ELECTS NEW CHAIRMAN: The Educators' Council which includes the principals of 11 religious and community schools in the state elected Rabbi Alvan Kaunfer, assistant rabbi and principal of the religious school at Temple Emanu-El, as its new chairman for the coming academic year.

Having served on the Council for four years as chairman of the curriculum committee, Rabbi Kaunfer is assuming office at a time when the Bureau and the Council are embarking upon a number of new projects designed to upgrade the standards of Jewish education in the state.

Rabbi Kaunfer served on the Bureau's standards committee and the Bureau's Israel pilgrimage committee, and was recently nominated to serve a two-year term as a member of the Bureau's board. He succeeds Lenore Levin, principal of the South County Hebrew School, who completes three years as chairman of the Council.

Italy, Israel Sign Air Agreement

ROME (JTA) — Until today, Italy was Israel's only friend in Western Europe with which it did not have an air agreement. That situation was rectified when Israel's Ambassador to Rome, Moshe Alon, and Italy's Director General for Economic Affairs, Mario Mondelli, signed an agreement which permits El Al and Alitalia to carry passengers to and from Italy and Israel, plus "two points beyond."

Israel's "two points" beyond Rome will be the U.S. and Mexico, while Italy has yet to specify its preferences in the Near East and Far East. El Al used to fly the Rome-U.S. route but dropped it in the past few years in line with company-to-company agreements with Alitalia. These agreements were renewed on a yearly basis and locked the permanent status that air agreement regulations have. Basic principles and flight schedules were included in the agreement.

El Al's new ability to carry passengers to and from Rome to the U.S. and Mexico is considered important for Israel. Alon told Jewish news media reporters here. Hopes are that the "beyond points" will prove economically profitable for both countries and could lead to the promotion of further investments in equipment and auxiliary services, such as air-hotels and rental cars. At a future date, service might even be extended to South America.

Begin Prepares For Summit Meeting

Serious Rift Opens Between Premier, Defense Minister

JERUSALEM (JTA): As Premier Menachem Begin prepared for his summit meeting with President Anwar Sadat at El Arish next weekend, a serious rift was opened between himself and Defense Minister Ezer Weizman over the 22-point autonomy plan for the West Bank and Gaza Strip that a majority of the 11-man

ministerial committee on autonomy approved last week.

Weizman objected strenuously to the plan as far too hardline and detailed to serve even as Israel's opening position if the negotiations are to succeed. During the tense 7 1/2-hour ministerial committee meeting marked by sharp verbal exchanges between himself and Begin, he announced that he would vote

against the plan when it is presented to the full Cabinet for debate. He also said he would ask to be relieved from serving on the team of six ministers headed by Interior Minister Yosef Burg, which is to conduct the negotiations with the Egyptians.

The latest crisis between Begin and Weizman — which was headlined in the Egyptian as well as the Israeli press over the weekend — came at the worst possible time for Begin's government. Coinciding as it does with mounting public resentment over runaway inflation, it has given the Labor Alignment opposition a potent weapon to attack the government on both the political and economic fronts. A public opinion poll published by Yediot Achronot over the weekend gave Likud only a 4 percent lead over Labor should elections be held now, its narrowest margin since Likud's election victory in 1977.

Moreover, the defection of Weizman on the crucial issue of autonomy barely a week before Israelis and Egyptians start their negotiations on the subject, can only weaken Israel's position. Labor Party chairman Shimon Peres charged in a telephone interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency over the weekend that the Likud government was "falling apart" on political and economic issues.

Features Of The Autonomy Plan

Several features of the autonomy plan are, in fact, considerably tougher than the program originally proposed by Begin to the ministerial committee two weeks ago. It articulates specifically Israel's demand that the "source of authority" for the autonomous councils to be elected on the West Bank and Gaza Strip remain the Israeli Military Government.

Under Begin's doctrine, the Military Government will be "withdrawn" — the term used advisedly in the Camp David accords — but not abolished. In his initial proposal, Begin only implied that point. But under pressure from Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon and Education Minister Zevulun Hammer, he made it specific in the final version.

The plan also specified total Israeli control over government-owned and uncultivated lands on the West Bank and over all of the territory's water sources. It concludes with two unilateral declarations: that Israel will never agree to a Palestinian state and that it will demand sovereignty over the West Bank and Gaza Strip at the end of the five-year transition period of autonomy.

More moderate ministers were reportedly opposed to including these ultimatums in a plan that, after all, is supposed to serve as a negotiating document. But the hardliners, with Begin's full endorsement, prevailed. While Weizman opposed the plan almost in its entirety, Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and Deputy Premier Yigael Yadin are understood to have voted against those sections specifying Israeli control over State lands and water supplies.

Weizman Seeking To Bow Out

Weizman, for his part, had indicated that he will not participate in the Cabinet vote on the autonomy plan as a demonstration of his lack of confidence in it. His view, stated vigorously in the ministerial committee, is that Israel should enter the talks with Egypt without any detailed or binding paper but rather with broad, informal guidelines prepared by the Cabinet to instruct the negotiating team.

He told the ministerial committee that his

Ambassador-At-Large To Join Negotiations In June

WASHINGTON (JTA) — Robert S. Strauss, President Carter's newly appointed ambassador-at-large to the Israeli-Egyptian talks on Palestinian autonomy, will join those negotiations in late June rather than August as he had previously indicated. He explained to reporters at a State Department news conference that he was advancing his timetable because of "negative trends" in the region.

He listed these as Arab hostility toward Egypt that was "more intense than I thought it would be," the rising incidence of Palestinian terrorism against Israel and Israel's continuing establishment of settlements on the West Bank.

Strauss, who is going to China next week in his capacity as the President's special trade negotiator, will not be present at the summit meeting between Premier Menachem Begin of Israel and President Anwar Sadat of Egypt at El Arish in Sinai next week, which will formally open the next phase of Israeli-Egyptian talks. He will be represented there, however, by his deputy, James F. Leonard Jr., who will accompany

Secretary of State Cyrus Vance to El Arish and remain in the region for a time, Strauss said.

Expects 'Extreme Positions'

Strauss said he expected the Israelis and Egyptians to lay down "some pretty extreme positions" at the start of their talks on the future of the West Bank and Gaza Strip. But he said he would allow the two parties to negotiate on all possibilities for a settlement before the U.S. advances ideas of its own. "When the time comes for us to assume a far more active role," Strauss said he would serve as "a strong negotiator, an advocate of positions."

"We're going to be a full partner in every respect. . . In form and substance," he told the reporters. "I am an activist. I have a high energy level. I'm in the middle of things even if I belong there or not. I want to be there, I want to start playing an active, a very dominant controlling role, if you will, very shortly, in determining what our posture is."

Strauss said that he felt that the next phase of Israeli-Egyptian talks offer "a fresh beginning. I feel it is more of a political negotiation than I earlier thought," he said.

Reaches No Decision On 5-Year Program

JERUSALEM (JTA) — The Cabinet reached no decision on Finance Minister Simcha Ehrlich's proposed five-year economic program aimed at reducing inflation by drastic cuts in the national budget. The debate will continue when the Cabinet meets in regular session again next Sunday. Cabinet Secretary Arye Naor said after Monday's meeting that the ministers seemed generally supportive of Ehrlich's plan. It calls for an immediate cut of IL 3.5 billion from the budget and possibly double that amount.

Other measures sought by Ehrlich include a freeze of the civil service work force, higher interest rates on development loans and periodic increases of the value-added tax (VAT). He said he hoped by these means to reduce the rate of inflation, currently running at 60 percent per annum, to less than 30 percent.

Ehrlich's program encountered strong opposition from his fellow ministers when he first introduced it a week ago. But the announcement several days later that inflation rose by 8.7 percent in April, the largest increase since Nov., 1977, sent shock waves through the government. Skeptical ministers had second thoughts and the

prevailing sentiment now is that something must be done to control run-away inflation. Defense Minister Ezer Weizman, whose attitude was negative, has indicated that he and the Army General Staff can "live" with proposed cuts in the defense budget.

One of Ehrlich's aims in trimming the budget is to provide funds for the redeployment of Israeli forces from Sinai to the Negev over the next three years without creating additional inflationary pressures. The Likud government is very much aware of the mounting public dissatisfaction with its economic policies that is encouraging opposition attacks.

Three no-confidence motions aimed at the government's handling of the economy have been filed in the Knesset by the Labor Alignment, the Shai faction and the Democratic Front (Communist).

The deteriorating economic situation has created strains between the Herut and Liberal Party branches of Likud and within Liberal ranks where Ehrlich has been challenged by Energy Minister Yitzhak Modai. Herut leaders have become increasingly critical of their Liberal partners where the economy is concerned.

The Liberals have pointedly criticized certain Herut ministers who favor budget cuts only if their own ministries are not affected.

A Shavuot Message

A lady into her fifties . . . very devout . . . acknowledged as orthodox with an authenticity few would dispute . . . recently wrote, "For the first time mine was the treat to come face to face with the inside of a Sefer Torah. My teeth began to chatter, the thrill was indescribable . . . even for one who has kept the Torah all her life."

Whenever a youngster's eyes fasten on a scroll as it is carried or with care is removed or replaced, there is a noticeable glistening. No one can properly set it into words. Even Exodus, in its splendid Chapter 20, is not the conveyor-belt for the true emotions of the original *dramatis personae* the first Shavuot, when they were exposed to two tablets with their ten words.

There is an impact that sheer sight of or

proximity to inspiration exists. That is all well and good and to be lauded and lofted. But the Torah was meant to be celebrated by more than eyeballs, an occasional Aliyah or the instructor's glimpse into its intricacies. Its intent was to be synonymous with life . . . with practice and preachment, with ethic and character, with daily routine and the milestone that comes but once.

As we relive ancient events and as we live out our own, it is sobering and comforting to realize that we are outlived by a scroll that alternately informs and thrills.

Your Money's Worth

POLLING THE POLLSTERS

Scarcely a month goes by without my receiving a phone call or even a personal visit from some opinion collector, asking whether I clip grocery coupons, which of several local political candidates I support, if I think a woman should place the interests of her family and husband before her career, ad nauseum.

Opinion surveys claiming to measure Americans' tastes, values, habits and views, have become nearly as common as weather reports. The only subject rarely examined, points out my research associate, Brooke Shearer, is the public's attitude toward polls themselves.

But according to a provocative article titled "Pollsters and Polling," in a relatively obscure journal, *The Wilson Quarterly*, Procter & Gamble once did ask Americans what they thought of polls. The answer? Less faith in pollsters than in the military or organized labor, but more than in the president or Congress.

Scientific opinion-gathering is a 40-year-old, \$4 billion-year business, report the article's authors, David Gergen, former special counsel to President Ford, and William Schambra, until recently associate editor of *Public Opinion* magazine.

The basic profits come to the industry from commercial clients, trade associations, advertisers, market researchers, manufacturers, who want to know how frequently you eat at fast food chains or add bleach to your wash. Some, too, subscribe for \$20,000 a year to more general, quarterly surveys designed to gauge the temper and economic health of U.S. voters. Pollsters make little, if anything, from their widely publicized surveys on national issues.

In addition to the well-known polling firms - Gallup, Harris, Yankelovich, Cambridge Research Reports, Sindlinger, the Opinion Research Corp. - many major news organizations have hired their own polling staffs or consultants. There are a dozen of more state polls. For instance Mervin Field of California and two independent university based survey groups, the National Research Center at the University of Chicago, and the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center. These latter two often do research for the federal government.

With so many opinion minions gathering and analyzing your thought, how can you - both the respondent to and reader of pollsters - tell a good survey from a bad one? Say Gergen and Schambra:

1- The most reliable way to select people to answer questions is through random sampling. Using census data and computers, all of the leading university research outfits and commercial polling firms randomly choose areas of the country that are to be surveyed and particular homes within those areas. Respondents are not selected because of race, sex, age, religion, etc. Only geography is a factor.

2- Most state and national polls collect the opinions of about 1,000 people. A random survey of a group this size produces at least 95 percent of the time, results which

have a margin of error of plus or minus three percent. Enlarging the sample jacks up the cost without correspondingly lowering the margin of error. Reducing the sample cuts the cost, but boosts the chance of error far too high.

