## Editorials

### Yom Kippur

Doubly holy is the Sabbath this week, coinciding as it does with Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

On this day Jews the world over will gather in their synagogues and temples to search their hearts and purge their souls of all sinful thoughts. A day of fasting and prayer from which Jewry will emerge purified of the sins which the frailties of human nature apparently render inevitable.

But it is not enough to spend a single day of the year in prayer and soul-searching. Too many Jews do not remain at one with God and their fellow men once dusk has fallen on Yom Kippur, but permit their hearts to be filled with bitterness against this group or that which itself is infected with the virus of hate.

Perhaps it is not human nature to remain at one with God and mankind throughout the year. But the endeavor to maintain the lofty spiritual level of the Day of Atonement throughout the year is the only force which can raise mankind to the noble heights to which we all aspire.

### Medicine And Religion

A grand prize for effrontery should be awarded Germany for inviting back into her borders Jewish doctors and specialists previously expelled during Hitler's racial purges. The expatriated doctors, useful to a Germany at war, are now asked to bind the hands that bled them.

The naivete of the gesture is too stupendous for either wrath or laughter. And while we contemplate the insane turnings of the Berlin race myth, it would be pertinent to examine racial prejudice in our own America, especially in its relation to the medical profession.

Anti-Semitism is gaining in the medical schools of our country and already we have refugees from the repression.

There exists in many colleges of medicine in America a definite and quite rigid limitation on the number of Jewish students admitted. Questionnaires sent to would-be enrollees include a question on nationality and religious faith. Quite apart from scholastic fitness.

It may be argued that the medical profession is overcrowded; what profession is not? Yet no facile statistics can excuse the fact that even in America the Jews are being made the special target of restrictions.

One can dismiss the Jew-baiting of outfits like the Christian Mobilizers as the screams of a half-literate rabble aroused by demagogues. But what words of condemnation can one find for the heads of enlightened medical schools invoking racial bias in a profession historically dedicated to humane ends?

Surely the time will come when America will have need of all of its trained men and women. And then we may have to stand before the world, as Germany is doing today, in the role of a monstrous hypocrite, extending a welcome to those we once spat upon and spurned.

### Jewry to Observe Holiest of Holidays To Chant Kol Nidre Tonight

Following the tradition of ages, Jews will gather in the synagogue, Friday evening, September 22, the eve of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, the most solemn holy day in the Jewish calendar. It is a day of fasting and prayer which will last until sundown, Saturday, September 23.

All Jews, Orthodox, Conservative and Liberal observe this one-day holy day.

Characteristic of the evening service that ushers in the holy day is the Kol Nidre chant whose origin is buried in the story of the past.

One of three festivals which was evolved from an ancient autumn harvest feast, Yom Kippur was marked with great ceremony in the days of the second temple. A week was spent in preparation for the services, which were conducted only by the High Priest of Israel. Jews from all parts of the world made pilgrimage to the temple in Jerusalem in order (Continued on Page 2)

### Ask Jewish Doctors To Return for Duty

PARIS. — While German radio stations continued to broadcast anti-Jewish war propaganda, information reaching here indicated that Nazi authorities have issued an official announcement inviting Jewish doctors and other professionals in neutral countries to return to the Reich.

The invitations extended through German consulates outside of the Reich, declare that "All German intellectuals and people of the free professions, irrespective of their racial origin, can return to Germany."

Newspapers ridiculed the announcement, evidently issued under instructions from Berlin, and expressed their astonishment at Hitler's shamelessness in calling them back after so many years of persecution knowing that not a single Jew will respond.

### TO LAUNCH APPEAL

NEW YORK. — The United Jewish Appeal will launch a campaign in 46 Jewish communities throughout the country within the next month in the Fall drive to raise funds for emergency needs.

### Daily Worker Very Pleased; Acclaim Invasion of Poland

The Daily Worker, official Communist newspaper, whose editors have been hard put to explain the zig-zag trail of their comrades abroad, this week hailed Russia's invasion of Poland as "another triumph for human freedom — destined for the brightest page of world history."

"With the total collapse of the treacherous and semi-Fascist Government," the editorial said, "the Polish people—including the White Russian and Ukrainian minorities — were left completely at the mercy of the Nazi invaders."

