NAMING BY THE WEST GERMAN Government of Karl Werkmeister as its ambassador to Sweden was received with shock by Israeli officials. Werkmeister was a Nazi diplomat serving in Budapest at the same time Eichmann was annihilating Hungarian Jews.

NEARLY 60 PER CENT OF ALL Jewish marriages in West Germany since 1945 have been mixed, according to a study made at Mainz University by Dr. Harry Maor of Tel Aviv. The study also showed that of 1,166 born in West German Jewish communities between 1951 and 1958, only 71 had two Jewish parents.

A SPOKESMAN FOR THE U.S. Immigration Service disclosed that Nicholas Eichmann, 25-year-old son of Adolf Eichmann, departed "voluntarily" from the United States. Protests had been made by the Jewish War Veterans against his anti-Semitic statements. The Justice Department made an investigation of his activities.

THE RABB FAMILY OF Boston, Mass., has donated \$1,000,000 to the Beth Israel Hospital development campaign, it was announced in Boston by Rudolph H. Weiner, president of the hospital.

SIXTY-TWO AMERICAN STUDENTS from all parts of the United States left this month to work in various Israel Kibbutzim for the summer. This group is the first of a new Israel summer work project called "Summer in Kibbutz".

BECAUSE OF DIVIDED OPINION over the issue of Federal aid to parochial schools, the 49th national convention of Young Israel could not unite on a resolution. The issue will be aired at a series of public forums to be arranged for that purpose by Young Israel in the next few months.

THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA Outstanding Achievement Award was presented to Mrs. Charles Hymes, president of the National Council of Jewish Women.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF the Weizman Institute of Science last week approved a ten-year building and expansion program for the institute. The first new unit will be the Ullman Institute of Life Sciences for molecular biology study, which will be started immediately.

THE AMERICAN-ISRAEL CULTURAL Foundation reported last week that 43 violoncellists from 12 countries have thus far qualified for participation in the third Pablo Casals International Violoncello Competition to be held under the foundation's auspices in Israel.

THE ISRAEL FOREIGN MINISTRY last week denounced the expulsion by the Soviet Union of an Israel Embassy official as "a case of flagrant provocation by the secret police."

ernment last weekend, accused the USSR on his arrival here on his way home to Jerusalem of trumping up "a fake espionage charge" against him

Reports Say Israel To Fire Second Sounding Rocket

JERUSALEM — Israeli scientists will fire a second sounding rocket within two weeks which will contain an instrument package capable of transmitting data to ground stations, reliable sources reported here today.

The sources said the instrument package would contain measuring devices to transmit to ground stations findings on radiation, temperature and pressures in the Ionosphere. Such a space probe would be a substantial advance over the relatively primitive device fired up 52 miles Wednesday in Israel's first rocket launching.

Attracts Speculation

The latest development in Israel's technological abilities which made it one of the world's few nations in the space club, was attracting speculation as to its military possibilities. These were denied recently by Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, who was one of the Israeli officials who watched the first rocket firing at a secret base on the Mediterranean Shore.

Premier David Ben Gurion, who appeared at a Mapai election meeting, rejected any idea that the rocket project had anything to do with Israel's military preparedness or with arms production in Israel. In reply to questions from reporters, he said "this is purely a scientific achievement and device."

When he was asked whether the Shavit could be modified for military use, he declined comment, saying only "first we shall have to see if and what the scientists will do."

Scientific sources said that the major achievements in the successful initial firing was the development by Israeli scientists of an effective solid fuel, which was indicated as having important strategic implications. The same sources stressed that Israeli space experts, having licked the propellant problem, should have no difficulty in launching more rockets for a study of the Middle East's atmospheric conditions.

It was disclosed that work on the solid fuel had been started several years ago by scientists at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology.

Mr. Sharett said that he and his wife were arrested last Thursday at Riga. He stated that both he and Mrs. Sharett had been "handled roughly" by the Russian police.

In announcing his ouster, Tass, the official Soviet news agency, had declared that the Israeli diplomat had been "caught red-handed in espionage." Yaacov Sharett is a son of Moshe Sharett, Israel's former Prime Minister, who was the Government's Foreign Minister for a number of years.

The Israel Foreign Ministry on Monday denounced the expulsion by the Soviet Union of an Israel Embassy official as "a case of flagrant provocation by the secret police."

The statement was issued as a comment on the announcement by Tass, the Soviet news agency, on the reasons for the expulsion of Yaacov Sharett, the First Secretary of the Israel Embassy in Moscow.

The Foreign Ministry described the Tass statement as "a tissue of falsehoods from beginning to end. Neither this Israeli diplomat nor any other Israeli diplomat has ever engaged in espionage or dissemination of anti-Soviet material in the Soviet Union.

"This is a case of flagrant provocation by the secret police," the Foreign Ministry asserted. The statement added that "the propaganda aims" of the Tass report "are obvious, and it is unlikely to deceive anyone."

Israel Ship Beached After 17 Hour Fire 'Damage Extensive'

CARDIFF, Wales. — An Israeli cargo vessel, the S. S. Etrog, last week was beached near Milford Haven, about 100 miles west of here, after a 17-hour fire was extinguished in the ship's hold. No casualties were reported among the 46 crewmen and passengers, but the Zim-Israel Navigation Company, owners of the vessel, confirmed that the ship was extensively damaged. Efforts are now in progress to refloat the vessel.