3- Beware of Breakdowns. Even with a sample of 1,500, national polls which break down results into such categories as race or age can produce unreliable findings. The reason is that a random national survey of 1,500 adults, will include only about 150 blacks. Reports of their views will be subject to a margin of error of eight to 10 percent.

4- The significance you can attach to the results of a poll depends in large part on what people are being asked, and how the question is worded. When people answer questions dealing with personal experience, their views tend to be well-considered, giving the poll results more credence. But when they are asked questions they know little about, they probably answer what is expected of them to get out of the embarrassing spot.

5- But even when people know what they're talking about, their feelings often are mixed, and their opinions complicated. Their views can't be disclosed by such words as excellent, fair, poor, etc. The views can be interpreted as negative or positive.

Thus, beware of black and white snapshots of developing and multi-hued mental pictures. Probe your polls and pollsters with care, assess the results that hit you almost daily with skepticism.

Understanding Fund Goals Important
Q: In May 1977, I invested \$10,000 in 669 shares of Northeast Investors Trust on your recommendation. The fund has paid no capital gains and has gone down in value. Do you still believe this is a sound fund and will recover? Or should I take my loss? R.K. California

A: Perhaps you misunderstood, when you invested, exactly what it was you were buying. Northeast's investment goal is to provide high income to its shareholders, and this it does well. At the present time the fund accomplishes its objective by investing in a portfolio of good quality bonds; they account for about 90% of assets. In general, an above-average yield does not go hand in hand with capital gains. However, should interest rates decline significantly the trading price for these shares would certainly rise.

Because Northeast is a managed bond fund, it can make changes in its portfolio to track rising interest rates. Nonetheless, there is bound to be a trailing effect, and it is this drag factor which accounts for the attrition in the share price. In 1978, a period

Responsa,
An American Version

Some fifty years ago people were talking in whispers of the goings on in the Temple on Broad Street. Very few were actually there in person, but the few who stepped over the threshold of Beth El were telling hair-raising stories. To the early immigrants from the little towns of Poland and the Ukraine the temple was a little less than a Protestant Church.

No services all week long except on Friday night. The services were all in English. Men and women sat together in the shul. No place was provided for reading of the Torah in the middle of the shul as it was done in the Orthodox synagogues. There was even a question whether there was a Sefer Torah in the Ark. They never saw it open. The men sat without yarmulkes and without a Talit, a Prayer Shawl, as was worn by Jews in the traditional shulen everywhere. The music of the organ. Did you ever hear of an organ in a shul? The garb of the Rabbi who was no Rabbi at all. The Rabbi himself was seen in a restaurant on Yom Kippur ordering steaks. The members all came by vehicle to the synagogue and they smoked on the Sabbath.

These and other stories were making the rounds among the Orthodox immigrants.

The general principles were supposed to be that if you were a descendant of German Jews, were well off, and didn't know a word of Hebrew, you were a respected member in a Reform Temple.

But things change. In time the Conservatives had their temples and in these temples were installed organs and mixed choirs. The partitions between the sexes were abolished and English was introduced in the services. The Orthodox Jew was confused.

As for German Jews, one has to dig very deeply to find the genealogy of a Reform or a Conservative member.

We are equal in all respects to the mainstream of American Jews. There is no doubt in anyone's mind that this mainstream is represented in the Conservative synagogue and that the Reform movement is leaning more toward the traditional Jewish ways.

Reform Judaism certainly is undergoing changes constantly. Some congregations more, some less, but changes just the same.

It was therefore intriguing to hear Rabbi Leslie Y. Gutterman of Temple Beth El, a recent graduate of the Union Theological Seminary in Cincinnati, ask the question "Where Is Reform Judaism Going?"

To answer this question, Rabbi Gutterman suggests that one open one of the six volumes of 350 Responsa compiled by Rabbi Solomon Freehof. These are questions and answers sent to Rabbi Freehof and answered by him. They are a barometer of changing times and moods among Reform Jews. The questions are something

that would not have been possible fifty years ago.

A Rabbi asks, for example, whether it is wrong to bless the Sabbath candles, customarily lighted in the Reform Synagogue after dark when the Sabbath is already with us.

No matter what the answer of Rabbi Freehof is, the question is indicative of a sensitivity to details of the Sabbath observance. A Rabbi of fifty years ago would have laughed at such questions. A Reform Rabbi asking such questions today certainly does not smoke on the Sabbath and in his own house the Sabbath candles are on the table before the sun goes down. Such a Rabbi we can be sure is observing Kashrut, and the younger the Rabbi the more the observance.

Rabbi Gutterman quotes such questions sent to Rabbi Freehof as: Can a woman be called to the Torah, which includes the Torah being handled by the woman in question. When a woman is being given an Aliyah is she required to put on a Talit? May the stepfather come up to the Bima instead of the ex-husband when her son becomes Bar Mitzvah? May a child be named after a Gentile grandparent? There are even questions about homosexuality in the Responsa of Rabbi Freehof.

If one wants to know how American Jewish life has changed, let him or her read the Responsa, the questions and answers of Rabbi Freehof, and similar authorities.

Every generation has its Responsa, its questions and answers. They reflect the problems that were uppermost in the minds of Jews living in different parts of the world under different circumstances. As a matter of fact, a goodly part of historical accounts of the life of the Jews were based on such Responsa, questions and answers, Shaalot Utshuvot, by authorities of the day.

Rabbi Freehof, by the way, is 87 now and is just as active in working in his library as he was in his younger years. He has become the authoritative voice of Reform Judaism in America. His Responsa are the barometer of changes in our days. To know what these are and how they are solved, Rabbi Solomon Freehof's work is of the utmost importance.



And, as far as I know, through brokers and commercial banks for a fee. In Florida, branch offices are located in Jacksonville and Miami. These are two of the system's 48 banks and branch facilities located throughout the country:

He Rejected Communists' Bid

Leonid Brailovsky, whose parents Victor and Irina were being harassed for their attempts to emigrate from the Soviet Union to Israel, was pursuing his studies in a mathematics institute in Moscow in 1975, when he was asked to join the Young Communists League. Leonid refused. News of his refusal spread throughout the institute,

along with word of his parents' dissent. These combined to make his life miserable. He was ridiculed, harassed and threatened. He felt impelled to resign from the student body.

Leonid continued his studies at an evening adult institute, and upon graduation, applied to the University of Moscow. But, he

was denied admission.

In a recent letter to the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry, Leonid said that 60 percent of the students at the mathematic institute were Jewish, but none of the 600 mathematics "majors" at the university were Jewish.

Hebrew University in Jerusalem, has offered Leonid admission if he is able to emigrate.

Does Research On Dystonia

BEVERLY HILLS, CALIF.: Dystonia, or dystonia musculorum deformans, as it is officially named in medical circles, is a strange brain disease seen in some Ashkenazi Jewish families.


Although this disease has been known for nearly one hundred years, its bizarre manifestations have only recently been fully understood. Often this disease becomes apparent in a child of 7 to 12 years of age. Walking becomes difficult, yet running may be unaffected, handwriting deteriorates, yet finger coordination remains excellent. Children may complain of cramps or of pain in their feet or legs yet when seen by their doctor, nothing unusual is detected. Often the diagnosis of hysteria or malingering is considered, and many a child is referred for psychotherapy.

This may be the state of matters for several years. Dystonia is progressive, however, and sooner or later children become unable to walk, their trunk or legs become contorted into the most grotesque postures and their speech may drop out.

The cause of dystonia is a complete mystery. Research designed to unravel the nature of the disease is being sponsored by the Dystonia Medical Research Foundation: 9615 Brighton Way, Beverly Hills, California. One of the problems that is being investigated is what treatment is currently available.

Dr. Stanley Fahn, Professor of Neurology, Columbia University Medical School, New York, presented his experiences with dystonia at the recent Chicago Meeting of the American Academy of Neurology. He found early diagnosis of dystonia to be important since treatment with large doses of Artane may result in considerable or even complete improvement.

Estimates indicate that there are some 1500 dystonic patients in this country; about half of these are seen in Ashkenazi Jews.

Today's hand is another that should have been easy, for all the necessary ingredients are right there to help the Declarer make the hand. Yet several manufactured problems for themselves. They seem to go out of their way to do this.

Some Souths, not using Weak Two Bids, opened the hand Two No Trump. To those who use the Weak Two Bids, this hand is too good, that bid would show 21-22 balanced points. With 23-24 the hand is opened with the forcing artificial Two Club bid followed by the No Trump rebid. Either way each North felt he had just enough to go on to game. The idea is to make it.

West's best lead is a small Spade. Leading from an Ace into a known powerhouse is usually not wise. I watched two Declarers allow East to win trick one with his Jack. Somewhere they had heard about ducking

an opening lead at No Trump. This was certainly not the time for it as those two Easts lost little time switching to the Heart Queen right through South's King with the resultant loss of four Heart tricks for down one.

I would certainly think that any Declarer would be extremely fearful of East ever getting the lead to do just what he did. Actually everything possible should be done to keep East out. To make the nine tricks necessary the Diamond finesse must be taken and assuming that it works, steps must be taken to allow it to be taken twice if possible. That means two entries must be fashioned in Dummy some way and there is a way.

After winning trick one play two high Clubs from South noting that both opponents follow both times ensuring that suit to break. So now you can afford to overtake a third high Club with Dummy's Ace for the first entry for the first Diamond finesse. Should that lose the hand cannot be made for now three Spades can be cashed and that same Heart Ace no matter where it is. But the finesse works and now we play the carefully preserved Club 7 over to Dummy's 8 for the other entry. Now another successful Diamond finesse and the hand is made.

True, the fact that the Diamond finesse does work is fortunate, but it does. So why not take best advantage of something good happening and not throw that right down the drain. Remember every finesse has an even chance of working unless the bidding tells us it is impossible.

Moral: Entries are valuable commodities as I have mentioned many times. You will find out that there are several ways of manufacturing extra ones if you are both careful and thoughtful.

Rabbi Sends Letter To Iran

WASHINGTON (JTA): Rabbi Joshua Haberman of the Washington Hebrew Congregation, the area's largest Reform group, addressed a letter to the Charge d'Affaires of the Iranian Embassy, Ali Ager, asking for specific information arising from the execution in Teheran May 9 of Habib Elkanian, the leader of Iran's Jewish community.

The Haberman letter followed an oral protest to Ager by Haberman and a group from the Menorah organization led by Joseph Friedman and Moshe Brodetsky after their visit to the State Department. Haberman's letter encompassed the elements of the Menorah's views to Ager in their hour-long session with him at the Embassy.

These included: a full official statement of what happened at Elkanian's trial shortly before he and six other Iranians were executed, including the factor of due process

under Iranian law; permission for American legal experts to attend future trials involving Iranian Jews; reassurances on "the highest level" that the execution of Elkanian does "not betaken a wave of mass arrests" of Jews, their disenfranchisement, losses of property and other acts of violence; and an official statement that Iranian Jews who wish to be reunited with family members abroad may do so without their remaining family members or fellow Jews who wish to remain in Iran to be harmed in any way.

Haberman said that petitions with hundreds of names were submitted to Ager and "that this is only the beginning. Many more are coming." The petitions said that "the vague charges of 'complicity with the Shah'" and "maintain contact with Israel and Zionism" suggest that his (Elkanian) only crime was that of being a Jew. The conscience of humanity and the law of God can only condemn such bloodshed."



Treasury obligations are taxable by the Federal Government but exempt from state and local taxes. Bills are available in amounts of \$10,000 or more. Long term bonds are usually available in \$1,000 amounts, and notes in either \$1,000 or \$5,000 minimums. Individuals investing less than \$200,000 must submit non-competitive tender offers for bills, or a subscription for upcoming notes and bonds.

Cut Back on Electric Utilities

Q: We are both 68 years old, retired, and living in a paid-for mobile home. In addition to a pension and Social Security, we have a savings reserve and a portfolio of seven electric utility stocks. Would you make any changes — considering our objective of increasing income with safety? **W.E. California**

A: Two of your seven electric utilities, Consumers Power and General Public Utilities, are fundamentally unattractive and I suggest that you sell them. The other five, American Electric Power, Middle South Utilities, New England Electric, Niagara Mohawk Power, and Pennsylvania Power & Light, are better situated and can be held.

