

WAR THIS WEEK

Appoints Committee

A President's committee of eight—composed of four mainlanders and four insular citizens—began consideration of how to grant Puerto Rico home rule in harmony with the Atlantic Charter and President Roosevelt's request for legislation to "permit the people of Puerto Rico to elect their own Governor, and to redefine the functions and powers of the Federal government and the government of Puerto Rico respectively."

Breezy Report

Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo, calling on his countrymen for increased food and industrial production, promised to "deal more decisive blows" to Japan's enemies. "I am firmly convinced that we shall win the war and carry through our big plan, the establishment of a new greater East Asia," he said in a speech quoted by the Berlin Radio.

Fascists Ousted

Immediate dissolution of Fascist Party and annulment of "all dis-

criminatory decrees and laws" were among the first steps taken toward the rehabilitation of occupied areas in Sicily under Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, Allied Military Governor.

Renominated

President Roosevelt cannot escape being renominated and re-elected for a fourth term, Senator James E. Murray (D) of Montana, declared, although he had not discussed the subject with the President, he said.

On Neutral Ground

A German plane which made a forced landing in the Swedish Province of Dalecarlia has been taken over by Swedish authorities, and its crew, with the exception of a woman passenger, interned. Although announced as a courier plane, it was found to be armed with a machine gun.

Protective Measures

Pierre Laval, Vichy Chief of Government, has ordered new measures against sabotage and anti-government activity in an effort to guard against an uprising in the event of an Allied invasion.

Editorials

"Figure It Out"

The Treasury Department's War Savings Staff has inaugurated a new and hopeful campaign to step up the sale of War Bonds through payroll savings. Until recently the Treasury sought to have every wage earner set aside 10 per cent every payday. Now it has raised its sights. To each of us, it says simply "Figure It Out Yourself." The appeal is a democratic one, of a sort to which Americans are certain to respond.

More than 26 million individual Americans are now buying bonds regularly through a payroll savings plan. Perhaps not all of them can manage to meet the 10 per cent quota. A great many of them, however, can manage to set aside much more. Some families have two, three or even four members bringing in pay checks each week. And with overtime work, the size of the pay checks has increased. Depending on individual circumstances, it may be possible for such families to save as much as a third or a fourth of their aggregate incomes.

The Treasury is asking them to forget the old 10 per cent minimum and to think in terms of a maximum—to invest every cent they possibly can in War Bonds.

No Relaxing

The final sessions of Congress, before adjournment, were marked by exchanges involving the Jewish people and Jewish lawmakers.

When Rep. Samuel Dickstein, of New York, criticized colleagues for attacking "nationalities and minority groups" and stressed the need for wartime unity, Rep. John E. Rankin, of Mississippi, told the House that "Communist Jews" created race riots and said that "old line American Jews throughout the South and West are ashamed and alarmed at the Communist Jews."

It seems we've heard Rep. Rankin's song before. Wasn't it Hitler and Company who insisted that they were only persecuting Communist Jews?

The urgencies of war have lulled us into the belief that anti-Semitism ended with Pearl Harbor. The warming sun of a few victories, however, has given us sufficient indications that we must be on guard.

War Effort Aided By Wooden Limb

LONDON — A spring from a wooden leg is keeping a Wales munitions plant going at full speed.

When an important machine broke down because a tension spring had snapped, the toolroom superintendent, Francis Davidson, vainly ransacked the factory and neighboring blacksmiths and ironmongers for a spring of the requisite pressure.

Then remembered a tension spring that worked the ankle joint in his wooden leg. Dismantling the leg, he found the spring was what was needed. After fitting a worn spare spring in his ankle, and the original in the machine, both Davidson and the mechanism were moving at top speed again.

If Davidson ever has to press into war service the spare spring now in his ankle, he plans to ask the firm for a complete new leg.

