

Center To Hold Purim Celebration

The Jewish Community Center of Rhode Island will hold a Purim celebration on Sunday, March 6, at the Center. Called "Purim in Jerusalem," it will commemorate the 10th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem.

A swim-a-thon and jog-a-thon will begin the day at 12 noon to raise money for the Center in Hof Ashkelon, Israel. Additional information may be obtained by calling Elliott Goldstein at the Center, 861-8800.

At 2 p.m. a series of workshops including hamentashen baking, songs of Jerusalem, tales of Jerusalem, greggor and mask making and learning to chant the Megillah will be open to family groups and interested individuals.

Joan Nathan, author of the cookbook, "The Flavor of Jerusalem," will speak about her experiences as special assistant to Mayor Teddy Kollek of Jerusalem at 3:30 p.m.

Carnival like booths, games and races in the gym for all ages, a bake sale and a low cost kosher snack bar will run concurrently with the workshops.

At 4 p.m., the Hebrew Day School Chorus will perform songs of Jerusalem. The community is invited to spend the afternoon at the Center for the Purim celebration.



Desecration At Lincoln Park 'Still Under Investigation'

During the late night, early morning, hours of February 27-28, some 25 monuments at the Lincoln Park Cemetery were toppled over in the area on the Westerly side of Foster Avenue. Six of the 25 headstones, all erected prior to 1953, were broken, as well, either as the result of falling against other stones or from the natural impact against the still partially-frozen

ground. It is assumed that the act was carried out by young vandals who apparently came over the low portion of the fence in the area where the concentration of damage was found.

According to Ben Rabinowitz, executive director of the Chesed Shel Emess Association which maintains the cemetery, the desecration was not carried out by any apparent pattern of selection. The older stones were the ones damaged, he said, because they are more easily knocked over.

A "conservative estimate" of the damage is in the range of \$5000, he said, citing this as the cost to place some type of marker on the defaced graves. "The cost, if we were to actually try and replace these old, individually-styled stones would be somewhere close to \$1000 per stone. In other words, we can't replace them," he further commented.

The damage was discovered around 10:30 a.m. Monday, February 28, and reported to the Warwick Police Department by noon. "If the police and detectives had treated this as though it were a murder," Mr. Rabinowitz said, "checking for footprints and that sort of thing, they would probably find who did it." He indicated that he believed the search would be dead-ended.

Police Investigation

Lt. Edwin Gardiner of the Warwick Police showed reporters the initial report filed with the department by patrolmen. Prior to press time on Wednesday, the Detective Division disclosed that the matter was "still under investigation" and that they had contacted residents on New York and Michigan Avenues, adjacent to the cemetery, to inquire if they had seen any suspicious activity in the area of late. The Division said they had put out word for people to watch the area.

Mr. Rabinowitz said he did not expect the damage would be covered by insurance, but that they would draw up a letter seeking contributions to restore or replace the monuments. Asked if families were ever contacted directly to help absorb this cost, he said that on the list of 17 monuments they had identified, they had been able to locate only seven with known survivors. Peres Would Be Member Of Rabin's Government

JERUSALEM: Defense Minister Shimon Peres, political rival of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, will be included in the Rabin Cabinet if, as expected, he is returned to office in the mid-May general elections, Mr. Rabin announced.

Mr. Rabin's remarks, pragmatic rather than philanthropic, came shortly after he beat Mr. Peres for the ruling Labor Party's nomination for the No. 1 post. The Prime Minister requires the party strength which can be marshalled by Mr. Peres in the coming weeks of campaigning.

Mr. Rabin, who personally dislikes Mr. Peres, beat him by a narrow margin of 41 votes out of

approximately 3000 which were cast by Labor delegates. The heated contest marked the first time in the Labor Party's history that an incumbent Prime Minister seeking reelection was challenged from within the party's ranks.

Party Unity

Asked whether Mr. Peres would be included in a new Rabin government, the Prime Minister replied: "He'll be a member of the Cabinet. There's no doubt that he'll play a major role in the new Cabinet because his effort is needed in the campaign for the coming elections."

Mr. Cohen was cochairman of the Bike-Hike for Mentally Retarded in the Squirrel Hill area of Pittsburgh and a member of the task force investigating the treat-

Nuclear Power Impact On Medicine Is Brown Topic

The biological and medical implications of nuclear power will be explored by several speakers at Brown University on Wednesday, March 9, between 9 a.m. and 12 noon in Sayles Hall on the College Green.

The program, developed by the Brown University Program in Medicine with funds provided by the New England Power Company, will open with welcoming remarks from Dr. Alvin S. Glicksman, professor and chairman of the section of radiation medicine at

Brown, and director of the Department of Radiation Oncology at Rhode Island Hospital.

At 9:15 a.m., Dr. Victor P. Bond will discuss the "Biological Implications of Radiation." Dr. Bond is associate director for life sciences at Brookhaven National Laboratories.

