Building the World Of Tomorrow

With Nazi legions goosestepping relentlessly across the map of Europe, crushing any small nation that stands in the path of their brutal forward march, the concept of a people without a political entity of their own is becoming familiar to every one.

Surrounded by exhibits of great and independent nations, the Palestine Pavilion will stand at the Fair as proof to all the world that through the storms and perils of the present day the Jews of Palestine continue their work of rehabilitating a land where thousands of their brethren will one day find refuge.

To enlist the fuller support of American Jewry for this Pavilion, the sponsors of this World's Fair exhibit have designated Passover Week as Jewish Palestine Pavilion Week, for a special endeavor to round out the Pavilion effort.

Every American Jew who is proud of what his brethren have done in Palestine and of America's share in that up-building must contribute what he can during Palestine Pavilion Week, that all America may see what Jews are doing in the Holy Land toward building a better tomorrow for the victims of today's persecution.

Kuhn Complains

Fritz Kuhn, after being arrested for speeding for the third time within a week complained of the "official persecution being directed against himself and leaders of the Bund."

In his weekly organ "Weckruf und Beobachter," the Nazi mouthpiece bitterly assailed the trail of subpoenas and summons which Kuhn and his aides have been following. And ironically enough, despite the acknowledged fact that the Bund is attempting to sabotage the bill of rights the newspaper cries, "What about the liberty in a free democracy?"

Legal Control of Ism Propaganda

In a recent speech Freda Kirchwey, editor and publisher of the Nation, suggested legislation that would ban uniforms for political organizations and curb race slander.

"The most important article of export from Germany is the Nazi idea," Miss Kirchwey said. "Hitler might well have said about his doctrine what he said about German goods in general—'We must export or die.' Nazism cannot live unto itself alone. It prides itself on its dynamic nature. But even for more practical reasons the Nazi dogma, as well as other Nazi products, must find markets abroad. Hitler counts on foreign pro-Nazi feeling to support his aggressive aims."

"Everything the Nazis hope to export to the United States—race hatred, contempt for the democratic government and liberal doctrines, and the rule of violence—is incorporated in the German-American Bund, Hitler's representative."

Miss Kirchwey then admits that the boycotting of ideas is not simple. She then suggests that laws prohibiting political organizations from wearing uniforms and laws prohibiting libels on a racial or religious groups be adopted to counteract these foreign termites.

Jews Trapped in Czechia

Palestine Differences Tackled Once More

Britain Shapes New Policies

LONDON.—The breakdown of the Palestine conferences left the Government faced this week with working out its own policy to enforce peace among the Jews and Arabs in the Holy Land.

Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald said he would inform the House of Commons that this policy would be announced in a White Paper.

Jemal Husseini, spokesman for the Arab delegation which rejected the British peace proposals yesterday, was asked if Palestine Arabs had given MacDonald any guarantee to preserve the peace. He replied: "The British will now have to mow down every one of us with machine guns."

The Jewish delegation had turned down the British plan the day before.

It was learned that the Arabs had not rejected the three main features—independence, immigration and land proposals—but had refused to accept the British suggestion of an indefinite transitional period for establishing an independent Palestine.

Hadassah Rushes Aid for Children

NEW YORK.—Acting quickly to relieve the panic among Jews in dismembered Czechoslovakia, Hadassah, the women's Zionist organization of America announced this week that it had completed arrangements by cable for the immediate transfer of 234 Jewish boys and girls from Prague to Palestine.

The children will be transferred under the auspices of Hadassah's Youth Aliyah movement, which has already sent 3,500 refugee children to Palestine. Places are ready for the Czech children in thirty-five agricultural settlements and three trade schools in Palestine.

Returning German to Swap Business With Jew in Reich

DUNELLEN.—Karl Schurr, a German-born ice dealer with business troubles, has arranged to swap his business and property in Jersey with a German-Jewish refugee family.

Schurr, his wife and daughter, Ethel, 18, will return to Germany as soon as the refugee family arrives here. A son, Oscar, 22, will remain to teach the refugees the ice business.

"I have nothing against the Jewish people," Schurr explained. "If I can help one of their families while also helping my own, so much the better. I like your country, but it is not my country. You know how it is when you are brought up in one place."

Schurr, 58, said he did blame the United States for his hardships, but he said friends had advised him he would fare better back in Germany. He has been twelve years in this country.

Neither the name of the Jewish family nor the nature of their business was disclosed.

With a new message for the world, Italy's Premier Mussolini had a big day Thursday. The new chamber of fases and corporations was inaugurated, succeeding the Italian chamber of deputies. The date also marked the twentieth anniversary of the founding of the first "Facio di Combattimento," Mussolini's storm troopers.