However, I think it would be advisable to cut back on the proportion of your assets now invested in electric utilities. With all of your portfolio in one industry, you are in a vulnerable position. Therefore, you need to diversify. I would reduce by one-half your holdings of Niagara Mohawk and Pennsylvania Power & Light, which have less dynamic dividend growth records. I recommend investing funds realized from these sales in four NYSE stocks. The companies are in different industries and the stocks provide a current average yield of 8%, with excellent prospects of dividend increases in the years ahead.

American Tel. & Tel. ranks first in telecommunications. Operating results and dividends have been moving steadily higher. The present \$5.00 annual dividend rate is more than double the \$2.45 paid ten years ago. Household Finance is the largest factor in the consumer finance industry. An expected increase in earnings to \$3.25 per share, from \$2.99 in 1978, should enable management to raise the dividend for the 27th consecutive year.

Chessie System operates a large East Coast railroad network. Development of coal and other natural resource holdings is important, and a merger with Seaboard Coast Line Industries (a southeastern rail system) has been ratified — though it still needs ICC approval. Union Carbide is a leader in several areas including petrochemicals, plastics, batteries, household wraps, and auto chemicals. Some of its well-known brand names are Eveready, Glad, Prestone, and Simoniz. Per-share earnings may reach \$6.75 this year, up from \$5.58 in 1978, excluding nonrecurring items.

To S.P. Nebraska: You are talking about two very different investments. The money market fund pays a high rate of interest right at this time, but should rates drop generally, so would the amount being paid by the fund. With the 8% savings certificate,

you settle for less but you lock in the interest rate for the term of the account. You also lose the liquidity of this money in a term account. To be sure, you may borrow against it, but you pay to do so — 1 1/2% to 2% over the rate of the certificate. These advantages and disadvantages must be weighed against one another in order to decide which investment is best for you.

Investing for Grandchildren

Q: My wife and I have established trusts for each of our three grandchildren, ages five, five and three. Each trust is now worth about \$12,000. At present, the money is invested in 9.8% T-bills that come due in August. How do you suggest I invest these funds now for their education? **C.A. California**

A: Rather than investing in short-term securities, you should look a bit further out and you should also split the capital between fixed-income and equity investments. For the fixed-income segment of each trust, you should purchase a \$5,000 face amount Treasury Note. The 7s of May 1982 are selling below par to yield 9.5% and would cost about \$4,700, leaving \$7,300 in each trust to invest in high-quality common stocks.

One stock candidate for your consideration is Dart Industries (NYSE). Earnings have gained an average of 15% annually, compounded over the last five years. The company's Tupperware division provided almost two-thirds of operating income last year, and now a major new thrust has been added with recently acquired P. R. Mallory, maker of the Duracell battery. First-quarter net reached \$1.31 a share, up from \$1.04, and full-year results could hit \$5.50. At 8X earnings, the shares yield over 4% and are a buy for growth.

Your grandchildren are young and should have some of their trust fund invested in the growing computer field. With annual sales approaching \$2 billion, Digital Equipment is the IBM of the minicomputer field. In the first quarter, earnings reached \$1.07 a share, up from \$0.87 in the 1978 period, and sales jumped 25% to \$466 million. Buy.

Q: It is my understanding that Social Security rules concerning benefits to remarried widows have been revised. I receive \$319.80 and my wife has been getting half that amount. In April, she received \$312.20, and a check for back payments, based on her deceased first husband's Social Security. As a former widow, would she not be entitled to \$319.80, her widow's benefit based on my Social Security payments? **R. D. Massachusetts**

A: Under the new rules, widows' benefits are not affected by remarriage. Before the new rules went into effect, if a widow remarried, she lost the widow's benefit and was given, in its place, the spouse's benefit, which is one-half the primary insurance amount of her husband. Thus, until the change in April, that is what your wife was receiving.

Now, with the change, she is once again eligible for her widow's benefits, based on her former husband's insurance. This benefit has nothing to do with your Social Security, since she is not your widow.

Ministry Denies Being Too Easy On Neo-Nazis, Right Extremists

BONN (JTA) — The Justice Ministry rejected charges that it was too easy on neo-Nazi and right-wing extremists who glorify the Third Reich, spread anti-Jewish propaganda and claim the Holocaust never took place. The Ministry said that a study of 20 recent cases showed that there were more convictions than commonly assumed and that sentences ranged from a 300 Mark fine to two years in jail.

At the same time, the Justice Minister of North Rhine-Westphalia announced a full pardon for anti-Nazi fighter Beate Klarsfeld. She received a two-month jail sentence in Cologne in 1974 for inflicting bodily harm and duress on former SS security officer Kurt Kischka who was the Gestapo chief in Paris during World War II.

Lischka has been accused of responsibility for the murder of at least 22,000 French Jews. Mrs. Klarsfeld, 40, and several French friends, attempted to drag him into a car in 1971 to bring him to France for trial. The kidnapping failed and Mrs. Klarsfeld, who returned to France, was tried and sentenced by a Cologne court in absentia.

An arrest warrant against her was suspended after angry criticism of the sentence abroad. The procedure for a pardon was in-

itiated by West German legal authorities on the basis of an appeal by prominent German and French citizens, among them President Valery Giscard d'Estaing of France.

Klarsfeld said at the time that the kidnapping was an attempt to focus world-wide attention on Lischka and the fact that many war criminals were still at large in West Germany. She said she had hoped it would prompt the West German authorities to bring the former Gestapo chief to trial.

Thousands Of Nazi Pamphlets Distributed

While the Bundestag is debating the abolition or extension of the statute of limitations for the prosecution of Nazi war criminals yet to be apprehended, the extent of neo-Nazi activities was indicated in the Justice Ministry's list of recent indictments.

The offenses included distribution of propaganda material by illegal organizations; libeling the State and its institutions; glorifying violence or inciting racial hatred; wearing the swastika or other Nazi symbols which is illegal under the law; and glorifying Hitler and the Nazi regime. Sentences were meted out to persons arrested for distributing leaflets urging Germans not to buy from Jews and for publishing pro-Nazi pamphlets.

For Those Who Cannot See

Providence resident Mrs. Leo Katzman can appreciate the importance of Talking Books—a volunteer book reading and recording program for the blind and handicapped, sponsored in Rhode Island by the Temple Beth El in Providence.

Seven years before he died in 1977, Mrs. Katzman's husband lost his sight. Admitting that those last seven years were "plain hell" for her husband, she says, however, that the book program was a "great help psychologically" for him.

"The worthwhile program gives them (the handicapped) a sense of independence," Mrs. Katzman declared. "Having someone sit and read for you isn't the best of situations. Learning to use the machine that the tapes are played in is an accomplishment in itself."

For over a decade, Temple Beth El has sponsored the Talking Books program under the auspices of the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. Readers come in for a couple of hours a week to record a variety of books, ranging from biographies to literary tours of the NE United States.

Currently, there are six, benevolent readers involved in the program. Those participating are director Mrs. Henry Husserl, Mrs. Maurice Applebaum, Mrs. Melvin Hoffman, Mrs. Henry Gross, Dorothy Greenough and Richard H. Blanding.

The readers record the books onto reels and send them to the nation's capital where they are reviewed by the Library of Congress. If approved, the reels are recorded onto a cassette and distributed to libraries for the blind and handicapped such as the one at 95 Davis Street in Providence.

The Library of Congress has "extremely high standards" for selecting readers, according to Mrs. Husserl. "They are real sticklers," she maintained. "You can send them a 1000 page book with one word mispronounced and they'll send it back to be corrected."

Mrs. Hoffman, who has been associated with the program since its inception 18 years ago, said the congress has recently become even more stringent in their requirements for readers. "They are extremely choosy as far as diction. It takes as many hours preparing for the reading as the actual recording itself," she said. "The

number of readers nationally has dropped to about 250."

The studio where they record the books is in the basement of the temple and is equipped with a recording machine, an amplifier and unfortunately a very sensitive microphone. Unfortunate for the readers, because the studio isn't sound proof and the slightest noise in the building is picked up, causing the readers countless hours of grief re-recording material. Therefore, the temple plans on waging a campaign in the near future for a soundproof studio, according to Mrs. Husserl.

An engineer, who has built studios for two local radio stations, has given the temple a proposal for the booth. Mrs. Husserl estimates the cost of the facility at about \$7,500.

"Anyone interested in creating a memorial for his family and would like to set up a fund, this is certainly a worthwhile thing to give money to," she said. "Anyone willing to give a \$1,000 donation or more will have their name placed on the door."

Neusner Blasts Federation

For Education Stand

As a postscript to my article on day school education in Providence, I want to report how happily surprised I have been by the favorable responses coming to me both from educators and rabbis as well as from ordinary Jews. This response confirms my view that there is deep interest in the community at large in the improvement of day school education, and this without prejudice to either the old school or the new one.

To be sure, some respondents see the new school as uncertain in its future. Certainly, its supporters must concede that to be a fact. Similarly, some respondents see the old school as top-heavy in its administration, with too many chiefs and too few indians (four administrators for a school of not much more than 200 students!). I think the more down-to-earth supporters will not argue that point either. Finally, all parties concur that this community cannot hope permanently to sustain two separate day schools. Now the kindergarten of the old one has approximately two-thirds that of the new, one third, of all enrolled children. When and if the proportions are reversed, will the supporters of the old school concede that the community must give all or most of its support to the new one? Obviously not.

It follows that now, and not two or three or five years from now, it is time to undertake serious conversations among people who presently do not think they have to talk with one another.

We have then to ask who will inaugurate those discussions. The obvious answer, in any well-run community, would be the Jewish community, meaning the Federation, which describes itself as "the organized Jewish community." But, as I observed in my article, the Jewish Federation of Rhode Island has not responded, not five years ago, and not now, to this impending crisis. In the main the Federation leadership, lay and professional, sees its task as collecting money and disbursing money (to those things it conceives to be "Jewish" and not to those equally Jewish things it does not conceive to be "Jewish" to be sure. If the present matter is suggestive, it does not see its task as planning and carrying out programs for the

orderly and intelligent running of this community.

That is why the present leadership has not hesitated to alienate and drive away both important donors and significant Jews. It simply does not care about anything except what it conceives to be its task. I sometimes wonder whether, in the last analysis, the administration even cares all that much about its task.

Just now I learned that one of Rhode Island's most effective rabbinical figures was needlessly and gratuitously offended by the leadership, and I know of other cases of the same sort. A theory of leadership which involves driving people away and making enemies out of friends of the Federation involves goals I do not pretend to understand.

Indeed, such a theory involves issues I cannot specify: Why would anyone want the job? What would someone hope to accomplish? And if the issue is not accomplishment, then what sort of gratification is to be gained in taking the position at all? For the Federation is supposed to unite and win the support of the community as a whole. It also is supposed to provide guidance and direction, planning and intelligent and effective modes of action. Perhaps some people think that that is what the Federation is supposed to do.

But I have not been able to find many people who can concur that that is what, in recent times, it has done. These are matters for public discussion. They cannot be resolved by a handful of people sitting in some small room, fuming at the outside world, figuring out how to exclude this one and punish that one—and manipulate everyone else. They have not got much power to do evil. They have some power to do good. It is that power which, in the present issue and in so many others, requires exercise. And it is not a coercive power to tax, spend, and elect, but only to persuade, elicit good will and financial support, and draw people together.

These are bitter words and they bespeak a bitter judgment. They are addressed not to the past but to the future. The leadership for not years but decades was a leadership of public spirited and enlightened Jews, real

Jews, who respected Judaism, Jewish learning, Jewish commitment, and who knew what Jewish goals they wanted to accomplish through organized and leading the Federation.

If we mention names such as the Lichts, Hassenfelds, Alperins, Resses, and the like, everyone knows the sorts of Jews who created this community as we now know it and who stand behind every good thing which endures in it.

They were people with whom one could differ with good will and mutual respect, with whom one could argue, and who, for their part, understood the value of public discourse about public issues. They wanted to bring people into the community, not drive people out of it. But that is because they believed in community and wanted to build community. Theirs was the generation of responsibility and, above all, of Jewish commitment. What is before us? Is there a Jewish leadership which is sufficiently Jewish to understand the values of the Jews, who, after all, make up the bulk of this community? I do not claim to know the answer.