Dr. Robert W. Miller, chief of the clinical epidemiology branch of the National Cancer Institute, will give a 10 a.m. talk on "Epidemiological Studies of

Irradiated Populations."

"Environmental Implications of Nuclear Power Production" is the 11 a.m. topic chosen by Bernard T. Feld, a physics professor at MIT.

Area physicians who attend the conference will be eligible for three Category 1 credits towards the AMA Physician Recognition Award. The general public is also invited to attend the free symposium.

Besides Dr. Glicksman, the program committee includes Russell A. Peck, Jr., PhD, professor of physics at Brown, and Dr. Albert F. Wessen, professor and chairman of the section of community health at Brown.

"In China, it is not unusual to spend the evening dining," says Louis Yip, proprietor of the China Inn Restaurant at 270 Dexter Street on the Pawtucket-Central Falls line, and he is striving to advance the custom here. Though he may not convert American patrons to the pace of the Orient, the restaurant's menu, with well over 100 selections, should slow them down a bit.

Mr. Yip, who worked in a restaurant in Cambridge, Massachusetts, before opening his business venture here earlier this year, is introducing Rhode Islanders to the more exotic tastes of Mandarin and Szechuan cuisine with their sharper tastes, subtler flavors. Among his favorites are chicken with spicy sauce, pork in chili sauce, hot and sour soup — and a variety of 10 duck entrees, from pressed to Peking.

Mr. Yin comes from a long line of restaurateurs, with members of his sizeable family operating a 300-seat restaurant in Hong Kong. At the close of the two-week celebration of the Chinese New Year in this, the Year of the Serpent (4675), it is both appropriate and timely to go out and treat yourself to some of this culinary delight. Still No Breira

I dare say that a goodly number of readers have never heard of an organization by the name of BREIRA. But that same organization is capable of doing great damage to the American Jewish community and to its relations with Israel, at this time, especially, when the new Carter administration is bending all its efforts to seek a peaceful solution in the Middle East, a solution in which Israel is so vitally interested, we must not allow any outside interference with that quest for peace.

What is BREIRA and who are the people involved in its affairs?

BREIRA means in Hebrew, Choice, Alternative, Option. When a Jew is asked why he agrees to a certain action, he answers, "A Breira hob ich?" Do I have another choice?

The expression came into particular prominence during the Arab-Israel wars. When Jewish soldiers were asked what secret weapons do you have to dare withstand the pressures of an enemy greater than you are, their answer was:

"Our secret weapon is AIN BREIRA, we have no other choice. Either we win or we are pushed into the sea. We prefer to fight and win."

Now come American Jewish intellectuals and say to Israel: You have a BREIRA. Talk to the Palestine Liberation Organization, the organization headed by Yasir Arafat, known as the PLO, and you will have peace.

These intellectuals are mostly professors in American universities and writers who write pamphlets, publish books, and are cruising around the country speaking on the Middle East together with PLO members. And everywhere they come and everything they write, the song is the same: Start a dialogue with the PLO, clear the government of the war loving Zionists, and you will live in peace forever.

All this is very appealing to the ears of a Jew who desires nothing more than peace in Israel. But do the Palestinians want peace? Do they want a dialogue with Israel? Do they show any inclination of letting Israel live?

Human Rights:

Direction From The Top

In the early rounds of the Human Rights championship match, being put on as a benefit for humanity, Jimmy Carter of the United States has made an impressive showing. He came out deliberately, stoutly, and quickly landed some telling blows against would-be challengers in Argentina and Uruguay — not to mention putting some consternation into some of the big boys in Paraguay and Indonesia. Now the biggest bruiser of them all, the Soviet Union, is beginning to flex his muscles, querying, "but what is changing in a country where noisy declarations are made about citizens rights and freedoms while, in fact, everything remains quite otherwise?"

What is changing, Bruno, is that, for the first time in this century, the call for universal human rights is coming from the top, from the American President. Not waiting for distinguished committees of academicians or Nobel Prize winners or special grass roots groups to call on him; or being content to address briefly or ignore angry protesters marching around the White House — Jimmy Carter has become an activist, a defender of those certain inalienable rights which the American populous celebrated so vociferously and profitably during our Bicentennial.

The idea of the executive branch championing human rights is exhilarating. To have the President speak in defense of freedom of the press, against inhumane prison conditions, forced confessions, torture — while supporting the rights of dissidents to speak against their governments — is exciting, even a little scary. But to speak out in defense of human liberty is one of the implicit responsibilities of the American President.

And the defender's purse strings are where his mouth is. President Carter is withholding American dollars from countries that he feels are violating human rights. The champ has clout.

During the last decade we learned the near futility of legislating human rights or civil rights or equal rights. We are weary of paper resolutions, paper declarations, paper victories. Personal example — especially at the Executive level — is all we have left to rely upon. Actually, personal example — each person standing up for and protecting the rights of others — is what human rights is all about anyway. Keep leading with those rights, Mr. Carter. This country deserves the championship.

