfurter will make a good United States Supreme Court Judge?"

The actual vote of those with opinions was: Yes, 82 per cent; no, 18 per cent. Even more important is the fact that only a small group of American citizens—the equivalent of 3 per cent of the voting population—objected to the appointment on the ground of race.

It was indeed a Montana farmer who taught our group of frightened Jews the essence of true democracy: "He'll make," he wrote of Frankfurter's appointment in the Institute's questionnaire, "a liberal judge and his interpretation of the law will help bring it up to the present."

This and nothing else is the qualification for the job; and Felix Frankfurter is not only one of our greatest legal minds but also an outstanding liberal.

To those who depend for information upon the daily press or, what is even worse, the liberal philo-Semitic weeklies, the result of the Gallup Poll will come as a surprise. They will ask, and justly so: What about the "wave" of anti-Semitic "protests" that were featured for weeks in our press? What about the alarming editorials in our liberal weeklies?

The keen student of American life, however, will know that at least in his instance Dr. George Gallup, the director of the Poll, is right.

The truth is—and I say this without even for a moment minimizing the sinister forces at work in our country, forces that must be combated

with all our strength and energy—that there is little conscious anti-Semitism in the United States. For the past three years I have traveled extensively throughout the United States. My work brought me into hundreds of factories, machine-tool shops, mines and railroad yards. I became intimately acquainted with hundreds of Americans of all walks of life. It was, indeed, amazing how little conscious anti-Semitism I found in the country.

I did find, to be sure, a great deal of bewilderment and in some cases even contempt of the Jew. In a large machine-tool shop in Detroit a young worker once asked me:

"Why doesn't the Jew fight back like some of the other minorities in Europe? All he does is wail."

"This is of course the picture of the Jew you get from reading the daily press," I replied. "It is a false picture. The Jews fight and fight hard for their rights. Have you ever heard of the heroic defense that the young Jews are putting up in Palestine?"

"I have never heard of it," replied the worker.

"No, you didn't," I said. "Nor have you heard of the great strike that the whole Jewish population of Poland, in cooperation with the progressive and Socialist forces, carried out against the anti-Semitic measures of the government."

"It was a mighty protest symbolic of new developments at which every true believer in Democracy and opponent of Fascism should rejoice. Only those who are acquainted with conditions in Poland can realize what an act of courage it was on the part of the Jews to carry out the strike. And yet on October 19, 1937, Jewish factories, shops and business houses of Poland were closed. Cinema houses were empty. Jewish housewives did no shopping

and Warsaw's energetic Jewish quarter was silent."

"Why don't the papers or liberal magazines write about these things?"

"For two reasons. Some of the large daily newspapers are owned by Jews. These are usually assimilated Jews without a backbone or tradition. Their ambition in life is to become like the Joneses; their only trace of Jewishness are the few little-understood Hebrew words that they mumble in their reformed temples on holidays. They are like the ostrich who hides his head in the sand to escape the enemy. In their attempt to be impartial, they often lean backwards, usually to the detriment of their own interests.

(This, incidentally, is the unrepresentative group of Jews who advised President Roosevelt not to appoint Frankfurter to the Supreme Court.)

"The second reason is that the liberals in America and their publications are in the business of philo-Semitism. Their slogan is: Pity the Jew! They have their own pet concept of the Jew. It is based upon the millions of — Jews who are flesh and blood of Jewish life and tradition, who are never worried about their Jewish origin, just as you are not worried about your Irish origin, but upon several thousand petrified upper class snobs who, like the majority of the German Jews, having no backbone, no tradition, nothing to live for once their economic status is questioned, crumble and perish at the first sign of trouble.

"When Alfred Rosenberg refers to the Jew as the son of the devil, or when Julius Streicher makes one of his pornographic speeches against the Jews, the American newspapers devote frontpage stories to it and the liberal publications shed crocodile tears. For here the implication is: Poor, defenseless Jews! Eternal martyrs! Pity the Jew! In the case of the strike of the Polish Jews, however, there is no room for pity.

"But that is not all: having themselves created a straw Jew, the liberals then proceed to tear him down. Thus, I once read a letter in the Nation by Lorine Pruette, a well-known liberal writer, in which she suggests that the Jews need a good dose of 'mental hygiene which will help them to ignore the memory of ancient grievances and check the tradition of anticipating future outrages.' As though all the poor little Jewish masochist has to do is sit and anticipate future outrages."

