### Bring It Out Into the Open

The absurd mental processes of Jew baiters, both amateur and professional, is disclosed by evidence now presented before the Dies Committee.

One of the amateur's, Dudley P. Gilbert, actually spent \$8,000 in disseminating Anti-Semitic material through a Reserve Army Captain, named Campbell. Mr. Gilbert's jitters are best revealed by the fact that he actually sent Campbell \$1,000 to build a "retreat" in Kentucky, in which to retire, in case of revolution. Material obtained by Campbell, when broken down, was found to consist of conversations overheard by a waiter in a New York club. The waiter spied on government officials and the data so obtained, interwoven with Anti-Semitic material, was broadcast through the country.

General Moseley, candidate for national Anti-Semitic fuhrer, who has a massacre phobia, is revealed as having written letters which outlined a war against the Jews. When analyzed, most of the Anti-Semitic material, pictures the Jews both as Capitalists who own everything, and as Communists, who own nothing. The Jew is tall and short, wide and narrow, depending on what the propagandist is trying to accomplish.

Revelation of these facts goes far to destroy the evil effects of this malicious propaganda. We urge the Dies Committee to continue the scientific survey, getting facts and not hearsay or opinion on the representatives of Adolph Hitler.

### Protection League For Jewish People

The call of President Roosevelt to establish an "anti-aggression" front in Europe leads one to ask: what of the people now being persecuted and tortured in the countries of the aggressors—Germany and Italy—and menaced in other countries as well? The Jewish people is without a State and therefore is unable to adhere to any Anti-Agression League formed by nations that will undertake its protection. But is not continuous, internal aggression leading to the annihilation of a defenseless people as criminal as violent annexation of a foreign country by external aggression?

The world of today presents a truly frightful picture: tens of thousands of exiles from Hitler's territories, plundered and beaten victims of pogroms, wander about about the seven seas, from one continent to another, knocking at the closed doors of every country. The "illegal immigrants" are driven away by the British Administration from the very ports of Palestine where the Jewish Yisuv is prepared to welcome and care for them. The wanderers are forced into a choice between the bottomless seas or the hell-fire of the pogrom countries, not confined to Germany and Italy.

We must not keep silent. When the Anti-Agression League is formed, it is equally necessary to create an international league for the protection of the Jewish people. The methods of defense may vary with every organization but the principle must remain the same; the struggle against aggression and violence.

This parallel action must be carried through by the World Jewish Congress in Paris and Geneva and by the American Jewish Congress in New York.

### 2,500 Families Offer Homes to Children

NEW YORK. — At a meeting of the American Committee for Christian German Refugees Dr. Marion E. Kenworthy announced that 2,500 families in various parts of the country have already offered to take child refugees in to their circles, although as yet no solicitation has been made.

Dr. Kenworthy declared that the spontaneous reaction of so many families on hearing of the proposal to bring refugee children from Germany was a testimonial to "the humanitarian sympathies of the American people."

### Deportation of Fritz Kuhn On Perjury Charge Sought

NEW YORK. — Deportation of Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German-American Bund, on charges of perjury in connection with his entry to the United States and his subsequent naturalization, is being sought by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League. The League announced it has placed in the hands of the Federal authorities a sworn statement by Reinhold Spitz, a refugee from Munich, stating Kuhn was convicted of stealing overcoats from fellow students while enrolled at the University of Munich.

According to Spitz, who was founder and owner of a large clothing establishment on the same Munich street where Kuhn's father had a business, Kuhn served four months in Stadelheim Prison for his crime. Upon his release he was given a job in the

### To Enforce Program Of Non-Co-Operation

#### To Train Youth For Emergencies

JERUSALEM. — A direct clash between official Jewish organizations and British authorities was threatened this week when the Jewish National Council, highest Jewish body in Jerusalem, announced a vigorous campaign against British proposals for the future of Palestine.

Reports were circulated that if the plan were put into effect British authorities probably would declare participating Jewish bodies illegal and seditious.