Dr. Albert Vorspan of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, in a recent article about BREIRA, asks: Where is the Arab BREIRA? Why do not the Palestinians discuss an alternative to war with Israel? Where are the liberals and intellectuals of the PLO to decry all the killings and the hijackings devised and executed by the terrorists of the Palestine Liberation Organization? Why don't we hear any protest to bombings?

BREIRA was first heard from about four years ago. Prior to that time these same people were marching in the South together with the Blacks, opposing the Vietnam War, and fighting the Jewish "Establishment" in the communities. They were known as the New Left, the Jewish Campaign for the People's Peace Treaty (in Vietnam), the Jews for Urban Justice, and have been associated with the magazines Response and Interchange. "Their guiding light and most vocal spokesman is Arthur Wascow, the author of a modern Passover Hagaddah, in which he justifies the rioting of the Blacks in such words:

"It is time for the Blacks to riot, to sweep through the Harlem night like a wave of locusts, breaking, screaming, bleeding, laughing, crying, rejoicing, celebrating, in a jubilee of destruction . . ."

But the Blacks kicked them out, the war in Vietnam was ended without their help, and the only "cause" left for these New Left advocates is the Palestinian struggle against Israel. Associated with Mr. Wascow are such names as Professor Noam Chomsky, Abbie Hoffman and Dr. Benjamin Spock of pediatric fame. Together with these are a host of Rabbis, Hillel foundation leaders, and a few Israelis who came to America and are used as living witnesses to the Israeli oppression of the Arabs in their own homeland.

Robert A. Riesman, president of the Jewish Federation of Rhode Island, writes in a recent article on the attitude of BREIRA to the Arab riots on the West Bank of Israel:

"The liberals of BREIRA would let the Arabs riot in the West Bank towns without Israel's intervention. Such a policy might well have destroyed the lives and property of an overwhelming majority of Arab residents who abstained and opposed the rioting . . ."

This policy is understood by everyone but BREIRA, to whom the intervention is labeled as Police Brutality.

These are the people who would have the government of Israel embrace the murderers of school children, the butchers of Munich and the hijackers of Entebbe. The PLO condoned all these acts as Revolution, as the struggle of the Palestinians for their Liberation.

Just as the people of BREIRA were told to keep out of the Black movement, and just as the peace with Vietnam deprived them of being martyrs for a great cause, so Israel will come to terms with the Arabs without the "help" from the great friends of the PLO called BREIRA. The Breira they hold

Your Money's Worth

Hazardous Driving

You're moving along in your car at a good speed down Chicago's Outer Drive when the throttle sticks in an open position. Suddenly, you are overtaking cars ahead far too rapidly.

What do you do?

You're caught in the heart of a big traffic jam en route to the San Francisco airport when your car's engine overheats.

What now?

You're driving in the middle lane of fabulous Highway 684 in Westchester County, New York, when your driveshaft drops!

What next?

At some time during our driving lives, most of us will come up against at least one emergency situation involving a malfunction of our car or truck. If not handled promptly and with a clear head, the result could be serious injury or worse.

To minimize the chance of accidents caused by your auto's malfunction, the best way, of course, is to keep your car in safe running condition.

Periodic checkups are imperative to save you time, money, the life of your car and you. Include routine safety checks on such items as fan belts and hoses, the exhaust system, brakes, steering assembly, related components, wheel alignment.

Always carry a fire extinguisher, auto jack, spare tire, warning devices or flares, a flashlight — all in good condition. Know where the fuse panel is and maintain a supply of fuses, too.

Make certain safety checks automatically before driving: tires which are low in air; looseness in steering or pulling to right or left; an oil pressure light that is slow to go out, indicating a potentially serious engine problem.

But the most serious emergencies are those that require stopping on the highway. To illustrate:

(1) A dropped driveshaft, one of the most dangerous problems of all. The problem doesn't occur often, but when it does (as it did to me on Highway 684), it happens suddenly. On cars with front-mounted

Breira Criticizes Position Of Vance

WASHINGTON (JTA): The first national conference of Breira heard criticism of Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance's position on the Palestine Liberation Organization and was told by an American Jewish journalist that the Jewish press in this country avoids criticism and controversy on matters relating to Israel.

The four-day Breira conference opened at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, Md. A Breira spokesman said 260 persons were in attendance. It was addressed by Edward Sheehan, a Harvard Research Fellow who has written extensively on the Middle East, and by Robert Cohn, editor of the St. Louis Jewish Light and president of the American-Jewish Press Association.

Sheehan criticized Vance for calling for a modification of the PLO covenant before the U.S. will recognize that organization as a partner in Middle East peace talks. The PLO covenant calls for the replacement of Israel by a secular democratic state in all of Palestine.

Sheehan claimed that Vance's view "looks like a dictat." He said there was a "rough consensus" among the Arab governments in favor of an agreement with the PLO for a "limited state solution" of the Palestinian problem. He warned

that a Palestinian state would be vulnerable "if it were hobbled by restrictions" and "it could be radicalized." He thought the PLO acceptance "by implication" of Security Council Resolution 242 should be sufficient for its participation in Middle East peace talks.