Jewish Scientist Discovered Radar

LONDON — Do you know that Radar, the radio trap for Nazi raiders, was actually discovered by a German-Jewish scientist, Heinrich Hertz, way back in 1888? Experimenting with ultra-high frequency electro-magnetic waves, Hertz found he could make them jump through space and register a signal on an instrument

Correspondent in Middle East Praises Jewish Achievements

BOSTON — Praising Jewish achievements in Palestine, especially in the Plain of Sharon, Joseph G. Harrison, correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor with the United Nations Forces in the Middle East, in a cable from Tel Aviv says that "no fair-minded person passing through here would ever again assert that the Jews are by nature city dwellers, and incapable of tilling the soil successfully."

"I have made it a point," Mr. Harrison cables, "to question a number of British and American soldiers here on leave regarding their attitude and opinion on the Arab-Jewish question and I have discovered a strong general feeling of admiration for Jewish accomplishments in Palestine. This feeling of friendliness toward the Jewish cause is strongly rein-

United Agencies Hold Emergency Conference

Confer on Plight Of Jewish People

Experts on Relief Will Participate

NEW YORK — With its immediate aim the creation of a United Nations Agency to save the Jewish people of Europe, an emergency conference on the plight of the Jews is being held this week at the Hotel Commodore.

Participating will be experts on relief, transportation and international law, as well as churchmen of all creeds, business and labor leaders and prominent writers and artists.

Speakers at open sessions will include Dean Alfange, Sir Norman Angell, Archbishop Ahenagoras, Herbert Hoover, Max Lerner, Rep. Clare Boothe Luce, Dorothy Parker, Rep. Will Rogers, Jr., Count Sforza, Admiral Yates Stirling, Jr., Bishop Henry St. George Tucker and Peter H. Bergson.

In announcing plans for the conference, the committee in charge pointed out in a full-page advertisement that the Jewish people have suffered more casualties in the war than all of the United Nations combined, excepting Russia and China.

"Thirty-two nations are joined in a crusade to save humanity—yet they do nothing about the plight of the Jews," the announcement said. "Even in the Dark Ages, among the most savage and primitive peoples, rarely has there been such universal indifference to human suffering."

Weizman, Guest Speaker, Scores Anti-Zionists Intrigue

LONDON — Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Zionist World Organization, declared here that the anti-Zionists in America did not succeed with their intrigues. He made the statement in the course of a speech at a farewell gathering for Mrs. Archibald Silverman, American Zionist leader, who came here to help the

Keren Hayesod Campaign.

The farewell gathering was held in Hotel Claridge. Chairman of the gathering was Simon Marks, who announced that this year there already has been raised two hundred thousand pounds for the campaign quota of a quarter-million pounds.

Fred Nettler, of Glasgow, submitted National Fund certificate, that various communities, visited by Mrs. Silverman, bought in her name. After Mrs. Silverman's speech additional donations were made totalling ten thousand pounds.

Compile List of 25,000 Quislings

NEW YORK — The names of at least 25,000 Axis administrators, officials and party heads who are held responsible for atrocities against the civil population of occupied Europe, have been compiled by the special office of the governments-in-exile established in London. 11,000 of those listed are charged with perpetrating crimes in Poland alone.

Additional names are being added as they come in from underground groups in countries under the Nazi yoke. Herbert C. Pell, former U. S. Minister to Hungary and Portugal, was appointed American representative on the United Nations Commission to investigate war crimes.

King George Honors Mrs. Sam Bronfman

MONTREAL, Canada — Mrs. Samuel Bronfman, prominent Canadian Jewish leader, was tendered a reception here this week in honor of her having been made an officer of the Order of the British Empire by King George VI for her signal contributions to Jewish and non-Jewish philanthropic and war causes in the Dominion.

Hundreds of persons, including representatives of the Canadian Jewish Congress, the Canadian Red Cross, Hadassah and other groups with which Mrs. Bronfman is connected, crowded the YMHA here to congratulate her. A gold plaque was presented to Mrs. Bronfman on behalf of Montreal women.

Paralysis Strikes Deported Jews

LONDON — Paralysis in epidemic form, including a type known as lathyrism affecting the legs, has stricken hundreds of Jewish deportees in the Ukraine forced to eat harmful seeds as part of their diet, it was reported from Rumanian sources.