AJC Predicts Eventual End To Blue Laws

NEW YORK — Despite the Supreme Court decision upholding Sunday-closing statutes, the long-run trend toward ultimate discard of all blue laws will continue unabated, it was predicted last week in a report issued by the American Jewish Congress.

The report, written by Leo Pfeffer, general counsel of the American Jewish Congress, forecast three developments arising out of the recent ruling of the court:

- 1) A temporary spurt of legislative and administrative action to enact new Sunday laws, to strengthen those already on the books and to institute more vigorous enforcement.
- 2) Launching of a drive to exempting additional varieties of commercial activity on Sundays.
- 3) Intensification of efforts to obtain exemptions for Orthodox Jews, Seventh Day Adventists and other Sabbatarians who observe Saturday as their religious day of rest.

Catholic Shift Seen

The document expressed "reasonable optimism" over the chances of legislation to exempt Sabbatarians from Sunday laws. For the first time, it was noted, a leading Catholic newspaper — The Boston Pilot, official organ of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston — has editorially endorsed the idea of such an exemption provision.

This may be an indication, according to Pfeffer, of a change in Catholic attitude. (Continued on Page 2)

FRANKFURT — A group of non-Jewish victims of nazi persecution announced last week establishment of a fund for the planting of a forest in Israel in honor of Dr. Heinrich Gruber, the Protestant bishop who recently testified for the prosecution in the Jerusalem trial of Adolf Eichmann. The forest, to be planted near Jerusalem, will mark Rev. Gruber's 70th birthday which he celebrated last weekend. Rev. Gruber is credited with saving the lives of thousands of nazi victims.

**To Teach Hebrew With "Teaching Machines"**

PRINCETON—A new approach to the teaching of Hebrew will be employed by Princeton Theological Seminary here starting in the fall when "teaching machines" will be introduced. Philip C. Hammond, one of the supervisors of introductory Hebrew, who will instruct the course in which the unique method will be used, estimates that beginners will take 40% less time to learn the language.

The entire introduction to basic Hebrew structure, morphology, grammar and forms will be taught in one semester instead of two. The mechanized program is the first reported formal use of such methods and concepts in teaching an ancient language.

According to Pfeffer, that official Catholic policy — which has long advocated strict Sunday-law observance — might now be changing to permit Orthodox Jewish merchants and others who close on Saturday for religious reasons to avoid the double-penalty imposed by compulsory Sunday-closing laws.

The report described the Supreme Court decision upholding the constitutionality of Sunday laws as a "serious setback to all those committed to the principle of religious freedom and strict separation of church and state." There were, however, a number of "bright spots" in the rulings which must be included in evaluating their real significance, Pfeffer wrote.

**Future Attacks Permitted**

He noted, for example, that the high court did not rule out all future judicial attacks on Sunday laws. Citing a statement in the majority opinion of Chief Justice Warren that a compulsory-closing statute might be held unconstitutional if its purpose was "to use the State's coercive power to aid religion," Pfeffer commented:

"If the court should at some future time be prepared to invalidate Sunday laws it may be able to do so in reliance on this sentence without finding it necessary to repudiate its 191 decisions."

A significant shift in the Court's attitude toward Sunday laws during the past decade was noted in the report. In 1951, it was recalled, the Supreme Court dismissed an appeal in the Friedman case, in which the American Jewish Congress represented a New York kosher butcher challenging the State compulsory-closing law. In refusing to hear the case for want of a substantial Federal issue, the Court indicated it deemed the arguments so lacking in merit as not even

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## Foods To Remember

We all have a favorite "quick and easy" dinner for special guests that will keep us out of the kitchen and with our guests. Here are two "never fail" recipes that will help us to appear cool, calm and collected when entertaining:

### ▲ OVEN-FRIED CHICKEN

Wash and dry cut-up chicken--chicken breasts or legs--and dip in beaten egg and then in seasoned bread crumbs. You can buy these highly seasoned bread crumbs in a carton at your grocers.

Place on cookie sheet or shallow pan, put a large piece of butter on each piece of chicken and cook for 45 minutes in a 400 deg. oven. The main course--chicken with a crispy crust--will be ready to serve by the time the table is set.

### ▲ TOP-OF-STOVE ROAST

For a delicious roast with its own ready-made gravy that you can prepare early in the day and requires no watching, we suggest the following:

- 5 to 6 lb. pot roast or chuck roast
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 package condensed onion soup mix

Place roast in Dutch Oven or heavy pan with a tight cover. Pour can of mushroom soup over meat and add the condensed onion soup mix, cover and place on top burner on medium and then low and simmer until tender. Small peeled potatoes may be added before end of cooking time.

### ▲ FRENCH VEGETABLE ROAST

An ideal summer "hot-dish" that can be prepared ahead of time and stored in the refrigerator and requires very little cooking time.

- 1 lb. String beans
- 2 stale rolls
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 lb. walnuts
- 2 boiled potatoes
- 4 egg whites
- 2 tbs. margarine or butter
- 1/8 teaspoon paprika
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg

Wash string beans thoroughly and grind together with the nuts. Soak rolls in water and squeeze thoroughly. Add boiled potatoes, paprika, salt, paprika and chop well. Beat whites of eggs stiff and fold in.

Grease frying pan with margarine or butter. Put everything in pan. Garnish with bread crumbs and paprika and dot generously with margarine or butter on top. Bake 1/2 hour in moderate oven.

