## Nazi Steel Banned Under New Laws

NEW YORK (JTA) — A barrage of protests directed against the use of Nazi steel in the Triboro Bridge being built here largely with Federal funds has prompted Secretary of Interior Ickes to rescind the PWA regulation which permits use of German steel when it undersells the American product 15 percent.

The new development followed revelations that German steel is being sold in this country on an export loss basis, which was interpreted as tantamount to dumping. Secretary Ickes made one provision in banning foreign steel: that if it is shown American producers are jacking up prices he will permit foreign steel to be used.

Meanwhile, it appeared nothing could be done to prevent the use of 500 tons of German steel for piling in one of the bridge approaches. Samuel Untermyer, president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, is investigating the possibility of court action to cancel the order.

Nathan Burkan, chairman of the Triboro Bridge Authority, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that according to a statement from the Woodcrest Construction Co., the contractors who ordered the steel, and from its own engineers, there was no other design of steel suitable for the purpose.

## Court Extends Meaning on Ghetto Laws

COLOGNE (JTA) — A new light was thrown this week on the Nuremberg marriage and citizenship laws by the decision of a Cologne court extending the meaning of the laws to forbid not only intimate relations of Jews with "Aryan" women but relations between "Aryans" and Jewish women.

In one case a former high official of the Nazi Party was tried for "Rassenschande" (race defilement) and acquitted only after testifying that he had severed relations with the Jewish girl in question after the Nuremberg laws were promulgated Sept. 15.

The defendant had been warned by the party in 1933 to discontinue his relationship with the Jewess, but ignored the warning. He was subsequently expelled from the Party. He admitted that he still meets the girl but declared he no longer has intimate relations with her.

The court ruled that there was not sufficient evidence to justify a conviction.

## German Stock Brokers Urged to Discourage Transactions With Jews

BERLIN (JTA) — At least fifty million marks is required for the purchase of Jewish firms which have already announced their intentions of selling out through the medium of newspaper advertisements, the Rheinische Landeszeitung reports on the basis of a survey it conducted.

Most of the firms, the paper states employ between 100 and 300 workers.

The number of smaller firms for sale is impossible to establish, the paper admits, explaining that these are sold without recourse to advertising. It states, however, that firms in this group, valued at less than 10,000 marks, are practically all out of Jewish hands.

In this connection, it is pointed out by the Essen Chamber of Commerce that German commercial life is still on the way to complete compliance with article 10 in the Nazi party's program which provides for the creation of a "healthy middle

## Family Welfare Society Establishes Endowment Fund

### \$100 Legacy Received Under Terms of Will of Hyman Silverman

An endowment fund has been established by the Jewish Family Welfare Society as a result of action taken by its board of directors on last Monday. The society started this fund with a legacy of \$100 received under the will of Hyman Silverman, formerly of Providence and late of New York. As a result of this gift and all other gifts which may be added from time to time it is hoped that the finances of this society may ultimately be placed upon a basis which will enable it to meet the needs for family welfare work more adequately than is at present the case.

By resolution presented to the board of directors by Isidore Hornstein, Esq., in corroboration with Jacob S. Temkin, Esq., counsel for the society, the legacy was placed in a separate account entitled "Jewish Family Welfare Society Endowment Fund." By the terms of the resolution this fund is open to the receipt of further gifts which may be made for capital purposes

Arthur J. Levy, president of the Jewish Family Welfare Society made the following statement in respect to the fund:

"The gift under the Silverman will enables Jewish Family Welfare Society to start an endowment fund, a step which it has very greatly desired to take ever since its inception in 1930. If this fund grows to proper proportions as the years go by

the amount of good which the Society can do will be greatly increased.

Due to the foresight of the founders of the Jewish Orphanage, for example, it is well known in Providence what great good is accomplished by the use of the income from the Orphanage endowment. This is likewise true in the case of many other local social agencies such as Family Welfare Society, Charitable Fuel Society, Home For Aged Women, and many others.

Due to the lack of funds, our society is unable to begin to meet the needs which it faces. Similar societies in other cities, established many years ago, operate upon much larger per capita budgets. Until some means is found of increasing the funds available it will continue to be necessary to exercise the most rigid economy in relieving families in distress and many such families cannot be given the full help which they deserve.

## Hans Luther Embarrassed by Questions

ST. PAUL, Minn. (JTA) — Embarrassing questions by the editor of an Anglo-Jewish paper and a student reporter on the persecution of the Jews in Germany an picketing by anti-Nazi served this week to make midwestern tour of German Ambassador Hans Luther a distinctly unpleasant experience.