Sheehan described Israeli settlements on the West Bank as an "outrage" and warned that "tensions are building up for Israelis" that "will be impossible to bear." He also reiterated that Arabs should have sovereignty over Jerusalem.

Press Should Deal

Cohn said that "It is not up to the American-Jewish community from afar to dictate terms to those who have to face Arab bullets" and Arab propaganda "but there is no reason why the pages of our newspapers as well as our magazines cannot deal with the various options which might be available to Israel as it seeks the long wanted peace with its Arab neighbors."

He stated that "It is hard to imagine, but some of the very same Jewish leaders who express outrage at the controlled press in Moscow or Peking and who defend the rights of publishers in the general press in America, are content with a Jewish press which is even less free to comment on controversy than the Peking Peoples Daily." Cohn said that on the subject of Israel, the American-Jewish press "generally adhered to the policy of after-the-fact endorsement of the decision of the ruling coalition (in Israel) to an even greater extent than the Jerusalem Post."

Cohn said that he believed that the aim of Breira was "to provide a forum for the intelligent discussion of alternatives" for Israel and deplored "the over-reaction of the Jewish establishment to the existence and activities of Breira." Breira has advocated Israeli-Palestinian reconciliation and has frequently criticized policies of the Israeli government and the Zionist establishment.

Cohn said his interpretation of what Breira set out to accomplish was "to provide a forum for the intelligent discussion of alter-



Soviet Refusniks Demand An Answer

NEW YORK (JTA): More than 60 Soviet Jewish refusniks from cities throughout the Soviet Union converged on the Presidium in Moscow and peacefully demanded to know, in writing, why they were being refused permission to emigrate and when the ban on their emigration would be lifted, it was reported by the National Conference on Soviet Jewry and the Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry. In addition, 150 demonstrators in 12 other cities held similar protests. Soviet authorities generally rejected the protestors' demands, the two groups reported.

The recent demonstrations, highly courageous acts in the Soviet Union, are reminiscent of protests held last October which were highlighted by KGB-inspired beatings of several activists, mass arrests and interrogations, and the leveling of criminal charges against two individuals which might have brought them five years in prison.

Charges against the two — Dr. Iosif Anss and Boris Chernobitsky — were dropped following massive protests from the West. As in the fall protests, these demonstrations included many of the most prominent long-term refusniks.

In New York, reaction was immediate, the National Conference and greater New York Conference reported. Thousands of telegrams supporting the demonstrators were dispatched to Soviet officials.

Community groups affiliated with the Greater New York Conference asked every member of the New York Congressional delegation to communicate with Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin, the State Department, other American officials, and the other government, the deeply felt concern held by members of Congress for the scores of demonstrators and the thousands of Soviet Jews they represent.

TV Host Fired

MADISON WIS.: The State Supreme Court has sustained the dismissal by a lower court of a damage suit by a Milwaukee disc jockey against the regional office of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith which the radio performer blamed for loss of his job, according to a report in the latest issue of The Wisconsin Jewish Chronicle.

Allan E. Augustine was fired by Ralph Barnes, general manager of station WOKY, in 1974, following a talk show which featured members of the National Socialist White People's Party, a local Nazi group. Augustine sued the ADL for \$150,000. Barnes also was named in the lawsuit, the Chronicle reported.

The court record indicated that during the radio show, the Nazi used "various epithets" about Jews and blacks and that Augustine failed to push the button which would have deleted such material. Augustine also failed to use a standard disclaimer tape to the effect that the views expressed were those of the guests and not of the station.

In upholding the ruling of the Milwaukee County Circuit Court, which rejected Augustine's claims of damage, the Supreme Court held that "the right of free speech as guaranteed by the Constitution is a privilege which has been asserted (as such) and correctly so by the ADL."


Saul Sorrin, Wisconsin regional ADL director, said the Supreme Court decision had "affirmed the right of organizations and individuals to protest material put on the air which they believe to be contrary to the interests of the community."

Discover Ancient Hebrew Written Left To Right

TEL AVIV: An ancient Hebrew script, believed to be the oldest ever discovered, was written from left to right, according to archaeologists from Tel Aviv and Bar Ilan universities. The script was engraved in two fragments of a clay tablet, which were found last August at Izbet Sarta, east of Kafr Kassem. It is believed that the script is a hundred years older than the famous Gezer Calendar of the late 10th century BCE.

The script of 80 letters, arranged in five lines, includes an entire line of the Hebrew alphabet similar to the modern one. The archaeologists who deciphered the bottom line believe that the script was part of an exercise written by someone learning to be a scribe.

The student, the archaeologists believe, probably wrote the alphabet at the bottom of the tablet so that he could copy the letters. Strengthening this belief is the fact that the word "et" appears in three lines in exactly the same position. Unlike the modern alphabet, the ancient order had the letter zayin coming after het and ayin after pei. The letter mem is missing, but there appears to be a space for it.

