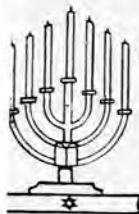

Providence Jewry Responds with Generous Contributions to Community Fund Drive

Jubilee Celebration by Temple Emanu-El on 10th Anniversary

The 10th anniversary year of Temple Emanu-El is being observed this coming Sunday evening, by a jubilee celebration at which Dr. Solomon Goldman of Chicago will be the main speaker. His subject will be "The Jew — A People of Patience." This jubilee celebration is sponsored by the Men's Club of Temple Emanu-El.

Herman J. Aisenberg, president, announces that at this celebration, short messages of greetings will be delivered by Dr. Carl Jagolinzer, president of the Men's Club of Temple Beth-Israel; Edward Adaskin, president of Temple Beth-El, Fall River; Harry Meyers, president of Temple Beth-El, Providence. A brief address will also be made by Rabbi Israel M. Goldman, and a musical program will be offered by Cantor Harry Bettman and Professor Arthur Einstein.

Dr. Goldman is a noted liberal in Jewish religious thought. His liberalism has often brought him into sharp clashes with the orthodox elements in Cleveland, where he formerly was the Rabbi of the Cleveland Jewish Center. At present he is Rabbi of Temple Anshe Emet of Chicago. He travels extensively on lecture tours from coast to coast. He is president of the Histadruth Federation of America, is the author of a notable volume, "A Rabbi Takes Stock," and is a contributor to many national magazines.

French Authorities Order Arrest of All Reich Refugees Without Visas

PARIS, (JTA) — Indication that the government intends to enforce its newly adopted measures against foreigners in France, even if they are refugees from Germany, was seen in the raids upon the headquarters of the French Refugee Committee.

The raid was the second of the week and resulted in the arrest of a number of Jewish refugees who were detained for lack of documents attesting that they had entered France legally.

Police are now insisting that every refugee carry with him identification papers.

The opinion was expressed here today that the new French cabinet will approve the police measures against foreigners and will even strengthen them by special government order.

Thousands of Jewish refugees from Germany who see no way of ever settling themselves in any other country and who are not in a position to return to Germany are finding themselves, as a result of the new laws, in a precarious situation. Not being allowed to do any labor

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Jewish Leader Dies



Baron Edmond de Rothschild died in Paris last week at the age of 89. The only living grandson of Mayer Amschel Rothschild of Frankfurt, founder of the Rothschild fortune, Baron Edmond was head of the French family. He was long known as "a one man Zionist movement" as a result of the many millions he spent in the development of agricultural life in Palestine.

Polish Jews Being Thrown Into Increasing Despair by New Decrees

WARSAW, (JTA) — Deepest concern for the immediate future of Polish Jewry was expressed here when all Jewish members of the Polish Parliament gathered for the purpose of finding a way to cope with the alarmingly increasing misery of their co-religionists.

The impotence of the Jewish parliamentarians for political intervention in the Polish Parliament was emphasized by all the deputies. It was revealed that a new procedure requiring seventy signatures for every measure offered in Parliament makes it impossible for the Jewish members of the Polish Sejm to raise any question in the Sejm against unjust treatment of the Jews.

Numerous decrees which will undermine the last positions of the Jews in Poland will soon be promulgated, it was disclosed at the meeting. The serious plight of Polish Jewry was especially emphasized in reports given at this meeting by Dr. Joshua Thon, president of the

One substantial group of contributors which has always given generously is yielding increased contributions in response to the necessity that the Fund must raise more money than last year if the 38 agencies — including our own Jewish Orphanage, Community Center, Miriam Hospital, Family Welfare Society and North End Dispensary — are to continue to meet minimum charitable requirements. A gift of \$100 raised to \$125, another gift of \$25 raised to \$35, still another rather large gift raised by 20 percent, and a number of others coming from those who have always done their best and a little more shows an increasing appreciation of the valuable benefits which membership in the Community Fund has brought to Providence Jewry.

The Special Prospects committee reports an even more heartening result in another group. One man whose contribution a year ago was \$10, has given \$75 this year. Others are following by pledges which indicate a growing knowledge of the meaning of giving to all charity once a year in one lump pledge payable in convenient installments instead of giving many times during the year by buying all sorts of tickets.