An official report by the Rumanian Jewish Central Office, based on a recent government-authorized inspection trip to Transnistria in southwestern Russia, said 207 persons were gravely ill with paralysis and 401 showed initial symptoms. Lathyrism was said to be widely spread.

U. S. Arabs Launch Anti-Jewish Drive

WASHINGTON — Members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives are being flooded with anti-Zionist propaganda by an Arab group in America styling itself "League of American-Arab Committees for Democracy" which is considered a pan-Arab "front" organization in this country.

In a letter circulated among senators here and dated Flint, Michigan, Najab R. Samra, secretary of the League, claims that American Arab groups "have made several attempts to persuade Zionists to suspend their damaging activities, for the duration at least, but without any apparent success."

Parents Charge Hospital Erred-Changed Boy to Girl

LOS ANGELES — Mr. and Mrs. Harry James Hardwig have sued the South Hoover Hospital for \$500,000 damages, charging that the hospital presented them with a baby girl instead of the baby boy they had been told was theirs.

The essential allegations are these:

Mrs. Hardwig became a mother on June 27 and Hardwig waiting in the corridor, was told by nurses and doctors that he was the father of "a nice big boy."

Hardwig saw the baby, with an identification band reading, "Sex-Male."

He named the baby Richard Allen Hardwig and so recorded the birth.

He paid a hospital fee to have Richard Allen Hardwig circumcized.

He bought a war bond in the name of Richard Allen Hardwig.

And, after all that, on July 3, when Mrs. Hardwig brought her baby home, she undressed him to give him a bath and discovered he was a girl.

"You can't stick me with this girl," screamed Hardwig, protesting at the hospital.

"There must be a mistake somewhere," was the best hospital attaches could answer.

Meanwhile, the Hardwigs are keeping the baby girl the hospital says is theirs, while charging the hospital with "permanent abduction of Richard Allen Hardwig."

COTTAGE CHEESE PIE

- 1/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3 tablespoon butter
- 1 tablespoon vegetable shortening
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 lb. dry cottage cheese
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
- 1 pkg. cream cheese
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk

Mix cracker crumbs with sugar and cinnamon. Mix all fats together, and work into crumb mixture. Line a pie plate with the mixture, patting it into place. Chill, while mixing the filling.

Beat egg yolks until thick. Blend sugar and flour. Add to egg yolks. Rub cottage cheese through a sieve and add to egg yolk mixture. Stir in vanilla and lemon rind. Mix evaporated milk with cream cheese. Fold this into egg mixture, then add stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into crumb lined plate and bake in a slow oven for an hour or more. Cool thoroughly before removing sides of pan. If you like a thicker consistency use more cottage cheese.

Women Theatre Managers Successfully Replaces Men

NEW YORK — Two gallery bums were resisting the efforts of several ushers asking them to leave the theatre. The situation looked nasty.

A mature, grey-haired woman approached. She spoke briefly in her softly modulated voice. The rowdies followed her with open mouths and accepted their refunds submissively.

In triumph, Mrs. Bessie Dove walked back into the Loew's Ziegfeld Theatre, of which she was then the manager. "They were so surprised to be thrown out by a woman that they simply forgot to object," Mrs. Dove explained.

Mrs. Dove, now manager of the Criterion at Broadway and 44th St. is one of the 37 women man-

agers Loew's is using in its 71 metropolitan houses to meet the growing manpower shortage. She is a trim woman who came to Loew's in 1911 as a cashier "just for a few months" (38 1/2 months to be exact).

The "Dean of the Women Managers" (her promotion came in 1929), Mrs. Dove arrives at the theatre by 11 each morning and rarely gets away before midnight. She is so busy that she seldom has time to see a picture through.

In Brooklyn at Loew's Kismet Theatre is Frances Segal, 30, who has time to see a picture through. She hasn't learned the trick of counting tickets by ear. Miss Segal is typical of the promotions which are the result of the war emergency.