### ▲ EGGPLANT CROQUETTES

This is a delicious side-dish or a tasty sandwich. It is especially good with spaghetti or spaghetti sauce.

Peel the eggplant, place in hot water and boil until tender. Drain in calender and press out excess water by putting a weight on eggplant or with the hands. Add 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper to taste. Beat together. Drop by tablespoonfuls into oil or margarine and fry on both sides.

Or, dip slices into beaten egg and seasoned bread crumbs and fry in oil or margarine for individual servings.

### ▲ BROWNIES

If you like a moist "cake-like" brownie, try this easy recipe.

Beat 4 eggs and add 2 cups of sugar and 1 teaspoon of vanilla together in electric mixer.

Melt 1 cup of butter (1 stick of butter, 1 stick margarine) and 4 ounce squares of chocolate and add to eggs. Add 1 cup sifted flour.

Pour into 10 x 15 cookie sheet lined with wax paper and sprinkle 1 cup chopped nuts on top.

Bake in 325 deg. oven for 1/2 hour.

## Calls For United Jewish Leaders

KIAMESHA LAKE, N.Y.—American Jewry was called on last week to create a "new frontier" for the fight against bias through a united Council of Jewish Leaders, representing all religious, fraternal, community and national service organizations.

The proposal was made by grand master Maurice Goldstein at the 74th annual convention of Brith Abraham, attended by delegates of 275 lodges of the fraternal order. In his message, Goldstein said he is preparing to bring about a conference of Jewish leaders to establish a "national council" to combat "the rising tide of anti-Semitism and all other forms of bigotry in education, housing and employment."

Asserting that "our greatest problem in America today is racial prejudice," he denounced George Lincoln Rockwell, leader of the American Nazi Party, and said "we must put a stop to such anti-Americanism, and make it unnecessary for Freedom Riders to subject themselves to arrests seeking rights guaranteed under our constitution."

## Reform Leaders To Attend Parley

LONDON — A drive aimed at the rebuilding of Jewish life through the world in areas destroyed by war, and others resettled by immigration, heads the agenda of the 12th international conference of the World Union for Progressive Judaism beginning here next week in London.

Delegates from 23 different countries will attend the seven-day gathering.

The World Union represents

one of the largest Jewish synagogue bodies in the world with a membership of 1,500,000 in 23 countries. The largest affiliated body is the Union of American Hebrew Congregations consisting of 630 Reform temples in the United States, Canada and Latin America with a membership of 1,000,000.

The World Union hopes to draft a series of programs during the conference which will re-develop Jewish life in several areas throughout the world. Special emphasis will be placed on Israel and South America.

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## Adequacy Of Education In U. S. Assailed

HALLIBURTON, Ontario — A leading Jewish educator charged here last week that Jewish education in the United States was "tragically inadequate" and was "no further advanced than was secular education in America at the turn of the century."

Dr. Max Baer, national director of the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization, told the annual convention of B'nai B'rith Young Adults here that there must be "a drastic overhauling of the curriculum in Jewish schools so that it will be child-centered instead of subject-centered, reflecting the needs of today's youth, not of their grandparents."

Dr. Baer suggested a "coordinated approach to Jewish schooling in local communities." He declared that, "Education standards can be raised successfully only if there is agreement on the part of local synagogue congregations for uniformly high quality religious instruction."

The gradual decline in religious discrimination throughout the United States will, in the next decade, "challenge Jewish youth

to remain loyal to their faith," he said. This was especially true, he said, in cases where Jewish youngsters had identified with their own people largely because of discrimination.

"With this barrier crumbling, there is danger of an alienation of Jewish youth from the Jewish community, unless there is an affirmative and revitalized program of Jewish education," Dr. Baer asserted. "Such a program, he maintained, "will obviate any serious concern over the possibilities of assimilation."

 "You know," said Abel, as he turned the steaks on the outdoor charcoal grill, "I'm worried about Ben-Gurion."

 "My advice to you," said Borah, "is to stop worrying. For my part, I have an agreement with him — he doesn't worry about my statements and I don't worry about his."  
 "A very good policy in my estimation," said Pincus. "Very clever," sneered Abel. "The both of you. Very clever, indeed. The only trouble is that when I make a statement the only people who know about it are you two. But when the Prime Minister of Israel makes a statement, the whole world takes it up."  
 "If you ask me," said Borah, "that's a wonderful thing. To think that we have finally come to the time when there is a Jew in the world that if he says something the whole world sits up and takes notice."  
 "Agreed," said Pincus.

With such people you can't deal on a rational basis. My advice is stop worrying up the wrong alley."  
 Pincus took a deep breath. "They smell very good today," he said. He paused. "You know, I was abroad last year and a funny thing happened. I went to a Jewish banquet for a good Zionist cause and they sang Hatikva and the national anthem of the country I was in Suddenly I thought of Ben-Gurion and I could understand the way he sees it, because for a minute I saw it the same way for the people at the banquet."  
 "I don't understand," said Abel. "So I'll explain," said Pincus. "I mean that for a minute I saw all those people not as nationals of the country they were living in but as Jews. I was looking at them from the United States just as Ben-Gurion looks at all Diaspora Jews from Israel. It never struck me at meetings here, because I feel so much a part of this country and so much an American."  
 Abel hooked the steaks with a long barbecue fork and placed them on three plates. The three men fell to with zest, lubricating the steaks' passage with beer. "I don't know how I was ever able to live in the city," said Pincus. "This is really the life."  
 "You're finished with your story?" asked Abel.  
 "Let him eat," said Borah. "I have to confess you did a good job today. Let him eat."  
 "It's all right," said Pincus. "No I'm not finished. The point is that (Continued on Page 7)"

