D.A.R. Turnabout

Rebuked by Mrs. Roosevelt for refusing the use of their concert hall to Marian Anderson, negro singer, the Descendants of the American Revolution have suddenly become aware of subversive elements in this country.

In a proclamation sent to all patriotic societies officials of the D. A. R. urged all units to reject courageously and publicly membership in a coalition promoted and inspired by such proponents of hatred, intolerance and prejudice as George Van Horn Moseley, Fritz Kuhn, Charles E. Coughlin and others of such "ilk".

It is preparing the ground, the statement said, for fascism in the United States when such individuals take advantage of the prevailing discontent of large sections of the American population to attack the present government, which actually represents the will of the people.

While this "turnabout" for the D. A. R. is welcome, it is difficult to forget the intolerance and bias that the organization displayed in attempting to excuse its failure to permit Miss Anderson the facilities of its concert hall.

Civil Liberties Union Reports

In these days when apparently intolerance is the rule, the report of the American Civil Liberties Union offers a ray of hope. Their annual report discloses that constitutional guarantees have received unprecedented support in this country in the last 12 months.

"Interference with the rights of political, racial and religious minorities has steadily diminished, though propaganda against them is ominously increasing," the report said. "Censorship of movies, radio, the theater and literature also declined."

The Union attributes the increase in the national evaluation of the Bill of Rights to the attacks of dictators and totalitarian states in Europe.

But throughout the entire discussion of civil liberties one fact is definite. We cannot underestimate the abilities nor the efforts of men and organizations who are daily striving to undermine our democratic form of government. The battle must be waged continuously. The results of the past year are encouraging but we cannot rest on our laurels.

Nazis Don't Joke

Word has come from Germany that Adolf Hitler has decided to dispense with the title of "Reichskanzler" and is to be known hereafter simply as "Der Fuehrer," The Leader.

We can't help wondering if the Nazis haven't been reading Mark Twain and, in their humorless way, taking that sly American's writing seriously. The Connecticut Yankee refused all titles at King Arthur's Court until a blacksmith called him "The Boss."

The Yankee's title stuck by popular acceptance. But Germans must call Adolf "Der Fuehrer" — or else.




ORT Uses Refugee Camp For Training School

Rabbi Criticizes Synagogue Games

ASBURY PARK, N. J. — Anti-Semitism is being exploited by many Jewish organizations, according to Dr. Solomon Goldman, president of the Zionist Organization of America, who spoke before 125 rabbis at the 39th annual convention of the Rabbinical Assembly of America.

Dr. Goldman expressed the belief that the center of Jewish learning had come to America, but charged that synagogues had permitted outside influences to creep in by the adoption of card games, parties and social functions.

Spanish Minister Hits Hostile Jewry

ROME. — Spanish Interior Minister Ramon Serrano Suner was quoted by the official Italian news agency as declaring that Spain, feeling herself "encircled" by "hostile Judaism," intends to stand by the Rome-Berlin axis despite the friendly gestures by Britain and France.

He said: "The Spanish people is conscious of its duties and is determined to make all the efforts and undergo all the privations necessary to shatter, as it did in the war, all the iron hoops with which hostile Judaism would like to encircle it."

La Guardia Answers Appeal For Action Against Mob-Rule

NEW YORK. — An urgent appeal to take immediate and energetic action to curb the campaign of slander and provocation directed by the followers of Father Coughlin and members of the Nazi Bund against the Jewish people of New York City, has been addressed to Mayor LaGuardia, by Louis Segal, General Secretary of the Jewish National Workers' Alliance, a labor Zionist fraternal order, to which appeal Mayor LaGuardia replied as follows:

"This is in reply to your letter of recent date, regarding activities of anti-Semitic groups within this City.

The matters set forth in your letter have already been called to my attention, and I am keenly aware of what is going on at present. I am sure you appreciate the fact that no one is more hostile than I am to movements aimed at the persecution of, or discrimination against, religious or racial minorities.

Problem Complex

I think you will agree with me that the problem is too complex to be dealt with solely by a little simple police action. Nor would you, I believe, after some reflection, favor the forceful suppression of the rights to freedom of utterance of any particular group, in order to do away with the advocacy of a hateful doctrine. The impartial administration of the law must not be altered for a special occasion.

The Police Department is paying careful attention to every instance and every occasion where

demonstrations occur, whether by individuals or groups, in order to make certain that those who claim the privilege of freedom of expression shall not overstep the bounds prescribed by law, and to apprehend them the moment they do so.