Deciphering

The deciphering was done by Aharon Demsky, Moshe Kohavi and Yosef Naveh. Demsky said that

letters were in an order found in some biblical alphabet poems, such as those in Lamentations, Chapter 2. The new discovery led scholars to believe that the ancient Israelites probably copied their alphabet from the Canaanites and not from the Phoenicians, as previously believed.

The tablets were discovered at the site of an ancient farming settlement of the 12th century BCE and showed that literacy had reached rural districts early in the days of the later Judges. The ancient settlement has been identified with Even Haezer, mentioned in Chapter 4 of Samuel I. Ancient Israelites had gathered here to face a Philistine attack launched from Ofek. The Israelites were defeated, Samuel's two sons killed and the Holy Ark of Shilo captured by the enemy. The discovery of the Jewish settlement was proof of the attempts of the sons of Ephraim to settle on the west side of Har Shomron, opposite the land held by the Philistines, said Moshe Garsiel, director of Land of Israel studies at Bar Ilan University.

Archaeologists had difficulty deciphering the tablet because the letters were lightly engraved. David Owen, an American Assyriologist, used ammonia solution to make the letters clear.



BRIDGE



By Robert E. Starr

As we all know, today's economy is terrible. Businesses are losing money or going bankrupt. I can think of one type that would have a field day if somehow it could feasibly get itself into our Bridge world. I am referring to Insurance, for if a Declarer could pay a premium to some company to guarantee the success of his contract, I am positive so many of them would do so the company could even spur the economy more because of their having to hire so many employees to handle their business. Strangely, that would be the case were that insurance available. Yet because almost the same can be had free of charge by merely playing a hand a certain way, that insurance is ignored much of the time. Today's hand is a fine example.

North

The bidding was simple, both South and North having automatic hands to bid. And with their combined holding of 27 points with at least three honors in every suit it would seem they should have an easy time making their contract. Yet ten of the twelve Declarers went down because they had failed to guarantee their contract. They were victims of looking at their cards, seeing only that almost solid long suit and going right after it without looking ahead at the pitfalls. Wasn't that the thing to do? Go after the longest suit?

What happened was that West

led a low Spade right into Declarer. Fine, they said, that helps, but did it. After their ten won they all led a Club to knock out the Ace and make the other three good. This did happen but unfortunately for them East had the Ace, not West and back came a Spade only this time through the tenace. What happened at trick one warned Declarer where the honors were but he finessed anyhow and West continued Spades establishing the suit after winning the King.

Even now those Declarers didn't think of failure for they still had another finesse to take, in Diamonds. That would give them enough tricks if it worked. But again they were unlucky and the finesse had to be taken right into West. So West now cashed his other Spades to actually set the hand two tricks never mind only one.

With all those high cards how could this happen? Think what occurs if instead of trying Clubs at trick one you foresee your danger, count your tricks and go to Dummy's Heart Ace to take the Diamond finesse right then. Remember you need those two tricks there at some time before you can count to nine only this time you finesse to West. Now if it loses do you mind? No, for what can he lead that can hurt? Anything he does lead either gives you time or if he leads a Major, gives a free finesse. If he leads a Club East will win and return that same Spade only this time you grab that Ace. You have enough tricks even though you could have tried that finesse at this time for West's thorn has been pulled and he can never get in again after he established his suit. That lead of anything but Clubs at trick two was the Insurance at no cost. True, both key cards were in the wrong hand but if those two suits were played in the correct order that wouldn't have made the hand go down.

Moral: If you can control which opponent you want to be on lead, the insurance, by all means do everything you can to achieve this.



 for the Prime Minister was the high point of the party's convention, which ends tomorrow after delegates thrash out a platform.

With the Rabin-Peres contest out of the way, members of other parties began commenting on the results — signaling the start of intense campaigning that will culminate in the elections on May 17.

Within the Labor Party, which has ruled Israeli political life since the nation was founded in 1948 and which has been beset of late with divisiveness and scandal, there were calls for unity so that the party can retain its primacy in the elections.

The Peres-Rabin competition was clear evidence of the split in affiliations in Labor, but, at least for today, both sides were claiming that cohesion would reign in the weeks ahead.

The major opposition party in Israel, the Likud bloc, said that the choice of Mr. Rabin as candidate for Prime Minister would increase Likud's chances of strengthening its representation in the Parliament.

Ezer Weizman, Likud's campaign manager, said that Mr. Peres would have been a more formidable candidate because "he's sharper, he's more concise and I think he's more of a leader than Mr. Rabin."

In the weeks ahead, the Labor Party must mount a convincing campaign to overcome the skepticism that has grown among some Israeli voters that it deserves to be the major party.

Shortly after his victory, Mr. Rabin said, "The prospects are good."



Soviet Show Cites Plot

NEW YORK (JTA): An hour-long nationwide TV broadcast from Moscow called "Traders of Souls" depicted Soviet Jewish activists and refuseniks as "soldiers of Zionism inside the Soviet Union," and accused them of being part of a "Western-based anti-Soviet conspiracy."