"Last June, my manager walked up to me and said, 'You're an assistant—and that's the way it happened,' she remarked.

Oscar Doob, director of advertising and publicity for Loew's, said, "I don't know why we didn't start using women even sooner. They're as swell even without a war emergency."

\$1,500,000 Donated By American Jews

JERUSALEM — American Jews contributed sixty percent of the record total of \$2,626,000 received by the Jewish National Fund headquarters in the nine-month period from last September to May of this year, it was announced here this week. In the similar period of 1941-42, \$1,583,936 was collected.

The JNF announcement also disclosed that the funds received in May marked a new high in monthly totals in the history of the organization. More than \$550,000 was contributed.

British Jews End Old Agreement

LONDON — The Board of Deputies of British Jews, leading Jewish representative body in England, at its annual meeting this week voted to discontinue its agreement with the Anglo-Jewish Association, which was founded in 1871 to obtain protection for oppressed Jews in Eastern Europe, and to reorganize the Joint Foreign Committee which was set up in 1878, with seven representatives of the Board of Deputies and three from the Anglo-Jewish Association as its membership.

Harry Greenstein Given Coveted Post in OFFRR

BALTIMORE — At the request of Herbert H. Lehman, director of the Office of Foreign Relief and Rehabilitation, Harry Greenstein, executive director of the Association Jewish Charities of Baltimore, has been granted a year's leave of absence to assist in the planning of welfare programs in the office of the OFFRR, it was announced here.

Mr. Greenstein will serve as general consultant in the Division of Program and Requirements and will help to develop plans dealing with mass problems of relief in the liberated areas. Upon confirmation by the State Department, Mr. Greenstein will immediately assume his new duties.

Mr. Greenstein has a broad background of knowledge and experience in the field of social welfare. From 1933 to 1936 he served as Maryland's first State Relief Administrator, and helped to lay the ground-work of the present public-welfare system in the State. In 1934 he was appointed C.W.A. administrator by Harry L. Hopkins. He was one of the founders of the Baltimore Council of Social Agencies and was its president for a period of five years.

In 1939 he was called to New York to make a study of the refugee agencies which resulted in the creation of the National Refugee Service, Inc. During the past year he has been serving as Regional Evacuation Office of the O.C.D. He has also served as national president of the American Association of Social Workers, and of the National Conference of Jewish Social Welfare.

Research Into Old and New Humor Bores Investigator

Sober-faced Harry E. Weiss, who has studied a thousand or more joke books dating back through several centuries, says he hasn't gotten a single laugh from them.

After writing a history of the American species of joke book for the New York Public Library, Weiss says his research bored him and left him "totally unresponsive." The same old jokes live on and on, he found, as he read the output from Shakespeare's day to this.

Surrounded by piles of reports on farm pests and the living costs of humans, the slight and sober little agricultural scientist told of his after hours excursions into the histories of jest books, dream books, the art of barbering, baby rattles, comic valentines, penmanship, and children's books.

He found there was a big boom in publishing and selling the pocket-sized joke books during the first World War, when friends sent them to soldiers, but the men in service now get more varied read-

ing matter and the boom has failed to recur in World War II.

Weiss avers that Hollywood, Broadway, and radio gag writers are the best market now for joke books that keep rolling off the presses year after year. "They just cook the old ones over," he says.

Did you hear that comedian pull that gag on the radio about the actress who told him she saw his picture and it looked so much like him that she kissed it? And he asked her if it kissed her back, and she said "No," and the comedian said, "Then it couldn't have been me."

Well, says humor historian Weiss, the ladies in merrie olde England were bursting their stays laughing at just about the same joke back in the days of George III.

Weiss says he turned off his radio the other night when he heard a streamlined version of this one, which he read in The Youthful Jester, printed in Baltimore about 1800: Two Irishmen were ten miles from London. "By my shoul and St. Patrick," says one, "it is but five miles apiece."