To conclude where I began: I do not think the leadership either of the old day school or the new one is to be blamed for the present impasse. Each group has its deeply held convictions, and I respect and honor both groups, while seeing problems in the positions of each. But facing such an impasse, the two groups cannot be expected to do more than they have done. It is an issue facing the community at large, and not the two day schools. To face up to this issue requires a sense of responsibility and of leadership, courage and willingness to stand up and criticize—and therefore accept criticism as well. But all of these observations are based upon a supposition which may in fact be false: that there is a Jewish community in Rhode Island, and not just lots of Jews who happen to live here.

Remarks On Professor's First Letter To Paper

The recent article of my friend and teacher Jacob Neusner, on the subject of Day School education is a distressing document, and must not pass without comment. Distressing primarily because Professor Neusner so fundamentally misunderstands the nature of what he styles the "financial crises" of the Providence Hebrew Day School. Professor Neusner suggests that the source of the school's deficit is to be found in the educational and administrative failure of its leaders. I would suggest that it is to be found instead in their excessive generosity.

Although the community served by the Day School possesses substantial wealth, the school has resisted the temptation to become a rich man's institution. On the contrary, the school has held fast to a commitment to educate each Jewish child who seeks its services, regardless of his parents' ability to "pay the piper." One result of this policy is that substantial numbers of Jewish children who could not otherwise afford a quality Jewish or secular education have received both. A corollary result is a student body nearly forty percent of which receives scholarship aid. A further result of this policy has been a decision to set "full tuition" at a level so low as to cover not more than a portion of the actual cost to the school of educating each child.

A second major component of the Day School's deficit, and a further manifestation of the attitudes of those who guide the school is to be found in the school's efforts to serve the children of Jewish refugees from the Soviet Union. Such children, who now constitute a substantial proportion of the student body, are generally charged no tuition during their first year of attendance,

and often little or no tuition thereafter. The result of this policy is that Jewish children who have been forcibly separated from their heritage by the enemies of our people, and who as a result often come to our community with little desire for Jewish learning, are developing a Jewish identity and are being reunited with the community of Israel. Such Russian Jewish children are infinitely precious, and each makes the school's budget more difficult to balance.

A third element in the creation of the Day School deficit, in addition to the school's commitment to low income students and to Russian Jews, is its commitment to educational quality. It would certainly have been cheaper, for example, for the school to have accepted the inadequate textbooks available in the area of Jewish history than to have written and reproduced its own; but the school's commitment to quality led it to follow the latter course. It might even be cheaper for the school not to maintain a high school for the benefit of the relatively small number of local students who seek an advanced Jewish education, but the school has wisely chosen to ignore the counsel of those who would measure educational quality by counting bodies.

The Day School has done good, although not always well, in following the path of generosity and quality. It is sad that these policies must rest on the sacrifices of a small number of donors. It is sadder still that these individuals must be subjected to the lecturing of those who have accepted their gifts and not shared in their burdens.

Pearlman Writes Concerning Providence Hebrew Day School

It is time for me to speak up about the most valuable asset of the Rhode Island Jewish community, namely the Providence Hebrew Day School and its high school division, the New England Academy of Torah. Whenever I travel throughout New England, New York, Washington, D.C., and even in Israel, I hear enthusiastic and favorable reports about the complete upturn in the quality of Jewish education in Providence due to our school and its fine graduates.

In the last 10 years, many people who have visited Providence have said that it was almost beyond belief that we have been able to develop such a fine school academically with local community support and, in addition, to have provided a girl's dormitory at 60 Taft Avenue, housing approximately 23 girls, and a boy's dormitory at 262 Blackstone Boulevard, housing approximately 25 boys. With an enrollment of some 250 children, our city has been a beacon in Torah education to serve as an example and to be the pride of all thoughtful Jews throughout not only Rhode Island and New England, but throughout the world.

The Providence Hebrew Day High School will be eleven years old this year and has attained numerous accomplishments. The following are just a few of them:

1: It has more than tripled the number of local youth who have obtained intensive and full time Jewish education after the elementary level, i.e. the eighth grade.

2: Over 100 of our local youth have developed an understanding in depth and a love for our great heritage and ethical ideals at the high school level.

3: A higher percentage of our graduates have consistently been accepted to the nation's top colleges, including Brown University, Columbia University and Yale University, than any other high school either public or private, in Rhode Island.

4: Children from observant and non-observant homes have become committed and knowledgeable Jews with a deep and sincere love and enthusiasm for Yiddishkeit, Israel, and the Jewish people, coupled with a marked increase in their own self-esteem.

I am especially pleased with the development of both my own children and those of my friends who have matriculated through the 12 years of this outstanding educational institution. Its superior secular and Jewish education program is truly the "gem" of our community.

The sacrifice and hard work and contributions of the founders of the School in general, and Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Korn and Rabbi Norman Cohen, the Rosh Yeshiva in particular, should be acknowledged . . . by not only our outstanding Jewish leaders, but also by the entire community. The taking of immediate steps to provide for scholarships, provisions in wills, and creating funds and other affirmative acts by members of the Jewish Community so that the outstanding work of the Providence Hebrew Day School can continue without undue impediments is not only imperative but urgent. There can be no better way to preserve our fine heritage than through our Jewish youth.

My Son The Boxer

Jews in the Cauliflower Industry

Last September in New Orleans on the same night that Muhammad Ali recaptured the heavyweight championship of the world from Leon Spinks, the light heavyweight crown also changed hands. Owing mainly to the gigantic shadow cast by Ali, little attention was paid to the ring victory of Mike Rossman who won the light heavyweight title from Argentina's Victor Galindez by a technical knockout in a bruising, bloody battle. In this day and age what is unusual about Rossman, who hails from Turnersville, New Jersey, is that he is Jewish and trumpets his Jewishness at every opportunity. He calls himself the "Jewish Bomber" has a Star of David tattooed on his right calf, and another prominently displayed on his trunks. In point of fact, Rossman is half-Jewish. His father, who also manages him, is Italian. Because his mother is Jewish—it is her maiden name that the new champion uses—by *Halachic* standards Rossman is a bona fide Jew.

I happened to mention the Galindez-Rossman bout while chatting with some of my undergraduate students who found it almost impossible to believe the Possman phenomenon. "A Jewish champion— unheard of," said one youngster. Nobel prize laureates in medicine, science and economics, of course. Literary and journalistic awards winners, yes, but not boxing champs. Even the Jewish students were surprised to learn that, although Jewish professional boxers are as rare as the proverbial hen's teeth nowadays, this was not always the case. Jews and Gentiles alike suffer from selective historical amnesia where ethnic, racial and religious stereotypes are concerned. For this reason a closer retrospective look at Jewish involvement in the "cauliflower industry" can be instructive.

The first Jewish champion was the remarkable and redoubtable Daniel Mendoza who was born in London's East End in 1764. Due to persecution on the continent, Jewish immigration to England escalated in the last few decades of the eighteenth century. Jews were quite unpopular in their new homeland and were often harassed by the local population which made Jew-baiting into a sport. According to reliable contemporary accounts it was Daniel Mendoza who was chiefly responsible for putting an end to the maltreatment of London Jews. Mendoza became a highly celebrated boxer lionized by the public and much sought after even by royalty. Mendoza established a school to teach boxing as a science. Many young Jews enrolled as students and became so proficient at boxing that anti-Semitic bullies gave them a wide berth. A proud Jew himself, Mendoza became a hero to his co-religionists to whom his achievements demonstrated Jewish physical prowess. They dubbed him the "Light of Israel." He was their champion. As a fighter he was always billed as "Mendoza the Jew."

In the United States there were relatively few Jews until the 1880s and 1890s when czarist oppression and grinding poverty brought swarms of East European Jews to these shores. Traditionally Jews had exalted intellectual achievement. Scholarship, that is brain development not body development, was deemed important but Jewish ghettos such as New York's lower East Side spawned many a rough youth ready, willing and able to use his fists to obtain the gold in the fabulous "Golden Land" of America.

Pre-eminent among the Jewish fighters in the 1920s was Benny Leonard. Born Benjamin Leiner in New York City, the future lightweight champion allegedly was en-

couraged to enter the violent world of pugilism by his mother. One can hardly imagine a less typical attitude for a Jewish mother. Legend has it that after his initial out-of-town win Benny wired his mother to inform her that he "was bringing home the bacon." We are told that his yiddishe mama responded with alacrity to that *Kashrut*—flouting figure of speech with "Never mind the bacon, bring home the gelt."

Sociologist Lewis Fever has described Benny Leonard as the "culture hero of his East Side years." Jews living in squalor and desperation worshipped Leonard for his agility, his quickness, his strength, his courage and his incredible coolness. My own father frequently regaled me with stories of Leonard emerging from the ring after grueling bouts unscathed and with every hair still in place. In addition, his personal qualities as a clean living, decent Jewish boy who was good to his mother received much attention in the Yiddish press.

On those nights when Benny Leonard fought there was much tension and excitement. Crowds of Jewish youngsters anxiously awaited the fight results. Prayers of thanksgiving were arranged by some synagogue on Sabbaths following Leonard's ring victories. Many Jews were resentful of other Jewish boxers such as the talented Philadelphia, Lew Tendler, who challenged Leonard.

Leonard retired undefeated in 1925 after holding the lightweight championship for some seven and a half years. His retirement was at his mother's request or so he claimed. His decision to retire had a comforting effect on his mother, Leonard told the press as he began a theatrical career. Leonard also tried his hand at sport writing and once contradicted the great philosopher Bertrand Russell who had described boxing as sadistic. Leonard, however, saw boxing as a positive influence on thousands of ghetto youngsters. Benny unwisely returned to the ring in 1931 and finished his amazing pugilistic career in 1932. He has been called "one of the finest ring mechanics of all time."

One of the most durable and colorful of the Jewish fighters was "Slapsie Maxie" Rosenbloom who fought some two hundred and eighty-nine professional bouts in a ring career that spanned sixteen years in the 1920s and 1930s. Rosenbloom was born in Harlem in 1904 when that neighborhood was predominantly Jewish rather than black. He won the light heavyweight championship in 1932 and held it for more than two years. It has been suggested that Rosenbloom's ring victory in 1933 over Adolph Heuser, the German champion, helped to persuade the Nazis to prohibit "inferior" Jewish athletes from competing against "superior" Aryan ones. Rosenbloom, of whom it was said that he did road work training for his fights on the dance floor, became a movie actor and nightclub entertainer after his retirement from boxing.

Another Jewish champion was Barney Ross who had been born Barnet Rosofsky in New York City. Ross moved to Chicago as a child and began his fantastic boxing career in the Windy City. After his father was murdered in a holdup, Barney, already an outstanding amateur fighter, convinced his mother to allow him to turn professional. He was to win both the lightweight and welterweight crowns before his retirement from the ring in 1938. During the Second World War, Barney joined the United States Marines, saw action in Guadalcanal and received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

I have dealt with just a few of the Jewish fighters, the most illustrious. There were more, many more, some truly noteworthy, most journeymen fighters of no particular distinction. Precisely how many Jewish professional fighters there were may never be known. Early in the century several East European Jewish immigrants and their American-born sons did not use their real names in the ring, choosing instead to employ Irish sounding names at a time when popular Irish boys dominated boxing. As James Michener wrote in his *Sports in America*, "In real life Battling Johnny Kilrain the Second was apt to be Hyman Finkel." With the passage of time Jewish fighters became more open about their Jewishness. With Mike Rossman, of course, we have a half-Jewish fighter who flaunts his Jewishness because a Jewish fighter is a novelty in the 1970s. Given the paucity of Jewish fighters, Rossman's Jewishness gives him a special, almost unique aura. Barely a month after he demolished Galindez, enterprising matchmakers were talking about a Rossman-Ali fight. From the promotional standpoint such a match would be a natural in that it would pit age against youth, a black against a white and most interestingly, a Muslim against a Jew. Promoter Bob Arum said in October that at first he had hoped to have Ali train in Cairo, and Rossman in Tel Aviv, with the fight to be held in Jerusalem.*

Ever since World War II there have been very few Jews who have attempted to win fame and fortune in the ring. Boxing has always been an escape route for American's underclasses, new immigrant groups, oppressed racial and ethnic minorities. The

Irish, the Italians and the Jews all took their turns in the boxing "game" in an almost unpredictable sequence. Their prominence in boxing declined as alternative routes to middle class financial success were opened. It is not coincidental that today one finds such a high proportion of black Americans and Hispanics in the boxing world. The continued predominance of Afro-American fighters is at least as much an indication of racial discrimination in society at large as it is a demonstration of black fighting ability.