Henry Hassenfeld, chairman of the committee, refers to pledges of this character in the following statement: "The man whose gift has been increased fivefold this year is not giving too much. Last year and the year before he gave far too little. That is not because he didn't want to give. Jews are always generous in such matters. But that man has simply learned to appreciate the importance of this great city-wide project. He has added up what he used to give in small amounts and the total has surprised him. He finds that four or five membership bills, plus raffles, ball tickets and a dozen other calls for money totalled more than he thought and more than he gave. He finds that innocently, without realizing it, he has been buying his charity too cheap. He realizes that he owes a large debt to his own conscience, another good-sized debt to the institutions which he helped to (Continued on Page Eight)

In their reports the deputies all expressed the deepest anxiety as to the fate the Jews in Poland may face in the very near future due to the expected decrees which will tremendously affect the Jewish population. A measure demanding the elimination of all Jewish teachers from the public school system in Poland was introduced today by the anti-Semitic National Democratic (Endek) members of the Sejm. The members requested that a decree be issued by the government prohibiting Jews to teach non-Jewish children.

The Minister of Education ordered today the closing down of existing Jewish secular schools.

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Speaks on Jewish Education at Confab

Speaking on "What the Jewish Religious School is Trying to do for the Jewish Child," Dr. Emanuel Gammoran, educational director of the Commission on Jewish Education in Cincinnati said at the eighth annual Conference of the Jewish Teachers' Association of N. E. Liberal Schools held Sunday at Temple Beth-El. "We are living in days of rapid changes in which all our values are being challenged. There is need of anchorage and a feeling of security. The Jew can find such anchorage only by integrating himself into the life of his group. It makes no difference whether we conceive of ourselves as essentially a religious group or a cultural group."

If we conceive ourselves to be a religious group, we must remember that religion with us never meant a divorce from life which it sometimes seems to mean to those who use the term. Certainly if we think of ourselves as a cultural group, and if we are true to Jewish history, we must recognize that our culture is essentially a religious culture. It includes however a great many other elements. It includes art, literature, music and ways of life. In short, the life of a people dedicated to the search for higher values.

"If we are to achieve happiness for ourselves and for our children, we must learn that it is our first duty to be true to ourselves. No true exponent of the American democratic ideal want us to give up our ideas and ideals, our customs, our distinctive ways of life, our Hebrew language or our literature. America can be enriched only by contributions from many cultures."

"We must teach our Jewish children to be themselves, to relate themselves intelligently and happily to their people and to the ideals which they cherish. In our desire to develop character in the Jewish school, we must always remember that the basis for character development is a well integrated personality. The Jewish school says to the child "Be Yourself" and teaches him to "Be Himself." Only in that way

can we avoid developing an inferiority complex on the part of our children. That way also is the path of true creative activity along Jewish lines in the development of the Jewish community of tomorrow."

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What Your Contribution Pays For

By the time this issue of the Jewish Herald reaches you, the campaign of the Providence Community Fund will be under way. You will either have signed your pledge card or you will be approached to do so within a few days.

On November 26, you will know whether you have performed your duty as a good citizen and a good Jew or not. Some people will tell the solicitor that they haven't made up their minds yet and ask him to call again. Some others will wish to consult someone else, hoping the volunteer solicitor who is giving not only his own money but also his time, will forget to come back. Others will make out a small check in round figures of five or ten dollars or extract that much from a pocket-book and consider the gift the price of getting rid of an annual nuisance.

But fortunately for the good of the community, only a few will look upon the Providence Community Fund Campaign in that manner. Most of us will remember that the Jewish Orphanage is caring for 43 parentless children day and night, 365 days in the year, giving them everything possible to make up for what they have lost. We will remember that last year the Miriam Hospital treated 467 patients wholly free, 419 more partly free, and 4596 others gratis in the clinics. We will recall that the Jewish Family Welfare Society is constantly caring for nearly 200 families, over 1000 individuals, driven to despair by adversity, and is rebuilding these shattered families. We will think for a moment of the North End Dispensary which treated an average of 484 patients a month during the twelve-months. We will visualize the Jewish Community Center, building sound character for hundreds of boys and girls for an attendance record of 77,631 in one year.

We will also remember that as Jews and citizens we owe a debt of gratitude and an obligation to the District Nurses, the Lying-in Hospital, the American Red Cross, the Boys' Clubs, and a dozen other of the 38 Community Fund agencies.