#### Five-Point Program

The five points of the Jewish Council program were:—

- 1—Stoppage of tax payments;
- 2—Non-co-operation by Jewish municipal councillors in cities with mixed Jewish and Arab populations.
- 3—Severance of relations with the British government by local Jewish elected bodies such as the municipality of Tel-Aviv and religious institutions.
- 4—Strengthening of youth training for emergencies.
- 5—Consolidation of economic resources for maximum consumption of local Jewish products.

Revisionists, the extreme wing of the Zionists, demonstrated before the Jewish Agency demanding resignation of members of the Agency on the ground that their "pro-British" policy had proved a failure.

### Bucharest Lawyers Are Reinstated

BUCHAREST. — The High Court ordered the reinstatement of a number of Jewish lawyers expelled by the Bucharest Bar Association during the revision of citizenship. At the same time, Magistrate Micescu, head of the bar association and foreign minister in the Goga cabinet, announced at a meeting of Christian attorneys that no Jew would in the future be admitted to the Bucharest Bar Association.

### Elman's \$41,000 Goes to Refugees

NEW YORK. — Mischa Elman, the violinist, left something to remember him by when he sailed last week for a concert tour of Central and South America—a \$41,000 check for refugee relief.

Just before the Santa Elena sailed, with Elman and his family, he appeared on the promenade deck, and while photographers flashed away, he presented the check to three representatives of refugee organizations.

The artist collected the \$41,000 on a three-month tour of the United States and Canada, during which he traveled 17,000 miles and played twenty-seven recitals in as many cities.

### Announce Palestine Immigration Figures

JERUSALEM. — Eight thousand and twenty-two Jewish immigrants have entered Palestine since January 1, 1939, according to figures released by the Jewish Agency for Palestine. Of this number 927 belonged in the category of capitalists, persons in possession of a minimum of \$5,000 apiece.

These capitalists were accompanied by 1,490 dependents. The total as given includes persons who, entering Palestine as visitors, have been authorized to remain.

The number of Jewish immigrants who entered in April was 1,656.

### Begin Public Hearing On Anti-Semitic Drive

#### Call 4 Leaders In Fox Quizzing

WASHINGTON. — The Dies committee begins public hearings this week on an anti-Semitic campaign designed by its sponsors to prevent a revolution which they claimed had been planned for this summer.

The committee revealed a portion of the story the witnesses will tell by publishing a transcript of testimony taken secretly last week. This week it began hearing four witnesses subpoenaed last Friday. They are:—

George Deatherage, chief of the Knights of the White Camellia; Major General George Van Horn Moseley, retired commander of the Fourth Corps Area at Atlanta; Chairman John D. M. Hamilton, of the Republican National Committee, and Felix McWhirter, Indianapolis banker.

Mr. Hamilton was expected to tell the committee that his correspondence with a backer of the anti-Semitic campaign had been routine; that he answered a request for a list of the Republican committeemen as he would any application for the list.

#### Moseley On Way

General Moseley, en route from California, will not testify until later in the week.

Mr. Deatherage was called to answer questions concerning the campaign as outlined by him in a letter already in possession of the committee. In this letter General Moseley was proposed by Deatherage.

"One cannot repeat too often," Mr. Laski said, "that if there is a section of the world population to whom peace is more essential than to anybody else, it is the





## Emigration Issue Aired in England

LONDON. — Foreign Minister Grigoire Gafencu of Rumania was expected to raise the question of Jewish emigration in talks with the British Government continuing the discussions initiated by Foreign Minister Josef Beck of Poland.

Gafencu saw Polish Ambassador Count Razynski and was understood to have discussed Jewish emigration, among other subjects.

Although the British Government has expressed willingness to examine proposals for Jewish emigration, it was believed that the Rumanian and Polish Governments would not submit concrete proposals to the British Government until after the international situation had eased.