When a racial or ethnic group moves up the economic ladder as Jews did by the end of World War II, within one or two generations of arriving at Ellis Island, they no longer have to look to boxing for a livelihood. Boxing is a brutal business and is very likely to be hazardous to the boxer's health. It is really "legalized mayhem." Moreover, only a small percentage of club fighters rise to the level where they can earn enough money to justify the risk inherent in climbing into the ring. With their strong tradition of learning, Jews have opted for higher education and the considerable economic rewards it usually brings. Accountancy, law, medicine, dentistry, teaching and commerce are safer and, in most cases, more lucrative than boxing. Accountants and physicians do not ordinarily finish their careers with cauliflower ears, flattened noses and somewhat scrambled brains. For these reasons it is highly improbable that Mike Rossman's ring triumphs will inspire Jewish youths to forsake their studies and become professional boxers. Besides, our mothers would never allow it.

It's time for the 27th Annual Banquet and Sports Awards Night which will be held at the Venus de Milo restaurant Monday, June 4, 1979. See your league reps for tickets. The winner of the *Wally Sundun, Jr. Memorial Award* for R.I. Jewish Athlete of the year will be Jane Forman. Jane, a junior at Wheeler School in Providence, is the first female high school student so honored. Jane was selected for being the outstanding athlete in her chosen field, which is tennis, but she also possesses the talent to be a well rounded athlete in any endeavor she chose to participate in. Over the years she has concentrated mainly on tennis since she found the greatest challenge in this game. Jane began playing tennis at the age of seven and at age ten competed and won her first major tournament, the R.I. State Championship, a tournament she has continued to win for the past seven years.

At the age of twelve she was the first girl ever to receive the Howard D. Cohen Memorial Award from the Jewish Community Center for outstanding sportsmanship and athletic ability. Jane has attained the No. 1 ranking in New England this year after maintaining a ranking in the top 5 from the age of 12. Nationally she is ranked No. 29 and expects to better that position to the top 15 after a successful 1978-79 season which so far this year has included winning 8 out of 8 N.E. tournaments and placing in the top 7 in three national tournaments. She has represented R.I. and the N. England section of the country in "Seventeen Magazines Tournament of Champions" for the past four years. Upon completing her high school education Jane hopes to attend a college either in the Southwest or on the West Coast.

The *Bert Summers Memorial Award* for Service to Sports for 1979 will be presented to Lou Cimini, as Lou has shown his dedication to the advancement of school boy sports in many ways. As head coach of the hockey team at La Salle Academy, he has skillfully led his team to 572 victories for a winning percentage of 72%. Coaching from 1946-1978, Lou has brought his team to the State play-offs 31 times in 32 years, as well as winning 5 state championships and one New England Hockey title. His interest extends far beyond winning. His guidance and training has been responsible for leading many individuals into the field of coaching including: Lou Lamoriello and Bob Bellemore from PC; Bob Reall from Bryant College, and Jim Reagan from Cranston East. As a member of the Governors Committee on Youth, Lou conveyed the wants and needs of high school students. In addition, he was a charter member, past President, and member of the Board of Directors of the Providence Gridiron Club, Past President of the R.I. Hockey Coaches Association, and R.I. Baseball Officials Association.

The *Dressler Family Memorial Award* to the R.I. Jewish Person of the Year goes to Marvin Holland. Since 1977 Marvin Holland has served as president of the Jewish Federation of R.I. In that capacity, he has met new challenges as they have been brought to light and they have been dealt with. For instance, due to his appointments and prodding, the reorganized committee on aging of the Federation has taken a number of steps to add new interests to the lives of our Jewish aged. He has constantly sought to be sure that the influx of Soviet Jews emigrating to our community have adequate services to make their settlement here successful and smooth. On many issues of critical interest to the Soviet Jews and the State of Israel, Mr. Holland has been able to mobilize his carefully cultivated political contacts in support of Jewish communal aims to assist Jews who are in trouble around the world. Mr. Holland has cemented relationships with the Bureau of Jewish Education, leading to improvements in educating young people throughout the state. At the same time he has been working closely with the Jewish Community Center in insuring the soundness of their fiscal support.

In the general community he has been most recently active in working for the

reelection of Governor J. Joseph Garrahy and Senator Claiborne Pell. Mr. Holland, in his capacity as Admiral of the R.I. Commodores, an appointment from Governor Garrahy, brought C. William Miller, Chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, to our community. He arranged a meeting with significant business leaders which led to important contacts that will benefit Rhode Island.

On the national scene, Mr. Holland serves on the Board of Council of Jewish Federations, the service and coordinating body for American and Canadian organized Jewry. He chaired an important committee which led to the development of Project Renewal, a major social welfare and housing program in Israel to deal with deprived people. In summary, Mr. Holland is striving to insure the creative survival of the Jewish community.

YOUR TOUR GUIDE THROUGH JERUSALEM



JAFFA GATE - The ancient city of Jerusalem is built inside a wall that completely surrounds it. One of the busiest entrances to the old city is through the Jaffa Gate, although there are six other entrances as well.



HEBREW UNIVERSITY - Israel's largest university opened in 1925 on Mount Scopus. In 1954, a new campus was added in west Jerusalem. Students travel from all over the world to study at this excellent college.



MONTEFIORE'S WINDMILL - One of the first Jewish settlements outside of the walled old city of Jerusalem was built 100 years ago by Sir Moses Montefiore. The neighborhood was called *Yemin Moshe* in his honor.

ARAB MARKET - One of the most fun places to shop in Israel is the Arab market in Jerusalem. You can find all kinds of treasures - and trash - in the market. If you are clever, you can discuss the prices of the goodies with the owners and get the items for much less than you first imagined. This is called "bargaining". As you bargain, you will have the opportunity to meet some interesting people.



SHRINE OF THE BOOK - In 1947, Biblical scrolls were found in a cave by the Dead Sea. Since then, seven other scrolls were discovered that are more than 2000 years old! The scrolls are very valuable so a special museum was built in Jerusalem to keep them. Called the Shrine of the Book, it was built to look like the pottery jars in which the Dead Sea Scrolls were found.

KOTEL - The *Kotel* is the only part of the ancient Temple which is still standing. The *Kotel* (which means "wall") is holy to Jews who have prayed by its stones for thousands of years. The wall has been held together all of these years without any cement! Each stone is so heavy that it holds the ones below it in place!



YAD V'SHEM - The Jews who died during the Holocaust are remembered at a special place in Jerusalem, Yad V'Shem. The memorial building is very simple, with the names of the Nazi camps on the floor, in front of a *Ner Tamid* (Eternal Light). Yad V'Shem also has a museum and a synagogue.



DAVID'S TOWER - King David did not build David's Tower but it has his name for two reasons. One reason is that King David made Jerusalem the capital of Israel. The other reason is that King David's casket is kept there. David's Tower is an exciting area to explore in Jerusalem.




MEA SHEARIM - Mea Shearim is a neighborhood in Jerusalem where very Orthodox Jews live. Before entering, men must wear *kepot* (head coverings) and women must not wear shorts or short sleeve blouses. No cars are allowed in this neighborhood on Shabbat.



KNESSET - The government of Israel holds its meetings in the Knesset building. In front of the Knesset is another important sight in Israel, the giant Menorah. The Menorah is 15-1/2 feet high and was a gift from England to Israel. The Menorah is one of the symbols of Israel.


BOOK REVIEW



Israel Hit By Highest Increase In 27 Years

JERUSALEM (JTA): Even the most pessimistic economic experts were surprised by the announcement that the price index soared by 8.7 percent last month, the highest monthly increase in 27 years without a drastic devaluation of the Pound. April's figures, published by the Central Bureau of Statistics, showed that housing costs led the upward spiral and, together with higher food prices, accounted for 70 percent of the increase.

Several Cabinet ministers reportedly have appealed to Premier Menachem Begin to intervene personally in economic policy, hitherto solely the province of Finance Minister Simcha Ehrlich. Begin was said to have told them that he feared galloping inflation would endanger Likud's prospects in the next elections.

Prices increased by 23.4 percent during the first four months of the year. Inflation is currently running at an annual rate of 88 percent, one of the highest if not the highest in the world. The chief contributor is the price of flats which went up by an average of 25.5 percent in April. The cost of an apartment in the coastal area north of Tel Aviv increased by 35.9 percent. A one-room flat in a good neighborhood in Jerusalem currently sells for IL 1 million, about \$40,000. These increases came on top of last year's rise in housing costs which amounted to 133 percent.

Israel Must Protect Moslems, Christians

NEW YORK, (JTA): Moslems and Druze as well as Christians in southern Lebanon look to Israel to protect their security, Premier Menachem Begin's chief media advisor said. Dan Pattir, currently on a brief visit to the United States, told a news conference at the office of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations that more than half of the 60,000 Lebanese living in the area south of the Litani River are Moslems and Druze. He said they lived and worked in friendship and cooperation with their Christian neighbors.

"Moslem units have joined Christian forces under the command of Maj. (Saad) Haddad to protect the security of their homes and farms against PLO terrorist attacks," Pattir said. "In so doing, they are serving also to protect Israel's security."

Pattir charged that the United Nations peace-keeping force in Lebanon had "failed in its mission of keeping the area free of PLO terrorists. As a result, Israel must assume that responsibility itself and will press its attacks on PLO-controlled areas until the Palestinians can no longer conduct raids across the border."

He said there was "increasing activity" by the PLO against Israel coming from territories that were supposed to be secured by United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL). Pattir added that Israel had vowed that "southern Lebanon will no longer be a jumping off point for PLO attacks against Israel" necessitating stepped up "search and destroy" actions by the Israeli defense forces by land, sea and air "as long as UNIFIL remains helpless to prevent PLO incursions against Israel."

"Jerusalem Alive" Is Theme Of Exhibition

MONTREAL (JTA): "Jerusalem Alive" is the theme of an exhibition of photographs and other items related to Jerusalem at the Place Bonaventure, Montreal's largest shopping center, under the auspices of the Canada-Israel Cultural Foundation. Local authorities and prominent public figures attended the opening which was addressed by the Israeli Consul General Zvi Caspi who stressed the role of Jerusalem as a "city of peace."

Caspi said, "It is our determined intention to do all that is in our power to maintain its tranquility and to restore its beauty and to make and keep this city open with free access to all worshippers, never again to be artificially divided and to become a battlefield and a scene of destruction and desecration." Caspi read a cable from Mayor Teddy Kollek of Jerusalem expressing his hope that "This exhibition will turn each visit (at the exhibition) into a visitor to Jerusalem."

The purpose of OPIC is to mobilize and facilitate the participation of American private capital and skills in the economic and social development of less developed friendly countries and areas, thereby complementing the development assistance objectives of the U.S.

The names of 65 of the terrorists and descriptions of their crimes were published by Yediot Achronot after they appeared in a terrorist pamphlet which claimed that the prisoner exchange was a "great victory" over Israel.

Investigate Interview On Radio Europe

WASHINGTON (JTA): The House Judiciary Subcommittee concerned with Nazi war criminals residing in the United States, is investigating why Radio Free Europe, which is supported by government funds, broadcast an interview on May 1 with Valerian Trifa, Archbishop of the Rumanian Orthodox Church in America who faces deportation hearings in July on charges of fraudulent entry into the U.S.

Trifa, a leader of the Rumanian fascist Iron Guard during World War II, has been accused of atrocities including the mass murder of Jews in Bucharest in 1941.

Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman (D. NY), Subcommittee chairman, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that it is "unconscionable and inexcusable to give a forum to somebody under proceedings by the U.S. government for fraud on entering the U.S. with relations to war crimes."

Holtzman said she "first read about it" (the Trifa interview) in a JTA story "and we tried to verify it." The story appeared in the JTA Daily News Bulletin May 8.