DEPORT REFUGEES

VIENNA.—A group of forty Jews, who had taken refuge in Hungary and had been compelled to return by Hungarian authorities, reached the frontier and were sent to concentration camps. Similar groups have been trickling back in recent days, totaling about 100.

Florida Nazis Fight Lands 7 in Lock up

CORAL GABLES, Fla.—Police Sergeant W. F. Key said seven men, three of whom wore uniforms similar to those of Nazi storm troopers and carried literature of an anti-Semitic "White Front," were arrested last week after a brawl in a barroom.

Key said the leader of the uniformed group booked as William Blanchard, twenty-three, said the "White Front" was national in scope.

The officers said pamphlets carried by the uniformed men invited Gentiles to "unite against Jews."

Suicides Mark Nazi Aryanization Drive

Invasion Tangles Refugee Problem

The destruction of the Czechoslovak Republic will add more than 356,830 to the number of Jews who are seeking escape from the mailed fist of Nazi repression.

A considerable proportion include refugees from Germany proper, from Austria and other neighboring countries which have come under Nazi influence.

Nazis pushed their aryanization drive in Bohemia and Moravia and suicides continued.

Newspapers contained no death notices, either in paid or unpaid announcements. But it was learned that a prominent Jewish physician, after being called in to attend forty cases of suicide or attempted suicide, was unable to endure the strain and put a revolver to his head. He was in a

Hull, Perkins Oppose Refugee Proposal

WASHINGTON.—An unfavorable report was returned by the State and Labor Departments on a bill submitted by Senator William H. Smathers, of New Jersey, which called for legislation permitting the President to allow entry of certain aged persons from countries of oppression.

In reports to the Committee on Immigration now studying the bill, Secretaries Cordell Hull and Frances Perkins said the bill would be difficult of administration and would cause unfavorable action abroad by placing the President in a position of designating certain countries as oppressors.

Thomas Calls War Still A Profit Device

NEW YORK.—Norman Thomas, national Socialist party leader, called on the people this week to prevent President Roosevelt from getting unlimited power in the matter of peace and war.

"The armament trade has not become holy because Hitler has become wicked," he said. "The armament trade is a trade for profit, and wars are fought for profit."

"Democracy will not be saved by war." Fascism is getting ahead because democracy is on the defensive and is not working. If the war goes on any length of time there will be revolts in Germany, France, India, Ireland and Arabia."

Refugee Writes Music for Drama

NEW YORK.—"Jeremiah," an English adaptation of Stefan Zweig's drama based on the life of the Biblical prophet, was produced by the Theater Guild at the Guild Theater.

The music for the production was written by Chemja Winaver, former music director of the Jewish Culture League in Berlin, now a refugee here. The play was hailed by the press.

1,000 Frisco Germans Ask Congress to Remove Consul

LOS ANGELES.—One thousand Americanized Germans, who said their action represented the sentiments of a majority of naturalized Germans in this country, demanded of President Roosevelt and Congress the removal of Captain Fritz Weidemann as Nazi Consul General of San Francisco.

At a mass meeting in Hollywood last night they authorized a telegraphic protest to Mr. Roosevelt and Congress in the name of the German-American League for Culture, a nation-wide organization claiming 85,000 members with branches in seventeen cities.

Identical telegrams dispatched to the President and presiding officers of the Senate and House, said in part:

"We protest the un-American

activities of the Nazi Bund and ask you to take proper steps against this agency of the Hitler Government. We strongly protest the presence of Captain Fritz Weidemann, formerly private adjutant of Mr. Hitler, in his new capacity as German Consul General in San Francisco. The appointment of Weidemann, who in the New York trial against the Nazi spies was named as one of the organizers of Nazi espionage in the United States, is an offense to America and especially to the majority of loyal democratic-minded American citizens of German descent."

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

Jewish Center Building Drive Gets Under Way

Five \$1,000 Initial Gifts Announced

500 Attend Dinner Meeting

Initial donations of \$1,000 each from Milton C. Sapinsley, Mrs. Isaac Wolf, Max L. Grant, the Men's Gym Class and Archie Joslin, together with \$1,500 from Charles and Archibald Silverman, \$500 from the Young Women's Hebrew Association, and similar sums from Samuel Soforenko, Saul Abrams and David Dwares, were announced at the formal opening of the Jewish Community Center's \$75,000 Building Fund Campaign, held last Monday night at the Narragansett Hotel. Approximately 500 men, women, boys and girls were in attendance.

