Those Who Abuse Personal Liberties

Further attention was drawn to the Coughlin menace this week when Mayor LaGuardia, commenting on an article and editorial appearing in a current issue of *The Nation*, which described the growing Coughlinite and Christian Front terror, said that although the right to free speech must be upheld, "inciting to riot and creating racial and religious hatred does not come within the guarantee of freedom of speech."

Those personal liberties, expressed in the Bill of Rights unquestionably must be respected. Yet the focal point of our entire system of government is that it serves for the greater good of all.

When individuals, or groups, abuse that freedom of expression to the detriment of minority groups and threaten the well-being of government which makes possible those personal liberties, then democracy, in its own defense must take action.

As *The Nation* so aptly put it, democracies can put up with occasional crackpots but — "When a group sets out to cultivate a state of war in the streets of our cities and to inflame the police against a whole racial section of the population, the time has come to bring that group to its senses or strip it of power."

Sign of the Times

A line in Elmer Rice's play, "Street Scene" playing in one of Prague's largest theatres, drew such a burst of applause that the Czech police observers ordered it cut at future performances.

The line was: "After all, Jews are human beings!"

Rebuilding the Reich

The advantages of Nazism are clearly demonstrated by two recent occurrences in the Third Reich. Whipped cream has been banned in the Sudetenland in order to conserve butter fat; and three workmen have been sentenced to jail terms in Vienna for resigning from their jobs.

Zionist Policy

Several hundred Zionist delegates are now in Geneva where their chief task is to frame a concrete program of resistance to imposition of Britain's new policy.

If Zionist unity, all-important at this crucial moment, is to be maintained, it will be necessary to draft a program acceptable to both the "moderates," as the supporters of Dr. Chaim Weizmann are called, and the more extreme groups, who demand militant measures to combat the British policy.

The way the wind will blow will depend largely on who will become president of the Zionist organization. In recent months there has been an increasing pressure for a new leadership on the grounds that the appeasement policy of Weizmann has been futile. Yet, it must not be forgotten that it was the action of extremists in encouraging illegal immigration on a large scale that forced England to ban all immigration for six months.

JERUSALEM. — Two Jewish brothers, Reuben and Zvi Friedman, were injured when a car in which they were riding struck a landmine near Haifa. Reuben was seriously injured, while Zvi escaped with slight wounds.

At a special meeting of the Jewish Center Building Committee held last night detailed plans for the building of a new auditorium and a complete reconstruction of the main building at 65 Benefit street were examined.

In order to make sure that the best possible plan can be produced with the amount available as a result of the recent building campaign, the committee has gone into the various parts of the plan with minute care.

The plans as drawn provide for a new auditorium with a seating capacity of 600 with modern stage facilities. Rebuilding of the now unused basement to provide game rooms for younger children and rebuilding of the

Ahavath Sholom Names Rabbi Silk Spiritual Leader

Rabbi Morris G. Silk of Pottsville, Pennsylvania, has been unanimously elected by the Ahavath Sholom Synagogue as its spiritual leader, and will arrive in the very near future to occupy the congregation's pulpit.

A descendant of rabbis through thirty-five generations, Rabbi Silk received his ordination at the age of eighteen. He came to this country from Poland in 1922, and studied in Philadelphia at Neff College and at the University of Pennsylvania. He received his first rabbinical charge in 1927 with the Montefiore Congregation in Philadelphia, and has just completed a decade as the spiritual leader of United Pottsville Community Rabbinate.

During his tenure in Pottsville, Rabbi Silk became an active

Gov. Vanderbilt On Speaker List

NEWPORT, R. I. — Descendants of George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Williams and John Clark will gather in historic Newport on August 20 for presentation to that city of a monument dedicated to the founders of religious liberty, first established on this continent in the State of Rhode Island. This monument will be presented to the city of Newport by the local Jewish congregation, established in 1685 when 15 Jewish families arrived from the West Indies, and will form part of the colorful Newport Tercentenary celebrations which have been going on all summer.

W. Seden Washington and Elward Jonas Phillips, direct descendants of George Washington, and Rabbi Moses Seixas will reenact a famous scene of 1790 when they read the exchange of messages between the first President and Seixas, leader of the Jewish congregation, on the occasion of Washington's visit to that city. The re-enactment will take place on the steps of the ancient Newport Touro Synagogue, a New England architectural gem, with the Newport Artillery Regiment in Colonial costume as the color guard.