"We're in the process of determining who is responsible for enabling Radio Free Europe to provide this forum for Trifa," Holtzman said. She said the 45-minute interview by the government-funded broadcast facility was "adverse propoganda for the U.S."

A Very Uncomfortable Situation

William Buell, senior vice president of Radio Free Europe-Radio Liberty operations in Washington, told the JTA today that "we can't deny that the whole thing is very uncomfortable." He said "We don't know exactly how the decision to air the interview was made despite the judicial procedure. It would not be correct to say we did not know who Trifa is."

American Zionists Assured Jews In Iran Not Thought As Disloyal To Government

WASHINGTON (JTA): American Zionists were assured at the Iranian Embassy recently that Jews in Iran need have no concern of being considered disloyal to the government of Iran because they are Jewish or Zionist, Rabbi Joseph Sternstein, president of the American Zionist Federation, said.

Sternstein, Louis Bernstein, president of the Religious Zionists of America, and Ivan Novick, president of the Zionist Organization of America, visited the Embassy and conferred there for an hour with the Charge d'Affaires, Ali Agah, and his assistant, Ibrahim Sadjadi.

"They received us as Zionists," Sternstein said afterwards. He noted that in a telegram several days ago to the Embassy, he had said they would be representing all Zionists in the United States. The Embassy issued an in-

itation to them the next day to visit the Iranian diplomatic leaders.

The request for the interview followed the execution of Habib Elkanian, the former president of the Iranian Jewish community. However, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini told Iranian Jewish leaders that Elkanian was executed as a spy for a foreign country, "not because he was a Zionist."

Sinai Oil Committee Discussing Problem

TEL AVIV, (JTA): Members of the Israeli-Egyptian Committee on Sinai Oil met at A-Tur where the oilfields are located to discuss problems dealing with the return of the oilfields to Egypt in seven months.

Among the questions discussed was whether Egypt would contribute all or part of the \$30 million cost of maintaining the Alma oilfield at its present output of 33,000 barrels a day during the transition period.

Agah reiterated this to the three Zionists. He spoke of Israel as "an oppressive state,"

but Sternstein said, Agah made it clear that "just by virtue of being Zionists does not make Iranian Jews disloyal to Iran." He said Zionists are not disloyal, the rabbi reported Agah as saying.

Also discussed was whether the Egyptians would buy the equipment at Alma and how much they would pay for it.

The meeting was to have been held in Tel Aviv. But Premier Menachem Begin insisted that it be in Jerusalem and the Egyptians refused on the grounds that other Arab states might see this as a recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital. It was then decided to hold the talks at the oil fields'

State Department Expresses Concern

Khomeini Attacks U.S., Sen., Mrs. Jacob Javits

WASHINGTON (JTA): Virulent attacks on the United States by Iranian leaders, including Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, in which the American government was called "a wounded snake" and a statement that Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R. NY) and his wife Marion are wanted in Iran for "corruption and misappropriation of Iranian public funds" were assessed by the State Department as being of "concern." But it refused to take a stronger stand.

Referring to the attack on Javits, a Department spokesman, Kenneth Brown, said that the "comments such as we have all read on the distinguished U.S. Senator is a matter of concern to us." When he was asked whether anti-Semitism may be involved in the Iranian attack on Javits, Brown said he was "not going beyond that."

When he was asked whether he would go no further than using the word "concern," Brown replied: "Right now, yes." Brown said "we understand that the New York police" are providing security for Javits and that Javits would receive protection in Washington, too. There was a report that former Secretary of State William Rogers has been threatened, too, but Brown said he did not know of anybody else except for Javits. Rogers represents the Pahlavi Foundation that was set up by the Shah's family.

Javits himself said "it's just ridiculous" and his office said he would not have any further comment.

Outraged By Senate Resolution

The Iranian Foreign Ministry expressed its outrage at U.S. Senate criticism in a unanimously adopted resolution last Thursday sponsored by Javits regarding Iran's execution of more than 200 persons, including the former Jewish community leader Habib Elkannan. The Iranians told the U.S. not to send a new Ambassador to Tehran and warned that Senate criticism was "interference" that could result in Iran's "limit" of relations with the U.S. At present, the U.S. Mission in Teheran is headed by Charge d'Affaires Charles Nass.

The Iranian Foreign Ministry's attack followed Khomeini's remark that President Carter's concern for human rights is a mockery because Carter is unable to deal with "matters such as humanity." He said that "although the American government has condemned us, we have to see what the American people have to say about it because the U.S. government is like a wounded snake at the moment because of

our victory. But the people are not like that." He added that "it is they who need us" because of Iranian oil.

When asked whether he had a comment about Khomeini's remarks on the "snake" description, Brown replied, "I do not." He then added, "Don't tread on me," a reference to the slogan on a banner during the American Revolution.

According to reports here, the leader of the Iranian Tribunal, Ayatollah Sadegh Khalkhali, said that Javits and his wife are wanted in Iran because of Javits' position on behalf of the Shah and Mrs. Javits' service for a public relations firm hired by the Iranian National Airlines during the Shah's reign. Mrs. Javits resigned from the company in January, 1976 after it was said her work might lead to a conflict of interest because of her husband's position.

Reviewing Relations With Iran

Regarding Iran's protest to the United States, Brown said that the U.S. is reviewing "the state of our relations" and noted "we have been seeking to establish a sound relationship" and "we will continue." He also said "we believe we should put the past behind us," and that "we support the (Iranian)

revolution's objectives, freedom, justice and democratic institutions for the Iranian people. It will not be easy. We wish the government well in the effort to improve the lives of its citizens."

When Brown was asked whether the U.S. government has asked other democratic countries to join it in protesting excesses in Iran or whether it was going to take the issue to the United Nations, he said that it had not. Sens. Robert Byrd (D. W.Va.), the Senate Majority Leader, and Howard Baker (R. Tenn.), the Minority Leader, had urged in Senate speeches that other nations cooperate with the U.S. in condemning the executions in Iran.

Byrd told the Senate that he was "sorry" that Javits was "singled out" by the Iranian government for the Senate resolution expressing abhorrence of trials without due process. Supported by Baker, Byrd said "This (the resolution) is an action of the Senate." He said he hoped "more indignation will be expressed from the international community, especially the Islamic countries."

In one of several attacks on Javits and the Senate, Iranian Deputy Information

Minister Mehdi Momken said yesterday: "The form and composition of the U.S. Senate is that they always support Israel and Zionists, and the people of the Third World have always been suppressed by them."

In his statement to the Senate, Byrd pointed out that the resolution was "co-sponsored" by himself, Baker and Frank Church (D. Idaho), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. "The Senate's action is not interference in Iran's internal affairs. When a government allows systematic executions without due process, that cannot be looked upon as purely an internal matter," Byrd said. "And certainly, when officials" of the Iranian tribunals "issue what they call an order to assassinate former leaders of that country who now reside in other countries, it becomes an international affair," he added.

Byrd said, "I want to see good relations once more between our two countries. However, such relations should not require that we pay the price of silence when faced with this pattern of executions and international calls for assassinations."

Israel Still Capable Of Defending Self

JERUSALEM (JTA): Defense Minister

Ezer Weizman assured Israelis that if the peace treaty between Israel and Egypt were to be broken, "Israel would still be capable of defending its borders."

Speaking to some 1000 people at graduation ceremonies at the Technion in Haifa, Weizman stressed that both Israelis and Egyptians took risks in agreeing to the treaty. He expressed the hope that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat would withstand pressure from the Arab world to renounce the peace process. Weizman pledged also pledged that the Israeli army would continue to fight the Palestine Liberation Organization and would try to avoid civilian casualties.

The Defense Minister also said he agreed with the report by State Comptroller Ernest Nebenzahl criticizing the army for a lack of planning and coordination in Israel's invasion and occupation of south Lebanon in April 1978. The report cited errors in logistics, operations and intelligence, and serious breaches of discipline. "I both support criticism of this nature as well as a strong, uncompromising State Comptroller," Weizman said.

Motion For Civil Marriage Beaten

JERUSALEM (JTA): A demand that Israel institute civil marriage as an alternative option to religious marriage was struck off the agenda by the coalition majority in the Knesset. The private motion was submitted by Yossi Sarid of the Labor Party, Shulamit Aloni of the Civil Rights movement, Meir Payil of Sheli, and Mordechai Wirshuvsky of the Shai faction.

Replying for the government, Minister of Religious Affairs Aharon Abu Hatzera said it was futile to attempt to disrupt the delicate balance between the religious and non-religious population. He stressed that all previous governments had maintained the status quo on marital issues which are under the jurisdiction of the Orthodox rabbinate. Many bills calling for freedom of choice in marriage have been presented in the past and were defeated regardless of whether Likud or Labor controlled the Knesset.

Americans Abandon Plans For Airfield

TEL AVIV (JTA): Difficulties arising from the expropriation of Bedouin lands have led American construction circles to abandon their plans to build a large military airfield at Tel Malhata in the Negev, it was reported from Beersheba. The Americans will build two smaller airfields, one near Mitzpeh Ramon and the other near Yotveta while the main base at Tel Malahata will be built by Israel. The three airfields are intended to replace the air bases that Israel will give up when its forces complete their withdrawal from Sinai in three years.

MEMORIAL SERVICES

JERUSALEM (JTA): State memorial services will be held from now on at the gravesides of Theodor Herzl, Chaim Weizmann, and Zeev Jabotinsky — as well as David Ben Gurion, the Cabinet decided Sunday. The decision came at the suggestion of Premier Menachem Begin. The ceremonies for Herzl and Jabotinsky will be held on Mt. Herzl in Jerusalem; and for Weizmann at his grave in Rehovot. The Ben Gurion ceremony is held at Sde Boker in the Negev.

Police In Frankfurt Cancel Nazi Permit

BONN (JTA): Frankfurt police cancelled the permit granted earlier to the neo-Nazi National Democratic Party (JPD) to hold its convention that was scheduled to open there on June 16. A police spokesman said the permit was revoked for security reasons. The NPD planned to bring some 6000 delegates to the convention but counter-demonstrations were announced by several anti-Nazi groups.

The police spokesman expressed concern for law and order. "We could expect that protest demonstrations will lead to serious clashes whereby we cannot rule out bloodshed and damages to public and

private property," he said. The NPD has not reacted and it was uncertain whether they would appeal the police decision in court.

Although not mentioned in the official announcement, the cancellation order followed a clash last weekend between a gang of 15-20 NPD youths and a Czechoslovakian television team that had been given official permission to shoot a film at the NPD's youth training camp in Kamen. Czech TV correspondent Cyril Smolik, his wife and cameraman were beaten by the NPD gang and their cameras and film were destroyed. Police are investigating but no arrests have been made.

Serious Rift Opens Between Premier, Defense Minister

views were shared by the army and the defense establishment. That drew an angry rejoinder from Begin that the Defense Minister did not represent the army. "You represent the government toward the army," Weizman was told.

The Defense Minister confirmed in a Yediot Achronot interview that he does not intend to participate in the autonomy negotiations although he will retain his membership on the supervising committee of 11 ministers.

Government circles conceded that they are worried about the Begin-Weizman clash. Should the Defense Minister resign from the Cabinet, the repercussions could be catastrophic for Begin's coalition government. But confidants of Weizman said over the weekend that he is not considering resignation. They said that, on the contrary, he will continue to fight with determination for his views and expected, ultimately, to succeed and thereby prevent Israel from making the same kind of mistakes that threatened the peace treaty talks with Egypt last winter.

These sources said that Weizman feels that while he and Dayan — Israel's principal negotiators in the treaty process — were often overruled by the Cabinet, their concepts eventually were adopted by the Cabinet majority. He believes, however, that the delays and shifts were harmful to the peace process and fears a similar situation will develop in the autonomy talks.

Difficult To Predict Outcome

Political pundits are wary of predicting the outcome of a prolonged quarrel between Begin and Weizman. While Weizman is popular in the public opinion polls, he lacks a firm base of support within Herut where Begin's tough approach to autonomy is cer-

tain to win back some of the waverers and diehards who were dissatisfied with the peace treaty with Egypt.

Herut holds its national convention next month and Begin is expected to easily outmaneuver his Defense Minister should Weizman provoke a confrontation. Nevertheless, with the economy in severe trouble and the government's popularity declining according to the opinion polls, Begin is believed to want to avoid an all-out clash and may seek to smooth over his differences with Weizman at least for the time being.