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Brandeis Resigns Supreme Court Post No Reason Given For Retirement

Stating no reasons for his action, Associate Supreme Court Justice, Louis D. Brandeis, 82 year-old dean of the bench, this week tendered notice of retirement to President Roosevelt, effective immediately. His two-line letter of resignation read: "Dear Mr. President; Pursuant to the act of March 1, 1937, I retire this day from regular active service on the bench. Cordially, Louis D. Brandeis."

Mr. Justice Brandeis was the first Jew to occupy a seat on the high tribunal, and his resignation takes away from the court its outstanding liberal member. The vacancy enables President Roosevelt to make his fourth appointment to the bench in less than two years.

Born in Louisville, Ky., November 13, 1856, Brandeis studied in Louisville public schools and attended the university there, but in 1872 he was taken to Germany to spend two years at the Annen Realschule, Dresden, Saxony.

The family wealth was wiped out during the interlude, and he worked his way through Harvard Law school in two years, and permanently impaired his eyesight by too much reading. He was graduated with high honors. His first law shingle was hung out in St. Louis, but he later moved back to Boston. In 1891 he was awarded a Master of Arts degree by Harvard, and married Miss Alice Goldmark of New York.

After his appointment to the high court in 1916, he became a fast friend of the aging Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, and the two began to hand down the dissenting opinions which made court history.



Hitler Turns Nazi Blast On Scandinavian Countries

LONDON. — German-nurtured agitation against Jews in Sweden, Denmark and Norway, the uncovering of a Nazi spy plot in Denmark and the German-enforced resignation of a Cabinet minister in Finland, have combined to alarm the constituted governments of Scandinavia.

Sweden, Denmark and Norway, though indubitably "Nordic" states, have shown no inclination to become Nazi. Abortive attempts have been made to establish Nazi parties, but they have remained insignificant.

Withstands Assaults.

All three countries have had Socialist Premiers and democracy

has more than held its own against assaults both from the Left and the Right.

Anti-Semitism, which nowadays seems to be the twin of totalitarianism, also had been absent from these states.

The Jewish population of Sweden, about 6,500, is only one-twentieth of 1 per cent of the population. Six thousand Danish Jews form only one-sixth of 1 per cent of that land's people and 1,450 Norwegian Jews form only one-twentieth of 1 per cent of Norway's people.

Formed No Menace

Their slight numbers formed no "menace," nor did they hold a predominant position in business, finance, law or medicine.

But the religious and racial serenity of Scandinavia suddenly has been disturbed the past few weeks by a flood of anti-Semitic pamphlets, posters and handbills. They bear no printer's name or address, and the suspicion is strong that they have been sent from Germany. Readers are incited to "stop the Jewish invasion."

Hideous Caricatures

In Stockholm the posters are adorned with hideous caricatures of well-known Swedish Jews.

In Oslo business firms are urged to advertise that they are purely Aryan if they want to continue to hold their customers.

Leaders of organized labor, he declared are determined to purge their membership of "ism elements" through education and barring of Communists, Fascists and others from union leadership.

Reich to Mobilize March 6 To Scare Europe, Says Briton

London Correspondent in U. S.
Link Move to Aspirations of Axis

WASHINGTON.— Sir Willmott Lewis, Washington correspondent of the Times, of London, said in one of his N. B. C. news broadcasts that Germany's military forces would be completely mobilized March 6 to "frighten" Great Britain and France into giving way to Italian and German de-

mands for colonies. He said his information came from a London news letter, cabled here by two generally well-informed British newspaper men. The mobilization of the German air forces is already 95 per cent complete, and the rest of the program, he said, was as follows:

"On February 10th the first recruits will be called up, instead of in the autumn; on February 15, beginning of mobilization proper, including the requisition of much civil transport, will be started; on February 28 men between 25 and 30 will be called, and on March 6 mobilization will be completed.

"It is on March 6 that Germany's warlike preparations will reach the full limit Chancellor Hitler thinks necessary for frightening Britain and France into giving way firstly to Italian demands, and secondly, to wider colonial concessions.

He said that "more and more Italian troops are being sent to Libya for duty near the Tunisian border."