"Martyrdom" Denied To N. Y. Anti-Semite

NEW YORK. — A man who made a street-corner speech threatening "a bloody riot" against the Jews was acquitted of a disorderly conduct charge by Magistrate Richard F. McKiniry, who said: "There is no doubt in my mind that the defendant's remarks were scurrilous. However, such language usually defeats its purposes and I don't think that even the Jewish people would care to see this misguided individual made a martyr. Surely the court doesn't wish to make him a martyr. It was the lowest type of ignorance." The defendant, Joseph Martney, 41, of the Bronx, said he was a member of the "Christian Mobilizers."

MacDonald Adamant On Immigration Ban

LONDON. — No exceptions will be made in enforcement of the ban on Jewish immigration into Palestine from October 1, Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald this week told the House of Commons, after insisting that illegal immigration is "enormous."

Appeals from Deputies for relaxation of the stringent ban was met with the uniform answer by MacDonald that all consideration had been born in mind before the policy had been adopted.

Hungary Orders Ban on Newspapers

BUDAPEST. — The New York Carpatho-Ukrainian newspaper *Karpatska Rus* was ordered banned in Hungary. Andre Brody, former Premier of Carpatho-Ukraine, now part of Hungary, condemned as false a rumor being circulated in the United States about the former Czechoslovakian territory.

In a statement to the press the former Premier said he would go to the United States if necessary to fight the false reports.

Library Donated To Synagogue

Mrs. Harry Leach has presented the library of the late Rabbi Bachrach to the Congregation Sons of Abraham, it was announced this week. The library, purchased from the Bachrach family, includes many rare Hebraic volumes and represents 50 years of collection and selection by Rabbi Bachrach.

Mrs. Leach is the wife of Harry Leach, president of the Congregation Sons of Abraham.

Jew-Baiting Talks Start Free-for-All

NEW YORK. — Five Bronx residents were under arrest and two policemen nursed injuries this week after a battle royal featured an outdoor meeting of the Christian Mobilizers, said to be followers of Father Coughlin, in the lower Bronx.

Trouble started when a speaker atop a portable stand started berating the Jews of which there were many in the audience. A drunken man who started heckling the speaker was beaten.

Anti-Jewish Incidents Mark Fascist Campaign in Detroit

DETROIT. — Two young Jewish youths were recently attacked, as they were walking in the Northwest Jewish neighborhood here, by three Italian amateur fighters.

The two young complainants said that the Italians asked of what nationality they were, and attacked without waiting for an answer.

"We were just having some fun," the fighters told the police, denying that their assaults were part of an organized anti-Semitic campaign.

Deny Citizenship To 45,000 Families

BUCHAREST. — A total of 135,000 Jews have lost their Rumanian citizenship on various grounds including such charges as fraudulent entry and insufficient length of residence. During the past two weeks approximately 45,000 Jewish families were told to apply for alien residents' permits before August 25 or face removal to concentration camps.

According to figures supplied by the American Jewish Committee, there are approximately 728,000 Jews in Rumania.

Epstein Swamped By "Eve" Models

BLACKPOOL, England. — Jacob Epstein, American-born sculptor of the gigantic statue called "Adam", said this week he had been swamped with applications from girls wanting to pose for a companion statue which he plans to call "Eve."

The applications came from girls, typists and waitresses, he said, adding:

"But I shall construct it from my imagination."

Punches were exchanged freely throughout the audience, which quickly grew from 500 to 1500.

Court Rejects Plea For Change in Name

BUENOS AIRES. — A civil court here has rejected a Jewish parent's petition to be allowed to change his son's name from Isaac to Ignacio Saler, on the ground that the Biblical name made the Youth the target of anti-Semitism, ruling that to grant the petition would be to admit that Argentine society was anti-Semitic.

The court recommended that the dossier on the case be turned over to the education authorities for an investigation of the college where the youth is a student, since the applicant had charged that instructors at the institution had condoned Jew-baiting activities.