The National Conference on Soviet Jewry (NCSJ) has learned that the "documentary," which dealt heavily with the emigration of Soviet Jews to Israel, took the unprecedented step of naming several activists and claiming that they were involved in "subversive" activities.

The recent broadcast depicted Western writers, actors and Nobel Prize laureates who have in the past appealed to the Soviet authorities on behalf of Soviet Jews as dupes of Zionist propaganda. At the same time, American and British organizations helping Soviet Jewry were stigmatized as agents of Jewish finance.

Long-term refusenik Vladimir Slepak said that this broadcast has incited anti-Semitism among average Russians. "Zionism," Slepak pointed out, "is being used as 'cosmopolitanism' was used during the Stalin purge period in the early 1950s."

Activist Anatoly Sharansky said, "There is always anti-Semitism among people in this country and as a Jew you learn to sense it, but now it is at a higher level than normal. Everyone in buses and subways is discussing these films and similar articles. It smells of a pogrom."

The film is only one arm of the media recently utilized by Soviet authorities. The latest issue of the illustrated magazine *Ogonyok*, asserts that Adolf Eichmann, the Nazi SS officer in charge of rounding up Jews during World War II, was kidnapped by Israelis in Argentina in 1960 to prevent him from divulging pre-World War II plans with the Zionists to set up a pro-Nazi Zionist state.

Four Soviet Jewish activists, Isosif Begun, Yuli Kosharovskiy, Slepak and Sharansky, have filed a suit charging insult against the television network.

A former Soviet Jewish broadcaster told newsmen in Rome of a second film called "Secrets and Other Things," which suggests that the Jews tried to kill Lenin, supported Hitler's rise to power and juxtaposed scenes of deprivation with pictures of prominent Jews.

It seems that in preparation for the Belgrade conference in June, 1977, on the fulfillment of the Helsinki accords, the USSR has prepared "an attack as its best defense," said Soviet Jewish scientist and refusenik Benjamin Levich who has been waiting for an exit visa since 1973.

Israelis Beat Russian Team

TEL AVIV (JTA): Israel went wild after the Tel Aviv Maccabi basketball team's surprise 91-79 victory over the Soviet Union's champion Moscow team. The game was broadcast live from Belgium during which time the streets of Israel's major cities were almost empty. But as soon as the game ended, shortly before midnight, the streets erupted with people cheering and dancing and the sound of automobile horns. The victory assures Israel of a spot in the European Cup finals.

Premier Yitzhak Rabin led a list of ministers, Knesset members and others who cabled congratulations to the team. MKs Yosef Sarid of Labor and Ehud Ulmer of Likud said the Israeli sports award should go to American-born Tal Brodie, who is the captain of the Israeli team. They noted that Brodie is an example of a new immigrant who remained in Israel after the eighth Maccabiah, married and has built a home here. The Soviet radio broadcast the results of the game but its listeners were told that the Russian team had lost to the Italians.

TEL AVIV: A demand that Nazi war criminals still at large, including high officials in Germany and Austria, be brought to trial was made by the 400 delegates to the second conference of the World Federation of Jewish Fighters, Partisans and Camp Inmates.

Jews Send Matzoh To Egyptian Community

NEW YORK (JTA): A large shipment of matzohs left a Brooklyn pier aboard the American steamship Lash Pacifico, bound for Alexandria to enable Egypt's remaining 400 Jews to celebrate the festival of Passover, which this year begins at sundown April 2, it was announced here by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC). The 2500 pounds of matzohs will arrive for distribution to the Jewish community now residing in Alexandria and Cairo.

The arrangements were made by Rabbi Alexander M. Schindler, president of the UAHC, after receipt of an expression of concern from the Egyptian Jewish community that their traditional matzoh oven had broken down beyond repair. Schindler, who had visited the Jewish community of Egypt in 1974 as head of an informal delegation representing the UAHC, has remained in close touch with Egyptian Jewish leaders.

After the matzohs were donated by the B. Manischewitz Company of New Jersey, Schindler met in Washington with Egyptian Ambassador Ashraf Ghorbal to seek his government's assistance in the forwarding of the matzohs. Ghorbal offered his immediate cooperation and Yehia Hafez, First Secretary of the Egyptian Economic Office, recommended a freight forwarder and assisted with details regarding the required export papers. Schindler, in a letter to Ghorbal, thanked him and Hafez for their "most considerate help" in expediting the shipment of the matzohs to Egypt's Jews.

Schindler, who also serves as the chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, viewed the act as "a humanitarian response to the needs of Egyptian citizens of the Jewish faith and an offer of aid to permit these families to fully observe a sacred holy festival."

Sees Israel Population Rising To Four Million

TEL AVIV: Prof. Ernest Kraus writes in Haaretz that in 20 years, the Jewish population in Israel will increase to four million from the present three million (if immigration will reach at least 25,000 per annum).