Isaac Siegel Speaks

Former Congressman Isaac Siegel, of New York, guest speaker for the evening, attacked "religious publications" which "libel men in public life." He directed his attack particularly against the magazine "Ave Maria," printed at Notre Dame, Indiana, but he asserted the publication was not published under the auspices of Notre Dame University.

Youth Make Appeal

A highpoint of the evening was reached when three Center youths, Melvin Chernick, Maurice Satloff and Marion Kominsky, took their places before an incomplete model of the proposed new Center buildings, urging their elders to make the architect's dream real. "We have only you to look to," declared Miss Kominsky. "Please do not fail us!"

Necessity for Drive

Samuel H. Workman, president of the Center, explained the dire necessity for the drive. "Our children," he declared, "are forced to play in a 70-year-old building which is virtually a fire trap. Those who use the gymnasium and shower-room are exposed to conditions which, from the standpoint of sanitation, are intolerable. Something must be done, and now is the time to do it!"





U. S. Senators Emphasize Palestine Policy Unchanged

WASHINGTON. — Reviewing America's relation to the issuance of the Balfour Declaration and subsequent United States endorsement of it in the Lodge-Fish resolution of 1922, seventeen Senators emphasized "that the American Government is not unrelated to the modern history of Palestine."

Quoting article 7 of our treaty or convention with Great Britain in 1924 with reference to the British Mandate over Palestine: "Nothing contained in the present convention shall be affected by

any modification which may be made in the terms of the Mandate, as recited above, unless such modification shall have been assented to by the United States."

American Zionist officials said that "disturbing" reports that Great Britain is "seriously considering the establishment of an independent Arab State giving the Jewish population a permanent minority status," prompted the Senators to emphasize their concern that the policy of Palestine be unchanged.

Ski Experts Meet

HOW TO TALK

To An Anti Semite

BY STUART CHASE

A friend of mine called at the village post office while the Nazi persecutions were at their height. He heard a leatherfaced New England farmer say: "If you ask me, it's a good thing. Jews ain't fit to live in the same country with decent people. They ought to run 'em out of Germany. They ought to run 'em out of this country."

My friend is descended from a long line of Irishmen. He was born in the middle west and baptized a Catholic. None of his forbears, so far as he knows, have intermarried with Jews. He turned on the farmer:

"That's a pretty strong statement, Mr. Perkins. You know, I'm a quarter Jewish myself." Mr. Perkins, whose income derived in part from my friend, collapsed. He numbed a red-faced apology and fled. The post-office hangers-on were eyewitnesses of an airplane crash. Nothing like it had ever been heard in the town.

There may be an idea here. If those of us who are innocent of Jewish relatives should proceed soberly to claim them when the Perkinses put on their act, we might help to smash some of the anti-Semitic mythology. If a million or two of us should do it, we might get the Perkinses so confused and bewildered that they would close their silly mouths. It wouldn't be comfortable to run down Jews when you could never be sure whether present company included one or not.

This proposal will be resented by the faithful of Israel, the select group who hold that they are a superior cut of mankind. That dogma causes as much hell and damnation as the Perkins doctrine. Either doctrine is out of place in the United States. We are a mongrel people, thank God!—the melting pot of the world.

No Jewish Race

No American who pretends to be civilized can nourish a prejudice against any other American for being a "Jew." If he is both civilized and educated, he knows that there is no such entity as a Jewish race. reputable anthropologists deny that Jews are a race at all. The most casual observer can match every supposed characteristic of Jews with an opposite characteristic, also in Jews. I cannot pretend very successfully to be a Negro, but I should have no more difficulty in pretending to be a Jew than had my Irish friend. There are blond Jews, snub-nosed Jews, tall Jews, short Jews, blue-eyed Jews, straight-haired, curly-haired, bald Jews, In Africa there are said to be Black Jews.

The only dependable characteristics which marks a Jew from other men are his religion and certain folkways which go with it, like abstaining from hog meat, and circumcising male babies. But most American Jews, like most American Episcopalians are less devout than their fathers and grandfathers. So even the religious differences is melting out.

The Jews were never a race, but only a religious sect in a pretty mixed racial stew in Western Asia. Since the days of Caesar that sect has wandered so far and wide and intermarried so much with outsiders that no competent biologist would risk his professional reputation by attempting to measure and identify a Jewish race. The concept is pure ghost-chasing, as crazy as the "Aryan" mythology of Hitler. If Jews insist on considering themselves a race they are making a false identification.