Auto Blaze Caused By Gasoline Thief

An automobile belonging to Dr. Leo Cohen of 164 Prairie avenue, was considerably damaged early last Tuesday morning, after a thief had syphoned gasoline into a gallon jug and both the machine and its garage at 248 Dudley street were ignited.

A gallon jug, nearly filled with the gasoline, and a short length of rubber hose near it in the car were discovered by fireman. They believed that the quick discovery of the fire and their swift arrival prevented a severe explosion. The garage was not badly damaged.

Palestine Aviator Planning New York to Tel Aviv Flight

NEW YORK. — The first airplane flight from New York to Palestine, aimed at dramatizing the accomplishments of the Jewish homeland, is envisioned by Morris Bromberg, Palestinian aviator, mechanic and leader of the Maccabi Sports Organization.

Bromberg, who organized the Maccabi round-the-world motorcycle tour in 1935, is seeking a \$12,000 fund to buy and fit out a plane for his intended hop to Tel Aviv, via Paris. He believes he can already count on \$8,000 and needs \$4,000 more. The 28-year-old flyer, trained in the United States and Canada, is confident that he can make the flight in about 25 hours. He would make the New York-to-Paris hop in 15

hours and from there continue on to Tel Aviv.

"Such a flight," Bromberg said, "would show the world that we Jews, too, can fly. It would illustrate, in a most dramatic way, what the 475,000 Jews of Palestine have accomplished." The trip, however, would have no political purpose, he said. It would be intended solely on "a good-will flight."

Bromberg was born in Russia and came to Palestine with his parents at the age of 12. His father now owns an orange grove at Raanana. During the 1929 Arab excesses Bromberg was among the first seven Jews to go to Jerusalem.

More Jews Reach Roumania To Dare Palestine Blockade

COSTANZA, Rumania. — Homeless Jews continued this week to pour into this seaport with the faint hope of crashing Britain's sea blockade into Palestine.

The freighter Tiger Will sailed with 850 Jewish refugees. More than 700 Polish Jews arrived by special trains and 1,600 Czechoslovak Jews landed at Braila, on the Danube.

The tramp steamers are provided by the Betar organization in which are grouped Palestine's extreme Jewish nationalists. Passage rates are high.

A handful of ragged men brought news of the steamer Lisel and its 800 Jewish passengers. The Lisel's captain was in jail in Palestine, it was stated, and most of the passengers were held in camps. Ten passengers were buried at sea.

For more than two months — with water and food running low — the Lisel cruised along the Palestine coast, waiting for an opportunity to crash the blockade. The crew mutinied for higher pay, which the master granted.

With passengers exhausted from hunger and thirst, the captain, finally surrendered to British authorities and the Lisel was escorted into Haifa by two destroyers.

Move to Control Endek Students

WARSAW. — 16 Polish Professors of the Lemberg Polytechnic have submitted a memorandum to the Polish Premier, the Ministers of Education, Foreign Affairs and Justice and the Presidents of the Sejm and the Senate, demanding the adoption of strong measures to prevent the recurrence of murders of Jewish students in Lemberg by Endek students.

Tolerance Manual Issued to Teachers

NEW YORK. — Issuance of a manual for teachers, entitled "An American Answer to Intolerance," endorsed by many prominent educators, was announced by the Council Against Intolerance in America. It aims to incorporate tolerance ideals through specific application in regular classroom work, rather than through any special tolerance program.

The manual contains four approaches—self-examination for prejudice, the study of propaganda devices, re-thinking of American ideals, and supplying of factual information on which propagandists are most misleading, with emphasis on contributions of various racial and national groups.

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Speeds Patient to Hospital In Emergency; Gets Ticket

HACKENSACK. — Mrs. Pearl Wollin, 30, of Brooklyn, rested comfortably in Hackensack Hospital last week after an emergency appendectomy which doctors said was performed "without a minute to spare." But the driver of an automobile, which sped her here at 85 miles an hour must answer a summons for speeding.

Stricken at a summer hotel in Parkville, near Monticello, N. Y., doctors at Monticello Hospital advised an immediate operation. Her husband, Albert, was summoned and asked a friend, Sidney Shapiro of Parkville to drive his wife to Greenpoint Hospital, Brooklyn.