On the one hand, these unhappy people were faced with brutal Nazi aggression; on the other, they were being stabbed in the back by the Chamberlain Munichmen, with whom the Polish ruling circles were in league. As Hitler's hordes advanced further into Poland, the atrocities against the Jewish people and other minorities exceeded some of Fascism's goriest deeds.

Freed from Tyranny  
"In this situation the Soviet

government sent in the Red Army, as an army of liberation, to protect the Ukrainian and White Russian minorities, after the semi-Fascist Polish government had ceased to exist and had left them to the ravages of war and Fascist enslavement. More than a million Jews living in western Ukraine and western Byelo-Russia are now beyond the pale of Fascist anti-Semitism.

"Freed from tyrannical rule of the greedy landlords and the corrupt nobility, all these minorities for the first time can chart for themselves a life of freedom, happiness and peace as have their brothers in the land of socialism. Freed from the chains of exploitation, they can now enjoy real self-determination, a chance to choose their own future, and decide their own fate."

### Polish Jews Are Subjected To Brutal Nazi Treatment

LONDON. — While Nazi forces penetrated deeper into Polish territory, Jews caught in towns close to the Polish-German border were subjected to brutal treatment by Nazi soldiers according to information reaching here. Thousands of Polish Jews have been thrown into concentration camps, and it is known that many Jews have been seized in reprisal for the arrest of Nazis living in Palestine by the British government there.

In Koenigsburg, East Prussia, a new German publication printed in Polish called "Polski Pravda," is carrying on a vicious war propaganda campaign against Jews declaring that they are Polish spies. Hundreds of Jews were executed according to reliable sources which said that Nazi authorities had order-

occupation of Polish towns on the grounds that they had been caught sniping at Nazi soldiers. Near Lodz 55 Jews were ordered shot on the allegation that they had fired at German airplanes.

Leaders of Jewish communities in all cities and towns now occupied by the invaders are being held as hostages and warned that if any Jew in Poland is apprehended carrying on acts of sabotage or espionage against the Nazi army, the leaders would be held accountable.

In many towns now occupied by the Nazis heavy fines have been inflicted upon the Jewish communities. Fines, for the most part are being paid, the lives of Jewish leaders being held forfeit for non-payment. Jews are now allowed to own radios and are subjected to a 6

### Polish Jews Flee Towards Lithuania

KAUNAS. — Tens of thousands of Jews are in flight towards Wilno and Volhynia, according to information which said that many have been killed and wounded as a result of continual aerial bombardment. Food was denied Jews in occupied areas.

Many Jewish refugees from Polish war zones are concentrated at Oskelniki where they are living in open fields along the roads. The director of the Jewish Scientific Institute in Wilno, M. Kalmanowitz, revealed that the Wilno Jewish community had sent an appeal abroad asking for food and clothing for the strick-

### Neutrality Act Holds Up Recruiting Legion

NEW YORK. — Recruiting of American Jews for a new Palestine Jewish Legion is being considered by Zionist groups, it was learned, but plans are being held in abeyance until it is ascertained whether action would conflict with the United States Government's neutrality policy. The Poale Zion-Zeire Zion organization scheduled a meeting for this week to discuss the question.

A spokesman for the organization said it was premature to speak of information of a Jewish legion. "It is now a question for legal experts to decide in the light of the American neutrality act," he said.

### Arnold Bernstein To Try Comeback

NEW YORK. — Arnold Bernstein, whose steamship line established new and for a while successful low-rate transatlantic passenger service some years ago, is returning to America to make a second plunge into the shipping business, reports from abroad indicated this week.

Bernstein got out of a Nazi jail July 25, having served two years for violating German exchange laws. The Germans took over his ships. He is expected to re-



## Italy Strengthens Anti-Refugee Laws

Reduce 4,000  
Jews to Beggary

ROME. — All foreign Jews in northern Italy are being systematically rounded up by the Italian authorities who are releasing only those who are able to prove that they were prepared to leave the country within a short time. It was reported that eight Jews, seized in Turin, were escorted to the German border although information about their fate was not available.

It is said that since the government has closed down the Jewish relief committee for refugees, the 4,000 Jewish refugees from Germany have been reduced to pitiful circumstances, many living on house-to-house beggary. Large groups live in one room and some are forced to walk the streets at night.