After a distressing interlude here Monday as the object of interrogations by Fred H. Weinberg, managing editor of the American Jewish World, Dr. Luther permitted himself to be quoted as follows:

"I never before faced such a situation."

Dr. Luther had refused to reply to Mr. Weinberg's question: "How do you justify the passage of the Nuremberg decrees?"

All he would say was, "There are some people in the United States who think differently about different things."

As a result of protest, a group of business men cancelled a scheduled address by Dr. Luther. He did, however, address three other meetings here during the week despite protests from Jewish organizations.

In Madison, Wis., questions by a reporter for the New Student, Wisconsin University undergraduate paper, excited from the Ambassador a heated denial that there had been "persecution of any kind" in Germany (Continued on Page Two)

## 25 Jews Hurt in Polish Anti-Semitic Riots

WARSAW (JTA) — About twenty-five Jews were seriously injured in anti-Semitic excesses in the city of Lwow on an authoritative survey disclosed this week. It had been previously reported by Der Moment, Jewish newspaper, that seventy were wounded.

All victims are expected to recover and order has been restored.

The report that seventy were hurt was characterized as exaggerated by Senator Moses Shchorr, Polish Jewish leader, arriving here from Lwow, where he attended the rally opening the campaign of the Palestine Foundation Fund (Keren Hayesod) in that city. He confirmed the statement made to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by Deputy Emil Sommerstein on the telephone from Lwow.

The disorders broke out last Thursday in high schools and universities in Lwow.

## Poland's Youth Changing from Religion to Zionism Says Miss Hassenfeld

"Poland's Jewish Youth has eyes only for Palestine," Miss Edith Hassenfeld, recent visitor to Poland, declared yesterday in an interview with a Jewish Herald reporter. "It has become an obsession with them and seems to be replacing their faith in religion. Every Polish boy and girl is a member of some faction of Zionism. They dream and talk of the day they will be able to leave Poland for Palestine."

This Zionist fetish, Miss Hassenfeld believes has been the result of decades of harsh anti-Semitism on the part of Polish officials. In quiet programs the Polish government has been gradually strangling the Polish Jew. Jews are considered an ever-present bane and, apparently the authorities have seized upon the simple expedient of starvation as the means of ridding the country of Jews.

"A Jew is only in business for a limited period," Miss Hassenfeld said. "When his license expires he discovers that the renewal license

has been issued to a Gentile for his place of business. With his possibilities of earning a living rapidly diminishing the Polish Jew will soon be dependent upon sums of money given to them by foreign sympathizers. Indeed, were it not for a steady stream of money arriving daily from the United States, a great number of Polish Jews would have starved to death long ago."

The youth in Poland is constantly aware of his Jewishness. "They must associate with one another and in their walks through the streets, they are stoned and reviled with filthy names," Miss Hassenfeld said, and in corroboration of this state of affairs she related an instance in which she was the victim.

"While walking one late afternoon with several friends, a dirty, uncouth dressed youngster suddenly darted before us and grabbing hold of my hand raised it up, yelling meanwhile, 'Jewess! Jewess!' This (Continued on Page Six)

## DEPORT DANZIG JEWISH EDITOR

DANZIG (JTA) — Paul Berman, editor of the Danziger Echo, Jewish weekly, was deported to Poland by the authorities for having written two allegedly anti-Nazi articles.

Berman had originally been sentenced to four months in prison, but the sentence was changed to deportation upon the intervention by the Polish High Commissioner for Danzig, Dr. Casimir Papek.

While the editor was being deported, the police confiscated the latest issue of the Echo, only Jewish publication in the Free City, for using expressions like "Jewish persecutions and anti-Jewish agitation by Germany." The confiscation order pointed out that the Danzig Senate (which is controlled by Nazis) had decided that Jews were not being persecuted in Germany.

### Jews Attacked in Harbin Streets

HARBIN (JTA) — A reign of terror against Jews being conducted by White Russian groups was fanned this week by publication in two White Russian papers, the Harbin-koye Vremya and the Nash Put, of featured articles accusing the Jewish people of various crimes.

The Nash Put features on its front page a faked telegram from Afghanistan reporting that Jews killed a Moslem child for ritual purposes.

Jews are attacked daily on the streets, but no one dares complain for fear of imprisonment by the gendarmarie in cellars, where they are kept indefinitely and tortured. The attacks are conducted with the apparent consent of the police.