This increase, however, will not solve the demographic problems of the state. The author points out that the 1,600,000 immigrants who arrived in Israel between 1947 and 1948 and the natural increase, has brought the Jewish population up to the present 3,000,000. During the same time span, however, the Arab population has also increased considerably. Only as a result of natural growth, the Arab population in Israel has gone from 250,000 in 1948 to 500,000 at the present time and that figure will double by 1993. That means that in less than 20 years, Israel's population will consist of 3,000,000 Arabs (including the administered areas) and 4,000,000 Jews.

Condition Of Syrian Jews

JERUSALEM (JTA): Contrary to previous reports, the conditions of Syria's Jews continues to be serious, according to the Public Council for Jews in Arab Countries.

The Council issued a statement which said that Syrian Jews are not yet permitted to leave the country unless they leave their families behind as a guarantee for their return, or large deposits. The Council also announced it was to convene to commemorate four Syrian Jewish women who were murdered four years ago when they tried to cross the border to Lebanon.

POUND DOWN

JERUSALEM: The Israeli Pound was devalued for the second time in less than a month and now stands at IL 8.98 to \$1. This U.S. dollar was worth about six Pounds when the policy of "creeping devaluation" began in June, 1976.

**Israel Bonds
Launches Drive**

MIAMI BEACH (JTA): Five hundred Jewish leaders from the United States and Canada launched the 1977 Israel Bond drive Saturday night at the Fontainebleau Hotel here with the enrollment of nearly 100 Prime Minister's Club members after hearing former Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan warn of the danger facing his country and urge continued support from the American Jewish community.

Sam Rothberg, general chairman of the Israel Bond Organization, announced individual purchases ranging from \$10,000 to \$500,000 at the dinner dedicated to members of the Israel Prime Minister's Club and the Ambassador's Society of Trustees. Michael Arnon, president of the Israel Bond Organization, said the enrollment was substantially in excess of what it was last year.

Dayan warned that Israel will have to withstand very heavy pressures to give up territory in any forthcoming negotiations. He said "I think the Arab countries want peace. They have to have peace, but they want to have peace on their own terms. It's a great Jewish victory that after four wars now the Arabs have learned they must make peace with us." He said Israel's leaders must "decide now whether we are going to stay on the Golan Heights, the West Bank, Sharm el-Sheikh."

Referring to the coming elections in Israel, Dayan said the decision must now be made by the young generation of Israelis if they want to give back any territory. He called for the youth of Israel to take the reigns of leadership. He said he was looking forward to the upcoming elections because it would give the Israeli youth the opportunity to take responsibility.

Urging the continued support of the American Jewish community, Dayan said "the leaders of the Jewish community around the world, like you now here in Miami, can help us to be strong as a rock. We must not compromise on the Jewish dream. We didn't go to Israel to establish a state for King Hussein or for Yasir Arafat."

Israel Blasted For Anti-Oriental Bias

JERUSALEM: Nessim Gaon, president of the World Sephardi Federation, has accused the Israel government and the Zionist establishment of perpetuating the social gap between Ashkenazim and Israelis of Oriental background and depriving the Sephardi community of its rightful representation on leadership bodies.

He demanded the creation of a new Cabinet ministry to deal directly with the social gap.

Gaon's statement at the convention of the World Sephardi Federation's presidium here drew some strong criticism, especially his implied warning that Sephardic Jews may be tempted to leave Israel and even return to the Arab countries of their origin.

He said that Sephardim have not yet been tempted "by recent invitations from Arab governments to return to their countries of origin," adding, "Imagine what would become of Israel if and when they should emigrate en masse."

Gaon cited statistics on poor housing and inadequate education for thousands of Oriental Jews. He charged that the authorities have forgotten that the creation of families by young Israelis, who marry comprises an "internal immigration" that is greater than immigration from the outside. Yet new apartments remain "empty for months waiting for olim," he said.

Gaon accused the World Zionist Organization of "keeping the representation (of Sephardim) on decision-making bodies at a minimum." He noted that of the 42 members of the Jewish Agency's

board of governors, only one is a Sephardi.

Despite their criticism, the convention delegates endorsed Gaon's demands for adequate representation in the Knesset and government, improved living standards for disadvantaged families and better housing for large families. The convention called on the government to give the social gap issue the same priority as defense.

Addressing the opening session of the three-day convention, Prime Minister Shlomo Hillel stressed the urgency of improving the education of disadvantaged children and integrating Sephardim into the country's social and political life.

The convention is being attended by 39 Sephardi leaders from 39 countries abroad and by 35 Israeli representatives.

Radio Liberty Probe Is Urged

WASHINGTON (JTA): The disclosure that an alleged Nazi war criminal sold scripts to Radio Liberty triggered a demand here that Congress investigate the federally-funded radio station that broadcasts to the Soviet Union. The revelation was made after a deportation notice was served on Vilis Hazners, 71, a prominent Latvian emigre living in upstate New York who is accused of complicity in the killings of several hundred Jews in and around Riga, Latvia during World War II. Rep. Edward Koch (D.N.Y.), who called for the probe, said that while he supported the objectives of Radio Liberty and its affiliate, Radio Free Europe, "we don't have to fund them if they are hiring Nazis regardless of whether or not, in this case, he is guilty of war crimes."