## Hore-Belisha Announces Refugees May Join Army

LONDON. — Foreign refugees living in England who seek to enlist in the British Army will be treated as regular British volunteers, War Secretary Leslie Hore-Belisha announced in the House of Commons. Applications from refugees will be placed on file and they may be called in limited numbers, provided their records are satisfactory, should their

services be required, Hore-Belisha said.

Earlier, Home Secretary Sir John Anderson announced that the cases of all Germans and Austrians in England would be reviewed to avoid treating as enemies the German refugees who are friendly to the country which has offered them asylum.

Several thousand exiles have registered with refugee organizations for national service. Until the new decision to accept refugee volunteers, they had been utilized only for passive defense activities, such as filling sandbags for defense against air raids.

But in synagogues wherever Jews were settled, the prayers that had made up the temple services were recited. Each individual said his own prayers asking for forgiveness and for another year of good life.

Not related to any nature festival or historic event, Yom Kippur, probably developed out of a desire to prepare, in a fitting way, for the grateful celebration of harvest which follows.

# Temporary Visas Extended

## 5,000 Nazi Refugees Benefited by Decree

May Postpone  
All Deportations

WASHINGTON. — Several thousand Europeans in the U. S. on temporary visitors' permits will be able to obtain extension of these permits up to a two-year period — and possibly beyond — officials said. An estimated 4,000 to 5,000 refugees from Germany are among the holders of such permits.

None will be forced to return to Germany, or Nazi-dominated lands, even if it were possible to deport them, it was stated. Bona fide visitors can renew their permits in the ports at which they landed for a two-year period. After that, applications for renewals must be dealt with in Washington.

The Bureau of Immigration of the Labor Department has the right to extend visitors' permits when it sees fit, as many times as it wishes, and this practice will be followed. Meanwhile, the State Department may consider an order postponing all deportations during the war, but this action is not contemplated in the immediate future.

## Says 'Purge' Caused USSR Policy Shift

Extremist Paper  
Denounces Jews

ROME. — The extremist newspaper Il del Carlino attributed the "improvement" in Soviet policy to a purge of the Jews by Joseph Stalin and attributed democratic policy in France, England and the United States to control by Jews. "If we have to take up arms, ours will be a Fascist war, proletarian and anti-Semitic, and we promise that the Jew will pay dearly for the bloodshed he has caused," the paper said editorially.

"President Roosevelt is of Jewish origin and vainly seeks to hide his real war-mongering sentiments by sending pathetic appeals to the heads of states. By his personal action he has envenomed relations with Germany and Italy, as witness the restrictions on Italian exports to the United States, so that the totalitarian states know him for their bitterest enemy."

## Jewry's Future Rests On America, Says Ben Gurion

JERUSALEM. — As in the last World War, the chief responsibility of the Jewish future rests on the Jews of the United States, it was asserted here by David Ben Gurion, Chairman of the Jewish Agency Executive, who declared that: "The world situation is pregnant with dangers and possibilities. The moral weight of Jewry, which deteriorated in the last few years, is re-arising. In view of the moral forces at stake in the present struggle, a

special responsibility devolves on two great centers of Jewish strength — America and Palestine.

"Polish Jewry is facing the severest ordeal. Jewry in the British Empire could be of great assistance but, as during the last war, the Jews of the United States bear the chief responsibility for the future of our race and for the conservation and extension of our work in Palestine."

## Catholics Expose "Christian Front" as Jew-Baiting Unit

NEW YORK. — Asserting that in the City of New York and to some extent in other cities of the East, a racial and religious war is in the making, the "Voice for Human Rights," published by the Committee of Catholics for Human Rights, declares that: "A mass movement of intolerance, hatred and persecution masquerading under the name of 'Christian' is being fomented by people who, though for the most part Catholic, are involved in a movement which is itself un-Catholic. It feeds upon Anti-Semitism, shows an alarming disposition to imitate the methods and ideology of the German racists. The chief manifestation of the movement," the publication reveals, "is the organization known as the Christian Front."