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"That part is all right," said Abel. "It's WHAT he says that bothers me. All that stuff about you can't be a Zionist if you don't live in Israel, and you can't be an American if you are a Jew. What does he think he's doing?"  
 "Better turn the steaks again," said Borah.  
 "Never mind the steaks," said Abel. "I never spoiled a steak yet. Seems to me you are trying to evade the issue."  
 "The issue can wait. The steaks can't. Well, anyway, you are quoting him out of context."  
 "That's right," said Pincus. "You are quoting him out of context and distorting what he meant."  
 "Context-shmontext," said Abel. "Every time there is an argument about what someone said, people start talking about context. To me context is nothing. It's what people think you mean that counts. If you are talking to people you have a duty to speak so that what you say is very, very clear. Especially if you are in a high place, and especially if there are outsiders who are just looking for excuses to jump on what you say for harmful purposes."  
 "If I understand you correctly, in or out of context," said Pincus, "you think that Ben-Gurion is putting the Disapora Jews in an unfavorable position vis-a-vis the non-Jews. Right?"  
 "I'm glad at least that I personally make my meaning crystal clear," said Abel. He went over to the steaks and turned them. "In two minutes they'll be ready," he said, fanning the charcoal smoke away from his nose.  
 "Listen," said Borah, "the people you are worried about don't need any ammunition from Ben-Gurion or anyone else. If they have no ammunition, they manufacture it. If they don't like the context for their purposes, they alter it."

those Jews were also worried about Ben-Gurion's statements, like you, Abel. They felt just as much a part of their country as we do of ours, but to me it looked strange. Do you understand what I mean? I mean I don't go along with Ben-Gurion, but I understand now how he sees it. And it worries me a little that I understand it."

"Very interesting," said Borah. "Very."

"More beer, anybody?" asked Abel. Pincus held out his glass and Abel poured from a can.

There was silence for a while as they relished the tender meat. Then Abel said, "I think I have an answer for you."

"I didn't hear any questions," said Borah.

"Stop for once with the smart-alecks," said Abel. "There is a question here in the air so thick you could cut it with this knife." He brandished the knife and Borah drew back in mock terror.

"So give us the question before you give us the answer," said Borah.

Abel ignored him. "There is a subtle inference somewhere, in context or out of context, that American Jews are insecure, surrounded by many many millions of non-Jews who, if they don't want to destroy us at least don't love us or receive us with open arms, and who might conceivably some day, under certain conditions, be driven to more active activity."

"A very long sentence," said Pincus with admiration. "A little redundant, but very long, I must admit."

"I happen to know what redundant means," said Abel, "in case you have the notion that you are being sarcastic. Anyway, let's suppose that this subtle inference happens to be correct, which I deny, but let's suppose. Is it worse or more dangerous than the position of the Jews of Israel who are isolated in the middle of forty million Arabs who are sworn to wipe them out at the first opportunity? Even if the subtle inference is correct, the only difference is that we here are intermingled with the others, while in Israel there is an imaginary line between the two groups called a border."

"In everything you have said today," said Borah, "there is only one thing that makes sense, and that is that you deny the subtle inference. That is why I am willing to grant Ben-Gurion freedom of speech. I feel perfectly secure here. Oh, there are certain imperfections, there are some things which could stand correction, but we'll get to them in time. We have a Catholic President, which is a great achievement, and who knows, maybe the next President will be Barry Goldwater."

"What point are you making?" interrupted Pincus. "What would be the great advance in making a Presbyterian President?"

"For your information," said Borah, "Goldwater's father was a Jew, and for any type of person with a Hitler trend of mind, he will remain a Jew for purposes of persecution. But my point is that regardless of the truth or untruth of subtle inferences, we are talking and settling nothing. To equate the relationship of the Jews in Israel with the Arabs and our relationship with our non-Jewish fellow citizens is ridiculous. I say let everybody speak his mind even if he happens to be a Prime Minister. If we don't like what he says, let's also speak our minds. Nobody knows the perfect answer to any of the world's problems

and maybe out of all the talking we will come to some sensible conclusions."

Abel swallowed the last bite of his steak. "I guess you're right," he said. His eyes lit up mischievously. "But don't consider this a precedent. I may never agree with you on any subject

again. O.K., I'll write Ben-Gurion a letter and tell him he has my permission to speak as freely as he likes."

"You know," said Pincus, "if there's one thing in this whole wide world that Ben-Gurion

doesn't need, it's somebody's permission to say what he thinks." (Reprinted from Congress Bi-Weekly)

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**QUOTAS CRITICIZED**  
 LONDON — The practice by some private London day schools of maintaining restrictive quotas against Jewish pupils was attacked here by Mrs. Joseph Grimmond, wife of the leader of the Liberal Party.

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A few weeks ago at the International Hair Style show, I became acquainted with a Mr. Anthony, who is a hair stylist from Italy. His first trip to this country has left him with a new slant of how American beauty is sold in stores. In fact, as we say in this country, "it stopped him cold." He could not understand why department stores, groceries or specialty shops sold cosmetics. To him this was unheard of since beauty products are sold only in "profumerias" in Italy. I inquired of Mr. Anthony what a "profumeria" is. He explained that a profumeria is a shop which sells only cosmetics, perfumes, fine jewelry, and is for the most part combined with a beauty shop. These salons are staffed by cosmetic experts who have had experience of at least three years as an apprentice. They feel that cosmetics should be personalized and treated in the same manner as custom made clothes. There are over four thousand profumerias in Italy. In Rome there are over one hundred hairdressing-profumerias which are stocked with the finest brands of cosmetics.