Racing at 85 miles an hour on Mackay Highway in Paraums, Shapiro was halted after a five-mile chase by Augustus J. W. Peek, motor vehicle inspector. Told of Mrs. Wollin's condition, Peek suggested she be taken to Hackensack Hospital. Doctors there said a delay might have been fatal. Then Peek served the summons on Shapiro.

Resume Anti-British Broadcasts to Arabs

Radio Program Stirs Questions

LONDON. — Resumption of broadcasts by the German Government calculated to stir up Arab unrest in Palestine came before the House of Commons when Lt. Commander Reginald Fletcher, Laborite, asked what the Government was going to do about it.

Replying to Lt. Commander Fletcher's question, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs Richard A. Butler remarked that it was unfortunate that the anti-British propaganda carried on by the Nazi regime consisted of inaccuracies regarding the situation in Palestine, but denied that they were intended to incite the Arabs to violence. He added that no purpose could be served in approaching the German Government regarding the broadcasts to Palestine.

"Christian Front" Changes Its Name

DETROIT. — Because an anti-Semitic group active in the east has assumed the same title, The Christian Front, a monthly magazine of social thought owned and edited by Catholic laymen, has changed its name to Social Action. The editors felt this move to be imperative so that the policies of the magazine should not be confused with those of the Christian Front organization.

"Catholicism and anti-Semitism can have nothing in common," said Richard L.-G. Deverall, editor and publisher of Social Action. "Our magazine is devoted to promoting a program of Christian social reconstruction in accord with the encyclicals of the Popes. We want nobody to confuse us with a group who stir up racial hatred."



F.C.C. Urged to Bar Coughlin From Air

NEW YORK. — A demand that Father Charles E. Coughlin be prevented from the use of radio to "incite Americans to riot and bloodshed" was telegraphed to the Federal Communications Commission this week by L. M. Birkhead, national director of the Friends of Democracy, Inc.

Mr. Birkhead also urged Archbishop Edward Mooney of Detroit to take action against Father Coughlin's activities, saying:

"Father Coughlin, in challenging his critics on the airways, Sunday afternoon, July 30, said: 'We will fight you in Franco's way if necessary. You will say this is inflammatory. It is inflammatory.'"

"Respectfully we ask you, are we to infer that the Roman Catholic Church permits one of its priests to advocate civil war and incite to revolution?"

Wells Insists Jews Must Assimilate

LONDON. — H. G. Wells, in his new book, "The Fate of Homo Sapiens," predicts that the troubles being experienced by the Jews will intensify "until they are prepared to assimilate and abandon the chosen people idea."

Provisions Made to Transfer 25,000 Refugees to Palestine

PARIS. — The Jewish Agency for Palestine has completed a plan based on the British Government's recently announced White Paper policy, to raise \$15,000,000 for admission into Palestine of 25,000 Jewish refugees "as soon as the High Commissioner is satisfied that adequate provision for their maintenance is ensured."

It is expected that Palestine will be in a position to absorb

about 35,000 victims of the Hitler regime in less than two years, and that 10,000 would immigrate either with their own means or as dependents of residents of Palestine. The largest part of the sum, or about \$10,000,000, will materialize from American and British sources and the remainder will be raised by the Jewish Agency in countries other than England.

Under the plan of the Jewish Agency for Palestine it is suggested that provision should be made for (a) 1,000 students, (b) 1,500 children between the ages of 12 and 15, (c) 4,500 young people between the ages of 15 and 17, (d) 3,000 middleclass families mainly of the ages of 30 to 45 comprising 8,000, and (e) 10,000 Cholutzim between 18 and 35.

As soon as the bids are opened and the contract awarded the day of breaking the grounds will be announced. It is hoped that the official ground breaking ceremony can be held early in September.



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

Is Hitler Invincible

By Walter E. Horton

There is an old truth — a missed opportunity doesn't turn. But sometimes there comes another. There was an opportunity for the democracies last fall to check Hitler; they missed it but now circumstances have placed a similar opportunity in their path.

There is a myth around Hitler — believed and beloved by his followers; feared by his enemies — that he succeeds in whatever he attempts.

Myth Disproved

But is that really so? Last Spring Hitler said he wouldn't wait for a solution of the Danzig and Polish Corridor; but now the deadline is no longer mentioned. The Nazi papers vaguely state the end of 1939 as a possible time when Polish and Nazi differences over Danzig will be settled.