## HITLER'S DISHONOR

Newspaper readers recently saw and so far as we know the statement has not since been denied, that the names of 15,000 German Jews who died fighting for their country in the World War have been removed from the rolls of honor of the German war dead by order of the Hitler government.

Hitler and his cohorts have done much in an effort to shame the Jews which has in reality shamed themselves, but in this action against the dead war heroes of their country they have certainly sunk to the utmost depths of dishonor.

Not only does such an action demonstrate indecency of mind but it indicates that Hitler and his followers are not even possessed of common sense.

## ON MAKING CITIZENS

In the work of the Family Welfare Society which today has begun an Endowment Plan, there are considerations of this work that is seldom made public. Aside from their duties of routine handling of cases, seeing to it that the persons involved are assured of daily sustenance, they have a greater task that requires deep understanding and co-operation.

This task, seldom undertaken by other societies, is the rehabilitation of these charity cases. Given proper encouragement, a great percentage of these now helpless people, buffeted by chance and disappointment, will stand on their own feet. The helping of these people works two ways. It makes self-sustaining citizens of ambitionless drifters dependent upon local societies for their daily bread. Secondly, it decreases the list of cases that require charity.

Your contribution to this worthwhile Endowment is a helping hand to these unfortunate people. Many of them dislike to accept this food and clothing dole; they want a chance. Give them their chance. Contribute to the Endowment so that the Welfare Society can carry on.

## TURNING BACK THE CLOCK

Exactly two months after the Nuremberg laws — the German laws for forcing the German Jews into the Ghetto were passed, there came last week the regulations under these laws fixing the status of the Jews in Germany.

These regulations make the Jews subject of the state, without the right to hold a government position, without the right to marry an "Aryan", without the right to employ young "Aryan" women as domestics and without all the political and civil rights of a citizen.

But significantly omitted was a definition of the status of the Jews in commerce. This pigeon-holing should be considered as Hitler strategy, pending action by the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States on Olympic participation. It was also made clear by government officials that more edicts under the Nuremberg laws would shortly be issued. And serving as an additional reason for delaying commercial regulation is the weakness of the Berlin stock market as a result of forced sales of Jewish securities.

It must be realized, therefore, that Hitler in turning back the clock to the middle ages, is doing so gradually and with his eye on foreign opinion. He has no desire in these critical stages to force indignant sympathizers to action which might affect his pocket and the stomachs of his people.

But it must be realized that edicts forcing the German Jew into the Ghetto will only be withheld until a final decision is made on Olympic participation and when Jewish interests in Germany are liquidated. In any event should the Olympics be staged in Germany Hitler will merely await their termination before adding the final restrictions. And if the Olympics are removed to another country, the Jew once more will have to act as the scapegoat. If they win they lose, aptly expresses the future of the Jew in Germany.

# BOOK NOTES

Have you ever watched a white capped wave come in from way out on the sea? Remember how you expected it to thunder and pound when it reached the shore? But somehow it turned into a gentle, fluffy little ripple and you felt a bit cheated. That, in a way, describes the effect of George Locke Howe's book, "Slaves Cottage" (Coward-McCann).

The material is there for a strong and forceful novel, but the effect is lessened by the melodramatic last half of the book. It is almost as if the author started out to write a symphonic poem and then produced a jingle. Nevertheless, the book is interesting and entertaining.

The scene, which is laid in Hope, a sea coast town in southern New England, will probably be recognized as a nearby town. Hope, at the time of Julius Caesar Vandeleur, was a busy port with its cargoes of slaves, rum and molasses. Now, it had a mill, built by a later Vandeleur, which had imported hundreds of Portuguese and Italian workers. The town was divided into two sections, each resentful of the other.

Henry Vandeleur, the last remaining son, tried to fill in the gap between the conflicting elements. At forty-three, he lived with his wife Eleanor and his daughter Helen in Slaves Cottage, existing on a very parsimonious allowance dealt out to him by his father. He feels wasted, useless. His own sentimentality puts a barrier between him and the friends he desires.

Only when his college friend Jasper Fell and his son come to visit him does Henry make his first attempt to "know how the other half lives." He is persuaded to run for Mayor. Not that he needed much persuasion. As a matter of fact, he was delighted. He fondled all the Italian and Portuguese babies, drank more red wine than was good for him, threw open the grounds of the exclusive Point to his new friends. His backers, the tricky Judge Morris and the Boys, were a little bit dismayed at his wholehearted surrender to the "foreigners".

The love story of Helen and Tom-

my Fell is bound up with Henry's political hopes. He almost loses his sense of proportion. Just in time, he realizes that to set her free brings him freedom too.