**Need Judaism To Aid State**

LONDON, England — Future generations residing in the State of Israel will not reject Judaism as a religious faith as is the case with a large number today, the leader of the World Union for Progressive Judaism declared here.

Addressing the opening session of the Twelfth International Conference of the 1,500,000 member religious body at Livery and Guild Hall, Dr. Solomon G. Freehof of Pittsburgh, Pa. said, "the need for a spiritual life will become increasingly evident to the growing generation to whom nationalism itself is no longer an original idea."

Rabbi Freehof predicted that "there will be a famine in Israel, as the prophet said, 'not for bread but for the word of the living God.'"

The religious leader stated that Progressive Judaism has made tremendous advances in both the State of Israel as well as other parts of the globe.

"Many obstacles stand in our way. On every path we take there are roadblocks. If we come to the State of Israel with our message, to a land where Jewish-folk consciousness has been so magnificently expressed, we are likely to be told that our message is quite obsolete; for we preach a form of the Jewish religion but the Jewish religion is no longer essential to Jewish survival."

It is estimated that only 20% of the Israelis identify themselves with any religious branch of Judaism. This group belongs mostly to Orthodox Judaism.

At the two Israeli congregations, men and women sit together, a practice forbidden by Orthodox Judaism. Both synagogues use a cantor, choir and have adapted their own prayerbook from the Union prayerbook used by Reform temples in the Western hemisphere.

Fashion at present is such in Italy that the fastest selling cosmetic items are eye make-up, nail polish and lipstick. Even though a great deal of eye make-up is used, it is natural in appearance. Lipsticks haven't changed in tone in the past few years; they remain very pale. Foundation bases when used, are light and natural in color. Care of the skin is foremost in the Italian girl's mind.

Above all, the hairdresser is the most important person in a woman's beauty ritual because her hair is never just combed, it is styled and set for individuality and fashion. "Being a woman in Italy," Mr. Anthony declared, "means a responsibility to look feminine and fashionable at all times."

I asked him what his opinion was of American women. All I could get as an answer was "very nice, but they should become more aware of their feminine charm."

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

KENNEDY'S PROGRAM—CHUNK BY CHUNK



Chunk by chunk, President Kennedy's economic and social welfare programs are going on our statute books--involving the biggest spending ever by government in Washington as well as several pioneering moves by Uncle Sam into areas never before touched.

The bread-and-butter lives of every one of us will be vitally affected by the laws Congress has been passing and Kennedy is signing in these weeks. The key meaning of this point is that our lives will be under a much greater, not a lesser Washington influence.

Much of the legislation being passed will have a direct, powerful impact on economic trends in the immediate and long-term future. The key meaning of this point is that, so far, our economy has been moving ahead mostly under its own steam and the stimulus of the bigger and broader spending by Uncle Sam is still to be felt.

The bet of both the White House and Congress is that our economy will be in a great boom in the next 24 months which will provide the tax income to cover the peak outgo. The key meaning of this point is that this is the crucial bet--whether or not the lawmakers realize it--and the spending is designed in a very real sense to spur the boom.

It's rather astounding to contemplate the general unawareness of the extent to which Congress is turning Kennedy's proposals into fact.

Perhaps the reason is that the Kennedy Administration's failures on the international front in its first six months have tended to obscure its successes on the domestic front. Regardless of the explanation, though, considering how narrow was the margin by which Kennedy squeaked into the White House and considering the phenomenal response to the proudly conservative, anti-federal government views of Arizona's Senator Goldwater, the Kennedy-Congress record to date is nothing short of spectacular.

Already law or becoming law are such major moves as:

**AID TO DEPRESSED AREAS.** This marks the first breakthrough in federal legislation specifically aimed at helping to stimulate regions of chronic economic distress. The law went on the books weeks ago; it authorizes spending of \$394 million; it is being put into effect now.

**EMERGENCY EXTENSION OF UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.** This law is operating, will pour up to \$1 billion into the pockets of three million needy unemployed over the next year.

**THE BIGGEST HOUSING PROGRAM IN HISTORY.** The stimulating influence of this law will be felt over many months and years ahead. It includes the most liberal mortgage terms ever devised, a great new boost for the home improvement market, billions for urban renewal, public housing, etc.

**HUGE HIGHWAY FINANCING LAW.** This one has just gone on the books, provides \$11.5 billion in additional federal grants to the states to permit completion by the 1972 target date of the 41,000-mile Interstate Highway System. It guarantees that constant and tremendous spending on new highways will continue to be a prop under the general economy.

**HIGHEST MINIMUM WAGE EVER.** This new law marks the first substantial extension of the minimum wage law in its 23-year history. It sets a minimum of \$1 an hour for 3,600,000 workers never before covered; sets a \$1.15 minimum for 23.9 million workers already covered; sets a goal of \$1.25 for 1963-64; starts to go into effect Sept. 3.

**ANOTHER LIBERALIZATION OF SOCIAL SECURITY.** Again, this law is just going on the books and the impact will be spread over future months. It will permit men to retire with reduced benefits at the age of 62, increase minimum benefits, raise benefits to widows. More than 4.4 million persons will be receiving hundreds of millions of dollars as a result.