Duce Wants Peace

Mussolini, on the other hand, appears to wish peace at this time. His failure to attend the Italian maneuvers is significant of his desire for peace. Yugoslavia has veered from the Axis, announcing that it wishes to remain neutral. This reversal of form is a severe blow to Hitler for he had counted on a subservient Yugoslavia for raw materials and free passage for his troops. Even Japan has become coy as a cabinet crisis threatens to doom consideration of a military alliance with Hitler and Mussolini.

Talks Kept Secret

Last week Count Ciano discussed current problems with Ribbentrop and Hitler. And although the world was reassured of Italo-German friendship nothing was revealed as to the content of their talks. But totalitarian states don't require conferences for friendship; it seems more likely that Ciano attempted to obtain assurance that whatever Hitler intended to do there wouldn't be any war or conflict with Italian interests.

Root of Trouble

The latin quotation "panem et circenses" is the root of all Hitler's internal trouble. More often he has been forced to make up the lack of "bread" with "circenses." And now he requires some new "circenses" to fill up the mental stomachs of his nilly-willy followers.

Poles Obstinate

But the Poles are obstinate. A "protectorate" over Hungary or Jugoslavia might be a substitute for Danzig. But will he get it? Not only are the countries involved opposed but Italy isn't delighted with the idea.

Again Europe's destiny is in the hands of England. With Parliament on vacation, Prime Minister Chamberlain has the opportunity to destroy the myth of Hitler's infallibility.


Bluff Continues

Raise \$600,000 For Palestine

NEW YORK. — Resolutions denouncing the British White Paper on Palestine as a "shameless attempt to disarm a people surrounded by brutal and vengeful enemies," praising the decision of Palestine Jewry to support immigration and colonization under all circumstances, and thanking the American and British labor movements for supporting the protest against the new British policy were adopted at a meeting of the National Labor Committee for Palestine.

Italy Contradictory On Refugee Problem

Add Facilities For Admission

ROME. — Italy, which only a short while ago embarked upon an official program of anti-Semitism, is in the anomalous of being virtually the only country in Europe to which refugees from Germany can enter with a certain amount of ease for at least temporary haven. Facilities for administration of Jewish refugees have been increased lately, resulting in the entry of more than 700 in the last month. Most of the refugees have only 10 marks which they were permitted to take with them from the Reich.

Care of the refugees is proving a difficult problem for the various Jewish relief committees, especially in Milan. A large number of the exiles are spending their nights on Milan park benches and are suffering from lack of food.

A similar order has been issued by the Bureau of Navigation of the United States Navy, the United States Coast Guard, and the Civilian Conservation Corps. There is a standing order of the United States Veterans Administration, granting furloughs during the holidays to patients able to go home.

Nazi Says Hitlerism Wouldn't Work Here

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — A Nazi newspaper man, Dr. Manfred Zapp, told the Institute of Public Affairs here last week of his conviction that National Socialism would not work in the United States "because the country is rich and has a widely spread population." He said his conviction was the result of a tour of the country.

C.I.O. Leader Asks Labor Oppose Hate

NEW YORK. — "Anti-Semitism is an important part of a wide conspiracy to destroy the liberties of the American people," warned John Brophy, national director of the C. I. O., in an appeal for labor's support of the Committee of Catholics to Fight Anti-Semitism.

"Anti-Semitism, like every other form of racism and minority hatred, has a real place in the plans of undemocratic, un-American forces seeking to dominate our social and political life," he said. "It is spread in America today for a definite and carefully plotted purpose." His declaration appears in the September issue of The Voice, published by the Committee of Catholics.

Zionists Announce Agenda for Conclave

Sessions to Last Until August 28

LONDON. — Zionist headquarters announced the agenda of the twenty-first biennial World Zionist Congress, convened last Wednesday and whose principal task will be to define the Zionist attitude toward the British government's new Palestine policy.

The congress was opened with an address by President Chaim Weizmann, who reported on the world Jewish position. Thursday a praesidium was elected.