Government circles maintain that no serious threat exists to its parliamentary majority. That view is based in part on the assumption that Yadin's Democratic Movement will not rock the boat for fear of new elections would probably wipe it off the political map.

The Labor opposition takes quite a different view. Many Laborites are convinced that the Likud government is now more vulnerable than ever. In a statement released here, the Labor Party leadership heaped scorn on the autonomy plan which, they said, is tottering toward collapse even before the negotiations with Egypt begin.

View Of The Labor Opposition

In his interview with the JTA, Peres charged that Begin is heading blindly for a bi-national state. By proclaiming there is no more "green line," the demarcation between Israel and the West Bank, by insisting that autonomy will apply to people, not territory, and offering Israeli citizenship to West Bank and Gaza Strip Arabs, Begin was "inviting" them to be part of the autonomy, Peres said. Approves Autonomy Plan

Will Not Submit Document To Egypt As Position

JERUSALEM (JTA) — The Cabinet this week approved a controversial autonomy plan endorsed last week by a majority of the 11-member ministerial autonomy committee headed by Premier Menachem Begin. But it decided at the same time not to submit the document to Egypt as Israel's formal position when the negotiations on autonomy for the West Bank and Gaza Strip begin at Beersheba this Friday. The plan will, for the time being, serve as "guidelines" for the Israeli negotiating team.

By doing this, observers said, the Cabinet deferred to the view strongly stated by Defense Minister Ezer Weizman last week that the autonomy plan was too hardline and too detailed to serve even as an opening position. That view was shared to some extent by Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and Deputy Premier Yigael Yadin. The plan that emerged from the Cabinet today consisted of 20 points instead of the original 22 submitted by Begin. But although there was some stylistic editing, the substance of the plan remained unaltered.

Some of the points were adopted un-animously and others by a majority. Cabinet Secretary Arye Naor disclosed that two of the points were adopted by votes of 11-4. Other sources identified the negative votes as those of Weizman, Dayan, Yadin and Minister of Social Betterment Yisrael Katz. The substance of these points was not disclosed but they are believed to be Israel's demand to retain control over all publicly owned and uncultivated land on the West Bank and its declared intention to claim

sovereignty over the West Bank and Gaza Strip at the end of the five-year transition period.

Both Weizman and Dayan had asked to be excused from the six-man ministerial team, headed by Interior Minister Yosef Burg, that will conduct the negotiations with the Egyptians. Begin refused on grounds that their positions made their participation essential. The Cabinet decided, however, that the entire six-man team need not be present at all of the negotiating sessions. This allows Weizman and Dayan the option of absenting themselves when the negotiations touch on points in the autonomy plan which they oppose.

The other members of the negotiating team are Justice Minister Shmuel Tamir, Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, and Minister-Without-Portfolio Moshe Nissim. Following approval of the autonomy plan, the Cabinet dissolved the ministerial autonomy committee inasmuch as it has completed its task of drafting the program.

AID FOR SOVIET JEWS RESTORED

WASHINGTON (JTA) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has adopted a measure providing \$25 million to help the resettlement of Soviet Jews in Israel. The action came on a motion by Sen. Jacob Javits (R., N.Y.). While Congress and the Administration have provided such support to Israel in past years, no funding was supplied in the Administration's recommendations to Congress for the new fiscal year. The Javits measure restored the aid.

Peres accused Begin of presenting a hard-line version of autonomy for "internal consumption." Carter Administration Denies Combat Troops Will Be Sent To Israel On Withdrawal

WASHINGTON (JTA) — The Carter Administration has explicitly denied that American combat troops will be sent to Sinai to supervise the Israeli withdrawal from the territory in accordance with the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty. The denial came last week from State Department spokesman Hodding Carter, following a report that the United Nations Security Council appears unlikely to renew the UN Emergency Force (UNEF) mandate which has been functioning between the Israeli and Egyptian forces on the Sinai peninsula since the end of the Yom Kippur War.

Carter said that "the U.S. believes firmly" that the mandate should be renewed by the Security Council before it expires July 24. He pointed to Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338, adopted after the Six-Day War and the Yom Kippur War, respectively, and "other resolutions" both in the Council and the UN General Assembly indicating the "important role" of the UN in carrying out those resolutions.

With the Soviet Union considering a veto of a continuation of UNEF in support of the Arab states with which it is aligned against the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty, Carter made it clear that the U.S. is emphasizing to

U.S. Requests Soviet Not To Curb Emigration

The United States has asked the Soviet Union for some kind of assurance that emigration, involving mainly Jews, will continue to be liberalized so that Moscow can become eligible for trade benefits.

Administration officials said that Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal told Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin in late April that the United States would like to lift the current ban on trade concessions, but needed to have at least oral assurances that met American legislative conditions on relaxed emigration. Until these assurances are received, officials said, the Administration could take no action to remove the restrictions.

The United States, seeking to grant non-discriminatory tariffs and government-backed credits to both China and the Soviet Union at about the same time, would like the trade question resolved before President Carter's meeting next month in Vienna with Leonid I. Brezhnev.

the Soviet government not to block UNEF's continuation. "We are in close consultation with Security Council members," he said, "and making our strong views known. This clearly includes the Soviet Union. I cannot predict the outcome of these consultations." Carter did not identify the other Council members.

Saying he denied "totally" that the U.S. is going to put troops in Sinai if the Security Council refuses to act and the other nations do not go along with the U.S. position, Carter said "as a matter of policy of this government there is no planning, no decision, no agreement — in fact a rejection of the idea of putting American troops in Sinai." He stressed that the U.S. monitoring units in Sinai do not constitute a military presence "and does not and will not have a military role."

Asked whether the U.S. will support an Egyptian-Israeli force to supervise the withdrawal activities, Carter said it was a "conjectural possibility" but "I don't see that envisioned right now." He did not deny that the question of the Sinai force would be discussed when President Carter and Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev meet in Vienna June 15 for three days to discuss principally the finalization of the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT 2).

Some Poor NY Jewish Children Not Getting Day Care Services

NEW YORK (JTA) — An estimated 20,000 children from some 10,000 low-income New York City Jewish families are not getting federally-funded day care services for which they are entitled by federal income standards, Jerome Becker, chairman of the Metropolitan New York Coordinating Council on Jewish Poverty, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Rabbi David Cohen, Coordinating Council executive director, charged that the Jewish poor and lower income working class families have been systematically excluded from an "adequate share" of such services from the start of the federally-supported day care programs.

Cohen said the New York State Department of Social Services is considering revisions in regulations on day care center operations. He told the JTA that the state Social Services Department was working on revisions in day care center regulations and

had scheduled a final review on all comments in requested changes for some time this summer, with final regulations to be issued in the fall.

The comments by Becker and Cohen stemmed from testimony from the Coordinating Council given at a Social Services Department little-publicized conference on proposed day care regulations held in Albany on April 25, at which Joseph Langer, Coordinating Council operations director, submitted a statement asking for changes to make possible greater participation by children of poor Jewish families.

Cohen said that because of "kosher food needs, lack of Yiddish and Russian-speaking and geographical location, the Jewish poor and the lower-income large working families attempting to earn a living under adverse economic conditions, cannot take advantage of day care in New York City."

He added that currently there are some 430 federally-supported day care centers, receiving more than \$90 million in public funds, in New York City "with just half a dozen having the ability to provide kosher meals. For the observant family in Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Staten Island, there are no kosher federal day care centers available." What this means, he said, is that the observant Jewish family "cannot take advantage of day care in most of the city."

10 Of 46 Rabbinical Students To Graduate In June Are Women

NEW YORK (JTA): Ten of the 46 rabbinical students who will receive the title of rabbi in graduation exercises in June under Reform and Reconstructionist auspices are women, according to a Jewish Telegraphic Agency telephonic survey.

Two of the 18 students who will be ordained as Reform rabbis on June 6 at the Cincinnati campus of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) are women. Seven of the 22 candidates who studied at the New York HUC-JIR campus are women. Their graduation exercises will be held June 10 at Temple Emanu-El here.

One woman and five men will receive the title of rabbi at graduation exercises of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia. The ceremonies will be held on June 10 at the Germantown Jewish Center, according to Rabbi Ludwig Nadelmann, associate director of the Reconstructionist Federation of Congregations and Fellowships. He said Linda Holtzman of Philadelphia will be the new Reconstructionist woman rabbi. She is being interviewed and is likely to get a pulpit, according to a spokesman for the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College.

The two women to be ordained in Cincinnati as Reform rabbis are Vicki Lee Hollander of Beechwood, Ohio; and Beverly Lerner of Shawnee Mission, Kansas, according to Harold Epstein, national director of information and development for the Reform seminary.

Large Group In N.Y.C.

The seven women who will be ordained as Reform rabbis in New York City on June 10 are: Michal Bourne, Mount Kisco, N.Y.; Ellen Dreyfuss, Chicago; Jan Kaufman, Baltimore; Beverly Magidson, Detroit; Janet Ross, Tarzana, Calif.; Sheila Russian, Cranston, R.I. and Bonnie Steinberg, Belmont, Mass.

If Rabbi-designate Holtzman does get a pulpit, she will be one of two women Reconstructionist rabbis — out of a present total of five Reconstructionist women rabbis — to hold a pulpit. Rabbi Sandy Eisenberg Sasso is currently the only Reconstructionist woman rabbi holding a pulpit. In a unique arrangement, she shares the pulpit of Congregation Beth El Zedek in Indianapolis, with her husband, Dennis Sasso, who is also a Reconstructionist rabbi.

The other three Reconstructionist women

rabbis are: Rebecca Alpert, director of student affairs at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College; Ilene Schneider, principal of the Cyrus Adler regional Hebrew High School in Philadelphia; and Ruth Sandberg, director of religious education at Reform Congregation Kneseth Israel of Elkins Park, Pa.

The seven women to be ordained as Reform rabbis here on June 10 will bring to 14 the number of such women rabbis, of whom three hold pulpits. Rabbi Sally J. Preisand, who made history by being ordained as the first woman rabbi in American history in 1972, was appointed assistant rabbi at the Stephen Wise Free Synagogue here and promoted to associate rabbi before she suddenly resigned, refusing to discuss her reasons for doing so but affirming she intended to remain in the rabbinate.

Women Reform rabbis holding pulpits are Rosalind A. Gold, assistant rabbi of Temple B'rith Kodesh in Rochester, N.Y.; Deborah R. Prinz, assistant rabbi at the Central Synagogue of New York; and Myra Soifer, assistant rabbi at Temple Sinai in New Orleans.

HUC-JIR women rabbis not holding pulpits are Michal S. Bernstein, who left a pulpit for graduate study; Laura J. Heller, director of the Hillel Foundation Center at the University of Southern California; and Rabbi Karen L. Fox, who is assistant director of the Federation of Reform Synagogues here.

21 Women Will Be Ordained

As of the June graduation exercises, there will be 21 women ordained as rabbis — 16 Reform and five Reconstructionists. The idea of women rabbis remains totally unacceptable to the Orthodox movement. There is sufficient support for the idea of Conservative women rabbis to have induced Chancellor Gerson Cohen of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America to have named a special commission which recommended that the JTS accept women as candidates for the Conservative rabbinate.

A vote by the JTS Senate on the recommendation, scheduled for May 30, was postponed by Cohen, at the request of JTS faculty members who asked for more time to study the issue. In announcing the postponement, Cohen said a definite stand would be taken on the issue for the 1980-81 academic year.

Refuse To Deny Or Confirm Report

BONN (JTA): The Justice Ministry has refused to confirm or deny a report that the Bonn police are negotiating with the Palestine Liberation Organization to exchange 11 Palestinian terrorists arrested in West Germany several weeks ago for four members of the German Red Army terrorist group said to be hiding out in a PLO camp in a Middle Eastern country.

According to the report, in the magazine "Quick," the PLO proposed the exchange and it is presently being negotiated between

Guenter Ermisch, vice president of the West German Criminal Police and Abdallah Franghi, the PLO representative in Bonn.