Cannot Yield to Panic

We have previously, on a number of occasions vindicated the wisdom of refusing to yield to panic by denying freedom of expression to those who preach un-American doctrines, while protecting the intended victims of those doctrines, with all the force we command, from any attempt to proceed from speech to unlawful action."

Social Justice, "Mein Kamp" Sold by Nazis

DETROIT. — The annual pro-Nazi summer festival of Detroit Germans at Carpathia Park saw new evidence of alliance between Nazis and Coughlinites. On one side of the park Coughlin's Social Justice was on sale and on the opposite side Hitler's "Mein Kampf" was on display and there was a brisk sale of postcards with Hitler's picture. The principal speaker was Fritz Hailer, German consul in Detroit.

Racial Hatred Is Turned To Laughs by Anti-Nazi League

NEW YORK. — Broadway strollers were treated to the first political laugh in weeks when the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League exposed the newest menace to hit Times Square.

Fashioned to ridicule Father Coughlin and his Nazi-styled "Social Justice" workers, four youths adorned with giant spectacles and bearing placards reading WHAT IS THE SPECTACLE MENACE AND AMERICANS FIGHT INTERNATIONAL SPECTACULARITY, gave out thousands of

cards exposing the treacherous nonsense employed by un-American groups to stir up racial hatred and civil strife.

By use of absurdity in a trumped-up scare that wearers of glasses threaten the foundations of our country, the Anti-Nazi League pointed out that such a danger was just as illogical as the race hatred propaganda being used by various New York groups whose activities closely reflect the thoughts of Hitler.

Kaufman Refutes Congregation Story Traces Incidents Leading to Edict

Israel Kaufman, president of the Waad Hacashruth, this week took exception to the statement issued by the Congregation Sons of Abraham which appeared in the Herald last week regarding the religious dispute which has raged since last year. In the following article, Mr. Kaufman presents the version that he believes correct.

"Since the Congregation Sons of Abraham, through its leaders, saw fit to comment on the "Trefa Edict" issued by the Union of Orthodox Rabbis in the United States in the columns of the Jewish Herald of July 7, 1939, it is only fair that the Jewish public have the correct information concerning the acts that led up to the publishing of the so-called Edict of the Agudas Harabonim.

Conference Called

"The conferences held at the Narragansett Hotel, June 4 and 5 were called by Rabbi J. L. Seltzer, secretary of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, who was sent down by the Union as an impartial investigator.

"After a few hours in conference with the president and the spiritual leader of the Sons of Abraham, Rabbi Seltzer arrived at the conclusion that in order that the foundation of Kashruth should remain solid, their case must come, before an impartial tribunal chosen by both parties or an impartial tribunal satisfactory to both parties and, in the name of the Agudas Harabonim, he summoned the Congregation through their leader to go to a Din Torah within a week's time or, if this time to be too short, to stop the banned shochet. Balfour Home Now A Refuge

NEW YORK. — Whittenger-ancestral home of the late Arthur Lord Balfour, in the Lammermoor Hills of East Lothian, Scotland, has been placed at the disposal of a group of 179 exiled Jewish children awaiting transfer to Palestine by the heirs of the man who authored the declaration two decades ago which promised the Jews a home in Jerusalem.

The action of the Balfour heirs was announced here by Mrs. David B. Greenberg, national Youth Aliyah chairman of Hadassah.

Kaufman Refutes Congregation Story Traces Incidents Leading to Edict

posit a sum of money as guarantee that all financial claims of the Sons of Abraham Congregation against the Waad Hacashruth would be honored if the Congregation Sons of Abraham would agree to withdraw the banned shochet until after the Din Torah.

"Mr. Harry Leach flatly refused to comply with the request to go to a Din Torah claiming that his Congregation passed not to go to a Din Torah.

Rabbi Issues Warning

"Then Rabbi Seltzer warned the Rabbi of the Sons of Abraham Congregation that he must see to it that his Congregation appear before the Rabbinical Tribunal or else Rabbi Taragin must leave the position for as an orthodox Rabbi he cannot remain as head of a Congregation which refuses to recognize the Jewish Religious Laws and is willing to destroy an institution of Kashruth which existed in Providence for over 20 years.

"Rabbi Taragin stated openly that he is without power or influence to have his Congregation go to a Din Torah.