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# Zionists, Christian Leaders Rap British Policy

## Procedure Morally Unjustified-Sherwood

### Mayor, Clergy On Speaker List

Asserting that Great Britain's action in "going back on her sacred word is morally indefensible," Herbert M. Sherwood, co-chairman of the Rhode Island Seminar on Human Relations, spoke last Sunday night before Providence Zionists, who had gathered en masse at the Crown Hotel to protest the Palestine edict, and to receive words of comfort from their rabbis and prominent Christian leaders.

#### Prestige Weakened

"The times cry out for a nation to stand up and do morally the right thing," said Mr. Sherwood. Great Britain, if she stood firmly behind her 1917 promise, would greatly enhance her world prestige, he added.

Protesting as a "fellow human being against this thing which is against human rights and justice," Rt. Rev. Granville Gaylord Bennett, D. D. suffragan bishop of Rhode Island, said, "By your hopes, aspirations and rallying cries of your people, ye shall challenge the smallness of so-called diplomacy and this balance of power. It is not your blackest night; it is merely the darkness before the dawn, and Palestine is yours and shall be yours because

you need it."

More than 700 persons jammed the hotel, overflowing into a second large meeting hall. Maurice W. Hendel, president of the Providence Zionist District, presented Philip V. Marcus, former president, who with Joseph Smith, local leader, presided.

#### Auditorium Crowded

A resolution, presented by Joseph Schlossberg and characterizing the White Paper as "one of the darkest statements of British diplomacy," was unanimously adopted. The resolution asserted that the Jews "will not rest until we have achieved our goal in establishing a home for our homeless and persecuted people in Palestine."

#### Other Speakers

Other speakers at the meeting were Mayor John F. Collins, Mr. Marcus, Dr. Earl H. Tomlin, of Calvary Baptist Church, president of the Rhode Island Council of Churches; Rabbi Israel M. Goldman of Temple Emanuel; Rabbi Morris Schussheim of Temple Beth Israel; Rabbi William G. Braude of Temple Beth El; Rabbi Nathan Taragin of Congregation Sons of Abraham, and Alter Boyman, local Zionist labor leader.

The Mayor said he cabled Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of England last February 22 urging that Britain retain the Balfour declaration, but he commented, "this cable was never even acknowledged."

Dr. Goldman cautioned Jews against carrying bitterness in their hearts against Great Britain, saying the meeting was in reality, "our own affirmation in Zion, for we Jews are getting together to strengthen our own resoluteness."

fears that the world is "morally bankrupt," said that Jewry is "tearing its heart out for nothing, for this disgrace and humiliation is not ours, but is the world's."

Mr. Hendel announced that meetings were being held throughout the country "as we are determined to create such a wave of public opinion to make known to the British government that we in America are not in accord with the White Paper doctrine."

Mr. Marcus said that when history is written, "this White Paper will be black against Great Britain's prestige."

## Cedars To Observe Holiday Week-End

An eleven-piece orchestra, under the baton of Art Kahn, for the fifth successive year will provide music for dancing. A new show is brought down each week from New York, with a full quota of stage and radio celebrities.

Living quarters include bungalows, villas and two main houses, all of which have screened windows, ample wardrobe space and are bright and airy.

## To Construct Oil Refinery at Haifa

HAIFA. — Under direction of a corps of American engineers, construction of the \$20,000,000 oil refinery on the outskirts of Haifa is well under way.

An army of 1,100 workers, 60 per cent Arabs and 40 per cent Jews, has cleared and fenced in the 360-acre and is constructing roads, drainage, temporary buildings, a railway bridge across the Kishon river connecting with Haifa Port and an automobile bridge from the Haifa Acre road.

The total number of men employed is soon expected to rise to 3,000.

## Manifesto Issued By U. S. Shekel Board

### Registration Continues to June 11

In a manifesto issued this week by the U. S. Central Shekel and Election Board, William I. Siegel, chairman, and Samuel M. Schmidt, executive secretary, made the following statements:

"With unshaken faith in the eventful victory of our ideal, we continue the struggle for our rights in the land of our fathers.