Many are remembering all these things and remembering them thoughtfully, generously, sacrificially. They are increasing their gifts in order that the morale of this community may be saved for their children and coming generations. They are appreciative of the fact that through the Community Fund method of efficient fund raising and scientific spending not only the Jewish social agencies but all the charities of this city are doing more and better work than ever before.

Which class of giver do you belong to? The one who buys his charity as cheap as possible? Or the one who gives all he can afford and just a little bit more and who receives in return priceless dividends in personal satisfaction?

THE BARON

One man alone brought more Palestine land into Jewish hands than has the entire Zionist Organization. The same man put more money into Palestine than the Zionist Organization has been able to raise and put into Palestine over a period of many years.

This man was Baron Edmond de Rothschild.

The death of Baron Rothschild is one of the greatest losses in Jewish history. Although not a Zionist, he was a "one-man Zionist movement" in himself. He invested over sixty million

dollars in Palestine. He pursued his constructive work there quietly, through the Palestine Jewish Colonization Association, known as the PICA. The PICA now owns in Palestine about half a million dunam of land, which is almost twice as much as the land owned by the Jewish National Fund.

Universally known as the "Nadiv Hayodua" — the Famous Philanthropist — he played a great and distinctive part in Jewish life. Though no Zionist, Baron Rothschild manifested his hope for national restoration of the Jewish people in Palestine by joining the mixed Jewish Agency as Honorary President, but as a non-Zionist.

He became interested in settling Jews in Palestine when notice was brought to him that some fellow-Jews who, driven out of Czarist Russia in consequence of the pogroms there, had a desire to settle themselves on land and change their lives from shiftless peddling to the oldest industry known to mankind.

The death of Baron Rothschild comes as a shock to world Jewry at this moment when Jews are seeking refuge from Germany, Austria, Poland and many other countries. The fate of these unfortunates had been taken as much to heart by Baron Rothschild as the fate of the Jewish exiles from Russia. Plans had been laid by him this year for assisting these victims. New land had been acquired for this purpose by the PICA.

Now the news comes that the venerable philanthropist has suddenly passed away. He will be deeply mourned by Jews all over the world.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Readers of this newspaper are invited to send in questions regarding the Protestant, Catholic or Jewish faiths. These questions may touch upon any aspects of these faiths. Q. What is the Protestant attitude toward birth control?

A. Protestants distinguish between birth control, which involves the conscious control of procreation, and abortion, which is the destruction of embryonic life, and condemn the latter as contrary to the law of God and man. They believe that it can never be right to make pleasure or self-indulgence the motive for determining to limit or refuse parenthood, but that where there is a clearly recognized moral obligation to limit or avoid it the method must be commendable to the Christian conscience.

At this point Protestant opinion is divided. Many believe that the careful and restrained use of contraceptives by married people is valid and moral. Many others believe that the better way is total abstinence from intercourse, even if it may be for long periods. Still others accept as a compromise the limitation of intercourse to periods in the rhythm of the sex life when conception is unlikely to occur. Protestants generally hold that the method of birth control is a matter for conscience to determine and believe that the church should not seek to impose its point of view as to the use of contraceptives upon the public by legislation or any other form of coercion.

Q. What is the meaning of the term "Kosher"?

A. This word, which can often be seen on the windows of Jewish butcher shops and delicatessen stores, originally meant "fit," "proper." In the rabbinic literature it took on the narrower meaning of ritual cleanliness and was applied to vessels, cooking implements, as well as foods. The word is now most particularly applied to the ritual preparation of meats. Meat to be kosher, must be rid of blood. That is why the method of slaughtering by the "shechitah" is carefully prescribed. This is also why meat must be soaked in water and then covered with salt and afterward washed three times in order that all traces of blood may be removed. The ancient Hebrews believed that the spirit of the animal was contained in the blood. The koshering of meat undoubtedly immunized the Jews from certain diseases which took heavy toll of the non-Jews, especially before sanitary methods were developed. In most modern communities, a board of orthodox rabbis closely supervises the koshering of meat used by orthodox Jews. Reformed Jews do not, in most cases, observe this ritual process.

Q. Can a Catholic girl marry a divorced man and still live up to her religion?

A. The Catholic Evangelist, Albany, N. Y., answers this question as follows: A Catholic girl cannot marry validly a man who was validly married and whose wife is still living. The fact that the man has secured a divorce does not alter the case. If, however, his first marriage was invalid in the eyes of the church, on a declaration of nullity by the proper ecclesiastical authorities she may marry the man and continue her life as a Catholic. The whole case hinges on the validity or invalidity of the man's first marriage. This can be determined only by a careful examination into all the circumstances of that first marriage. The procedure is to consult some priest, give him all the facts he deems necessary and be advised by him what can be done.