"Then almost at the end of the conference, Mr. Harry Leach proposed a way of settlement, that he has the right to accept, and, after making all his demands known, I explained that I would be willing to bring these proposals before a special meeting of the president of Orthodox Congregations and Board of Directors, to which Mr. Leach agreed and sent one of his committee to bring his nephew, Attorney Jacob Alper, to draw up the proposal.

Meeting Called

"As president of the Waad Hacashruth I agreed to present this agreement at a meeting of the Board of Directors for approval or rejection but, I, personally, did not agree to anything. The following day a special meeting of the Board of Directors was called at which all of the officers, a majority of the heads of orthodox congregations, our Rabbis and a majority of the Directors were present.

Asked For Opinion

"At this meeting each individual present, by roll call, was asked to express his opinion on the agreement which was carefully read before the Board.

Vote For Rejection

"After each member had the floor on the subject, a roll call was taken on a vote of acceptance or rejection; and the Board voted unanimously for rejection of the agreement and for a demand of a Din Torah before an impartial Rabbinical Tribunal for settlement of the issues at stake, stating that a Congregation and a Rabbi which wants to be part of an institution of Kashruth must obey the religious laws.

"At no time did the Waad Hacashruth demand that they select all the Rabbis of this Tribunal; but from the beginning offered to go before an impartial Rabbinical Tribunal to which the leaders of the Congregation Sons of Abraham were unwilling to submit.

"What remains a mystery is how a Congregation can publicly proclaim that it has no faith in the laws of Israel and in the judgement of those who are authorized to expound the law and still claim to be Orthodox.

No Co-operation

"If the leaders of the Congre-

gation had been willing to submit their case before an impartial Rabbinical Tribunal there never would have been cause to issue a ban of excommunication, or issue a Trefa Edict, as can be seen from the leaflets, signed by recognized, authoritative Rabbis of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, which openly states 'we have formally warned the Congregation Sons of Abraham and its leaders at three different times to bring the matter before an impartial Rabbinical Tribunal, whose composition shall be satisfactory to all concerned.'

"If it is true that Mr. Leach wired the Union of Orthodox Rabbis that he would submit to a Din Torah the 30th of June, how is it that the Agudas Harobonim were not aware of this as late as the third of July when they issued the Trefa Edict?

"Is it logical to expect a Court to wait for the return of an individual from vacation when the souls of people are daily being contaminated?

"Has the Congregation Sons of Abraham ever shown its sincerity of willingness to settle the matter by recalling the banned shochet?

"As a religious organization, governed entirely by the Sacred Laws of the Jewish religion, which we believe we received directly from a Divine Source, the Waad Hacashruth cannot submit to any test except those same Holy laws by which it was created.

See Boycott As Aid To Collapse of Reich

NEW YORK.—Dr. Max Winkler, economist and adviser to the Research Department of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, in a report prepared for the League indicating the effect of the anti-Nazi Boycott on German trade, predicts a trade collapse for Germany's Third Reich.

According to Dr. Winkler's report, the total trade deficit of the Reich last year was four-and-a-half times as large as that reported by official German statistics. Although Germany's adverse balance of trade for 1938 is officially reported at RM 192,000,000, Dr. Winkler points out that a careful examination of the nature of Germany's foreign trade reveals that the actual trade deficit was RM 880,300,000.

Conference Score Attacks On Democratic Principles

"No true American wants the liberties of citizenship abrogated at the dictates of foreign dictators. The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith is engaged in the work of promoting the tenets of democracy among the various groups. We are carrying on a program to stem the tide of hatred, barbarism and anti-Semitism spreading in this country, so that there may remain in this country the same freedom of opinion, worship, and liberties for which the Revolutionary Fathers fought 150 years ago." So declared Moses D. Mosessohn, New York attorney, national B'nai B'rith leader and authority on anti-defamation problems, who addressed 400 delegates and guests at the banquet on last Sunday evening, which closed the summer conference of the Central New England B'nai B'rith Council held at Sunset Lodge, Sharon.

The Conference viewed with deep concern the British White

Paper, and urged in a resolution adopted by the assembly dignified opposition to the current plan, to the end that it be modified to accord with the hopes and rights of the Jewish people in Palestine.

The Conference also adopted a resolution expressing definite opposition of B'nai B'rith to Communism, Nazism and Fascism as inimical to the position, security, and welfare of all democratic peoples, and resolved to signify B'nai B'rith's unalterable disapproval of all such forms of Government and society as un-American and un-Jewish.