The description of small town political manoeuvres is illuminating, so put it mildly. It would be painful to dwell upon its realism for it is not a particularly pretty picture. Judge Morris' scheme to betray "Mayor Vanilla", as Henry has been affectionately dubbed, reads a little like a "Nelly-the-cloak-model" scenario and sounds archaic.

The characterization, on the whole, are well drawn and the book itself, when its contrasting traditions, its humor and irony, is entertaining.

**Reading Suggestions**  
"The Golden Cord", by Warwick Deeping. (A. A. Knopf) A tender story of a mother's understanding for her son and his triumph over difficulties with her help. Reviewed last week.

"Nine Etched from Life" by Emil Ludwig. (Robert M. McBride) The title explains Mr. Ludwig's diversion from his usual type of subject. His previous biographies have not been sketched from life. The book is divided into two parts; first, the servants of the people; second, the rulers of the people.

In the first group are included Nansen of Norway, who restored countless prisoners of war to their own countries, Masaryk, the first president of Czech-Slovakia, Briand of France, Rathenau the Jew who saved Germany twice from invasion, and Motta of Switzerland. Among the second group are listed Lloyd George and Venizelos, of whom Mr. Ludwig says, "they were born a generation too soon and allowed themselves to be carried along with the democratic current of the times", Mussolini and Stalin.

against the order was sent to Mr. Burkan by Mayor LaGuardia from his bed in Mount Sinai Hospital, where he was undergoing treatment for scapula. It read:

"My dear Nathan: I have patiently and quietly watched and listened from the sidelines to the controversy over imported material for the Triborough Bridge.

"I have reached the conclusion that the controversy has ended in a draw, to wit: both parties the damned steel. Therefore, I just set the contractor to furnish American-made material with the job. That's all. In fact, it will be economy to do so. As Mayor I cannot permit the use of an intra-city bridge unless certain its safety. I cannot be certain of its safety, unless I first have every bit and piece of German-made material tested before used.

Yet from a study of the three books on Munsey, the du Ponts and Cardozo, we come away with the impression that the great American jurist, penniless in comparison with these others has enriched himself and his country to a far greater extent . . . Brilliant, thoughtful, human to a vast degree, leaning more to an interpretation of the spirit of the law than its letter, Cardozo's career is as rich and deeply-toned as a benediction . . . The Jewish race can well be proud of this great mentality."

naturally called us to the attention of passersby and if it were not for recent laws, my girl friends said, prohibiting public outbursts against the Jews, the urchin's actions would certainly have precipitated a riot.

### Shows Anti-Semitism

"Anti-Semitism in Poland is just as strong as it is in Germany. But the Polish Jew is not in the public eye. The world has become accustomed to hearing of Polish pogroms."

"But the effect on the Polish Jew has been terrible. He accepts all restrictions with sullen compliance shaking his head confusedly, as if to say, 'What good will it do to resist or protest.' He goes his way seldom considering what the next day may bring. It is a living death for them."

When questioned as to why Jewish representatives in the Polish government, for the most part, do not change existing conditions, Miss Haasensfeld said, "The Jew is rapidly being removed from the government. New laws are slowly cutting down the representation and with the recent high taxes applied to Jews, who are really second rate citizens, it is likely that Jewish representation will be a thing of the past."

### Student Difficulties

Returning to the subject of the Polish youth, Miss Haasensfeld gave several practical reasons why the Jewish youth has turned to Zionism. "Polish law," she said, prohibits a Jew from practicing law or medicine. The Universities permit only a few Jews to become students. Those who are accepted find University life intolerable. A friend of mine, an unusually capable girl, happened to be the only Jew in a particular class. One day she was told by her fellow students that her presence was objectionable and that she must leave. She refused; and the next day she was attacked and given a severe beating. No one attempted to interfere.

"Restricted in this manner, having little or nothing to do, for there are no jobs for them, they have turned into strong Zionist groups. They meet nightly at their own rooms and through this communal spirit they manage to sustain that omnipresent hope of emigrating to Palestine."

### New Restrictions Enforced

As to further restrictions against the Jews, Miss Haasensfeld stated that recent action in Germany has affected the Polish policy. And playing along with Germany they have made more degrading laws that affect only the Jews. Even to the extent of insisting that the Jews contribute their share of dead bodies to be practiced upon by embryonic surgeons.

"The position of the Jew in Poland is intolerable," she said, "and though they look only towards Palestine, entrance restrictions, and, in fact, a little dream for most of the Polish youth."