Victor Chenkin Brings His Art to Jewish Center on Nov. 25

Unique among foreign artists who have invaded the American theater, Victor Chenkin has practically recreated the difficult role of the singing actor. The talented actor, who is coming here Sunday evening, November 25 at the Plantations Auditorium, under the auspices of the Community Center, gives life to a superb group of characters familiar to various corners of Continental Europe. He makes each character the voice of the folk lore of an ancient people. He deals in dramatic mood rather than dramatic incident.

Chenkin is, above all, an actor. Without an innate knowledge of the dramatic craft, he could never give reality to his varied impersonations, nor extend that reality into the illusion of setting and supporting cast. But his singing voice is by no means to be overlooked. A flexible organ, it bends to his will, whether he requires the sonorous intonations of the Jewish Rabbi singing the laments of his people, or the liquid tones of the Italian boy, or the crude earthy voice of the Ukrainian peasant.

But perhaps the subtlest effect achieved by Victor Chenkin is through the medium of his strangely expressive hands. If it were possible to black out the entire stage training light only on his gesticulating hands, the audience would still see a dramatic performance. A series of varying characters would still move across the stage, young men, gay men and weary men, scholars and peasants. The hands seem to change in shape as well as gesture, and always, even in repose they are splendidly and intensely alive.

Chenkin has a consummate explanation of his own art. One evening after his performance, he was asked if he was conscious of the part played by his hands in his impersonations. With the simplicity which marks his, he touched first his forehead, then his heart, and ended with an eloquent gesture of his hands—a giving from himself to the audience. "There is the first station," he said, repeating the ritual. "There the second. And there the third. That is all."

What amazes audiences more than anything else about the amazing Victor Chenkin is his mastery of make-up. He appears in five changes of costume and he is five different persons. Each personality is shed with the garments that unfold it; new garb means an inner as well as an outer transformation. Nor does Chenkin depend upon his costumes

to create anything but background. His make-up is, so to speak, scenery and not substitute for the true subtleties of acting. Successfully he is a jester, the poet Beranger singing his own songs, a Caucasian Mountaineer—Chenkin was born on the border of the Caucasian Mountains—a Khassid, a peasant from Ukraina... a gesture and the change takes place almost before one's eyes.

To mastery of make-up Chenkin adds a facial plasticity that creates, at times, a veritable dance of the features. He is no longer light upon his legs, but he dances nevertheless with his eyes, his cheeks, his moustaches, his fingers. His hands are astonishingly expressive. He could easily, as impersonators do, fall into exaggeration, especially when one considers the types that he does best. Yet it is precisely here that he exercises most artistic restraint. The transition from boisterousness and rustic abandon to Chassidic piety and visionary mysticism he accomplishes with seeming effortless ease, and possesses a voice as plastic in sound as are his features in line and expression.

may say that the ideals of economic Zionism are: free immigration and free land.

An Economic Laboratory

In other words, Palestine has been an economic laboratory, in which at a time of universal depression, it has been proven that free immigration and accessible land can bring prosperity.

If we look back to our early American history, we will see that it was this combination indeed, which brought prosperity to early America. When the doors of the country were opened to all, and when there was yet a frontier to which the landless men could go and stake himself to some land, America spelled Opportunity. . . . But when the Frontier was gone through land monopolization and the doors of the country were closed — Prosperity disappeared in thin air.

Appeal to Common Sense

Does this sound very theoretical? On the contrary, I think the program of economic Zionism is so simple that it would occur to the most ordinary mortal.

Take your most elementary sort of human, and to reduce the problem to a grasp which will not stagger him, say to him: Here in the town of Middletown, there are 300 people who are unemployed. What shall we do with them? Do you think we should coin some new money? Do you think we should put them on the dole?

And what would his answer be? He would say, "Well, why don't you put them on the land lying on the outskirts of Middletown? There they could raise food for themselves and have very cheap rent. That much would occur to the most simple individual."

But perhaps what he wouldn't realize is that this reform in its effects, would go much further. For as any good economist will tell you, as soon as the hundred unemployed were taken away from Middletown, the wages of those remaining in Middletown would immediately rise. For as these economies will tell you, an unemployed man is not only unhappy in himself, but his presence is the means by which even the wages of those employed is kept down. Or as Karl Marx himself once put it, without, I believe, seeing the full implications: "It is the reserve army of the unemployed which makes possible capitalistic exploitation of labor."