There remains religion, along with a few vague patterns, to mark off a Jew from Mr. Perkins or a rug merchant or the Right Reverend William T. Manning. The religion we have noted is a characteristic which becomes less defined every year. Good Jews, good Catholics, good Protestants are on the golf courses of the land every Sunday morning.

We can dismiss, I think, dietary taboos and circumcision as distinctive habits of no great importance. Plenty of Christians are circumcised. In habits that really count, it is alleged that:

1. Jews are financially unscrupulous.
2. They are clannish, and "run down" a neighborhood.
3. They are too damn smart.

I am a Connecticut Yankee and resent the slur of the first charge. Weren't we the original sellers of wooden nutmegs in the republic? Can't a Yankee out-horse-trade a Jew any day? Seriously, while Jews are accused of sharp dealing in some quarters, they are widely acclaimed for their probity in other quarters. Jews were the leading bankers of Europe for centuries. A banking house which is not careful of other people's

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Actor Sees Potential American Fuehrers Among Industrialists

Melvin Douglas Warns Against Putting Wealth Before Tolerance

WASHINGTON, D. C. — There are potential Hitlers and Mussolinis in the United States who have no connection whatever with the German or Italian regimes, Melvin Douglas, suave movie star, declares in the forthcoming April issue of The National Jewish Monthly, published by B'nai B'rith. Warning that Fascism will achieve power in the United States unless "we rectify our economic condition," the popular film actor writes "let us not fool ourselves into believing there are no potential Hitlers or Mussolinis in this country. There are—and they are men who have no connection whatsoever with the German or Italian regime, who, through the incredible industrial expansion which has taken place in the last half century, have gained tremendous economic power."

Pointing out that the findings of the La Follette Civil Liberties Committee demonstrate that "the techniques of the Fascists have served as a model which in many of its aspects has been imitated by some of our great industrial concerns," Mr. Douglas pleads for a more straight-forward American attitude of civil liberties. In his article, which is entitled "It Can Happen Here," Mr. Douglas assails terrorization of labor organizers and the attempted suppression of trade union activities, which he terms the "seeds of an American economic dictatorship."

BUDAPEST. — To avoid a repetition of pro-Jewish manifestations by certain of its branches, the National Union of War Veterans ordered a general revision of its membership rolls. Four district groups of the organization were recently dissolved for indulging in what was described as "propaganda friendly to Jews."

money does not last for centuries. The charges and countercharges cancel out, leaving Jews like the rest of us, with a small percentage of fast workers and a large percentage of honest citizens.

The second charge, about clannishness, can be supported with some evidence. Why? Because there are so many Perkinss around that Jews naturally band together for self-protection.

The third charge has never been proved by objective test, so far as I know, but I suspect that it is true. One hundred Jews picked at random would I. Q. slightly higher, I think, than a hundred Methodists, Christian or Episcopalians. Many of them are better disciplined mentally, and they work harder as a rule. The hard work is not a racial or even a religious habit, but an attempt to compensate for the sense of inferiority handed them by the rest of us. Personally, the more smart people we have in this country in the next few years, the easier I shall breathe.

What else, gentlemen, what else? I cannot think of anything. I am quite aware that all this fine reasoning doesn't help the Jews or make anti-Semitism less menacing. To civilized gentiles there is no personal problem of anti-Semitism, but such people are also in a minority. If they let on to be Jews at strategic post offices, it would double the minority and at the same time give the Perkinss the blind staggers.

Yes, there may be something in it.



Refugee School Obtains Near-Corner on Alien Brains

NEW YORK.—There are no recess periods, no spitball throwing and no surreptitious writing of notes in the school at 251 W. 100th St. The pupils, strangely enough, have to be urged to go home when classes are over, and discipline is the easiest thing to maintain.

In this school are 1,200 students, most of them refugees from dictator-ruled countries of Europe, eagerly learning the English language and other subjects that will help them earn their living in a new world.

This week the English class included Dr. William Einstein, cousin of Dr. Albert Einstein, the scientist; Dr. Kalman Friedmann, former chief Rabbi of Florence, Italy, and Dr. William Dickmann, former justice of the Berlin Court of Appeals.

The school is the West End Cen-

ter project of the WPA-Adult Education program, housed in the community center through the help of Temple Ansche Chesed. Classes are free. Instructors are supplied from the WPA rolls and the courses are mapped out by the Board of Education.

To Dr. Einstein the school was a source of wonder.

"In Europe" he said, "such a thing is undreamed of today. Only in America could such a thing be found. People who have lost everything are able to start anew here. It is democracy's way, far different than the manner of life in the totalitarian governments."