Mind you, this is only the start of July and many more programs involving billions of dollars will be passed before Congress adjourns.

When you add the chunks, the whole becomes impressive indeed! Kennedy is betting that a coming business boom will cover the record spending by calendar 1963 and his spending programs are, in turn, a most important basis for his bet on boom.

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## The Lyons Den

**LAKE TAHOE, Nev.:** The curtain was drawn across the huge window framing the view of the Sierra Nevada range. The lights in the vast, sprawling South Shore Room were dimmed and the spotlight caught her as she moved along the big stage to the spot where stars belong--down front, center, and alone.

The 700 customers at Tahoe Harrah's cheered her entrance music, "Dinah." Years ago, when she was fresh out of Vanderbilt University, she had auditioned in Hollywood for Jimmy Saphier, the agent. He liked her voice and she was signed by Paramount. "But you'll have to change your name," he told her. "It's such a ridiculous name--Dinah Shore. It doesn't ring true."

At the piano onstage was Ticker Freeman, the only accompanist she's had since her professional start. He's accompanied her everywhere, in nightclubs, armories, on TV and at parties--including the party where Arthur Rubinstein played and where Freeman congratulated the pianist; "You made me feel for the first time that the left hand is for something other than turning pages."

Dinah faltered only twice during her superb show. The first time was when she felt she'd quivered over one note in "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." That was because of Tahoe's 6,000-foot altitude--

which makes it take five minutes to cook three-minute eggs. Backstage are oxygen tanks for new chorines and acrobat acts. The second time was when a moth suddenly darted toward her and interrupted a line of the lyric.

Once, when the Tennessee-born singer had to ad lib a line from "Dixie," Barney Balaban told her: "Dinah, I'll send you the lyrics so that you can memorize them." Balaban, a collector of rare manuscripts, sent her the original manuscript of the song "Dixie."

George Montgomery, her husband, was at our table with their children. It was George Burns who, in discussing the gentle-mannered singer, said: "Dinah Shore's idea of punishing her children is to sing them a song that is not in the 'top ten' hits."

Montgomery was in the Army Air Corps during the war. He and Robert Porterfield, owner of the Barter Theater, were assigned to a survival experiment in Alaska. They shivered on a glacier, testing the types of food and clothing which would help downed fliers survive in the Arctic. One night Porterfield, freezing, asked: "George, what's the first thing you'll do when you get back?"

Montgomery, through chattering teeth, replied: "I know now, but I won't tell you." The first thing Montgomery did when he got back was marry Dinah Shore.

## In Hollywood . . .

Hollywood, California--Everywhere you go, Jewish folks are striving with various results to latch on to even particles of success attained and enjoyed through these many years by the original Borscht Belt entertainment circuit in New York state that spawned some of the most famous names in Jewish showbiz history.

The Mont Vista Lodge in Upland, California, just 45 minutes as the lunatic drives the freeway from downtown Los Angeles, has a better than even chance to attain the ultimate goal.

Mont Vista Lodge is under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Koss who have refurbished and refurbished the venerable Jewish resort and have installed a program to keep both young and old active, entertained and happy.

What impressed me was the premiere festivities of the resort where, for the very first time, I was exposed to the live talent and artistry of Leo Fuchs, a gentleman I have learned to respect from afar for his creditable performances on television and most recently in the movie "The Story of Ruth," but oddly enough I had never before witnessed his driving force in the palpating flesh.

It proved to be quite a revelation.

While he worked on the stage with the propulsion of a whirling dervish, I tried to analyze Mr. Fuchs' exhibition and appearance by assuring myself during various intervals that he looked and acted like Eddie Cantor, no Hans Con-

reid, no Danny Kaye, no Victor Borge, no who then?

Apparently, the answer must be that the multi-talented Jewish actor is neither facsimile nor composite but a shining star in his own right, so now we can observe many another entertainer and honestly say:

"He reminds me of Leo Fuchs."

This young man, who arrived here many years ago from Poland and who still retains a touch of delightful old-country accent, has an extraordinary flair for turning on either comedy or pathos with the ease of flickering a light switch.

His singing voice is tremendously enjoyable and without asking him I'm sure that at one time he entertained the possible thought of one day becoming a cantor.

Especially rare and enjoyable are Leo's Yiddishisms. In the scope of his talented delivery, they more than bear out what I've always maintained--that no other language can say things so funny via the sideroutes of such hilariously incongruous phrasings that they become absolutely impossible to translate without losing their original flavor and meaning.

The appearance of Leo Fuchs at the premiere of the new Mont Vista Lodge could very easily presage the realization of a long sought goal in the general vicinity of Hollywood--"The Catskills of California."

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The high-rolling gamblers have disappeared, except for such as Ray Ryan, the oil man. He was invited to dinner in Reno, ordered steak, and while it was being prepared stepped into the casino and lost \$66,000 at dice. His sole comment about the night was: "Good steak. Worth coming here."

They come from everywhere, judging by their license plates. TWA runs a chartered flight from San Francisco to Tahoe at 6:45 p.m. daily, returning at 5 a.m. The fare is \$22, of which \$11 is returned by Harrah's to each commuter who comes with hopes of quick glory, as if to a new Yukon.