Return to Question

If my argument fails to convince you that the solution of the world's economic problem is free immigration and free land — then I return again with my original question "How do you explain Palestine's prosperity?"

Your answer perhaps, that it was possible to achieve this prosperity in Palestine because Palestine was an empty land. And I answer you that Palestine was never quite as empty as large stretches of Texas, New Mexico, Vermont, Maine or even sections of New York State.

Think it over, and then when you have arrived at an opinion agreeing with mine, run for Congress on an American Zionist platform. What is being done in Palestine can be done here. It's the program that is important.

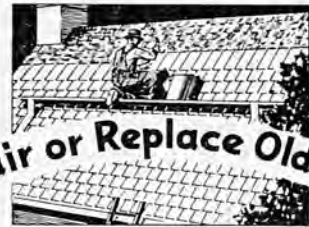

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Our Community — And Its Needs

The Jewish community as such is the only agency to care for the needs of the community. No one organization would think of providing the community with a home for the aged, an orphan's home or a hospital. It is a problem which does not concern one unit in the community but the community at large. Likewise does the question of Jewish education concern Providence Jewry and not only a part of it.

Jewish education is the sorest spot in our communal life and is in the direst need of attention. It would be futile to organize a Jewish community which in the end will have committed suicide by killing off its future leaders one by one.

The training of our youth now will mean the building of a Jewish community for posterity. We must create a type of community that will be representative of Jewish life and letters. A type of community that will be creative and not destructive. And the way to start is with an organized system of Jewish education and a united front for the creating of interest on behalf of Jewish education.

For the proposed community council the question of Jewish education should be of primary interest. And then the things of lesser importance will follow.

It shall then be for the proposed council or K'hilah to decide whether or not it desires to affiliate itself with a Jewish Voters League, for example, and not leave it to a few. It shall then be for the council (which will speak on behalf of its represented bodies) to solve problems concerning the community at large.

The success or failure of this long

needed community council will depend entirely upon the scope of its policies. An organization such as this must not become a mere agency for the exchanging of dates. It must not assume a dictatorial attitude by dictating the policies of this or that group. Nor must it show favor to one organization in preference to another.

The rabbis with their profound knowledge of Jewish life and law should prove of inestimable value to the community in planning and guiding the course of action of its council.

The broader its range of view and action, the more inclusive (rather than exclusive) its membership, the more humane its approach, the more assured will be its success. An attempt at anything other than that is sure to meet with failure. It is only when the community as a whole is asked to cooperate in this respect that we shall have the possibility of knowing—"Art thou of us or of our adversaries?"

There is a common ground on which all of the Jewish Community of Providence may stand or fall, as the case may be. We must prove the way for that common ground. A united effort on the part of the entire community to hold together will make our stand firm and secure. The best interests of the community will be served in the best way possible. The needs of the community will be supplied with the least amount of effort and in a manner most representative of all shades of Jewish thought and opinion.

Now is the time to plan. Now is the time to act, and may success be ours.

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THIS WEEK IN REVIEW

UNITED STATES

Receiving a vote well over the two million mark, Herbert H. Lehman was re-elected governor of New York by a plurality of 800,000 votes over his Republican adversary, Robert Moses. It was the largest plurality ever recorded by a New York gubernatorial candidate and it was interpreted both as a vote of confidence in President Roosevelt's New Deal and a personal endorsement of the Governor, himself, who made a very fine record in his first two years at Albany as the successor of President Roosevelt.

Governor Julius Meier of Oregon was not a candidate to succeed himself and thus will retire from office this January. With the retirement of Governor Meier, there will be but two Jewish state executives, Lehman of New York and Horner of Illinois. For a year or so, until the death of Governor Seligman of New Mexico, there were four Jewish governors throughout the country.

The Congress will include eleven Jews. Ten of these were re-elected. The new Jewish Congressman being William Citron of Connecticut. Those re-elected: Samuel Dickstein, Emanuel Celler, Dr. William I. Sirovich, Sol Bloom and Theodore A. Payser of New York; Isaac Bachrach of New Jersey; Mrs. Florence P. Kahn of California; Adolph J. Sabath of Chicago; H. P. Koppelman of Hartford, Conn., and Henry Ellenbogen of Pittsburgh, Penn. Two of these Congressmen are Republicans, Mrs. Kahn and Mr. Bacharach. Their victories in this Democratic year are a testimonial to their personal popularity within their districts. Congressman Sabath, the Dean of the House returns to the legislature for his fifteenth term.