Wave of Horror Started In Greece

Pogroms Waged By Nazis in Greece

CAIRO — The latest anti-Jewish pogroms followed immediately after a wave of strikes which seriously crippled Axis war production in Greece, the report said.

The invasion-jittery Nazi authorities, alarmed at the extent of the strikes and other anti-Nazi acts, charged that the estimated 9,000 Greek Jewish guerrilla fighters were responsible for the strikes.

Anti-Jewish pogroms took place simultaneously in several Greek cities and although the exact number of Jewish casualties is unknown it is believed to be heavy.

At the same time the Nazi authorities appealed to the Greek population to inform on the Jewish guerrilla fighters in order to break the strikes. The response to this Nazi appeal, as with previous ones, was negligible.

Aryan Sympathy Disturbs Boche

NEW YORK — Nazi reporters, describing the deportation of the last group of Jews from the Netherlands, said that they were "amazed at the tears shed by both sides—The Jews who were leaving and the Aryans who had been carrying the Jews' luggage during their last walk through the streets of Amsterdam," account in Netherlands Information Bureau here.

One of the writers is quoted as stating: "We National Socialists stood simply stunned. Aryans and Jews were standing side by side at this modern Wailing Wall, with tears in their eyes as if ready to offer resistance to this so-called violence against the Jews." Another reporter said: "We saw two persons who were not wearing the Jewish Star pushing a cart not only piled with a heap of rubbish which was obviously intended for Poland, but also carrying a fat Jewess. Some Jews arrived in carriages."

To Honor "King" Cohen in Palestine

LONDON — The same of Sgt. Sydney Cohen, the young Jewish RAF pilot who secured the surrender of the Italian island of Lampedusa when he was forced to land there because his fuel supply had run out, will be inscribed in the Jewish National Fund's "Golden Book" in Jerusalem, it was announced here. At the same time, it was suggested that the JNF set aside a special page in the book for men and women who have distinguished themselves in military service.

Vets Seek \$250,000 To Fight Fascism

NEW YORK — A campaign to raise \$250,000 nationally to meet the problems of the returning servicemen and to fight against "our home-grown Fascists" has been inaugurated by the Jewish War Veterans of the United States.

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Detroit Race Riots Reveal Peculiar "Jewish Angle"

NEW YORK — A study of Detroit's recent racial riots revealed a peculiar "Jewish angle." A walk through Hastings St., the center of destruction, shows that about 80 per cent of all stores over a distance of about two miles were looted, it is estimated that about three-fourths of all the ruined stores were Jewish.

An interesting angle of the Detroit racial riots from a Jewish viewpoint, is the story told by Louis Martin, editor of the Michigan Chronicle, a Negro publication. Mr. Martin told how a Negro agent of the America First Committee had approached him with a proposition to lure Detroit Negroes into his organization on a general anti-Semitic and anti-labor program modeled very much after Nazism.

The program of the America First Committee being "Aryan," the committee was willing to "Aryanize" the Negroes in the same manner in which the Japanese people have been "Aryanized" by Hitler, providing that the Negroes, through their religious organizations, could remove the Jews as an obstacle.

With 112 registered campers, Camp Centerland, conducted by the Jewish Community Center, on its grounds at 65 Benefit street, is now operating to its full capacity. Children from 5 through 13 come to the camp 5 days a week for a full day program which includes the following activities: sports, field trips, story-telling, arts and crafts, singing, rhythm band, and dramatics.

Weizmann Rebukes Zionist Extremists

LONDON — Zionist extremists in the U. S. were rebuked by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, for calling in published newspaper advertisements upon Britain to surrender the Palestine mandate to the U. S.

Declaring that the future of the world depended upon friendly Anglo-American relations, Dr. Weizmann, who recently returned to England after an extended stay in America, said the demand was "most unfortunate."

"America doesn't want the mandate," he told a press conference here, "and nobody wants to give it."

CANNOT LEAVE

LONDON — The German government has vetoed all plans to obtain permits for Jews, whether adults or children, to leave Axis-dominated countries.

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