"We proclaim most emphatically to the entire world, that we shall never relinquish our God-given rights in Eretz Israel. By the sheer force of our immutable will and unconquerable determination, we shall overcome everything that comes in the way of our deliverance and freedom in our historic land."

The manifesto further said, "In order to give further concrete and direct expression to these sentiments, we continue with the work of our shekel registration in one united effort until June 11, 1939.

We call upon all the Zionist groups through the land and upon all Jewish organizations and societies to utilize the remaining weeks for an intensive and determined shekel registration, until we have registered one million Jews as shekel payers."

## Jews and Refugees

Last July the Evian conference set up an inter-governmental committee to tackle the refugee question on a scale to match the magnitude of the horror itself. The committee is still in existence; it has done some work and issued a report or two; but as far as refugees are concerned—what, actually, has happened?

What has happened is that in this past year the numbers of refugees and would-be refugees has multiplied. And the truth is that the Jews are carrying the main burden of the refugee problem. What they are able to accomplish is relatively little, because the task is far beyond the most ample private resources. But the effort they are making is a stupendous one—a credit to the Jewish people and a shame to the rest of us.

In this one year the United Jewish Appeal has set itself a goal of \$20,000,000 in the United States. Jewish groups are beating the bushes in every sizable community to bring out the last available dollar. A man in Detroit said to me the other day: "Sometimes it looks hopeless. Even now we can do little enough; and if millions of Jews in Poland and Hungary and Rumania are driven out in these next months, what will happen to them? But we can't stop to think about that now. We have to do what we can for the millions already on our hands."

This is a gallant attitude and one cannot argue with it. But one can and must argue with the assumption that the problem is, in reality, a Jewish one. First, one can demand that the Intergovernmental Committee get busy. An agreement between the democratic powers, great and small, to accept in numbers proportionate to their resources all the refugees from Central Europe and then to work out a plan of gradual redistribution and settlement, would prove that the capacity for statesmanship and decency still exists. The present procrastination of the non-fascist powers is only a little less inexcusable than the overt acts of oppression committed by Hitler.

Somehow, the idea has taken root that because a majority of non-political refugees are Jewish, the burden of their care should fall on the Jews. This monstrous idea contradicts every humane impulse and should be rooted out as a menace to the ideals of democracy that most of us—despite Father Coughlin and Senator Reynolds—still cling to. If not a single Gentile were to be counted among the persecuted millions in Europe, the responsibility for their relief would still rest upon all Americans.

It is truism to say that the United States is a refugee nation, but it must be repeated every time this question comes up. Who of us today would be in this country—relatively safe—if the United States had not opened its doors to the refugees from Europe's earlier tyrannies? Was the country poorer for that influx of energy and rebellious spirit and love of democracy?

I am not suggesting any such simple, early American solution of present refugee problem. I am urging a revival of the spirit that made the right of asylum a genuine part of our legacy of democratic ideas. I am insisting that a wise and generous solution of the problem is essential if democracy itself is to survive. The job belongs to the non-fascist governments, in the end. But today and tomorrow and until we can galvanize those governments into action, the job belongs to all the people—not to the Jews alone. It is a gauntlet thrown at our feet by the fascist dictators. If we refuse to pick it up or pretend we don't see it, we shall have agreed in advance to the annihilation of every decent and humane value in life and have given Hitler his greatest bloodless victory. Democracy cannot afford that surrender. (Reprinted from the Nation)

## 16 Huge Broadway Posters Blast British on Palestine

NEW YORK. — Sixteen huge posters denouncing the new British policy in Palestine were pasted on glass doors at the three entrances of the Cunard White Star Building.

The posters, each four by six feet and all expertly printed, were directed at the British Consulate, which has offices on the eleventh floor of the building.