A NAZI OFFERS ADVICE DANZIG. — Albert Foerester, Danzig Nazi leader offered some advice to Poland this week. "Our suggestion," he said, "to the Poles in Danzig, is that they remain quiet. They are guest here and have nothing to say. In Danzig we Germans decide our own fate."

LAWYER'S FEES HIT SAN FRANCISCO. — Robert H. Jackson, Solicitor General of the U. S., said this week that lawyers had better do something about the high cost of legal services or "this problem will be likely to be forced upon the government." Something like this has happened to the medical profession and may be happening to lawyers, he declared.

U. S. LAST STRONGHOLD NEW YORK. — Last stronghold of democracy is in the United States, Eduard Benes declared as he sailed for London. People realize better than Europeans, he said, that freedom is at stake.

The Moslem religious leader is accused of having spent over \$15,000,000 for private purposes as agent of foreign powers. The terrorists leaders assert in their document that the MacDonald White Paper is a partial fulfillment of Arab demands for Palestine.

Jews Summoned For Road Work

VIENNA. — Jews between the ages of 18 and 35 have been summoned for work on Germany's highways. Serious shortages of man-power in the Reich is responsible for the sudden order which revokes laws which hitherto forced Jews out of all occupations bringing them together with Aryans.

SAO PAULO, Brazil. — Jewish leaders proclaimed a \$5,000 fund-raising campaign for the Zionist cause as an answer to Britain's Palestine policy and sent a delegation to the British Ambassador to present a memorandum protesting against the British plan.

Alaskan Entry Bill Received by Senate

WASHINGTON. — The Senate received a companion measure, introduced by Senator Ernest W. Gibson (Rep., Vt.), to a bill offered in the House of Representatives by Andrew J. May (Dem., Ky) for admission of political refugees to Alaska.

Senator Gibson's bill proposes admission of colonists from any nation on condition that they can prove that they had never engaged in subversive activities in their native countries and had given up all allegiance to any other power.

As in Representative May's proposal the number of immigrants admitted could equal the unfilled entry quotas to the United States.

STARS MOTIVATE ADOLF
NEW YORK. — Adolf Hitler maintains an advisory staff of five astrologers who have counseled him to make whatever moves he is considering to increase his "fame" before September, according to Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University. At the present time, Dr. Butler said, the advice of these wise men is that the climax of Hitler's career will come early in September and whatever he is to do to add to his fame must be done before that date.

AMAZON BASEBALL FANS
BROOKLYN. — On the ground that he was trampled by ladies when the Brooklyn Dodgers had their last Ladies' Day, Julius Trieb, a lawyer, this week sued the club for the \$1.10 he had paid for his ticket. Trieb claimed the ladies knocked him down, stepped on him and in the process of the general mauling tore his suit.

Prague Issues Registration Order

PRAGUE. — An anti-Jewish decree, following the Jews in Czech territory, is issued today providing that the 100,000 Jews of Slovakia must register their property and barring Jews from service in the army and air force.

Adopt Resolution Demanding Preservation of Civil Liberties

NEW YORK. — The American Youth Congress went on record last week at its final business session, as opposed to all forms of dictatorship, including the Communist.

The declaration was considered a concession to a minority group of fourteen organizations whose delegates walked out of Monday's meeting in protest against the majority's refusal to place Communism on a level with Fascism and Nazism in an anti-dictatorship amendment to the congress' creed.

The anti-Communist stand was embodied in a resolution, however, rather than an amendment.

Communist Votes for It

The resolution, unanimously adopted, also demanded the preservation of free speech and expression for young people of all races, religious and political parties.

Gil Green, of the Young Communist league, in casting his vote for the resolution, explained that Communism "does not stand for dictatorship but for the greatest democracy" and that the league was "opposed to all forms of dictatorship."

A lone vote against the resolution, originally cast by Clifton Amsbury, of the Veterans of Abraham Lincoln Brigade, subsequently was withdrawn.

Enroute to Europe



NEW YORK. — Dr. Abba Hilel Silver, national chairman of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs, has sailed for Europe to study at first-hand the recent developments which have created new emergencies in Jewish life overseas, and to confer with Jewish leaders abroad on the possibilities for refugee settlement in Palestine and ways and means of carrying them into effect.