Hazners served as a major in the Nazi-sponsored Latvian SS Legion. He entered the U.S. from Germany in 1956 in violation of the anti-war criminal proviso of the 1953 Refugee Relief Act, the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) has charged. The INS opened deportation proceedings against him in Albany last week. A hearing is scheduled to begin June 20. John S. Hayes, chairman of Radio Liberty-Radio Free Europe (RL-RFE), admitted it had not fully checked Hazner's background when it bought his scripts because "he does not broadcast, he is not a staff member, he is a free lancer."

RFE-RL was established last year as a government-sponsored non-profit corporation to run the two anti-Communist radio stations which were started by the CIA in the 1950s. RFE broadcasts to the entire East European bloc and Radio Liberty only to the Soviet Union of which Latvia is now a part.

Hebrew Paper's Life Is Short

NFW YORK (JTA): Israel Express, the Hebrew-language daily newspaper that started publishing here Dec. 10, 1976, suspended publication this week. But Yaakov Nachman, the paper's general director, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the suspension is temporary "due to technical and editorial changes." He added, however, that the paper had to close due to financial difficulties and that he hoped to resume publication in two weeks after new investors are found.

The JTA learned that the paper has been facing financial hardship almost from the start when hopes for a large circulation and revenues from advertisements failed to

materialize. Editorial staff members and printers told the JTA that they have not received their salaries in the last three weeks and a number of workers who came here from Israel have been left with no means of livelihood and with no money to return to Israel. They are reportedly now seeking help from Israeli and Jewish institutions here.

Nachman confirmed to the JTA that salaries have been withheld and that a number of workers are returning to Israel. The paper published five days a week, Monday to Friday and sold for 30 cents a copy.

The most serious hazard to the driver is failure of the front joint.

Most important, slow down before pulling over from the road to prevent the drive train from digging into the road's surface.

Have your service facility examine and lubricate your car universal joints regularly and check for possible looseness in the joint assemblies or in the bearings. A warning sign: universal joints become noisy before failure. Watch for severe vibration throughout the vehicle at all speeds.

(2) Throttle sticking. If this occurs on the open highway and there is distance between you and other traffic, tap lightly on the accelerator pedal a few times to see if it springs back to a normal position. If this fails, try to pull the pedal up with the toe of your shoe. Don't reach down with a hand.

If you must slow down or stop quickly, turn your ignition to "off" (not lock) and apply the brakes. Don't pump the brakes. Guide the car off the road.

(3) Overheated engine. If you notice steam or liquid coming out from the front of the car, pull off the road, turn off the engine, and let it cool. If you can't pull off and the engine has not reached the critical overheat point (note needle movement of the gauge), certainly turn off the air conditioner. In stop-and-go driving, shift into neutral while stopped. During long waits in traffic, increase the idling speed lightly. If none of these works, also turn on your heater to help reduce the engine's temperature. Never remove the radiator cap and risk burns before letting the engine cool.

(4) Driving through water in heavy rain or snow. Drive slowly to avoid stalling or loss of steering control. After moving through water or heavy slush, apply your brakes lightly while driving to dry out the linings and other components.

natives." He said he does "not question either the sincerity or Jewish loyalty" of Breira members and that the "over-reaction of the Jewish establishment to the existence and activities of Breira is akin to using an elephant gun against a flea." This, he added, "has resulted in a needless waste of energy on the part of those attacking Breira and on the part of Breira itself which has to devote too much of its own creative energies these days to defending itself."

The Breira conference was picketed by a group of militant Jewish youths, some of whom entered the lobby of the 4-H Center shouting "There is no Palestine" and "Am Yisroel Chari." Tables were overturned and Breira leaflets were strewn on the floor along with leaflets brought by the demonstrators that included some attributed to the Jewish Defense League. The demonstrators left the building when Montgomery County police arrived but continued outside to picket and shout slogans for about two hours. There were no arrests and no injuries were reported.

Seminary Acquires Music Collection

NEW YORK: A musical collection including the private repertoires of 19th-century cantors to secular Zionist singers and rare professional journals has been acquired by the library of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America.

More than 2,000 manuscripts, books and music sheets are in the collection assembled during the last half century by Max Wohlberg, a cantor and associate professor in the Cantors Institute Seminary College of Jewish Music.

Paul Grossinger, of the Grossinger Hotel family, purchased the collection for the library. He has asked that it be housed in a separate enclave dedicated to his mother, the late Jenny Grossinger, when a new library building is erected next to the seminary.

The actual presentation was made by the Cantors Assembly, a professional organization which Cantor Wohlberg helped found in 1947. He also was a founder of the Cantors Institute, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.