Louis T. McFadden, arch American anti-Semite, was defeated in his Pennsylvania district by two thousand votes. Congressman McFadden has long attacked the Jews. Julius Strencher's "Der Stuermer" in September carried a story from its New York correspondent lauding McFadden as one of the few Congressmen fearless enough to speak out openly against the Jews. He was also shown to have had correspondence and dealings with such American anti-Semites as Pelley, Royal Scott Gulden and others.

The write-in candidacy of John F. Hyland for New York governorship, which was sponsored by Nazi organizations, was a complete flop. He received less than 10,000 votes. It revealed the weakness of the Nazi organizations and it is expected that the election was the death knell of the leadership of Louis T. Zahne, chairman of the German-American Independent Voters League, in German-American circles in New York. More conservative leaders than Zahne questioned this outward demonstration of strength.

The New York Kashruth's Association "issur" on poultry went into effect last Monday. All poultry not bearing the tag of the association was declared unkosher. Schuchets who slaughtered poultry without the Rabbinical supervision of the association were permanently disqualified from slaughtering kosher poultry by the Rabbis. The ban, the first few days, was considered sixty per cent effective. A small rabbinical group bolted the Kashruth Association and said it would give special dispensation to slaughter poultry under its supervision. See.

venty-two of the 132 city poultry markets accepted the terms of the Kashruth Association. But as we write, the entire matter is still unsettled. Even hundred Bronx butchers refused to accept poultry bearing the Kashruth Association tag. City officials, however, announced their support of the rabbis.

AUSTRIA

The threat of revocation of the citizenship papers of Jews naturalized after the war finally came to pass last Wednesday when the government deprived seventy-six naturalized Austrian-Jewish citizens of their citizenship rights. The government move, which was not unexpected in view of Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg's known desire to deprive post-war naturalized Jews of at least part of their rights, is expected to affect at least 30,000 Jews who became citizens of Austria after 1919. It also means that henceforth no Jew can become an Austrian citizen. Thousands of Jews will lose jobs as they lose their citizenship.

This step by the Austria government is reminiscent of the Nazi government's early steps against so-called Eastern Jews who migrated to Germany during the World War or immediately after it. It definitely puts the lie to any statements made in the past, or that will be made in the future, by Chancellor Schuschnigg regarding the reassurance of the rights of Jews.

GERMANY

League of Nations High Commissioner for German Refugees James G. McDonald, was empowered by the governing body of the League of Nations refugee commission to negotiate with the German government for the relaxation of Nazi laws forbidding export of money to exiles.

At the meeting the High Commissioner reported that the condition of the refugees is growing steadily worse. He will make efforts to raise funds in America and elsewhere for mass migration. He will also seek to negotiate with various countries for permission for this migration, a thing so far hampered by Nazi propaganda. The money question, however, McDonald stated, was more pressing.

The Nazi Labor Front instituted a new and bitter anti-Jewish campaign to convince the workers of Germany that "association with Jews, even with decent Jews, is immoral and harmful" because the Jews are a menace to Germany.

POLAND

Charges that "the Polish government is condemning 3,000,000 Polish Jews to annihilation" were made last Wednesday from the tribunal of Polish Sejim in impressive speeches delivered by Dr. Rabbi Joshua Thon, president of the Jewish Deputies, and Rabbi Lewin of the Agudath Israel, part of the pro-government

block in the parliament. The Rabbis claimed that the Jews are being "annihilated" by the government system of taxing the towns and favoring the villages, Jews living in the towns.

The popularity of the Yiddish performance presented last week at the Modern Theater has resulted in the decision by the famous Franklin Park Theater players to again visit Providence Monday evening, November 26, for a presentation of "Gypsy Caravan."

"Gypsy Caravan" is a famous Yiddish musical comedy and has been exceptionally well received wherever it was presented. It played to record houses in New York and more recently in Boston. A chorus of scores of beautiful girls and 22 musical numbers help them towards the success of the hit.

Among the stars are Samuel Auerbach, Sadie Shoengold and Max Kletter. These are assisted by the entire Franklin Park Theater cast. Tickets for this performance are on sale at the regular stations.