Professor Cuza Appointed to Council

BUCHAREST. — The aged leader of the Rumanian anti-Semites, Senator Professor Cuza has been appointed by King Carol a member of the Council of State.

The sudden promotion of Professor Cuza, as well as the election of the anti-Semitic leaders, Dr. Vaida Voevod and Professor Gorga, as Presidents of the Chamber of Deputies and Senate respectively demonstrate the great influence exercised by the anti-Jewish elements in the new legislative bodies of Rumania.

Professor Gorga, however, only held his post for two days. Owing to the rejection by the Senate of his proposal that all Senators, including members of the Opposition, must appear in the Senate in the uniform of the Government Party, he tendered his resignation.

Tientsin Blockade Hits 2,000 Jews

TIENTSIN, China. — More than 2,000 Jews were affected by the Japanese blockade of the British and French concessions here. Most of them have businesses within the concessions, while a number reside in Japanese-controlled sections of the city.

A majority of the Tientsin Jews are of Russian origin, having come here via Harbin. Only a few are German Jews, with refugees among their number.

Decree Death Penalty For Capital Removal

ROME. — The Italian Press has announced that a new law is being enacted in Italy, providing for the severe punishment of offenders against the regulations forbidding the smuggling of Italian currency abroad.

All such cases will be tried by special courts which will be empowered to inflict even the death penalty.

The enactment of the new law came as a result of the outcry of the anti-Semitic Press that the Jews, who have to leave Italy, are secretly withdrawing their capital abroad.

In Florence, ten Jews have been sent to prison for eight days each for failing to register as Jews under the new laws.

Cantor to Give Estate to Aged

NEW YORK. — Walter Winchell in his last Sunday's broadcast, made the statement that Eddie Cantor had decided to give his Long Island, N. Y. estate to the establishment of a non-sectarian home for the aged.

The property consists of a fine mansion in the center of 10 beautiful acres of land. Eddie Cantor does a lot of public speaking, undoubtedly for publicity purposes but here is an illustration of positive action that speaks louder than words.

Cancel Immigration Quota for Palestine

Ban To Hold For Six Months

LONDON. — Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald announced in the House of Commons this week that no Jewish immigration quota for Palestine would be issued for the next six months.

Whether immigration would be resumed would depend on how the illegal immigration question is settled, he said.

In its White Paper of May 17 outlining its policy on Palestine, the Government announced 75,000 Jews would be allowed to enter Palestine in the next five years. Illegal immigrants have been subtracted from the six-month quotas.

Immediate reaction from Palestine was reported to be consternation and dismay.



France Plans to Use Aliens In Wartime

PARIS. — The Interior Ministry revealed that preparations were under way for dealing with the country's more than 3,000,000 aliens in the event of war. The announcement brought hope to thousands of Polish, Rumanian, Austrian, Czech and German Jews who are willing to volunteer for service in the French army but are nevertheless held in jails as illegal aliens because their countries of origin will not readmit them.

The cases of those now in prison may be reviewed, it was indicated when leading statesmen and newspapers opened a campaign not only for a more liberal attitude toward aliens but for revision of the immigration and naturalization policies in order to enable them to join the French defense forces.

24 Jews Who Failed To List Race Jailed

MILAN, Italy. — Twenty-four of thirty-three Jews tried for not having declared their Jewish blood under the race law passed last November were under sentences this week varying from twenty days in jail and \$100 fines to eight days in jail and \$50 fines. Nine were acquitted.

The thirty-three were the first of 200 who will be tried.

Poland to Halt Man Smuggling on Border 10,000 Ordered To Leave Reich

BERLIN. — "Man smuggling" was reported going on this week in both directions on the Polish-German frontier.

Hundreds of Polish Jews under Nazi compulsion were said to be on the border attempting to enter Poland while German residents of Poland were trying to get back against the official Polish will.

Contingents of Jews have been taken daily to the frontier by German police since the latest general roundup of Polish Jews began early last month.

Ten thousand such Jews in Germany have received notices since then to leave within 10 days or two weeks. Some have gone but a majority of them still are on German soil.

DEPORT ANTI-SEMITE

SANTIAGO. — Johan Voigt, manager of the local office of the German State Railways, was deported to Argentina for financing and editing an anti-Semitic

leaflet. Voigt, was accused of stirring racial strife. It was reported that 100,000 copies of his leaflet had been circulated prior to his arrest.