Says It Must Be Exposed

NEW YORK. — The greatest danger to American democracy today lies not in the activities of the frankly Fascist "haberdashery brigades" but in the subtle attacks on free institutions engineered by so-called patriotic groups and individuals who conceal their Nazi aims, James Waterman Wise, research consultant of the Council Against Intolerance in America, said in an address at the Free Synagogue, Carnegie Hall, in New York.

"Renouncing the name but maintaining the objectives of Nazism, these individuals and groups, may be recognized by their opposition to the basic guarantees of the Bill of Rights, by anti-Semitic, anti-Catholic or anti-Negro bias and by "vicious attacks on all progressive movements and men," Mr. Wise said.

"To expose and defeat this type of Hitlerism, it is necessary to pillory it and expose it, whether it emanates from Royal Oak in Michigan, from the Black Legion of vigilantism or from the streamlined versions of the Ku Klux Klan," Mr. Wise continued.

Premier Imredy Tenders Resignation

BUDAPEST, Hungary. — Causing a sensation in political circles, Premier Bela Imredy announced this week that he had resigned, because his grandmother was a Jew. Imredy is remembered as the author of recent anti-Jewish legislation even more severe in economic restrictions on Jews than the German Nazis' Nuremberg laws.

He announced to the government party conference that he had carefully checked his family tree and had discovered that one of his grandmothers, a Jewess, had been baptized in 1815 at the age of seven. "This discovery," he said, "forces me to announce my resignation."

Germany's Workers Put on Draft System

BERLIN. — The Federal Labor Office and its sub-departments throughout Germany were this week authorized by Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering to draft any workers who would be considered necessary to perform tasks of importance to the state.

Foreigners excepted, every inhabitant of Germany may be drafted for whatever form of labor Goering deems necessary. Men or women holding jobs will be given leave of absence immediately by their employers when called.

If a task prescribed by the Labor Office is of indefinite duration, the person drafted is regarded as having resigned from his former position. But if he is drafted only for a stated period, the employer must keep his job open for him and take him back whenever the Labor Office's special requirement is filled.

The employer is not compelled to pay wages for the absent period, but the drafted person's wage scale for his new job may not necessarily be the same.

to finance the emigration of parents and other relatives.

3. Older Jews would be guaranteed against further Nazi anti-Jewish legislation while the emigration scheme is in operation.

May Provide Loan

4. A trust fund would be created out of Jewish property in Germany on which emigrating Jews would be able to draw for passage and equipment and machinery needed in countries to which they were going.

The greatest barrier to acceptance of the plan was said to be the Nazi government's failure to guarantee the supply of foreign currency for emigrating Jews.

The suggestion was heard that the governments represented on the committee might float a loan large enough to pay most of the expenses of transporting and resettling refugees.

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

small sum in a business of selling clothing in small towns through the East, and moving on from place to place after a brief stand in each town. He opened his first permanent store in Meriden, Conn., with a sales force of two people, and attended to his own advertising by distributing hand bills from door to door.

But after a while, he decided to move again, and in 1894, after taking on his brother, Leon as a partner, he arrived in Providence. The brothers originally intended to remain here for only 30 days, but after looking over the field, they decided that Providence offered the opening for a permanent business, which they had long been seeking. The little two-by-four store, out of which the Outlet Company was to grow, was bare of furnishings, and the stock was piled up on packing cases used as counters. But it wasn't long before the customers felt they were getting good value for their money and the sales volume skyrocketed.

Col. Samuels never relaxed his active interest in every detail of the store management, and remained at the helm to very last. He was widely known for his philanthropy. His major benefaction was his gift of \$300,000 to the Rhode Island hospital in 1929, for the construction and endowment of a children's dental clinic, to be conducted primarily for the poor.

He was an ardent golfer, a raiser of flowers and a lover of animals. He held membership in St. John's Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Philadelphia, the Elks, the Turks Head Club, the Lyceum Club of Boston, the Kernwood Country Club of Kernwood, Mass., the Providence Chamber of Commerce, the Town Criers, the Friars Club of New York, the Metacommet and Ledgemont Golf Clubs, the Edgewood Casino Club and the Commercial Club. He was a member of Temple Beth El.



Samuels was married in Boston on January 17, 1900 to Alice March Murr, the daughter of Louis and Bertha (Silver) Murr.