Coffee is served 24 hours a day. That's probably because it helps keep gamblers awake, and as long as a gambler's eyes are open he'll gamble. There are 1,700 slot machines. For blackjack games, the dealers are in the same proportion as the players--60 per cent male, 40 per cent female.

There is a school for blackjack dealers, whose classes start at 5 p.m. "We don't want 'em with experience," said the manager. "No bad habits." The pay is from \$18 to \$27 a day for eight hours. They play one hour, then take 20 minutes off. One dealer, Joy Davis, is a vacationing schoolteacher from San Francisco.

A deck of cards is used for only 45 minutes. Then an old woman collects them, and they're shipped off to hospitals and military camps.

I crouched in the "lookout," a low-slung catwalk running the length of the casino, which once was a Quonset hut. It's mirrors, transparent from the back, enable watchmen to study every dealer unobserved, and note basic mistakes. Last month a brazen visitor ducked under a roulette table and, with a tiny saw, removed the cash-box and made good his escape.

There are no armed guards, making the plot of Frank Sinatra's "Ocean 11" plausible. "In the first place," said one club director, "we don't want any shooting around here. An innocent bystander may get hurt. And, besides, where could any stick-up guy run from this peak?"

The Nevada casino operators adhere to the law with high moral rectitude. Bill Harrah showed Dinah Shore his backstage sign, "If you can't do it on TV, you can't do it here." It was the Reno operators who recruited a football team for the University of Nevada. That's why, said one of them, "We'll accept bets on any proposition except the university's football games."

**SCRIPTS:** At her press conference in Ketchum last Saturday, Mrs. Mary Hemingway mentioned some unpublished manuscripts the late Nobel Prize winner had left in vaults. Hemingway once showed me one of these manuscripts, in Havana, and told me why he stored them: "I wait, then read it again and cut out the contemporary stuff. Better I do that than posterity."

## Shortage Of Rabbis Hampering Growth Of Congregations

LONDON, England - An acute shortage of rabbis and limited funds are hampering the growth of new Progressive Jewish synagogues, also known as Liberal or Reform, the executive director of the World Union for Progressive Judaism reported here last week.

Addressing the second day of meetings of the Twelfth International Conference of the World Union for Progressive Judaism, Rabbi Hugo Gryn, World Union executive director, told the representatives from 23 countries, "our greatest problems are men and means. Every single World Union constituent suffers from a shortage of rabbinic leadership."

"We must redouble our efforts to find young men interested in entering the rabbinate. I hope that all of us will begin an International recruiting drive among our constituency," Rabbi Gryn said.

Rabbi Gryn stated that a temporary solution to alleviate this shortage would be to recruit American-trained rabbis to serve overseas congregations. "This would only be a stop-gap answer to our problem, however. The real difficulty in sending over these American rabbis is the lack of financial subsidies available to meet current salary standards."

"Until such subsidy funds are at our disposal even the recruitment of United States rabbis will be a difficult task," he pointed out.

Rabbi Gryn explained that

such monetary restrictions are preventing the advancement of the World Union in such other areas as providing teachers for religious schools, interest-free loans to struggling congregations, translation of English publications, of prayerbooks and religious school texts into Spanish, Hebrew, French and other languages.

"The post-Hitler era finds the World Union foremost in the ranks of those who are reconstructing Jewish life. We possess the idealism, the experience and the mechanism. It is therefore now imperative that we find the funds with which we can translate such idealism into reality," he said.

"The time has come for the world Jewish community to recognize that as important as is the resettlement of Jews and the rebuilding of Israel, just as urgent is the rebirth of our spiritual life which was disrupted and destroyed by the Nazi slaughter. The Eichmann's of this world will always remind us of this need," remarked Rabbi Gryn.

Rabbi Gryn announced the initiation of a fund-raising group called "Friends of the World Union" aimed at raising \$100,000 in a cash drive to meet the immediate and urgent needs of the international synagogue body. One thousand individuals will be sought to contribute amounts of \$100 each. Rabbi Gryn stated that 200 such persons had already been signed up as "friends."

## State Department Has Agreed To Drop Anti-Bias Clause

WASHINGTON — The State Department has agreed with Chairman J. W. Fulbright (D. Ark.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on elimination of a clause from the new Mutual Security bill aimed at Arab discrimination affecting Israel and American Jews, it was learned last week from official sources.

Fulbright, concerned lest the Arab states take offense at the anti-bias expression, raised the matter in recent days with Phillips Talbot, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. Stressing the desire for improved Arab-American relations, Fulbright discussed the clause with Talbot at a closed, "executive session" of the Foreign Relations Committee. Fulbright said he could see no useful purpose in the anti-bias clause being retained in the bill, and obtained Talbot's agreement on this.

Fulbright questioned whether the clause was in the true national interest and indicated it might impede current efforts to improve United States relations with the Arab states. Talbot explained that the clause, in Section 102 of the preamble to the aid bill, was not reflective of State Department thinking, but was submitted to Congress by President Kennedy to indicate Administration policy.

Fulbright asked Talbot if the State Department considered the clause essential or if it could be removed without detriment to U. S. foreign policy objectives. Talbot agreed that it could be taken out without objection from his Department.

In Fulbright's view, the measure served no other purpose than to mollify internal political considerations detrimental to American objectives abroad.

The passage facing elimination was a declaration supporting "freedom of navigation in international waterways, and recognition of the right of all private persons to travel and pursue their lawful activities without discrimination as to race or religion." This was contained in a preamble to the operative parts of the bill and replaced a stronger anti-discrimination measure contained in the last Mutual Security Appropriations Act. It would replace Section 108 of legislation for the fiscal year ending June 30.