This adult education school has achieved a near corner on alien brains in New York. In one English class for beginners alone there are eight physicians, five attorneys, three clergymen and three college professors.

Julien Levy, who exhibited the painting in his gallery here last season, in announcing the rejection said, "I should like to know whether the jury turned down Blume's work because it could find no artistic merit in it, or because it was displeased with the anti-Fascist character of the work." Blume is one of the few American painters to win first prize in the Carnegie International in recent years.

Most of them seemed to be comparatively unconcerned by the military phases of the Hungarian annexation of this former Czechoslovakia district. But they knew that Hungary has just adopted legislation restricting Jewish participation in business and the professions.

Their greatest concern, and the question most frequently asked, was "When is Hitler coming?"

As Far as the Border

The nearest that Germans approached, however, was to the village of Nagyszalancz in Slovakia on the Carpatho-Ukraine border.

Germany Speeds Passport Issuance


BERLIN.—Passports marked with "J" were being handed out indiscriminately this week to German Jews as fast as formalities could be completed, which reversed a policy of granting passports only to those likely to receive permission to enter foreign countries.

It is believed that the reversal is meant to provide Jews with passports as swiftly as possible and tell them to leave Germany soon under an order which requires the emigration of 100 Berlin Jews daily. As a result, a new wave of Jews crowded foreign consulates asking for visas. More than the required 100 appeared at the new central emigration headquarters established here to facilitate the necessary formalities of passport requirements.

Rescue 54 Jewish Refugee Children

LONDON.—Fifty-four Jewish children who had been rescued from "no man's land" on the frontier between Poland and Germany, where they had been living for three months, arrived here from Gdynia, Poland. They were the first of several hundred who will be taken into English homes and taught trades to fit them to emigrate to the Dominions when they are 18.

MEMPHIS.—In responding more generously to the call of distress abroad, American Jews must continue to fulfill their responsibilities here, Sidney Hollander of Baltimore, newly-elected president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, declared this week.

"Our duty, as well as our self-interest, lies in giving in full measure to all causes tending to enrich life at home, for Jews and non-Jews alike," he said. "What we do for our people elsewhere must be after we have done our full duty here—an addition, not a substitution. To do less would be putting in the hands of our enemies the very weapons they seek."

Two thousand WPA men will be cut from the roles next month it was announced this week by Farrel D. Coyle, State Administrator. The reduction will amount to a monthly payroll cut of \$120,000 and will affect every city and town in the state.

tion and passed a resolution favoring to have the issue settled at the 1940 elections.

The resolution carries appropriations of \$2500 for the remainder of the present fiscal year and \$10,000 for the next fiscal year beginning July 1.

Compulsory Health Insurance Set Back Doctors Vote Against Plan

NEW YORK. — Compulsory health insurance has been rejected in a poll of one-third of the membership of the Medical Society of the County of New York. The three-to-one vote was announced by Dr. B. Wallace Hamilton, secretary of the society.

Described as the first poll of its kind in the country, it reached 1,718 of the 4,800 members of the organization. Compulsory health insurance was favored by 432 and disapproved by 1,286.

Twenty-one former presidents of the society circularized the doctors with a leaflet contending, before the vote, that "independent scientific and progressive medical care would be impossible under any system of compulsory health insurance."

Dr. Ernst B. Boas and Dr. Foster Kennedy led the pro-insurance group.

Italians Defer Ouster Edict Until April 1

ROME. — There has been an unofficial postponement to April 1 of the March 12 deadline for expulsion of all post-War immigrants of whom 6,000 to 7,000 still remain in Italy.

The Jewish Refugee Committee at Nice reported that 400 men, women and children had been forced out of Italy at bayonet point. Local French authorities expressed willingness to legalize their stay provided the proper visas and residence permits were procured at a total cost of about \$5,000.

Hundreds of other Jews are reported wandering in the border hills, arriving at the French frontier on the verge of collapse. On March 13 the French border police were instructed to admit as few refugees as possible.

because they cannot get across the frontier.

Dispatches from Prague report that hundreds of desperate Jews fled Bohemia and Slovakia. Those who escaped to the Polish border were denied entry into Poland. Foreigners and Jews "are trying to leave Prague by any means and the consulates and legations are crowded." All roads were closed on Wednesday by the German army, no trains are allowed to leave and no airplanes to fly.

A New York Times correspondent in Prague reported that at railway stations all passengers were forced to run the gauntlet of poorly-clad, uneducated Hlinka Guardsmen who robbed and often beat them.

An Associated Press cable reported that thousands of Jews and German political emigres are in hiding because they dare not show themselves in public and

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