Some of them read:

"Hitler crushed Czech nation, Chamberlain crushed Jews in Palestine."

"Britain used the Jews to get Palestine, now she deports Jews from Palestine to Nazi concentration camps."

"British defenders of democracy shoot Jews escaping Nazi Hell in Palestine."

Police discovered the posters as the result of a riot call from building employees. Six patrol

cars and an automobile load of detectives responded.

The "riot" consisted of efforts of several employees to put a man out of the building. The man turned out to be a newspaper reporter who had obtained permission to use a telephone in the main hall.

The police straightened that out, then helped the janitor remove the posters.

### Ireland Catholics Assail Jew-Baiters

DUBLIN. — Warning against stirring up of racial hatred, The Standard, leading Dublin Catholic weekly, referred editorially to the circulation of anti-Jewish literature by a group calling itself the "Irish-Ireland Research Society."

The society has been circulating a letter signed by A. J. Browne, which begins: "Having fought for political freedom against England for centuries, we are confronted with a new enemy today—the Jew."



**Columbia Prohibits Refugee Immigration**

BOGOTA. — Following the example set by Bolivia and Chile last week, the Colombia government this week decreed that no more refugees, whether Jewish or Spanish, are to be admitted pending the adoption of a definite, comprehensive immigration policy by the government.

Applications of five thousand persons for entry to be held in abeyance include fifteen hundred for parents, wives and children of Jewish refugees already in Bogota.

The Bogota newspaper Tiempo points out that thirty-five hundred Jewish refugees entered Colombia in the past eight months, while previously immigration had been so light that Colombia had no definite immigration law or policy.

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## Reynolds Defends "Vindicator" Society Denies He Has Pro-Nazi Ideals

WASHINGTON. — Senator Robert R. Reynolds (Dem., N. C.), in a four-hour speech in the Senate, denied that he was pro-Nazi, defended his anti-alien "Vindicators" organization and condemned the Wagner-Rogers children refugee bill as "a measure to take American jobs away from Americans."

Denying that he had pro-Nazi sympathies, Senator Reynolds declared: "I've joined others in denouncing the tactics of the rulers of dictatorships such as Germany and Italy, but I insist that the United States remain aloof from European battles." He denied the truth of a report that while in Germany recently he conferred with Chancellor Adolf Hitler and other Germans and become a member of their clique. He said he spent only two days in Berlin on a sight-seeing tour and the only official place he called on was the American Embassy.

## Condemns Dean for Unjustified Attack

### Daily Telegraph Criticizes Inge

LONDON. — The Rev. W. R. Inge, former Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, was severely criticized by the Daily Telegraph which editorially condemned the "gloomy Dean" for "indiscriminate reproaches" against the Jews of England.

In an article in the London News-Chronicle the Dean has charged the Jews with attempting to bring pressure on Parliamentarians to oppose a policy of conciliation with Germany.

Although he admitted he had no direct knowledge of Jewish influence on the press, Dr. Inge declared that he had been informed by a journalist that his paper had been threatened by Jewish firms with cancellation of advertising contracts, if the paper persisted in its policy of making overtures to Germany.

The Telegraph stated that there was absolutely no foundation to Dr. Inge's charges.

### Treason Charged

Major witness at the private hearings last week was James Erwin Campbell, retired Captain of army engineers. He produced letters from Mr. Deatherage which referred to General Moseley as "The Bass."

Captain Campbell said Deatherage's letter was filled with "treasonable" utterances, which caused him to discontinue his connections with him.

Witnesses told the committee that the anti-Semitic campaign was excused by Messrs. Campbell and Deatherage on the allegation that leftists planned to overthrow the government. They said they had received word of this plot from a waiter in the exclusive Harmonie Club, New York.

The waiter, identified as George Rice, was said to have told Dudley Pierrepont Gilbert, New York socialite, that some members of the club were plotting a "revolution." Mr. Gilbert informed Captain Campbell and donated money to finance the counter-campaign.