There will be no plenary sessions from August 21 to 26, during which time committees are scheduled to meet, with the heads of executive departments delivering reports to their respective commissions. In the final days of the session, which is scheduled to adjourn on August 28, commission reports will be presented to the plenum and elections will be held.

A two-day meeting of the Council of the Jewish Agency for Palestine will be opened on August 30 with an address by Dr. Weizmann.

VIENNA GHETTO

VIENNA. — Reich Commissioner Joseph Buerckel issued a decree barring Jews from public parks and permitting them to make use only of Wettstein Park in the Second District, Leopoldstadt, which is Vienna's "ghetto" now with more the 100,000 of the city's Jewish population still residing there.

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Hospital Service Enrollment Begins

First Response Swamps Officials

Inquiries to the headquarters of the Blue Cross, 338 Hospital Trust Building, Providence, have almost doubled since last Thursday's announcement that enrollment was to begin immediately, and after the radio broadcast over Station WPRO, sponsored by the Rhode Island Medical Society, on Sunday, Stanley H. Saunders, executive director of the Blue Cross, said today.

As the Blue Cross moved well into its first week of enrollment, Mr. Saunders expressed satisfaction at the response with which the public has greeted the initial presentation of the non-profit group hospitalization plan in this State.

"We have almost been swamped by requests from employers that we come out and organize a hospitalization group at their plant," Mr. Saunders said, "We are filling these requests as fast as we can handle them, but it takes a little time to organize a group at a place of employment of any size, especially at the beginning, and we are having to move slowly on that account," he said.

Catholics Organize in Fight on Coughlinism

CHICAGO. — A branch of the Committee of Catholics to Fight Anti-Semitism has been formed by some 30 Catholic leaders in Chicago, it was announced by the national Committee of Catholics to Fight Anti-Semitism. Two radio programs are planned in Chicago, and arrangements have been made for leaflet issuance and distribution, as well as distribution of The Voice, official organ of the Committee to all parts of Chicago.

Its purpose is to carry on the work of the national committee in New York, whose program of activity consists of frequent issuances of literature, radio broadcasts, speakers' bureau, educational program for schools, research bureau, information service and education of Catholics to combat bigotry and anti-Semitism.

HINT AT NEW POGROM

LONDON. — Accusing the Jews of conducting an "atrocious whispering campaign," Der Angriff, official organ of Reich Propaganda Minister Goebbels, hinted at the possibility of a new pogrom against the Jews of Germany if it were not stopped.

Jewish Drunkard a Rarity Survey By Doctor Reveals

BOSTON. — The Jew rarely becomes a drunkard because of the hatred of alcoholics which is part of his social tradition, according to a study made by Dr. Abraham Myerson, director of the Psychiatric Research Division of the Boston State Hospital. Dr. Myerson, who recently addressed a scientific convention in Atlantic City, N. J., on "The Social Psychology of Alcoholism," said in his paper that although the Jew suffers as much as anyone from painful psychological states and responds like members of other races to the effects of drink, the Jew seldom drinks to excess.

"I believe the answer to lie," he said, "in the social tradition of the Jew in respect to alcohol. Jews are rarely total abstainers. There are no Jewish total abstinence societies, and not even any Jewish temperance societies. But nowhere and amongst no people is there more contempt, loathing and even hatred for the alcoholic.

"The term 'Er ist ein Shikur' (He is a drunkard) designates an individual whom no responsible girl will marry, whom no business man will employ, who loses his friends, who is condemned in harsh and unsparing terms. To be a drunkard is to cease being a Jew, is to leave the fold of Jew-

ry or to be pushed out.

"The attitude is that it is entirely unworthy of a Jew, man or woman, to get drunk, and while amongst the younger Jews 'getting tight' is not regarded with the same loathing and contempt as amongst the elder Jews, nevertheless the tradition holds over and operates very strongly against alcoholism of a chronic or recurring type."

Nazis Strengthen Anti-Jewish Law

PRAGUE. — The German Government has hastened to legalize the anti-Jewish law described in detail in last week's Zionist Review which had been promulgated here by the Protector, Baron von Neurath, without the knowledge or consent of the Czech Government or of President Hacha.

The new decree, published in Berlin, empowers the Protector to issue new laws and amend old laws, making it binding on the

Czech people and Courts of Justice to accept as valid any legislation so promulgated.



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