"In the opinion of informed observers," the paper says, "this movement, if allowed to go un-

challenged from Catholic sources, will create pogroms, split the labor movement, endanger the structure of American political democracy, and bring the fires of persecution upon the Catholic Church in America. Already it has caused street fighting and rioting, and aroused the anger of the great Jewish population of the East. It is the first mass manifestation of intolerance, bigotry, violence and uncharity ever to be promoted by Catholics in this land where the record of the Church is thus far unblemished."

### Jewish Workers' Holidays Cancelled

NEW YORK. — According to a decision by the Labor Court in Stuttgart, reported in the New Yorker Staats-Zeitung Jewish workers in Germany do not enjoy the right to observe national holidays with pay which has been conceded to their "Aryan" fellow-toilers.

The Nazi court ruled in the case of the special holiday of April 20, 1938, that only Germans were entitled to their wages on that occasion. It said that a Jew was "neither a German worker, nor a racial comrade or citizen of the Reich, but merely a sub-

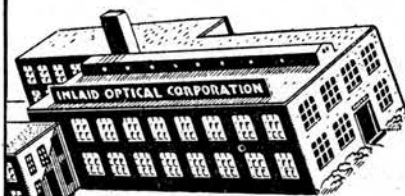

## Thousands Offer Services to Allies

### Refugees Swamp Recruiting Offer

PARIS. — With Jewish immigrants here registering for service with the French army at the rate of 200 per hour, a recruiting station, operated by the Association of Jewish War Veterans, announced that already more than 6,000 Jewish immigrants have volunteered and that before the week is out all able-bodied young men among the 100,000 Jewish immigrants, not including refugees, will be in uniform.

The women's International Zionist Organization, together with the OSE (Jewish health society) and the Federation of Jewish Societies) have opened a special office to receive applications for war duty from Jewish women, who are clamoring to enlist in any service useful to the French cause. A station has been opened by the Federation of Polish Jews where women interested in engaging in Red Cross work, may take courses in medical and sanitary aid.

NEW YORK. — Dr. N. H. Swellengrebel of Amsterdam, at the Third International Congress of Microbiology at the Waldorf-Astoria, last week warned that neither the sites of proposed colonies of Jewish refugees in Dutch Guiana nor any other tropical land infested with malaria were suitable for colonization.

## Actors Stop Sticking Pins And Needles in Chamberlain

War Brings Armistice Here;  
Four Little Angels Now Are Three

NEW YORK. — Call it a self-imposed censorship or a sporting urge to withhold brickbats from persons already busy ducking bombs, but the fact is that the war has caused alterations in at least one Broadway production.

"Pins and Needles," nose thumbing play of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, has dropped one sketch, rewritten several others and, in general, pulled all punches aimed at antics of certain democracies. The labor stage hasn't changed its policy of socking exposed chins, but it seems to think it only fair to cease sniping at Prime Minister Chamberlain, for example, now that he's fighting a war they approve.

Then There Were Three

The 12-minute lampoon of Chamberlain's appeasement policy, Britannia Waives the Rules, with the sock line, "If at first you don't concede, fly, fly again," is no longer in the show.

The Four Little Angels of Peace, once Hitler, Mussolini, Chamberlain and a Japanese imperialist, are now only Three Little Angels. The trio, minus Chamberlain, still sing of their desire for peace while they promote wars here and there, but the words are different.

The lyric writers, however, drew on a reserve supply of acid when they rewrote the lines. Hitler no longer predicts "Anschluss with Mars" but ruefully admits: "Though I've started the war in the Poles' corridor, Believe me, it's quite a surprise; The allies got tough And at last called my bluff— Now I'm Danzig with tears in my eyes."

And Mussolini, who formerly defended Italian participation in the Spanish war with "After all, don't we say that we're sorry" now feels cheated by the Russian-German pact and laments: "Once Herr Hitler and me Were like THIS, you'll agree, With no other lover to harm us; Then a Russian named Joe Laid our whole romance low— I'll sue him yet for breach of promise."

Japan, too, feels let down by the Hitler-Stalin exchange of cordialities, according to the lyricist. Where once an imperialist sang "Oh how we deplore the mere mention of war—We're a nation of poets and thinkers" and defended pitiless bombing by describing the Chinese as something rhyming with Thinkers, he now

expresses alarm in these lines:

"Now we're all in a stew,  
We don't know what to do,  
Suppose one of the Allies attack us;

You know it's a fact  
When Adolf signed that pact  
He just left us out flat on our axis."