Section 108, adopted last year, was never implemented because the Executive Department, under both Administrations, did not see fit to use the authority provided. The section said, "It is the sense of Congress that any attempt by

foreign nations to create distinctions because of their race or religion among American citizens in the granting of personal or commercial access or any other rights otherwise available to U.S. citizens generally, is repugnant to our principles; and in all negotiations between the United States and foreign states arising as a result of funds appropriated under this title, these principles shall be applied as the President may determine."

## Spain's Press Reveals 'Longing' For The Nazi Era

LONDON — Spain is exhibiting "a recurrent nostalgia for nazism," and the controlled Spanish press is denouncing the Adolf Eichmann trial in Jerusalem as "ridiculous and nauseating," according to a Madrid dispatch in the Guardian of Manchester.

The Guardian quoted Roderigo Royo, editor of the Spanish news weekly, SP, as saying editorially: "The Nazi-Fascists were not as bad as the Jews have painted them. If there was some persecution of Jews under Hitler, the persecution of the Nazis by the Jews in the past 16 years has been infinitely more ferocious."

The dispatch quoted Royo further as declaring "there were no gas chambers for the extermination of Jews," and the Spanish editor continued: "I have been in the German gas chambers. They were technical installations of the army testing the soldiers' gas masks. All that's been said on the subject is sheer fabrication. The Jews invented an Eichmann in Argentina. They caught him the way you net a butterfly, then they indoctrinated him the way a clown in a second-rate circus is taught his role."

According to the Guardian, these "publicized and officially condoned pro-Fascist outbursts make no impact on Spaniards in general, who are neither Fascist-inclined nor anti-Semitic." On the other hand, the Manchester newspaper declared, "the Spanish press accounts of the Eichmann trial have been superficial, giving the impression that it is Government policy (since the press is State-controlled) that it does not wish to reveal to Spaniards the full horror of the Hitler era."

Meanwhile, it was revealed in Jerusalem, that Israel Minister of Social Welfare Yosef Burg is leaving soon for Spain, to represent Israel at an international



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### Culture Group Gets \$25,000 For Research

NEW YORK — An award of \$25,000 from the Jacob R. Schiff Fund to the National Foundation for Jewish Culture was announced by Edwin Wolf 2nd of Philadelphia, president of the foundation. These funds will be applied to the program for the academic year 1961-62 which will be centered largely in the field of doctoral fellowships and research in the field of Jewish studies.

At its June meeting, the executive committee of the foundation authorized a program of fellowships and grants amounting to \$43,831 for the next academic year.

Michael A. Stavitsky of East Orange is a member of the board of the foundation and chairman of its administrative committee. The foundation is a beneficiary of the United Jewish Appeal of Essex County.

Dr. Grayson Kirk, president of Columbia University, in writing to Dr. Judah J. Shapiro, secretary of the foundation, on behalf of the Jacob R. Schiff Fund, expressed the hope that "this grant will be useful in carrying on your important activities."

In announcing the award, Wolf stated that the university and the scholar contain a potential for Jewish cultural life in America which has thus far been inadequately developed. "We are only gradually coming to realize that American Jewry must develop its own scholarly resources and personnel because of nazi annihilation on European Jewry from which much of our intellectual leadership was furnished in the past," he said.

It is expected that the foundation's fellowship program will be followed later in the year with the support of publications deemed to have special value to scholars; with emphasis on translations of classic works and bibliographies currently unavailable to the students of Jewish history and literature.

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### Israel Aids Asians At Medical School

NEW YORK — The Hebrew University - Hadassah Medical School in Jerusalem has established courses in English and French for African and Asian students who are being trained as potential teachers to develop medical education in their own countries.

This was reported here recently by Prof. Giulio Racah, a physicist, and newly elected rector of the university. He spoke during an interview at the headquarters of the American Friends of the Hebrew University at 11 East Sixty-ninth Street.

The first of these courses will be opened next fall for the English-speaking African and Asian students.

Professor Racah stressed that the introduction of the courses in French and English "was unprecedented in the thirty-six-year history of Hebrew University." He said it had been set up to accommodate the English-speaking African and Asian students "who are vitally concerned with the progress of their countries."

The course, in English and French, have sixteen students in each class. The university is formulating plans for a larger enrollment.

### GLOOMY VIEW

KINGSTON — Because of the recent Supreme Court decision upholding the constitutionality of Sunday blue laws, "the wall of Church and State is severely, possibly irreparably, cracked," Neal C. Wilson, an official of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church, told the N. J. summer conference.

Wilson saw an accelerated campaign for enforcement of Sunday blue laws in many states and said the Court decision will encourage attempts to forcibly regiment the life and conscience of citizens.

### Eichmann's Son Ends U. S. Visit

WASHINGTON — Nicolas Eichmann, 25-year-old son of Adolf Eichmann, has left the United States via the Miami International Airport on a flight bound for South America. It is presumed he is now back in Argentina.

Nicolas Eichmann's anti-Jewish and pro-nazi statements here, expressed while propagandizing on behalf of his father, generated violent controversy and led to vigorous protests. The protests in turn, brought in a Federal investigation and Nicolas Eichmann departed from the country after only 25 days visit. He had arrived with the stated intention of remaining much longer to write and to seek American backing for his father who is now on trial in Israel.