The Palestinians, reportedly armed, were arrested when they attempted to enter West Germany from Austria and Holland. They are being held in jail pending investigation of charges of possessing explosives and plotting terrorist acts. The Red Army terrorists were arrested in Yugoslavia last year but released after negotiations for their extradition failed. They were flown out of Yugoslavia to an unknown destination.

Harsh Sentences For Beltsy Jews

NEW YORK (JTA): Three Moldavian Jewish refusniks are arrested Jan. 5 in a Beltsy cafe for brawling with anti-Semitic thugs have received harsh prison sentences for their part in the melee, according to the National Conference on Soviet Jewry (NCSJ). The seven hoiligans who provoked the incident were never arrested. Aleksandr Milner has been sentenced to six years in prison, while Arkady Feldman and Yankel Groberman each received four-year terms. Their trial was April 13. An unidentified non-Jew who came to their defense during the fight was arrested with them drew an even longer, although unknown sentence, the NCSJ reported.

The three men, all of whom had applied to

emigrate to Israel, were celebrating Feldman's receipt of his visa at the restaurant when seven youths began to insult and taunt them with such statements as "How long must we put up with you lousy Yids?" Eventually the Jews were provoked into defending themselves and were aided by the incensed Russian customer, the NCSJ said.

Groberman, who was released from custody prior to the April 13 trial and was to be a material witness, actually appeared as one of the accused. His parents, wife and children, and Milner's father all live in Israel. Groberman's exit application had been denied on the grounds that he holds state secrets as a result of his army service.

Neo-Nazi Group Will Operate Underground

VIENNA (JTA): The neo-Nazi Aktion Neue Rechte (Action for a New Right) has disbanded because it was not allowed to run for the university boards elections in June. However, the group has announced that it will continue to work underground on an informal basis. Last month, several members of the group clashed with police in Braunau, Hitler's home town, when they gathered to celebrate the Nazi dictator's 90th birthday. The incident provoked a demonstration of

more than 2000 anti-Nazis in the center of Vienna who called for a ban of all neo-Nazi organizations.

NEW ORGANIZATION

NEW YORK (JTA) — A new organization to promote Yiddish culture and support various Yiddish programs and clubs in Israel. The League of Friends of Labor Israel, will hold its national founding conference June 9 and 10 at the New York Sheraton Hotel.

Eighteen Athletes Inducted In Jewish Sports Hall Of Fame

LOS ANGELES (JTA) — Eighteen athletes were inducted this week in the Jewish Sports Hall of Fame at an inaugural dinner here. The Hall of Fame, which is under the auspices of the United States Committee Sports for Israel, will be located at Israel's Wingate Institute.

Those inducted are: Red Auerbach, who won nine world championships as coach of the Boston Celtics in the National Basketball Association; Jackie Fields, world welterweight boxing champion from 1929-30 and 1932-33; Benny Friedman, an All-American quarterback at the University of Michigan; Hank Greenberg, who hit 331 home runs for the Detroit Tigers baseball team; Nat Holman, president of the U.S. Committee Sports for Israel and considered a top-ranking basketball player and coach.

Also, Hirsch Jacobs, a leading horse trainer and owner; Jimmy Jacobs, who won every handball match he played from 1955 through 1969; Irving Jaffee, an Olympics gold medal winner in ice skating; Sandy Koufax, the former pitcher for the Los Angeles Dodgers; Benny Leonard, world

lightweight boxing champion in 1917-25; Sid Luckman, the famed quarterback of the Chicago Bears in the National Football League.

Also, Barney Ross, who held both the world lightweight and welterweight boxing championships. Abe Saperstein, the founder and owner of the Harlem Globetrotters. Adolph Schayes, who played with the Syracuse Nationals in the National Basketball Association; Dick Savitt, who won the Wimbledon singles championship in tennis; Mark Spitz, winner of seven gold medals in swimming in the 1972 Olympic Games; Sylvia Wene, considered the best woman bowler, and Henry Wittenberg, considered one of the greatest amateur wrestlers.

The dinner was labeled an "Evening of Jewish Pride" and featured outstanding stars of television and the theater. The Hall of Fame was the brainchild of, among others, Joseph Siegan, a Beverly Hills producer, who feels that not enough is known about the major role played by Jews in sports.

Weizman, Begin Clash Over Plan For Self-Rule

JERUSALEM: Defense Minister Ezer Weizman clashed with Prime Minister Menachem Begin over the Israeli Government's plan on self-rule for Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Gaza territories. Mr. Weizman said he would probably refuse to represent Israel at negotiations with Egypt on the self-rule issue.

Prime Minister Begin reminded Mr. Weizman that he had been named to the negotiating team by the Cabinet. Mr. Begin said a new Cabinet vote would be necessary to relieve him of the assignment.

The exchange between the Defense Minister and the Prime Minister came during a seven-hour meeting of a ministerial committee that completed guidelines for the Israeli negotiators.

Greater Cairo Role Urged

Backed by leaders of Israel's armed forces, Defense Minister Weizman has been urging a greater degree of Egyptian involvement in the autonomy plan than Mr. Begin and his aides have been willing to accept.

The premise of the military leaders seemed to be that the self-rule plan had a chance of succeeding only if Egypt, still the most authoritative of the Arab countries, had a role in it.

The Cabinet majority favors making the Israeli military government in the West Bank and Gaza territories solely responsible for the self-rule project.

Mr. Weizman, former commander of the Israeli Air Force, took part in the negotiations that led to the signing of a peace treaty between Israel and Egypt. He has achieved good relations with President Anwar el-Sadat and other Cairo officials.

Egyptian-Israeli talks on autonomy in the occupied territories are scheduled to open May 25 in Beersheba, Israel.

The Israeli negotiating team is to be headed by Interior Minister Yosef Burg, a conservative. A month ago the Government also appointed Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, Defense Minister Weizman, Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, Justice Minister Shmuel Tamir and Moshe Nishim.

Minister Without Portfolio, to the bargaining group.

Sources close to the Defense Minister told reporters that Mr. Weizman was inclined not to take part in the negotiations. The state radio reported that the Defense Minister felt the Government plan for Palestinian self-rule "does not constitute a base for real negotiations."

At the committee meeting, the Defense Minister objected to various proposals in the guidelines and abstained from voting. He announced that he would vote against the text when it is to be considered at a special Cabinet meeting. Later next week, Parliament's Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee is to be briefed on the guidelines.

The text approved is a revised version of an autonomy plan worked out by the Prime Minister's office. It largely disregards a position paper submitted earlier this month by the Defense Ministry, proposing Egyptian participation.

The policy guidelines call for Israel to demand control over security and defense matters, public land and water resources in the occupied areas, while yielding administrative affairs to an elected Arab body.

Autonomy for People, Not Land

Israel will insist, the guidelines say, that autonomy applies to the people, the Palestinian Arabs, not to the land, and that Jews will have a right to acquire land and to settle in the occupied areas.

The text is understood to comprise 22 points and two annexes, or "general statements."

The first annex declares that Israel opposes establishment of a Palestinian state. The other announces that Israel, at the end of a five-year transitional period, will claim sovereignty over the West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

Egyptian officials have made it plain that they expect the autonomy plan to give the Arab populations in the Israeli-occupied areas full legislative, judiciary and executive powers — a status similar to independent statehood.

Cautiously Endorse Proposal Of Rabbi To Seek Converts To Jewish Faith

NEW YORK (JTA) — Leading Catholic and Protestant churchmen and scholars have endorsed — with some cautionary observations — a proposal by Rabbi Alexander Schindler, president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC), to seek converts to the Jewish faith among the "unchurched" or others searching for roots in religion, according to a report released here by the UAHC, the central body of Reform Judaism in the U.S. and Canada. The proposal, which would reverse a 400-year-old Jewish tradition of not proselytizing, was advanced last December by Schindler.

The UAHC's 180-member board then set up a task force to study the question of "bringing the message of Judaism" to any and all who wish to examine or embrace it. The task force, headed by David Belin of Des Moines convened here this weekend in

conjunction with the semi-annual meeting of the UAHC board of trustees. It will report to the UAHC's General Assembly in December.

The UAHC's Department of Interreligious Affairs made public responses to the questionnaire sent to 31 Catholic and Protestant theologians. Eighteen responded. None of the four Fundamentalist or Evangelical representatives who were sent the questionnaire answered.

PALESTINIANS PARADE

MONTREAL (JTA) — About 300 Palestinians and their supporters paraded through Montreal to protest the 31st anniversary of Israel's independence and the Israel-Egyptian peace treaty. The parade was sponsored by the Quebec Palestine Committee. Marchers shouted such slogans as "Yesterday the Shah, tomorrow Sadat."

Magician Does His Act In Hasidic Garb

NEW YORK: Abracadabra, voila, a sabra! The Wizard of Ouz (Ouzi Goldsmid) is a religious Jewish magician and illusionist born in Israel and bred in Brighton Beach, Brooklyn. He uses a unique approach that has earned him appearances on television programs such as "The Mike Douglas Show," "The Joe Franklin Show" and "The Jewish Scene." Part of the novelty lies in his garb; he unabashedly wears a yarmulka and Hasidic clothes.

During the past eight years, Ouzi has spun webs of magic, capturing his audience. For his opening effect the curtains part, and a blinding flash of fire appears. A moment later, the Wizard of Ouz steps out of a cloud

of smoke.

Sometimes Ouzi dresses as an authentic Hasid with curled earlocks. The yarmulka and beard are constant companions.

In Ouzi's bag of magic tricks are dozens of extraordinary illusions, custom-made, tailored to his style. Although he uses many standard tricks, he translates them to his own style.

What makes Ouzi's magic special is its significant Jewish content. His magic, based on Yiddishkeit and Zionism. His acts are entertaining, and educational.

For example, he asks for volunteers to count from one to fifteen in Hebrew. "This is an incentive for the kids who don't know all

the numbers to study a little harder," says Ouzi.

In Brooklyn

Ouzi's own education began in Brooklyn public schools. Then he obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in mass communications from Queens College; another B.A., in Hebrew literature, from Yeshiva University, and a Master of Arts in education from New York University, stringing together a lot of rides on New York City subways as he obtained his string of degrees.

Earlier, Ouzi had intended to pursue a teaching career, and obtained his teaching license.

"Then I saw there was no future in education," he said, leaning back in his living chair and reflecting for a moment. "There are many more good educators than teachers." He added, "Many who would make fine teachers leave because there is little financial incentive."

Ouzi's college interest in sleight-of-hand was focused on wrestling mats. He was a member of the Yeshiva University wrestling team. But an automobile accident ended that. Then Dr. Abe Hurwitz, father of Shari Lewis, the ventriloquist, gave him a book on magic. This led him to enrollment in Hurwitz's course in magic and soon, to his current career.

Now he reads extensively about magic, studies other magicians, and gives many performances.

Ouzi has no qualms about being Jewish. He says, "It's within me to remain a religious Jew. For someone to give up something, he must have a substitute. I have yet to find a substitute for religion."

Many producers and Jewish entertainers have a persecution complex, asserts Ouzi. "One would hardly know that 80 percent of comedians are Jewish. Very few Jews are

willing to play the role of a Jew, yet their portrayal is most genuine, more so than that of an Italian playing a Jew," says Ouzi.

Don Rickles

"Actors who play Jewish characters, such as Herschel Bernardi, are rare," he says. "The more common Jewish actor type is Don Rickles. He ranks out every ethnic group but his own."

Many Jewish actors believe that mid-America would poke fun at a Jew playing himself, Ouzi reflected. He added that comedian David Brenner had told him it was absurd to presume that television producers would allow him to dress in Hasidic garb. Ouzi says he has proved him wrong.

"Many of my Jewish friends are surprised at my strong religious convictions, but they congratulate me on following through," says Ouzi. "Even the Hasidim were pleased

with my performances including vignettes of a Hasidic rabbi. Clearly, they have a sense of humor, too."

Support from the Jewish community is strong, he says, but it is Ouzi's aim to break into the nonethnic world of television.

In spite of his smattering of successes, Ouzi faces many obstacles stemming from his religious observances. "He has turned down several generous offers because he refuses to perform on Friday night: Outside of the Jewish world, it is difficult to be accepted on the basis of my talent."

A producer's typical response is, "If you can't perform on Friday night we don't need you," he grimaced.

Ouzi has another objective: to bring this entourage to Israel.