Satires on the native scene, local politics, radio advertising and labor problems, and the impudent treatment of Italy's version of the Stork Derby, are changed only enough to keep them topical, but in "The Red Mikado" the authors really let themselves go.

Curtain Song

In this travesty the old version had a Prime Minister singing the "titwillow" song, before plunging into "the watery grave," to the refrain Oh Munich, Oh Munich, Oh Munich.

Now a Rhine maiden sits near a tree by the Danube, sobbing "We've got a substitute for every produce," and the stanza that brings down the house with the curtain has wallop to keep the writer out of Hitler's Germany forevermore:

"I don't mind if our clothes are  
all paper and sand,  
"If for dinner we roast up an old  
rubber band,  
"But instead of a man at the head  
of our land  
"We've got ersatz, oh ersatz, oh  
ersatz."

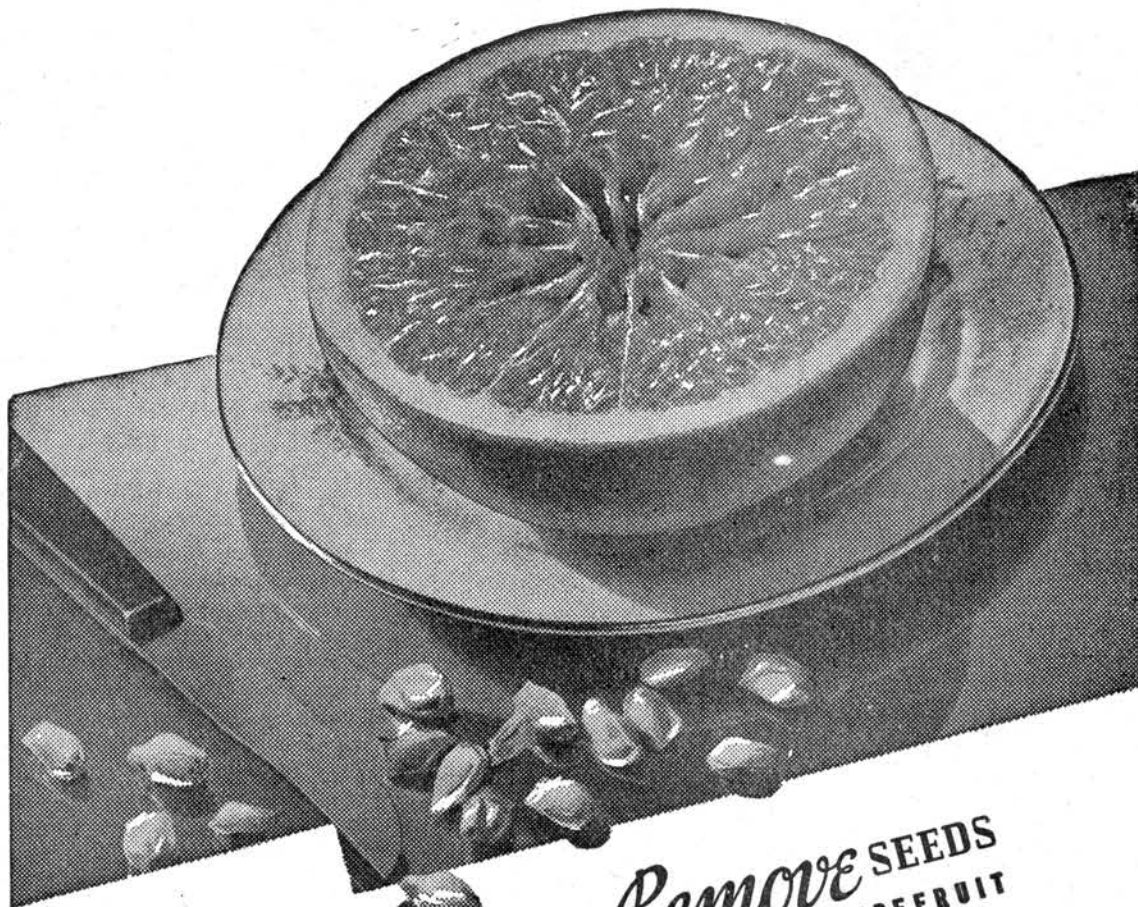
